You're forcing me to do the hard digging that I've been avoiding for five years.

For longer than that, I've known that the data on our earlier generations in America are shaky -- inconsistent -- debatable -- and dependent mostly on who put them on paper -- with no two persons agreeing on all points.

Thus far, I've worked out, in acceptable form, only the facts for our first abraham and for Jonas Newton Belknap. In between them, I've done little or nothing -- being swamped with afforts to get information from living people while they're still alive. (Some six of my correspondents have died in the past three years).

To try to arrive at any worthwhile correction of erroneous or questionable entries. I'll have to order from NEHGS something like 50 books that have been cited by various people -- EXEM a few at a time is all that they'll send. And then still be left with the old old problem or and by (A) the unreliability of Massachusetts vital records before about 1500 and (2) the relatively few that had been remade and published by NEHGS, and (2) the dubious versuity of old New England town histories.

And I'll be duty bound to follow up every hint in Evans work, ever though I've often found that he cites sources that contain not one word on the person concerned. I have to keep in mind that once in a while I find he has something that nobody else has — and is right about it. But I continually dawn him for the time he makes me waste.

So I shudder when I look at the set of sheets that accompanied your memo, for at every glance I see old problems and debatable entries -- and questionable sources, such as the Compendium and other commercial enterprises which printed (without verification) whatever was sent to them by nice little old ladies.

Heaven help me, I'll have to face this task someday. But not now. There are other things that I must do first, in the next three months. And in the end, I may come out with nothing more nearly acc urate than HWB's notes were.

So much for that.... Should tell you that to make my work more difficult, I'm trying to get hold of a set of Evans' stuff much bigger and more detailed than anything of his that you and I have yet struggled with. I've seen samples of it -- a few pages -- and can't justifiably cuit trying to get all of it.

The fact that the HWB listings include my grandfather, Joseph Gillett, an uncommon name (is Gillett) in the Belknap line and gives his year of birth correctly would lead me to believe that HWB's list of Elijah's offsprings may have been founded on good information. He does not show his source of information for this listing does he?

In your memo of h/7/68, paragraph 7, you memtion a "friend Abjiah Wright" and comment that you recalled seeing this name some place else in the records relating to the Belknaps but couldn't at the moment recall where it was. He is carried as the husband of Romanna Parker, da of Elijah Parker and "a Miss Stiles" in the "Parker in America" entry relating to Esther Parker.

In your memo to Dick Taylor under date of 4/22/68 you have a typeographical error in the listing of children of Ebenezer. You show "(4) a daughter, born about 1796." I am sure you meant 1696 and have so noted on my copy.

On August 14, 1967, when I was in Washington, D. C., I stopped in at the National Archives and made a list of the Belknaps, some 33 in all, who served in the War of 1812. They ranged from private through corporal, sergeant, fifer, musician, pay master, quarter master, ensign, 2nd. Lieutenant, Lieutenant, captain to Lt. Colonel Isac Belkmap Jr., Commander of (Belknap's First Regiment N.Y.Militia. 26 were from New York; 4 from New Hampshire, and one each from Ohio, Virginia and Massachusetts. I may try to get the dates for the Elijah transactions but according to the headings as to dathes covered it would appear that the sale of his property would have been by or before 1836. Subsequent to that time he lived in Franklin County for a period of time before going on to Iowa.

You asked if I have any information as to the identity of the Belknaps you named in your memo of January 6, 1971. James M. Belknap was the oldest son of Elijah. I believe the listing of James "W" Belknap is in error. I think someone read a long hand "M" for a "W". Please compare the description of the James "W" Belknap grantee deed on page 1, entry 12, with the grantor entry on the next page to Orrin from James M. Belknap - 2nd entry on page).

Elisha Belknap had a Henry, born ##### 8 May 1817 and a grandson Willadm, born in 1834 (Oldest son of Lacy) but that William wouldn't have been more than 14 within the 1848 ending shown for this group of deeds. The record doesn't seem to show when the William shown on the third page sas disposing of land to Oren Brigelow came into possession of said property.

The only Horace Belknap that comes to my mind is the Dr. Horace Belknap, born in Connecticut in 1791 who accompanied a wagon train across the country to toe west coast in the late 1840ss He was the ancestor of Jack Belknap in Iowa you will recall. Sorry ### I'm not of more help.

Thanks for filling me in on the fact that the Joseph Belknap carried in the 1820 US Census for Hardin County, Kentucky, was not the brother of Jonas N. I had been fairly sure in my mind that he must have been.

Regarding the spelling of the last name of Joseph Gilletter Belknap's first wife I have concluded that in the early days of 1850 it was spelled as one work, Vancleave, without the capital C. but that in later years it has been spelled Van Cleave, with the capital C by many of this line. Here is a resume of the matter and if , after reviewing same, you have any suggestions please advise.

According to the Dictionary of American Family Names by Elsdon C. Smith, 1956, the family name went back to the Village or Duchy of Cleve (Cliff) in far West Germany near the Netherland border. Said dictionary lists the name in the following order: Van Cleave, Van Cleve, Van Cleef, Van Clief. One large World Atlas that I consulted, cartied the name of the village as Kleve.

As you know, Evans carried it as Van Cleve and I fell into the trap of thinking the Vancleave carried in the 1850 US Census in Wapello County, Iowa, was #### just a goof on the part of the census taker. Actually, as you know, the "Van" comes from the Holland Dutch meaning from."

In drawing up what I had hoped to be a final draft of the Joseph Gillett Belknap recordsmy attention again fell upon the Vancleave spelling as carried in the 1850 census and in retrospect I suddenly realized that Sopha Belknap Eudy, grand daughter of Elizabeth, had been quite consistently spelling the name "Vancleave" without the capital C. I decided that her relationship to Elizabeth should be sufficiently close to conclude that the family way of spelling the name was Vancleave and settled on that spelling.

Upon receipt of your inquiry I wrote Sopha to specifically inquire if she were sure of the spelling. She replied that actually it was spelled "Vanclieve" in her father's old Bible. Sounds to me like someone in her father's family must have had a German background and entered, or listed, tthe name with the "ie" in it with the last letter of the "ie" or "ei" combination in German determining whether one sounds the "e" or the "1".

In the James M. Belknap family records the Spelling was Vancleave. James M. was an older brother of Joseph Gillett and, of course, brother-in-law of Elizabeth and had lived in the Wapello County, Towa ares when Joseph and Elizabeth lived there.

Since the Vanclieve spelling appears only once and was not consistent with the Vancleave spelling historically carried otherwise, and since alleged descendants of this branch of the family now living in Ottumwa, Iowa and San Antonio, Texas spell the name Van Cleave

Thes Saturday morning, I'm in no mood for continuing the pick and shovel drudgery of pursuing wills and deeds and vital records; nor in even a mood to plunge into an equally basic task that is going to bury me from sight during the next two or three months. So I'm going mx to pause for a moment, to impose on you by asking you to appraise my proposed answer to one of the errors I must deal with when eventually I begin writing even so little as a history of my own branch of the family -- let alone a whole Belknap genealogy.

There are many such errors, none of which seems to have been dealt with in print or in manuscript, as far as I can find. One of them, which is far too prevalent to be ignored, is the "legend of two brothers." Thus far, I'm impressed by the obvious fact that when I've merely said it's an error I haven't convinced many people. So I think I'll have to try to show not MENELLY just the facts but also the way in which the legend probably arose.

Here, as in some other parts of the family history, I'll be treading the thin line between genealogy and history. A genealogist can (or perhaps must) confine himself to stating the proven facts. Anhistorian can (and must, I thank) present inferences and interpretations of the facts, even to stating suppositions and hypotheses as a physical scientist must do -- provided he makes it clear that his hypotheses are hypothetical, not factual. He can't, for example, dismiss the Beltoft-Belknap problem by saying as H W Belknap did, about the Sawbridgeworth family, "It is impossible to say whether they were Beltofts or Belknaps." On the contrary, that's just what he must say -- as an hypothesis based on interpretation of the known facts. So, some day, that's just what I'll do.

But now I'm dealing with a simpler problem: the legend of two mrothers. It has taken many forms. For example:

- (1) In branches of the family in which the oral tradition goes back only a few generations (as in the descendants of Pilgrim Belkhap in NY, N Dakota, YEWEYEX and Iowa; and in the Louisiana branch which KEMEETE only a beginning in New Orleans in mid-19th-century), the legend usually starts with the presumed immigration of the trade of two brothers -- names not known -- who came to America at some unknown HITE date from somewhere in Europe: Scotland, England, even Austria in one instance. In some variations, the two brothers are given names, sometimes the names of the first known men back a few generations from the present, sometimes names that seem to have been coined by pure imagination.
- (2) In branches in which there's an oral or written tradition of descent from early Massachusetts Belknaps but no memory of Abraham, the legend may be either descent from two brothers whose names are not stated or descent from two whose names are known—sometimes Samuel and Joseph, correctly—sometimes from others with untraceable names.
- (3) In branches where the name of Abraham is known but the "two brother" legend persists, it takes the form of saying that when Abraham came to America he was accompanied by two brothers, sometimes named, sometimes not named. When these

(4) Another variation, originating orally before genealogists, ANNIANT Abraham at some time in the 19th century, is that the ANNIANT first Belknaps in America were three brothers, one of whom died without leaving any children, so that all living members of the family descend from the other two brothers (who usually are not named).

This fourth variation (which happens to be the one I heard in my childhood and later) is the one that interests me most, for it is the one that comes closest to the truth and also is the one that seems to will suggest how the legend originated.

- -- Abraham lived in America only six years after being allotted land at Lynn.
- -- When he died in Sept 1643 his oldest living child (Samuel) was only 15.
- -- He left three young sons: Samuel, Joseph, John.
- -- John lived long enough to sign a deposition 27 March 1655 (aged 20) but no other record of him has been found, so presumably he died unmarried. Bufor 2 1671 dead of thems the do.
- -- The other two brothers, Samuel and Joseph, married and had children.
- -- The burial place of Abraham has never been found. Nor has his will been found, although known to have been probated.

From these facts, it seems only natural that memory of the name of Abraham might readily be lost, by his grandchildren and great-grandchildren — whereas these descendants might well remember that their own ancestor Samuel or Joseph had a brother. As time went on, later generations in the 18th century might well forget their names of those two brothers, NNI remembering only that there had been two brothers, from whom all American Belknaps were descended.

This seems to me to be the way in which the two-brother legend must have originated during the two centuries (up to about 1850, I believe) in which the NAMEX existence of Abraham was unknown to his descendants. (I have found no mention of Abraham in anything published or put in manuscript form before the second half of the 19th century. Have you?)

From this hypothesis I move to the conclusion that belief in any variation of the two-brother legend could persist only among branches descending from Abraham through his sons Sanuel or Joseph -- and that therefor a branch which has such a legend, even though talking of descent from other brothers arriving later in America, is prima facie descended from Abraham -- and probably legitimately, since an illegitimate son, whose parentage cannot be verified, would be unlikly to know or perpetuate that tradition.

As I said -- hypothesis -- but #IXXII separated from the known facts on which it depends.

I need some such hypothesis in dealing with present-day Belknaps who believe that they descend from some later immigrant. And I'll need it when I come to write anything about the record of the family, for I can't just ignore widespread beliefs.

So I'll be grateful for your comments. Please.

Your note about a living Beltoft amases me. To see why, just read note I sent to John Sherman a few days ago. It summarised the story -- but it didn't go into all the possible detail.

What I know about the Lincolnshire Beltofts exmem wholly from the letters and notes sent to HWB by Charkes Bernau. For more than twenty years, that fine workman chased down every lead he could find -- on Belknaps and Beltofts.

Spelling being what it had been, he tracked down everything that might be (but wasn't) a variant of either name -- including even such a name as "Bulletat" en the off chance that it might mean Beltoft. (In Latin, name was written De Bello Tofto.)

I can't translate.

He came up with nothing but the petering out of the Beltoft name as the last recorded males died and only females were left -- just as happened in the old knightly Belkmap family during the reign of Henry VIII.

He found Belknap descendants of the Sambridgeworth family in Essex and near London, into the early 19th century -- and then that trail died, too.

New this discovery of yours opens the door again.

I hope you'll follow up on this opening. Any clues will help -- not just names of known ancestors, but names of any other known Beltofts past or present -- and above all, places -- so we'll know where to look -- for that's the one best way to start tracking.

Thanks for note about Danish erigin of present American Beltofts. I think you must be right in guessing that some English Beltoft went to Denmark, as I see MAR no other way of accounting for the surname. It could not have been taken to England from Denmark

Family surnames not used (at least not eften) in England until 12th century -i.e., century after the Herman conquest. I do not know when surnames began to
be ised in Denmark; but I doubt that they came into use there as early as in
England. Seems to me that the most likely origin for Beltoft surname in Denmark
would be arrival in Denmark, semetime after IZHXXXXIIJMAX 1100 or 1200, of
a member of the English family that already was using that surname.

Lincolnshire, where the English family lived, was in heart of the part of England captured and settled by Danes -- well before the Conquest.

of that Lincolnshire family, I find nothing known before the Conquest. First mention is in Demesday Book, compiled as list of available taxpayers for William I shortly after the Conquest. It shows (I'm quoting from nemot, but I'm sure quite accourately), "Of Beltoft there is one carucate of land." A carucate was as much land as could be tilled with one plough and eight exem in one year. This would indicate relatively low status as a land-owner. But a small holding was natural at that time, because of the confiscation of large heldings by the Normans. As historians point out, the pre-invasion "nobility" were generally reduced to being yourned to being yourned to be independent of the confiscation of large heldings of title to any land at all was indication of higher status before the Invasion, (I'm over-simplifying, but what I'm saying is essentially true.)

Subsequently, the Lincolnshire Beltofts seem to have prespered. Seme five or six coats of arms are described in various books on heraldry. I haven t leoked them up, to find dates when granted. But can assume between 1200 and 1400, as in case of other non-Herman families.

Of course it's pessible that the Beltoft of Demesday Book was a Dane in William's army -- there all serts of se-called "Normen" in it, from Scandanavia and even from Sicily -- for adventurers from many parts of Europe flooked to join the army that Milliam was preparing for the invasion. So this Beltoft might have been one of the many who were rewarded by being given land confiscated by the invaders. But the small size of the helding makes this seem unlikely. So I think, as I've said, that the Lincolnshire Beltofts were of a family settled in the Danish part of England long before 1066. And in the trobled years after the Conquest, when "presentation of Englisher" (proof that the victim of a murder was not a Herman) was said that the wife of a mon-Norman family might well find good reason to go back to the place where his ancestors came from.

All this may be of no use to you. But conceivably it might aid you in contacts with these present day Beltofts. So I've written it.

Ancesters of our EKH only millionaires, the Louisville Belknaps, as well as hundreds of others less fortunate. All preceding records wrong on one big point -- a missing generation.

Belknap, may not have played any part in Carol Anne's success in establishing membership in the DAR. Prior to the introduction of your material Carol Anne's application had stalled completely. MJane had told my wife and I of this personally when we had visited her in Des Moines.

To satisfy my mind on this point I called Jane long distance Friday night and asked her if she had submitted your document to the DAR in establishing Carol Anne's right to membership and she assured that she most certainly had together with all the other material she had put together on her own (and which I know to have been rejected as inadequate). She said she had presented your material because you had the ability to present such material in a much more convincing and coordinated manner than she. I did get the impression that that it may never have really registered with her that the material you compiled had had new basic elements in it that she hadn't already presented. At any rate, I am fully convinced that without your document Carol Anne would still be on the outside looking in so far as DAR membership were concerned!

You lost me going around the corner with the statement in the third paragraph of your 2/21 note in which you refer to Jesse Belknap as your great great grandfather. I was under the distinct impression that Jesse bore the same relationship to you as his brother Elijah does to me, namely great grandfather. According to the chart I have your father was Chares Carroll, your grandfather, Corrington Gavett, your great grandfather, Jesse and your great great grandfather Jonas Newton. Did I miss a generation some place along the way?

Have heard nothing more from the Beltofts and of course may not.

The last of last week I wrote to a Mrs. Ruby L. Huffman of Beaver Crossing, Nebraska, whose maiden name I understood, was B eltoft, and today I received a reply. It turns out that she says her maiden name was Biltoft. However the young lady in the office where I am employed states that they are all off the same branch, with some spelling the name Beltoft and others spelling it Biltoft. The following is quoted from Mrs. Huffman's letter:

My father, E. R. Biltoft, my sister Mrs. Marvin Cast and myslef are the only family members in Beaver Crossing.

We have always understood that our grandfather was a norwegian seaman who married a Danish girl and settled in Schleswig, Holstein. The Germans overran that neck of land, and forced the young Danes to serve 3 years in the German army, beginning at age 17. It was a very hard life to which they felt no allegiance, so they came to America while young to escape it, or after serving.

My grandfather was Nis Biltoft, youngest of his family. My father the Erastus or Erasmus and has always signed his name E. R. Biltoft. The first generation was quite prone to name their youngsters after their brothers and sisters so there was repitions of Pete, John, Ras, Nis and Anna. They do not sound especially English to me; more Biblical.

I believe that there was a time *********** when the British Isles were under the Scandivanian domination, and finally they were overthrown and driven back to the continent but which came first, the chicken or the egg, I have no idea.

A family member who traveled in north### Europe aaid the word toft ###### meant a narrow neck of land surrounded by water, and there were names like Ebeltoft. Ebel means apple. But he heard of no Biltofts.

Several years ago my younger brother, Russell, who lives in California sent the name to his newspaper which ran a celumn which printed information about family names, crests, etc. It was months before they finally printed the information they could gather which stated " it is believed to be a very old English name." It syrprised us, of course.

I am sending your letter to a brother, Charles # in Calif and will ask him to write you about his experience with Biltoft in Australia, when he was a Navy man in WWII

"Since he spent a vacation last fall in England and nearby countries, I am sure he will be interested to learn what part of the country you believe to be your ancestral home."

Our local reference Librarian in inclined to think that Beltoft as well as Belknap meant beautiful knolls or hills. Noth "toft" and "knap" are apparently of old Anglo-Saxon derivation meaning a **** knoll, ***** low hill or piece of land set aside as a homestead. Belle or bello in French had the meaning of beautiful but if we go to the Latin if would have a basis meaning of "war" according to her findings. Don't know how huch steck you can put in this but thought it might be of interest anyway.

Will keep you informed if and as I may receive any more on the Beltoft angle.

Learning of my interest in the Beltoft name someone else in the office reported that there were a number of Beltofts living in the rural area around Beaver Crossing, Nebraska. I shall try to follow through to see if their ancestry goes back to Denmark too but since that area isn't very far from where Shirley's

family lives I suspect they may have the same place of origin in Seminark.
Looks like one of those Englishmen may have ventured or drifted across the North Sea!

When I run across something that may need to be taken into consideration on family history, I like to make sure that it isn't buried in my files alone. Hence this note for your files.

Up to now, I have thought that the fact that Richard Heltoft's will made his younger son Josias his chief heir indicated that his older child Bennet was in dasfavor -- and that Bennet was showing dislike of Abraham when he made his youngest son Josias his residuary heir and left Abraham, the eldest son, only 20 shallings.

Now I find that I may possibly have been wrong in this interpretation -- for there may have been, an both cases, a survival of the custom known as "Borough English."

When the Normans conquered England, they found in the main towns or boroughs a practice of making the primary heir not the oldest son but the toungest one. In Norman-French, they called it "tenure en Burgh Engloys" -- that is, "tenure in and Englash borough." Later, it was called "Borough English."

So I can't say flatly that the wills of Richard and Bennet meant what I thought they meant.

That brother Joseph went from (HWB #304) Massachusetts to West Leyden, Lewis Co, NY and lived and died there -- reported there in Census 1810 and 1820. Identification seems certain. . . I have found no other Joseph of that generation who could have been in Ky in 1820.

In your December 7, 1970, memo to Kay you raise the question as to whether Elijah Belknap, son of Jonas N., went to Allen County, Ohio, from Licking County. I have no evidence that he didn't but the 1840 US Census does show him to have been in Beldon Township, Franklin County, Ohio, at that time, along with his sons James M. and Samuel and his daughter, (Amazilla) and her husband Joel Eastman and their respective families.

I am not certain when Elijah went to Wapello County in Iowa but, again, the Census records, this time for 1850, in Wapello County, Iowa, shows him to have been where at that time. His youngest son, Joseph, had married a girl born in Indiana within the year. The wedding had taken place in Ohio. The girl's Name was Elizabeth and was later shown to have been Elizabeth Vancleave. With Elijah in Wapello County in 1850 were also James M.(sOn) and son, Gamaliel and Elijah's oldest daughter, Amanda, and her husband Josiah Garlinghouse. The last three children mentioned also had families of their own.

It's my guess that these Belkmaps came to Wapello County about 1845. A son of gamaliel, Fernando age 7 at the time of the Census was listed as having been born in Ohio but a son of James M. (Sanford) age 5 at the time of the Census was carried as having been born in Iowa.

Incidentally, the 1820 Census for Hardin County, Kentucky, lists, in addition to your Jesse, a Joseph Belknap, over 45; his wife, over 45, 2 sons - one 10 - 15, another 16 - 25 and three daughters, one under 10, one 10 - 15 and one 16 - 25. I have assumed that this must have been the brother of Jonas N. and Uncle of Jesse. Do you agree?

Here's a copy of a brief mem I wrote today for Gladys Gray, the wonderful woman who dug up -- in several years of expert effort -- most of what ##### we now FIRE know about the quarter-century when our family lived in Ontario County, NY.

Some day I'll write a much fuller story -- when I'm sure of all my facts.

So please help me correct any errors I have made in this first short summary.

GLADYS:

I'm impelled to send you a copy of a newspaper piece (1927), about my father's saster Mary. It came to me on the death of her daughter Rose a week or so sgp. Because you became so deeply interested in my people during your long work on the family of Jonas Newton Belknap. I think that you must sometimes have wondered "What became of them, after they left Ontario County?"

So maybe I should preface the enclosure by summarising the story of my own branch: Jesse and his descendants.

As you already know, the next stopping place after Ontario County was Kentucky -Hart and Hardin Counties, circa 1820. Jesse and his brothers and two of his
sisters didn't stay there more than a few years. "Coukdn't put up with slavery,"
says family tradition. So, by 1830, they were in Licking County, Chie -- just
east of Columbus. I've summarized that part of the record in what I wrote about
Elisha.

Some of Jonas Newton B's children stayed there: BEKKI Esther and her husband Gamaliel Garlinghouse; Cynthia and Isaac Newton. And Orin, who set out to join his brothers in Oregon but went back to Licking County when his wife HERKENEEN died on the way west. And Elisha, after he came there in 1830.

But Jesse, Elijah, and Jonas(Jr) didn't stay put. In the middle 1830's (or maybe a year or so sooner) Jesse sold his Licking County land to his brother-in-law Gamaliel and moved his family farther west: to Allen County in NW Ohio -- beginning all over again the same old task of clearing wooded land.

After a few years in Allen County, the next move came -- overland to Van Buren County in SE Iowa-- arriving there in 1839, it is said. Brother Elijah was then (or "thenabouts") in next-door Wapello County. And Jonas (Jr) and his family were in that areas, but I don't know just where.

Then, seven or eight years of apparent prosperity, till very suddenly in 1847
Jesse (and probably Jonas Jr., but certainly two sons of this Jonas ; Silas
and Orin) decided to succumb to "Oregon fever" -- to the known dismay of at
least one of the womenfolk: Keturah Penton, wife agx of Jesse's oldest son, George.

Why all this continual "moving on?" The traditional explanation, by the members of the next two generations, was a fatalistic "It was in their blood" and I still hear ININ these words sometimes. But the true explanation, I feel sure, was something much more basic — the simple fact that these people were farmers who necessarily had large families.

Their forefathers, too, had been farmers -- in Massachusetts and Connecticut -- in times when there was virtually no Middinaid farm labor to hire. In early New England, the "hired hand" was so uncommon as to be notable when he existed. So in order to farm that hard land, sons were essential -- as many as possible. But when the sons grew up, it was never possible to provide enough nearby land for them -- so most sons had to move to places faither on, where land was available -- and sometime the fathers tookthe lead in moving, by selling out and taking their whole families to new places, as Jonas Newton B's father Samuel did when he sold his land in north central Comnecticut and took his MIXMINIAINAIN wife and children to the newly MANNAME opened "Murrayfield Plantation" in central Massachusetts.

One passade-genealogist, Glenn Evens, has emplained the moves as being "a search for free land." It was no such thing, till the very end of the story. The land on which Jenas Hewton B and the Carlinghouses settled in Ontario County wasn't free for the taking. It had to be bought. The same thing had been true when Jenas's father Samuel moved to Murrayfield Plantation, which was a land-selling enterprise. It had been true before, when his grandfather, also a Samuel, had come from Haverhill, Massachusetts, to northem Connections. Not free land, but land available for Manness It was true again, in Kentucky and MANNESS them in Chio. I think (but don't know for sure) that it was also true in Iswa.

She first and only free land they found was in Gregon, in the Willemette Valley. There the members of my tribe filed "Donation Land Glaims" and settled in a compact group of farms with their patriarch, Jesse, in its center. But I'm getting ahead of my story.

Jesse, in 1847 when my tribe left Iowa, had long since become an acknowledged leader. It was perhaps only natural that he was elected exptain of that wagon train — which had something more than 100 wagons, seconding to one record. He remained captain EMENT till the train reached Soda Springs, near Fort Hall in the SE corner of Idaho.

SomeofJesse's

There the family divided. INE older children and their husbands went on to Gregor by a newly opened southern route: the Applegate Road -- synthwest down the Humboldt River ("the river that dies") -- across the Black Rock Desert -- past Mount Shasta -- finally across the Rogue River on a ferry operated by some tame Indians -- and so into the Willammette Valley. I shadder when I think of that hard route, which is described in detail in De Voto's "Year of Decision," which tells the story of the first imigrant train that followed it in 1846, one year before my people did. (De Voto also shows the truth about these early emigrants: that they were end had to be people of substance, able to defray the high cost of the journey. "The misfits," he wrote, "came later, when the railroads were HHILE had been built.")

Meanwhile, Josse and Jane and their younger children (and some of the others, I'm not sure which, except for Hannah and her husband Dow Cilbert) waited at Seda Springs or Fort Hall till the spring of 1848 and then went on to Oregon by the old Oregon Trail (US 30 on today's maps) up to the vicinity of Walla Walla, then down the south bank of the Columbia River, and eventually to Beliknap Settlement on the Willamette -- where the term of Alpine is now, and where many of my tribe are buried.

I have a copy of an old hand-drawn map showing the farms they lived on -- Josse in the center, ringed about by his children: Kenish and her husband Chatman Hawley; Hannah and her Husband Dow Gilbert IXEMENEE ("Lorense Gilbert" in the Walkridge book); Ranson and his wife Mahala Starr; George and his wife Keturah Pentsu; Talitha Cami and her husband Sasmel Starr -- and Polly Belknap (Mary Ann Garlinghouse, widew of Jesse's brother Jonas) and some of her children. Jesse's youngest children, my grandfather Corrington and the still younger Harley, were still living with him when that map was drawn.

That was the end of the traveling that began back in Haverhill about 1700. The "old ININE folks" would remain farmers. The next generations, beginning with my gradifather Corrington, would start entering the professions and business. There's more to the stary -- much more -- and someday I'll try to put all of it on paper.

But perhaps I've gone far enough to answer the question that must have been in your mind: "How did they come out?" . . . EXHERE Thank you, they came out all right.

I fear I have to make lots of comments about the attached sheet, though the revised sheets for Abraham, which I mailed to you a day or so ago, cover some points.

- (A) & (B) I'm puzzled by these questions of yours. Don't see the conflicts that you mention.
- (C) Grace Adam -- no "s". Misspelling with "s" was started by Hiram Belnap, Utah, whom HWB called "a man most unfitted for this work." Hiram's daughters Flora (now dead) and Della (now secretary of the Utah "Belnap Family Organization") inherited his facility in misspelling and Evans got it from Flora. In 1969, field workers for Salt Lake Genealogical Society finally found record of Grace's parents -- members of the Adam family at Sawbridgeworth -- thus confirming the spelling found by E C Bernau, the record searcher who did the English field work for HWB.
- (E) Why cite the untrustworthy Evans? Why not say just "mentioned in Bennet's will"? You have seen this will, in Register 1914. Evans was merely copying the words used by Moriarty.
- (F) I'm disturbed to find you still following Evans on the non-existent Reger and Mary Ingalls. His sole authority for them was an amateurish fill by a nice little old lady, in Illinois Hist Soc journal. The other references Evans cited WHEXX did not support the fiction.
- (J) [#] Jeseph's wives: second was Ruth Ingalls -- not "Ingall" as misspelled by Evans and also semetimes by Flora Belnap. (I have a complete set of Flora's and Della's work -- full of misspellings and errors, but useful anyway.) Third wife us Hannah Meakins -- never appears as "Meekins" in original records in Hantanxanax Hatfield. Mass.. where Joseph lived for a few years after marrying that daughter of a prosperous farmer. Hiram and Flom Belnap spelled it wrong and Evans copied from them, sometimes.
 - (H) I've entered places where Abraham if known to have lived.
 - (I) Abraham was a farmer in Lynn -- but only indication of occupation in England is word "yeoman" in deposition he signed by mark at North Weald Basset. No evidence he ever owned or rented land in England. Meaning of word "yeoman" at that time was varied -- did not necessarily mean land owner or tenant farmer.

 - (G) -- Hannah -- name of her hushand is usually stated as Christopher Osgood RENEXEEE to distinguish him from his father.
 - (M) I've inserted her known dates.
 - (K) John -- only record of him in Mass. is signature on a deposition in connection with a transaction by Francis Ingalls, in 1656. So he is believed to have died sometime after that date. (Morianty, Register, 1950)
 - (L) What is your source for date "1676" for death of Samuel? To the best of my

knowledge no record of his death has been found. (As Moriarty pointed out in Register 1950, HMB had erred in placing Samuel's death "after 1731.") Hany amateurs have invented ENVERGENEET various dates for it.

- (H) ax Abbreviation "Herts" stands alone, does not need "Co." Full form IXIX was IXX" County Hertford." Both pronounced as in Hartford, Conn.
- (0) See my recent sheet on Abraham for data on Marky Stallion.

Pergive my emphasis on details. Hy hardest task is to combat the cynical definition so often heard: "Genealegy is the perpetuation of past mistakes." Too damed often, That's just what it has been - especially in the Belknap family. That's what dragged me into this work.


Please refer to your letter under date of October 29, 1969, to Gladys. You were kind enough to send a copy of same to me. My problem is with the paragraph beginning at the bottom of page one and continuing on page two in which you state that the Salt Lake Genealogical Society had found the record of the marriage of Abraham Belknap to Mary Stallion, daughter of Thomas Stallion and Mary Dalton, at Latton, Essex, 24 December 1595. If this is meant to be the date of the marriage of Abraham and Mary it doesn't seem to correlate with the date, or estimated date of birth for Abraham and (1589) or with the births of the children of the couple. I would hardly seem plausible that they would wait until 25 years after their marriage to start having children. On the other hand, if the date given, 24 December 1595 should refer to the date of birth for Mary Stallion this would seem to mesh very well. Will you please straighten me out on this point?

Sorry to bother you but I seem able to stay away from the genealogy subject for very long at a time.

Hope all is well with you and yours.

It was good to hear your vpice last night. And kind of you to call. My deep apologies for neglect. I've no excuse -- just reasons, which aren't excuses.

I've been far away, mentally -- in Virginia and Rennsalaer County N Y and Oneida County N Y, for instance -- trying to solve such puzzles as the link to a Virginia family of Rev War times, previously unknown -- hurrying to collect information while the only people likely to help me are still living -- getting wills and IMEXABEMENT land deeds -- hastening off on wild goose chases promptedby imaginative claims made by nice old ladies.

So postponing from day to day what I wanted to do -- write to people like you and Gladys and others whom I've neglected.

Yesterday, before you phoned, I had started to put myself in position to answer some of the questions you had asked in memos that I had laid aside. Began by looking at what you said about the change of family name in Sawbridgeworth — found it forced me into re-examining some stuff in my files — got so immersed that I never started writing, but began to figure how to rewrite some things I had written in the past — gave up, finally, and went to dinner.

And then you phoned.

So, this morning, I'm doing what I should have done long since -- writing to you.

And finding that I erred in saying that I didn't receive one memo of yours. I

That was the query about the date of marriage to Mary Stallion, in a memo to Gladys. Alas, in writing that memo I relied on memory and set down the date of Hary's mixture not the date of the marriage -- which was 28 Oct 1617.

I'm enclosing a copy of my latest set of notes on Abraham. If I've sent you earlier versions, please destroy them, for they probably contained an error resulting from misinterpretation of a date — a statement that Abraham began calling himself Belknap before his EXXENSERGEN father died, which wasn't MEXX actually a matter of record.

Attached to that page of notes on Abraham is something I've just written -- a summary of the recorded facts about the ANAGE of name from Beltoft to Belknap.

It includes a brief bit about the change in pronunciation of Belknap. Some day
I'll write much more about that point, for it's not all that simple. No one
yet, as far as I know, has been able to establish even an approximate general date
for the time when k before n became silent in English, for it was a gradual process
which proceeded at differing speeds in various parts of England. Today the only
survivor of the old pronunciation (Anglo-Saxon and then Old English) is the way we
spell and pronounce the name of King Canute — originally, in his own time, "Cnut."

Better add, I suppose, that the pronunciation of the name in Chaucer's time was doubtless something like "bail-k-nep" or market perhaps "bail-k-nep-eh". As late as the reign of Henry V it was still being spelled (in records of Queen Catherine's court) "Bealknap" though the "ea" had probably ceased being pronounced "ay" as in "hay" and had been shortened to "eh!"

What I'm trying to say, I suppose, as that we have no just cause to be purists about either the spelling or the pronunciation of the name. If someone calls me Belcknap he is merely reviving a former pronunciation -- and indeed it was spelled just that way by some scribes, more than once.

I chatter too much. Better get back to answering your memos.

But first, a brief note about another thing that I'm enclosing.

Rummaging through the multitude of sheets in my Gladys Gray file, in search of the memo you had mentioned. I ran across a piece I wrote for her last Christmas -- which I had passed along to my children. . . I think maybe you'd like to see it. So I enclose it.

But in looking at it, I see I must explain what that piece says about the route from Iowa to Oregon. . . . My tribe stuck together as far as Fort Hall, in 1847. Then Jesse and Jane and their younger children stayed behind, while the older children and their families went on — by a southern route that I had a hard time understanding because that portion of funt Kit's writings has been lost and the survixing other documents pick up the stary after the first contingent got into southern Oregon — omitting the tough part between Fort Hall and KINNINKEXING the Regue River.

Recently, I found that route described in one of Bernard De Voto's books: The Year of Decision: 1846. It tells the story of the first emigrant train that followed that southem route, the applegate Road, in 1846 -- one year before my people. If you are interested: pages 146-186 and 371-380; and map pp 152-53; and netes on Chapter VI, in back of book. . . My memory of those pages lay behind what I wrote in my little piece for Gladys. The whole book is fascinating -- to me, anyway.

Should add that the second contingent -- Jesse and Jane and the younger children -- took the northern route (old Oregon Trail via Walla Walla from Fort Hall) the next year: 1848. And got to Walla Walla just one week after the Whitman Massacre.

Some day when I'm free from present drudgery. I'll write for my children and grandchildren the whole story -- from Lynn to the Willamette Valley -- and will send you a copy.

Now back to your memos.

Ang 27: Error on date of Elijah's birth, page 11 of "Parentage of Elisha..." Thanks. I thought I had caught all the mistypings made by the typist who copied my MS. Made this correction promptly, after your memo. Noted that correct date 1785 is shown in the final pages.

Aug 19 -- Letter from nurse Katherine L Belknap. Interesting. I thought she might be the nurse I've been trying to locate -- who attended my uncle Fred in a hospital in California last year. Interested in her comment about "blue eyes." Hereditary in my family, though sometimes skipping a generation. They skipped my son and daughter but all my grandshildren have EXEXECUTER my blue eyes, which I got from my father.

Aug 26 -- copy of letter from Sophy Belknap Endy, Cisco, Texas. I think my files contain some unresolved data on that family, but haven't searched for it yet. Lots of Belknaps in Texas, as far back as about 1780. My records not too good on them.

Aug 24 -- change from Beltoft to Belknap at Sawbridgeworth. Lack of time to reply adequately was one thing that keptme dierring writing to you. Much that I want to set down for you on this subject when I find time. For the moment, unfinished

business.

I'm also enclosing two things I set aside to mail to you, long ago -- letting them just accumulate on top of your file:

For more than two years I have harbored in my mind a curiosity concerning your personal theory as to how the Beltofts of Sawbridgeworth knew that the Belknap name was rightly theirs and immediately knew how to spell it -- Belknappe.

I promised myself, however, that I would refrain from asking you until I had done some more work on the subject myself. In recent weeks I have again reviewed and studied not only the rather comprehensive and most interesting memo you sent me under date of August 6, 1968, but also your memo of March 20, 1968, and the attachments thereto, including the copy of your memo to Claudia under date of February 28, ### 1968. I located the New England Historical and Genealogical Register at our State Historical Library and reviewed the material you had cited in your memo to Claudia: Vols. 68(1914); 85(1931): and 104(1950). Isalso found the Dictionary of National Biography at our University of Nebraska Library and reviewed the sections cited in your August 6, 1968, memo regarding Sir Robert Belknap and Nicholas Wotton.

with all of this information at hand I still feel very ill prepared to be making any prouncements of theories. But anyway for what it's worth here goes:
Your position that the change of names was prompted by the printing of the Bible and religious influence seems to make a lot of sense certainly as far as the given names of the individuals were concerned. The switching from the , what I presume to be a Norman surname to the more English spelling of the name which meant essentially the same thing could have been related to this same general change over I suppose but I firmly believe it was prompted by something much more profound in the minds of those makeing the change, namely that Belknappe was indeed their rightful name -- that they were taking something back that they knew belonged to them, out of the past. Changing a surname isn't an every day act.

