The name of the office was changed to Belkmap Springs June 15, 1875. About 1891 the name was changed to Belkmap Springs."

I can find no J. H. or R. S. Belknap of the Alpine Belknap's, so don't know if these 2 men are of the Benton Go. Belknap's.

Thank you for the copy of your letter to Mrs. Milne. Hope she's answered by now, and has added more info. All those bits and pieces help.

Have you written to Violet Belkmap of Jefferson, Ore. lately to see if it's possible she may have the address of Reva Barrett? Violet is the one who first asked me if there was any relationship. She had sent Reva some of the papers.

As to copying any Belknap info for Byrnice and Sylvia. I've already sent them all you've sent me in the past. I certainly don't mind typing one or two pages at all, but some that are many many pages I find it hard to get around to doing.

In looking thru my correspondence with Violet I find that she sent some things to someone else. Here is exactly what Violet says: 'Could you by any chance be related to Reva Barrett? I sent some of The Old Lady Belkhaps' writings also ledger to Lovina Belkhap Christian a long time ago when a friend found them when wrecking a house near Coquille (Ore.)—everyone there called her 'The Old Lady'. I felt I shouldn't keep them so mailed them on. Have alsays wished I had copied some of it.'

So we have lots of info thru your kindness in sharing and we are very grateful. By the way, do you have a copy from Sylvia Richardson that is headed 'Fioneer Family Statistics-Belknap'? This is compiled from the bk. 'They Laughed, Too' by Edna A. Mintonye, pub. 1968 by the Naylor Go. If not, let me know and will send you a copy.

Can't remember if I've sent the following, seems I have. But anyway, it's taken from a book (forget the name) by a man named MacArthur who has taken every geographical name for towns, mountains, creeks, etc. in Ore. and has traced the origin of their name.

Belknap Crater---Deschutes & Linn counties. This in one of the important features of the Cascade Range, & lies just north of McKenzie Pass. The crater and its enormous lava fields are easily seen from the McKenzie Mwy. and produce a spectacle that is swe inspiring to say the least. The crater has an elevation of 6877 ft. It was named for J. H. Belknap, an early resident along the McKenzie River and a son of R. S. Belknap who developed Belknap Springs. J. H. Belknap was interested in the toll road that was built over McKenzie Pass in the early 1870's.

Belknap Springs, Lane Co. R. S. Belknap located these springs in Nov. 1869 and conceived a plan for developing them. They now bear his name. Salt Springs Fost Office was established Oct. 26, 1874, with Belknap postmaster.

Dear Kay:

Much thanks for the record of Electa's marriage. It helps in many ways. For instance, it places Jonas (jr) and his family in Allen Co. Ohio when Jesse was there. And it places EMMI Starrs there, too -- for the Rev John W Starr, brother of Jeremich Starr, was father of Mancy Starr who married Orin, son of Jonas (jr) -- and had a farm next to this Orin's in Belknap Settlement in Oregon -- as no doubt you know.

As you must know, I've been interested in tracing the westward route of our brash of the family, and most of it is pretty clear now. But I don't always know when they moved separately or together. For instance, preliminary evidence of land deeds in Licking County, Ohio, seems to that Jonas may have been the first to move from Kentucky to Ohio -- followed by Jesse -- and a little later by Elijah. And that Jesse was the first to leave licking County, Jonas second, Elijah third. But I don't knew whether Elijah went to Allen County. Maybe Clinton Belknap, descendant of Elijah, will know. I'll send him a copy of this letter.

In citing documents on settlement of estate of Jonas (jr) you say: "Letter enchosed (with the document) indicates #INTERIOR agent date was in 1849 & Jonas was living as late as Jan 31 1853."

LIFE pictures in of Belknap factory, Leconia H H. Yes, I saw it. Lots of Belknaps in Vermont and N H in 18th and 19th centuries. I haven't tried to trace that one, yet. Probably somewhere in my records of more than 4000 persons.

Riverside, Conn., is a section of Greenwich -- one of seven sections each of which has its own post office.

I've been Fereading your letters to see if you MEER ever told me your own Belknap

I have identified REVA BARRETT.

Though she is (or was) a descendant of Jesse Belknap, brother of Jenas (jr), it may well be that she is (or was) a cousin of your husband.

