Easter last during Roger's life, and (2) the lands in the said bishopric of John son and heir of Thomas Wattekynesone of Foxstan, and the marriage of the said John, which are in the king's hand by the forfeiture of the said Roger, to hold the same from Easter last until the lawful age of John, rendering at the Exchequer by equal portions at Michaelmas and Easter 4 marks yearly for the rent and 2 marks yearly for the lands, and paying 20s. in hand at the Exchequer for the marriage; with clause touching maintenance of buildings etc. The said William de Fulthorp is bound to the king, by a recognisance made in the Exchequer, in 12 marks to be paid at the king's will in the event of his failing to pay the said farms within two months after any term.