As to how and why they should claim Belknappe as their rightful name is a matter of conjecture for me, of course, but I can imagine that it could have resulted from a strong family tradition quietly and secretely handed down from generation to generation based upon perhaps one of two theories: (1) Thet the Judge, Sir Robert Belknap, had, while in exile in Ireland, been indiscreet, and had fathered a son or sons by a woman not his lawful wife and had later, upon his return to England, arranged for her transfer and support in the country village of Sawbridgeworth a short distance outside of London. It would logically follow that she would raise such children under an assumed sirname and Beltofts having about the same generic meaning as Belknappe would seem a happy choice. Or **** (2) During the years of Sir Robert's hectic problems with the crown and parliment, one or more of his children could have adopted the assumed name of ##### Beltoft, again because of the basic similiarity of menaing, in order to withdraw from the continual critical scrutiny of the public and the government and in order to be in a position to hold property and accumulate wealth without the fear of government seizure. Twice Sir Robert's holding had ben seized by the state

the second time only two years following the restoration from the first seizure. It would stand to reason that Sir Robert, being of the legal profession would be likely to help members of his family devise a means of establishing security in their own right and here again in a nearby rural village. Or the Judge's wife might have helped engineer the matter following the death of her husband. She had battled the government in an attempt to have the Judges holdings restored to her only to be ridiculed by some in the government but had finally been given the use of the land during her lifetime with it reverting to the government at her death and only some years later to have been restored to the Judge's son Hamon.

Getting back to reason, why the wife and children of Bennett were determined to immediately use the Belknap surname might possibly be credited, in part, to an integrity prompted by religion -- doing now, with determination, **** that which they knew they should have done allialong but didn't have the courage to do until their beloved Josias led the way!

By this time I am sure you have become keenly aware of my poor background in English history and of my equally poor ability to develop theories that could be helpful to you in any way.

I do hope that you will find it possible to divulge to me your theory on the whole subject in addition to the part that the printing of the Bible may have had. Maybe by this time ** your theories are no longer just theories put documented fact. I wouldn't be surprised, the way you tie into things and come up with answers!

Thanks for sheet on gravestones in Round Prairie Cemetery, wherever that may be. I doubt in Johnson County -- as this family lived in Des Moines Co, in SE Iowa.

I'm always glad to get new names, for sometimes they help me rescue one of my unidentified Belknaps. This time, I have a pretty full record on that family. Silas was the father -- the others his sons. Descendants of the Newburgh family.

Gravestone does one service for me, on Silas. His middle initial C settles the old dispute over whether his middle name was Gardner or Carner -- and thus the surname of his mother. Carner it must be.

Date given for death of Silas is in error -- and impossible. Someone copied 1810 instead of 1840. He arrived in Des Moines Co in 1833 -- died in 1840.

I should ask if you want records on descendants of Jonas Newton B -- other than your own line through Elijah.

From Between us, you and I have semething on all of his children except Cynthia. From to time, when I have a chance, I transfer my notes to an organized record - but a long way to go, yet, especially on descendants of Jesse, my great great grandfather.

All I know about Cynthia is that Isaac Newton was in Licking County in 1830's. I haven't yet tried to trace for children.

This is written to correct a statement carried on page 11, paragraph 2, of your "Parentage Of Elisha Belknap" summary.

The statement is made that Elijah and Sally Belknap were listed in the 1810 census for Pittstown, Ontario County, N. Y. and that they were each shown to be in the 16-25 age bracket. The incorrect statement is the one saying that Elijah was born in 1795. He was born in 1785 according to my records. He was married in 1806 to Catharine Garlinghouse in Ontario County and although no mention is made of his family having been carried in the census he had a wife and two children (Amanda and James M.) also under 10 which should have been reflected in that census. The age breakdown for Elijah, 16-25, would, of course still held when listing his birthdate as 1785.

On first glance, when I read that paragraph (the first part) I thought you were saying that after Samuel's death Elijah married Sally and they were living together when the census was taken. I realized, however, after reading on that no such inference was intended.

Just though I should call your attention to the birth date error for Elijah because I have a feeling that as time goes on this excellent summary you developed relating to the Parentage of Elisha will become a frequently quoted document in relation to the Jonas N. Belknap family.



Will try to do a little catching up. Thank you for the information on Jack Belknap's line in Knoxville, Iowa. Subsequent to writing you, I had checked the Dick Taylor chart and thought I had come up with information showing that lorace's retail the bridge to Samuel and Mary Dickinson, the Abel R. and Electa Carey, and Abel and Elizabeth Stevens, but I guess the chart wasn't trustworthy or I don't know how to read it.

Anyway, I had written Jack asking him if this were right, and also asking if he would share the Journal of Horacesif I paid the Xerox charge, or suggested that if he were interested, I might run off a copy of Kathryn Christian Barrett's presentation relating to your Aunt Kit's diary in exchange.

His reply came yesterday, thanking me for my letter, and saying that he really didn't know the link between Horace and Samuel, and it was evident that he really wasn't much interested. Said that he had recently inherited a "genology" report from a cousin, (Edwin Shady Belknap) who died in January, which goes clear back to the lith Century I believe but I haven't had a chance to study it out yet."

"As to the Journal", said he, "That is out... It is so fragil I Haven't even read it all myself. I have hopes of finding time to have a copy made of it, but until then it will not be opened."

I will follow up to let him know my error regarding the Abel Belknaps, and also suggest that he might want to enlist the State Historical Library Curator in Des Moines in getting suggestions on the preservation of the Journal and in making a copy of same. I think I shall then let the matter drop. I shall tell him my source of accurate information re the ancestry of Horace, which will make him aware of your identity, should you care to check him out on this geneology he has inherited. He points out that the late Edwin Shady Belknap to whom he refers is a son of Clifford Belknap, "my dad's youngest brother". Jack's address is 714 E. Robinson, Knoxville, Iowa, 50138. He still operates a jewelry store at 216 E. Robinson, and the 1968 City Directory shows Elizabeth Belknap, "widow of L. D." to be residing at 192 N. Attica Rd., Knoxville, and Josephine Belknap, "widow of Forrest" to be living at 601 E. Robinson, Knoxville. The directory showed 2 children (of Jack S. and Christina) as students: Burton S. and Marjo A., both listing the parent's address as their residence.

I appreciate deeply the copy of your memo of July 7, 1970 to George May, and the copy of his communication to you under date of May 12, 1970. Please do let me know what determination you make regarding the validity of the report to which he refers.

Thank you also for the copy of the Belknap-Brown paternal ancestry. Jane Belknap of Des Moines provided me with this earlier, and had included a third page, a copy of which I am attaching to this memo.

Thanks also for the Dorothy Masters communication and attachment.

The fact that I had in my files the Belknap-Brown ancestry sheet and had not shared it with you focuses attention on the fact that I have other correspondence and information copied from Jane Belknap files, which, to the best of my recollections, have not been shared with you. Please refer to your letter under date of October 29, 1969, to Gladys. You were kind enough to send a copy of same to me. My problem is with the paragraph beginning at the bottom of page one and continuing on page two in which you state that the Salt Lake Genealogical Society had found the record of the marriage of Abraham Belknap to Mary Stallion, daughter of Thomas Stallion and Mary Dalton, at Latton, Essex, 24 December 1595. If this is meant to be the date of the marriage of Abraham and Mary it doesn't seem to correlate with the date, or estimated date of birth for Abraham (1589) or with the births of the children of the couple. I would hardly seem plausible that they would wait until 25 years after their marriage to start having children. On the other hand, if the date given , 24 December 1595 should refer to the date of birth for Mary Stallion this would seem to mesh very well. Will you please straighten me out on this point?

Sorry to bother you but I seem able to stay away from the genealogy subject for very long at a time.

Tour memo about death of Samuel (Jenas's father) stirs me into tackling a task that I set addation and aside long ago. Should have warned you that EX I was accepting a combination of my family tradition and entries in HWB's notes, disregarding data shown in Mass Soldiers and Sailers. Knew I should search for verification, but didn't see IM how to do it, and went on to chores that seemed more urgent.

Your memo deserves a full answer. In replying, I'll number the paragraphs in your memo, for your convenience.

Par 9, bettom p 1 — Mass Soldiers and Sailors ... Reason for not relying on it was primarily the notorious unreliability of early militia records, plus general minimal vagueness of entries for Samuel. Militia muster records often fraudulent, for sake of subsistence allowances, etc. I'm biased by my own army contact with instances of padded rolls of militia companies. .. Record shown in book needs supporting evidence for everything beyond date of enlistment. Service 2 mass 8 days (1.5. to me 975) seems puzzling and perhaps inconsistent. Date of order for bounty cont is date of order, not application — does not prove 5 in service on that date. Reported deceased, without date, means nothing.

Today I'm asking Emilitia & Mational Archives for record on Samuel. Doubt they' have record of more militia & service -- but should find out.

Meanwhile, I've been inclined to rely on the tradition passed down in my branch of the family, in every generation since Jones & Esther.

Hour par? -- Version given by Reva Barrett (one of my tribe) is essentially the tradition handed down orally and in w riting in my branch of the family. More fully, in one old family paper: "He (Samuel) was a very fleshy mand and was overcome by exertion and the heat (on Bunker Hill)." HWB's entries (source impossible to trace, now) also show death at Cambridge next day.

Par 2 -- Jane Belknap -- lineage books -- should look up in NYC when I get a chance; but they aren't really accurate sources, as merely show what has been said by some applicant and accepted by DAR. Rarely indicate original sources.

Par 3 -- Evans -- apparently repeats a version of the widespread tradition -- but I know nothing to support "wounded."

Par 4 -- Evans to you 1948 -- he apparently slipped in writing "Lexington" instead of Bunker Hill. Just carelessness.

Par 5 -- Evans to Mrs Jane 1948 -- I've noted that letter in the past and thought it possible but inlikely that the Samuel he mentioned might have been Jones's father. Mention of "Concord" made me think he was probably the Samuel who helped raise a company at Woburn and helped lead it at Lexington (net Concord). The Belknaps at the bridge in Concord were from Winchester.

Par 6 - Mrs Brewn 1942 - I'll look into the MS VR for Belchertown, reported by George May, to see if it supports the statement that Samuel died at Belchertown. Wen't be in Boston till late Summer at earlies t.

Par 8 -- Della to Mrs Jane 1968 -- Dear sweet Della has great but unfounded faith in the records essembled by her father (and relied on by Evans, who got them from Dellas older sister, now deed). Those records are fine, beginning withe Jesse Belnap who dropped the k -- but sketchy and unreliable on everything before that. (i.e., before about 1770 or 1780) I've learned to be tactful about them; but did manage to get Della to correct some bad errors.

Any ideas on what else I might do?

Mailed to you earlier today, copies of some things that may interest you, which I found in doing mx some belated filing. Don't believe I had already sent them to you.

- I have noticed in the summary you prepared for Carol Ann that you had, at least tentatively, accepted the date of death of Samuel, father of Jonas N., as June 18, 1775, and the place as Military Camp at Cambridge, Mass. Is this now firm in your acceptance? And if so, will you share with me your source?
- Jane E. Belknap of Des Moines, Iowa, said, in a letter dated May 1, 1964, that Samuel died trying to get home the day following the Battle of Bunker Hill where he had been wounded. She gave as her reference Lineage Book, Vol. 158, p. 82 and also cited the same publication, p. 88, for data concerning Jonas N.
- Glen Evans, in true Evans fashion, stated in his summary to me, February 7, 1951, that Samuel Belknap, the father of our Jonas, "enlisted at Granby, Mass. in 1775 for Revolutionary War Service. He fought at Bunker Hill where he was badly wounded and he died the next day at Cambridge, Mass."
- In a letter to me under date of January 7, 1951, he had stated that the "father (of Jonas) was mortally wounded at the Battle of Lexington in 1775 and died the following day at Cambridge." This would have meant he died about April 20, 1775.
- In a letter to Jane E. Belknap under date of September 23, 1948, Evans speaks of certain descendants of Samuel having had "the musket which Samuel held in his hand when he was mortally wounded at Concord."
- In a summary by Mrs. Milton Brown, Marengo, Iowa, dated November 24, 1942, provided to Mrs. Jane E. Belknap, it was stated that this particular Samuel Belknap, father of Jonas, died in Belchertown, Mass., in 1775. She cited no reference.
 - Reva Barrett, in a letter to Jane E. Belknap, under date of September 2, 1951, said Samuel (father of Jonas) died June 18 at Cambridge, Mass., in camp of heat prostration following the Battle of Bunker Hill. She listed no reference, but Jane Belknap had indicated to me in conversation that Reva got much of her material from the Salt Lake records, as I recall.
 - Della Belknap, of the Salt Lake group, stated in a letter to Jane E. Belknap, September 15, 1968, that they had good records for Abraham and Mary down to Samuel Belknap and Mary Newton and their children, but that the information was limited from there on.
 - The one disturbing factor on placing Samuel's death as early as June, 1775, would seem to be his apparent Massachusetts Milita service record--Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors of the Revolutionary War, Vol. I, page 918. This reference to "Belnap, Samuel, Belchertown, indicates that Samuel answered muster roll dated August 1, 1775. Also Company return Probably October, 1775, and also filed for a bounty coat or its equivalent from Cambridge, December 23, 1775, and was later reported deceased. Note: Bracketed portion part of

Was good to get your letter of March 26th. Had assumed that you had either gone on another holiday jaunt, or weren't well.

I had a bout with prostate surgery March 3, but have been back on the job for the past 2 weeks.

Yes, I did receive your copy of the letter to Jane Belknap in Des Moines. While in the hospital I received a letter from her-the first for many months--postmarked March 3. I am enclosing a copy. Her comments to me regarding the C.A.R. membership and her telephone conversation with you at about the same time don't seem to jib. I fear Jane's health may be failing her to the point that she is confused.

I wrote her, long hand, from the hospital, expressing great surprise that she had not followed through with the material you had so graciously prepared for her at much cost in time and effort to yourself. I find it very difficult to understand why Carol Ann, or her dad, Don of Kansas Middn't help Jane follow through on this matter. And I get the impression that no one in Jane's family has even so much as thanked you for your efforts. This is truly a dissapointment, and I intend to express my sentiments to Don when I next see him.

Now for the Garlinghouse matter. I'm afraid we have, in the person of Wendell Garlinghouse, some one who isn't currently very enthusiastic about actively providing us with information and help. I am enclosing a copy of my letter to him under date of February 25, 1970, and his response to me under date of March 4, 1970.

Perhaps I tried for too much information in my first communication. Maybe if I had confined my requests to only one or two items, I could have more readily opened the door for follow up communications. Actually, Topeka isn't more than about 150 miles to the south and east of Lincoln, and it may be possible for me to arrange to stop and meet this man personally one of these days.

Do you have any suggestions? Would you care to approach him to see if you can accomplish more than I did? As to the date of Gamaliel's birth, I suppose he could have been a twin, but it does seem that this would have been mentioned somewhere along the line.

Dear Mr. Garlinghouse:

Some time ago Dr. Richard E. Garlinghouse and I concluded that we must have had a common Belknap ancestor. He told me that you had gathered considerable material on the Garlinghouse ancestry and had prepared a chart which he wold share with me.

Recently, while my wife was in the hospital recovering from surgery which Dr. Garlinghouse had performed, his brought in the Family Tree chart and left it with her for me to see when I came to visit her. I, of course, found it most interesting and it confirms the fact that we do indeed have a common ancestor. Jonas Newton Belkmap, father of Esther who married Gamaliel Garlinghouse was also the father of Elijah Belkmap, my ancestor.

In case you do not have the identity of Esther's parents and her siblings, I am enclosing a copy of a family record sheet providing this information together with a copy of a section from an 1887 Early History of the town of Spring Water, New York, which you may find of interest. In addition I have the record of the direct lineage of Esther back to Abraham Belknap who came to America from England and settled in Lynn, Massachussets, in 1637. I shall be glad to share this with you should you like.

In exchange, I would be extremely grateful if you would provide me with the source of your information regarding Esther and Gamaliel and their children. I am interested in the dates end places of birth, marriage and death and also places of residence in so far as you may have them. Do you know the occupation of Gamaliel?

Do you have the name of the father of Gamaliel? Wou will note that three of Esther's brothers married Garlinghouse girls, including my ancestor, Elijah. Would you happen to know the names of their respective fathers! We have been searching for this.

In your memo of September 29, 1969, Mou ask if I have checked the census returns for Elijah for 1820, 1830 and 1840 against HWB's list of children. Yes, one of the strongest supports I found for accepting HWB's list was the listing in the 1820 census. That together with the fact that all previously verified information on members of the family well known to contmporary of this branch mesh so completely, prompted me to go with HWB's list.

In the 1830 census the males check out completely. The females -one under 5; 1, 5 under 10; 1, 10 under 15, and 1, 40 under 50 -do not check out so well. Assuming that Mary Jane had been born
early enough in 1830 to be counted she would account for the
1, under 5. The lack of match of ages for Esther 12, and Amazilla, 18,
with the 1, 5 under 10 and 1, 10 under 15, could possibly have been
due to an error caused by sloppy recording of the enumerator, or
Amazilla may have already been out of the home and on her own
and a niece of Elijah's could have been living with the family
or there is always the possibility that another girl had benn born
to the family subsequent to the 1820 census and prior to Joseph
Gillett in 1826. Under any circumstances I do not feel that the
lack of match need cast any great question upon the list down
through Jonas, 1820, and we have contemporary verification of
the fact that both Joseph and Mary Jane were members of Elijah's
family.

Nothing I have yet come across, other than the apparent slight discrepancy on the female side in the 1830 census has indicated that there was anothe female offspring.

As to matching the 1840 census with the family members remaining in the home, I find no problem.

Seems to me there are too many? marks, dashes and nebulous information on that sheet to be worthy of very much conjecture and concern. The ones he lists definitely can be accepted as children of Elijah, ie, James, Samuel, Jonas. Susannah would, of course be the wife of James M. Who a supposed "Anna" would have been is any ones guess based on such a skimmp listing, it seems to me.

In your memo of October 5 you ask how I went about it to get the information sheet on Elisha from Salt Lake. You will recall I also sent you a copy of one from from them on Ebenezer, "abt 1677" and one on Samuel, "abt 1700." I'm sure its no different than you or someone else would have done.

Under date of August 5, 1964, I wrote Mr. Paul P. Royal telling him I was attempting to secure data about my ancestor, Elijah Belknap, and in-as-much as it was my understanding that "your Society has data on very large number of Belknaps" I was wondering if it might be possible for them to give me some assistance and if there were a charge to advise me of the amount. I enclosed with my letter such information as I then had on Elijah.

On August 17, 1964, I received a reply, a brief note, saying that my letter had been turned over to one of their departments and that he was sure I would be hearing about the matter shortly.

On August 30, 1964, I wrote a follow up letter. Under date of September 8, 1964, I received a letter from Miss Frances Baker of the Special Services section including the following paragraphs; and enclosing copies of records mentioned at the beginning of this letter.

"A check of the Master Index of over 27 million cards was made but no reference was found to Elijah Belknap, born 1785, son of Jonas Belknap. This indicates that no one has placed a record on file in our archives representing Elijah Belknap, his wife, or children.

"Our library and Archives are open to the public where you would be welcome to come and make your own searches free of charge. We have made no investigation of the printed books and microfilm records as this would require the services of a professional genealogist, unless you were able to make your own searches.

I regret the delay in answering your letter of August 30, which was referred to me by Mr. Paul Royall. With this letter you enclosed one which you had sent to Mr. Royall on August 5. I have endeavored to find what department your letter of august the referred to and to find a copy of the correspondence which was undoubtedly written to you, but this has not been successful.

A check of our Master Index of over 30 million cards was made, but we were not successful in identifying your Hijah Belkrap who had a wife named Catherine Carlinghouse. The only reference to any of the names mentioned was to Elisha Belknap who married Lucy Finch. A copy of this Archive sheet is enclosed.

No investigation has been made in our printed books and microfilmed records. This would require the services of a professional genealogist, unless you are able to come and make your own searches free of charge. Dear Ma. Garlinghouse:

Since writing you in February, the exact date of death for Esther Belknap Garlinghouse, wife of Gamaliel, has been reported by the Licking County Clerk, Ohio, as having taken place in Licking County, February 13, 1879. Though you might like to make this notation on your Garlinghouse summary.

I surely do hope that you will find it wonvenient to let me know if your records show the source for the date of birth for Gamaliel as 1792 and also the name of his father. Or, if you can direct me to someone else who might be able to supply this information I shall be most grateful.

There has been conjecture on the part of Carroll York Belknap, retired market analyst of Riverside, Connecticut, who is now spending almost full time on Belknap genealogy, that Gamaliel Garlinghouse was the brother of Catharine, Mary and Jane, all of whom married Belknap boys (brothers of Esther Garlinghouse) However the date of birth for Jane, wife of Jesse Belknap, taken from the grave stone, is March 26, 1792 which would place her birth in the same year as Gamaliel's as shown by your summary. This would seem to disprove Carroll Belknaps conjecture unless, of course, Jane and Gamaliel were twins.

It isn's far from Lincoln to Topeks and if you feel a personal conversation about these matters would be more fruitful than writing I shall be glad to arrange to drive down some day this spring at your convenience.

In your undated memo to Gladys Gray, Violet Belknap (Mrs. G. M), George May and myself, mailed by you 12, November, 1969, you state in paragraph 6 that "Family tradition says Catharine, Jane and Mary (Garlinghouse) were born in Pa." In the case of Catharine, wife of Elijah, there is something more than family tradition. The us Census for Wapello County, Iowa, gives her birth place as "Pa."

In your memo, or communication, of November 17, 1969, to Gladys Gray, you raise the question as to when the Belknaps, Garlinghouses, et all moved from Kentucky to Ohio. In the case of Josiah Garlinghouse mentioned in my memo to you under XXX date of 12/9/69, we know that Lacy Garlinghouse was born in Ohio in 1830 because he was listed as 20 in the 1850 census. In the Elijah Belknap family Joseph was born in Ky in 1826 but the birth place for Mary Jane, born in 1830 was given as Ohio in the 1850 Wapello County, Iowa census. This might be of some help in determining the facts.

You also expressed concern as to how to go about the digging out the Belknap facts in Ohio. I'm under the strong impression that most of the facts sought would eneter primarily in KKKKKKK Licking and Franklin Counties and I get the impression also that there has been considerable historical source material preserved that would be available to one if he were actually on the scene and had a local contact such as Mrs. Ada Avery, to give suggestions and counsel as to where to go to go to find the information sought. Mrs. Avery sounds pretty alert and resourceful to me. As for me attempting to follow through on any of this material I jut don't have the time to get into it and I know better than to start because once I get going on something like this I have a hard time putting it aside.

As I stated to you in my letter of 9/30/69, I do not have any other source for listing a "Roger" as son of Abraham except Glen Evans. I have read your treatise on the Ingalls and find no fault with your conclusion.

When I was in Lansing, Michigan, in December, 1986, reviewing Belknap genealogical records in the State Library, I joted down some notes as to references listed by Glen Evans in relation to data pertaining to children of Jonas Belknap. I reviewingsthose notes I find the follwing for Orin, b. 1799, Cattaraugus Cgunty, N. Y., d. 1811 1873, Pataskala, Ohio, Licking County. r. N.Y., Ohio, Michigan. Married Mary WKKKKX A. Draper, b. 1805
d. 1858 Pottawattamie (Council Bluffs) Iowa. Evans lists Charles Belknap as his sakkkan source.

Do your records show Mary Draper to have died in Pottawattamie County, Iowa? And if so, do you have the background? Did Orin start West with his family as others of Jonas' family had earlier, lose his wife enroute at Council Bluffs, and turn back. Do your records place him in Michigan for a time during his life? I did a quick check of the 1850 census for Pottawattamie County, Iowa but found no Orin Belknap in the county at that time.

Should now give you essential excerpts from that correspondence, in order to explain errors by the Commedere and by HWH, who got his dope from the Cdr, before hearing from Orin Jr.

m 1919: FROM LETTERS FROM ORIN JR, "I was born in the big pine woods of Michigan, 50 miles NW of Detroit. My father's family always lived on the frontier. The wild buffelo of the plains and the skin teepees (six) of the Indians who roused the old Buffale Range were known to me in my young EKIXHEEKE manhood. . . My father died . . in Pataskala, where he owned a store at the time of his death. . . My mother's name was Anna Draper. She married my father in 'York State' near the headwaters of the Susquehanna, where my father built a flat boat in which they fleated down the Susquehanna and the Ohio to the vicinity of Louisville, Kentucky, from whence they moved to central Ohio; to Michigan; to Northern Illinois; and starting from there to join his brother Jesse in Oregon, preceded to western Iowa in 1854, where my mother's health failed and where she died March 3rd 1856. . His second marriage was in the fall of 1856. W. WOTES ON INDUSTINED WORDS AND DATES:

MY NOTES ON UNDERLINED WORDS AND DATES:

Anna Draper: Gdr Charles B had it Mary A Draper. So did HWB, till he heard from Orin Jr. (HWB also had it "Mary Caswell" at one early time) .. . Gladys Gray found a Draper family near or in Honcoye at that time. . . Name might possibly have been Mary Anna, with first name not used in the family?. . . Orin Jr does not give date of marriage of his father and Anna Draper; but list of their children makes it seem they must have married circa 1824; and must have been in N Y State at that time, as not in Ky or Ohio Censuses 1820. Place of marriage night well have been Catteraule Co, NY, which Odr Charles B gives as place of birth of Orin Sr (See next paragraph).

Susquehanna: An elvieus impossibility, accepted without question by HWB, who never went west of the Hudsch. I think an error by Orin, Jr, as only river possible was the Allegany - which rises mainly in Cattaraugus Co. I so change it in my records.

1856 - Evans and Cdr say Orin Sr's wife died 1858. I accept 1856, stated by Orin Jr. because he mentions that year several times in various connections; enviously it was

a year firmly fixed in the mind of the 17 yr old bey that he was in 1856; he could not easily have been wrong on that date for so many occurences as he mentions in his letters. Cdr Charles B's "Pottawettamic (Council Bluffs)" agraes with Orin Jr's "western Iowa" for place of Anna's death: I think I'll accept it, though I haven't yet found the Cdr's source for that entry, and perhaps I should say "possibly" or "said to be", in my final record.

GRATUITOUS COMMENT ON CRNSUS RECORDS: They are tremendously helpful — BUT they are not evidence of any fact except that "this is what was printed." The census taker may have erred — often did. The printer may have errei — doubtless often did, being a printer. Result: Census record can be taken as factual only when supported by valid contemporary evidence. Does, however, indicate probable frames presence in location at time named. (Example: gress errors in census records of ene CYB in his childhood, when I dug them up to prove my US citizenship when I first applied for a passport.)

RACHEL --- Possilly a Garlinghouse. Tos. But no trace of any Rachel Carlinghouse yet found except Abiather Newton's wife Search for Rachel is widespread, among all Ont Co families. A Rachel C who married J N B would have to be sister of James or John G, of course. (?)

JOSIAH GARLINGHOUSE m. Amanda B - not yet identified.

LACY G m. Mary Jane B — apparently sen of Josiah G, above. My guees, just that, is we'll find Josiah G is son of Esther B and Gamaliel Garlinghouse. But our research in Licking Go will probably give us the correct answer, whatever it may be.

We already know that Charles Belknap who married Harriet Avery, aunt of Ada Avery, was sen of Elisha B Jr, and I'm in correspondence with his MEMBELLEXIAN descendents in Ohio.

Don't be surprised In Lacy 0 and Mary Jane turn out to be first cousins. Marriages of MI "own cousins" occurred a number of times in our family.

Census records - Jesiah and David Garlinghouse, Iowa. Helpful. I'll not let myself guess about their parentage, yet, except as above on Jesiah.

NOTE ON CATTARAUGUS COUNTY: Odr Charles B, meticulous werkman though he was, sometimes drew wrong conclusions from valid data — taking place of baptism as place of barth (which it eften wasn't), or place of marriage as place of birth er place of death. In this instance, Orin Jr's letter makes it likely that Orin Sr married Anna Draper in Af Cattaraugus Co, but from Waite we know he was born Ont Co. I think Cdr Charles b got right place of marriage, then misinterpreted it, Seems probable, knowing his mental habits as I do.

In your memo of October 15, 1969, sent jointly to Claudia Marshall, et all, including myself, you ask whether we agree that the source of the exact statements about the children of Jonas and Esther, furnished to D. B. Waite by Mrs. Cynthia Avery, granddaughter of both Jonas Belknap and James Garlinghouse, must have been the family B ible of Jonas and Esther. My answer, for what it may be worth is yes!

I wish to also indicate my agreement with your analysis and conclusion presented in the second paragraph of your memo to to Gladys Gray, George May and myself, October 17, 1969, regarding the strong case for the validity of the data presented by D. B. Waite.

REGARDING YOUR MEMO OF 12/2/69.
[page 1 (No. (1) under "Unfinished Business."

I find myslef, as usual nodding agreement to your analysis and the conclusions projected therefrom. It is noted both in your memo of October 17, mentioned above, and in this memo of 12/2/69, that you call attention to the position that we do not yet know the last name of Rachel, the 2nd wife of Jonas N. Belknap, who died 4 July 1815 in Ontario County, N. Y. (page 2, par. 2, your letter to Mrs Gilbert M. Belknap, 21 Oct., 1969). This may be only a wild guess, and, indeed, that's all it is, but I suggest that one should not automatically rule out the possibility of it being Garlinghouse.

In reviewing the notes in my census file record, I have put my hand on a record of Josiah Garlinghouse who married Amanada Belknap and who, with their family was living in Wapello County, Iowa in 1850. This family's 3rd daughter also had the name of Rachel (Spelled Raichel by the census enumerator). There possibly could be some remote chance that this daughter was named after a Rachel on the Garlinghouse side of the family - a more likely possibility than for the second wife of Jonas, as such unless she also were a Garlinghouse.

I also found in this Josiah Garlinghouse household a 20 year old young man by the name of Lacy Garlinghouse. He is shown to have been a farmer, born in Ohio. A Lacy Garlinghouse, you may recall, was named by old Aunt Anna of Cedar Vale, Kansas, as the young man who married Mary Jane, the youngest daughter of Elijah, in 1855, "and moved with him to Southern Missouri!" Whether it was this same Lacy, a brother possibly of Josiah, or whether it was another Lacy is not known by me. From the census record and dates of birht one would led to think that this particular Lacy Garlinghous was more than likely the oldest som of Amanda and Josiah and surely Mary Jane would not be marrying the son of her own older sister!

The Josiah Garlinghouse schedule followed immediately the listing for Joseph Belknap and his wife Elizabeth who had been married within the year. (Som of Elizabeth)

Have also uncovered another Garlinghouse in the 1850, Wapello County, Iowa census -- a David Garlinghouse whose household is carried in schedule 1116 as follows:

David Garlinghouse, age 40, male, farmer, b. NY.Y. owner of real estate valued at \$1060 Catharine, 22, female, b. Ky. Lavina, 11, female, b. Ind.

Jasper (sic), 6/12, "F" (sic) although the last three previous lines had also been "F" with the last two of the three indicated by ditto marks and it had not been the practice of the enumerator to again list an "F" or an "M" unless there were a change in gender for the name, different than those listed above, so, I believe, he intended to change the listing to an "M" but goofed and instead of listing the "M!, which he intended listed an "F". Jasper's birthplace was listed as Iowa.

Dear Clinton:

I'm most grateful for the big sheet showing descendants of Esther Belknap and Gemaliel Garlinghouse, for it gives us the names of their children beyond Cynthia. Here are some comments, which you may wish to pass along to wendell Garlinghouse if you haven't already done so.

- (1) First column: Does Mr Garlinghouse confirm our belief that the Garlinghouse girls were also the children of James and Eleanor? Does he have a record of the sisters of GARRINGEN Gamaliel? Or can we help him by giving such information as we possess?
- (2) Same column: Birth date given for Gamaliel (1792) is troubling; and may cast doubt on my belief that the Garlinghouse girls were Gamaliel's sisters. Gravestone of Jane, wife of Jesse Belknap, shows birth 26 March 1792; and this date has long been used in my branch of the family. Does Mr Garlinghouse have proof for birth date of Gamaliel,
- (3) Same column: If Eather Belknap was related to a signer of the Declaration, it was not through her paternal line. Might have been through the Parker line, but I know nothing on this. Ar Carlinghouse might be interested in war record of Eather's father -- and possibly in the fact that Gamaliel's father James Garlinghouse was also in Rev War service (N J records).

Could it by any chance have been possible that the disgrace allegedly brought upon the Sir Robert Belknap of County Kent in the latter part of the 14th Century (when he is alleged to have attainted and to have later been banished to Ireland) might have raused a tangent segment of this proud family to have gone under ground, so to speak, and to have quietly removed to a different area under the newly assumed but historically old name of Beltofte? There are probably a thousand reasons why this could not have happened and such a wild idea will rapidly convince you that I am indeed not a historian but I thought it might be worth a try anyway.

As I told you I intended to do, I spent a lot of time with Mrs. Jane Belknap in Des Moines August 3 and 5 and do hope that I may have been some help to her.

When I examined the copies of the Eli(son of Elisha) Belknap Bible, I found your challenge of the 1808 wedding date for Elisha and Lucy Finch to be well founded. The original entry in the Bible for the date of **** marriage for Elisha and Lucy was "July 1st. 1810" but some one had later written "probably 1808" above the 1810 date and had also questioned the 1808 date of birth for Lacy, the oldest son of Elisha. I am enclosing copies of the Bible reclords Jane showed me, for your files. I pointed out to her that there must be still another sheet because these sneets do not provide dates of birth for all the children. She agreed to look and send me copies of any additional sheets, if any, found. I'll share any such additional data with you

I am enclosing a copy of a letter I have completed and sent along for Jane and her grand-daughter Carol Anne.. I trust it will meet with your sanction.

P.S. - a note from Jone Belluce P tolog 8/20/63 sups the 3 sheets of Bible records attached are all she has of the Ele Bulking Bible record.

Dear Carol Anne:

I have learned through your grandmother, Mrs. Jane (M. R.) Belknap, that your application for membership in the Daughters of the American Revolution has been held up pending submission of additional evidence of the father-son relationship between your ancestors Jonas Newton Belknap (b. 1759) and Elisha Belknap (b. 1787 or 89).

As you know, it has been established by the records of the Belchertown, Massachusetts. Congregational Church that Jonas N. Belknap's wife was Esther Parker. (See Historical Sketches of Congregational Church in Belchertown, Massachusetts, by Hon. Mark Doolittle, names 227 and 228.)

I am enclosing with this letter Xerox copies of electrostatic copies of Henry Wycoff Belknap's original file documents furnished me by Carroll York Belknap which should be especially helpful in establishing Elisha Belknap as the son of Jonas N. Belknap. Carroll York Belknap, born 29 September 1892, is the founder of the Carroll Belknap and Associates firm of Greenwich, Connecticut, and is himself a descendant of Jonas N. Belknap. His residence is 25 Club Road, Riverside, Connecticut, 06878. He is now devoting practically full time and then some, in the huge task of compiling a combination of all available records of the Belknap family in America. Among other things, he has made electrostatic copies of the complete Henry Wycoff Belknap work files. You will note that the sheet I have designated by an "A" is shown to be the first sheet Henry Wycoff Belknap made up for Jonas Newton Belknap, #302, listing a "Lincoln" as his wife and that later he corrected his records as shown by the material I have marked "B" listing Jones N. Belknap with wife, Esther Parker. He goes on to list the following as children of the couple:

> #657 Elijah (My ancestor) #658 Elisha (Your ancestor)

Jonas #659

#660 Jesse (The ancestor of Carroll York Belknap)

#661 Orin

The birthdate for Elijah is shown in the above mentioned record as 1785 with Elisha listed next without a specific birthdate given. The Eli Belknap (son of Elisha) family Bible record as furnished me by your grandmother, Mrs. M. R. Belknap, lists the birthdate for Elisha as January 18, 1789, which would correlate with the other birth dates listed on the Henry Wycoff Belknap record and as we know them to be.

The Old Northwest Genealogical Quarterly, Vol. 15, carries information taken from Elisha's gravestone at Alexandria, Ohio, showing the date of death for Elisha as "January 8, 1839, aged 51 years, 11 months, and 21 days". This would have made the date of his birth January 18, 1787. Both records agree that the date of birth was January 18. It seems very evident that both records relate to the same Elisha but that an error of exactly two years was made as between the two recordings. In any event, the 1787 date would also correlate with the other birth dates listed in the HMB records and as we know them to be.

The American Genealogical and Biographical Index lists page 459 of the volume Parker Family in America (Augustus Parker, Buffalo, N. Y.) for Elisha Belknap. It will be noted on page 459 that among the children of Esther Parker and her husband "a Belknap" (whom we have already established through the Belchertown Church records as Jonas N. Belknap) Elisha is listed and in the same order as carried by Henry Wycoff Belknap - following Elijah who, according to Carroll Y. Belknap's research, was baptised in the Belchertown Church in 1785.

I suggest that you forward these copies from the Henry Wycoff Belknap files to be made a part of your application as well as a Xerox copy of the Eli Belknap Bible record together with a copy of the data from the Old Northwest Genealogical Quarterly. Vol. 15, to help more clearly establish your direct lineage to Jonas N. Belknap. It is suggested also that you draw attention to the Parker Family in America citation, if you have not already done so.

