Here's Virginia Taber's correction of your sheet for Edwin M Belknap, with a copy of her in which I've marked in red the paragraph explaining her changes.

This is a typical case of having to decide which witness to trust. I think Virginia rather than Frank, as women usually more accurate on such matters than men are.

It's a constant problem, once we reach the years in which the numbers of persons are so huge that we can't dig for documentary prooff except when a major error seems likely. At that point, we have to accept what descendants say — unless we have reason to distrust their statements. And when the descendants differ, we have to choose between them — or else stop to dig for documents, which is warranted when the problem involves lines of dexcent of many people, as it did in the case of the record of children and grandchildren of Joseph Belknap and Prudence Morris, when we found all records hopelessly garbled. The years of work on that tough job required assembling mat (I'll guess) more than 100 original documentary records, but the effort was justified. . . . 100? No. Probably more like 200, I think.

Meanwhile, the problem of deciding whether or not to accept what a descendant says is always with us. This seems to be especially true of the records of Admiral Charles. I see many things in them that are valuable and acceptable. But I have to warn both you and myself to be wary when his information comes not from documentary sources but from "what someone has said." Glancing through his pages, I see many and many a point on which I know that he merely repeated what someone told him, without further confirmation --- and often what he thus repeated was obviously in error.

A minute or so ago, I happened to look at his page for Orin, son of Jonas Newton Balknap, my great grandfather -- p 76 in the biggest book on descendants of Samuel Belknap and Mary Dickinson. It shows this Orin b in "Cattaraugus County, NY." Now, I know who told the Admiral that, and I know why and how that person thought so. And I also know -- within five yards plus or minus -- the exact spot in Otario County where stood the house in which this Orin was born (on indisputable evidence).

This is just am example. I could name others. But all I'm trying to do is to warn you against copying the Admiral blindly and trustingly. Maybe this one example will be enough -- D hope.

On the other hand, I greatly admire the job the Admiral did in assembling documentary evidence on the early generations (though he flopped badly on Ebenezer and got all miled up on various Samuels). He found a few documents that I hadn't found -- and some of them solve problems that had troubled me till now, such as the date when Samuel B and Mary Newton moved to Massachusetts and the true date when his brother Job did. I'm looking forward to the time when I'll be able to sit down to the job of combining the Admiral's records and mine. I'll be grateful, then, for what is plainly trustworthy -- and I'll be painstakingly cautious when I don't see visible indications of sound sources.

The memo attached deals with the lines of descent of some 200 to 300 Belknaps whose names you do not have. All of them are, in my judgment, descendants of Stephen the youngest brother of my great great grand father Jonas Newton Belknap. They divide into two groups: (1) those who are or were descendants of Stephen by a marriage that may have been bigamous, hence illegitimate; (2)those who are probably but not fully proven to be Stephen's descendants. Of course I can't release the data on them, in my files, until there's more certainty on both groups. . . But I think you should know about this partially solved problem, just in case you encounter it in some form, in the future. (I doubt that you have bumped into it yet.)

It's an old problem. HWB tackled it, and got nowhere because he misunderstood the true nature of the problem. Branklin Belknap's notes contained a fragment of it, which led nowhere. My files had more on it, uselessly, for some years. . . Four or five years ago one of the many requests for aid that come to me was: written by a man who was plainly a good candidate for "most distinguished living Belknap" and knew nothing of his ancestry but the names of his father and mother. Two years later, I was able to prove that he was a descendant of Stephen Belknap son of Samuel Belknap and Mary Newton — and in the past twelve months I've been able to track two other inquiries to a "probable" descent from the same Stephen.

The attached memo, explaining the present status of the problem, may possibly interest you -- even if it only illustrates the nature of much of the workthat has consumed a lot of my time in recent years.

I think I must stipulate that there must be no correspondence with the three persons to whom the memo is addressed. I have no right to expose them to any annoyance beyond having to listen to my views -- with which they may not agree.





Della, my dear --

Don't be stubborn. I couldn't possibly let you pay for the Admiral's work out of your own pocket. I owe too much to your aid and encouragement. When I remember the swift generosity with which you sent me a set of your own records when all you knew about me was that I tackling Belknap genealogy, I'd feel very small if I didn't try to equal your unselfish kindness in this little way. And while you're so busy with your immediate job on your book, don't feel obliged to deal with the various sheets I've been sending to you lately. I'm not in urgent need of a reply. They can wait till you have time for them.

Now -- the points you raise in your letter of 14 Sept:


The sheet showing data from Stiles Ancient Windsor is OK -- as far as it goes. But it's incomplete, like so much of the genealogy in that old book. Local histories, of course, are highly unreliable on genealogy, and this one was no exception -- as professional genealogists have often pointed out. It's not as bad as Ruttenber's old history of Newburgh, which has misled so many people, but it needs careful handling, for Stilesprinted only what he found, which often was only a partial fragment of the story. . . You'll find a better statement on p 6 of the Admiral's second and final book about descendants of Samuel Belknap and Mary Dickinson (the one that has only a single index of names) but he was wrong on Ruth's place in the list of children. She was thild vii, born in 1790 (month and day unknown). Darius, born 1769, was child vi. . . HWB got the information on these two children from old family papers in hands of Job descendants, found by James Kibbe -including Job's comment on the unhappy first marriage of Ruth: "I kept my daughter from the wolves, but the owls got her." (I'm quoting from memory; so the wording may not be entirely accurate). Where the Admiral got Ruth and Darius, I don't know, but the fact that he and HWB, working 20 years apart, got the same results is enough for

You say that you have a Charles "with the children of Job and Phoebe Newton." He doesn't belong there. I'm sure. The Charles Belknap who voted in Enfield in 1849 must have been Charles Kellogg B, son of Francis and grandson of Job Sr. You'll find him on the Admiral's page 24 and page 67 (which gree with HWB).

FRANCIS BELKNAP & HANNAH PRIOR: You say: "Also shown with Job Belknap (Jr) and Hannah was Francis Perley Belknap b 1787 in E Windsor . . . married Hannah Prior." I fear what you are citing must be all mixed up. There was no "Francis Perley." There was a Francis and there was a Parley -- both sons of Job Sr's son Francis -- page 24. Admiral. The Francis who married Hannah Prior (2nd wife) was child ii of the first Brancis (Admiral's p 24) and the Admiral shows his marriages and children on p 62. He and HWB are in complete agreement. So your sheet 352 seems incomplete. . . The list of children on your 352 is same as given by HWB and the Admiral, except they have the son as Edwin Francis, not Francis Edwin.

(I should add that the spelling Perley appears in some sources, but I proved it to be Parley long ago., Not going to take time to look up how I did it, right now.)

Evans is wrong in putting "Francis Perley" in family of Darius and Elizabeth Crane. They had no children. But the vagaries of Evans are beyond human comprehension. Was it he who invented a "Francis Perley"? I wonder.

C. Hawley in Salem and his work at Willamette University closed in 1907. These three references mark the composition as belonging to the opening years of this century, previous to 1907

and most likely in the fall of 1904.

The original manuscript belongs to Willamette University. The university received it in 1931 from the cetate of the late Rev. John Parsons. Dr. Parsons was for many years an eager and persistent seeker after materials dealing with our early history, especially such as pertained to the work of the Methodist Unfortunately, Dr. Parsons left no record of its original acquisition. A portion of chapter six of his book, Beside the Beautiful Willamette, is based upon this parrative and he quotes a few passages from it. He gives her name as Kesiah instead of Ketturah, a mistake which perhaps he fell into by hearing certain members of her family refer to her by that name. Her name in the original manuscript however is clearly Ketturah and members of her family confirm that spelling (not agreeing on the double "T" however). The writing is a bold but often not too steady a hand. Capitalization, punctuation, and spelling are left unchanged.

The writer, Ketturah Belknap, was Mrs. George Belknap. We must apparently be content to know her mainly from this narrative. A reference in it places her birth as of August 11, 1820. She arrived in Oregon from Iowa over the overland route in 1848. Her life was long in the pioneer land for she was writing this delightfully vivid narrative some 16 years later. The scant references we have found give no details of her life. The manuscript has a marginal note reading: "to be continued—if you want any more let me know and in the next chapter will organize the first class Read this in Connection with the first Chap

I sent." Its first page is missing.

Dear Della:

Your inquiry about an alleged "Eliza Belknap":

As you weren't able to make a copy for me of the Evans material in your possession, I have to assume that the quoted passages in your letter of 6/12 come from an Evans version of some of Aunt Kit's mammairs as published in Oregon Historical Quarterly in 1937.

My immediate reaction, as I read your letter, was: "Poor Della -- she's another victim of one of Evans's forgeries."

From time to time, in recent years, I've had the task of showing semeone just how Evans falsified a document that he said he was copying. I've never yet seen a case in which he didn't commit the unpardonable sin of altering a document. Cases that come instantly to mind: (1) Obituary of my great grandfather Jesse Belknap, in which Evans made twelve alterations, all falsehoods. (2) Inventory of Abraham's estate at Lynn, in which Evans made a number of senseless chages, I forget just how many.

Now I'm enclosing copies of the pertinent pages from what was actually printed — with the passages that Evans falsified marked in red. As you can see, Aunt Kit never said that Rev John W Starr's wife was "Eliza Belknap." Indeed, there was no such Eliza at Belknap Settlement in Oregon — nor anywhere else inthose years, as far as I recall. Evans invented her.

J W Starr's connection with us Belknaps was that his eldest daughter Nancy was the wife of Jesse Belknap's nephew Orin (son of Jonas, Jr). His wife in Oregon was Eliza Ann Lucas. His farmin the Bellfontain area of Belknap Settlement adjoined that of Orin. His first wife, who had died in 1828 after the birth of her fifth child, was Hannah MacWilliams (widow Phillips).

If what I've said seems to indicate contempt for Evans, that's correct. Nothing based solely on his statements should ever be published.