Wrote to Mrs Milne today, misdating letter as you'll see -- copy enclosed. to a Belkmap in Iowa,

Re. Reva Barrett. She lent, some years back, the most nearly complete version of Aunt Kit's writings that I have yet seen. Unfortunately, even this version is blank on the later part of the trip from Iowa to Oregon — the very part on which there's disagramment in what has been written by other people. So I keep hoping I'll find how to get in touch with Reva and ask her aid in tracing the missing portion of the manuscript.

Have noted your wish that I send duplicate copies of material to Sylva and Mrs Hanson. Will do. But am not sure I know that I've sent you thus far. Of course you have Sylvia's address and I think her gunt, Mrs. Byrnice Manson, 738 No. Bay Drive, North Bend, Ore. 97459. The 3 of us have met and we exchange the info you send. The only new names I might add are: Mrs. H. Bayard (Frances) Milne, 2009 Lybecker Rd., Fullman, Wn. 99163. In her 1968 letter to me she states: The Belknaps are not my line, the query was placed by another person of whom I had inquired about Jeremiah Starr, hoping in some way to connect him to the family of John W. Starr (Rev.), he had 17 ch. most of them settling around Monroe and later throughout the Willamette Valley. John W. Starr'sy brother, Moses Starr brought his family west a few years after John W. but he died just as he got to Glackamas Co. His wife came on to the Belkmap settlement. They had about 17 ch. also. The Starrs and Belknaps intermarried frequently but the Belknaps are not my line. I seem to run across a lot of Belknap info from time to time, but have never filed it so am not sure where to put my hands on it at this time. Someone who is working on the Belknap line, and whom I believe has a lot of info is: Mrs. Margaret K. Smith, 35552 Roca Dr., Freemont, Calif. 94536. The Jeremiah Starr records in the probate file seem to be missing. The way Benton Co. court house keep their reocrds, it's a wonder more people haven't walked off with more.

I haven't written to Frances since, and just discovered that I've never written to Mrs. Smith either.

You ask about my tie with Electa. My husband descends from Electa and husband Steven Howell's dau., Nancy Ann Howell marrying John Armstrong Bounds. Whichever one of us gets to the Alpine Ceme. will take a pic of the grave of Jesse & Jane and send it to you, if you don't have one already.







Dear Mr. Belknap:

I certainly appreciate the xeroxed copy you sent. It's really interesting. I'm now in the process of trying to obtain the marriage certificate for Stephen and Electa. The Probate Court in Allen Co. couldn't find one, but gave me the address of the local historical Society, so I still have hope. I haven't been able to see any Chio census and would need to know where her parents were in 1830 anyway.

Last Sun. we stopped by the Alpine cemetery on our way home from visiting friends and copied the inscriptions on the Belknaps. Didn't have time to see if Glenbrook or Bellfountain have cemeterys but will do so next time we have a chance. The following I copied from Vol. II of Oregon Donation Land Claims. You may already have it, but will send it along anyway.

#1550 BELKNAF, Polly, & heirs of Jonas Belknap, Benton Co.; settled claim Aug. 20, 1851. Letter enc. indicates settlement date was in 1849 & Jonas Belknap was living as late as Jan. 31, 1853. Jesse Belknap gave MA as Jan. 15, 1813. Siggers of affadavit: Abiatuan Newton, Herman C. & Ramdolph Buckingham.

If you wish me to send the gravestone inscriptions, other Belknap land claims, and the 1870 Benton Co., census, just let me know. I don't know what you have or need.

I decided to go ahead and order the Taylor chart on the Belknap's and that day received a letter from Fern Martin saying she was sending her chart & I could have it copied. I'd already sent for it tho, and after seeing how blurred hers is in spots, I wish I hadn't. I hope the one they send me is in better shape than hers. The top part of her chart is cut off, but notice the date is 1400-something, too hard to read. The information you sent starts in 1589/90. How far back does the chart go? Has it been proven back to the 1400's?

Neither Jones or Mary Ann are buried at Alpine. Did they come to Ore.? Jesse and Jane are buried there but are not listed in the 1870 census. Jesse's stone says: Jan. 26, 1792--Nov. 19, 1881 wife Jane March 26, 1792--Dec. 10, 1876.