It is likewise suggested that you ask to amend your application to show the date of marriage of Elisha and Lucy Finch as July 1, 1810, the date originally listed in the Eli Belknap family Bible, rather than the "Probably 1808" later written in above the original entry. This revised entry was apparently made by some one in a later generation in an attempt to make the date more nearly compatable with the July 5, 1808 date of birth for Lacy Belknap, son of Elisha and his wife. As documented, in Index of Town of Richmond Cemeteries, in the Honeoye, N. Y. library (according to Carroll Y. Belknap) Elisha had previously been married to a Bettie Briggs (Daughter of Moses and Deborah Briggs) who had died in May, 1910.

Since, as Carroll Y. Belknap further reports, the 1810 census for Ontario County, New York, (taken before Bettie's death) shows the couple to have had a male child under 10 years living in the home, it would seem only logical and reasonable to assume that Lacy, born in 1808, was the son of Elisha

I trust that you may find this communication and the enclosures helpful in establishing your eligibility for membership in the D. A. R. If there is any other way in which I can be of help, please let me know.

Thank you for the copy of the data and review of same sent to George S. May, P.O.Box2, Fair Oaks, California, 95628 under date of August 29, 1969. I found it most interesting and find mys2 taking no exception to the analysis and conclusions you have made therein. It is most considerate and thoughtful of you to share such documents or summaries with me.

I haven't heard a word from Carol/ Anne Belknap or from her grandmother, Jane E. Belknap, since I had last heard from you in January, this year. Her son, on, the father of Carol Anne used to visit our Nebraska State office quite regularly but has not been by for many months.

Relative to the use of HWB's information on Elijah and his children, I found all known facts relative there to to be entirely consistment with the data listed on HWB's list of children for Elijah and decided to list the children as listed by HWB unless some verified information to the contrary came along.

On HWB's "Revised Sheet" which you sent me with your memo of May 31, 1968, I note that the "Author" of the list of Jonas Newton Belknap and Esther Parker and the five sons of Jonas N. was listed as "Orin Belnap, 1919". I have speculated that Orin might also have been responsible for the list of children given for Elijah. Would you take the "1919" to be the date he recorded the information or the date that the information was provided? It is noted that the last name of this Orin is written as "Belnap" with the k left out but I also note in the 1820 Census records for Hart and Hardin County, Kentucky, that Jonas, Jonas Jr., your Jesse and my Elijah all spelled their last name without the k at that time. Anyway one of my problems is that I find no "Orin" listed among the Belknap families for which I have data who would have been alive in 1919. Jonas Na Orin had died in 1873 and Orin, the son of James M. Belknap (Son of Elijah) is reported to have been killed 23 June 1862 fighting for the North in the Civil War. His birthdate was 24 Oct., 1840. Have you identified the Orin mentioned by HWB?

Speaking of the 1820 USCensus for Hart and Hamilton Counties in Kentucky; I secured the micro films of these census records during the summer and carefully reviewed them and then had my wife double check me on the data. I list it as follows:

The Hardin County Census was listed under 3 areas: Pennsylvania, Little York and Elizabeth Town. Both Belnaps listed for this county were shown to be in the "Little York" area.

I appreciate your letter of September 11, 1969 and all the work you went to to respond to my previous communication. I am convinced that your position is sound and am changing the narrative material for Elijah. Will se that you have a revised copy when it is complete to replice that which was sent earlier.

I am sure you are also right about the coopering being a vocation along the way and that he did indeed farm earlier in life. I am refering to Jonas N., of course.

On page 2 of your memo, Far. 1, you state that Rousel died in Sheridan, Ohio, but could not locate the town on your map. It is located in the extreme southern part of Ohio (P.O. South Point). Shows a population of 56 and is in Lawrence County.

I note your comment that a search should be made, or would be helpful, to determine if Orin were in Hardin County, Kentucky, in 1820. If he were he was not listed by name and would have been included only in one of the other families but not as a head because we searched both Hart and Hardin county for all the Belnaps or Belknaps listed by name.

I did not search for the name of Isaac Newton or David Chatfield.

Yes, Glen Evans said that Jonas "died in Harte Cokkky, Ky. Feb. 16th, 1824, and the last pension payment was made to Isaac Newton, administrator of the estate, at the Lexington, Ky. Pension Agency."

The data you present about the parentage of the three Garlinghouse girls sounds pretty firm and is certainly seem to be the probable background.

And your knowledge of the normal route the Belknaps would have taken to Kentucky also makes sense in the light of your explanation.

I do hope that you are successful in learnign more about Orin.

I am assuming they were there when he died in 1824; and that Esther (Belknap) Garlinghouse, being the oldest daughter present (Cynthia was there, but Susannah was then in Ohio) took posession of the Bible in which the births of her brothers and sisters had been recorded.

I can think of no other explanation of the precision of the information that D. B. Waite got from Mrs. Avery.

" . . Aaron Hunt, a soldier of the Revolution from New Jersey, who had a

few years before taken up his abode in the once pleasant valley of Wyoming, . . in the early spring of 1795 left Wyoming and ascended the Susquehanna as far as New Toyn, now Elmira (and eventually followed, on foot) the Indian trail that led to Honeoye Lake (and came to) what was, after the HANTELWAXX subdivision of lands, lot No. 2 in the present Town of Richmond. (3) the farm on which Mrs. M. A. Bray lately resided, and the first one settled (4) between the head of the lake and the present village of Naples. "Col. John Green had preceded them one year , and was the first settler on the J. G. Briggs farm near the head of the Honeoye lake, and Elijah and Stiles Parker were very early comers there. Many of the first settlers along that (5) road exchanged their farms withthe Hoh. Francis Granger of Canandaigua for (6) wild lands in Hardin County, Kentacky, and removed thither in an early day. Jacob Holdren took at first what proved to be lot No. 7, mostly in the present town of Canadice, built him a cabin where the old orchard is on the bottom north of the present school house, married Jane Hunt, and made a temporary

James and John Garlinghouse the next year put up a cabin on the south side of the line (9) a little west of the present sawmill, and became the first actual residents of the town, and here Mary Garlinghouse was born in June 1797, and was the first white child born in the town. She became in time the wife of Thomas Briggs, . . James Garlinghouse married Elanor Hunt, a sister to Aaron.

"Through the kindness of Mrs. Cynthia A. Avery, a grand-daughter of both Jonas Belknap and James Garlinghouse, of Grandville, Ohio, we have had (11) access to the family records of Jonas Belknap, and learn that Esther Belknap (12)Was born just across the line April 1, 1797, Orin Belknap, May 29, 1799, Cynthia Belknap, July 12, 1801, and just over the line in Canadice, Samuel Holdren in 1798. Those were the earliest births in this hollow. Garlinghouse and his Nephew, Benjamin, afterwards settled in what is now called the "Garlinghouse Settlement." John afterwards went to Richmond, died there, and Moses Briggs, the father of Caleb, Thomas, Barzillai and John, married his (13)Belknap sold out his interests on the Richmond side of the line to Aaron Hunt, and in 1806 built a house in Springwater a few rods from the line, where the apple trees are west of the present road. Here his wife, whose name was Esther Parker, died June 10, 1809, and was no doubt the first white person (14)who died in (the) town. NOTES ON EXCERPT FROM CHAPTER VII of EARLY HISTORY OF SPRINGWATER, LIVINGSTON CO.

- (1) "Aaron Hunt" father of Sarah Hunt, wife of Samuel Belknap, son of Jonas Newton Belknap also possibly uncle of some or all of the Garlinghouses who married Belknaps in Out. rin County N V.
- (2) "the once pleasant valley of Wyoming" -- When he said "once pleasant", Mr. Waite was doubtless thinking of the Wyoming Valley Massacre in 1788. This valley lies between the Alleghanies and the Poconos in N E Pennsylvania. Originally settled by people from Connecticut and claimed by Connecticut after the Revolution. In the massacre in 1788, the Connecticut contingent was virtually wiped out by a band of Tories and Indians. Note 7, below, considers how this background may have influenced Jonas, en route to Ontario County, N. Y.
- (3) "Town of Richmond" -- an area MI about six miles square, first called Pittstown; the village is now named Honeoye.
- (4) "the head of the lake" south end of Honeoye Lake; the lake's outlet, Honeoye River, flows North by West from north end of lake.
- (5) "Elijah and Stiles Parker" younger brothers of Esther Parker. Served in 7th Massachusetts Regt, as did Jonas. They and Jonas almost inseparable for many years.
- (6) "Hardin County" possibly an indication of how Jesse Belknap got land in that county in Kentucky.
- (7) "valley of Wyoming" We can now reconstruct our notion of the route probably followed by Jonas and his young family, after leaving Cherry Valley, N Y, where Jesse was born in 1792. Very likely, along or down the Susquehanna River from its headwaters near Cherry Valley, past the small new settlement at Scranton, on to the larger one at Wilkes Barre in the Wyoming Valley where newcomers from New England were not likely to feel comfortable a few years after the Wyoming Valley Massacre. Assume Jonas was in that valley about 1794, stayed there only briefly learned of the new road opened by the in 1792
- by the British company that owned much of Ontario County and was trying to attract settlers from Pennsylvania went back up the Susquehanna to New Town (Elmira) and then along the Cohocton River to the area near Canandaigua, where he paused in the winter of 1794-95, before settling in Lot 1 in Town of Richmond.
 - (8) "the town of Springwater" does not mean the present village of that name. It had only one log cabin till 1824. The area which eventually became the Town of Springwater was part of the Town of Naples till 1816. "Town" in that part of N Y State means an area about 6 miles by 10 miles, or larger.
 - (9) "south side of the line" that is, south of the boundary line between Town of Richmond (Pittstown) and Town of Middletown (the original name of Naples). Approximate location of house built by Jonas in 1806 is shown at 20 on map.
 - (10) "Mary Garlinghouse" Not the Mary who married Jonas Belknap Jr. This
 Mary was daughter of John Garlinghouse, married Thomas Briggs.

 . . If the mother of any or all of our Garlinghouse girls **MXX*
 was Eleanor Hunt who married James Garlinghouse, this challenges sheet from
 Bertha Hansen showing father as Elijah Garlinghouse, mother as Eleanor Hunt.

The parentage of the Garlinghouse girls — Jane, Catherine, Mary Ann — needs further study. All we yet have proof for is that Gamahiel Garlinghouse who married Esther Belkmap was a son of James Garlinghouse and Eleanor (Elenor?) Hunt — and that Rachel Garlinghouse who married Abiather Newton was a sister of Jane Garlinghouse who married Jesse Belkmap.

- (11) "Mrs. Cynthia A. Avery, Grandville, Ohio" this weman, in Licking County, Ohio, must have been a daughter of Esther Belknap and Gamaliel Garlinghouse, both of whom lived and died in that county. No other Belknap who married a Garlinghouse had a daughter named Cynthia. She is the TITEL child of Conly
- (12) "family records" This phrase had only one meaning among such people in the 19th century. It meant the family record pages in the family Bible. Esther, oldest daughter of Jonas in Kentucky (Hart County) where he died would naturally have been the person to take EMAX possession of the Bible of Jonas Belknap and Esther Parker. Such precise dates for birth of children born in Ontario County could hardly have come from any other source. If I am right in believing that Mrs. Avery was drawing from that Bible in giving information to Mr. Waite, we now have for the first time a contemporary, first—hand, original source for the names and sequence of birth of all the children of Jonas Newton Belknap and Esther Parker. Up to now, we have had only lists derived from family tradition such as the one in the Parker genealogy, Parker in America, and the one written about M 1916 by Elizabeth Jane Starr (Mrs. Garrison Turner), grandaughter of Jesse. Such lists have been correct; but not acceptable as proof of descent.
- (13) "Moses Briggs" Father of Bettie Briggs, first wife of Elisha Belknap.
 She died 1810, leaving him with a son born 1808. He then married Lucy Finch.
- (14) Date of Esther Parker's death Now that we know she died in IN 1809, we can say that the female aged over 45, shown in 1810 census of household of Jonas Belknap, was the Mrs. Jonas Belknap (Rachel) who died in Gorham, Ontario County, in 1815. (See postscript below.)
- (15) "on the bank of the Green River" This river runs through Hart County, Ky, where Jonas died.
- (16) "Middletown" original name of Naples, as noted above. This means that in 1808 Jonas was living in the house located at 3 on the map.
- (17) Places of death are correctly stated. Inclusion of Jesse in this list means that Waite got information frm Mrs Avery after 1881 -- year when Jesse died.

P.S. After death of second wife, Rachel, Jonas married Tamar Vinton, widow of Asa Newton. This third wife was with him in Hart County, Kentucky, 1820.

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The following excerpt is taken from Chapter VII, "Hunt's Hollow," by D. B. The numbers in the right-hand margin refer to notes I made for my own guidance when I first read this chapter. Carroll Y. Belknap, 14 Oct 1969.

There now. You two have been properly introduced to each other. I should have done this scener. My reason for doing it now is that I think scenere beside me should have a record of the main purales yet to be solved about Jonas Newton Belkmap -- and you two are the persons most interested in them, though a lot of others have been and still are helping.... Forgive me if this memo proves to be long-winded.

I think I have pretty well reconstructed the record of Jonas W, from his birth in 1759 up to his last known action in Ontario County, N Y, in 1819. The main unsolved problems are:

(1) When and where did Esther Parker die?

(2) Can we prove that he Subsequently married Tamar Vinton, widow of Assa Newton?

If so, when and where?

(3) Who was Diantha's father?

(4) Was the Isaac Newton who married Cynthia (Jonas N's daughter) a son of Asa Newton and Tamer Vinton?

You two have established, plainly, that the wife named in the 1820 pension application in Kentucky was probably (at least possibly) Tamar.

Some circumstantial evidence supporting that possibility:

- (A) Though Tamar Vinton was born in Charlton, Mass. (30 July 1766 seems to be a well sustantiated date), her family moved to Granby, Mass., a short time later. Granby was a settlement just a few miles from the Belchertown settlement where Jonas and his father and mether lived. (These weren't much more than settlements in the wilderness at that time.) Samuel's military record shows him enlisting "for Granby" in May 1775. Jonas enlisted in the same militia company on the same day. . Jonas, then 16 years old, might well have known Tamar, then 9 and most probably knew her family. If they met later, when he was 60, it might have been a meeting of old friends both, now widowed.
- (B) Tamer's brother Samuel moved from Gramby to south central N Y in 1202 1803 and was in a settlement near Binghamton in 1825. Tamer and her husband Asa Newton might well have accompanied him or have joined him later. This kind of related-family movement was very common at that time, in our family and many others. If it happened in this case, it places Tamer on her way toward Kentucky. (Or pessibly toward Ontarios County in northwestern N Y) Census records 1810 for both parts of N Y may bell us Ontario County. Chemange County, Brooms County.
- (C) The Isaac Newton who married Cynthia is said (by Clen Evans) to have been Exemple executor of the estate of Jonas N after Jonas died in Hardin County Ky in 1824. So there is a known Newton connection in Kentucky.
- (D) As Jones N named no wife or child in his first pension application in N Y 1818, his second marriage probably occurred after that date. Kentucky seems the more probable place—with the date probably late 1819 or in 1820.

Park And

There is little hope of finding a documentary record of such a marriage at that time in Kentucky. People like these were usually being married by itinerent ministers -- not in churches.

We might possibly find information in local histories -- but this is walkely, I feet fear, for Jones could not have been an important cities in his last years in Kentucky. (Incidentally, don't accept too literally his statements about property, etc., in pension application. The pension law required an old soldier to be a passer in order to qualify for a pension. Many local authorities were rather bread-minded when helping an eld soldier, in those years.)

I den't think we can find much aid in Vinton records. The published Vinton genealogy (Vinton Monorial) gives no information on Tamer beyond bithdate and names of two husbands — I got her unrriage date (to Asa Newton) 25 Jon 1789 from the records compiled by Commander Charles Balkmap; and he, too, had nothing further on her but that her second husband was said to have been a Jones Balkmap manus a Jones Herri Helimap as her second husband is not real evidence. Such vague statements, lacking specific supporting detail, are generally regarded as being based on hearsay or more family tradition — homes not acceptable as proof. Buch tee often, to my erm and knowledge, they turn out to have no validity whatever.

Our best hope, I believe, is to find a present-day Newton who can tell us (at least) the names of Asa Newbon's children and the date of his death — and possibly, what became of his wife Tamar after he died (though this is unlikely). . I wrote some time ago to the Hrs. Calkins named ing Claudia's letter. No reply yet. She may turn out to be the second person, out of scores to whom I've written, to fail to reply to my ples for aid. . . If so, I may ask Claudia to write to her, if she's willing to do so.

What I must emphasize, forgive me, is that if I presented such evidence as we now passesses to real experts like Mrs Potter at Essex Institute and Miss King or Miss Harding at MEROS, they'd just do what they've done in similar or comparable instances. They'd sails tolerantly and tell me "You might go so far as to say 'pecahly'."

I'll centime searching for more present-day Newtons who are doing genealogical work.

Meanwhiles, sty suggestions?

Hy problem is that I don't have time for original research. With something like 3000 or 3500 names to work on, and enchess contradictions in the various sets of records, I have to rely almost wholly on pure good luck in finding people who have the answers I need — until I end with (I hope) a manageable and relatively small number of cases demanding study of original manageable such as court records, vital statistics (where reasonably transverthy, which is all too seldom) etc., etc., ad infinitum.

Dear Carroll,

No, I have not been ill, but I have been up to my neck with projects other than geneological that have demanded about every waking hour.

Since my memorandum to you under date of 9/28/69, I have received a large number of most welcome and informative communications, including many copies of memos or letters to and from others, such as George S. May, Claudia Marshall et all, Gladys Gray, Mrs. Gilbert M. Belknap, and Mrs. Milton R. Belknap. I do deeply appreciate all of this data, but I sincerely doubt that any assistance I may be able to offer shall ever repay you for these courtesies, since my interest in all of this far out weighs either my ability as an amateur geneologist, or available time to pursue such interests. I am still employed full time in a position which can be very demanding, and I also have made some commitments to bring together data relating to my mother's side of the family.

She passed her 85th birthday last April 8, and since her health is far from good, I must spend more time on the Moss geneology while she yet lives and can help me fill in the gaps here and there. My Moss ancestry in America goes back to Ed Moss, Lancaster, England, who settled in York County, Virginia in 1644. Moses Moss, born in 1758 was a Revolutionary War ancestor, and Opal Butz Anderson of San Angelo, Texas, a niece of my mother's (and my cousin) received membership in the D.A.R. (certificate No. 307011) on his record.

A couple of weeks ago my wife and I made a week end trip to visit my mother at Hemingford, Nebraska, and enroute, stopped in "Ash Hollow" along the old Oregon Trail road to walk up the very steep, old rut scarred hillside where the wagon wants came down into the valley as they crossed over from the South Platte River to the North Platte in their journey west. I have traveled through Ash Hollow many times, but after reading your Aunt Kit's account of the precarious descent of their wagons down this well known hill into Ash Hollow, it has taken on new significance and meaning (see p. 36 of Mrs. Kathryn Christian Barrett's presentation). See also enclosures with this letter.

What a masterful, masterful job you did for Carol Anny Belknap, and I am so grateful to you for furnishing me with a copy. I can well understand how very much time and effort went into this project. I hope Carol Anne and her grandmother, Mrs. Jane (M. R.) Belknap fully appreciate all you have done for them.

And as soon as time and the results of your research will permit, I do hope you will write up the life of Jonas N. Belknap and his family. I'm very sure no one else has done so much research on this subject, and one could be very sure of the authenticity of such a presen-

tation if you did it.

In your September 30, 1969 memo, you ask if I have sources for Mary Belknap Kentfield and Chloe Belknap Shumway beyond Glen Evans. The answer is "No", and I have a question mark in my summary records beside each entry. As the copy of Evan's material which you have shows, he indicated that a Mrs. Burton Belknap, then of Clipp Road, Delmar, N.Y., had the Bible records of Jonathan "which record Samuel and his family". Evans probably picked up the names of a couple of grandchildren and recorded them as children as he had in my own family. He also listed Charles Belknap and a George De Groff records of Meridian, Cayuga Co., N.Y., as well as Vinton Family records as sources. I never tried to follow up on any of these to further verify data, and I just don't have the time and energy to do so now. I have noted your comments to George S. May on the identity of Mary.

Yes, my only source for Roger, #10, is Evans. On my source sheet accompaning the family sheet I specifically point out that Roger was not listed by you, HWB, or the NEH&G.

Yes, I now carry the birth date of Cynthia, my #53, as 1800.

In your memo of Oct. 4, 1969, you ask whether you should write to Garrett M. Belknap. He does considerable traveling about among contemporary members of Joseph Gillett Belknap's family and might be helpful, but don't expect any thing very comprehensive from him. He means well. And incidentally, you have my full permission to contact directly anyone you find listed in any of the family sheets or otherwise that I may have furnished you.

The information found by Gladys Gray in the Spring Water, N.Y., history was surely a break through. I have purchased a copy of the book. Thanks for letting me know where it could be secured.

The information given therein has also provided additional evidence of the place of death for Elijah as Indiana.

I note in the data prepared for Carol Ann, page 6, that you state that Elijah "returned" to Indiana in the 1870's for some temporary reason and died there. Do you have evidence that he had lived in Indiana at an earlier time? The first time that I can place him in Indiana was when he filed for his War of 1812 pension from Owen Township, Clinton County, Frankfort, Indiana, 31 March 1871. He was granted same and information from the Federal Archives states that the "last (pension) payment of record for Elijah Belknap, a resident of Frankfort, Indiana, was in the amount of \$24 on December 8, 1974."

I have speculated that perhaps Samuel was living in Frankfort at the time, and that Elijah was living with his family. HWB puts Samule's son, Myron Hawley and wife, Honor Wilson, in Frankfort in 1899, and said that Samuel's wife, Amy Reed, was a widow in Franklin, Indiana in 1890.

Regarding your most recent memo of November 24, I must say that my only information for the Ingalls came from Evans.

As time permits, I will respond relative to other, as yet unanswered

memos you have sent me in the past number of weeks, but we are expecting one of my mother's younger sisters tonight for a visit, and I must bring this to a close now.

ASH HOLLOW HISTORY

The following narration is at best a condensation of a small part of the history of Ash Hollow. It is factual and deals with the part of the Oregon Trail which goes by Lewellen, Nebras-ks, or about a 10-mile section of the ploneer highway that opened up the west,

The history of Ash Hollow is long and varied and has been a crossroad of life, death, travel sod adventure. For a quarter of a century it was a living part of the Oregon Trail. It is a ravine that Nature has created in the side of the bluffs overlooking the North Platte River. It affords a natural shelter for livestock and wild game, If a heavy rain occurs the sand draw that winds down through the Hollow may become a raging flood for it is the watershed to many thousands of acres south and west of it. A small grove of Ash trees around an oasis of fresh spring water is said to be the reason for the naming of Ash Hollow; there being no other Ash trees in the vicinity.

In 1841 pioneers and families traveling the hazardous route from St. Joseph, Missouri, to the Oregon Territory encountered many perils. The natural terrain presented almost as great a problem as the weather and the Indians, and because water was a prime consideration, the Oregon Trail necessarily followed the main waterways. Accordingly the North Platte river became a part of the Trail from Ash Hollow, west across the Panhandle of Nebraska and into Wyoming. Wyoming. Nebraska

Fording places in the river were carefully selected to avoid quicksand. To reach the fording place at the mouth of the Hollow the covered wagons were lowered

Sometime, about 1846, an abandoned log cabin began to be Sometime, an used as a depository for mail. Letters and messages were left there with the hope and some possibility, they would eventually reach their destination. It naturally became known as the Ash Hollow Post Office, although it was an unofficial one, it was used until about 1852,

On September 2, 1855, General Harney and troops camped in the Hollow and the next day fought a battle with a band of Sioux, led by Chief Little Thunder. Fort Grattan was built short-ly after this battle with the In-dians. This controversial battle actually took place along the banks of Blue Creek, north and west of Lewellen. (This stream was then known as Blue Water). Ash Hollow, being the better known landmark was used to identify this skirmish which some critics called a massacre, as there were quite a number of Indian women and children involved,

According to historical ac-counts Fort Grattan was built on the south bank of the river at the mouth of the Hellow. It was named after Lieutenant Grattan who was killed and his troops de-feated by the Sioux in a prior fight. The fort was a temporary earthen defense work thrown up. ASH HOLLOW STATE HISTORICAL PARK

Ash Hollow has been the home of prehistoric animals and prehistoric man.

The bones of prehistoric rhinoceros, mammoths, and mastodons have been recovered in and along the area.

* * * * * *

Excavation of Ash Hollow Cave indicates the presence of prehistoric man some seven to eight thousand years before the present. Later artifacts indicate the tenancy by historic Indians of this same cave.

* * * * * * *

Probably the first white men to see or live in Ash Hollow were the early French fur traders of whom we have no positive record. The earliest known mention of Ash Hollow is by Robert Stuart who, in his diary, describes Ash Hollow and refers to it as Cedar Creek in 1813.

* * * * * *

In 1830, William Sublette, Jedediah Smith, and David Jackson guided the first wagons through Ash Hollow.

* * * * * * *

Abe Greenwood refers to Ash Hollow by name in 1832,

* * * * * * *

An Indian Battle of considerable consequence between the Sioux and Pawnee took place at the mouth of Ash Hollow in 1835.

* * * * * *

The earlier use of Ash Hollow by the mountainmen and trappers caused the Overland immigrants in search of free land and gold to follow this established route up the north Platte. In the 1840's and 50's many thousands of immigrants who crossed at the Lower California Crossing used the Hollow as a resting place and a place to repair vehicles damaged by the descent of Windlass Hill. It was also at this time that Rachel Pattison died and whose grave is in the Ash Hollow Cemetery.

* * * * * *

United States Mail Station #21 was located in Ash Hollow.

* * * * * * *

Fort Grattan, a fort built of earth, was erected by General Harney after his defeat of the Indians at Blue Water some six miles west in 1855.

* * * * * * *

The Fremont Expedition passed through Ash Hollow and was noted in Fremont's diary. The Landers Expedition also spent some time here. Records indicate at least one or perhaps two trading posts being located in Ash Hollow, one of which was burned by the Indians.

* * * * * * *

A deserted trapper's cabin built about 1846 provided an "unofficial Post Office." Immigrants would write letters and leave them in the building asking those travelers returning to the states to mail them.

* * * * * * *

Ash Hollow was named because of the large number of ash trees in and along the Hollow. There was also a large amount of cedars and some of the cedars were cut for telegraph poles at the building of the Overland Telegraph.

* * * * * *

When the use of the Lower California Crossing was discontinued and travel proceeded on up the south Platte and used a new crossing called the Upper California Crossing, immigrant travel down Windlass Hill and through the Hollow was considerably lessened for wheeled vehicles. However, the pack trains and cavalry units still used the Lower Crossing route and went through the Hollow.

* * * * * *

Printed immigrant guides, which were widely used during the 40's and 50's all mentioned the springs to be found in Ash Hollow and agreed it was the best water along the Oregon Trail.

* * * * * *

The Nebraska Game and Parks Commission has acquired Ash Hollow and Windlass Hill, and is in the process of developing the area into an Historical Park.

Your memo Sept 22. I shouldn't be answering it now; rather, should be dealing with my fat file labeled "Clinton, not yet answered." But this most recent memo seems to need answering at once, while it's fresh in your mind and in mine. So here goes.

ELIJAH'S CHILDREN: Have you checked Census returns for Elijah, 1820, 1830, 1840, against HWB's list of children? I do OK on 1820 — but not on later ones. . . Have you checked names on excerpt from Old North West Quarterly, on HWB sheet for Elijah, which seems to show possible children not named as E's children?— but no other brother known to be in Delaware county then.

ORIN -- Some of your questions about "Author" on HWB sheet for Jonas N B's son Orin were answered in my note to you a few days ago... Other questions: No, he was not source of HWB's information about Elijah's children. I think the record of that source was destroyed in Salem Fire 1914. . Spelling without "k" in Kentucky probably error by census taker. . In letters to HWB, the Kettle Falls Orin was objecting to misidentification of another Orin as his father. That other Orin, I find, belonged to the Oswego or Oneida County Belknaps. I haven't yet found his parentage.
HWB wrote: "These Orins are troublesoms." I agree. Most common error, today, is confusion of Orin, son of Jonas ## (jr) with Orin son of Jonas # B.

KENTUCKY CENSUS RECORDS — I'm immensely grateful. But disturbed by discovering that John Sherman made a mistake. If he still makes mistakes after more than 30 years of genealogical work, what chance have I?

ABSENCE OF ORIN IN KY CENSUS —I shouldn't have argued expected to find him there. He married in 6r about 1824, in New York State. . Though he went to Ky, obviously years after his older brothers did, he may not have stayed there very long. . So, perhaps, a bit of strengthening for surmise that Cynthia and Isaac Newton were living with Jonas N B in Ky — Hart Co.

SHERIDAN OHIO — Thanks for telling me where to find it. Location strengheens two of my guesses: (1) that the migration to Ky was probably by or along ribers; and (2) that Susannah and David Chatfield were probably not with her brothers in Ohio.

SOME EHRORS OF MINE, in Aug 29 letter to George May:

In saying that all contemporary records showed Jonas N B as Jonas only, I had momentarily forgottn that the Belchertown church record listed him as Jonas N. Belknap. HWB guessed that the "N" was for "Nathen," but was corrected on this by 1919 — by descendants of Jesse.

I showed birthplace of Jonas N B as Enfield Conn. Another momentary forgetfulness. Should have written "Windsor (Ellington)". The Windsor of those days was an area north of Hartford — not the Windsor of today, which is in another part of Conn. Many people have stumbled over names of settlements in what Stiles called "Ancient Windsor" — East Windsor, Ellington, Enfield, Somers.

I shouldn't be answering it now. Instead, I should be dealing with the file labeled "Clinton, not yet answered" — but your most recent memo seems to need answering at once, while it's fresh in your mind and in mine. So here goes.

HWB's list of Elijah's children: What I had in mind in my warning is that I'm not always sure that he got all children of any one family. I know of cases in which his correspondence shows that he had reason to believe there were more children than he had found. Also, I have in mind the citation from Old North West Quarterly 1840 shown on his sheet for Ehijah in Delaware County Ohio showing two names possibly children of Elijah (Anna and Susanna) not included in his own list of such children. And I think of my difficulties in matching the 1830 and 1840 census figures for Elijah (in my letter to May Aug 29) with HWB's list of the children. Maybe you can solve this.

A similar problem: Glenn Evans shows a sister of Jonas NB, Mary, as Emprised marrying Rufus Kentfield. No one else lists her. Evans may be right; probably based his entry on Doolittle's No. 184 — "Mary (Belknap) Kentfield — joined church in 1779" — as reported to me by the Belchertown Library. But in 1916, James Allen Kibbe — a competent source on Connecticut Belknaps — wrote to HWB: "Here's a puszle for you" Ithen quoting another passage in Doolittle) — "Mary (Belknap) widow Kentfield died 1781 aged 88." HWB wondered if this might be Mary Newton, mother of Jonas. But Mary Newton's birth date 8 Nov 1737 seems well authenticated; so wouldn't have been 88 in 1781. . . Could it have been Mary Dickenson, Jonas's grandmother, whose husband Samuel Belknap died about 1757? She is said to have been born 29 Nov 1703, which would make her 78 in 1781 — so maybe birth date should be 1693 not 1703. . . I don't suppose I'll ever solve this puzzle, except by luck. Meantime, I'm chary about agreeing with Evans — or with HWB.

ORIN: Some of your questions about the "Author" on the sheet for Jonas's son Orin were answered in note to you a day or so ago. Other questions: No, he was not source of names of Elijah's children. I have no record of that source; so assume it was among records destroyed in Salem Fire 1914 . . On my copy of HWB sheet, this Orin's name is spelled witha k. . Spelling Belnap in Kentacky census records doubtless error by census taker, like KENKKHENKKENKKELIKKELIKK "Mr Belnap" on bill from tree surgeon, which I paid yesterday. I know of no instance in which any descendant of Jûnas N B has, himself, omitted the k. . . In letters to HWB, the Kettle Falls Orin was objecting to HWB's EXHIBITED OTHER AS A STATEMENT MISIGENTIFICATION.

EINTERNATIONAL MISIGENTIFICATION.

This reminds me. Error in my letter to May: Aug 29. I said that all contemporary records for Jonas N B showed name only as Jonas. Forgot, momentarily, that Belchertown church had him as ENK "Jonas N. Belimap."

This reminds me, too, of an error by Evans, who wrote that Jonas N B was one of those who served only occasionally in Revolution. Not so. Record shows continuous service from May 1775 to he June 1783. Maximum strength of Washington's army at any one time was 1,000 men. Jonas N B was always one of that 1,000.

Ky Census 1820 — page 64 — Belnap, Jas (James) — Is "James" your addition, or copied from census record? If only "Jas" in original, could be misprint for "Jos" i. e. Joseph. Haven't tried to identify him yet.

Glad to hear from you again.

Regarding Carol Ann's rejection, I too was disappointed for her sake that the DAR rejected her application. I'm not sure that her grandmother, Jane, has done the best job of coaching her in completing said application but on the other hand I definitely get the feeling that the DAR is losing objectivity in trivia in relation to Carol Ann's petition.

Although I have had correspondence with, I haven't really done any thing to help Carol Ann renew her petition because I just haven't known much else to do. I explained to Jane when she told me they had written you that you were out of the country until December and that she couldn't expect to hear from you immediately.

Jane told me that when she was in Kentucky this year in an attempt to gather more information on her Arnold family and to do some local research of the Belknaps in Hardin and Hart counties, she was informed in the state capitol that the court houses in both Hardin and Hart counties, together with their contents of official documents and records, had been destroyed by fire during the Civil War as a result of raids by the North apparently at about the same time that Sherman and his forces were making their march of destruction from Atlanta to the Sea. I gathered from her comment that she really didn't get into the two counties, personally, at all.

I really don't feel competent to give her much more help than I have already tried to give in the matter of following this matter up with the DAR especially when I get the distinct impression that the DAR is more interested in finding a way or ways to keep her out than to accept her. Perhaps Jane has at some time had some run in with the local chapter er may have irked them by too readily assuming that there would be no question about her granddaughter gettin in.

Anyway I am sure that Carol Ann would be most grateful for any counsel or help you might be able to give her.

You asked if I have a copy of the application filed by Carol Ann. I have asked Jane for that more than once but the only thing she has ever given me is the enclosed copy of a petition to the DAR modified to be a petition for membership in the National Society of the Children of American Revolution CAR. I am today taking the liberty of writing to Jane and requesting that she send you a true copy of Carol Ann's application so you will have as much information as possible. I said "true copy" but meant an electrostatic copy of the true copy. I am of course assuming that she kept a true copy.

As I think I may have indicated to you following my visit to Des Moines this past summer, I fear Jane has been failing rather rapidly and is not nearly as well coordinated in her mental alertness and processes as she once was.

Incidentally, in relation to the possibility Esther, the wife of Jonas, might have been in Ohio by 1817, I have noted that the record of David Chatfield (Jonas N's Susannah and family) which you enclosed with your memo of March 22, 1968, shows the place of birth for the son Rousel as having been in Ohio in September, 1817. Do you suppose it possible that Esther might have been failing in health and had gone to be cared for inthe home of her oldest daughte in Ohio in keeping with the contention of Jane that she saw her grave stone in Alexandria?

Am afraid the Christmas and New Year holidays are catching up with me and that I'll have to spend my spare time on other things than genealogy for a little while.

I must hasten to tell all of you to disregard the conclusions I drew in my letter to Mr May, Aug 29.

Gladys Gray has just sent to me what I must judge to be incontestable evidence that — regardless of the 1800 census figures on which I relied — the Jonas at Pittstown (Honeeye) was Jonas Newton Belknaß.

As the evidence she sent me was badly garbled by the inexpert typist who copied it for her, Ishart pass it along to you until I get a correct copy. For the moment, I'll content myself with saying that it gives us a lot of valuable new information — including the exact location (to within one foot) of the grave of Esther Parker.

When I get a true copy, I'll send it to you with a memo outlining the new problems arising from this new evidence.

From her deep knowlede of that area in early 1800's, she differed with my guess that Elisha's second marriage might have occurred in Niagara gounty — said it must have been in vicinity of Honsoye where Elisha and Bettie Briggs lived.

Dear Clinton:

I'm back from Crete, now — and the first thing to tackle seems to be Carol Anne's D.A.R. application. I find a letter from Mrs. Jane, Oct. 18, in which she says she sent you a copy of the letter of rejection. So before I do anything I ought to consult you and ask what you've done and what you think I might do.

The letter of resting from Washington, seems to me to be a bit
pusaling — with its concentration on non-essentials, such as the
dates of deaths of Jonas and Esther. The only essential question,
I should think, is whether or not the Elisha from whom Carol Anne
is descended was a son of Jonas.

On this point, the evidence must be wholly circumstantial, I think, centering around the records assembled by Miss Gmey for Ontarios County N I in 1800 and 1810. I believe that I can put together a summary of that evidence that might be acceptable, for when I reviewed it with the secretary of our local chapter of the S. A. R. he said (as I think I wrose you) thatit was "better evidence of parentage than we usually get." At any rate, I can easily get his help and that of the local D. A. R. officers, in preparing material for resubmission of Carol KNAXEE Anne's application, if you think I should do this.

It seems to me that the first step to take should be to examine the application that Carol Anne submitted. Do you have — or can you get — a copy of it? Or should we try to get a copy of it from the D. A.R. national office at Washington? . . . My guess is that Carol Anne went too far, by including unsubstantiated data — such as the date and place of the death of Jonas and the death of Esther — and possibly other questionable entries that evoked suspicion. Until I know exactly what the application contained, I'm not in good position to try to improve it — and I'd like to go over it with S.AR. and D. A. R. officers here, to get their knowledgeable comments.