Fortunately -- or so I hope -- he never got his lying hands on the much more extensive portions of what we affectionately call "Aunt Kit's Diary."

CORRECTION OF SOME MISTBENTIFICATIONS MADE BY H W BELKNAP

ON: -- The Eli Belknap who married Clarissa (Cleracy) Lyman.

-- The Asa Belknap who married Abia Deverix

-- The John Belknap whose sons were Eli, Timothy, John, and Foris

The correction of these erroneous identifications is the result of years of research by John A Sherman, beginning about 1934, and by him and C Y Belknap cooperatively 1968 to 1972. The finding rest entirely on primary sources-- wills, land deeds, court proceedings, and other original contemporary records.

These misidentifications are the most serious errors in H W Belknap's work, as they have led to the statement of incorrect lineage for scores of Belknaps.

The root of the errors was that HWB had no record of the second John Belknap in the list of three Johns descended from Joseph Belknap and Prudence Morris:

-- John (Sr), son of Joseph and Prudence, born Woodstock, Conn., 21 Sept 1725.

-- John Jr. son of the above, born at Holland, Mass., 6 April 1748.

-- John (III), son of John Jr. born at Holland 12 April 1784.

Lacking a record of the second John (John Jr). HWB assumed that the John Belknap who was reported to have married a "Lovina" was John (Sr) and that she was that elder John's second wife. He therefore assigned to John (Sr) three sons — Eli, Timothy, and John (III) — who were actually sons of John Jr and Lavina Brock (widow of John Hinds), as proved by the will of Lavina's father David Brock of Woodstock, Conn. This Lavina was the so-called "Lovina" that HWB thought had been second wife of John (Sr). (HWB also misassigned another son of John Jr and Lavina Brock: Foris, whom HWB listed as son of Foris's uncle William and Anna Burke.)

In 1935. John Sharman directed HWB's attention to this error. HWB acknowledged the error but did not alter his records, as he had ceased active work on Belknap genealogy in 1926. (After 1926, he merely filed new data without entering them in his systematic records.) So those who have relied on his notes have perpetuated his errors.

By the end of 1913, HWB had found the record of the marriage of an Eli Belknap and Clarissa (Cleracy) Lyman at Peru. Mass. (called Partridgefield at the time of that marriage in 1800). He assumed -- with no supporting evidence -- that this Eli was the Eli in his records of the family at Holland, Mass., and entered this marriage on his card for that Eli (whom he showed as son of John Sr. incorrectly).

On 24 Feb 1914, the Boston Transcript carried an inquiry signed H.L.C. (H. L. Conlee of New York City) asking for the parentage and date of marriage of a John Belknap and a Lydia, and for the date of marriage of their son Eli to Clarissa Lyman.

On 15 March 1914, in the Transcript, HWB replied: "John born Sept 21 1725 married second(?) perhaps Lovina -- (the correspondent says Lydia), and had Eli by second wife, born Sept 15, 1780, married Cleracy Lyman. Eli was born at Wales, Mass. and married at Peru, Mass., being then of Stevens Town, Mass."

(NOTE: The name of the town was an error for Stephen Town, New York. There was no town of that or similar name in Massachusetts.)

On 16 March 1914, the Transcript carried a lengthy communication from Conlee, beginning: "John Belknap of Renssalser County (New York) married Lydia. They had several children, one of whom was Eli." Then followed names of descendants of that Eli and Clarissa Lyman.

HWB ignored Conlee's repetition of "Lydia" and entered the children of that Eli and Clarissa (named by Conlee) as children of the Eli whom he believed to be the son of John Belknap (5r) and a second wife named "Lovina" (but who was actually son of John Jr and Lavina Brock).

Conlee stuck with "Lydia." But in correspondence with him, NWB did not alter his insistence that "Lydia" was really "Lovina."

There was no evidence to support this insistence. But HWB clung to it.

He was completely in error. Years of research by John A Sherman and recent cooperative research by him and C Y Belknap have established the following unquestionable facts:

- -- Court records of the intestate settlement of the estate of John Belkmap (Sr) of Holland. Mass, show that he married only once -- had a son named John (who is shown as John Jr in various records at Holland) -- and did not have sons named Eli, Timothy, and Foris.
- -- Other records make it plain that these sons and several daughters were children of John Jr and Lavina Brock.
- -- The Eli who married Clarissa Lyman could not possibly have been the Eli who was born at Wales, Mass. in 1780. Census records at Stephen Town NY show that Clarissa's husband Eli was born not later than 1774.
- -- That Eli (Clarissa's husband) moved from Oakham, Mass. about 1799 and in 1800 was settled at Stephen Town NY on land adjacent to the properties of his brother Asa and his father John.
- -- His father John was the oldest son of John Belknap and Ruth Farr of Westboro, Mass. He does not appear in Westboro VR, but HWB obtained acceptable evidence confirming his birth in 1740. He married Sarah Walker and lived in Cakham till 1799, then moved to Stephen Town NY with Sarah and their children.

The following facts have also been established;

- In 1803, while the Eli who married Clarissa Lyman was living at Stephen Town in Renssalaer County, John Belknap Jr of Holland, Hass. was in Oneida County NY with his sons Eli, Timothy, and John (III). His youngest son, Foris, had gone to Ohio with a young couple from Lanesborough, Joseph and Anna (Sherman) Devereaux probably not long after the death of his mother Lavina Brock, which occurred at some time before 25 Nov 1795 (the date of her father's will, indicating that she was dead by that date).
- -- In 1803, John Jr bought land at Lee, in the Town of Western, Oneida County NY. Three years later, his sons Eli and Timothy jointly bought land adjacent to the land that John Jr had bought in 1803. In 1808, Timothy who had moved to Smithfield in Madison County NY sold his half of that jointly owned land to Eli.

-- During the entire period in which the Eli who married Clarissa Lyman was at Stephen Town in Renssulaer County, the Eli who was born at Wales, Mass. in 1780 was in different counties of New York.

In the process of correcting those misidentifications, a correction for a related error by HWB has been found:

- -- When HWB found the record of marriage of an Asa Belknap to Abia Devetix (of "Stephenton, Mass." according to his notes) he entered this marriage on his page for the Asa who was son of Daniel Belknap of Dummerston, Vermont. But Abia Deverix was of Stephen Town, NY (there was no such town as "Stephenton, Mass.") and the Asa who married her was the brother of the Eli who married Clarissa Lyman and lived on the farm adjoining that Eli's at Stephen Town. (No record beyond birthdate has yet been found for the Asa born at Dummerston.)
- -- In this instance, HWB indicated by "(1)" on his notes that he was merely guessing in his identification of the Asa who married Abia Doverix. But many people have omitted that (1) when copying his notes.

In the Census records for Stephen Town, NY, there seems to be a probable explanation of the "Lydia" named by Conlee as wife of the John Belknap whose son married Clarissa Lyman.

That John Belknap, of Oakham, Mass., married Sareh Walker at Brookfield, Mass. 15 Feb 1769. She was presumably with him when he moved to Stephen Town, being the female Over 45 shown in the 1800 Census of his household. In the 1810 Census, the oldest female in this household was shown as aged only 26-45. As there was no daughter of that age, this was probably the Lydia named by Conles -- second wife of John, and not mother of Eli as Conles believed. On this assumption, Sarah had died between 1800 and 1810, and the marriage to Lydia had taken place during that same period. The 1810 census indicates that this second wife was probably a widow with one small child.

I think I should send you the enclosed copy of a summary that I wrote last year, at the conclusion of four years of work on the branch founded by Joseph Belknap and Prudence Morris.

In 1968, when John Sherman and I began that job, we knew only that all the current records of the first few generations of that branch were obviously erreneous. The farther we went, the more errors we found.

At the end, I drafted this very condensed summary of the chief reasons for the sweeping revisions to which the facts had led, so that the root of the errors would be plain to anyone who examined my files.

I haven't yet completed the laberious task of rewriting scores of HWB's sheets on members of this breach of the family.

NOTE 1: 13 Feb 1812 is date of intestate probate of his estate.

NOTE 2: Town copy of Brimfield VR shows her last name as Ball. Another copy shows it as W---- with notation "torn." At a time when this second copy may have been in better condition, William Belknap of Louisville thought it might have read "Wallis." What seems most likely is that she was a widow Ball whose maiden name began with W. or vice versa. No confirming record has been found.

NOTE 3: This list of children differs from all other lists now current, which contain names of some of the children of John's son, John Jr. It derives directly from the list of John's children named as his heirs in the record of the administration of his intestate estate.


NOTE 4: Much of the widespread confusion about John's children, in past and present lists, has been a mistaken belief that the John Belknap recorded as marrying a "Lovina" was this John But this John married only once. The "Lovina" who was erroneously assumed to be his second wife was Lavina Brock, daughter of David Brock, and widow Hinds, who married John Jr. The result of this assumption was a typical instance of a "lost generation."


NOTE 5: Brimfield VR shows marriage to Sherman as "Eunice Lumbard," her name as widow. List of John's children in administration of his estate shows Eunice Belknap as wife of Jeremish Sherman who was the administrator appointed by the court.

NOTE 6: Some present-day compilations show this Joseph as marrying Esther Snow, daughter of Jabez Snow and Keziah Newton. Esther's husband was the Joseph who was son of John Belknap and Ruth Farr of Westboro, Mass. No record beyond date of Birth Kan Keen found.

NOTE 7: Some present-day compilations contain two errors about Abigail. (1) Showing name of her husband as "James" instead of James. He was member of the large James family at Brimfield. (2) Showing Abigail as marrying, second, Daniel Thompson. She married only once and her husband William James was buried beside her. This error has been the result of an incorrect entry in Brimfield VR: entry of an undated marriage, in a church record only, of "Abigail Belknap and Daniel Thompson" which is plainly an erroneous entry of the marriage of Daniel Thompson and Abigail's aunt Hannah, daughter of Joseph Belknap and Prudence Morris.

