KERNVILLE'S GRAND OLD MAN, JUDGE SUMNER DIES

*Mary Sumner's
father*
Pioneer of the Early Mining
Days Called at Ripe Age
of 92 Years.

JUSTICE FOR 24 YEARS

Lived in Kern County for
Half a Century; Known to
all Old Settlers.

Joseph W. Sumner, pioneer of California and Kern county in the early days, justice of the peace of the First judicial township for a quarter of a century and well-known retired resident, died Wednesday afternoon at his home in Kernville, where he spent more than half his long life. He was aged 92 years and was born in Maine.

Although the weight of years hastened his death, it was not known in Bakersfield until yesterday that he was fatally stricken. Late word from Kernville had not mentioned his illness. Communication with Kernville by wire was cut off yesterday and only meager details of the pioneer's last days were obtainable.

The body was taken to Los Angeles last night for burial, being taken to the train at Caliente, where Charles F. Bennett, Constable Ripley and other pioneers were at the depot to greet the funeral party.

Widow Survives at Advanced Age.

Judge Sumner is survived by his widow, who is well beyond the four score mark in years, but enjoys rugged health. He leaves two daughters, Mrs. Andrew Brown of Los Angeles, the widow of Andy Brown, the well-known Kernville merchant who died some years ago

at a ripe old age, and Mrs. Belknap, who lives at Kernville. Sumner Brown, a ~~grandson~~ ^{grandson}, resides in Los Angeles and came to Caliente to take charge of the funeral party.

Judge Sumner reached Kern county long before this county was carved out of Tulare county. He was in California soon after the discovery of gold and migrated to the Kernville district from Old Coso, then a prominent place in Inyo county.

He at once became prominently identified with the upbuilding of the county. Kernville in those days was the center of great mining activity and Mr. Sumner engaged in mining and freighting. He assumed his place as a leader in the community and was to be found in the front on all important matters coming up in the early days.

Justice for Twenty-Four Years.

His public career as a justice of the peace began in 1879 when he was first elected and he served continuously until 1903, once or twice being re-elected without opposition. Prior to 1879 he was defeated for justice, then a highly important office in the new mining center. He lost in 1871 by two votes to S. S. Merrill, and was an unsuccessful candidate four years later, losing by a narrow margin to F. H. Bennix, whom he defeated later on.

Judge Sumner was one of the old line Republicans. He maintained true to his party's principles throughout his long life. He was regarded as one of the staunchest Republicans of his day, being one of the wheel-horses in Kern county for scores of years. During his earlier days he was identified with the Whig party.

In Bakersfield he was particularly well known to the older residents. He was a frequent visitor here up to the last few years, when his ripe years prevented him from getting around as actively as in his younger days.

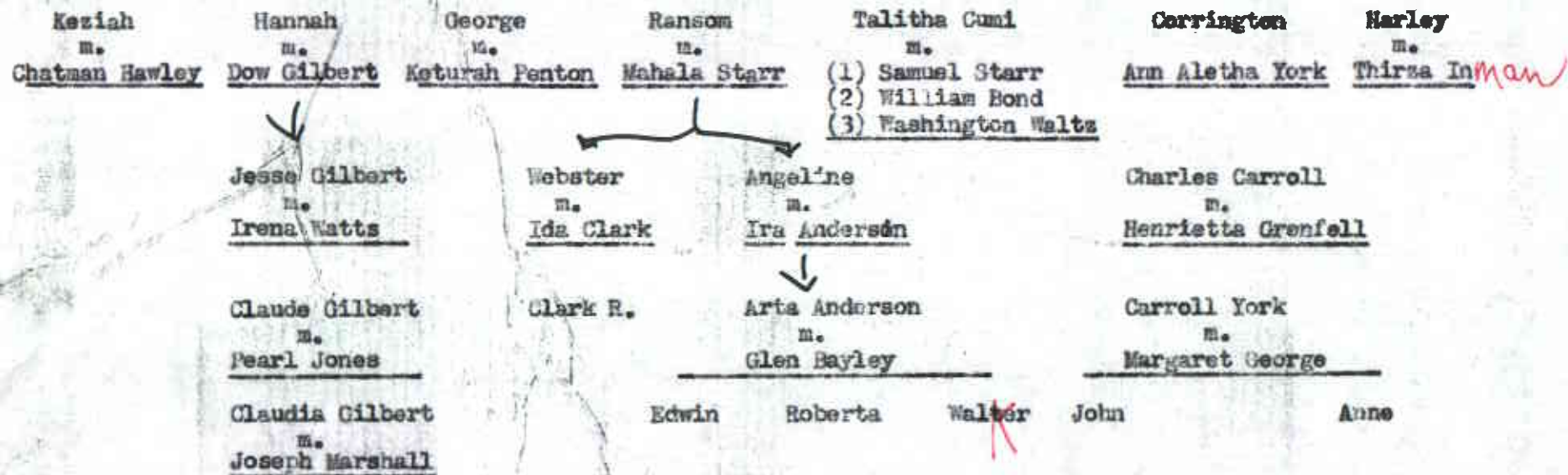

He was one of the charter members of the Southern California Conference. For some years he was Government Indian Agent and missionary on Tule River Reservation, in Tulare county. His first wife died in Santa Barbara, leaving him three daughters, two of whom are now

living in Idaho—Mrs. Forney (Mary E.), at Moscow, and Mrs. Holt (Rosa A.), at Golf; and, one son, Charles, now living in Arizona. In 1882 he was married to Miss Josie Sumner, who now survives him, with their son Fred. For some years Rev. Mr. Belknap has been on the retired list, but whenever his strength would permit he preached with joy to himself and profit to his hearers. He was a good man, much beloved. His sufferings at various times during recent years were intense, and yet he was cheerful. On September 19th he submitted to the surgeon's skill to remove a tumor, but they found him hopelessly in the grip of complications, and he did not rally from the shock of the operation. His body sleeps beside his loved ones gone before in Santa Barbara, while he rejoices at the end of the way, where the toils of the road now seem nothing to him. H. W. W.



Corrington Gavette Belknap was born in Kentucky, August 17, 1829, and died at Los Angeles, September 10, 1906. In Oregon, in 1853, he was married to Miss Ann Althea York, daughter of the Rev. John W. York,* of the Oregon Conference. In 1857 he was admitted to the Oregon Conference and spent twelve years laying the foundations of Methodism in that state. In 1869 he was transferred to the California Conference. In 1875, he was Government Agent for the Tule River Indian

Reservation. The reservation being within the Southern California Conference, he thus became one of its Charter Members, continuing therein with "nothing against him" for thirty-one years, till God called him home. He remained in the Indian Agency for thirteen years, where he greatly advanced the welfare of the Indians. He had taken a medical course, graduating with the degree of M. D. Leaving the Indian Agency in 1888, he again took up the work of the Pastorate, being appointed to the following appointments: Plano, Visalia, Arlesin and Mantalvo. In 1892 his health compelled him to ask for a superannuated relation. In 1889 his wife died. She left with him one son and two daughters; two of whom, the son and one daughter, survive him. On June 21, 1882, he was married again to Miss Josephine Sumner, daughter of Judge Sumner of Kernville, Calif., who with one son born to them, remains to mourn his departure.

Reverend Belknap was a man of sweet disposition; gentle as a woman; but strong in purpose, and of unwavering fidelity in the discharge of duty. His was an unusually transparent character, warm and sympathetic; always cheerful, buoyant in spirit, trustful in the Lord. To know him intimately was to love him. He was a good man, and true; faithful to his trust.