Have the Taylors written a book about the Belknaps? Seems they either were, or intend to do so, and I'd like to obtain a copy. So many questions, & I hope you don't mind. Must close for now, and thank you once again for taking the time to send me the information.

I also had a letter yesterday from Bertha Hansen with whom I've been writing for about two months. Am also writing to Mrs. Gilbert M. Belknap, Rt. 1 Box 157, Jefferson, Ore. 97352 whose husband descends from Jesse. She sent ms a note someone in the past had written, that stated Electa married Stephen Howell, but she didn't know how Electa was connected to the Belknap's. The note says: Electa Belknap b. 1821 and died Sept. 15, 1861. Doesn't give any places. Married on Jan. 2, 1838 to Stephen Howell. Crossed the plains from Iows in 1852 and settled near Monroe, Ore. Their children were: (this is from my notes)

Austin Howell-b.? d. Jan. 1903 m. Susan Jane McFall-7 chld. Wm. Howell-b.? d.?-m. (1) MaryzRexford; dleb877)(2) Arista Brown Re had 4 children

Silas Howell-b. April 29, 1845, d. March 19, 1924. m. Jerusha Ann Hayden on Dec. 25, 1864. 5 children.

Stephen was b. 1816 but don't know where. He died in 1877. He also m. Polly McFall after Electa died. They may have had a son Walter who died in 1922. A woman once made up a Howell-Carter booklet (Stephen had 2 known brothers, one whom m. Margaret Carter) had she had sthings terribly mixed up. She also had so much trouble getting people to answer her letters. She had Stephen m. to Sarah Redenour who was his daughter but got that straighten out myself a by an elderly woman whose mother was Mary Ellen Howell Hoover.

Now when I looked over the donation land claims bks. for Ore. I didn't know Electa was the mother of Nancy. Then I obtained Nancy's death certificate later. This is what I have: #2025-3tephen Howell, Benton Co., Ore. Born 1817 in Ohio. Arrived in Ore. Oct. 3, 1852; aettled claim Oct. 1, 1853. Married Electa Jan. 2, 1838, in Allen Co., Ohio. Affidavit: Isaac Rambo, David Hawley, Lewis A. Rambo and Wm. Howell. Next chance I get, will copy down all the Belknap's listed and send them on to you. Should be able to see the books in about a wk. and a half. I must also get busy and send to Allen Co. for the marriage record.

The enclosed land claim map was sent to me by Mrs. Gilbert Belknap. She copied it from somewhere and Iêve done this copy from hers. Will ask her where she got it and then see if I can't get a photocopy made. Then will send Bertha and you one.

Now I nate to ask this as it might be too much of an undertaking, but

I would like all the information you can send me on the Belkmap's. If this is asking way too much, please don't hesitate to say so. Have you seen the 20' long history of the Belkmap's that Mr. & Mrs. Taylor of Nev. have made? Maybe if it's of your Belkmap's I can just send the \$10 and save you the trouble.

I'm going to have to make copies of everything sent to me on the family and have it xeoroxed-net sure I spell that right-then can send copies on to other interested Belkmap's. Did that for my Rickabaugh line and it sure helps.

I'm so grateful for the help you've given me already and hate to ask for more, but anything you can tell me will certainly be greatly appreciated.

Here's a copy of a brief new I wrote today for Gladys Gray, the wonderful

woman who dug up -- in several years of expert effort -- most of what filled we now know about the quarter-century when our family lived in Catarie County, HI.

Some day I'll write a much fuller story - when I'm sure of all my facts.

So please help no correct my errors I have made in this first short summary.

Note revisions

GLADYS:

I'm impelled to send you a copy of a newspaper piece (1927), about my father's sister Mary. It came to me on the death of her daughter Rose a week or so sgp. Because you became so deeply interested in my people during your long work on the family of Jonas Newton Belknap. I think that you must sometimes have wondered "what became of them, after they left Ontario County?"

So maybe I should preface the enclosure by summarising the story of my own branch: Jesse and his descendants.

As you already know, the next stopping place after Ontario County was Kentneky — Hart and Hardin Counties, circa 1820. Jesse and his brothers and two of his sisters didn't stay there more than a few years. "Counties' put up with slavery," says family tradition. So, by 1830, they were in Licking County, Chio — just east of Columbus. I've summarised that part of the record in what I wrote about Elisha.