Thinking of the book you're now preparing, I worry a bit about your records of some of the early Belknaps in America, which I think are based mostly or perhaps partly on very early work by HWB -- therefore contain errors which he corrected when he rewrote all his notes about 1920.

So I'm taking the liberty of sending you my present revisions of your sheets 734,735,736 -- based on all information now in my hands. Some of my changes may be of value to you.

Some comments I should make:

- House
- (1) First need, on this Joseph, is to get rife of that traditional date of birth, 1630. As HWB pointed out in 1914 piece in the Register, there was never any proof for this date. 16 years later, the true date was found in church record at North Weald -- but was not published till Moriarty examined HWN's unpublished note in 1950. . . We should also eliminate statement that Joseph died at age 82 -- which was based on that same fictitious 1630 date.
- (2) On 734, I have entered some data that I found in HWB's later notes, with good sources indicated. (The task of straightening out the much mixed up miscellaneous notes of early generations, left unassimilated by HWB after he stoped active work in 1926, has been difficult but I've made progress on it.)
- (3) I assume the long note at bottom of 734 is quoted from some printed source, not named. It is wrong on date when Joseph became freeman of Boston. I think that it's probably right in saying that Joseph was at Hatfield 1682 to 1696, for I can't agree with the dates given by HWB on this point and the evidence that I have obtained sets 1681 as a year when he lived in Boston.
- (4) I'm unable to explain why daughters Mary and Elizabeth on 734 were baptized on same day in 1665 -- but that's the record. Have'nt found baptismal dates for the two sons on this page.
- (5) Your 735. I distrust all the points that I've marked with an? for I don't know where such information could have been obtained. I doubt that Lydia Ingalls was only 1? at time of marriage and I doubt that there's any basis for giving an exact year of death for her. So I've asked if you have proof. . I originally wrote on this sheet a suggestion that it be held till I could investigate further but then remembered that I have already examined all available data on family of Francis Ingalls, when I was chasing down that non-existent Roger whom Evans named. My memory of that search is what makes me doubt the entries I've questioned.
- (6) The changes on 736 are self-explanatory, I believe and I may have told you about some of them already. I now feel pretty certain that the only child born at Hatfield was Samuel as I've found record of birth of Abraham 1681 in Boston.

 . You probably know that the John Meakins whom Ruth married was her first cousin.

This is the best that I can do on this first Joseph, and I think it's good enough to use — although I'm still digging for definite evidence on some points (such as whether or hot he was the father, illegitimately, of the Mary Belknap who married Ebenezer Kentfield somewhere near Hatfield about ININIXENIX 1713; she was born in or about 1993, five years after death of Hannah Meakins).

I've heard nothing from NEHGS, yet, about my request for a copy of Charles Belknap's two books of records. So I'm assuming my request hasn't been turned down. I also asked for some other copies of manuscript material -- so with the total job I requested was about 250 pages, and I can't expect speed on it. When I get the CB material, will make you a copy. But should warn you that everything in its automatically worth copying. I know it contains errors, just as Franklin Belknap's notes do. But Charles fortunately recorded many of his sources of his raw data, so that the validity of his findings can be appraised.

Got some good news yesterday. Clinton Belknap, descendant of Jonas's brother Elijah, is just about ready to turn over to his printer his book on his branch seams of the family -- same as mine down to and including the Samuel Belknap and Mary Newton. Knowing the great care that he has taken, I'm rejoicing that at last an accurate Belknap job will be in print -- covering about 1000 names. Don't know the exact date of publication -- but not far off.

Have just noted one point I failed to mention on your 734 -- my deletion of your mention of "Media Research Bureau" in sources in upper right-hand corner. For your own sake, don't even admit you ever saw that thing. It was a hack commercial job, copying whatever someone happened to find-mostly just not so. My copy of it is newstar to indicate 19 serious errors and untruths.

Have tried to put the material in shape to meet the needs of the forms you use.

One request: Please keep the question marks that indicate uncertainties. Too often, in the past, I have found later workers discarding the question marks set down by the original investigator whose pages they were copying. Evans, for instance, was often guilty of this malpractice.

Sheets are numbered in sequence, in red.

Sheet 1 -- Samuel XXXXXXXX Belknap and Mary Newton. (Your #411) Contains best information now known; but I have not completed my search on dates for children. List of children is certainly complete. I have thought it essential to give you this sheet, to provide continuation to Jonas Newton Belknap.

Sheet 2 -- Jonas Newton Belknap. New to you, I think. This sheet summarizes four years of work on him. All data from dependable documentary sources. I recommend you use his full name, not just Jonas -- to avoid confusion with other Jonas's, which **EXELYXXXX** has misled many people in the past. (I wish everything in my files was as accurate as this sheet is.)


Sheet 3 - Jesse (Your sheet 412) All data from dependable sources - gravestones, documents, etc. (Your sheet 412 not good at all.)

From there on, all sheets unquestionably accurate -- though not all dates in full.

On Sheet 1, note that name of Samuel's mother was Mary Dickinson, not Dickson as on your 411. And Dickinson -- not Dickenson. Source of spelling, a number of legal documents.

Asterisks indicate I have continuations. But I shan't attempt to go farther at this moment. Just don't have time to transcribe records of something more than 700 descendants of Jonas Newton Belknap., Haven't yet had time to even organize them. I've been too busy collecting information and correcting errors.





In the process of filing things this sfternoon, I discovered a typing error in the sheet for George Belknap & Keturah Penton.

Date of their marrhage was 3 Oct 1837 -- not 1839.

How my fingers could make that mistake is beyond me -- for Aunt Kit's story of when and how George suddenly KALAXNAX suggested immediate marriage because he and the rest of Jesse Belknap's family were leaving Allen County for Iowa in just a few weeks -- that's a story well known to all of us. I knew it was 1837.

So please correct my error.

The word "Miss" in published Parker tradition may have been an error for "Mrs."

But Jonas and Esther left that area met later than early 1794 and were in Ontario Co., NY, from 1794 on — as were the two EX Parkers (brothers of Esther). (The Ruth sometimes said to be Samuel's daughter, m Levi Gowdy, was his grandaughter.)

NOTE 1: Date for Samuelis death, above, is that of probate of his will by wife Mary. The inventory of his estate contains the following entry: "To his wages, lawful money £9-12s-00. One item in account of widow Mary as administrator of his estate reads: "To journey to Boston to get his wages." The source of these wages, the reason for collecting them at Boston, and the time and place of his death -- all are unknown.

NOTE 2: Marriage is shown in Mansfield VR. But this does not necessarily mean that it occurred there, for all early New England VR included entries of events that took place elsewhere. Tradition is that Samuel married Mary at her uncle's home in Rowley, Mass., and then moved to Conn. with her brother James. Samuel's farm and that of James, in Mansfield, were adjoining -- which may indicate that they arrived there together.

NOTE 3: Confusion of the name "Mary Dickinson" with that of her mother Mary Wood Dickinson has been common in past years. The facts are these! After James Dickinson Sr died in 1705/6, leaving two infant children, his widow married Daniel Pearson of Newbury, Mass., where her children by him were born. Pearson lived long after that marriage. There appears to have been a long dispute of the inheritance from James Dickinson Sr and the estate was not settled for some years, Meawhile the children, James Jr and Mary, were brought up by their uncle Thomas Dickinson, who became their guardian. When the estate was finally settled, James Jr and Mary (signing as Mary Belknap, along with her husband Samuel Belknap who also signed the deed) sold to this uncle the land and dwelling "which our Honoured father James Dickinson died Seized of." The move from soon Mansfield to Enfield was made after Mary received her share of the £ 420 that the uncle paid for the property .- a rather unusually large amount, for those times.

ADDITION TO NOTE 21 In the manuscript VR of Mansfield, the entry of the marriage of Samuel and Mary precedes immediately the entry for the birth of their first child, and reads "Samuel Belknap and Mary his wife were marryd July 9th 1723" -- plainly a record written at the time of that birth, for a past event which is not said to have occurred at Mansfield.

The confusion of this mother and daughter, in early Belknap genealogy, is an old one. The facts were worked out, correctly, by Commander Charles Belknap, USN, in the 1890's. (So Kal Meu A, from Walik sui dence.)

She could not possibly have been the Mary Dickinson who married Samuel Belknap 9 July 1723, as Daniel ENER Pearson, her second husband, was still living. His will was probated 8 June 1759.

Her daughter Mary Dickinson, as soon as legally old enough ("over 14") named NETXHERIMXETERIMENT a Dickinson relative as her guardian.

The date of the settlement of the estate is not known, but occurred before 8 Feb 1726/7 — when the daughter Mary Dickinson and her brother the 2nd James EIEKNAR Dickinson, both then married and living in Connecticut on adjoining farms, sold to Thomas Dickinson of Rowley Mass. (their uncle) "a dwelling and land which our Honoured father James Dickinson NN died seized of."

It was this daughter, Mary Dickinson, who married Samuel Belknap 9 July 1723.



My father, Hyrum Belnap, had the original of Charles Belknap record and Henry W. Belknap and was going to print them. They want wanted their records returned before this could be done. Father only got H. W. B. record copied. He was told that Com. Charles Belknap house was burned down and his records also. Whether this is correct, I don't know. Glen W. Evans in his record also quotes from Com. Charles Belknap. If the original record was burned there must have been other copies or parts of the record left.

BIRTHDATES OF CHILDREN OF SAMUEL BELKNAP AND MARY NEWTON

In the precess of seeking fuller dates, I have found new evidence requiring a major revision of the birthdate of sen Jenathan. He was not the 8th child but the 6th. The 1774 date based on a report on a MS VR of Belchertewn was 10 years in error. The old family tradition that Stephen was the youngest sen has been proved to be correct.