Eventually, perhaps, you and/or I should correspond directly with the D.A.R. Registrar in Washington. But that's something to defer for later possible decision.

Excerpt from requirements for Certified Genealogists

"He shall be able to evaluate published source materials and genealogies, and in the case of the latter, to verify statements contained biserein before using them."

As this is the only such requirement I can hope to meet, it will serve as an introduction to this example of its meaning and its importance.

Some weeks ago, I asked you if you had any other source for listing a "Roger" as son of Abraham -- beyond Glen Evans. Meanwhile, I've gone ahead with the task of searching for verification.

What Evens said, in the thing he prepared for you, is as follows:

Mis page 1: Gives "Roger" as his \$10, no birthdate or other dates, says married "Mary Ingalls." No dates for her, either,

Same page: "He (Joseph) married three wives, and Lydia Ingalls was a sister to his brother's wife Mary Ingalls. The father of these girls was Frences (sio) Ingalls who was one of the first settlers at Lynn, Mans."

Same page: Evans mentions inventory of Abraham's estate (which he miscopied on his next page) but does not note that Francis Ingalis was Abraham's chief oreditor.

Page titled "THE INGALL'S (sic) FAMILY." Evens repeats statement that Lydia and Mary Ingall (sic) married Joseph and Roger Belknap, sons of Abraham (1). Elfore exploring these two named sources, I should summarise what I already know about Francis Ingalls.

(1) He was the first termer in Massachusetts.

(2) He was Abraham Belknap's chief creditor - amount 3 Lb, im 10 s.

 (5) Shown as a "proprietor" in Lynn town records, 1638.

(9) His will dated 10 Aug 1672 was probated 1 Nov that year, naming as legatees his wife Mary, his son-in-law Joseph Belknap, and his daughter Elizabeth (who had married a Farnum) in Andover. No other names shown in abstract of this will, except overseers.

So I naturally was skeptical about the existence of a daughter named "Mary." And my doubt about a "Roger" Belkmap was heightened by the plain fact that a first name of French or Norman derivation was most improbable in Abraham's family, in which all known names were Biblical. My chief doubts, howevery centered around the fact that neither H W Belkmap nor G. Andrews Moriarty (the greatest of all New England genealogists) had found any such "Mary" or "Roger." Nothing in what they published nor in HWB'S notes nor in HWB'S correspondence with Mr. Moriarty mentioned either of these two persons named by Evans, though the two of them threshed out a number of debatable points. I did not see how they could have missed finding those two persons, if they actually existed.

Nevertheless, we owe it to Evans (though he was in error about it, on one point) that we finally verified the marriage of Johns and Tamar. So it was up to us to look few possible verification again.

I have obtained what seem to be the sources he listed.

(1) Journal of the Illinois State Historical Society, Vol. 18, p. 416 - copy employed with this name.

As you will see, the piece by Mrs. Mary F C Dimon says: "Frencis left no male descendants, his daughter, Mary, married Roger Belknap". Unless supported by valid contempory documentation, a statement of this kind is more merely a statement, not evidence. She gave no authority for what she wrote.

You will also note that (with only one major exception) what Evens wrete in his page titled "THE INSTRUCTION INVALLABLE Panelly" was a paraphrase (or copy) of Mrs. Dimon's wording.

The exception was his mention of the English birthplace of Francis and Edward Ingalls - Skirbook (not Skirboot as he wrote it), Lincolnshire. Mrs. Dixon did not name this town. So Evans must have got it from some other source.

There seem to be only two published genealogies of the Ingalls family -- both devoted to descendents of Round. I got both of them, from MERGS.

(2) Genealogy of the EMMEN FRENCH family, (which contains a section on the connection of this family and the Ingalis family), by M. Q. Beyer, in Illinois.

It seems likely that Evans saw this. The wording of his mention of Skirksok is similar to that of Mrs. Bayer — and does not resemble the wording in the other Ingalls genealogy. . . The Mrs. Beyer book, however, merely mentions Francis Ingalls very briefly, without any detail at all. So it does not support that Mrs. Dixon wrote.

(3) The Genealogy and Ristory of the Ingalis Family in America, by Charles Burleigh, 1903. This is a record of the ancestry and descendents of Edmand Ingalls, with just a few

mentions of Francis Ingalia:

First puragraphs "Rith his brother Francis and four others, he (Edward) commenced the outliness of large in 1629."

Package on some pages "Francis Ingalls, brother of Educad, was the earliest tennes in Massachusette and his vats could be seen at Sampscott as late as 1850. He moved to Boston and his will Nev. 1, 1672, mentions wife Mary, somein-law Joseph Bolkmap, balance of his property to Elizabeth Parama of Andoveratter his wife's decease." (NOTE: Date of probate, not date of will, OTE)

In last paragraph of Edmind's will, he named his brother Francis as one of the oversears.

There are no indications that either Mrs Dison or Clen Evens read this book. No similarities in wording nor in details of information. Also, no indications that HN Belimap saw it, for his information and wording are very different in detail, such as naming the exact location of the vats at Swampscott (Humphrey's Brook), etc.

THE COMING OF THE INGALLS FAMILY TO ILLINOIS IN 1834.

In the year 1628, Edmund and Francis Ingalls landed at Salem, Mass., from Lincolnshire, England, with Governor Endicott. They were tanners in England. They crossed the Saugus River in 1629 and established a tannery at a place they called Lynn, because of the name of their home in Lincolnshire, England.

Francis left no male descendants, his daughter, Mary, married Roger Belknap.

Edmund fell through a defective bridge over the Saugus River in 1648 and was drowned.

Henry, son of Edmund, moved to Andover, Massachusetts, sometime after 1646. His son, James, married Hannah Abbott. They had a son, James, born in 1695, who married Mary Stevens. After the death of James, Sr., his widow, Hannah Abbott Ingalls, with her son James and his wife went with the Pomfret Colony to Abington, Connecticut. They there established their home almost directly across the street from the Colony Church. They there raised a family of seven children. Their son, Ephraim, married Mary Sharpe, whose great-grandfather was Resolved White, who came over in the Mayflower in 1620.

Their son, Ephraim Ingalls, married Lucy Goodell, and they too, resided in the ancestral home, rearing a family of nine children; Mary S., Henry L., Lucy, Lydia, Deborah, Edmund, Chas. Francis, George A. and Ephraim. Lucy, the mother, died in 1829 and the father, Ephraim, in 1831.

Their oldest son, Henry Laurens Ingalls, married Lavinia Childs. Her sister, Priscilla Childs, married Dr. Chandler, the founder of Chandlerville, Illinois. Henry had made a visit to the Illinois country and found it to his liking. When he re-



Elijah Belknap, born 1785 in Belchertown, Massachusetts, was baptised at the same time as his older brother, Samuel, on August 14, 1785, which was two weeks after his parents, Jonas and Esther Parker Belknap, had joined the Belchertown Congregational Church. Elijah was the second son of the American Revolutionary War veteran, Jonas Newton Belknap. Elijah's grandfather, Samuel Belknap, No. 32, was also a Revolutionary War soldier. He died in the service of his country at Cambridge, June 18, 1775.

By the time Elijah was eleven years of age, his father, a cooper (barrel maker) by trade, had moved with his wife and children to Ontario County in Western New York State. According to Carroll Y. Belknap, "Jonas and his older sons moved around all over that county between 1796 and 1818". (Carroll Belknap is a semi-retired management research consultant, who has more recently been devoting almost full time to Belknap family genealogy. The above quote is taken from a memorandum to Clinton Belknap under date of March 22, 1968.)

According to the U. S. Census of 1800 (see schedule on page 368 for Ontario County, New York), Elijah's parental family then lived at Charleston, later allegedly known as Lima, in Ontario County. According to a family tradition, confirmed by the Wapello County, Iowa census for 1850, Elijah became a farmer as did most, if not all of his sons.

In a declaration for a War of 1812 pension, filed 31 March, 1871 in Owen Township, Clinton County, (Frankfort), Indiana, Elijah stated that he had married Catharine Garlinghouse (later erroneously referred to as 'Christine' Garlinghouse by Anna McCormack Belknap of Cedar Vale, Kansas) 8 January, 1806 in Ontario County, New York.

In the War of 1812, he had been inducted into the New York Militim at Naples, New York, and served from "24 August, 1814 to 8 November, 1814", when his services were no longer required. He served in Captain Graham's Company, under the command of General Brown. (See War Department Muster Rolls, vol. 93, p. 221.) According to the record, his responsibilities in the military had been "garding (sic) prisoners to Albany and conducting the shipping of provisions to the soldiers."

He and his family are believed to have migrated west in about 1816 to 1818, possibly stopping briefly in Licking, County, Ohio, enroute to Kentucky. In the U. S. Census for 1820, Elijah and his family were then shown to be living in Hart County, Kentucky. (See page 153). Also listed in the Hart County census for 1820 was the family of Elijah's father, Jonas. (See page 155). Again, on page 153 of the census was carried the family of Elijah's brother, Jonas (Jr.). Listed on page 158 of that report were the Garlinghouse families, who were reported to have migrated to Kentucky from New York with the Belknaps. Included were James Garlinghouse, James Garlinghouse Jr., and Gamaliel Garlinghouse. Gamaliel was the husband of Elijah's sister, Esther. James Garlinghouse is believed to have been the father of all three Garlinghouse girls who married sons of Jonas N. Belknap, namely Catharine, who as indicated earlier, married Elijah; Mary

who married Jonas (Jr.); and Jane, who married Jesse.

The 1850 census from Wapello County, Iowa, (See schedule 1400, page 500), lists Joseph Gillett Belknap, youngest son of Elijah, as having been born in Kentucky in 1826.

Mrs. Milton Ray (Jane E.) Belknap of Des Moines, Iowa, whose late husband is reported to have been a descendant of Jonas N. Belknap, made a special trip to Kentucky in an attempt to do some research among local official documents and records relating to the Belknap family, only to be informed in the State Capitol, Frankfort, that the court house in each of these two counties in which she was interested, Hart and Hardin, together with the records therein, had been destroyed by fire during the raids by the North in the Civil War at about the time of Sherman's March to the Sea, which began a bit farther south.

- 1. Mrs. Anna McCormack Belknap of Cedar Vale, Kansas, now deceased. Born 8 October, 1871, Anna was a granddaughter of James M. Belknap, oldest son of Elijah. She married her first cousin, once removed, Arthur C. Belknap, oldest son of Joseph Gillett Belknap by his second wife, Olive Brock. Joseph was, in turn, the youngest son of Elijah. Age 93 at the time of her death in January, 1965, Anna Belknap had taken much interest in the Belknap family record and, although almost blind in her later years, was mentally alert to the time of her death. In 1904, she had copied from the Bible of her grandfather, James M. Belknap, considerable family information, which she permitted E. Clinton Belknap and his wife, Mildred, to personally review at her home in Cedar Vale, Kansas, in the Spring of 1962. Some information conveyed from memory in her final years did not prove to be entirely correct, such as her statement that the initial "C" for the first name of her maternal great grandmother stood for Christine instead of Catharine, which was later documented to have been the correct first name. For the most part, however, the information transmitted from memory proved to be much more reliable than most family tradition encountered in genealogical research.
- 2. Mrs. Sopha Belknap Eudy, 1605 Avenue E., Cisco, Texas. Mrs. Eudy, born 14 September 1896, the wife of the late Maurice Eudy, is the youngest daughter of James Gee Belknap, and granddaughter of Joseph Gillett Belknap by his first wife, Elizabeth VanCleve. Sopha has been most helpful and reliable in providing information about her grandfather, Joseph Gillett Belknap, the youngest son of Elijah. Joseph Gillett lived a portion of his later years in the James Gee Belknap home.
- 3. Garrett M. Belknap, 20120 Smith Road, Route 1, Perris, California, 82370. Son of Arthur C. Belknap and Anna McCormack Belknap, listed above, Garrett was born 22 April 1897 in Hooser, Cowley County, Kansas. He has in his possession the family Bible of his father.
- 4. Elmer Curtis "Ed" Belknap, grandson of Elijah and father of E. Clinton Belknap. Born 29 March 1873, Elmer Curtis Belknap died 27 April 1963, and is buried in Rose Hill Cemetery, Emerson Nebraska.

Suppose you will soon be returning from your holiday. Thought I would be sending you more than I am by this time but day to day demands on one's free time have ways of breaking in and delaying the best laid plans.

Have not as yet followed through with the Lacy Belknap contact but should get that out of the way before too long.

Have numbered and made a master listing of Belknap descendants which my records now carry either on their own individual family record or as one of the children in such a family listing. I am forwarding a copy of this master listing to you at this time and will be fordwarding copies of the various family record sheets as my wife completes typing them from my long hand drafts. These I shall confine to Elijah and his descendants, or at least as many of them as I now have recorded.

In the main column at the left of each page are listed the numbers assigned to the members of my direct family line. Circled in red at the left of the column is the number of the generation in America with my direct progenitor in each generation underlined in red. This individual, in turn, becomes the progenitor of the children listed below in the next generation. Listed at the right of each name is the year of birth as I have it reworded.

For example: 1. Abraham is the progenitor of NXX 2 #2 Abraham through #10 Roger, while #5 Samuel becomes the progenitor of the third generation, #11 Mary through #17 Patience, with # 15 Ebenezer being the direct progenitor of the fourth generation starting with #18 Sarah

Listed in the columns to the right are auxiliary off shoots of direct line family members other than my direct progenitors with the generation indicated at the left in red parentheses. For example: under #49 Elisha is listed his 8th generation children Lacy, assigned the number 49-1 through #49-7 Maria, with off springs unde #49-5 Eli carried out to the (12th generation.

It may be alittle complicated but the numbers assigned immediately identify the individual as to original line progenitor and gives me a better handle on things than the entire listing in just one numerical sequence.

I have carried the listing out, when information available permits to the first generation beyond the mother who bore the maiden name of Belknap and, in the instance of males, to the most recent generation listing abailable to me.

If some of this is confusing, so indicate and I'll bry again.

The numbers assigned to additional family members in any of the auxilary units will be assigned in numerical sequence under the original, column one, key number, and so registered on my master file card listing, regardless of generation represented. For example, a child of Orin, No. 56-2, if identified would be assigned the next available number which in this instance would be 56-19.

As my good wife transcribes the material on the family data sheets from my longhand completions, it is my intent to furnish an electrostatic copy of each for your files, beginning with Elijah No. 47.

I hope that I may someday have a summary listing of your line back to and including Jesse, the brother of Elijah.

I'm going to send copies at this memo to all three of you, as all of you are involved, in one way or another, in my effort to assist Carol Anne Belkmap (Des Moines) by providing proof that her ancestor Blisha was son of Jonas Newton Belkmap. Also, I sent to all of you a copy of my letter Aug 29 to George S May — which was a trial run of some of the KINIX evidence bearing on Elishab parentage — in the hope that you'd detect and challenge any weaknesses you saw in it.

In the past few days, I've been digging for further evidence - mainly in the files of Henry Wyckoff Helknap's correspondence. I've come up with some helpful stuff, which I want to tell you about.

Up to now, I was resigned to the apparent faut that in discussing Elisha's parentage (son of Jonas Newton Belknap and Esther Parker) I would have to rely on evidence of time and place — for lack of any other evidence. But now me have what can be termed "eye-witness evidence" — from a son of Orin Belknap (youngest son of Jonas N B).

This son of Orin was also named Orin; and was one of the youngest children of his father. In 1919 he was living in Kettle Falls, Washington. In letter's to HWB he identified himself unmistakably as son of the Orin who was a brother of Elijah and Jesse. He gave his age as "almost 80" — which would place his bitth in about 1840. So perhaps I should comment that his age — in our long-lived family — had obviously not impaired his mind not his accurate typing on an old poyewriter which he described as "bald-headed like its manipulator."

Among the key dates that he supplied in his letters in 1919 was the exact date and place of his father's death — 15 Feb 1873, at Pataskela, Licking County, Ohio. And in connection with that date, he corrected an error in a letter written to him by HWB, when the supplied in his letters in 1919 was the exact date and place of his father's death, the corrected an error in a letter written to him by

"You note that Elisha was with my father at his death. True. But not his son. A nephew of my father's; a farmer who lived near him."

Now, there was only one Elisha who was a nephew of his father Orin. This one possible Elisha was the Elisha Jr who (according to the Bible page from Mrs. Jane Belknap, Carol Anne's grandmother) was been the first-Dorn son of Elisha Belknap and Lucy Finch — born 25 Oct 1811, died 3 April 1875 (bracketing the year 1873 when Orin died). No other brother of Orin had a son named Elisha.

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The letters from the Kettle Falls Orin also help us in our search for information about Jonas N B's daughter Cynthis.

In my letter Aug 29 to George May, I gave my reasons for believing that Cynthia was born after Orin and this could not have been borne before late 1800. I thought that this was a weak point in my reasoning. So I'm thankful that the Kettle Falls

Orin has come to my rescue - in one of his letters, 5 Oct 1919.

HWB had asked him "Who was KME Cynthis Gilbert?" - referring to a name mentioned by Orin in an earlier letter. Orin replied:

"The Cynthia Gilbert of the letter was the daughter of my father's sister, next younger than him, whom I saw in 1856, a hale and hearty old lady, in Licking Co., Ohio."

The "hale and hearty old lady" could have been only Jones N B's daughter Cynthia, it seems to me. The Kettle Falls Orin was 16 at that time, and Cynthia would have been not more than 5 or 56 — but no doubt she looked "old" to him, at his age.

So I think we can say! (1) That Jones NB's daughter Cynthia was certainly born after Orin; (2) that she was in Licking County in 1856, and this may have gone there from Kentucky when her brothers did; (3) that she had a daughter named Cynthia (our first trace of names of her children).

But what about "Gilbert"? Here is where Claudia may be able to help, from her knowledge of the time when the Belkmap-Oilbert connection began, and where it began.

— for example, was it like the Belkmap-Starr connection, which began when Jesse's family were in Ohio, where Mahala Starr was born?

What the Kettle Falls Crin wrote can be interpreted several ways. For instance:

- (1) It may mean that Jonas NH's daughter Cynthia did not marry Isaac Newton, but married a Gilbert. I question this, but only for the reason that the statement that she married Isaac Newton has come to me from many independent sources. Yet, also, this would mean that the daughter, Cynthia Gilbert, was unmarried in 1856 when her mother was 55 or 56 perhaps which seems unlikely.
 - (2) It may mean that Jonas NB's daughter Cynthia married a second time, and that Cynthia Gilbert was offspring of the second parriage.
- (3) Or it may mean merely that Cynthias's daughter Cynthia married a Gilbert.

 I hope Claudia can help on this.

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That's all, for now, about Orin. Later, I'll drafft a list of his known descendants.

Later, too, I'll write about the possibility that the Rachel who died in 1815 was a second wife of Jonas N B -- in between Esther and Tamar. But I'll have to defer this till I hear from Gladys in reply to a question I asked her a few days ago.

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Elijah Belknap, born 1785 in Belchertown, Massachusetts, was baptised at the same time as his older brother, Samuel, on August 14, 1785, which was two weeks after his parents, Jonas and Esther Parker Belknap, had joined the Belchertown Congregational Church. Elijah was the second son of the American Revolutionary War veteran, Jonas Newton Belknap. Elijah's grandfather, Samuel Belknap, No. 32, was also a Revolutionary War soldier. He died in the service of his country at Cambridge, June 18, 1775.

By the time Elijah was eleven years of age, his father, a cooper (barrel maker) by trade, had moved with his wife and children to Ontario County in Western New York State. According to Carroll Y. Belknap, "Jonas and his older sons moved around all over that county between 1796 and 1818". (Carroll Belknap is a semi-retired management research consultant, who has more recently been devoting almost full time to Belknap family genealogy. The above quote is taken from a memorandum to Clinton Belknap under date of March 22, 1968.)

According to the U. S. Census of 1800 (see schedule on page 368 for Ontario County, New York), Elijah's parental family then lived at Charleston, later allegedly known as Lima, in Ontario County. According to a family tradition, confirmed by the Wapello County, Iowa census for 1850, Elijah became a farmer as did most, if not all of his sons.

In a declaration for a War of 1812 pension, filed 31 March, 1871 in Owen Township, Clinton County, (Frankfort), Indiana, Elijah stated that he had married Catharine Garlinghouse (later erroneously referred to as 'Christine' Garlinghouse by Anna McCormack Belknap of Cedar Vale, Kansas) 8 January, 1806 in Ontario County, New York.

In the War of 1812, he had been inducted into the New York Militia at Naples, New York, and served from "24 August, 1814 to 8 November, 1814", when his services were no longer required. He served in Captain Graham's Company, under the command of General Brown. (See War Department Muster Rolls, vol. 93, p. 221.) According to the record, his responsibilities in the military had been "garding (sic) prisoners to Albany and conducting the shipping of provisions to the soldiers."

He and his family are believed to have migrated west in about 1816 to 1818, possibly stopping briefly in Licking, County, Ohio, enroute to Kentucky. In the U. S. Census for 1820, Elijah and his family were then shown to be living in Hart County, Kentucky. (See page 153). Also listed in the Hart County census for 1820 was the family of Elijah's father, Jonas. (See page 155). Again, on page 153 of the census was carried the family of Elijah's brother, Jonas (Jr.). Listed on page 158 of that report were the Garlinghouse families, who were reported to have migrated to Kentucky from New York with the Belknaps. Included were James Garlinghouse, James Garlinghouse Jr., and Gamaliel Garlinghouse. Gamaliel was the husband of Elijah's sister, Esther. James Garlinghouse is believed to have been the father of all three Garlinghouse girls who married sons of Jonas N. Belknap, namely Catharine, who as indicated earlier, married Elijah; Mary

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In Iowa the family farmed, probably in the vicinity of Blakesburg, since a Mr. Seaman Smith and Silas Reynolds, the two witnesses to attest to Elijah's identity in connection with his War of 1812 claim for Bounty Land, in February, 1854, were both from that community. An affadavit in his pension files, signed in January, 1852, stated that he was then a resident of Licking County, Ohio. In connection with his February, 1854 claim, he had filed a request that any bounty land grant approved be sent to his agent, Napoleon Campbell, of Columbus, Ohio, with whom he had contracted to receive and forward such Bounty Land certificate.



I've finally taken time for more than a cursory study of the set of bag sheets showing your numbered sequence of "A Belkmap Family INTEREST Lineage." I think I'm beginning to understand the numbering system you adopted.

First, my great thanks for this great contribution of something more than 400 Belknap names to the compilation I'm trying to assemble. I'm looking forward with pleasure to the record sheets you are preparing for Elijah and his descendants — for they'll give me what I need: full dates; names and parentage of wives; dates of marriage; etc.

I wish I were in position to give you similar list of the descendants of Jesse, but I'm not that far yet. I have a list of some 300 or more -- but it's not nearly complete and it is sadly lacking in dates (not even year dates in many instances). I'm still hoping that Claudia will help me on it. Of course I'll send it to you as soon as it becomes usable.

I do not feel competent to discuss in detail the entries on your page 1 — Nos. 1 to 10 — for there are many uncertainties in the alleged records on those people, and I*ve been so busy corresponding with present-day members of the family that I*ve had no time for detailed verification of dates, etc, from Abraham's children on to Jonas. Have verified, thus far, only the dates affecting the record of Jonas N B.

But I do feel it necessary to question a few of your entries.

38 -- Mary Belknap Kentfield 39 -- Chloe Belknap Shumway

Do you have any source for these, beyond Glenn Evans?

On this Mary (your 38) see copy of recent letter to George May.

10 -- Roger Again, do you have any source other than Evans? As far as I know, this entry appears nowhere else. Am I wrong?

Here I think I should explain my reluctance to rely on Evans alone. He seems to me to have been a diligent readers who accepted everything he found or heard, without critical appraisal of probable accuracy. He certainly did not live up to one of the chief qualifications of a genealogist, as defined by the Board for Certification of Genealogists: "He shall be able to evaluate published source materials and compiled genealogies, and in the case of the latter, to verify statements contained therein before using them."

More than that, he was flagrantly inaccurate in using evidence. Where I make have certainty about my knowledge of the factual evidence and can see that he read that same evidence, I find him making misstatements over and over again. For example: When I first read the material he prepared for you, I was spocked by his first few pages. IEXI His notes on sources claimed that he had read the true records, and some of the things he said could have come only from those records. But as I

read along, I marked a red I everytime I saw something at variance with the known evidence that he must have seen,

His page 2, inventory, a red note "Miscopied"

(At that, bad as it was, his work for you wasn't as bad as the job he did for the Grand Rapids Belknap family.)

So I'm prejudiced against Evans. I can't accept his word unless I prove him to be correct.

Let me insert an illustrative instance of what he never seems to have done.

In the back of his majorial for you, he quoted a foot note in the quarterly of the Oregon Historical Society, giving Harte (thus misspelled) County, Ky, as birthplace of Jesse's son Ransom. Having learned to distrust all such printed stuff, I sought verification — but found, as I've told you, that Ransom's sworms statement, in record of Donation Land Claims, Oregon, said "Hardin County" — which ultimately was supported by your examination of Hardin Co. census 1820.

So forgive me for not accepting, at face value, Evans' statement (in page on "INGALL (misspelled) FAMILY) "From these descendants (in Illinois CTB) the record of the marriage of Mary Ingall (sic) to Roger Belknap was obtained."

Nor do I trust his citation of two printed sources -- on that same page. And I don't think you should trust it. Too often, I have found Evans listing as a source something that contains not a single word about the person in question.

The next step, I think, is to get hold of those two sources and see what they actually say. Till then, I stick with what Moriarty said in NEHG REGISTER, 1950. He was the outstanding New England genealogist of all time. And I have copies of all the records on which his statement of A's children was based.

Have I told you that field workers for Salt Lake Gen. Soc. have found the record of Abraham's marriage, hence name and parentage of his wife Mary? In case I've neglected you on this new find, I enclose copy of my revised sheets for him.

LEGEND

Have numbered and made a master listing of Belknap descendants which my records now carry either on their own individual family record, or as one of the children in such a family listing. I am forwarding a copy of this master listing to you at this time and will be forwarding copies of the various family record sheets as my wife completes typing them from my long-hand drafts. These I shall confine to Elijah and his descendants, or at least as many of them as I now have recorded.

In the main column at the left of each page are listed the numbers assigned to the members of my direct family line. Circled in red at the left of the column is the number of the generation in America with my direct progenitor in each generation underlined in red. This individual, in turn, becomes the progenitor of the children listed below in the next generation. Listed at the right of each name is the year of birth as I have it recorded.

For example: 1 1. Abraham is the progenitor of 2 #2 Abraham through #10 Roger, while #5 Samuel becomes the progenitor of the third generation, #11 Mary through #17 Patience, with #15 Ebenezer being the direct progenitor of the fourth generation starting with #18 Sarah.

Listed in the columns to the right are auxilary off-shoots of direct line family members other than my direct progenitors with the generation indicated at the left in red parentheses. For example: Under #49 Elisha is listed his (8th generation children Lacy, assigned the number 49-1 through #49-7 Maria, with off-springs under #49-5 Eli carried out to the (12th generation.

It may be a little complicated but the numbers assigned immediately identify the individual as to original line progenitor and gives me a better handle on things than the entire listing in just one numerical sequence.

The listing has been carried out when information available permits, to the first generation beyond the mother who bore the maiden name of Belknap and, in the instance of males, to the most recent generation listing available to me.

The number designation for each additional family member in any of the auxilary units will be assigned in numerical sequence under the original, column one, key number, and so registered on my master file card listing, regardless of generation represented. For example, a child of Orin, No. 56-2, if identified, would be assigned the next available number which, in this instance, would be 56-19.

(4) "Elijah-and-Stiles Parker" — younger brethers of Esther Parker. Served in 7th Mass Regt, as did Jonas N B. They and Jonas virtually inseparable after leaving Belchertown circa 1790 (?) and till 1815 or 1820.

NOTES ON PASSAGE FROM D.B. WAITE'S "HUNT'S HOLLOW"

- (1) "Aaron Hunt" -- pessibly uncle of some or all of the Garlinghouses who married

 Belknaps. See #11, below. For location of Lot 2, see map.
- (2) "the head of the lake" the south end of Honeoye Lake; the lake soutlet,
 Honeoye River, flows North by West from north end of the lake.
- (3) "Col. John Green" one of those who moved on to Kentucky as the sons of Jonas Newton Belknap did. For location of his land, see Lots 16 or 17 on map.
- (5) "wild lands in Hardin county" possibly a clue to how Jesse got land in that county in Kentucky. The "road" mentioned in this sentence was East Lake Road see map.
- (6) "valley of Wyoming" now called Wyoming Valley, in Wyoming County west of Ontario County.
- (7) "Hopewell" at that time, the western part of the Town of Gorham. Split off from Gorham in 1822.
- (8) "the town of Springwater" does not mean merely the present village of that name. It was part of Town of Naples till 1816. Included a large area in what is now the SW odd-shaped corner of Livingston County. See also #16, below.
- (9) "the line" means the southern boundary of Lot 1, on map, and its extension westward through Lot 7 and acress Honeeye Inlet.
- (10) "Mary Garlinghouse" not the Mary who married Jonas Belknap ## (jr). Ix

 This Mary, who married Thomas Briggs, was a daughter of John
 Garlinghouse. (History of the Pioneer Settlement of Phelps and
 Gorham ////west Purchase, p. 205) She was living in 1852 in
 Ontario Co.
- (11) "Elener Hunt" if the mother of any or all our our Garlinghouse girls and Gamaliel was an Eleanor Hunt whose husband was James not Elijah, this challenges Bertha Hansen's page showing father as Elijah. George May says that in 1800 the census shows 3 Garlinghouses (Pittstown) of same generation as Jonas N Belknap: John, James, Benjamin. Gladys Gray did not report finding any of these in 1800 Census, but did find James in 1810 Census - Males 2 0 1 0 1 - Females 2 0 2 1 0. Data known to me thus far, about Benjamin's will, 1850, make WARREN it seem unlikely that Benjamin was the father. Most likely bet seems to be James. Mention of the Garlinghouse family in later years, in local histories, deal mainly with descendants of John - ne mention of descendants of James, as far as I've yet It may be that James left for Kentucky and was the one shown in 1840 in Delaware county, and massing and was the father, as HWB surmised However, we have no ducumented proof that Jane, Catherine, Mary were sisters, or that Gamaliel was their brother. Only such proof is that Rachel Garlinghouse

was Jane's saster. . . This subject obviously needs exploration.

- (12) "Mrs Cynthia A Avery . . . Grandville, Ohio" this woman, in Licking County, must have been daughter of Esther Belknap and Gamaliel Garlinghouse. None of the other children of Jonas N Belknap hadrocal matter who married Garlinghouses had a daughter Cynthia. The statement that she was grandaughter of James Garlinghouse attemption attemption that means that Gamaliel was son of James but tells us nothing about parentage of Jane, Catherine, Mary.
- (13) "family records" This familiar phrase had only one meaning in 19th Century, among such people. It meant the family with Bible. Esther, mother of Mrs Avery, was must have been the child who kept the Bible of Jonas N. and Esther Parker, after death of Jonas in 1824 as her elder sister Susannah was not in Kentucky then. Such precise dates for births of children born in Ontario Co. could hardly have come from any other source. Family Bibles were usually preserved by the wemen, not the men. . . By tracing descendants of this Mrs Avery, it might be possible to find, at last, the long-lost Bible of Jonas N B and Esther Parker. But we can, I believe, feel sure she had it and quoted from it in supplying information to Waite.
- (14) "July 12, 1801" -- We can accept 1801 as year of Cynthia Belkmap's birth, but not the month and day. See #17, below.
- (16) "a house in Springwater" appreximte location is shown at 🗷 , on map.
- (15) "Moses Briggs" -- father of Elisha's first wife.
- (17) "June 10, 1801" We can accept 1801 as year of Esther Parker's deaths but not the day and month. When I received the badly typed copy, I thought this might be an error by the typist. Miss Gray says it was correctly typed, and that she discussed the problem with the Ontario County historian, who suggested that Waite probably transposed the dates of Cynthia's birth and Esther's death, and failed to correct his error.
- (18) "Green River, Feb 16 182h" The Green River bisects Hart Co., Ky. The precision of this entry, and its accracy, strengthen my certainty that Mrs Avery was quoting from family Bible.
- (19) "Middletown" location not yet known, by me. Will ask Miss Gray.
- (20) "His children" accuracy of list and of sequence of names is further reason for feeling that source was Bible.
- (21) "Sarah" now we know that the name of Samuel's wife was Sarah Hunt, a cousin of Gamaliel Garlinghouse.
- (22) Places of death completely accurate, if it's true that Elijah died in Indiana. Fact that Mrs Avery said so, may be confirmation. Jesse died 1881. So Waite got his information from her after that date. Many grandchildren of Jonas N B were living as late as 1910.

I wish I hadn(t been so blasted eager to consult you. In the next mail there came (1) a letter from Gladys Gray saying she had been wrong and that the prihted date for Esther Parker's death was 1809 -- not 1801 -- with a lot of new information, such as finding and visiting the property that Jonas N B sold in 1810, and taking photos of it, etc. etc. -- and (2) the book itself, which is the biggest single find in my search for original sources. . It will take me days to catch up with all this new information. But here's a swift emendation of the "Notes" I sent to you.

- (6) "valley of Wyoming" I was misled by the typists candensation of the sentences about the arrival of Aaron Hunt. The actual passage in the book makes it plain that the place was the Wyoming Valley in N E Pennsylvania in Wyoming County just west of Scranton. This gives us a whole new conception of how Jonas N B got from Cherry Valley to Ontario County. I'll write more fully about this, later.
- (7) "Hopewell" map from Miss Gray, showing major areas II about IRON shows
 Hopewell North of Gorham not west as I had thought. Springwater
- (8) "the town of Springwater" OK as I wrote it, but add following: Nothing to be gained by looking as at location of the village on present-day maps. There was nothing but one log cabin there till 1824. The Town of Epringital (note capital T) was formed 1816 and like other "Towns" in that section, consided of max an area about 6 miles \$/ x 10 miles.
- (11) "Elemor Hunt" thus spelled in the book. EX Note OK as written. But I must now add that I erred in relying on my memory of a note taken by me many years ago, when I said (in a previous note to you) that an Elijah Parker was in Luserne Co, Pa, in 1790 Census. Digging into my fat files of "miscellanous" data (as I should have done before) I find the name was James Carlinghouse— and I can't remember this was the only Carlinghouse I ever found in 1790 Census, anywhere.
- (lh) Kill this note.
- (17) Kill this note. But add: Esther's death in 1809 means that oldest female shown in 1810 Census, Bristol, was probably a new wife, Rachel, who died 1815.

 Miss Gray is now trying to track her down. XPREMMENT Possibly, though not necessarily, this Rachel was mother of Diantha born 1811. There's still the possibility that Diantha was daughter of Tamar Vinton by her first husband.
- (19) "Middletown" this was name of what is now called Town of Naples. The fact that Jonas N B was overseer of Highways in Middletown in 1808 (last paragraph of typed excerpt from book) means he did not become "of Bristol" as in sale of land in 1810 till sometime between 1808 election of officials of the Town of Middletown and the date of the census-taking in Bristol 1810 (The property he sold in 1810 was not in Town of Bristol but in Town of South Bristol. He had owned it but briefly.)

So much for these "NOTES."

I should add that after reading the book, I'm strongly inclined to believe you were right in thinking that Jonas N B made his living as a cooper, when in Ontario Co. I doubt that he was ever a real farmer, anywhere.

Gladys said *\$5.25 seems a lot for such a thin book." Me, I'd gladly have paid twenty times that much for it.

So without waiting to receive a copy of the book itself, I'm now sending you

 N Y State, means an area, not a settlement. E.g., Newark, N Y,

 on Hunt's Hollow, by D B Waite, seems to be an old piece now
 included in a present-day book published by a local bookstore.)
 - Copy of tracing of a part of an old map, made by Gladys.
 - -- Copy of typed notes based on pencilled notes I made for my own guidance, when I first read the passage from the book.

As I see it, the major sighificance of this new material is not that it says unmistakably that the Pittstown Jonas, 1800, was our Jonas — but that it gives us first-hand contemporary evidence about Jonas and Esther and kin their children, taken directly from the family Bible kept by Jonas and Esther (rather, kept by Esther the wife, as wives were generally the ones who made the entries).

So we have the first list of children that is not family tradition but contemporary - and original source, not a secondary one.

Do you agree? I'll welcome your comments.

I'll write later about a possible solution of the problem of the "two Jonas Belknaps."


Early spring of 1795 t Aaron Munt family t a soldier of Revolution from N. J. left valley of Wyoming * to what was after the subdivision of lands lot #2 in the present town of Richmond. This is the farm on which Mrs. M. A. Bray lately resided, and the first one settled between the head of the lake and t present village of Naples. Col. John Green had preceded them one year, and was the first settler on the J. G. Briggs farm near the head of the Honoeye lake, and Elijah and Stiles Parker were very early comers there. Many of the first settlers along that road exchanged their farms with the Hon. Francis Gronger for wild lands in Hardin county, Kentucky, and removed there early.


