March 28. Commission during pleasure to Roger Seward and John Chichestre
Westminster. to collect in the port of Melcombe (1) the new customs granted to Edward I. by foreign and alien merchants in return for certain liberties, (2) the custom and subsidy on wools, hides and woolfells, to wit, on each sack of wool 50s. from denizens and 4 marks from aliens, on every 240 woolfells the like amounts, and on every last of hides 100s. from denizens and 8 marks from aliens, and (3) the custom on cloths of wool and worsted made in England for export; and to keep the 'coket' seal in the said port, answering at the Exchequer for the issues; and to appoint substitutes to act for them where they cannot attend in person.

March 8. Order to the sheriff of Kent and all knights, free men, reeves,
Westminster. bailiffs, ministers, suitors of courts, hundreds, leets and 'lawedayes,' and all other the king's lieges in the said county, to be intendant to Peter Lambert, whom the king has appointed during pleasure to be bailiff of the liberty of the king's hundred of Middleton, and to make executions and returns within the said liberty of all the king's writs and mandates, as well of summons of the Exchequer as of the king's other courts, and to collect and receive for the king's use all the issues, fines, amercements and other profits which pertain to the king in respect of the said liberty and the king's court of his castle of Ledes, answering at the Exchequer for the moneys forthcoming, and to keep all the king's fees within the said hundred and in all other the king's manors and lands in the said county, and to do all else that pertains to the offices of bailiff of the liberty and keeper of the fees.