Without taking time to state all the rather emplex evidence (including the probability that son Stephen married twice, not just ence), I'll just list the birthdates as new established, for some of you need this information as soon as possible.

Presently, when the subject of Stephen's marriaghs has been clarified a bit farther, I'll rewrite my sheet on this family. Meanwhile, the dates shown above can be used.

THE ENGLISH ANCESTORS OF ABRAHAM BELKNAP

(Based on two articles by Henry Wyckoff Belknap; The English Ancestry of the American Belknaps, New England Historical and Genealogical Register, 1914, pp 83-92 and 190-198; and Belknap; Additional Records, Register, 1931, pp 265-288 -- with corrections and comments by C. Y. Belknap, May 1973)

This summary and commentary is needed for two reasons: to aid persons who have seen only the first of HWB's articles and thus are not aware of the revisions he made in 1931; and to warn against misinterpretations resulting from errors and unwarranted assumptions by HWB in both articles -- as well as some present-day misinterpretations which seem to have gained wide currency.

The earliest proven ancestor of Abraham was a farmer in the Parish of Sawbridgeworth, Hert fordshire, who was known as RICHARD BELTOFT, and died during the first decade of the 16th century (1501-10) or possibly earlier. The line of descent to Abraham ran through Richard's son Leurence, his grandson Richard, and his great grandson Hennet, all of whom bore the name Beltoft. With one exception in the year 1600 (1599 by Old Style reckoning) none of these Beltofts ever used any other surname -- contrary to the mistaken impression conveyed by HWB in his 1914 article.

In 1624, all of the then-living descendants of the first Richard Beltoft -- including Abraham -- suddenly changed the family surname to Belknap, and never threafter reverted to Beltoft.

The widespread notion that this family used "alternate surnames" has been derived from some of the wording in HWB's 1914 article -- especially from his distortion (no doubt unintentional) of a statement on this point by his record agent in England, C. E. Bernau. In a footnote in 1914, HWB misquoted what Bernau had written on the subject of alternate surnames, so as to support HWB's own belief that "they sometimes were called Beltoft and sometimes Belknap" -- whereas what Bernau actually said in his letter to HWB was an effort to show that he did not agree.

This point in the record is important. Mistaken belief in "alternate surnames" has led to many imaginative versions of the family history, some of which have been rather fantastic.

The record is simply this: a century and more of nothing but Beltoft, then more than three centuries of nothing but Belknap. (The exception in 1600 was merely the forerunner of the sweeping change that was made in 1624, as will be shown later.)

There has never been any justification for calling any of the early Beltofts "alias Belknap", as has often been done by some present-day members of the family.

With this background on the two surnames, the detail of the ancestry can be examined.

1. RICHARD BELTOFT & Christian ----

All that is known of this Richard and his family comes from the detailed records of lawsuits over his land, years after his death. He owned a "mesuage" (i.e., land and buildings) of 30 acres -- a holding much larger than the average farm of those times. As he died about 1501-1510, it can be estimated that he was born not later than about 1460 or possibly as early as 1445 -- the choice of year depending on whether his son John was his eldest son as HWB believed or was his youngest son, as he possibly may have been, for reasons that will come to sight in a discussion of the will of his great grandson Bennet, later in this memorandum.

The children of Richard and Christian were (not necessarily in sequence of birth):

In his 1931 article, HWB repeatedly called John the oldest son, and assumed the other sons were born in the order shown above. There was no evidence to support this assumption. It rested on still another assumption: that the inheritance of Richard's property was in accordance with the rule of primogeniture. Both assumptions may have been correct. But there was no evidence in favor of them; and there is a reason for possible doubt about them -- as will be seen later.

2. LAURENCE BELTOFT (wife's name not known)

Like his father, Laurence is known only from records of lawsuits over land. He **MANDING** died before 2 February 1544/5, or -- much more likely -- about 1525.

His children (order of birth unknown):

3. RICHARD BELTOFT (wife's name unknown) she was buried 17 January 1588/9, as "wife of Richard Beltoft")

The he was about 31 years old.

Because his will listed no land, HWB said he was probably "a prosperous copyhold farmer" -- i.e., a tenant farmer with lifetime tenancy of land belonging to a Manor. This surmise may have been correct; but there is reason for thinking that he may have given his land to his youngest son, Josias, a few years before he died.

Inchis 1931 article, HWB silently omitted two errors he had; made in 1914:

- -- In 1914, he had called Richard "Beltoft alias Belknap." There was no evidence warranting this alias, which has misled many people.
- -- In 1914, he had given "Elizabeth" as the name of Richard's wife, although the editor of the Register rightly objected that there was no evidence for it.

Because HWB did not direct attention to these changes in his 1931 article, they have been ignored very often.

Richard's children:

Bennet, born -- probably -- before 1558, when church register began.

Alice, bpt 16 Sept 1561; died not later than 1594. m Edward Lyndesell

Josias, bpt 6 Sept 1562, Sawbridgeworth; buried 4 Feb 1599/1600, Southwark.

4. BENNET BELTOFT alias BELKNAP . GRACE ADAM

Born before 1558; buried 21 May 1624. Baptized Beltoft; signed will Beltoft; but his wife and children buried him as Belknap.

Once, and once only and under compulsion, Bennet called himself a Belknap. The occasion was when he probated the will of his brother Josias, who had hade Bennet his chief legatee. Josias was the mystery man in our family history. All that we know about him comes from the brief and tender will that he dictated as he lay dying. From that will, we know that he had -- at age 37 -- accumulated an amount of money most unusual for a young villager in Shakespeare's time. How he did it, we do not know. He also owned "landes" (obviously at Sawbridgeworth) which he probably had never cultivated, but had been leasing to Bennet for at least four years without receiving payment of rent by Bennet. These lands and a sizable amount of money, he bequeathed to his brother. But to receive this inheritance, Bennet had to swear on oath in court that he was "Bennet Belknappe"

Josias had signed his will Josias Belknappe and had named his brother as "Bennet Belknappe." So, two days after Josias was buried, Bennet swore he was a "Belknappe." Why Josias, baptized Beltoft, chose to call himself Belknappe, is not known; but it seems plain that he must have been using that name for some time.

is known to have

The one time that Bennet called himself Belknappe was on 6 February 1599/1600. The will he signed 23 years later gave his name and that of his children as Beltoft.

But when he died a year later, his wife and children buried him as Bennet Belknap and never used the name Beltoft again, in any recorded moment.

The reason for this sudden and dramatic change of surname is not known and need not be discussed in this memorandum, though a strong case can be built for the hypothesis that under the influence of a vigorous religious movement the first generation in which all the sons bore Biblical names (instead of the Norman first names that had been the rule in earlier generations) insisted on resuming the surname that they felt was rightfully theirs. But this is only an hypothesis, without real proof. If there is proof for this or any other explanation, it will be found only when the record of earlier Beltofts at Sawbridgeworth — before the first Richard — has been traced.

Bennet's children:

Abraham, baptized 10 March 1589/90 Frances, bpt 3 January 1590/1 John, bpt 8 April 1593 Daniel, bpt 2 November 1595 Josias, bpt 12 August 1599

Of these children, only Abraham was married before their father's death. All the others married as Belknaps, in the years following the death of Bennet. And Abraham, who had married as a Beltoft seven years earlier, was called Belknap when a man was tried for stealing sheep from him, six months after Bennet's death.

What usage should be followed in naming Abraham and his brothers, after the change in surname? HWB called them "Beltoft alias Belknap" in what he published in 1914. At other times, he called Abraham "Belknap alias Beltoft." Unfortunately, the use of the word "alias" has seemed to foster the notion that the two surnames were used alternatively and concurrently, which was never done at any time. It seems better, now, to adopt a terminology that recognizes and emphasizes the suddeness and completeness of the change -- such as "Belknap, formerly Beltoft" or more compactly "Belknap ex-Beltoft"

Because Bennet's will made his youngest son Josias his residual heir, it has been customary to say that Abraham, the eldest son, was disinherited and to believe that he was in disfavor with his father. But the detail of Bennet's will shows plainly that no such disfavor existed. Quite the contrary, Bennet left to Abraham his only sizable legacy of money -- just 20 shillings, but that was a lot of money for Bennet: he had to give his executor a year to raise that much. And Bennet left half that much to Abraham's son, for whom he had stood godfather. And he made Abraham his ultimate heir if Josias should die without issue. And he named Abraham his executor.

Plainly, some other explanation must be found for Bennet's disposal of his land. The possible explanation may be seen by noting something that happened sometimes in early days in New England and even as late as 1870 in other parts of America — the apparent survival of the pre-Conquest practice that the Normans called Borough English (tenume en burgh anglais), inheritance of land by the youngest son rather than by the oldest, as was the feudal custom on the Continent. The Normans brought the rule of inheritance by primogeniture with them, and it became the general practice in England; but it was not the native English practice and it did not wholly displace the custom of inheritance by the youngest son. In various parts of England, the old practice — Borough English — lingered on for centuries and was not legally abolished until 1925.

Burough English came to New England with the first colonists. For instance, Robert Jones (father of the wife of Abraham's son Samuel) bequeathed his land to his youngest son just as Bennet had done. And it is quite possible that Abraham's will (which has not been found) left his land at Lynn to his youngest son John; the record of later sales of that land suggests this possibility.

In America, the custom of Borough English seems to have taken two forms: (1) leaving land to the youngest son by will as Bennet did, and (2) giving the land to the youngest son when the father became old and unable to farm it -- often with the understanding that the father would continue to live there, with the youngest son's family. This second method was the one followed by Abraham's son Samuel, and by Samuel's son Ebenezer, and apparently by Ebenezer's son Joseph -- and in 1870 by the great grandfather of this present writer, "as was the custom."