Jonas Belknap, a soldier of the Revolution, from Massachusetts, but who had also been a resident of the velley of Wyoming, made a temp rary residence in the corner of H opewell near Canandaigua and then came in the spring of 1795 to this hollow and took lot No. 1, the extreme south lot in the town of Pittstown, now Richmond, and Andrew Hunt, a brother to aeron came and went into the cabin first erected by Holden. Belknap's house stood in the present town of Richmond, but he extended his claim southward into what is now the town of Springwater, end he made the first improvements, and may well be said to be the ploneer of the town. . . James and John Garlinghouse the next year put up a cabin on the south side of the line a little west of the present saw mill, and became the first actual re idents of the town, and here Mary Carlinghouse was born in June, 1797, and was the first white child born in town. She became in time the wife of Thomas Priegs, of whom we shall speak hereafter. James Garlinghouse married Elanor Hunt, a sister to Aaron. Through the kindness of Mrs. Cynthia A. Avery, a granddaughter of both Jones Belknap and James Carlinghouse, of Grandville, Ohio, we have had access to the Camily records of Jonas Belkmap, and learn that Esther was born just across the line April 1, 1797, Orin Belknap, May 29, 1799, Cynthia Belknap, July 12, 1801, and just over the line in Canadice, Samuel Holdren in 1798. Those were the earliest births in this holdow. Garlinghouse and his newphew, Benjamin, afterwards settled in what is now called the "Garlinghouse Settlement." John afterwards went to Richmond, died there and Moses Briggs, the father of Caleb, Thomas, Barzillai and Johnk married his widow. Belknap sold out his interests on the Richmond side of the line to Aaron Hunt, and sha in 1806 bu81t a house in Springwater a few rods from the line, where the apple trees are west of the present road. Here his wife, whose maiden name was Esther Parker, died June 10, 1801, and was no doubt the first white person who died in town. She was buried in Richmond, north of the old orchard on the bottom set out by Jacob Holdren and Jennie Hunt in 1895, by the side of George Holdren who was burned to This was without doubt the first death in this hollow. death in 1801.

> Jonas Belknap sold out in 1813 to John Kelly, went to Kentucky, died and was buried there on the bank of the Green River, Feb. 16, 1824. He was a man of fair qualifications, a commissioner of schools in Pittstown in 1796, a constable and collecter there, also overseer of highways and fence viewer in Middle town in 1808. His children were Samuel, Elijah, Elisha, Jonas Jr., Jesse, Susannah, Ester, Orin and Cynthia. Samuel married Sarah, the youngest daughterof Aaron Hunt, and died in Hopewell in 1810. His widow married Artemus Lincoln, after whom Dr. A. I. Hunt of Springwater was named. Lincoln was his uncle by marriage. Elijah died in Indiana, Elisha, Susanna, Esther, Orin and CyNthia in Ohio, and Jones, Jr and Jesse in Oregon.

NOTES ON EXCERPT FROM CHAPTER VII of EARLY HISTORY OF SPRINGWATER, LIVINGSTON CO.

- (1) "Aaron Hunt" father of Sarah Hunt, wife of Samuel Belknap, son of Jonas Newton Belknap also possibly uncle of some or all of the Garlinghouses who married Belknapa in Ontario County N.Y.
- (2) "the once pleasant valley of Wydming" -- When he said "once pleasant", Mr. Waite was doubtless thinking of the Wyoming Valley Massacre in 1788. This valley lies between the Alleghanies and the Poconos in N E Pennsylvania. Originally settled by people from Connecticut and claimed by Connecticut after the Revolution. In the massacre in 1788, the Connecticut contingent was virtually wiped out by a band of Tories and Indians. Note ?, below, considers how this background may have influenced Jonas, en route to Ontario County, N. Y.
- (3) "Town of Richmond" -- an area MI about six miles square, first called Pittstown; the village is now named Honeoys.
- (4) "the head of the lake" south end of Honeoye Lake; the lake's outlet, Honeoye River, flows North by West fra north end of lake.
- (5) "Elijah and Stiles Parker" younger brothers of Esther Parker. Served in 7th Massachusetts Regt, as did Jonas. They and Jonas almost inseparable for many years.
- (6) "Hardin County" possibly an indication of how Jesse Belknap got land in that county in Kentucky.
- (7) "valley of Wyoming" We can now reconstruct our notion of the route probably followed by Jonas and his young family, after leaving Cherry Valley, N Y, where Jesse was born in 1792. Very likely, along or down the Susquehanna River from its headwaters near Cherry Valley, past the small new settlement at Scranton, on to the larger one at Wilkes Barre in the Wyoming Valley where newcomers from New England were not likely to feel comfortable a few years after the Wyoming Valley Massacre. Assume Jonas was in that valley about 1794, atayed there only briefly learned of the new road opened brokker in 1792
- by the British company that owned much of Ontario County and was trying to attract settlers from Pennsylvania went back up the Susquehanna to New Town (Elmira) and then along the Cohocton River to the area near Canandsigua, where he paused in the winter of 1794-95, before settling in Lot 1 in Town of Richmond.
 - (8) "the town of Springwater" does not mean the present village of that name. It had only one log cabin till 1824. The area which eventually became the Town of Springwater was part of the Town of Naples till 1816. "Town" in that part of N Y State means an area about 6 miles by 10 miles, or larger.
 - (9) "south side of the line" that is, south of the boundary line between town of Richmond (Pittstown) and Town of Middletown (the original name of Naples).

 Approximate location of house built by Jonas in 1806 is shown at ? on map.
 - (10) "Mary Garlinghouse" Not the Mary who married Jonas Belknap Jr. This Mary was daughter of John Garlinghouse, married Thomas Briggs, discount of the mother of any or all of our Garlinghouse girls HEXX was Eleanor Hunt who married James Garlinghouse, this challenges sheet from Bertha Hansen showing father as Elijah Garlinghouse, mother as Eleanor Hunt.

In checking the 1870 US Census for Linn County, Missouri, I have found three of the children of my grandfather, Joseph Gillett Belknap (son of Elijah) and another child by the name of Samuel Belknap believed to be the son of Joseph's second wife by her first husband, Rev. Samuel Roberts, listed in the household of a Thamas Martin, age 30, of foreigh birth and his wife Susan, also age 30, born in New York. Children of the Martins include Susan XX 12, born in New York; George 9, born in Illinois and William whose age I neglected to record but which was younger than George. William was XXX also shown as having been born in Illinois.

I am trying to determine if Susan, the wife of Thomas Martin could have been a Belknap. Do you have any data that would identify her as a descendant of Jesse, Orin or any of the other Belknaps of record in your files?

Can't quite figure out why Samuel Belknap age 7, Arhur age 5, Laura age 3, and Albert age 1, would have been listed in the Thaoms Martin household. Do you suppose the cansus takers were instructed to record the names of all individuals found at a home when the census was taken regardles of whether they actually lived there or not? In this particular censusn listing all of these four children from the Joseph Gillett Belknap family were shown to have been born "in Missouri" when all the other evidence I have (and it is considerable) indicates all of these four, or at least the three youngest, were born in Iowa. Perhaps the Thaomas Martins just assumed they had been born in Missouri and so indicated without really knowing.

Joseph Gillett Belknap his second wife Olive Brock, are listed in the same census under a separate household. Emily, a daughter of Joseph by his first wife Elizabeth VanCleve, is listed in the same household with Joseph and Olive. Her age is listed as 11 and birthplace as Iowa.

Please don't go to a lot of trouble to help me with this matter but if you can throw any light on the identity of this Susan, the wife of Thomas Martin, or on Thomas Martin himself, it will be appreciated. There is no Susan among any of the Belknaps in my files that would make this identification but my files are largely confined to Elijah's family and some in Elisha's.

Received the material yesterday on Orin and the apparant verification of the fact that Elisha, the ancestor of Carol Anne was a brother of the other sons of Jonas and was therefore a son of Jonas N. Will be most interested to learn of the membership of Orin's family. Appreciate being included in your progress in establishing Elish's identity.

Forgive brevity in answering your recent memos. Am pressed for time today.

- (1) Keturak's diary Yes, please send to me for copying. I'll return it promptly.
- (2) Shkets for Carrett M Belkmap many thanks . Should I write to him?
- (3) Sheets for Lscy Belknap line more thanks. Two points to answer, now:
 - (a) Can't help on other children of Lacy son of Elisha. Nothing about Elisha in most collections of data in my hands. Cdr Charles Belknap had nothing but names of 3 children of Elisha (including Lacy) but nothing but the names. HWB had nothing. Salt Lake may have something (but whatever they have must be approached with caution, for their records depend far too much on unreliable sources). May be something in work done by Evans for Michigan Belknaps but don't recall it off hand.
 - (b) Sheet for Lacy son of Elisha shows birthplace of wife Eliza Carney as "Ontario County." Technically this may be correct; I don't recall when Niagara County was split off from Ontario Co. But suggest better to show birthplace as fair "near Lockport, N. Y." as in obituary primal printed after her death in 1906 I think you have it; can make a copy for you if you want it.
- (4) Your memo 9/28 Young Belknaps in household of Thomas Martin. Do not recall any clues on this, in my files but haven't tried to trace all known Susan Belknaps. Will keep this in mind, for there may be a Susan whom I've forgotten.

Should warn you that the new evidence dug up by Gladys Gray calls into question the validity of the sheet on Garlinghouse children, sent to you recently. Can't tackle this problem until I get a copy free from typing errors — and, I hope, a photo of Esther Parker's gravestone, if it still exists. At the time I received it, I merely noted that it bore the name of Flora Belnap

MINING as the submitter — which automatically made it suspect as possibly
containing errors. Then I laid it aside — till now. (To explain why "suspect",
I'd have to malign INSIGN a man who died in 1938, and I'd rather not — for I
owe much to the kind courtesy of one of his daughters.)

Re-examining that sheet, I see that it does indeed contain some visible errors, including the altered dates for Elisha'd second marriage and the birth of Lacy -- plus others, IMPRESING no doubt instantly visible to you.

Yet it might be worth while to ask Salt Lake if they have sheets for any or all of Elisha's children. (See note below)

Long ago, I queried the secretary of the Mormon MMAINAND "Belnap Family Organisation" (of which, by courtesy, I'm a dues-paying member though the relationship is dubious) about the possibility of seeing if Salt Lake records might solve some of the many dead-ends in my records. I got a favorable answer, but no information as to how to do it — so deferred further action till my own files become better organized.

I assume you must know the procedure. So will you tell me how to go about it

NOTE: On sheet for Elisha, absence of symbols indicating existence of Marianian's continuation sheets for children does not necessarily mean Salt Lake has no such sheets. Merely means that such symbols could not be entered when this particular sheet was dubmitted and accepted. Other sheets for same people may have been submitted by other persons — without reference to the sheet you sent me. If I ask for a sheet on Lacy — for instance — I should ask for all sheets on which his name appears. Might, I think, get half a dozen — full of EMARKARITARIA contradictions.

This far, though I have hundreds of sheets from the Mormon Helnaps, I've made little effort to correct their many, many inaccuracies. Here I think I should explain my reluctance to rely on Evans alone. Where I make have certainty about my knowledge of the factual evidence and can see that he read that same evidence, I find him making misstatements over and over again. For example: When I first read the material he prepared for you, I was specked by his first few pages. ANXI His notes on sources claimed that he had read the true records, and some of the things he said could have come only from those records. But as I

read along, I marked a red X everytime I saw semething at variance with the known evidence that he must have seen.

(At that, bad as it was, his work for you wasn't as bad as the job he did for the Grand Rapids Belknap family.)

So I'm prejudiced against Evans. I can't accept his word unless I prove him to be correct.

Let me insert an illustrative instance of what he never seems to have dene.

In the back of his majerial for you, he quoted a foot note in the quarterly of the Oregon Historical Society, giving Harte (thus misspelled) County, Ky, as birthplace of Jesse's son Ransom. Having learned to distrust all such printed stuff, I sought verification — but found, as I've told you, that Ransom's swerns statement, in record of Donation Land Claims, Oregon, said "Hardin County" — which ultimately was supported by your examination of Hardin Co. census 1820.

So forgive me for not accepting, at face value, Evans' statement (in page on "INGALL (misspelled) FAMTLY) "From these descendants (in Illinois CYB) the record of the marriage of Mary Ingall (sic) to Roger Belknap was obtained."

Nor de I trust his citation of two printed sources — on that same page. And I don't think you should trust it. Too often, I have found Evans listing as a source semething that centains not a single word about the person in question.

The next step, I think, is to get hold of those two sources and see what they actually say. Till then, I stick with what Moriarty said in NEHG REGISTER, 1950. He was the outstanding New England genealogist of all time. And I have copies of all the records on which his statement of A's children was based.

My wife has met Robert Jacksom Belknap (Chrastopher's nephew, who lives in Kenya) and says he is virtually my doubled, even in what she terms my "mannerisms" — and that a photo of his son John is for all practical purposes a photo of our own son John. Yet our relationship is EXPLICAL sorething like 186th cousinship, perhaps.

I could go on like this for hours.

I postponed tackling the fine fat file of material from you because it would force me to search many other files in order to reply to points you had raised Now I'm starting on your file; and my letter will doubtless be very long, for there is much to cover, as the greatest service you and I render to each other is to compel hard thinking by differing on essential matters. Here goes. YOUR MEMO YELVENING FRB 1 1969 (Replying to my memo Jan 27 , 969, in which I had raised some questions about your summary of known facts about Jonas N B and his children and their children.) p. 1 - list of Elijah's children, with scuroes: Glad to have this. say that entries resting solely on HWB may be subject to revision, for much of his information on children of Jonas N B came from unsupported statements by descendants, as he was not able to do much original research outside of New England. p. 2 - next to last paragraph, Louisa Wright possibly daughterof Abijah Wright and Roxana Parker: . . . George S May, best source I've found on Parkers, says there was both an Abijah Sr and an Abijah Jr and isn't always able to distinguish between them, as both were in same parts of NY State at same time. I doubt that I'll pursue this question; not pertinent to my work. If May provides further information, I'll pass it along to you. p. 2 , last par. "coopering." - I may have overemphasized this point. have said that Jones N B was apparently a farmer till early 1810, and his occupation in Ontario County 1810 to 1819 is unknown. p. 3 - 3rd par. Births in Kentucky. The substantiated (documentary) records for two eldest sons of Jesse come from sworn records in Oregon Donation Land Claims. I'll come to them later. But since the part question in your letter (par 4 p 3) is the route followed by Jonas and his children, on way to Ohio, perhaps I'd better begin by summarising what seems to me to be the record, before I show the detail of the record, as far as I know it. . . Like this: It seems that at least three sons of Jonas N B went from Ontario County N Y to Kentucky before 1820 - Elijah, Jonas, Jesse. Whether his son Orin also, I don't know -- but think it highly likely. These three sons, plus Orin, were in Ohio by 1830 - and Elisha joined them there, about that time - having moved West through upper New York State (Niagara County). Jonas N B was in Ontario County in late 1819, and in Kentucky by March 4, 1820, and died there 16 February 1 24.

The daughter Susannah and her husband David Chatfield left Ontario County N Y after their second child was born (1815) and their third child, Rousel, was born in Ohio — place not known to me. But Rousel died in Sheridan, Ohio, 11 March 1877. I can't find Sheridan on my maps of Ohio, so cannot say minister whether or not it was in the area near Columbus, where Susannah's brothers settled in or before 1830; but the fact that Rousel died in Ohio makes it seem likely that his parents did not move farther West when Elijah, Jonas and Jesse did.

Orin, who was in Licking County Ohio with his brothers, died there.

Esther, daughter of Jonas N B, min and wife of Gamaliel Garlinghouse, died in Licking County. She and Gamaliel had been in Kentucky in 1820.

This leaves Cynthia unaccounted for, but it seems that we can place her in Kentucky, with her husband Isaac Newton, in 1820 and 1824.

I'm setting down all this stuff partly for you, but partly for my own later use in preparing proof of Elisha's parentage for Carol Anne. So, for the same two reasons, the documentary proof:

The figures for Jonas, (jr), Elijah, and Gemaliel G. seem obvious identifications.

Those for Jonas N. B. ("Sr" in your letter) are interesting, as showing -- very possibly, I think -- the location of Cynthia and Isaac Newton. Like this:

^{-- (}a) and (b) match Jones N B and Tamar, on age.

-- (e) can be Diantha.

- (c) can be Isaac Newton.

- (d) can be a child of Isaac and Cynthia.

- (f) can be Cynthia and a female also in the household (a slave?)

- (g) could be another slave.

Another possibility, but I think an unlikely one, is that (c) might be Orin, youngest son of Jonas N B, and that one of the two females 16-25 might be his wife (whom I usually name as Mary Draper, as this is the name most often given in family papers, but actually I do not know mikes her name was Mary or Anna or — possibly — Mary Anna).

The only support for this second solution is a statement made in 1919 by a descendant of this Orin: that Orin went to Kentucky, near Louisvilles, before going to Ohio. One step I must take is to search 1820 Census, Hardin County, Ky, to see if it shows Orin in that county — where Jesse is ma known to have been. These two counties are adjacent — Hardin and Hart.

There seems to be better reason for surmising Cynthia and Isaac Newton:

Letter from National Archives to Mrs Gilbert M Belknap, Jefferson, Oregon, as summarised by her on June 8 1968: "They said he (Jonas) died February 16, 1824, Hart County, Ky. Isaac Newton was appointed admistrator of his estate."

Excerpt from List of Pensioners Living in Kentucky, sent to me by Fern Martin: "JONAS BELKNAP. Hardin Co., Ky. Private, Massachusetts Line. Placed on pension roll June 25, 1819. Commencement of pension, May 27, 1818. Transferred from New York March 4, 1820. He died Deb. 16, 1824."

Query: Do you recall where I saw a statement that Jonas N B's last pension check was cashed by Essac Newton? I think somewhere in Glen Evans, but haven't found it,

Now for Jesse -- not shown in Hart County census. He was in Hardin County.

Data from records of Oregon Donation Land Claims, via George S May: on the oldest sons of Jesse.

"George Belknap, b. 1815, Hardin Co., Ky."

"Ransom A Belknap, b. 1817, Hardin Co., Ky."

These are in accord with written traditions of Jesse's family. No news to me, but first documentation I've seen.

So Jesse must have left Ontario County not later than 1815 or 1814. Have not yet checked Hardin County census 182 1820. . . I've known for a long time that I must someday take time for complete examination of all census records, all states, 1790 through 1850.

Another point bearing on fact that Jonas was still in Ontario Copi, years after some or all of his sons had left: Heorge May says he has a copy of a paper signed by Jonas in connection with pension application of Esther Parker's brother Stiles, who (says May) served in same army outfit as Jonas — and this paper is dated 11 Oct 1919. I've asked May to send me a copy.

Now for the Ohio record. Again I'll tabulate, for easy reference later on.

The puzzle here is apparent absence of Orin himself, who should appear as think as born 1799. Possibly an error by Sherman, in copying — or error in census taking?

"ELT B HELKNAP - . . . born in Niagara County N. Y., April 13 1819. His parents, Elisha and Lucy (Finch) Belknap, were both natives of New York, and in 1830 moved to Licking County, Ohio, where the father died in 1839 at the age of 52 years."

So Elisha arrived in Licking County in 1830, after the census had been taken. Probably an intentional effort to rejoin his brothers, for we know from diary kept by Keturah, wife of Jesse's son George (my father's "Aunt Kit") that there was correspondence by mail at that time among family relatives. Elisha died in Licking County — so did his faughter Delana, as you know. Written tradition of Fesse's family is that "Elisha remained in the East" after Jesse, Elijah, Jonas moved on to Iowa — where Jesse arrived 1839 (i.e., had left Licking County before Elisha's death). . . From census 1840, Franklin County, as above, probable that Jesse went to this before Elijah did. Jesse settled in Van Buren County, Iowa, adjacent to Wapelle Co., but I shan't try to show more of the documented evidence beyond Ohio, at this time.

I've been long-wided, haven't I? But you challenged me to prove Kentucky before Ohio.

Here, while I'M at it, a footnote on death of Esther (Parker) Belkmap:

- She could not have died in "1817/18 in Alexandria, Ohioy unless (possibly) she had left Jonas N B and accompanied Susannah and David Chatfield. No evidence that they were in Licking County at any time, buthave not yet searched 1820 census Ohio for Chatfield. On other hand, no trace of her appears in households of her sons in Ky 1820 - unless I find her wife with Jesse or Orin in Hardin County census, not yet examined.

An aside: Tradition in Jesse's family has been that he and his brothers left Ky because of dislike of slavery.

TOUR LETTER Feb 1 — first par last page — parentage of the Garlinghouse girls.

. . I've long doubted HWB's guess that their MARMACK father was a James G.

My guess (from fact that all known family records say the girls were born in

Pennsylvania in the 1790's) was that the father was the Elijah Garlinghouse in

1790 Censue, Luzerns Co., Pa. . . Now, recently, what looks like confirmation

(though I do not yet know the documentary source of the data).

Letter from Bertha Hansen (descendant of Jonas jr and Mary Ann Garlinghouse) giving list she got from Violet Belkmap (Mrs Gilbert M Belkmap, Jefferson, Oregon):

Elijah Garlinghouse married Eleanor Hunt. . . Their children:

Catherine — married Elijah Belkmap
Jane — married Jesse Belkmap
Gameliel — m. Esther Belkmap
Patty — m. Rufus Palmer
Mary (Ann?) — m. Jonas Belkmap
Silas
Rachel — m. Abither Newton
George — m. Elsie Lee
Eleanor — m. Robert Thompson.

As this list matches details that I know, I think it's probably pretty right. The Rachel who married Abither Newton (Abiathera, Abiatha, etc., in various documented records in my posession) was the "Mrs Newton, Jane's sister" named by Aunt Kit as among the women who stayed in Belknap Settlement, Oregon, in 1849 — when all the grown men went to California to dig for gold. They came back after months in the goldfields, with enough money so that (says Aunt Kit) "we began to live better." . . . And Abither (however his name should be spelled) appears as witness on a number of land claim documents of the Benton County Belknaps. As there were a lot of Newtons in Ontario County in 1800-1820, I assume he was son of one of them. . . Though there were scads of Garlinghouses in that county at that time, I've not identified Klijah — think he must have died between census 1790 and census 1800. . . Can only say that all Garlinghouses found later in other areas must have been of a later generation than that of this Elijah.

Your letter, page 4, second par. - Jesse's location in Iowa - in Van Buren Co., not Wapello Co - as noted earlier in this letter.

Now I'm going to stop. Have flooded you sufficiently. Will write separately about the wonderful other genealogical material that arrived while I was This ill.

PS -- Looking back at your letter Feb 1, I see I've not answered one points -- your assumtion that the natural way to Kentucky from Ontario Co N I would be through Ohio.

Here I have the advantage of personal geographic knowledge of the area, for I spent much of my business life in Ontario County and vicinity — had clients there and became an executive of one of them, after 1950.

"Matural" way to Ky would not be through Ohio. It would be by the easy valleys and riverside roads leading down through maximum southwestern N T, western Pa, and along the Ohio River. . Family legend is that Orin (Jonas N B's son) did it by flatboat down the Ohio. . Even if legend is untrue, it reflects the way maximum these pioneer people thought about how to travel. . "along the rivers, if possible."

I think you may have been influenced — too much, perhaps — by fact that Elisha went by way of Niagara 22 Co. . . A number of Belkmaps in other branches of the family went that way, from Albany area, but settled in N E Pennsylvania (mainly around Erie) or went on through northern Ohio to Michigan. None of them, as far as I have yet found, went SW in Ohio, as to area around Columbus, or on to Kentucky (except, and it's a rare exception, the descendants of Joseph Belkmap & Prudence Morris, mr one of whom settled first at Marietta Ohio, then went to Louisville — origin of Belkmap Mariatal Marietta Chio, then went to Louisville — only branch of the family that has ever become fabulously rich).

MEMO TO E. Clinton Belknap FROM Carroll Belknap

Aug 6 1968

It's always interesting to hear from you. Among all the persons with whom I'm corresponding, you're one of the very few who are interested in reliable evidence rather than wishful guesswork. So here goes for an effort to answer some of the many questions in your memo of July 29.

MRS JAME BELKNAP - I think it likely she is right. The problem is to find, if possible, a different date for the marriage of her Elisha and Lucy Finch. This may be very difficult and perhaps impossible. Our branch of the family continually moved ahead of churches, so that marriages were performed by itinerant ministers. For example, there are no church records of marriages in Ontario Co. N Y for the period when Jonas N. and his children were there. Or, sometimes, marriages were performed by IR itinerant ministers and baptism occured months or a year later, when a church was established in some nearby town. For the most part, we have to rely on family Bibles and other family records - for dates and places of marriages . I think the place to search for evidence is Niagara County N Y. For instance, if no Elisha is found there in the census of 1810 but one is found in the census of 1820, we'd have perhaps good grounds for the identification she wants. . . I do not believe that Elisha went to Kentucky. Long ago, looking at that excerpt from an old local history (cited in my memo to Mrs Jane) I noted that I thought that "Elisha" was an error for "Elijah." The records of my family aren't much help. All they say is that Elisha "remained in the East." have always thought that this meant that he did not go to Ohio when Jesse and Elijah and Orrin and Jonas did - . but stayed behind in N Y State. However, my beliefs are not evidence. . . . I do not know who Reva Barrett may have been - but perhaps a relative of Mrs. Frank Barett of Oregon, a present-day descendant of Jonas, brother of Elijah and Jesse.

DATE OF ESTHER PARKER'S DEATH — I simply can find no way of placing Esther in Ohica as early as 1817/18. And I distrust all dates that are stated so vaguely. The fact that many statements of that two-year date can be found has no weight with me.

NUMBERING, IN YOUR RECORDS -- All I can suggest is adoption of consecutive numbering, beginning at any point you wish -- and renumbering when you find additions that have to be inserted. HWB EXEKTET renumbered his file at least once. After I have added some 1000 or 2000 names to his records, I'll have to renumber every name -- a bit of drudgery I'll leathe.

BURTON DASSETTINQUIRY. The purpose of my letter to the pastor, there, was to find if there was any reason to be accept the naming of Sir Edward Belknap as "de Beltofte" in Evans MS. The reply makes it plain, as I believed from masses of records, that the old Belknap family was never known as Beltoft. Perhaps, if you'll bear with me, I'd better try to summarize the known facts. I'll try not to be unduly long-winded. And I'll try te distinguish between facts and surmises.

(A) In the Middle Ages (before 1300) there was a Beltoft family in Lincolnshire, numerous enough to have had at least five differing coats of arms and two differing creats. HWB traced this family and found that it had died out completely by 1300. (The name, in old records, appears variously as Beltoft, de Beltofte, Beltofts, and in Latin as "de Belle Tofte.) This family is not known to have come south of Lincolnshire. Its coats of arms and creats had no resemblance to those of the Belknaps. HWB and Nermau found no reason to think there was any connection between this ancient Beltoft family and the Bealknap family that appeared in the lith Centiry. I agree with their

- cousin

interpretation of the evidence they accumulated. . . and with their conclusion that there was no known link between this old Lincolnshire family and the Beltoft family that appeared in the village of Sawbridgeworth in Herts about 1500 — two centuries we more after the death of the last known Lincolnshire Beltoft.

(B) The record of the Bealknap (later Belknap) family begins with Robert de Bealknap who became Chief Justice of the Court of East Pleas. As he was a page at court along with Chaucer, the present editor of Debrett's agrees with me that he was prob ably born in or about 1227. His father is assumed to be the John Bealknap who was practicing law in London in 1343 - but there is no proof of this parentage. record of this family is pretty well known, down through the reign of Henry VIII -when Sir Edward Belknap, then custodian of Warwick Castle, didd leaving no heirs, so that the great family estate was inherited by his sisters Anne, Margaret, and Eleanor. (Sir Edward's two elder brothers, Henry and William, had died leaving no heirs. However, he had a proper to him - Philip Belknap "of the Moat at Canterbury," said to have been Mayor of Canterbury) This family (usually known as "the Judge's family") dropped the "de" from "de Bealknap" by the reign of Henry V, when it came back into royal favor. Sometime between then and the reign of Henry VIII the speaking of its name became "Belknap " -- and present day historians use this later spelling for all its members, including the Judge. . . This family was enormously rick on a fortune accumulated first in the practice of law - leter increased by such marriages as that of Anne, Edward's sister, who married the heir of the Wotton fortune built in the wool trade. . . If you are interested, the easiest beginning point is the condensed biographyof the Judge in the Dictionary of National Biography, which is suse to be in the library of the University, in Lincoln. That sketch of his life is generally accurate (though colorless) except for two points: (1) the statement that he was "undoubtedly descended from the Belknape who came with the Conquerer -- which stamps the piece as having been written not later than 1910 or 1911, before the spurious nature of the so-called Roll of Battle Abbey had been disclosed by modern historians - and (20 the omission of the names of the two known children of the Judge, John and Joan, and the omission of the name of the Joan who was maid of honor to Katherine, queen of Henry V, and must have been of the same generation as Sir Hamon , grandson of the Judge, and Treasurer of Mormandy under Henry V. If you want to go farther, next read the life of Nicholas Wotton, Anne's younger son - in the DNB -- the first, I believe, of the English public servents who serve not an individual monarch or pasty but the state and the country. . . The period covered by bearers of the judgets name, summarized above, runs from circa 1300 to about 1521. No known link to our village Beltoft family has been found, though the Mormon Belnaps are still searching.

(C) Our village ancestors, calling themselves Beltoft, were traced to the Richard who died in Sawbridgeworth in the first decade of the 16th Century (1500 or 1501 to 1510) and continued to use that family name until Abraham's uncle Josias changed to "Belknappe" and the Abraham led his entire generation in making the same change as I've teld you before. . . HWB, being a genealogist and not a historian, refused to indulge in speculation and wrote [in letters) "It is impossible to say whether they were Beltofts or Belknaps." I am under ne such limitation, as my prime interest lies in family history and the history of the family name, rather than in mere genealogy; and HWB's present-day successors at Essex Institute urge me to write biography as well as genealogy. I differ with HWB. I can find only one hypothesis that fits the known and recorded facts. This hypothesis is that under the influence of great religious feeling (resulting originally from the publication under Henry VIII of the first authorized Bible, "the Great Bible," so that as Trevelyan wrote "For the first time all Englishmen could read the Bible or hear it read") this village family began giving Biblical names rather than Norman names to its children and under the leadership of Jesias and then Abraham determined to resume the family name they knew

by HWB

was properly theirs.

(D) Before going farther, I pause to deal with the unanswered question of "When did this village family first appear?" I cannot answer this question. I can only try to offer guesswork suggestions of when it might have appeared The Richard Beltoft who died in 1500-1510 was a relatively young man at the time of his death, as he left a family of young children and a wife who lived for many years after his So we can surmise that he could not have been borne IMIME earlier than 1460 At the time of his death he much cuned 30 acres of good farm land. This was well above the ordinary holding of a village farmer in those or earlier times. So it is unlikely that he had accumulated that holding in his own short life; he must have inherited some or all of it. And it is likely that in the century before Henry VIII it would have taken two or three generations to acquire, bit by bit, a property that large. If so, then there would have been a Beltoft at Sawbridgeworth in the period 1400 to 1425. Whether this would have been the first villager using the Beltoft name is impossible to say. . . But this is the period immediately fellowing the death of the Judge, when his widow Juliana was struggling to regain possession of his vast estate - which had been attainted by Parliament under Richard II, restored briefly, them re-confiscated when HEnry IV usurped the threns, then finally restored to the family by Henry V -- by which time the heir was the Judge's grandeen Hamon (Hamo in Latin, HAMMARKINIE Hamond in French). During those years of trouble for the Judge's family, his own children almost vanished from the records that still survive -- and all we know, today, is the name of a son John and the name of a daughter Joan - we do not know with whether he had other children. Nor do we know, for sure, the names of any grandchildren except Sir Hamen and (in the judgment of myself and the present editor of Debrett's) the Joan who was at court in the reign of Henry V (as was also a Grisel or Griselda who is difficult to identify with certainty) . . How garrulous I'm being. But I'm just trying to show why I agree with you that it's highly probable that there was a link possibly illegitimate but not necessarily so - between the Judge's family and our village Beltefts who, I'm convenced, knew all along that they were really Belknaps. And here there's a curious question: "When Abraham's uncle Josias signed his will a few days before his death, how did he know how to spell Belknap and why did he spell it Belknappe?" This spealing was not in use by any of the Judge's family living miximum as late as 1500 - a century before Josias's death - but there are one of two examples of similar spelling well before 1500.

So much for my guesswork. Now I'll try to work on to Burton Dassett.

(E) In 1914 HWB published the first identification of the village Beltefts as the ancestors of the American Belknaps. This soon led many American Belknaps to say and repeat, "the name was originally Belteft" - ignoring the existence of the old Bealknap family. And many of them are still saying it. . . Then, seme time after 1914, somebody whom I can't name seems to have encountered the names of Sir Rebert and Sir Edward Belkmap and found somewhere a piece I've never seen about Sir Edward Belkmap and that painting in the church at Burton Dassett and deliberately altered the family name to Beltoft. And senewhere and semehow Glen Evans came acress this bit of falsification and either copied it or rewete it; without naming I don't think Evens himself did the falsification: for in the NEHG library at Bostom there's another bit of amateurish Belknap genealogy telling the same falsified story with slighly differing detail in wording. . . No doubt the falsifier, whoever he may have been, thought he was merely conferming to the current saying that "the name was originally Beltoft." Knowing, as I thought I did,

In 1600, the do belimage name had died out.

that no member of the Judge's family was ever on record as a Beltoft, I had to write to Burton Dassett to see if there would be any confirmation of that "Beltoft" in Evans' first page. As you know, I got no such confirmation.

(F) You ask about heraldry, and the question was worth asking. As I've teld Dick Taylor, he has published at one time or another four differing coats of aras -some of the differences being nothing but the whins of modern artists, but one of them being the Beling arms, not Belkmap. I'm attaching, in case you want it, a photostat of a drawing that is probably accurate (though the old descriptions of the Belknap arms , written centuries ago, sometime disagree on minor details, such as whaher the narrow silver bands above and below the bend are "cotisses" or "bendlets.") Of couse, we American Belknaps have no right to use these arms. . . But they play a part in understanding the reply from Burton Dassett. The arms shown in the upper left-hand corner of the shield, in the vicar's sketch, seem to be recoghizably the Belkmap arms - as described in the piece that Evans copied. The arms shown just to the right on that shield are not any of the various arms of the old Lincolnshire Beltofts and bear no resemblance to any of those coats of arms. If they had proved to be any version of Beltoft arms, I'd have to revise my thinking and everything written or printed at 1st the Judge's family. Most likely, the mie the mims of the Knowles family (Sir Edward's mother) or of the Boteler who was Lord Sudely, father of Sir Edward's grandmother. Quartering of arms in this fashion was common at that time - which was one of the reasons why Henry VIII instituted the "Visitations of Heralds" to check pedigrees and report any improper use of coats of arms - as they did after one visit to Philip Belknap at Canterbury - which didn't step gim and his descendants from keeping right on doing the same thing.

Reading, this morning, what I wrote yesterday, I see that I did not deal very well with the point that helps convince me that I am right in believing that the village Beltofts at Sawbridgeworth were and knew they were Belkmaps. That point is the question "How did Josias know how to spell the Belkmap name?" So I'm going to ramble en, again, to give you the background.

For many years before 191h, the only known report of a Belkmap around the year 1600 was the will signed Josias Belkmappe and naming his brother Benedict Belkmappe as his MEXE heir.

The last male Belknap of the eld "knightly line" — the Judge's family — died early in the loth century. I forget the exact date and don't want to take time to go look it up today — but it was not long after the death of Sir Edward Belknap, which occurred in 1521. Years of searching, including finally the work done by Bernau and others for HWB, never found any Belknap of record between then and the date of the will of Josias.

After Bernau proved that Benedict Belkmappe was known as Beltoft, neither he ner any other searcher or record agent ever found any subsequent Belkmaps who were not rather obviously descended from the Sawbridgeworth Beltofts. So, of known record, there were only two English families bearing our name -the Judger family and the family that changed its name from Beltoft to Belknap
when Bennet died.

When Josias wrote or dictated his will a few days before he died, there had not been anyone else known as a Belkmap for just about three-fourths of a century.

Now, as I've indicated in a memo to Cousen Claudia, of which you have a copy, Joalas himself is a mystery man. We know only the date when he was christened a Beltoft and what is said in his will, and what can be inferred from the contents of his will, and the date and place of his burial. How he accumulated, in his short life, what amounted to a very considerable estate for a villager 35 years eld, we do not know.

But we mix do know that he signed his will - the only member of his generation or the preceding generation known to have been able to do more than sign by mark. We thus have to assume that he had some manifolding schooling and could read and write.

So we end where I began, with that same question. Let me re-phrase that question like this: "How, in the vacuum of three-fourths of a century with ne other known or traceable Belknaps, did Josias know how to spell the name, with its unusual and curious 'k'?"

Let me re-state that question in still different fashion? "How could EXECUTELY EXECUTED This obscure man in a small farm town have possibly known how to spell the name (in an old fashion) unless he had in his possession or had seen some written document containing the name? And what could that document have been, when the odds against his having been able to see any of the records we now know, for the Judge's family, are overwhelming?" The only way I can answer such questions is to believe that the village Beltofts must have had, for generations past, some written evidence of their true family name — and that if there was or had been such a document there was something in that that made Bennet stubbornly unwilling to admit that he was a Belkmap.

of course all this is mere speculation about a mystery. But I've found it impossible to avoid this sort of speculation and your comments in the 4th paragraph on page 2 of yor letter 3/29 have tempted me into putting it down on paper for the first time — knowing that you'll regard it as mere guesswork just as I de.... Yet, daynit, it's informed guesswork.

Aug 8

Yesterday, after reading what I had written on the sign 6th, I wrete a postcript on the question, "How did Josias know how to spell Belknap?" Later, I realized that I had erred by stating my guess about the answer — when what I should have done was zer to seek counsel, by stating the known facts and asking what you conclude from them. So now I'm rewriting that postscript. . I may not do a good job of stating the facts in proper sequence, for I've never put them down on paper before — in relation to that intriguing question. But here goes.