Some of Jonas Newton B's children stayed there: MHIMX Esther and her husband Gamaliel Garlinghouse: Cynthia and Isaac Newton. And Grin, who set out to join his brothers in Oregon but went back to Licking County when his wife AMMENENHAN died on the way west. And Elisha, after he came there in 1830.

But Jesse, Elijah, and Jonas(Jr) didn't stay put. In the middle 1830's (or maybe a year or so sooner) Jesse sold his Licking County land to his brother-in-law Gemaliel and moved his family farther west: to Allen County in NW Ohio -- beginning all over again the same old task of clearing wooded land.

After a few years in Allen County, the next move came -- overland to Van Buren County in SE Iowa-- arriving there in 1839, it is said. Brother Elijah was then (or "thenabouts") in next-door Wapello County. And Jonas (Jr) and his family were in that areas, but I don't know just where.

Then, seven or eight years of apparent prosperity, till very suddenly in 1847
Jesse (and probably Jonas Jr. but certainly two sons of this Jonas ; Silas
and Orin) decided to succumb to "Oregom fever" -- to the known dismay of at
least one of the womenfolk: Keturah Penton, wife mix of Jesse's oldest son, George.

why all this continual "moving on?" The traditional explanation, by the members of the next two generations, was a fatalistic "It was in their blood" and I still hear late these words sometimes. But the true explanation, I feel sure, was something much more basic — the simple fact that these people were farmers who necessarily had large families.

Their forefathers, too, had been farmers — in Massachusetts and Connecticut — in times when there was virtually no Midding farm labor to hire. In early New England, the "hired hand" was so uncommon as to be notable when he existed. So in order to farm that hard land, sons were essential — as many as possible. But when the sons grew up, it was never possible to provide enough nearby land for them — so most sons had to move to places faither on, where land was available — and sometime the fathers tookthe lead in moving, by selling out and taking their whole families to new places, as Jonas Newton B's father Samuel did when he sold his land in north central Connecticut and took his MICKEMMINENTIMENTED. Wife and children to the newly AMMINIMAL opened "Murrayfield Plantation" in central Massachusetts.

One pseudo-genealogist, Gleen Evens, has emplained the moves as being "a search for free land." It was no such thing, till the very end of the story. The land on which Jonas Merten B and the Carlinghouses settled in Ontario County wasn't free for the taking. It had to be bought. The same thing had been true when Jonas's father Samuel moved to Marrayfield Plantation, which was a land-selling enterprise. It had been true before, when his grandfather, also a Samuel, had come from Margrisl, Massachusette, to morthem Councetiont. Not free land, but land evailable for Markhami purchase. It was true again, in Kentucky and MINIX then in Onio. 2 think (UKT don't know for sure) that It was also true in Iona.

There the members of my tribe filed "Donation Land Claims" and settled in a compact group of farms with their patriarch, Jesse, in its center. But I'm getting ahead of my story.

Jesse, in 1847 when my tribe left Ious, had long since become an acknowledged leader. It was perhaps only natural that he was elected captain of that wagon train - which had something more than 100 wagons, seconding to one record. He remained captain EMESI till the train reached Sode Springs, near Fort Hall in the SE corner of Idaho.

him when that map was drawn.

there the family divided. ZEE elder children and their hasbands went on to Gregor by a newly opened southern route: the Applegate Road — sputhwest down the Humboldt River ("the river that dies") — across the Black Rock Desert — past Hount Shasta — finally across the Rogue River on a ferry operated by some time Indians — and so into the Willamporte Velley. I shudder when I think of that hard route, which is described in detail in De Voto's "Tear of Decision," which tells the story of the first amigrant train that followed it in 1846, one year before my people did. (De Voto also shows the truth about these early amigrants: that they were and had to be people of substance, able to defray the high cost of the journey. "The misfits," he wrote, "came later, when the railroads want HEEE had been built.")