The existence of this second variation, in America, suggests the advisability of taking another look at the "landes" that our mystery man Josias bequeathed to his brother Bennet in January 1599/1600. How had he come by ownership of them? His will indicates that he had owned them for at least four years; so he was not older than 33 when he acquired them. The value of the land, as indicated by the yearly rent stated in the will, makes it seem highly improbable that a young villager bought it himself at or before age 33. So the obvious probability is that his father Richard gave the land to Josias at some time before he made his will in 1594, when he was about 74 years old. This may well be why this Richard's will mentions no lande

Finally, in turn, all this consideration of the terms of Bennet's will can lead back to a question raised early in this memorandum. Was HWB correct in assuming that the inheritance of the land owned by the first Richard Beltoft was by primogeniture, and that therefore John was his eldest son? Or did Richard's will (which is known only by the way it was described by witnesses in a law suit) actually follow the practice of Borough English, so that John was his youngest son? The question may have only minor importance. Yet it will need to be borne in mind by anyone who searches for Beltoft records earlier than those that have yet been found at Saworidgeworth.

It seems probable that this John Belnap might have been the son of Rosel (Rosnell) Belnap 1780-1832 and the brother of Gilbert Belnap 1821-1899 both of whom were born in Canada. In 1873 Gilbert Belnap visited his relatives in " Mich., Ill, New York, Pa. and Canada, so Hyram Belnap relates in his family history published in the Ogden Examiner Sept. 13.1925.

Rosel had a brother Ansel 1787-1870 who had children born in Canada but John was not his son. I assume that your father was Hyrum 1858 and your Grandfather, Gilbert 1821. Inasmuch as Hyram had spent much time in collecting data on the Belnap Family I felt sure that the results of his research must be preserved somewhere. Several Michigan Belnaps descend from Jesse 1760 fifteen of whose children I have identified.

Instead, there two attestations by men who had witnessed the signing of the deed in 1695: Jeremiah Spick and Joseph Burnap -an expedient used when the grantor was not available to acknowledge his signature. The obvious probability is that Samuel died before the dates of these attestations. The last known date of record for Samuel is 11 Nov 1701, when he witnessed a deed signed by his son Abraham -- Exhibit C, attached. (There is no visible reason for thinking that the Samuel who witnessed this 1701 deed might have been the son Samuel. NOTE 3: The parentage of the Sarah Belkhap who married Nathaniel Singleterry 22 Dec 1673 has not been established, though she was obviously of the same generation as that of Samuel's known children. There appear to be five possibilities. (1) That she was the Mary, daughter of Samuel, born 14 Oct 1656, for whom only the birthdate has been found. Or (2) that she was a daughter of Samuel and Sarah, born about 1655, for whom no birth record has been found. Or (3) that she was a daughter of Sarah by a first marriage, if it is true that Sarah Jones was a "widow Hill." Or (4) that she was a daughter of Samuel's younger brother John, who is not known to have married but died at some time before Samuel moved from Salem. Or (5) that she was either an adopted child or an illegitimate child of Samuel. No clues pointing to any of these possibilities haveyet been found.

From the dates on record, obviously incomplete, a sketchy summary of Samuel's life can be set down in skeletonized form. . . When his father died in Sept 1643, Samuel was 15½ years old. His mother Mary was 48. His brother Joseph was 10; and John was 8. His sister Hannah was 3 or 4. It can be assumed that the burden of being the man of the family fell naturally on Samuel. The land at Lynn remained in the family — presumably under ownership by Mary. (Some of it remained in the family for many years afterward.) But little of it was good farm land; so it seems likely that there was pressure on Samuel to find another way of supporting his family. At any rate, by the time of his marriage about 1652 Samuel had learned the trade of a joiner, which he followed for the rest of his active life — being termed "joyner" in deeds as late as 1696, when he was almost 70 . . . At the time of his marriage or soon thereafter, he went to eastern long Island with a party of men intending to settle there, and in 1653 owned two small lots at Southampton. Though eldest son, was left only 20 shillings by Bennet's will, which made the youngest son Josias the ultimate heir to Bennet's land, with reversion to Abraham only if Josias died without issue. Josias married 1631; first child born 1632.

Was allotted 40 acres at Lynn, 1688. After death in 1643, his will (which has not been found) was probated by wife Mary at Salem -- hence later error in assuming he died at Salem. Inventory of his estate shows net value of 47 pounds, 17 shillings.

2. Abraham, buried Netteswell 6 Dec 1620.

3. Abraham, born circa 1622, alive 14 April 1623, known only from being named in Bennet's will on that date.

4. David, buried North Weald 2 March 1624/5. Probably born after 14 April 1623, as not mentioned in Bennet's will.

5. *Samuel, baptized Immanuel, North Weald 16 March 1627/8.

(Church register at North Weald shows name as Beltrap.)

6. Doross, baptised North Weald 7 Feb 1629/30; died young. 7. *Joseph. bp North Weald 12 May 1633.

8. *John, bp North Weald 10 May 1635.

9. *Hannah, born about 1639 or 1640, presumably at Lynn, Mass.

When smigrating from England, was accompanied by wife Mary and sons Samuel, Joseph and John. Contrary to tradition, none of his brothers came to America. Church registers and wills in Hertfordshire and Essex show that all his brothers remained in England. He had no brothers named Joseph and Thomas — the names most commonly said to be those of brothers who came to America with him. Identification of a Thomas Burnap as an immigrant Belknap, by Banks (Topographical Dictionary, etc.) was based on an error by H. W. Belknap, which HWB later retracted when Burnap proved to be a variant of Burnett. No other Belknap immigrant has yet been found.

28 Jan 1599/1600 Josias made his will as Josias Belknappe, naming his brother as Bennet J signed the will in full, not by mark. (The numerous legatees must have known him as Belknappe; otherwise the will would have been meaningless. So he must have begun calling himself Belknappe at some time before the date of the will.)

4 Feb 1599/1600 Josias was buried as a Belknap at Saint Saviour's, Smuthwark. Entry in church register: "Josias Belknap, a man being a stranger and no parishioner." (HWB's note based on letter from Bernau 9/5/30 shows spelling "Belknap" but does not indicate explicitly that this was the spelling in the church register.)

6 Feb 1599/1600 Bennet probated J's will, swearing he was Benedict Belknappe.

(But 14 Apr 1623 Bennet made his will as Bennet Beltoft, naming all his children and his grandson Abraham as Beltoft.)

- 21 May 1624 Bennet was buried as Bennet Belknap.
- 15 June 1624 his executors, wife Grace and son Josias, probated his will as that of Benedictus Belknapp, though it was signed Beltoft.
- 19 Oct 1624 Bennet's daughter Frances married as Belknap. (Six month after Bennet's death) 20 Oct 1624 Trial of one Norrington for stealing sheep from Abraham Belknap of Latton.
- 24 March 1624/25 Abraham's son David buried at North Weald as Belknap (Beltrap).
- 31 January 1626/7 Abraham made deposition at North Weald Basset as Abraham Belknapp.
- 10 July 1630 Grace, daughter of John and Elizabeth Belknap (Belknop) was baptized. (Presumably John, son of Bennet, was married as Belknap about 1628 or 1629, at the hame of his bride in some other town.)
- 20 Oct 1630 Bennet's wife Grace was buried as Belknap (Belkap).
- 2 May 1631 Bennet's son Josias married as Belknap (Belkap).

After the date of Bennet's no use of Beltoft appears in records till 1663, when two children of Henry Belknap (grandson of Bennet) were buried as Beltoft; and again in 1683 when this Henry's last child Mary was buried as "daughter of Henry and Mary Belknap als Beltoft." These are the only recorded instances of reversion to Beltoft by those who made entries in church records or other records. They may indicate only that an aging pastor or warden remembered that the family name had formerly been Beltoft. This Henry, like all of the children of Bennet's sons, was christened Belknap -- and married as Belknap, twice.

AThe spelling Belnap first appears at Sambridgeworth in the will of that Henry, 10 Apr It had appeared earlier, in 1658, in register entry of burial of Daniel Belnap at Netteswell. These are the first recorded indications of a silent "k7. Earlier spellings such as "Belkap" and "Beltknap" seem to indicate presence of a hard consonantal sound in middle of the name -- as also in "Beltrap". As all spellings except that of Josias in signature to his will, 1599/1600, were set down by persons who were trying to write what they thought they heard, it may be assumed that the hard "k" was sounded in the first half of that century and became silent in the second half -- as in the consistent spelling "Bellnap" in records of Essex members of the family in that period. Thus the change in the pronunciation of the name appears to have occurred about the time above the pronunciation of the name appears to have occurred about the time above the same change was generally being made in all English

words containing "kn". (Oxford English Dictionary, section on letter "k")

NOTE ON ABRAHAM"S CHILDREN

The list of children given on page 1 is that published in NEHG Register 1950 by G. Andrews Moriarty, the most respected New England genealogist. After H. W. Belkmap's death, Moriarty examined HWB's notes and papers, finding among them some documents obtained after HWB had written the report he published in 1931. One of these documents was the record of births shown in the parish register of North Weald, giving birthdates for two children previously unknown -- David and Borcas -- and also for Samuel Joseph and John, which also had not been known. This record remedied an old error in the birthdate of Joseph, commonly said to have been in 1630 but proving to be in 1633. (Some present day writers still copy that traditional erroneous date, 1630.)

Another old error, originated in the 19th century by an unreliable historian, named two sons, Abraham and Jeremy. Savage, page 158, found no trace of a Jeremy -- and neither has anyone else. However, Savage mistakenly perpetuated the notion of a son named Abraham, by saying that he took the oath of allegiance Nov. 1677, but nothing more is heard of him."

There was nothing to hear. The Abraham who took oath of allegiance in 1677 was the oldest son of Abraham's son Samuel, then aged 17, who took the oath at Haverhill when his father did. He could not possibly have been a son of Abraham, for the deed of the sale of Abraham's house lot at Lynn in 1671 by Samuel and Joseph, with the signed concurrence of their sister Hannah, indicates that no other heirs of Abraham were alive in that year, six years before the date of the oath of allegiance.