- (1) For many years before 1914, at least as far back as the 1890's, the only known record of a Belkmap in England in the early 1600's was the will mix signed Jesias Belkmappe, naming his brother Benedict Belkmappe as his chief heir.
- (2) After this Benedict Belkmappe was identified as Benedict Beltoft, no searcher has ever found any subsequent Belkmaps who were not rather obviously descended from the Sawbridgeworth Beltofts.
- (3) The last male Belknap of the old knightly line the Judge's family died early in the preceding century. I gorget the exact date and don't want to take time to go look it up today, but it was not long after the death of Sir Edward Belknap in 1521.
- (4) Many years of searching have never found anyone bearing the name of Belkmap between then and the date of Josias' will -- January 1599/1600.
- (5) Of known record, there have been only two families bearing the name of Belkmap the old Judge's line, and the family that changed its name from Beltoft to Belkmap when Bennet died.
- (6) So, fer about three-fourths of a century, no Belknaps are known to have been in England until Josias signed his will.
- (7) From the fact that Josias signed his will instead of making his mark, it has been assumed that he had some schooling and could read and write.
- (8) Abraham, the next to charge from Beltoft to Belknappe as he did before his father died signed by mark only; but the wording of a deposition that he signed thus at Northweald Bassett states that he had "examined" the registers in two churches. This may mean that he could read.
- (9) The nature and timing of all known documents naming members of the Judge's family seems to make it virtually inconseivable that an obscure villager in a tiny farm town in Hertford County could have seen any of them.
- (20) My opinion only; but I do know a good deal about English philelogy: It is likely that the "k" was not silent in the two centuries of the Judge's family, and did not become silent until the early 1600's. It would almost certainly have been prenounced during the lifetime of the Judge and Chaucer ca. 1337 to 1400.

So now let me restate the question: "In what possible way could this villager Josias have known how to spell Belkmap (Belkmappe) in 1600; "EXEMPLEMENTALES."

I've never asked anyone else to look at this question. I'd like px to have your comment on it.

And I think I must add, for your consideration, an epinion of mine.

It seems to me that any tenable answer to that question must HET also answer another questions

"Why, immediately upon the death of Bennet (who only ence and years before had admitted that he was a Believey) were his wife and his children so swift to change hir name and theirs from Beltoft to Believey never again using Beltoft?"

Maybe it's unfair to tess these questions at you, for you can't have had thur long study of all the known records as I have had. But I've tried to state all the facts that have any bearing on the answer.

Suggest you alter name of Jonas our great-greatgrandfather to his full name Jonas Newton Belknap, in all your records. Essential, to distinguish him from a lot of other Jonases of his tame, including his son Jonas.

Photos E. Chiton Bernap Last night at dinner I told my wife Peg about your letter and your plan to be in Washington the first week in April. She said, "Let's ask him to return home via New Yor and come to visit us." Anddthen, sadly, "But we can't, can we? We'll be away."

The fact that we have to be in Boston and in Salem to dig up some more family records that I need is the reason why I probably shan't be able to write to you again till the middle of April — and, hence, why this memo is going to be rather lengthy, for there is much that I feel I should tell you as promptly as I can.

But first let me thank you heartily for the very useful material you sent to me. You have much about Jonas that I had not found (though I question some things said to you by Evans) and what you yourself have drafted is head and shoulders above any similar material I have received from present-day members of our family. I'm immensely grateful — though I'll have to raise a lot of questions when I really study it.

I'll copy the Evans material and mail it back to you tomorrow. And later today I'll mail to you some pieces that I think will interest you. But before talking about them, there are other things I should say.

First of all, forgive Dick Taylor for not answering your questions. He couldn't, for he's not a researcher and has no information except what has been sent to him by Belkmaps in various parts of the country. . I first heari of him in 1966 when he sent me a reprint of a magazine article he had written, offering for sale a "family tree." Because his magazine piece was full of obvious errors, I was curious about the family tree — and ordered it.

When the family tree arrived, I was horrified to see its many serious errors — and began writing about them, asking for his sources. I kept bombarding him with queries and objections. Eventually, my magging provoked him into writing that he and Charlens merely collected what they could get, put what they could into their chart, and vouched for nothing.

That accumulated in the past fifty years. As I continued, I grow more and more interested and started to search for the collection of family records that are the basis of most of what has been done in recent years — the thousands of pages of notes put together by Henry Wyckoff Belkinap between 1900 and 1927. I located them and after some months managed to get them placed in my hands, on loan. Them, finding that they were not always correct, I began searching for all other similar or comparable collections and getting them, also, into my study. (There may be no end to this, also. I've just located a collection, covering about 500 names, which has been out of sight since around 1905; so now I've got to go after it, too, for I mow that it differs on many points with the other sets of records in my possession.)

What is now ahead of me is the long drudgery of comparing entries, evaluating sources, checking sources for accuracy in transcription, and triing to decide which statements are most nearly correct. This will take a year or so, I'm sure, for I have something like 8,000 to 9,000 sheets and pages to work with — on perhaps 3,000 oremore names.

What I think I'll eventually produce will be a manuscript of about 500 typewritten pages — covering all Belknaps since 1300, as far as known to me — for deposit in a number of libraries and museums as basic source material for later generations. (500? Well, maybe 750 pages, who knows?)

Meanwhile, I have the fun of trying to help Dick and Charlene Taylor, with whom I'm in constant touch by mail and by phone. As I see it, he is our hope for the continuation of what people like you and me are trying to do — for he's much younger and he's deeply interested. When I come to the end of what I'm trying to do, I'll probably give him my entire set of files.

Some time ago, I surmised that he had a fat file of unused material — letters giving information about Helkmaps whom he had not been able to link into his chart. So I asked him to ship that file to me, so that I could copy it for my records. That's how I got the letter you wrote to him.

At the same sime, I found in his files an amused query (which he couldn't answer) from a descendant of Susannah — sister of your Elijah and my Jesse. I had for years been searching for any clue to "what became of Susannah?" Yesterday, in the same mail with your letter, there came a reply from Susannah's descendant, to my great delight. (Susan in your records — Susie in others — Susannah in others, and I think correctly.)

Fortunately, being retired(or rather, inactive in business) I have the time and money to indulge myself by doing what I want to do and going where I need to go. And, than heaven, perfect health — though I'm much older than you, as you know.

But I should say that the magnitude of what I'm trying to do will not permit me to do much original research — except to get the original sources of debatable entries (such as "Tamar Vinton) when I can find them. I'll have to confine myself to choosing what seem to me to be the most likely entries on each of hundreds and hundreds of names on which them is disagreement — with new research only when vitally necessary — and relying on Dick Taylor to do what he can do better than anyone else, digging up recent information from Belimaps now living.

How, after this long preface, I can talk about the material I'll mail to you today.

But I have to begin by saying, unhappily, that what Olen Evans gave you on the English ancestry is shockingly erroneous. (Olen Evans will always be a puzzle to me. I'll never be able to understand how a man with wide acquaintance with authentic original sources could possibly mite such a source and then set down on paper something drasticulty at an extense with the cited source — we he did again and again in his label work for Michigan Belmaps and as he did in his later work for you. But I can't just dismiss his work and refuse to make any use of it, as our Mormon cousing in Utah have done out of religious motives, for accuracy in genealogy is a part of their religion. You see, once in a while he is right where everyone else is wreng; so, to my sorrow, I have to check every blasted entry in his work.)

For example, on his first page, the man he names as "Sir Robert de Beltofte, Chief Justice of the Court of Common Pleas" was never known by that name. And Evans must have known this. So let me summarize the facts about our English background.

In the Middle Ages, in Lincolnshire, there was a Beltoft or de Beltoft family, many manhammid much were imighted. This family died out by the end of the Middle Ages. No connection with our family has been found — and I agree that none existed.

and

(Before I go on, I'd better say that in everything I tell you about the English background I am speaking from original sources, such as the Harleitan MSS in the British Museum — wills, records of leasuits, and so on and on. I'm not merely repeating what has been printed in modern books, where I've found many errors.)

In early 1300's there came into sight the Belkmap family most commonly known as "the impulsive or the duigs and or simply the old Belkmap family." This family, very rich and very prominent, flourished through the reigns of Richard II to that of Henry III the official spelling in court records was "de Bealtmap." By the time of Remry VIII it was "Belkmap" — and modern historians use that later spelling for all members of this family, clear back to 1300. This family claimed to be descended from an ancestor who came with William the Conqueror in 1006; but there is good reason to feel that this claim was based on forged evidence. No present—day list of those who "probably" came with the Conqueror contains his name.

I have been studying this fascinating family ever since, years ago, I saw the name of the first known Anne Belkmap on the magnificent tomb of one of her some in Canterbury Cathedral. I think I know it/s record airly well—mail well enough, at any rate, to be shooked when Evans writes, of his so-called "Sir Robert de Beltofte," that "Little can be found about his life." Evans must have known that a condensed hife of this man, by his right name, Robert de Bealkmap, has been in the easily accessible British Dictionary of Mational Biography for many years (in almost every worthwhile library in the U.S. And every mistory of the reign of Richard II that I've ever seen tells the most dramatic parts of this judge's life.

Last Fall, studying this old Belknap family, I found myself concluding that the DNB and the Harielian MSS were wrong in saying that Sir Edward Belknap was the great grandson of the judge. There was, I felt sure, a "missing generation" in the record. Sir Edward must have been, I was sure, a great-great grandson. And I thought that the missing generation must be, actually, the children of the Judge. But I could find no documents that supported my belief.

At the same time, I was searching for the brother and sister - John Belknap and Joan Belknap - who were said by Debrett in 1952 to be the ancestors of the present Queen and William Shakespears. But I couldn't find them in all the documents available to me.

So I had two unsolved puzzles - until it belatedly dawned on me that they might be only one puzzle. Then, early this year, I wrote to Debrett's about it.

The piece marked with a red "A", in what I'll send you today, is the reply from Debrett's editor. As you'll see, he placed that John and Joan right where I thought they ought to be. And you'll be sensed to learn from his letter that the editor of Debrett's Peerage is himself part-Belknap — and is the man who worked EER out the pedigree in 1952. (I'm still in correspondence with him, about further information.)

I know much more about this old Helkmap family than is shown in the editor's

letter. I could easily write a big book about it - for it was a great family, with many fine men and women.

But all efforts to establish a link between this old Belknap family and the village family from whom we are descended have failed. Everyone but our Mormon branch has given up on it. They, for whom genealogy is part of religion, are still trying to find the link. I encourage them, by suggesting possible searches that have not yet been made — but I think the odds are that I have yet find this link it will be an illegitimate one. Which wouldn't disturb me, for illegimate descent would then be something that we would share with some Kings of England and a mass of Dukes and Earls.

Our known English ancestry is a village family — small farmers — whose record is sketched in item "B" in what I'm smiling to you today, a longish letter to my Oregon cousin Glaudia Marchall, who is working on the task of bringing up to date the complete record of the tribe (that a small it was) that Elijah's brother Jesse took from New York to Kentucky to Ohio to Iowa to Oregon. (Elijah, by some evidence, probably accompanied Jesse as far as Ohio.) When you read my letter to Claudia you will see more points on which Evans was dead wrong — for what I said is based on original records.

You ask about the list of the children of Jonas and Esther Parker, in Parker in America. Though I do not have church records to support it, I accept that list as given - including sequence of birth - for what seems to me to be a sound reason. In 1916, Elizabeth Jane Sterr (Mrs. Carrison Turner), a grandchild of Jesse - 7 years old when they left Ioua, 8 years old when they reached Oregon copied for my father what she said was "an old family paper" that was in her possession. The wording of the paper she copied indicates that it must have been written very long ago, while the family was not farther west than Ohio (say 1820), by someone who had known Esther. Its details agree entirely with what is shown in Parker in America - the story of the massacre from which Esther's father escaped when a baby; the names and nicknames of the Parker children (including emphasis on the pronuniciation of Esther's bame - as "Easter", her nickname); the birth sequence of the list of the Parker children; the names of the children of Jonas Newton Belknap and Eather Parker, in the same sequence of birth. When two records from widely separated sources agree so completaby I have to accept them, despite my general reluctance to accept data from secondary sources.

But I am not ready to accept a "Hester" born to Jones Newton Belknap and Esther Parkers in Ex Evans MS. (Evans of the arrest as the result of the bank making only years as dates, instead of full dates though and very and careless dealing with names and the spelling of names. I have yet to see a page of his work on which he copied all names correctly from the records he was examining. So he often errord in identifying people. His work for the Michigan Belknaps is full of such errors — and even a swift look at what he did for you has disclosed similar instances. Why, the man couldn't even copy correctly the name of a county in Kentucky.)

Also, I am not ready to accept EMAE date of Esther Parker's death as 1817, in Ohio. That date has been shown again and again, by various persons — but I think I may have found the correct date and the place of her burial in New York.

Taylor, of Las Vegas, Nevada (formerly at Pala Springs, California), has sent me the letter you wrote to him on Nov. 10, 1966 — as I am trying to aid him in his work on Bellman genealogy, and have information not yet in his hunds. From your letter to Dick Taylor, I infer that the record prepared for you by Olen Evens must be of later date than the record he repared for some Michigan Bellomps in 1948, and that it does not contain some of the many errors in the 1948 job — of which I have a copy. In his index to the 1948 material, I do not find your name — nor is it in the index to the 1,000 page record developed by our Utah cousins, which is also in my possession.

So whatever you can tell me will be, at least in part, new to me and most welcome.

Would you be willing to do what a number of Belknaps and some libraries and museums have done — lend me a copy of what Evans prepared for you, so that I can make electrostatic copies of it here in my well-squipped study and then promptly return it to you? If you can do this, I'll be most grateful.

Or, if you don't or can't trust an individual person, maybe you'll be willing to lend the material for a short time to the Greenwich Historical Society, of which I'm a member — so that I can study it at IINCHARGEMENTARY the society's headquarters.

And needless to say, all information you can give me about your branch of the family will be welcome, for what I am trying to do is to compile a master record which will snahls each branch of the family to see exactly how and to what degree it is related to all other branches.

P.S. Recently I wrote for a most helpful cousin a summary of the English ancestry with emphasis on just when and how the change in name from Beltoft to Belkmap occurred. Would you like a copy of it?

Question "First": List of Bennet's children shown in letter is correct, but baptismal dates for Abraham and Frances should be given both Old Style and New Style, as being before March 25. Abraham 10 March 1589/90

Frances 3 January 1590/1

There were no such brothers as Thomas and Joseph. Taylor, at my urging, has now erased them from his chart (in 1968). (One defect of Glean Evans' work was his use of year dates only, instead of giving also the day and month when known — a serious error in genealogical work, in which precise dates are often the only means of identifying persons of same name born in same year.)

Quastion "Second": Wife of Samuel, Mary Dickinson (note correct spelling), was not not good. Her mother was Mary Wood, wife of James Dickinson the lat, Rowley, Mass. I have, as yet, no proof of birth date for this Samuel. 1703 seems probable date of Mary Dickinson's births in my judgment, but is disputed by our Utah cousins. Taylor has now aliminted "nes Wood." Utah cousins are still arguing about it. I believe they are in error. Marriage dates 9 July 1723.

Question "Third"; Church record, Belchertown, Mass, shows Jones Newton Belknap married Esther Parker in 1783 shortly after his discharge from the army. I have his complete military record, 1775 to 1783 - also documented data on period spent in Ontario County, N. Y. - and a bit on period in Kentucky, circa 1826. "Tamar Vinton" is unknown to me; and would have to be occulusively proved to be acceptable to me. "Miss Lincoln" is result of an early error by Henry Wyckoff Belknap, before 1912, corrected by him later. But after Esther's death in Gorham (now Phelps) in N. Y., it is possible that he remeried married either a daughter of General Otis Lincoln, or a widow of a son of that general. Possible, that's all -- not proved. She may have been his wife Panny in 1820, in Hardin County, My. Her daughter Diantha may have been daughter of her first (Lincoln) husband. Gould not have been daughter of Jonas unless born illagitimately before marriage to "Fanny". All sons and daughters of Jonas on record were of Esther. Story of Jonas is closely linked with that of Esther's family, from 1783 to at least 1818. (In what I've said about Jones, above, I am citing original documents, not what any management genealogist has said. EXHICKLES I have a pretty full and well authenticated file on him. CTB) Taylor has now changed "Miss Lincoln" to "Esther Parker" on his chart. Her name, by the way, was pronounced "Easter" - but that's another story.

Mr. Evan's document lists the birth date of Samuel as 1703 instead of 1707 and states that Mary Dickenson, Samuel wife, was the daughter of James and Mary(Wood) Dickenson form in howley Mass. in 1703. He notes that the couple was married at Mansfield, Conn. in 1723.

Third. In the sixth generation in America you record indicates that my ancestor, Jonas Belkmap (1759-1824), son of Samuel (1751-1775) married Miss Lincoln." compilation by Mr. Evans carries him as having been married twice; to "Tamar Vinton" and to "Esther Parker." No mention is made of another marriage or any wife with the maiden name of Lincoln.

Now the questions in your memo.

My memo 3/20, page 2 — descendant of Susannah is Mrs. Fern Martin, Perris, California, who had spent years and years trying to find someons who had even heard of Susannah. She is descended from Susannah's marriage to David Chatfield, in Ontario County, N. I. As result of giving her the Belkmap pedigree she wanted, I'm now getting letters from other people whom she is advising to write to ms. Today, for example, a Belpful query from Mrs. Frank Barrett, Florence, Oregon, a descendant of Electa, daughter of the Jonas who was brother of Elijah and Jesse.

My memo 3/28, first paragraph — descendant of Jonas M was Mrs. Bertha Hansen, whose great grandmother was Rachel Belkmap, daughter of Chine Jonas, I do not yet have her line in full — just enough to be able to assure her that "Polly Belkmap," in Oregon in 1853 legal document was unquestionably the Mary Ann Carlinghouse who married Jonas sen of Jonas Newton B. Now waiting for complete information from her. This poor woman has been trying to identify "Polly" for years — even to advertising in Oregon papers asking if enyone knew about her.

Of course I intend to pass on to you everything I eventually assemble about Jonas Newton B. and his descendants. But I'm just now beginning to fill this gap in my records and almost every day is bringing some further information, some of which needs careful verification.

Here's something sent to me from a helper in Ontario County, N. I., about EXIMALE proof that EXIMAL while in that county, married Bettle EXIMEN Briggs, born presumably in 1788 as aged 22 when died in May 1810, daughter of Moses and Deborah Briggs. This young family shown in 1820 census, with (possibly) one son, though the census record may be in error as age shown for the son is too old (but it may have been a nephew living with EXIMEN and Bettle, of course). Thanks for copy of letter from Evans. I wish I could believe him. But even that harmless letter makes me raise my eyebrows at several points.

I still have problems with some unquestioned facts from records in Ontario County; but won't trouble you with them till I think I see solutions. Which probably means "when I get more information."

Dear Cousin:

I was delighted and surprised to receive your good letter of March 13 and the enclosure relating to the questions I had raised in a previous communication to Dick Taylor. I had received no reply from him and appreciate your comments.

None of the material I have on Jonas (1759) indicates what his second name or initial may have been but it would surely seem logical that it could have been Newton since his mother's maiden name was Newton.

I am forwarding to you on a temporary toan basis as suggested in your letter the Glen W. Evans document. This is the carbon copy of the summary he prepared for us. I let my brother, Glen Noble, have the original. This carbon copy has some notations and comments on it which I have added since its receipt.

Much of the Elijah Belknap (1785) as compiled by Evans was in error because he had confused material furnished by my Aunt Anna McCormack Belknap, (1871) who had lost most of her sight and althoughher mind was most alert, she found it difficult to prepare data and put it in proper form without special help from some relative or friend. I spent time with her subsequent to the date of Evan's work and profitied greatly by my personal conferences with her.

You expressed an interest in my family. I nave made copies of a number of work sheets i nave made up preparatory to putting my family record together one of these days for my sons and grand-children and am sending them along to you for such review of same as you may desire to make. They are surely not finished products.

I am including such material as I nave on Jonas (1759). I had assumed that Evans had secured the date of death from records of last payment of pension. However he did not state specifically. He stated that he had material from various children of Jonas but he did not identify which or where they lived. In case you are not aware, all of the Belkhap records of Gien W. Evans were, upon his death, deposited with the Michigan State Library at Lansing, Michigan. I visited there briefly one week-end in late 1966 while attending a Medical Care Seminar at Ann Arbor for two weeks.

I have been able to secure considerable data on Elijah Belkhap (1785) from the Federal Archives and have spent some time there personally when in Washington on state business. I am to be in Washington

again April 3-5 this year but I understand the conference is being set up over in Virginia so probaty won't have much time in Washington unless I decide to stay overaa day or so or go early.

Am enclosing an excerpt from the 1949 edition of Who's Who in the Middle West which gives a quick run down on my personal background. In the summer of 1965 I completed 21 years of service as a Field Representative for the National Foundation-March of Dimes and resigned at that time because I no longer desired a job with travel as a constant diet. I became Medical Social Service Consultant for the Nebraska State Department of Public Welfare. In January, 1967, our new Republican Governor, Norbert Tiemann, whom I admire and respect very highly, told me that he thought Public Welfare in Nebraska had been swept under the rug long enough and asked me to take over the Directorship of the entire department. This I did for the period of one year -- long enough to recruit some top notch leaders in the key positions and long enough to locate a competen replacement -- and then asked to be relieved of the tremendous responsibilities of the department to again return to the position of consultant. One of the contributing factors involved was that my vision has been deteriorating (corneal dystrophy) gradually in recent years and the tension of the more demanding position was causing an acceleration of the problem.

Yes, I most certainly would like a copy of the English ancestry summary you mention in your postscript.

And another bit of information I am most anxious to have is a documentation of the listing of the children of Jonas (1759). Actually the only record I have on this point, other than the Evans report, is that listed in the Parker in America or rather The Parker Family in America. Do you have such a listing from a church record or directly from one of the children's records or otherwise? And if you do have will you please share it with me?

I shall look forward to hearing from your further and to the return of the Evans material in the not too distant future.

Mrs. Jane Belknap, widow of Milton Ray Belknap, of Des Moines, has just furnished me with records from which I am able to compile the information on her husband's line of descent, which is claimed back to Jonas Newton Belknap via Elisha, son of Jonas. I will share these with you in the near future. She has presented one item which would seem to prove, or at least provide rather good evidence, for establishing Elish's date of birth as 18 January, 1787.

CLINTON:

We can new scratch "Tamer Vinton".

In an obscure part of HWB'S files, she is shown as the wife of a Jonas Belknap who was said to have didd in Juniata, Michigan, in 1881 or 1882. HWB noted: "Date of deaths improbable." He did not succeed in identifying this Jonas. I may be able to do so, later. But obviously not Jonas Newton Belknap, as far as I can judge at this moment.

I think it likely that the date "1881-1882" in Vinton Genealogy is a risprint for 1831-1832. Such misprints of 8 fer 3 have been rather common.

It's also possible that this Jones was a descendent of a Jesse Belknap who identify explicitly dropped the "k" from his name and was the ancestor of the Mormon Belnaps — also ancestor of a lot of Michigan Belnaps and Belknaps (they varied in using or not using the "k".) I try to adended him some day. . One related problem is that the parentage of that Jesse has never been fully verified, to my

thinking.

MEMO TO E. Clinton Belknap FROM Carroll Belknap

Here are the copies you asked for, HWBAs notes of the ancestry of Elijah. I fear you will not find them very helpful, as the only one that I have yet revised is #1, Abraham. The others are just as HWB left them, except for some minor notations that I have made.

#15 -- Rhenezer -- very unsatisfactory on dates. I have not yet tried ## to compare with dates on other records.

#52 - Samuel - date and place of death not yet determined. HWB'S pencilled entry of Windser as place of death is questionable. Dates for children are sound. INTERMENT Existence of Ruth, 129.9, is unsubstantiated tradition.

"129.4 — Samuel. Date of removal to Murrayfield, given as 1770/1 by HWB, must have been a mistyping for 1760/1. Murrayfield was a large plantation area, may not a town. Belchertown, where Samuel appears on church record 1761, was in that plantation. Data on children very sketchy. Seth — 303 — appears in Ontario Co., NY, when Jonas Et N. was there.

"302 - Jonas N. - HWB left two sheets for him. One showing wife as a Lincolm was written before 1910. The one showing Esther Parker as wife was written after Jos. Nibbe found the Belchertown records. HWB apparently never saw Parker in America. Data on children very inadequate and incomplete. . . I have started to revise this sheet several times, but am still deferring as I keep getting additional information.

Sorry that these sheets wom't be much use to you. When I get around to it, I'll revise them rather extensively. Some of them are among the most unsatisfacry records that HWB left. His #1, Abraham, was so wrong that I just wrote a whole new record.

Will be delighted to see your data on descendants of Elisha. Thus far, I have distrusted everything I've seen, on him — except the verified record of his early marriage in Ontario County, which I've already told you about.

Reading, this merning, what I wrote yesterday, I see that I did not deal very well with the point that helps convince me that I am right in believing that the village Beltofts at Sawbridgeworth were and knew they were Belknaps. That point is the question "How did Josias know how to spell the Belknap name?" So I'm going to ramble on, again, to give you the background.

For many years before 1914, the only known record of a Belknap around the year 1600 was the will signed Josias Belknappe and naming his brother Benedict Belknappe as his INIM heir.

The last male Belkmap of the eld "kmightly line" — the Judge's family — died early in the 16th century. I forget the exact date and don't want to take time to go look it up today — but it was not long after the death of Sir Edward Belkmap, which occurred in 1521. Years of searching, including finally the work done by Bernau and others for HWB, never found any Belkmap of record between then and the date of the will of Josias.

After Bernau proved that Benedict Belknappe was known as Belteft, neither he nor any other searcher or record agent ever found any subsequent Belknaps who were not rather obviously descended from the Sawbridgeworth Beltofts.

Se, of known record, there were only two English families bearing our name the Judget family and the family that changed its name from Beltoft to Belknap when Bennet died.

When Jesias wrete er dictated his will a few days before he died, there had net been anyone else known as a Belknap for just about three-fourths of a century.

Now, as I've indicated in a meme to Couson Claudia, of which you have a copy, Jealas himself is a mystery man. We know only the date when he was christened a Belteft and what is said in his will, and what can be inferred from the contents of his will, and the date and place of his burial. How he accumulated, in his short life, what amounted to a very considerable estate for a villager 35 years old, we do not know.

But we ske do know that he signed his will — the only member of his generation or the preceding generation known to have been able to do more than sign by mark. We thus have to assume that he had some members schooling and could read and write.

So we end where I began, with that same question. Let me re-phrase that question like this: "How, in the vacuum of three-fourths of a century with no other known or traceable Belknaps, did Jesias know how to spell the name, with its unusual and curious 'k'?"

Let me re-state that question in still different fashion? "How could have seen this obscure man in a small farm town have possibly known how to spell the name (in an old fashion) unless he had in his possession or had seen some written document containing the name? And what could that document have been, when the odds against his having been able to see any of the records we now mow, for the Judge's family, are overwhelming?" The only way I can answer such questions is to pelieve that the village Beltofts must nave had, for generations past, some written evidence of their true family name — and that if there was or had been such a document there was semething in that that made Bennet stubbernly unwilling to admit that he was a Belkmap.

Of course all this is more speculation about a mystery. But I've found it impossible to avoid this sort of speculation and your comments in the 4th paragraph on page 2 of you letter 8/29 have tempted me into putting it down on paper for the first time — knowing that you'll regard it as more guesswork just as I do... Yet, damnit, it's informed guesswork.

MEMO TO E. Glinton Belkmap FROM Carrell Belkmap

July 26, 1968

In trying to complete the record of Jonas Newton Belkmap, I feel a need of setting down on paper the puzzle of (1) when did his wife Esther Parker die, and (2) who was the Fanny he named as his wife when applying for a pension in 1820 in Kentacky? He said in his affidavit that he was then living "with my wife Fanny and daughter Diantha." I've mentioned these inter-related questions in earlier notes to you. Now I'm led to continue along this line because of what appears in a letter from Mrs. Jane Belkmap. But before I quote what she said, I'd better go back to earlier data.

- (1) In 1910, HWB wrote to my cousin Clark Belkmap (great grandsom of Jesse, like me):
 "Your great grandmother was a Lincoln." Because of the great interest in family history
 in my brush of the family (the "Benton County Belkmaps" of Oregon, samemarized descendants
 of Jesse and his brother Jonas) this "Lincoln" name has been widthly circulated. I have
 abandened hepe of finding the source of this early error by HWB. All I know is that
 by 1919 the researches of Joseph Kibbe, Warehouse Point, Conn., (a Belkmap donnection
 by marriage) had led HWB to name Esther Parker as Jonas N's wife, in a letter to my
 father. Kibbe, in HWB'S opinion, was the chief authority on "the Connecticut
 Belkmaps." Commander Charles Belkmap, in the 1890's, set down the place and date of
 the marriage to Esther but apparently HWB did not know this part of the Commander's
 records.
- (2) HWB, as you know, gave "1817/8" as the date of Esther's death with no indication of source. This date, or just "1817", has been given many times by later members of the family but again with no indication of proof and with no place named.
- (3) In 1961, my cousin Claudia Marahall, in Oregon, wrote a transcript of the pension applications made by Jonas N. in 1818 and 1820. This transcript, naming "Fanny" and "Diantha", has been circulated widely. A number of copies [MENIXX (some with tampering and erroneous alterations by God-knowswhom) have come into my hands.
- (h) The result has been the sort of confusion that appears in Mrs. Jane's letter. She writes: "The dates I have on Esther Fannie Lincoln Parker is this. We saw the stone when we were in Alexandria, Ohio, years ago. I am sure it read 1817-18 and then Reva Barret desc. of Jesse had this same date." Of course this is not valid evidence. And certainly no gravestone would give such a twoyear date of death.
- (5) Moreover, I do not see how Esther could have been in that part of Ohio as early as 1817 or 1818. These of her children who had left Ontario County NY (not later than 1816 I am sure) were in Kentucky in 1817 to 1820 or 1822 and had children borne there in those years. None of them went up to Licking County or nearby Ohio until late 1822 or early 1823. Meanwhile, Jonas remained in Ontario County until 1819, when he sold property in Gorham as you already know. (Despite, I should add, the fact that in his 1818 affidavit in nearby Phelps he swere that he man had already sold all property that he had possessed. On this point, we must remember that to qualify for that pension at that time, the law required him to be a pauper. Se perhaps he fudged a bit about a small property of little value. Certainly in 1818 he was no longer a farmer with any substantial amount of land.
- (6) To place Esther in Ohio in 1817 or 1818 (and in Licking County) we have to assume that she had left Jonas and had accompanied her sen Elijah who may have been the only son who went to Ohio without going first to Kentucky..... Do you know if he did this? I have no record on him between 1810 and the 1830 census. One of us, perhaps, should look for the 1820 census, Licking County.

- (7) If Esther and Jonas had separated by 1816 or 1817, I'd think I'd find this fact mentioned in what has been set down by some of the women in my branch. But I find nothing of this sort.
- (8) Meanwhile, diverge to "Fanny and Diantha." No matter how I juggle the dates, I can find no way of thinking that Diantha was physically a legitimate daughter of Jonas, if she was 9 years old in 1820 as he said in his affidavit that year. Or should I assume (a) that Jonas Mikhaka "took up" with this Fanny by at least 1811, (b) had an illegitimate daughter by her, where whereupon Esther left him, and (c) that Jonas married this Fanny after Esther died? The only known evidence tending to lend any support to this sweeping set of assumptions is the fact that Jonas sold his farm at Bristol im Jan. 5, 1810. But the 1810 Census shows him living at Bristol with his smally and a wife of the right age to be Esther. I'd have to assume that the census was taken before that date.
- (9) An epposing surmise is that "Fanny" was a widow Lincoln with a Lincoln daughter, married to Jonas after Esther's death. There were lots of Lincolns in Ontario County in those years. One of them, Samantha Lincoln, born 1807 if the age given for her at her death is correct, married a Belknap (most likely the son of Jonas's brother Seth aged 16-25 in census 1810 and living with his father and mother at Homeove then first name unknown). Whoever her husband Belknap may have been, he appears to died by 1850 when Electronical Samantha Belknap Electronical with Lincoln relatives, as she continued to do till her Beath in 1879. No connection with Jonas, of course just indication of Belknap-Lincoln centacts in the years I've been talking about.
- (10) Now, having rambled on about "possibilities," which have to be considered if 1817 or 1818 was the date of Esther's death, I finally come to what I believe was the truth, evan though there is evidence against it. The Ontario County Index of Cemeteries shows the name of "Mrs. Jenas Belknap" - with no further identification. Tracking this indication down, we found in the Index of Deaths of at an eld-time Ontario County newspaper, the Wastern Repository and Genesee Atvertiser, the following entry: "July 4, 1815 - Wrs. Jones Belimap (Rachel) age 59 - Gorham." Knowing that Jonas had a small property at Corham until 1819, I think that the name "Rachal" must have been an error by the newspaper. But what about the age - 59? This doman't agree with the birthdate of 1766 given for Esther by Glen Evans. But I've never believed that date and have not been able to confirm it. Parker in America gives 1765 for the birth of her brother Stiles - with enough further detail on dates to make the record seem likely to be dependable. And by all accounts, Stiles was the second Parker child born after Esther's birth. So in likelihood she was born not not later than And manufactor somewhere I recall seeing a date of 1769 for her birth -1761 ar 1762. some time ago, when I had no reason to make a note about it. IXXXXXIIIMMAXI If she was born in that year, she would have been 9 in 1815 - not 59. . . That So I have to guess that the newspaper erred also on her age. Suraise, yes. But there simply is no possible hint that any other Mrs. Jonas Belknap could have died at that place in 1815.
- (11) So I come to the conclusion that Esther died in 1615 that it had been she, not Jenas, who had held the family together in Ontario County and that once she was dead her sons left, in 1816 or possibly late 1815 with Jenas lingering behind till 1819.

I can't end this memo without paying tribute to Miss Gladys Gray of Geneva, N. Y., a skilled researcher who voluntarily and just for the pleasure of it dug up this and much more information about the Belknaps and the Parkers and the Garlinghouses and the Lincolns — pages and pages of it, over a period of months. I wish we could find someone like her in Licking County.

Se, now, please - your judgment of what I've written. You're the only person I know who is competent to comment on it.

On reading what I've written, I think I'd better send a copy to Claudia
Marshall, who has been working on the task of adding dates to the long
list of Jesse's descendants and bringing it up to date. Though I
haven't pestered har with the details of what you and I have been doing to
work out the record of Jonas Newton B and his children, she may well know
more than I do about some parts of his story — or may know bits of family tradition
that can be helpful — and may detect errors in what I've said.

CLINTON:

Eless you - for what you did to help Mrs. Jane. I hated to have to doubt her record. Have been trying to let other people to work in searches that might aid her.

I've taken the liberty of writing to Carol Anne - supplementing your fine letter to her. Copy enclosed.

I'll answer your other questios as soon as I can.

Here are some points that have been in my mind for many months.

- (1) Tamar's family lived at Granby, a few miles from Belchertown, when she was a child. It was "from Granby" that Jonas and his father enlisted in May 1775. Jonas was then 16 Tamar was 9. He might have known her there.
- (2) One of her brothers (this is also shown in the mins typed page you sent to me) is known to have moved from Granby to south central New York, near Binghamton—some distance from Ontario County, but near enough to make me wonder if Tamar and Asa Newton accompanied him (as so often happened in families in those days and might well have happened if Asa was a younger son who did not inherit land at Granby).
- (3) Cynthia, daughter of Jonas N, is known to have married a Newton -- who is daid to have been with Jonas at the time of his death in Kentucky. So there is a known contact by Jonas with a Newton.
- (4) The wife living with Jonas N. in Ontario County 1800 and 1810 was the right age (census) to have been Esther Parker but not Tamar Vinton.
- (5) In all of the pension papers of Jonas N. there is no mention of "Yanney" and Diantha before 1820.
- (6) As Cynthia was probably born circa 1805, possibly 1802 Or \$\infty\$ 1803, it is not likely that she married before Jonas left Ontario County. Though I stiill have no evidence of the place of her marriage, it seems reasonable to guess that she accompanied Jonas when he left NY State and met and married Isaac Newton in Kentucky.
- (7) If Jonas married Tamar Vinton it too was likely to have been in Kentucky.

Guesswork, much of it. But what I have to do is to trace the movement of Tamar Vinton Newton from Granby, Mass. to somewhere in Kentukky (maybe) — which can be done only by tracing her husband Asa Newton and finding when and where he died.



That "only" in the last line on the preceding page was a poorly chosen word. There are other ways, of course, but they are very unlikely in Kentucky at that time. My one best hope is to find a Newton record that will yield the facts we need — or prove something else.

This brings you up to date on my searches. Wish me luck.

Later:

I see I haven't played fair. For complete honesty, I should state my reasons for remaining skeptical till definite proof is found.

(1) My own branch of the family has maintained continuous effort on Belkmap genealogy for many years, so that we have the facts on more than 500 descendants of Jesse, Elijah's brother. The records of this branch cover the years in Kentucky. Early in this century was two members of my branch formed a family association devoted to research in genealogy. This was the source of much that is in HWB's records and in other sets of records. There is no mention of Tamar Vinton Newton in any of the work that has been done by my branch in past the past 100 years — nor in what is now being done by my Pacific Coast cousins.

(But perhaps the only child of Jonas likely to leave an identification of his wife in Kentucky might have been Cynthia. I can always hope that suddenly I'll receive a query from a descendant of Cynthia, as I did from a descendant of Susannah. I never know what the next mail will bring — from people who happen to have heard of what I'm doing.)