Meanwhile, Jesse and Jane and their younger children (and some of the others, I'm not sure which, except for Hannah and her husband Box dilbert) waited at Soda Springs or Fort Hall till the spring of 1848 and then went on to Gregon by the old Gregon Trail (US 30 on today's maps) up to the vicinity of Walla Walla, then down the south bank of the Columbia River, and eventually to Belikmap Settlement on the Willamette — where the town of Alpine is now, and where many of my tribe are buried.

I have a copy of an old hand-drawn map showing the farms they lived on - Jesse in the center, ringed about by his children: Kesiah and her husband Chatman Hawley; Hannah and her husband Dow Gilbert fixeeham ("Lorenso Gilbert" in the Walbridge book); Ranson and his wife Mehala Starr; George and his wife Keturah Penton; Talitha Cumi and her husband Samuel Starr - and Polly Belkmap (Mary Ann Garlinghouse, widow of Jesses brother Jonas) and some of her children. Jesse's youngest children, my grandfather Corrington and the still younger Harley, were still living with

That was the end of the treveling that began back in Hererhill about 1700. The "old SERRE folks" would remain ferrore. The next generations, beginning with my gradifather Corrington, would start entering the professions and business. There's more to the story - much more - and someday I'il try to put all of it on paper.

But perhaps I've gone far enough to ensuer the question that must have been in your mind: "How did they come out?" . . . Examin These you, they come out all right.

You asked about Dick Taylor's chart. He means well, but he just publishes what is sent to him. He verifies nothing. I don't use his entries until I have proved them to be correct - which doesn't always happen. . . As far as I know, neither he or Charlene has published anything else about the Belknap family. Heanwhile, they have helped me a lot, by sending me inquiries that they couldn't answer. They are good people.

I'm enclosing a copy of my letter to Mrs Richardson, as some parts of it may be of interest to you.

Looking at my copy of what I sent you long ago. I see some points on which new information has been obtained. Should pass it along to you.

ABRAHAM'S WIFE: In 1969, field workers of the Salt Lake Genealogical Society found the record of Abraham's marriage: at Latton, Essex, 28 Oct 1617; to Mary Stallion, daughter of Thomas Stallion & Mary Dalton. . . It's good to be able to stop arguing with people who have invented surnames for Mary.

JONAS HENTON BELKHAF: There were errors and deficiencies in what I sent to you -most of which have now been remedied in the process of developing proof that Carol
Anne's encester Elisha was son of Jonas Newton B. I enclose a copy of the parts

Jonas enlisted as a private in the Massachusetts militia, in same company as his father, on 3 May 1775, and fought with his father on Bunker Hill, at age 16. After the death of his father, he re-enlisted in the 7th Massachusetts Regiment and served in that regiment till the end of the Revolutionary War — being one of the few men who served from the beginning of the war to its end. Discharged from the Army in June 1783, by General George Washington, with award of a badge for good and faithful service, and with rank of sergeant. Shortly afterward, Married Esther Parker and began moving westward. In his later years, received a pension as result of having been wounded during the war. Was in a number of battles, the most important being Saratoga and Yerktown.

Dear Mrs. Berrett:

I'm glad Fern Martin gave you my address, for I think I can help you, for I've recently been digging up some information for a descendant of Rachel Belknap, sister of the Electa whose parentage you ask about.

There have been a number of Belkmap girls named Klacta. This one was the daughter of Jones Belkmap and Mary Ann Garlinghouse, who were married in Ontario county, New York, and afterward moved west -- over a period of more According to the records in my files, than 30 years -- to western Oregon. Electa was born in 1820. If so, then she was probably born in the area near Columbus, Ohio, as the family did not go on to Iowa until 1839? Or later. It would be 1839 if Jones and Mary Ann accompanied his brather Jesse (my great grandfather) on the move from Ohio to Iowa; but I have no certainty on this point. Woon Jesse and all his children and grandchildren moved from Iowa to Oregon (Monroe) in 1817 and 18h3, two sons of Jonas - Orin and Silas - went But Jones and Mary and and their daughters are believed to have stayed behind for a few years, arriving in Oregon in 1850 - though there is some evidence, which I have not yet studied thoroughly, that Jones became a landomer in Oragon in-1869.

I should add that Mary Ann, wife of Jones, was known by the nickness of Polly, in Oregon. Her sister Jame was the wife of my great grandwather Jesse.

Please write me and tell me all that you can, about your relationship to Electa.