Abraham did have two sons who were christened Abraham. The first died young, as the record shows. The second is known only from being named in Bennet's will in one or 1623, being probably not more than two years old at that time. There is nothing to indicate that he came to America. The presumption is that he died young.

One other error should perhaps be mentioned, though it has not been copied very widely. About 1955, one erratic and extremely unreliable amateur worker in genealogy circulated the statement that a son of Abrham named Roger married a daughter of Roger Ingalls of Lynn. Effort to verify his statement showed that his only source was an unsubstantiated mention in an article in an obscure local historical society bulletin. But he supported his claim by saying he had confirmed it by data in a published genealogy of the Ingalls family. Examination of all compiled genealogies of that family, including the one he cited, disclosed that none of them mentioned either any such Roger or any such Ingalls daughter. No other mention of this alleged Roger is known.

Original allotment: Record of lawsuit 26 March 1661 by William Langley and Henry Collings on behalf of the town of Lynn, vs John Hathorne, "in regard to . . . land not laid out to him," includes a list of those to whom land had been alloted in 1638 -- among them, Abraham Belknap 40 acres.

Inventory of his estate 16 Feb 1643/4, four days before his will was probated, shows a total of 45 acres listed in five parcels:

- (A) "The houses and 5 acres of land"
- (B) "2 acres of planting land" (C) "2 acres of salt marsh"
- (D) "6 Akers salt marsh at Fox Hill"
- (E) "30 Akers at the village"

Whether the apparent increase of 5 acres, since 1638, reflects an aquisition of more land or merely indicates variation in surveying is not known.

No record of subsequent transactions involving parcel "E" has been found. The known record of the property in the other parcels is as follows:

"theire thirds" of

- (1) 14 April 1671, his children Samuel, Joseph and Hannah sold 3/4 acre "part of a house lott formerly Abraham Belknap's house lott," for 10 pounds, to Thomas Laughton Sr. This was plainly a part of parcel "A." The wording of the deed deserves close examination. The word "thirds" was at that time a customary legal term for an inalienable right to minimum inheritance under either a will or intestate proceedings -- originating in the provision for a "widow's thirds" of all properties owned by a deceased husband (in the English Statute of Wills , 1540) and later extended to include similar rights of other heirs to equal shares of properties subject to intestate probate. In this expanded usage, it did not mean an arithmetical third -- though in this instance it would have that meaning by coincidence, as there were only three signers of the deed. If there had been four or evenfive signers, the phrase "theire thirds" might still have been used. The fact that there were only those three signers is a clear indication that both the It appears also to indicate that the mother Mary and the brother John were dead. preceding owner -- either Mary or John -- had died intestate. It can also be regarded as indicating that the three surviving children -- Samuel, Joseph and Hannah -- had the same rights of inheritance to whatever else remained of the lands listed in the inventory of their father's estate. And it leaves wide open the question of whether Abraham had done in his will the same, thing that his father Bennet had done: leaving his land to his wife for her life, with the youngest son John the residual heir upon There is no firm evidence that Abraham did this. But it is plain that his will did not make any other child his chief immediate or residual heir; only John could have been such an heir. To this extent, then, the possibility that Abraham's will may have followed the custom of Burough English cannot be ruled out.
 - (2) 10 May 1682 Joseph Belknap (clearly Abraham's son, not his grandson Joseph Jr as HWB thought) sold to Edward Hutchinson for 19 pounds "6 acres of fresh meadow at Lynn, formerly given to Abraham Belknap by the said town." This appears to include parcel "B" and the remainder of parcel "A". In the light of the details of sale #1, above, it can be assumed that Joseph had bought the interests of Samuel and Hannah.
 - (3) Il April 1713, five months after the death of that Joseph, his sons Joseph Jr and Samuel -- his joint executors -- sold to Joseph Belcher two lots of salt marsh at Lynn, described as "2 acres" and "6 acres." These appear to have been parcels "C" and "D." Again it seems plain that Abraham's son Joseph had exquired the shares of his brother Samuel and his sister Hannah.

I'm deeply indebted to you for your comment on the sheets on our first Samuel, which I sent to you last May. It has led to a rewriting of those sheets. So I'm now sending you the new version, with its supporting exhibits -- one of which is condensed by omitting the long central portion, which contains nothing bearing on genealogy.

Your comment about the son Samuel who went to southern N J was of course correct. Though it had no part in the writing of the new version, it happened to make me reread all the evidence on which my 1973 version was based. In this rereading, I got the notion that the full deed which was said to have been acknowledged in 1731 might contain information identifying the Samuel who appeared to have acknowledged it in 1731. So I sent for a copy of the deed, to compare with the abstract in H W Belknap's notes.

To my surprise, what I found was that H W Belknap's abstract of the deed, in his notes, was astoundingly erroneous. The conclusion that he (and I) had dreen from that abstract But his abstract was incredibly false. . . I say "incredibly" because I'm unable to think of a way in which HWB could have made the error when he was so painstaking as to reproduce even the mark by which Patience signed as witness and also the recorder's misspelling of Samuel's signature. But he did make the error, as the accompanying exhibits show.

Please destroy the 1973 version on Samuel. . . One of the penalties of trying to share the fruits of research is the difficulty of stopping further circulation of an error detected in later research.

Dear Miss Belknap:

I wish to acknowledge the receipt of your most gracious invitation to attend the Belnap Family re-union to be held at Ogden Sept. 11th. and I regret that the distance only prevents my attendance.

The Belknap Family re-union appears to have been event for many years. On Sept. 13, 1825 the Ogden Examiner ran a full page describing the reunion of that year, and your father was prominent on the program. He gave a review of the family history. Among the Belnaps attending were: Leveritt of Hartford Ct., Scott Belknap of Carthage, Ill., Henry Belknap of Idaho, Joseph H. Belknap of Ogden, Mary Belnap Lowe of Franklin Idaho and many others whose names are no doubt familiar to you.

The Belnaps owe a great deal to your grandfather Gilbert and to your father Hyram in their efforts to gather together the history of this family with its mant ramifications. Not long ago I came into possession of 5 or 6 letters written by your father in 1906 to J.O. Belknap of South Royalton, Vt. who also was gathering material on the family. Several times large quantities of data were collected and turned over to various geneaologists of the family who had agreed to publish it. However before it could be accomplished, death ensued, and either through carelessness or cussedness of their survivors the data was either concealed or lost.

I am not a descendant of the Belknap line but while assembling data on the Evans geneaclogy, I ran across an old will in which a John Belknap of Grand Rapids was mentioned as an heir at law. He was the son of Olive Evans of Ogden, Monzoe Co. N.Y. b. 1798. This whetted my curiosity as to whom Olive married and being of a stubborn and persistent disposition I spent much time and effort in an endeavor to identify her Belknap husband. He finally turned out to be the son of Abel and Bethiah Newhall Belknap of Lynn, Mass. and Chili, Monroe Co N.Y. His name was John Belknap b. 1790. The lineage goes: Abraham (1) Joseph (2) 1630; Thomas (3) 1670; Samuel (4) 1707; William (5) 1730; Abel (6) 1754 and John (7) 1790. John Married Olive Evans, daughter of John and Martha Evans. He died in 1831 and Olive died in 1825. John and Olive and his parents Abel and Bethiah are buried in the North Chili cemetery, Monroe Co. N.Y. and all have grave stones. John and Olive had a son John Evans Belknap born 1822 and after Olive's death John married again and had a son Rufus whose mother was Elvirah W.

John Evans Belknap (8) 1822, married Harriett Richmond of Riga Monroe Co. N.Y. They came to Michigan in 1853 and settled at Tallmadge a short distance West of Grand Rapids. The half brother Rufus married Harriett Waters and he settled in Walker Tsp. Kent Co. Mich but a few miles from John's.

John's daughter Olive Belknap married William &. Quigley. She was born near Churchville. Monroe Co. N.Y. in 1850. Their son Amos Quigley b. 1872 lives to-day on the original John Belknap farm in Tallmadge. Mich.

The information concerning John Belknap was acquired only after long and tedious research and in this search I accumulated a large amount of geneaclogical data on this most interesting family many of whom settled in Michigan. The Mich. State Library which has an extensive geneaclogical department asked me to assemble my data and prepare copies for the Detroit, Mich and the Grand Rapids Mich. libraries. This has been done and it contains the lineages of about 1500 Belknaps, indexed, together with the names of their wives and husbands which should prove helpful to descendants who are attempting to locate their ancestors. Recently I was able to assist Mrs. Jane Belknap of Des Moines Iowa in her search.

There is a matter in which I would like your co-operation. Most off the Belknap lineages assembled many years ago by their descendants list Samuel Belknap (4) born about 1703 probably at Framingham, Mass and his wife Mary Dickenson. He was the original Ct. settler and live at Mansfield, Sommers and Enfield. Have you any references as to where the information was secured that Samuel was the son of Ebenezer or that his wife was Mary Dickenson? His marriage is recorded as "Samuel Belknap and his wife Mary". A great deal of work was done to establish this lineage which was referred to as the "missing link" in old correspondence. About 1906 a Miss Adeline Belknap of South Orange, N.J. is referred to by Commander Charles Belknap, U.S.N. who did much research work on the family, as having found the "missing link" but he did not state what she had found. Your father communicated with Charles Belknap and it occurred to me that perhaps your father may have secured this information from him. Charles Belknap's records were turned over to his son who would not permit any one to see them altho later fragments of them were published in Putnam's Leaflets.

I will not take more of your time as I assume you are assembling the tomatoes and water melone for the Reunion. If I can be of any assistance to you in Belknap matters, I shell be happy to assist you. A letter written by Edwin M. Belknap of Perris Cal. in 1942, speaks of your kindness in assisting him with information about the family, and I too am grateful for the trouble you took for me.