- (2) Of the Belknap genealogists who have known about Tamars alleged second marriage to a Jonas Belknap, the only one who thought it might be Jonas Newton B was Glenn Evans. HWB didn't think so. Neither did Commander Charles.
- (3) The fact that the Vinton Memorial, published many years age, says that Tamar's second husband was a Jonas Belkmap is not valid evidence. When such statements are made without any supporting data, the common assumption is that they are based on mere hearsay. Much of what one finds in published genealogies is of dubious nature. I've had to learn to look for verification before accepting unsupported statements, for I find that top-flight professional genealogists are rather scornful critics of much of what can be found in books, including local histories too. So I'm wary, perhaps because I, too, have made so many mistakes in past years.

- (1) Your last paragraph, regarding Tamar Vinton: Danmit, I do wrong things sometimes, with good motives. Re-reading the memo I wrote to you early this week (which got delayed by my failure to put a stamp on it), I get irritated by a long-winded resume of the evidence suggesting a search for a link between Cynthiass marriage to Isaac Newton and Jonas N's possible marriage to Tamar Vinton Newton thought I was bothering you too much with details of my thinking chopped off two pages and threw them into the wastebasket. . Trouble is, my conscience bethers me shout the way I pester you and the ways in which I'm likely to continue doing so. I take the much advantage of the fact that you're the only person I know who has both the background and the temperament to appraise my speculations.
- (2) Descendants of Elijah: If you uncover any additional information, hayond what I amt to you, I count on you to pass it along.
- (3) Jonas at Charleston: Gladys Gray, many months age, pointed out some reasons why this Jonas could not have been Jonas Newton B notably ages of deughters. Charleston, she said, was actually not in Ontario County but in Livingston County (and is now called Lima). We agreed on identification of Jonas N as the Jonas shown at Honeoye in same census. I have not yet identified the Jonas at Charleston in 1800 who has not yet been found in an 1810 census. Do you differ? (The Jonathan Belkmap at Charleston in 1800 census has been identified as one of the Newburgh family descended from Abraham's son Joseph leading us to suspect that the Jenas at Charleston in that year may eventually be identified as from that branch of Belkmaps. Newburghfamily was very large 8h in it, in 1790 census.)
- (h) Forly generations: Don't rely too much on HWH's record for Ebeneser at Haverhill. Many dates for the births of his children have been disputed. I haven't yet tackled this problem. (I envy a JEMN juggler with only six balls to keep in the air.)... There's also contraditory record on Samuel, father of Jonas N and on his grandfather Samuel, son of Ebenezer. I'll get it stmightened out some day, but God knows when.
- (5) Reva Barrett you're right. I found a forgotten mention of her in a letter from a descendant of Jonas son of Jonas N.

MEMO TO E. Clinton Belkmap FROM Carroll Belkmap

5/11/68

This being a Saturday, I'll try to answer your most helpful memo of 5/1. Delay caused by absence from home — at Boston and Salam, mostly.

I'm grateful for your detection of my error in typing dates of Ebeneser's children. A year or two ago, an accident to my left hand forced me to learn typing all over again, one-handed. So I make stupid errors in typing, end don't see them. Thanks.

I enclose copy of a memo to Dick Taylor and an accompanying sheet about the old
"Mary Wood—Hary Dickinson" confusion. It is indicates (partially) my low opinion
of the Salt Lake records for anything earlier than the 19th century. I have what
is said to be a complete set of the Belkmap family records as stored in the Salt
Lake Archives. They are full of such obvious errors as giving date and place of
baptism as date and place of birth (which were often very different in 17th and 18th
centuries), etc. etc. Each of the early work for those Salt Lake records was
done by Hirum Belnap fifty or more years ago — a man whom HWB characterized as "most
unfitted for this kind of work." In that Hirum's own pedigres, sent to me by his
daughter Delia (who is a kind and wonderfully helpful person) I had to note 16 provable
errors, Il omissions of known data, and I statements subject to serious question. So
I warm you, regard Salt Lake as helpful in supplying leads — but nothing more than that.
Some of Olen Evens' mistakes come from unquestioning acceptance of what is shown in
the Utah sheets. I get negative reactions when I question those Utah records; so I've
stopped telling Delia about the recent I spot.

You'll note that my sheet about "Mary Wood -- Mary Dickinson" mentions the work of Commander Charles Belkmap, who died in 1981. I've known about his work for a long time but couldn't find his records till I read an old letter from a son of his, sent to me by Dick Taylor. And I know that hell regarded the Commander's work highly and cited it frequently (""" differing on some minor details). In Boston, lately, I examined the Commander's papers and was terrifically impressed by their obviously makening scholarly nature. Found in them much that HTB had been me unable to use, as the Commander's son refused to let HTB see them. Formed the opinions after clicking some final entries against sources shown in the Commander's worksheets) that I'll accept his findings as is -- unless I have positive evidence of error in them. (by sheet on "harwood -- Mary Dickinson" melds HTB's record and the Commander's records and my own.) I am making the necessary arrangements to have the Commander's records placed at my disposal.

One thing I found in his final record was what seems to be reliable information on Jones Newton B.

Born: 19 May 1759 Married Esther Parker, at Belchertown, 17 January 1783.

This last entry interests me for two reasons. (1) It contradicts the vague statements that I've seen to the effect that they married "seen after his discharge from the Army" in June 1783. [2] It explains that entry in his military record, showing that he got hO days leave on Dec 17, 1782 and overstayed his leave 2 days.

You are right, of course, in pointing out that Parker in America merely says that Esther married "a Belimap" — but the standard many-volume index to genealogical data (I forget its name at this moment) lists those pages for Jonas. And the church record at Belchertown confirms the marriage of Jonas and Esther. Source most often cited as easiest to consult is Doolittle's Notes on the Church History of Belchertown.

Thanks for telling me where I had seen the name of Abijah Wright. It all ties in

with the records sent me from Ontario County - which show that at least some of Elijah Parker's children, including Esther's brother Stiles, moved on to that area with Jones and Esther - and went on to Kentucky about the same time that Jesse did.

I should have told you that I was quoting a record sent to me by a helper at Canandaigua. (I haven'll yet had time to study the census records themselves, though the microfilms are available nearby). I copied correctly from the record sent to me. It's best to remember that the early census records were often very inaccurate on detail. I regard them as providing reasonable evidence of residence, not much more than that.

. The 1810 censum, ten years later, for obviously the same family, shows 2 males to to 15, 1 female under 10 (probably Cynthia, as you surmised), 1 female 10-15.

On children of Jonas Hewton B., the Communier's records show the following dates of Daptism (not birth): Sexuel and Klijah, lh Aug 1785; Orrin born 25 2k May 1799.

He names the following children of Klijahs Richard, Philander, Giles.

He also has some data on Elisha - needing children: Lacy, Henry, Ely.

For Jones (son or Jones M.) he has the complete list of children and some dates not previously known to me.

At Boston, I looked up Temer Vinton in the Vinton genealogy: Vinton Memorial. It shows her born 30 July 1766; married Asa Newton 25 Jan 1789; and married (no date) Jonas Belknap as second husband. Obviously must have been another Jonas (there were several in these years, in various branches and I've not yet identified all of them.). Resident Character Ch

In the library at the MEHO Society, Boston, I found in a very ampteurish manuscript on some Belimap genealogy another version of that familial first page that Glen Evens wrote for you — differing in detail somewhat but plainly derived from the same source — which I'm guessing is Buttenber's very erroneous history of the Manually, Belimap family, embroidered by Evens.

HWB'S pages on Elijah were written bafore 1914. The notes on sources were destroyed in the Salem fire, 1914.

Thanks for the list of Belimaps in War of 1512. I can use it. . . Am especially interested in the inclusion of our most unsolved Belimap -- Pilgrim. We have full records of Pilgrim's many descendants -- but no clue to his parentage. Maybe the record in the Mational Archives will show where he enlisted, placing him somehers earlier than our first known residence for him - Saratoga, N. Y. (or Saratoga Gounty). Did you copy may further data on him? (He had a brother Stephes, whose descendants also know nothing of the parentage.)

Reading what I wrote yesterday, I see some points on which I should made additions.

- (1) Date of birth of Elijah. Bate given by the Commander is first full date I've seen. One weakness of all work by Evans is his use of year only. Baptismal date for Samuel and Elijah (1h Aug 1785) was kix 15 days after Jonas N. and Esther became members of the Belchertown church (30 July 1785). No date yet known for birth of Samuel, but we can assume it was late kikk 1783 or early 1784 and we cannot be far wrong if we take Belchertown as birthplace for both of Manif them.
- (2) Temer Vinton -- IMB card linking her to a much later Jonas in Michigan must be in error; or else the Vinton Memorial is wrong on her dates, which I doubt. I think HMB erred.



Now that Peg and I are home from a happy time on Grete, I'm starting to work on genealogy again. Among the accumulated correspondence, there's a letter and some enclosures, from Gladys Gray — who has helped so much by research in Ontario County, NY. I had asked her if there was any trace in that county of the Asa Newton who married Tamar Vinton, at and of an Isaac Newton who might be alseir son.

With her dustomary thoroughness, she sent me everything she found on Newtons. Because Claudia is interested in Newton genealogy, I'm sending her a Hamman complete copy of Miss Gray's sheets. But as most of what they contain would be of no interest to Clinton, I'll summarise here — for him — the entries that may have some bearing on our effort to trace the marriage of Jongs Newton Belimap to Tamar (Vinton) Newton.

In the early 1800's, there was an Asa Newton in that part of N.T. He does not appear in the census records examined by Miss Gray; but he does appear in two other records:

COUNTY CLERK RECORDS, Liber 18, p. 228 — Sir John Lowther Johnstone of Webster Hall, Dumphries, Scotland, Baronet, and his wife Charlotte, sold to ASA NEWTON 150 acres situated in the northwest corner of lot #5, Township #9, 6th Range . . . for \$600 — Jan. 30, 1811. Hap attached to this entry showed location of this property to be not far from Honeoye (where Johns and his sons lived in 1810):
Miss Gray could find no record of any sale of this property by Asa; so presumably it went to his heirs, though she found no record of such inheritance— nor any record of the death or burial of this Asa.

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(A possible hint MME that this Isaac Newton was no longer in that area and that both these transactions were performed for him by others.)

All this, of course, is highly inconclusive. But I have thought it well to make a record of even these slight and dubious ESHEMEXELEREN possible clues. Someday, perhaps, they might fit into a pattern of other evidence.

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Considering the frequency with which families related by marriage moved on Westward together in those days, it would not be surprising to find that Asa Newton in Ontario County when Jonas was there. Some of the other Newtons in that county, then, obviously came from the part of Connecticut where Jonas was born.

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

How that we are back from Grete, I'm resuming the search for TAMAR VINTON.

Before leaving home in October, I asked Gladys Gray if she could find any trace in Ontario County in the early 1800's of an Asa Newton (possible first husband of Tamar) and an Isaac Newton (possible son of Asa and possible husband of Jonas's daughter Cynthia).

In the accumulated mail I find a reply from her, giving a sizable mass of data on Newtons in Ontario County. As Claudia is interested in Newton genealogy, I'm sending her a copy of this material. For Clinton's information, I'll merely summarise the portions that may possibly hear on Tamar Vinton.

COUNTY CLERKS RECORDS - Jan. 30, 1811 - an Asa Hewton bought land not far from the part of Ontario County where Jones and his sons lived in 1810. Price, \$600.

SURROGATE'S OFFICE RECURDS -- an Asa Newton was graated letters of EMBLETELIES administration in the ertate of r son (name left blank in the record)-- May 23, 1815.

Mids No Asa Newton shown in census records of 1800 or 1810. (Still to be asked: whother he appears in 1820 census.)

COUNTY CLERES RECORDS - Feb. 1, 1823 - two quit-claim deeds - \$1 each - to land near property of that Asa Newton -- by an Isaac Newton (so worded as to hint that this Isaac Newton may not have been, in that years, physically present in Ontario County).

Inconclusive ---

RESINGUESTALL but even such slight clues may fit into a broader pattern, some day.

If I find that neither this ase nor this Issac appears in the 1820 census of Ontario County, we may at least surmise that this ase arrived in the county after the 1810 census and died sefore the 1820 census (though Mass Gray has found no record of his death or burial) — and that this Isaac left Ontario County before 1820 (about same time that Jones left, parhaps).

As possible hint that this Asa Newtob may have been the Asa who was brother of Mary Newton, mother of Jonas N B, there is are obvious indications that some of the many Newtons in that part of Ontario County at that pime had come from the same part of Connecticut where Mm the parents of Mary lived --- or mearby.

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

Page 1, par 2: Only record that Jonas was a cooper was in Kentucky -- after he got into the whiskey-making country. In Ontario he was a farmer -- till he sold his land as previously reported to you. No record of how he made his living after that -- except ownership and sale of a much smaller piece of land.

Page 1, par. 3 - Not "alleggedly known as Lima" but should read "now called Lima." Many old names changed in that area - e. g. Pittstown became Honeove. Miss Gray's knowledge of the place-mames is vast and provably accurate, as result of her work on a history of old houses in that section.

Page 1. last par.: Second line - all records of births of children show Kentucky in the 1820's and Licking County Ohio in 1830's. Not Ohio fint, as you said,

Same pare: Lines 5 and 6: Can you send me the 1820 Census record for Jonas?

Same par. "James Carlinghouse." What is your basis for saying that the James Carlinghouse in Kentucky was father of the "three Carlinghouse girls." I think their father stayed in Ontario County. Am I wrong?

Page 2: Wapello County, Iowa. According to Jesse's daughter-in-law Keturah (my father's "Aunt Kit") Jesse and his family were also in Wapello County in early 1840s. At least, his son Ransom was.

From affidavits in the Jonas Belknap #39 pension file S-36408 (The actual serial number of his pension certificate in relation to his claim filed under the Congressional Act of March 18, 1818, entitled "An Act to Provide for Certain Persons Engaged in the Land and Naval Services of the United States in the Revolutionary War was 13360) relating to services in the Revolutionary War, photo copies of which were furnished E. Clinton Belknap #77 under date of 12-28-1960 by the General Services Administration, National Archives and Record Service, we learn that Jonas Belknap:

"first enlisted into the service of the United States in the Spring of 1775 for eight months in the State of Massachusetts and served said term, and, about the first of January, 1776, enlisted for one year and before his service expired he enlisted sometime in the fall of the same year in the Continental Service during the War in the state of New York in the Company commanded by Captain Luke Day in the 7th Massachusetts Regiment commanded by Colonel Alden afterwards by Colonel John Brooks..."

Note: Mr. James C. Olson, head of the History Department of the University of Nebraska, Lincoln, Nebraska, explains that the first two enlistments "in the services of the United States" would have been in the Massachusetts Militia and that after serving out the first and some of the second enlistment in the Massachusetts State Militia, he enlisted or was voluntarily transferred to Washington's Continental Army which had been authorized under an act of the Continental Congress in 1775.

Another affidavit in his pension files states that the January, 1776, enlistment was at Northampton, Massachusetts.

From affidavits in the above mentioned Jonas Belknap pension files, we find that Jonas Belknap continued to serve in the Continental Army until the end of the war and, with the rank of sergeant, was given an honorable discharge in June, 1783, at Newburgh in the State of New York. Records researched by Glen W. Evans indicated that Jonas Belknap also received a badge of merit at the time of his dismissal. would have been understandable because of his long period of service at a time when one of the greatest problems plaguing Washington's Army was short enlistments and desertions.

According to affidavits in his pension file, Jonas Belknap had served under Captain Keith and Colonel Jackson in the Massachusetts Militia and had, among others, later served under Captain Luke Day and Captain Coburn and under Colonel Alden and John Brooks. These affidavits further stated that he had served in the following battles:

"Battle of Bunker Hill" "Bemis Heights" "Cober's Klin" or Cober's Hill "Taking of Burgoyne" (Battle of Saratoga) "Taking of Cornwallis" (Battle of Yorktown) and "Battle of Newburgh."

He was wounded in the Battle of Cober's Kiln or Cober's Hill and according to his pension files was, under an Act of Congress in 1793, given a \$20 per year pension. This he later relinquished in May, 1818, for a pension paying \$8 per month under the Revolutionary War Claims Act of March 18, 1818.

According to the records of Glen W. Evans, Jonas lived at Cherry Valley in Otsego Co., New York, in 1792 when twins, Jesse and Susan, were born. He was a member of the Belchertown, Massachusetts, Congregational Church in 1785. In 1798, he and his wife were admitted to the First Presbyterian Church of Worcester, Otsego Co., New York. He lived at Naples, Ontario Co., New York, in 1818 when he made his application for a pension. In 1820, he lived in Harte Co., Kentucky. He gave his wife's name as Fannie and had a daughter Diantha living with him. Perhaps Esther Parker was called "Fannie" or he might have married again. It appears that Jonas must have married a third time since Jane Belknap's records indicate that his wife Esther died in 1817 and was buried in Alexandria, Ohio.

He died in Marte Co., Kentucky, February 16, 1824, and the last pension payment was made to Isaac Newton, administrator of his estate, at the Lexington, Kentucky Pension Agency.

According to an affidavit in his pension files signed in December, 1820, his History of Hadery; Mark, Dar Linesque occupation had been "coopering." (See: Pension file; Parker Family of America;

Re: Elijah Belknap (#46) 1785-

According to the 1850 U.S. Census for Wapello County, Iowa, page 500, schedule 1400, Elijah Belknap, #46, a "farmer", was born in 1785, in Massachusetts. Since his father, Jonas, #39, is reported to have been living at Belchertown from 1776 to about 1798, it is assumed that Belchertown in Hampshire County, Massachusetts, was the city of Elijah's birth.

In a "Declaration for Pension" filed March 31, 1871, he stated that he had married Catharine Garlinghouse, January 8, 1806, in Ontario County, New York.

He was inducted into the New York Militia in the War of 1812 at Naples, New York. He served from "24 August 1814 to 8 November 1814," in Captain Graham's Company under the command of General Jacob Brown. (War Department Muster Rolls, Vol 93, page 221.)

According to the record, his responsibilities in the military had been "guarding prisoners to Albany and conducting the shipping of provisions to the soldiers." Immediately following his discharge at Batavia, N.Y., he was at Canadique, in Ontario County, N.Y. where he collected his pay.

The Wapello County, Iowa, U.S. Census for 1850 (pages 480, schedule 1120, and page 500, schedule 1399) states that both of his older sons, James M. #56, and Gamaliel, #57, were born in New York in 1809 and 1814 respectively, but that his younger son, Joseph, #58, was born in Kentucky in 1826.

His only daughter, Mary, was born in Ohio, (probably Licking) in 1830. It is evident from the same 1850 Census record that Elijah Belknap and his family had moved to Wapello County, Iowa, in about 1845. All of his sons were living in that county at the time the census was taken and all were listed as "farmer." The family probably lived in the vicinity of Blakesburg, Iowa, since the two witnesses to attest to Elijah's identity in connection with his claim for Bounty Land in February, 1854, a Mr. Seaman Smith and a Mr. Silas Reynolds, were both of Blakesburg.

An affadavit in his pension file, signed in January, 1852, stated that he was at that time a resident of Licking County, Ohio. However, in 1854, he filed an affadavit from Wapello County, Iowa, again.

On March 31 1871 he 603 in

On March 31, 1871, he filed for a pension in Owen Township, Frankfort, Clinton County Indiana, based on his military service in the War of 1812. Certificate No. 7642 was issued November 9, 1871, in response to his claim No. 6580, authorizing a monthly pension of \$8 commencing February 14, 1871. The certificate was issued by the Indianapolis Agency and recorded in the Indianapolis Volume, page 5. Prior to this, he had received two Bounty Land grants in recognition of his service; one by warrant No. 99182 for 40 acres under the Act of September 28, 1850 and another by warrant 19146 for 120 acres under the Act of March 3, 1855.

Note: Olive Brock had previously been married to Samuel Roberts, who died about a year later. She is reported to have had one son by this first marriage. He was named Harvey and was last heard of in Colorado. He could not be located when his mother died. Olive was the daughter of James Porter and Amelia Brock, reportedly of Tennessee.

Although Anna Belknap, wife of Arthur C. Belknap, #66, and a granddaughter of James M. Belknap, #56, believed Joseph Gillette, #58 to have been born in Ohio, probably at Licking, the 1850 U.S. Census Record of Wapello County, Iowa, lists him as having been born in "Kentucky." (See schedule 1092, p. 478) His grandfather, Jonas Belknap #39, died in Hart County, Kentucky in 1824 and it is quite possible that Joseph's father, Elijah and his family may have lived there for a short duration at about that time.

Joseph lived in Wapello County Iowa, in 1850 and had married his first wife, Elizabeth, within the year. Elizabeth's birthplace was listed as "Indiana." first wife died in December, 1863, during the period of the Civil War. She is believed to have died in Wapello County, Iowa.

Elizabeth is reported to have been from a staunch Southern family who moved from Indiana to Texas, and to have insisted that any fighting to be done in the Civil War should be on the side of the Rebels, whereupon Joseph is alleged to have started to make his way to the Southern forces but, by design or otherwise, was intercepted by Northern troops and detained at "Allenburg Prison" until he signed an affadavit not to join the Rebels. He later reported to his son, Arthur, that he had been treated well while being detained, "even given sugar for his coffee!"

Fernando, born 6/26/1841, son of Joseph's older brother, Gamaliel, #57, and Orrin Belknap, born 10/24/1840, son of Joseph's oldest brother, James M., #56, both fought for the North in the Civil War. Fernando is reported to have "gone down on the Steamer, 'Lion'," and Orrin is reported to have been killed in action June 23, 1862.

Deft with four living children ranging in age from three to twelve years of age at the time of Elizabeth's death, Joseph soon married a widow lady by the name of Olive Amelia Brock Roberts, who had also lost her mate (a Methodist minister) by death and who had at heart one son, Harvey, by her first marriage.

The record subsequently shows that a new child was added to the family quite regularly over the next several years until a total of ten had been recorded. E. Churton Dellucy (1701) 2019 Harusocot St hincoln, Robradea

The strain of trying to adjust in such a rapidly growing household containing components of three different families was apparently too much for the children of Joseph by his first wife. In 1964, a report by Anna Belknap, mentioned above, stated that the oldest boy, Ahijah "Jack" #60, ran off at an early age and went to live with his mother's folks, the Van Cleves, in Texas. Both James Gee "Jim" #62, and Edith, #65, also later went to Texas to live with the Van Cleves.

In October, 1964, Sopha Belknap Eudy, daughter of James Gee "Jim" #62, stated that at the time of the death of her grandmother, Elizabeth Van Cleve Belknap in 1863, James Gee was given by his father Joseph Gillett Belknap #58 to Joseph's older borther, Gammaliel #57 and that James made his home with Gammaliel and family until he was old enough to be on his own.

Joseph, with his family, was still living in Wapello County, Iowa, in 1873 at the time of the birth of Elmer C. "Ed" Belknap, #70. He is believed to have continued to live there until about 1878, when he moved with his family to a farm in Linn County, Missouri. According to Ed Belknap, the family post office was at a small town located between Brookfield and Bucklin (probably, St. Catharine).

By the winter of 1885, the family had left Missouri and moved to Kansas and by 1886 had located in Scott County, Kansas. Here Joseph "did some farming and worked for wages," according to Anna Belknap.

He was now past 62 years of age. By the time he was about 65, he is reported to have begun to spend much of his time in Texas with children by his first marriage, although it is known he spent the winter of 1901 back in Kansas with Arthur, #66, and his family. Arthur was the oldest son by Joseph's second marriage.

During these later years, his second wife, Olive, and the smaller children still at home, found it necessary to turn to the older children in the family for help with their subsistence.

Harvey Roberts, son of Olive and Samuel Roberts, had apparently stayed as a member of the family until he was old enough to be on his own and had come on out to Kansas from Missouri. He later went on out to Colorado and lost contact with the family. All attempts to locate him in March, 1913, at the time of the death of his mother were without success.

Elmer Curtis Belknap, #70, commonly known as "Ed," was the fifth in a family of ten children by the second marriage of Joseph Gillett Belknap.

Born in Ottumwa, Wapello County, Iowa, in 1873, he migrated with his parental family from a farm in Iowa to another farm in Linn County, Missouri, in about 1878.

In letters written to his oldest son, Clinton Belknap, in 1938 and 1940, he related that he had attended a rural school, located between Brookfield and Bucklin, Missouri as far as the fourth grade. He had, he stated, used hand-me-down books (including the McGuffey reader) from the five older children "because my dad had to furnish the books."

One of his early recollections was of his father and mother "going out into the big timber" in Missouri to gather bark, roots, buds, herbs, leaves, etc., and bringing them home, putting them in labeled bundles and placing them all in a flour sack for later use by his mother in preparing her own medicines.

At the age of about 11, an episode in his life occurred, the effects of which were to have an important bearing on his departure from home to shift for himself at a very early time in life.

During the early spring farrowing of the sows on the farm, he had rescued a baby pig which had been tossed over the fence into the snow as dead by his father. "blew in its face," took it to the house and warmed it by the fire and "brought

it back to life." He gave it careful care and raised it as a personal pet that followed him around the farm "like a dog would follow another boy."

Late that Fall, while he was at school and without his consent, the pet pig, which had by this time grown to a rather mature young hog, was butchered to help provide meat for the family larder during the winter months ahead. He was aware that plans had been made for the Fall butchering on that particular day and, apprehensive of developments, had pleaded with his father to spare his pet. He had tried to feign illness so he could remain at home to provide protection, but the plan was of no avail.

Years later in relating the story, he told of running the full two miles home the instant the country school was dismissed to find his pet butchered and hanging on the scaffolding along with half a dozen other carcasses for cooling before further processing.

The emotional impact of the experience was to replace any further interest in formal schooling with a secret determination to run away from home and be on his own.

In 1884 or 1885, the family moved from the Linn County farm in Missouri to Kansas. One report has it that they spent the winter in or near Wamego, Kansas. In 1964, Daisy Belknap Wood, whose birthdate was December, 1885, and who was the youngest of the ten children, stated that she was born in Salina, Kansas, in Saline County. In 1964, she was living at 2369 Moorpark Avenue in San Jose, California.

There seemed to have been general agreement that the family located in Scott County, Kansas, in 1886.

Ed related that he had preceded the rest of the family to Kansas assisting another Missouri farmer (whose first name was John but whose last name he couldn't recall) move his milk cows through Kansas City and on to a farm located on the line between Logan and Scott Counties in Western Kansas.

He apparently was with his own family only briefly, if at all, after their move to Scott County, Kansas, before running away to be on his own. Up to this time, he had gone by the given name of Elmer, but now adopted the name of Ed "so my folks couldn't find me." He worked in a livery stable for about one and a half years at Great Bend, (Barton County) Kansas, for a Bradley Chatal who "was a race horse man and also ran a livery stable."

Leaving Kansas a bit later "for the range country of Colorado" he "arrived in Pueblo on the third day lof January in 1889...with a shoe shine box about 5" x 8" x 10" strapped over my shoulder" and proceeded to make his living in Pueblo and Colorado Springs as a "boot black."

By the fall of 1889, he was employed on the open cattle range in Colorado and Wyoming "following the round up wagon." Specializing with his knife in the technique of neutralizing the reproductive power of the male calves, a technique he had learned early in life from his father on the farm, he remained on the range during the open season of each year until the Fall of 1895.

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During the winter months, he apparently occupied his time with other kinds of work such as carpenter's helper and apparently at one time worked as a janitor in a Federal Court Building where he became fascinated by the criminal trials and spent many hours listening to the presentation of testimony and looked forward with anticipation to the closing arguments of the opposing attorneys as they pleaded their cases before the court.

On September 1, 1895, at the age of 22, he married "Liz" Rader in Russell Springs, Kansas. Here, he continued to live until this marriage ended in divorce about three years later.

He again returned to the cattle range country around Pueblo and Colorado Springs with his activities ultimately including Participation in trailing a herd of Cattle up to Abudeen, South Dokota.

Remaining in South Dakota for a time "herding sheep," he later drifted down into the panhandle area of Nebraska. He worked on the old "101" Ranch in Eastern Wyoming and in the portion of the Sand Hills area of West Nebraska which later became known as the old "Spade" Ranch.

At or near Gordon, Nebraska, in south 1901, he met Kittie Moss, daughter of William Greenberry and Miranda Parks Moss, who had migrated from Indiana with the Rev. J. W. Scammahorn colony in 1885.

A short time later, she was to return with her parents to Indiana because of the failing health of her mother due to a damaged heart valve. He made his way to Indiana also in the Fall of 1903 and he and Kittie Lieuella Moss were married at the home of her parents near Linton, Indiana, on Christmas Day, December 25, 1903.

He had secured a surface job at the Antiock Coal Mine, located about 20 miles northwest of Linton, and was working there at the time of their marriage. He continued working there until April, 1904, when the couple returned to Gordon, Nebraska, in Sheridan County.

Here, they did tennant farming on shares "on the old Lulu place" about seven or eight miles south and east of Gordon, where their first son (E. Clinton) was born December 24, 1905. They also farmed on a place about a mile south of the Gordon cemetery on the west side of the road and later on a farm owned by Dan Hill located about four miles due south of Gordon (on the east side of the road).

From about 1909 to 1911, they worked on the Dan Hill "V V Bar" Ranch located some 28 miles south of Gordon; for over a year on the "North Place" and for a shorter time on the "South Place."

In about 1911, they filed, under the Kinkaid Homestead Act of October, 1904, on 480 acres located in the Sandhills about 16 miles south and 4 miles east of Gordon. The legal description was "Range 41. Township 30, No and S.E. of Section 1, Sheridan County, Nebraska.". The east side of the property bordered on Cherry County. It consisted of rolling Sandhill grazing land.

Here, they built a four room home, a barn and other improvements and raised livestock, primarily cattle, with a few head of horses. They milked six to eight cows most of the time and produced enough butter to meet their own needs and sell

some to markets in Gordon. They also had a rather large flock of brown Leghorn chickens which produced eggs for the household and an extra quantity for sale. The Leghorns were rustlers, ranging far out for insects for food. Brown were preferred over the whites because the whites had a much greater tendency to attract chicken hawks with the accompanying loss of the producing hens.

To help bolster the limited income of the homestead, Ed secured a contract from the U.S. Postal Department to carry a star route from the rural Sandhill post office (first "Childers" and later "Hinchley") to Gordon and return three times each week on Tuesdays, Thrusdays and Saturdays.

Until near termination of the contract in late 1916, the route was covered by horse drawn vehicles consisting of a light, one seat, top buggy in the hot summer months, an open spring wagon or an enclosed cab with sliding doors, custom built by Ed himself over a carriage chassis for the late fall and winter months.

During the last year or so before the project ended, a Maxwell Touring Car was purchased to cover the route but it gave endless trouble because it was not built to cope with the long hard pulls made necessary by the unimproved, loose sandy roads on the south portion of the route and it was forever breaking down with damaged bearing in the differential.

Ed's wife, Kittie, who frequently drove a team on a mower during the haying season or assisted with other outdoor work, was an official substitute and covered the route many times when Ed was busy with haying, building fence, repairing the wind mill, cultivating potatoes or corn on rented farm land

nearer the Niobrara River, or assisting some neighbor with a special project, such as calf branding or "breaking" horses.

The two older children, Clint (Elmer Clinton) and Lee (Ernest Lee) attended Sheridan County rural shoool, District 138, by riding their ponies (provided by their dad with considerable pride), a distance of about three miles while the younger son, Glen Noble, would remain with his mother at home or accompany her on the route. Their father served as an officer on the shoool board for at least one term. Teachers of the district included a widow lady by the name of Grace Geddes, who lived on a homestead over east in Cherry County (commuting each week day by team and buggy) and later a Miss Etta Green of Gordon.

In about 1916, the family sold the homestead for \$2,880.00, or about \$6.25 per acre, to Fay Hill (the recorded deed shows it was registered in the name of Fay's mother, Myra), son of Dan Hill of the old "V V Bar" ranch and moved to Glenrock, Wyoming, where Ed worked as a carpenter and teamster. About a year later, the marriage was dissolved and Ed returned to Nebraska again settling at Gordon where he worked as a teamster, independent contractor, carpenter, trucker and ranch hand until about 1934, when he suffered a light stroke resulting temporarily in almost complete loss of speech.

This was followed by a period of time on the sea shore on the west coast of lower California. This he credited for greatly helping him to recover his voice as well as his physical stamina.

On July 4, 1918, following his return from Glenrock, he had married Daisy Leach at Hot Springs, South Dakota, but the marriage had lasted only a short period of two or three years.

A spry, erect, resourceful man of about 5'10" and weighing between 155 and 160 pounds in the prime of his life, he had, prior to the light stroke at the age of about 61, seldom, if ever, known a sick day. He had an unconscious tendency to view others less fortunate in this regard with a skeptical eye--as perhaps just wanting to get out of doing some "honest work."

He prided himself on hai physical agility, had been an excellent ice skater in his youth, was a good dancer who liked to waltz and two step. During his home-steading days in Nebraska, he was frequently enlisted to "call" for the country square dances. He could "clog," was a good swimmer and horseman, a good shot with a gun and liked to fish but never gave too much time to hunting or fishing because of his feeling that there were too many more important things to be done.

He was handy with a saw and hammer and had done much of his own carpenter work in constructing the building on the Sandhill homestead. He had erected a large wooden supply tank by the "Eclipse" windmill and had piped running water underground to the stock tank near the barn and into the kitchen when other homesteaders' wives were still carrying water in buckets from the family pump.

For one who had not progressed beyond the 4th grade, he read lots and was quite adept at figures.

He believed that a man should be willing to work for a living and should take care of the things he acquired, including improvements on his land, his fences, his livestock as well as machinery and other equipment. To put a cultivator or flow away without first applying a heavy coat of grease to the shining surface of the blades to protect against rust and corrosion was to him a capital offense as was the mistreatment of dumb animals. He was of the firm conviction that a building worth constructing should have the protection of paint and the tendency among many of the homesteaders to neglect this detail was to him a constant source of personal irritation.

He was forthright in manner, believed in speaking his mind and was never accused of being overly tactful or diplomatic in his dealings with others. If a man owed him money and was slow to pay, he had little patience and believed that one of the more effective ways of taking care of the matter was to dun the individual orally, in public before his friends. While such a practice frequently worked, he gained few friends by the use of such techniques.

Although there were times when some inner feelings of love and compassion showed through his more abrupt exterior, these occasions seemed rare. He was self confident and had a tnedency toward impatience with others. The above traits, no doubt, explained in part at least his lack of success in matrimonial ventures; his first marriage lasting scarcely three years, his second lasting much longer but still terminating by the end of the lith year, and a thrid marriage ending in divorce within a period of only two or three years.

Although he spoke of his desire that his children be well educated, his contributions toward such goals were very limited following the termination of his second marriage. He enjoyed talking with his neighbors or even casual acquaintances. He prided himself on his judgment of "horse flesh" and was willing to discuss a horse trade at any time if he thought the other fellow had an animal worth consideration.

He had no time for any man not willing to work for a living and believed everyone willing to work was entitled to "three square meals a day and a place to sleep." He complained bitterly when at the age of 60 he was denied his seasonal employment at the Scottsbluff Sugar Factory "because you are too old for us to carry on our payroll."

Although he was physically agile to the last week of his life, senility, which had no doubt been hastened by the earlier partial stroke and a later sun stroke he had suffered while raking hay on the Fawn Lake Ranch south of Gordon in 1942, prevented him from leading the more vigorous, independent life that had previously been his.

His later years were spent in nursing homes, the last being the Paul Littrell Nursing Home at Emerson, Nebraska, where he had remained for about seven years. Here, he suffered a broken hip in an accidental fall due to failing eyesight and died two or three days later on April 27, 1963, at the St. Joseph Mercy Hospital in Sioux City, Iowa, of complications developing following the accident.

His funeral was in Emerson, Nebraska, and his burial in Rosehill Cemetery at Emerson, April 29, 1963. He had attained the age of 90 years and 28 days. His grave, located near the southwest corner of the cemetery, has a marker placed in 1965.

Thank you for the copy of the notes on questions asked of Jane Belknap by John Sherman of Hollywood, California, and for the copy of your letter of August 25, 1968, to Carol Anne Belknap c/o her grandmother, Jane Belknap, of Des Moines, Iowa. A recent long hand note from Jane indicates she was very pleased that you would take time to write Carol such a nice and helpful letter. She feels quite hopeful that Carol's DAR application will now be accepted.

Thank you too, for your memo of August 26, regarding Tamar Vinton. I was especially glad to get the specific identity of Tamar's mother from among the three wives of her father.

I have read with interest your memo of August 29 and thank you for it. I note your remarks in paragraph (3) regarding the U.S. Census reports covering Jonas Belknap in 1800 in Ontario County N. Y. I fail to follow the contention of Gladys Gray that the Jonas of Charleston, Ontario County, for 1800 could not have been our Jonas N. Belknap, because of ages of daughters etc. Actually I find the reportsfits the membership of the family of our Jonas N. in every respect. You state that Gladys has pointed out that Charleston (now Lima) N. Y. was in Livingston County, not Ontario County. But in 1800 there was not a Livingston County in N. Y. The county, according to my information, wasn't even formed until 1821 and Charleston, now Lima, was a part of the Ontario County as of 1800 as indicated by the U.S. Census report for 1800. Actually, as I survey the map, Charleston (now Lima) was probably not more than a dozen miles from Honeoye, N. Y. where where our Jonas appeared in the record at a later time.

But to get back to the report itself. Here are the reports for the 1800 Ontario County census as reported by John Sherman in a latter to Jane Belknap under date of April 2, 1968: the key for both reports being (0 < 10) (10 < 16) (16 < 26) (26 < 45) & (Over 45):

Regarding Paragraph(4) of your August 29 memo, I surely agree that more research is needed on the Ebenezer record. Sounds too much like some one trying to go out of his way to show this family to have set an all time record for longevity.