THE COMING OF THE INGALLS FAMILY TO ILLINOIS IN 1834.

BY MRS. MARY F. C. DIXON.

In the year 1628, Edmund and Francis Ingalls landed at Salem, Mass., from Lincolnshire, England, with Governor Endicott. They were tanners in England. They crossed the Saugus River in 1629 and established a tannery at a place they called Lynn, because of the name of their home in Lincolnshire. England.

Francis left no male descendants, his daughter, Mary, married Roger Belknap.

Edmund fell through a defective bridge over the Saugus River in 1648 and was drowned.

Henry, son of Edmund, moved to Andover, Massachusetts, sometime after 1646. His son, James, married They had a son, James, born in 1695, who Hannah Abbott. married Mary Stevens. After the death of James, Sr., his widow, Hannah Abbott Ingalls, with her son James and his wife went with the Pomfret Colony to Abington, Connecticut. They there established their home almost directly across the street from the Colony Church. They there raised a family of seven children. Their son, Ephraim, married Mary Sharpe, whose great-grandfather was Resolved White, who came over in the Mayflower in 1620.

Their son, Ephraim Ingalls, married Lucy Goodell, and they too, resided in the ancestral home, rearing a family of nine children; Mary S., Henry L., Lucy, Lydia, Deborah, Edmund, Chas. Francis, George A. and Ephraim. Lucy, the mother, died in 1829 and the father, Ephraim, in 1831.

Their oldest son, Henry Laurens Ingalls, married Lavinia Childs. Her sister, Priscilla Childs, married Dr. Chandler, the founder of Chandlerville, Illinois. Henry had made a visit to the Illinois country and found it to his liking. When he re-

Excerpt from requirements for Certified Genealogist:

"He shall be able to evaluate published source materials and genealogies, and in the case of the latter, to verify statements contained before using them."

As this is the only such requirement I can hope to meet, it will serve as an introduction to this example of its meaning and its importance.

Some weeks ago, I asked you if you had any other source for listing a "Roger" as son of Abraham -- beyond Glen Evans. Meanwhile, I've gone ahead with the task of searching for verification.

What Evans said, in the thing he prepared for you, is as follows:

His page 1: Gives "Reger" as his #10, no birthdate or other dates, says married "Mary Ingalls." No dates for her, either.

Same page: "He (Joseph) married three wives, and Lydia Ingalls was a sister to his brother's wife Mary Ingalls. The father of these firls was Frances (sic) Ingalls who was one of the first settlers at Lynn, Mass."

Same page: Evans mentions inventory of Abraham's estate (which he miscepied on his next page) but does not note that Francis Ingalls was Alraham's chief creditor.

Page titled "THE INGALL'S (sic) FAMILY." Evans repeats statement that Lydia and Mary Ingall (sic) married Joseph and Roger Belkiap, sons of Abraham (1). Mentions Frances(sic) Ingall (sic) and his mother Edmand, says they were born "about 1598" at Skirbect (sic) Lincolnshire. . . Says Francis(sic) Ingall (sic) left no male heirs. "His daughter Mary married Roger Belknap," who he again says was a son of Abraham. Givesother data on record of Edmand Ingall (sic) and his descendents in Illineis.

Same page: Evans names following sources:

Illinois State Historical Society, Vol. 18, p. 416.
"The Ingall (sic) Family" a printed genealogy. (No page named)

Before exploring these two named sources, I should summarise what I already knew about Francis Ingalls.

(1) He was the first tanner in Massachusetts.

(2) He was Abraham Belkmap's chief creditor - amount 3 Lb, im 10 s.

(3) His wife's name was Mary ______. (4) His tannery vats were at Swamscott. (5) Shown as a "proprietor" in Lynn town records, 1638.

(9) His will dated 10 Aug 1672 was probated 1 Nov that year, naming as legatees his wife Hary, his son-in-law Joseph Belkmap, and his daughter Elisabeth (who had married a Farnum) in Andover. No other names shown in abstract of this will, except overseers.

So I naturally was skeptical about the existence of a daughter named "Mary." And my doubt about a "Reger" Belkmap was heightened by the plain fact that a first name of French or Norman derivation was most improbable in Abraham's family, in which all known names were Biblical. My chief demats, howevery, centered around the fact that neither H W Belkmap nor G. Andrews Moriarty (the greatest of all New England genealegists) had found any such "Mary" or "Roger." Mothing in what they published ner in HWB'S notes nor in HWB'S correspondence with Mr. Moriarty mentioned either of these two persons named by Evans, though the two of them thrashed out a number of debatable points. I did not see how they could have missed finding those two persons, if they actually existed.

Hevertheless, we owe it to Evans (though he was in error about it, on one point) that we finally verified the marriage of Jenas and Tamar. So it was up to us to look for possible verification again.

I have obtained what seem to be the seuroes he listed.

(1) Journal of the Illinois State Historical Society, Vol. 18, p. 416 - copy enclosed with his memo.

As you will see, the piece by Mrs. Mary F C Dimen says: "Francis left no male descendants, his daughter, Mary, married Reger Belknap". Unless supposted by valid contempory documentation, a statement of this kind is was marely a statement, not evidence. She gave no authority for what she wrote.

You will also note that (with only one major exception) what Evans wrote in his page titled "THE IMPRESERVENCE INCALL'S Family" was a paraphrase (or copy) of Mrs. Dimen's wording.

The exception was his mention of the English birthplace of Francis and Edmand Ingalls -- Skirbeck (not Skirbect as he wrote it), Lincolnshire. Mrs. Direct did not name this town. So Evans must have get it from some other source.

There seem to be only two published genealogies of the Ingalls family - both deveted to descendants of Edward. I get both of them, from NEHOS.

(2) Genealogy of the ERREN FRENCH family, (which contains a section on the connection of the family and the Ingalls family), by M. Q. Beyer, in Illinois.

It seems likely that Evans saw this. The wording of his mention of Skirbeck is similar to that of Mrs, Beyer — and does not resemble the wording in the other Ingalls genealogy. . . The Mrs Beyer book, however, merely mentions Francis Ingalls very briefly, without any detail at all. So it does not support what Mrs. Dixon wrote.

(3) The Genealegy and Ristery of the Ingalis Family in America, by Charles Burleigh, 1903.

This is a record of the ancestry and descendants of Edmund Ingalls, with just a few

mentions of Francis Incaling

First paragraph: "With his brother Francis and four others, he (Educad) communed the softlement of Lynn in 1629."

Frotnote on same pages "Francis Ingalls, brother of Edmund, was the earliest termer in Massachusetts and his wats could be seen at Emmpscott as late as 18h0. He moved to Boston and his will Nov. 1, 1672, mentions wife Mary, son-in-law Joseph Belkmap, balance of his property to Elizabeth Farnum of Andoverafter his wife's decease." (NOTE: Date of probate, not date of will, CTB)

In last paragraph of Edward's will, he named his brother Francis as one of two everences.

There are no indications that either Mrs Dison or Olan Rvans read this back. No similarities in wording nor in details of information. Also, no indications that HW Belkmap saw it, for his information and wording are very different in detail, such as making the exact location of the vats at Swampsoott (Humphrey's Brook), etc.

Not the point, I think, that even this excellent genealogy gives no mention of a suggestive state of the second of the second of the second se

But again let me emphasize that if we had merely found an unsupported statement in this book or in the Beyer book, it would have not been evidence, unless documented by contemporary sources. We would still have had to keep searching for valid proof Emphasizement before accepting was two books.

My conclusion: Evens murally copied what Mrs Dison wrote, without varification. His listing of a genealogy which he called THE INCALL FAMILY was just another instance of semathing that I have found his doing again and again — that is, listing as a source consthing that he had read but which contained nothing whatever bearing on the point at issue. . And, since he support has been found for the statement made by Mrs Dixon, and there soems to be no reason for thinking that any much support can be found, there's no use searching farther.

On 13 Oct 1696 deeded his homestead at Haverhill -- "27 acres with buildings" -- to his youngest son, Ebenezer. On 21 Nov 1695 deeded other land at Haverhill, 100 acres, to his son Abraham "of Reading." On 31 Aug 1731, at Concord, acknowledged this deed to Abraham -- witnessed by his daughter Patience. NOTE 1: In NEHG Register 1950, G. Andrews Moriarty disputed the date of death of Samuel given by H W Belkmap -- "after 1731" -- saying that the man acknowledging on 31 Aug 1731 the deed signed in 1696 conveying land to Abraham "of Reading" was Samuel's son Samuel. For two reasons, it is plain that Moriarty was in error.

(1) The son Samuel had gone to Fairfield, Conn. sometime before 1690 and from theme to Southern New Jersey about 1690, where he remained till 1697, probably longer. He could not have been the man making the acknowledgment in 1731, as he could not have been the grantor of the deed in 1696. (2) The further history of the land given to Abraham in 1696 identifies, as signer and acknowledger, his father Samuel. On 11 Nov 1701, Abraham -- then "of Framingham" -- sold part of this land to his brother Ebenezer, and the deed was witnessed by Samuel Belkmap, who could only be his father. (As this deed was recorded in Essex County, it probably was executed at Haverhill.) Later, 17 June 1720, Abraham "of Framingham"

the need of validating Abraham's title to the property that he sold in 1720 seems to have arisen -- requiring that the 1696 deed conveying the land to him bg acknowledged by the grantor. This acknowledgment was made by Samuel Belknap on 31 Aug 1731 and witnessed by Patience Belknap, daughter of Samuel. That the grantor and acknowledger was Samuel the father was made plain by the wording of the 1720 deed executed when Abraham sold half of the land: ". . . ½ of the 100 acres which was laid out to Bartholomew Heath's third division & by him conveyd to Mr Thomas Brackett of Boston, shopkeeper, & from him to my Hond father & from him to me." So the statement that Samuel the father died "after 31 Aug 1731" is correct. He was the first Belknap to live past 100 years of age. . . As no later record for his unmarried daughter Patience has been found, the same statement is made for the date of her death.