Regarding your Query as to whether I would be willing to contact another Belknap in Lincoln regarding genealogical data. Yes, of course. I suspect the subject may be Lacy Belknap. Should this be the case I'm not sure how much help we may get. Lacy is a really fine person and has a splendid family but could care less about any serious attention to genealogical data. He is, according to Jane Belknap, a descendant of Elisha. Such data as he has would, I suspect, be based on work done by Glen Evans. But, anyway give me the name and what background you have on the individual and I'll be glad to follow through.

Your memo of September 7, 1968, was here when I came home from the office last evening. I read the entire set of enclosures over twice. It was facinating - much better that any ordinary detective story! Excellent detection on the part of Claudia Marshall! And thank you for taking time to tie every thing together so well in your final summary.

The task of tracing the descendants of Jonas Newton B. is a hard one. I can be sure of a complete record of the descendants of his son Jesse, my great grandfather, for this record has been kept scalously by the women in our branch of the family. Elsewhere I have all too little information, but am beginng to make some headway. . . So XXXX I welcome your aid on the descendants of Elijah.

For that reason I enclose copies of HWB's sheets for Elijah and his descendants. They bear the identifying numbers given to them by HWB: starting with #657 for Elijah. Where an asterisk precedes the name of a child, there is a subsequent card for that child. As you can see, the data are scanty — but they may be helpful to you. There is far from complete agreement with Evans, as you'll note. But HWB's information came largely from secondary sources, too; so heaven knows what's correct.

Here are some bits of information from records sent to me from Ontario County, N. I.

History of Ontario County, "Town of Richmend" 1788-1876, (N. H. McIntosh (I think CIB) page 453 - "April 5, 1796, election of town officers; Constable and Cellector; Jones Belkmap. He was also on Committee for Schools."

(before 1796)

This makes it seem that Evans may be in error in saying "In 1798 he and his wife were admitted to the First Presbyterian Church of Worcester, Otsego County, N. Y." I can place Jonas and Esther at other towns in vicinity of Albany, but not at Worcester. There was at that time another Jonas Belknap whom I have not yet identified. CYB

1800 Census, Ontario County, shows Jonas Mi at Honeoye, aged 26 to hh, with a wife aged 26 to hh (which agrees with birth dates of Jonas and Eather), 1 son 16-25, 3 sens under 10, 3 daughters 10-15, 1 daughter under im 10. Considering great inaccuracy of early census records, this is pretty good identification.

On Jan. 5, 1810, Jones sold 100 acres for \$400, to Jana and Daniel Taylor, in Bristol.

Between 1800 and IERE his son Samuel married Sarah Jones. On April 19, 1810, she and "friend Abijah Wright" were granted letters of administration, of Samuel's estate. (That name "Abijah Wright" seems familiar to me; but I can't seem to recall where I've seem in in my files,) The 1810 shows Sarah (as "Sally") with two daughters under 10 Consus

1810 Consus shows Jones at Bristol, now aged over 45, with wife over 45, 2 sons 10-15, 1 son 10-15, 2 sons 10-15, (It also shows his brother Seth, at Honeoye, with wife and one son 16-25.)

1820 Consus shows both Elisha and Elijah, at Honeoye. . . Elijah and his wife both aged 16-25, and 1 son under 10 and one daughter under 10. (Agrees with marriage date of Jan. 1806 in HWB record.)

Pension record in Nat. Archives, as you know, shows Jonas living at Naples in 1818 — in southern part of Ontarios county, what is still called "the Garlinghouse area — so plainly he lived at three me known places while in Ontario County.

I hope you can help establish the parentage of the Garlinghouse girls -- Catherine, Jame, Mary Ann. Assumed to be sisters, but I have seen no real proof. Ontario County was check full of Garlinghouses in those days. I haven't attempted to unscramble all of them.

MEMO TO B Clinton Belknap FROM Carrell Belknap

RE Tawar Vinton

Before I try to answer your memo of Aug 20, I should apologize for not keeping you fully informed on what I've been doing on this subject. But I'm sure that you know, by this time, that I don't regard my disbelief of a statement as an excuse for failing to continue searching until definite proof or disproof has been found.

On April 14 I wrote you that I had found an HWB record of a marriage of Tamar Vinton and a Jonas Belkmap in Juniata, Mich — and that he had doubted a death date. At the time, I thought he was referring to the date of Tamar's death. But when, later, I succeeded in making a very probable identification of that Jonas, I found that the date HWB had doubted was for Jonas, not for Tamar. So I made a note to check the Vinton Genealogy on which HWB's sheet was based.

Later, in Boston at the NEHGS library, I did theck the Vinton genealogy — Vinton Memorial — and told you about this in a memo dated 5/11, in which I gave the date of Tamar's marriage/ to Asa Newton: 25 January 1789 — adding that no date was shown for a second marriage to a Jonas Belkmap. What I now see I failed to do was to name the place of Tamar's births Charlton, Mass. (as you'll see if you reread the second line of the typed page you attached to your memo of Aug 20) — nor did I mention her family's later move to Granby — nor did I indicate that the date of the marriage to Asa Newton came from the records of Commander Charles Belkmap, who did not identify the Jonas Belkmap who was said to have been her second husband.

Under pressure of time at Boston, I did not search the Commander's detailed note; of sources, to find where he got his information on Tamar's first marriage. This, I thought, could be done later, when I get the NEHOS to lend me his records (which I'm not yet ready to tackle properly). At the time, I made a note that the obvious next step was to find a Newton record on Tamar — not easy, as the old published Newton genealogy gives no aid.

So I had to try to find a present-day Newton who is engaged in work on Newton genealogy. This took time, through correspondence with Belknaps who have Newton blood in their veins. But last week I was able to write to a Newton in Massachusetts, asking for help on this problem. I hope she replies — and will let you know what I get from her if she gives me anything that is helpful. I'm not too hopeful of her cooperation, in the light of what has been said to me about her.

That brings you up to date on my activities. Now for your memo of Aug 20.

Obviously, you are right about the reading "Tanney." At the time when I had the complete photowopy of Jonas N's pension papers — about six or seven feet of them — I was searching for evidence of his birth date, and didn't look carefully sh at what I assumed was the oft-mentioned "Fanny" and Diantha, except to note that he did not state plainly that Diantha was his daughter. Your sharp eyes caught what I missed seeing. And of course you are right in saying that the age giren for "Tanney" matches the birth date for Tamar Vinton. (Incidentally, I forgot to say, aboves that the Vinton Memorial shows her as daughter of Abiathar's second wife, Rachel Caswell.)

You may be right in surmising that the clerk who wrote the deposition in Kentucky in 1920 wrote "nn" instead of "m" or "mm." Certainly I should continue to search for confirmation.

But I think I must now play devil's mindex advocate and state a possible INTIX (but INTIX equally hypothetical) case against your surmise.

- (1) Your surmise presupposes that the "a" in "Tammy" would be a flat "a" as in "Fanny." But as far as I am amare, all known pronunciations of Tamar in England and in early New England had a long "a" -- Taymer. Had I noted what you did, I wouldn't have thought of "Tammy" with a short "a". I'd have thought that the "T" was a miscopying of an "F" -- that is, an uncompleted "F".
- (2) The document in the archives is not the wright original signed by HMM Jones, but a copy made later by the clerk who forwarded it to Washingon. (The earlier application in the Archives, made at Phelps, N. Y. in 1818, is an original bearing Jones's signature.) In making this copy that clerk made a number of errors which he corrected in his own handwriting.
- (3) It is just as plausible to assume that he miscopied an "F" as a "T" as it is to assume that he wrote "nm" for "mm." In the handwriting of that period, capital "F" was most often (though not always) written exactly as a "T" -- but with a cross-bar. Unfortunately, the document you sent me does not contain even one capital "F".

Now of course this is more hair-splitting. I'm just trying to keep you from being too excited by your discovery of that "T". I still face the need of finding some factual evidence.

Here are some points that have been in my mind for many months.

- (1) Tamar's family lived at Granby, a few miles from Bolohertown, when she was a child. It was "from tranby" that Jonas and his father emlisted in May 1775. Jonas was then 16 -- Tamar was he might have known her there.
- (2) One of her brothers (this is also shown in the mixer typed page you sent to me) is known to have moved from Granby to south central New York, near Binghamton some distance from Ontario County, but near enough to make me wonder if Tamer and Asa Newton accompanied him (as so often happened in familes in those days and might wall have happened if Asa was a younger son who did not inherit land at Granby).
 - (3) Cynthia, daughter of Jonas N is known to have married a Newton -- who is daid to have been with Jonas at the time of his teath in Kentucky. So there is a known contact by Jonas with a Newton.
 - (4) The wife living with Jonas N. in Ontario County 1800 and 1810 was the right age (census) to have been Eather Barker but not Tamar Vinton.
 - (5) In all of the pension papers of Jonas N. there is no mention of "Fanney" and Diantha before 1820.
 - (6) As Cynthia was probably born circa 1805, possibly 1802 or \$ 1803, it is not likely that she married before Jonas left Ontario County. Hough I still have no evidence of the place of her marriage, it seems reasonable to guess that she accompanied Jonas when he left NI State and met and married Isaac Nowton in Kentucky.
 - (7) If Jonas married Tamar Vinton, it too was likely to have been in Kentucky.

Guesswork, much of it. But what I have to do is to trace the movement of Tanar Vinton Newton from Granby, Mass. to somewhere in Kentukky (maybe) — which can be done only by tracing her husband Asa Newton and finding when and where he died.



That "only" in the last line on the preceding page was a poorly chosen word. There are other ways, of course, but they are very unlikely in Kentucky at that time. My one best hope is to find a Newton report that will yield the facts we need — or prove something else.

This brings you up to date on my searches. Wish me luck.

I see I haven't played fair. For complete honesty, I should state my reasons for remaining skeptical till definite proof is found.

(1) My own branch of the family has maintained continuous effort on Belknap genealegy for many years, so that we have the facts on more than 500 descendants of Jesse, Elijah's brother. The records of this branch cover the years in Kentucky. Early in this century man two members of my branch formed a family association devoted to research in genealogy. This was the source of much that is in HWB's records and in other sets of records. There is no mention of Tamar Vinton Newton in any of the work that has been done by my branch in part the past 100 years — nor in what is now being done/ by my Pacific Coast cousins.

(But perhaps the only child of Jenas likely to leave an identification of his wife in Kentucky might have been Cynthia. I can always hope that suddenly I'll receive a query from a descendant of Cynthia, as I did from a descendant of Susannah. I never know what the next mail will bring — from people who happen to have heard of what I'm doing.)

- (2) Of the Belkmap generic ists who have known about Tamars alleged second marriage to a Jonas Belkmap, the only one who thought it might be Jonas Newton B was Clenn Evans. HWB didn't think so. Neither did Commander Charles.
- (3) The fact that the Vinton Memorial, published many years ago, says that Tamar's second husband was a Jones Belkmap is not valid evidence. When such statements are made without any supporting data, the common assumption is that they are based on mere hearsay. Such of what one finds in published genealogies is of dubious nature. I've had to learn to look for verification before accepting unsupported statements, for I find that top-flight professional genealogists are rather scornful critics of much of what can be found in books, including local histories too. So I'm wary, perhaps because I, too, have made so many mistakes in past years.

MEMO TO E. Clinton Belknap FROM Carroll Belknap

Today, by roundabout wags, I received a long letter from a descendant of Jonas (son of Jonas Newton B.) and Mary Ann Garlinhouse. It contains some information that interests me and may be of value to you.

- (1) It lists the children of Jonas Newton B. and Esther Parker just as in Parker in America and in the old document copied by Elizabeth Jane Starr in 1916 and in the same sequence of eirth (which differs from that set down by Evans) so that I'm questioning the birth date given by Evans for your ancestor Elijah. Do you have other proof of that date?
- (2) It omits the "Rester" named by Evans; and shows that the daughter Esther married Gamalial Garlinghouse. As I said in the last page of my memo to you dated 3/20, I supposed this was just a bit of typical Evans confusion of names and dates. I can probably varify the marriage of Esther and Gamalial G., in Ontario County records; will try to do so. Will you agree to scratch "Rester"?
- (3) It adds to the present confusion on Orin (Orrin?) by saying that he married Mancy Starr. Other records in my possession show him as having married Anna Draper, Mary Draper, Naumi Carpenter. In my files there is a lot of correspondence with a managemental absolutedrin, which I have not yet had time to untangle.
- (h) It says that the daughter Cybthia married Isaac Newton. This is interesting. If there is proof that Evans was right when he said that En Isaac Newton was the admistrator of Jonas Newton B's estate, then we can place Cynthia and her husband rith or near Jonas Newton B. at the time of his death.

So we now have from various sources the names of the spouses of all of the children of Jonas Newton B. I can vouch for the marriages of the following: Samuel; Elijah; Jesse; Susannah; Jonas, The name of Elisha's spouse (Lucy Finch) rests on Evens, unless you have other evidence. AndOrrin's marriage or marriages still need study. Meanwhile, I'll attempt to get verification on spouses of Esther and Cynthia.

As to "Diantha" - I've already given you my reasons why (if she was 9 years old in 1820, as stated by Jonas N.) she could not have been his legitimate daughter. (One sad error often made by Evans, which renders his work worthless to the Mormond, is that he did not distinguish between children of different spouses.)

THE NAME AND FAMILY OF BELKNAP OR BELNAP

The name of BELKNAP or BELNAP is believed to have been derived from the residence of its first bearers at a place of that name in England and to have been taken from the words beal, meaning "a passage between hills", and knap, meaning "a low hill or knoll". It is also possible that the first part of the name was derived from the French belle, meaning "beautiful", but the former theory is the more probable. The name is found in ancient English and early American records in the variant spellings of Bealknap, Bealeknappe, Bealenap, Bealnappe, Belknappe, Belknappe, Belknappe, Belknappe, Belknappe, Belknappe, Belknappe, Belknappe, Belknappe, Belknap, and others, of which the form last mentioned is that most generally in use in America today, although the form immediately preceding it also is still occasionally to be found.

Families of this name were resident at early dates in the English Counties of Kent, Warwick, Hertford, Sussex, and London and were, for the most part, of the landed gentry and nobility of Great Britain.

One of the earliest known lines of the family in England was that of Sir Robert Belknap of County Kent, before the year 1377, who was attainted about eleven years later and banished to Ireland. By his wife, Juliana, daughter of John Dorset or Darset, he had at least one son, named Hamon Belknap, to whom the lands in England were This last mentioned Sir Hamon Belknap was the restored. father by his wife, Joan, daughter of Thomas Boteler, of three sons, John, William, and Henry, each of whom inherited in turn the lands in County Kent, but the first two died without issue. Henry Belknap, the youngest of the three brothers, made his home in County Sussex and was the father there by his wife, Margaret, daughter of Richard Knowls or Knolles, of five daughters, Ann, Elizabeth, Mary, Griselda, and Alice, and of one son, Sir Edward, who was the father by his wife, Alice (surname unknown), of at least one son, also named Edward, who resided in Warwickshire.

Other early records of the family in England mention
Robertus or Robert Bealknap of 1369, who was possibly the
same as the above-mentioned Sir Robert Belknap; Johane or
Joan Bealknap, who was maid of honor to the Queen in 1422;
Philip Belknap, Mayor of Canterbury, who died in 1457; and
Symon Belknap of Kent and Essex Counties about the same time.

According to historians, the American Belknap or Belnap family traces its descent from one Beltoft, alias Belknap (Christian name unknown), who was the father, in Hertfordshire in the latter fifteenth or early sixteenth century, of three sons, John, Edmond, and Henry. Of these, Henry had issue by his wife, Elizabeth, of Richard and Alice, of whom the first had issue by his wife, Elizabeth, of Bennet or Bennett, Alice, and Josias. Of these, Bennet or Bennett was married in 1586 to Grace Adam or Adams and had issue by her of Abraham, Frances, John, Daniel, and Josias, of whom the first emigrated to America probably about 1635 (or certainly before 1637) and became the ancestor of most, and probably all, of the families of the name in America.

The immigrant Abraham Belknap or Belnap settled first at Lynn, Mass., and removed soon afterward to Salem, in the same colony. By his wife, Mary, whom he married in England about 1620, he left at least five children, Abraham, Samuel, Joseph, John or Jeremy, and Hannah. No record of the descendants of Jeremy has been found.

Abraham, probably the eldest son of the immigrant Abraham, came with his parents to America. It has been related that he took the oath of allegiance at Haverhill

in 1677, but very little else is known of him although he may have been the ancestor of one Abraham Belknap who died at Johnston, R.I., in 1820 at the age of ninety-two years.

Samuel, son of the immigrant Abraham, came over with his parents and was married before 1653 to Sarah, daughter of Robert Jones of Hingham, Mass. He made his home first at Salem and later at Haverhill and may also have owned land at Easthampton, L.I. The children of Samuel by his wife, Sarah, were Mary (died in infancy), another Mary, Abraham, Samuel, Joseph, Patience, and probably Ebenezer.

Abraham, eldest son of Samuel, of Salem and Haverhill, was married in 1691 to Elizabeth Ayer, by whom he had issue of Mary, Hannah, Samuel (died young), Abraham, another Samuel, Elizabeth, Jeremiah, Nathaniel, Jedidiah, Thankful, and Experience, all but the first three of whom were born at Framingham, Mass., where this branch of the family settled and flourished.

Joseph, son of the immigrant Abraham, made his home at Boston, Mass., and was first married there about 1657 to Ruth, daughter of Nathaniel Williams. By this first marriage he left issue of Joseph, Mary, Nathaniel, and Elizabeth. Before 1668 he married, as his second wife, Lydia, daughter of Francis Ingalls, by whom he had only

one child, a daughter who died young; and sometime before 1670 he took a third wife, Hannah, daughter of Thomas Meakins, and had further issue by her of Thomas, John, Hannah, Ruth, Abigail, and Abraham.

Joseph, eldest son of the first Joseph of Boston, was the father by his first wife, Deborah, daughter of Jeremiah Fitch, whom he married before 1684, of Mary (died young), Joseph, and Jeremy or Jeremiah. In 1690, he married again. His second wife was Abigail, daughter of Thomas Buttolph, by whom he had issue of Thomas, Abigail, Mary, Nicholas, Buttolph, Nathaniel, Ruth, Elizabeth, Lydia, and Abraham.

Thomas, son of the first Joseph of Boston, was married about 1694 to Jane, (who was probably a daughter of Thomas Cheney of Roxbury and Cambridge, Mass.,) and, at Woburn, Mass., became the father of Thomas, Jane, Benjamin, Hannah, Samuel, Joseph, and at least one other daughter who died young. Of these, the sons Thomas, Benjamin, Samuel, and Joseph settled at Newburgh, N.Y., in the first half of the eighteenth century and founded the New York line of the family.

The descendants of these and other branches of the family in America have removed to practically every part

of the Union and have aided as much in the advancement of the nation as their ancestors did in its founding. On the whole, the record of the Belknaps and Belnaps in the United States is that of a courageous, strong-willed, pious, patriotic, and resourceful race. Representatives of the family have won distinction in the service of their country.

Among those of the name who fought in the War of the Revolution were Sergeant Joseph, of Massachusetts; Ensign William, of New York; Lieutenant William, of New York; Lieutenant Ezekiel, of New Hampshire; Lieutenant Jacob, of Rhode Island; Captain John, of New York; Captain Ebenezer, of Massachusetts; Captain Samuel, of Massachusetts; and numerous others from the various New England States.

Robert, Thomas, John, Henry, Edward, Josias, Abraham, Samuel, Joseph, Nathaniel, Benjamin, Ebenezer and William are some of the Christian names favored by the family for its male progeny.

A few of the members of the family who have distinguished themselves in America at various times are:

Jeremy Belknap (1744-1798), of Massachusetts, Congregational clergyman.

William Worth Belknap (1829-1890), of New York and Washington, D.C., military officer and son of General W. G. Belknap.

George Eugene Belknap (1832-1903), of New Hampshire. naval officer.

Reginald Rowan Belknap (b. 1871), of Massachusetts. naval officer.

William Burke Belknap (b. 1885), of Kentucky, member of the Kentucky House of Representatives and educator.

The coat of arms of the English family of Belknappe or Belknap is described in heraldic terms as follows (Burke, General Armory, 1884):

Arms, -- "Azure, three eagles in bend between two cottises argent."

Thank you for the copy of the note from Fern Martin regarding Gamaliel Belknap. Yes he is a son of Elijah.

Yes you surely did send me the subsequent sheets on Elijah. I feel very guilty for not having commented more on this at an earlier time. I was delighted to get it although it opened up the horizion considerably more on unfilled blanks in the genealogival record so far as Elijah's children are concerned. I have given considerable attention and study to the data carried on the Elijah sheets themselves and on the subsequent sheets on the individual children.

I had previously been aware of only four children for sure, namely: James M., Gamaliel, Joseph Gillett and Mary. At one time my old Aunt Anna Belknap of CedarVale, Kansas, had told me of an Amazilia but later when I tried to get better confirmation the lady who was writing aunt Anna's letters for her (Because Anna had lost most of her sight) commented that apparently Aunt Anna had been mistaken and closed the issue. Since there was an Amazilia who was the oldest child of James G. I assumed that pernaps Aunt Anna had got them mixed up and dropped any more follow up. James' Amazilia died as a very young child.

I have checked the entire Elijah Belkmap household (excluding Amanda tono had alreday married and left the home) including Elijah and his wife Cathering and they check out 100% with the 1830 USmCensus for St. Alban's Township, licking County, Thio so far as sex and numbers of members are concerned and checked out so far as age classifications are concerned also except that Esther's age classification as carried would have made her a year younger than she actually was according to HWB's dates and put Amazilla in a bracket that would make her a couple of years younger than she really was. This however I consider pretty close for a census record of that era.

Anyway I am convinced that the list as given by HWB is correct and I am adding Amanda, Samuel, Amazilla, Esther and Jonas to my original list. So, any auxilary information you may have or come upon for any of the enewly added members will be deeply appreciated.

Incidentally, I checked our Jonas/Belknap household against the the 1800 Charleston, OntarionCounty, N. Y. US Census and it checked out 100 all the way!

Have been making some adjustments in my family record sheets on the family groups in our direct line from Abraham in keeping with some of the data carried in the HWB sheets you sent me May 31, this year.

In arecent memo to you I referred to a Reva Barrett. I checked her out with Jane Belknap and she is connected with the Belknap

family. Jane said she passed away about five years ago. She had been a librarian at Pullman, Washington. Jane thought at some college. She was the great granddaughter of George and Keturah Penton Belknap. Her mother's name was Katherine Christian Barrett, it was stated. Revais last known address:

A provoking thought: Did Jonas Beiknap marry Isaac Newton's widowed mother? It might tie together rather well. Tamar Vinton had first married Asa Newton. Isaac is reported to have married Cynthia, the youngest daughter of Jonas. This should have placed Isaac Newton on pretty close terms with both Jonas and his wife Tammy and the appointment of Isaac as Executor could have followed quite logically.

I am indebted to you for a copy of a memo to Fern Martin of Perris, California, under date of June 30, 1968 with an enclosure photo copy of her communication to you under date of June 26, 1968 re: a statement by G. M Belknap, RRI, Box 157, Jefferson, Oregon concerning the marriage of Esther Belknap to Gamaliel Garlinghouse: also the copy of your memo to Mrs Milton Raymond(Jane) Belknap of Des Moines under date of July 22, 1968 together with a copy of an HWB letter tog a Daniel Belknap in Granville, Cal under date of November 23rd., 1914; and then, today, the copy of the letter from Burton Dassett Parochial Church with your memo dated July 25, 1968 and, in a separate envelope, another memo dated July 26, 1968.

Time and the pressure of obligations do not permit me to do justice to these communications in the way of comments and replies. You are most patient and in due time I shall get at things in a more adequate manner.

I talked with Mrs. Jane Belkmap by phone for some 20 minutes last evening and will try to give her such help as I can. I hope to be in Des Moines a week from tonight and will plan to spend some time with her. In a letter to me under date of 12/23/1964 (or rather I should say in an undated letter, postmarked 12/23/64) she indicated that a Reva KARKELE Barett, a librarian friend in Oregon, who had been in touch XXXXX in 1943, with a Mary Belknap Gordon, then of 605 North Waco Avenue, Wichita, Kansas, about genealogical data on the Belknap family and had provided information about the alleged death and burial of Esther Belknap, wife of Jonas Belknap, in Alexandria, Ohio, in 1817/18. Mrs. Mary Belknap Gordon had told Reva that she, Mrs. Gordon, was a grand-daughber of Richard Belkmap abd Anna Bowman, and the daughter of Walton S. Belknap, all of Colds County, Illinois. KXKAKKA Richard Belknap was the son of Lacy BelknapXXXXX who was a son of Elisha, according to the information given me by Jane Belknap . I did not understand Reva Barett to be a Belknap descendant but rather some one interested in gathering Belinap data. I gather from your memo today that Jane indicated to you that Reva was connected with the Belknap family. I'll have to check this out with her when I see her.

In this same communication from Jane Belknap in 1964, referred to above, she stated that she and her husband had visited Elisha Jr. in Alexandria many years earlier and had visited the cemetery and had actually seen the tombstone of Esther Parker, wife of Elisha. When I asked her last night if she had actually taken down the specific wording on the grave stone at the time, she informed me that she had not — that this was before she was really doing any genealogy work and had not come to appreciate the importance of such recording.

She states that when she tried to revisit the comptery in Alexandria just recently, the grave stone; had been taken up and piled at the back. She indicated that her son Ray, was planning to follow through in attempting to find the stone and if he should I shall ask that we have a photo of same.

One of my problems in keeping the records I am accumulating is how to number the various individuals in the simplest manner, to be able to find and identify members of the various families the respective generations. I'm sure you must have faced this and arrived at some reasonable solution long ago but I am not the accomplishe genealogist that you are. Do you have any syggestions for me? I have started out by assigning a number to each member of the families in the direct line of descentin chronological and numeral sequence in so far as I can determine but it is the number to assign to the off-shoot families that gives me trouble.

In your memo of July 22, 1968, page 2, par. 3, you refer to long hand notes on the Evans manuscript indicating the marriage of Elisha and Lucy Finch as having taken place"in Ohio". Please scratch the entire long hand entry at that place. It was a very serious goof on my part to have made the entry about Ohio being the place of the marriage. I had underlined a line in a memo from Jane Belknap "Ohio - m - 7-1-1808" but in checking back the Ohio should have related MXXXX only to the place of death. The other dates in long hand were meant to relate to the birth date and date of death for Lucy Finch and there was an error here too. The date of death should have read 8/5/1845.

I trust you will bear with me on a point not immediately clear in my mind in relation to the letter received from BurtonDassett. As you may have guessed, I am not a student of heraldry. The point not clear to meassuming that EK Glen Evans didn't know what he was talkning about so far as Edward Belknap having been known as DeBeltofte, is there something in the coat of arms or this letter otherwise to rule out the possibility that there may have been a shift from DeBeltofe to Belknap at some time along the way! It is a bit puzzleing to me how there could have been two distinct Belknap families in England without a common denominator back some where in IXXXXXXXXXX the origin of the name.

Little by little I am getting my records in order so one day in the not too distant future I shall provide you with & copies for your files. And when you have time I should very much like to have the family record sheets on the Belkmaps in your direct line from Jesse. I really have no intent to try to collect the entire Belkmap registry such as is your very worthy objective but perhaps I can make some contributions to your collection and this I shall be most delighted to do.

I shall give more study and offer more comment in response to your memo of July 26 as time pemits but there are two or three observations that I shall offer at this time.

First, may I report that the Elijah Belknap record bears out your contention that the Belknaps went first to Kentucky before going to Ohio and Iowa. James M. a son born in 1809, is listed as having been born in New York. No place of birth for Gamaliel, born 1814 has yet been confirmed by me but my grandfather Joseph E Gillett was born in Kentucky This was confirmed by the 1850 Census for Wapello County, Iowa. May J. is shown to have been born in MMA Ohio, 1830,

Second, John Sherman was searched the Licking County Census records for 1820 without finding any records of the Belknap; but did find records for 1830. Please see copy of John A sherman letter, dated March 17, 1962, to "Dear Mrs. Belknap" (Jane Belknap) forwarded to you June 9, 1968.

Three, I have in my possession a complete copy of all the documents of record in the Jonas Belknap pension file from the Federal Archives in Washington and just to make sure they had sent me everything in the file I pulled the file and personally examined it at a later date when in Washington. But the point I started to make is that an affadavit filed by Jonas 11 Dec. 1820 ends with the following ", , , I have not nor has any person in trust for me any property or securities contracts or debts due me nor have I any income other than what is contained in the schedule hereto annexed and by me subscribed viz property I have none. My family consists of my wife named Fanney aged fifty four years and one daughter Diantha aged nine years. My occupation is coopering and I am very unable to follow the business."

Among the notations by HWB on the summary sheet for Ebenezer (1667) is the statement that the Annals of the "American Academy", in an article on longevity, had said that his was the longest lived family on record. To what "Academy" does he refer? The Academy of Political and Social Sciences?

We have all the volumes of the Annals of the American Acedemy of Political and Social Sciences in the University Library here in Lincoln but they are very poorly indeed, if at all, and it looks like an endless job to find anything in them but I am willing to give it a try if you think that is the publication to which HWB is referring. The first volume wasn't published until 1890 and that was quite a while after the 1837 date given for the comments reported to have been carried in the N.H.Patriot. It would seem that if some one went to the trouble of getting infor mation together of sufficient substance to be published in such a distinguished publication that it should have been backed by fairly good research and might give us some valuable data on members of this family. If you have any suggestions or thoughts on the subject I shall be glad to have them as you have time to comment.

What do you show for the place of death for Samuel, the oldest son of Jonas? Honeoye? In your memo of April 7, 1968, you state that Sarah Jones Belknap, wife of Samuel, was granted letters of Administration for Samuel's estate on April 19, 1810. Was this in Ontario County?

I feel sure that it is the source of the statement by Mrs. Lacy Belknap to the effect that Abraham and two brothers came to America and settled in Massachusetts. We'll know for sure presently.

No. 59 - Am glad to have the suggestion relating to the possibility that Louisa Wright may have been the daughter of Ahijah Wright and Roxanna Parker, sister of Esther. My Aunt Anna listed Louisa's birth place as N. Y. but did not list the names of her parents, if she knew them.

Page 1, par. 2. Since Jonas had been in Kentucky such a short time when he filed his affadavit in December, 1820, stating that his occupation was coopering, I assumed, with considerable justification,

I believe, that he had learned the trade before coming to Kentucky and had practiced it before coming. I shall revise this statement to indicate that he had been known to be a farmer in earlier life.

Page 1, par. 3 - A good suggestion. Am revising to read "now called Lime."

Page 1, last par. - The only record of birth in Kentucky that my records show, so far as I can recall, is for Joseph Gillett Belkmap, 19 July 1826. What other birth records do you have verified for Kentucky?

I based my assumption that the Belknaps could have stopped briefly in Ohio enroute to Kentucky from New York on the fact that I was under the impression that they would have gone through a part of Ohio on their way to Kentucky; Jane Belknap contends that Esther died in Ohio in 1817; as I pointed out to you on page 2 par. 2 of my memo to you under date of December 15, 1968, the record of the David Chatfield (Jonas N's Susannah and family) which you enclosed with your memo of March 22, 1968, shows the place of birth for the son, Rousel, to have been in Ohio in September, 1817; and it seemed quite possible that one of the reasons for leaving Kentucky for Ohio could have been the prior knowledge of the state gained enroute to Kentucky.

Page 2, last par. - The 1820 US Census in Hart County, Kentucky, as I have it from John Sherman records is as follows: in Steridan Mer Horn on

Page 1, last par. On HWB's sheet for Elijah he suggest the possibility that James and Eleanor Garlinghouse were the parents of Catharine, Mary and Jane. I assumed the Kentucky James Garlinghouse to be the same as that to which HWB alluded. The factor of proximinity would seem to lean toward a family near by. It would seem somewhat unlikely that three daughters, without their parents, would migrate alone to the West and all three wind up marrying into one family. I must admit, however, that I don't have the firm evidence to really tie the matter down and if you do I shall quickly yield.

Page 2 My records show the following children of Jonas N. in Ohio in Licking County, in 1830: Jonas, Elijah, Jesse and Ori but the 1840 US Census in Wapello County, Iowa doesn't seem to list Jesse there at that time. It is, of course possible that his name was overlooked in the review of the records by John Sherman.

Page 2. No I haven't reviewed the US Census for 1850 for Davis County, Iowa (Established in 1844). I have, however, visited the area, checked some of the cemeteries and made inquiry of the post master of the small town of Belknap and have inquired of old timers in and around the town only to be told that to the best of their knowledge and memories, no Belknap had ever resided in the community-that the town was named after "General Belknap" (William Worth Belknap) who won distinction as a Civil War general under Sherman, was later, in about 1869, made Secretary of War, later to be impeached, as you already know, I'm sure.

Thanks for providing me with a copy of the Evelyn Belknap outline of her family and your letter to her.

First, let me say "Manks" to all three of you for information you've given me recently — not yet digested nor even acknowledged. In this memo, I'm merely going to summarise where I think we stand, after getting the Walbridge book.

It's going to be obvious that I'm placing heavy reliance on the statements of D B Waits. As all of you know my well-dounded distrust of local histories, I must say I trust Mr Waits. . . First, he himself stated clearly that he relied on evidence, "knowing full well that when we contrivert the long-published data of misinformed and guessed-work historians who have preceded us, we are incurring the displeasure (of descendants of early settlers)? . . . Second, there are continual indications that his statements depend of valid evidence, not on Maxaguar recollection or hearsay. . . Third, whenever he says anything on which I have factual knowledge from other sources, he is entirely correct.

. . So I trust what he says, when it differs from what someone has make also has said.

Now, to begin with, what I'll call FINISHED BUSINESS.

- (1) Proof of parentage of Elisha, for Carol Anne: I have plenty, now.
- (2) The "two Jonas Belknaps": I'm sure you'll agree, nown, that there was only one and that two different census takers caught Jonas in two different places at two different times in 1800. I can write an essay supporting this conclusion, if necessary but by this time all of you have beaten me to it, I'm sure.
- (3) Jonas at Worcester H Y in 1798 I now resume my early disblief. He can't have been in Otsego Co. in that year. The citation of the church record, in Early Settlers of New York State, June-Aug 1939, must contain an error in copying such as turning 1793 into 1798. (Modern historical publications don't command respect merely because they are printed. An issum of Oregon Historical Society journal, for example, says Jesse's son Rensom was born in Hart County, Ky but Ransom himself testified that it was Hardin County.)

Next, the UNFINISHED BUSINESS - and there's lots of it.

- (1) Who was the Rachel --- that Jonas married at some time between June 10 1809 and the taking of the census in Town of Bristol, 1810?
- (2) When did Jonas marry Tamar Vinton between death of Rachel and the date of his pension application in Ky, 18207
- (3) Who was Diantha the "one daughter aged N years" whom he named in that application? Was she daughter of Jones, by Rachel? Or daughter of Tamar, by Asa Newton?
- (4) What were the names of Samuel's children, and dates of birth? After his widow married Artemus Lincoln, did these children take Lincoln name, or retain Belknap name?

- (5) Did Cynthia marry Isaac Newton? I have many reasons for thinking so; but no preef, yet. . . Also, who was Isaac Newton son of?
- (6) What children did Gamaliel Garlinghouse and his wife Esther Bellmap have? We know only one -- Mrs Cynthia Avery.
- (5) What children did Cynthia have? We know only one Cynthia Gilbert (which I'll bet was her married name; Lorenzo Gilbert from Ontario County mentioned by Waite married Jesse's daughter Hannah; a brother of his may have married a daughter of Cynthia).
- (7) When did Elijah, Jonas Jr, Jesse and Gamaliel Garlinghouse and Isaac Newton go to Kentucky? We know only that Jessewas in Hardin County in 1817, when Ranson was born and that the others were EMERICANIES in Hart Co. in 1820 and that Jonas Sr did not leave Ontario Co till late 1819 or early 1820 (although his close associate Stiles Parker was in Ky in 1818).
- (8) What was the parentage of our Garlinghouse girls Catherine, Jane, Mary Ann (Polly)? I have only family tradition for saying they were sisters. I'm betting they (like Gamaliel Garlinghouse) were children of the James(Sr) who was in Ontarie County in 1800 or before and in Ky in 1820. But no proof.

There - that's enough to occupy you, if you have idle time on your hands.

Me, I've got to lay off of you for a moment or so, while I resume pestering other people — to whom I haven't written since last Summer, 1968. Their unanswered latters are stacked deep on my desk.

- PS Lest I forget George May's surmise.
- (9) Was Mrs Elijah Parker (Mary), who died Jan 11 181h at Gorham, the Mary Newton who was Jonas's mother? That is, had she married Esther Parker's father Elijah (sr) at some time after her husband Samuel Belknap died in 1775? Was she the wife shown for Elijah (sr) in 1790 census, Canajoharie? The age at death 76 is OK. But all we know for sure is that the Belchertown church record says she "removed" after Samuel's death. We don't know date of death for Elijah's first wife, Martha Stiles. I think (guess?) she must have been a widow when she died.

I am sure your own immediate family will cherish for generations to come the rich heritage offamily history and information that will be theirs because of your resourceful endeavours -- to say nothing of debt of gratitude from others in the Belknap Tribe!

Speaking of gratitude (or lack of same), I suppose I shall never be able to comprehend the gross lack of expressed gratitude on the part of Carolz Ann Belknap and her family for all the help you provided in helping her establish membership in the DAR. I can understand that her grandmother, Jane's health may well explain her lack of follow up but neither Caroll Ann nor her father, Donald, can offer such excuses. Not too long ago I saw Don in Lincoln one day and he informed me that his daughter was now a fully accepted member of the DAR, based on the data you had provided for her.