NOTE 2: The parentage of the Sarah Belknap who married Nathaniel Singleterry 22 Dec 1673 has not been established, though she obviously was of the same generation as that of Samuel's children. There appear to be four possibilities: (1) That she was the Mary, born 14 Oct 1656, daughter of Samuel Belknap and Sarah Jones — in which case she married at age 17. Or (2) that she was a daughter of Samuel and Sarah, born about 1655, for whom no birth record has been found. Or (3) that she was a daughter of Sarah Jones by her first marriage (if it is true that Sarah Jones was "widow Hill") and had adopted the name of her stepfather. Or (4) that she was a daughter of Samuel's brother John who is not known to have married and died before 14 April 1671.

NOTE 3: From the dates of record (obviously incomplete) a sketchy summary of Samuel's life can be set down in skeletonized form. . . When his father Abraham died in Sept 1643. Samuel was 15th years old. His mother Mary was 48. His brother Joseph was 10; John was 8. His sister Hannah was 3 or 4. It can be surmised that the burden of being the man of the family fell naturally on Samuel. The land at Lynn remained in the family -- presumably under ownership by Mary. But little of it was good farm land. . . By the time of his marriage, about 1652, Samuel had learned the trade of a joiner and continued in it the rest of his active life, being termed "joyner" in deeds as late as 1696, when he was 68. . . At the time of his marriage or soon afterward, he went to eastern Long Island with a party of men intending to settle there; and in 1653 owned two small lots at Easthampton, L. I. Whether he ever actually lived thereis unknown. . . By 20 Oct 1657 he was settled in Salem, and by 1660 was in possession of a large lot of land in what is now the center of the city. Till 1669, he is on record in Salem. . . In 1670 or 1671, he moved to Malden, nearer Boston, where he and Joseph and Hannah sold "theire thirds" of their father's house lot -- which suggests that their mother Mary had died, and indicates plainly that the brother John was dead by that date. . . . Samuel was not long at Malden. In 1673 he bought a small lot -- $2\frac{1}{2}$ acres -at Haverhill, which he sold for 80 pounds in 1685, probably at a high profit. Samuel remained at Haverhill till at least 1696 and probably at least 1701, and prospered -- for by 1696 he owned land totalling 127 acres. In that year, at age 68, he gave his homestead, "27 acres and buildings," to his youngest son Ebenezer (possibly with the customary understanding that he would continue to live there, with Ebenezer?). A little later that year, he gave his farm land to his son Abraham, who was then at Reading. Five years later, 11 Nov 1701, he witnessed the deed by which Abraham sold of that farm land to Ebenezer. At that time. Samuel was probably living in Haverhill. . Nothing more is of record till 1731, 30 years later, when he acknowledged, at Concord, the 1696 deed to Abraham. He was then 104 years old, and his daughter Patience may have been living with him. Nothing more is known. ADML

Dear Della:

As I've heard nothing yet from Dr W Dean Belnap, I think I should write a reply to the letter you wrote on July 5.

In essence, the answer I must give to you and him is that it would be a waste of time for the two of you to try to examine my records now -- for they won't be ready for that sort of study until at least a year from now. But this brief reply needs full explanation; so I'll beg forgiveness for what's probably going to be a lengthy and wordy letter.

It seems to me that the true cause of Dr Belnap's suggestion is the fact that I've never really told you exactly what I've been doing and how I've done it. I have not been merely compiling a genealogy from what is in existence. Quite the contrary, I've been trying to produce records based on verified original data, regarding all existing compilations — including even yours — as helpful material requiring close scrutiny and also unbiased critical appraisal of visible or possible errors. The result is that my records often differ from yours, sometimes in minor ways (such as the name of the first wife of William Belknap of Brimfield on your sheet 493, not McNeill but McNall), and sometimes in major ways, such as the list of children of that William's brother John on your sheet 489.

I'd better go back and start at the beginning of my serious work on Belknap genealogy, nine years ago, before you reproach me for not sending you such corrections as I went along. There's a big reason why I've not done that.

Early in my work, years ago, I was innocent enough to think that if I could find the great body of Belknap genealogy built up by Henry Wyckoff Belknap in the first quarter of this century my task would be easy. As you know, I did find it -- and was permitted to make electrostatic copies of his organized notes (about 3500 pages). I also was able to examine some thousands of pages of his correspondence, and made copies of all of them that contained information on his sources or data that he had not entered on his final records before he stopped working on Belknap genealogy. But I soon discovered that even his much-corrected notes, rewritten shortly after 1920 perhaps, contained many visible errors and lots of entries that were subject to question.

So I was forced to regard his records of approximately 2500 persons as just raw material, which I'd have to edit very rigorously -- accepting what seemed well substantiated, re-investigating whatever seemed unsubstantiated.

And as I accumulated other compilations and data in printed sources such as various so-called encyclopedias of genealogy. I found that they -- too -- would have to be regarded as requiring verification where and when they lack proof of accuracy.

In short, I found nothing that I could accept blindly, merely because someone had said it or published it. I would have to dig deep for facts -- in vital records, wills, intestate proceedings, land deeds, and so on and on. I'd

also have to plod through innumerable local histories — not for what their authors said, which is not evidence and often is visibly wrong, but for whatever original documents they reprinted, which are evidence. (Example, Lovering's great History of Holland, Mass., in which his statements on parentage are often erroneous while the many original documents that he reprinted are a magnificent source of valid evidence. If HWB had seen this book, he would have avoided some of his worst mistakes.)

So, for all these years, I've been engaged in endless search for facts which have led to changes in the records with which I was working. The heart of my work was the huge body of material created by HWB, but I was editing it and altering it when I found revision required. Other collections, such as yours, were helpful in disclosing debatable points and in providing clues worth persuing — but always I had to search for valid contemporary evidence that would justify a final decision on what was correct.

This took time, of course. The hardest problem arose from a letter written to HWB in 1934, protesting that the information he had provided on the branch started by Joseph Belknap and Prudence Morris could not possibly be correct. As HWB had ceased work on American genealogy in 1926, he merely acknowledged the protest a with his habitual courtesy -- and did nothing about it. When I got in touch with that protester in 1968, his problem was still unsolved. So he and I tackled it together.

It took us five years to arrive at a solution that we could accept. In that period, our correspondence and the documents we accumulated (copies of wills, deeds, and what-have-you) filled five fat file folders, each more than an inch thick. Sometimes we almost quit in despair of finding the evidence we needed. But in the end, we came out with what both of us regard as a sound record of the first four or five generations of that branch.

I'm enclosing a small example of what the two of us produced -- our complete revision of the record of John Belknap Sr. son of Joseph and Prudence. You can compare it with your #489.

Why haven't I sent you such revised sheets as I went along? Simply because there wasn't time. I was too deeply involved in many investigations. Ordinarily, all I could do when a problem had been solved was to stick its file folder into the file cabinet containing such material -- deferring to some future time the laborious task of reducing the data to proper form for inclusion in my master file. Only when there was urgett need for preparing a sheetlike the one I'm enclosing did I take time to prepare it, for the approval of the correspondent who had helped on that problem.

So the great bulk of my revisions did not get into final form that you could examine -- but has remained unsummarized, awaiting organization when time permits.

Meanwhile, of course, I was deeply involved in expanding the master file by getting records that went well beyond the point that HWBhad reached by 1926. At a guess, I'll judge that I've added at least 2,000 more names. They, too, are in file folders, waiting for the labor that will be needed in order to put them into proper shape for inclusion in the master file.

All this time, I was conscious of my desire to aid you as much as you had aided me. But I felt that I could not expect you to alter your records just because I said so. I'd have to give you valid proof that the changes were right -- which could be done only by stating the evidence, as on the sheet I'm enclosing.

For instance, your sheet #489 shows an Eli Belknap marrying a "Clarissa Lynn," whose name was actually Lyman, not Lynn -- and we have proved beyond question that the Eli who married that Clarissa was not a descendant of Joseph and Prudence but came from a very different branch. The error in your sheet stems from a bad and unjustifiable blunder by HWB in his early days, which he did not correct when he rewrote all his notes about 1920 or a year or so later. In correcting that error of his, I've removed from the Joseph-Prudence branch some 80 persons (not shown in your sheets) who do not belong in that branch at all. But I can't expect you to accept this revision until I find time to set down on paper a detailed statement of the complex evidence that requires it.

Please don't think for a moment that I believe I'm infallible. I make mistakes, too. Just this week I've been reminded of that unhappy fact. A correspondent has sent me a letter written by your sister Flora in 1949, containing what seems to be unquestionable proof that I erred in identifying a Susannah Belknap as twin sister of my great grandfather. This error of mine is embarassing. On the basis of the identification that I made, the D.A.R. accepted the application of a descendant of that Susannah and thus has a member who has no right to membership. I'll have a devil of a problem, trying to rectify my error, won't I? The fact that I had abundant circumstantial evidence supporting that mistaken identification doesn't soothe my remorse.

A couple of weeks ago, I decided that I'd have to cease collecting new entries in order to concentrate on the task of reducing to organized form all the data in those files of mine. Then will come the job of preparing an index of some 4500 names. How long will the job take? At a guess, at least a year. Then my stuff will be ready for your eyes -- not now.

Can our differing records be combined? Yes -- on two conditions.(1) That you can prove that your record, not mine, is right on a certain family.(2) That I can prove to you that mine is right, if it actually is right. In other words, if the two of us are reasonable people and are willing to spend a lot of time looking carefully at the many differences.

But I suppose that the main point is simply that I've been working along lines quite different from assembling a compilation from present-day sources, so that my records. when Iget them into shape for examination, are bound to disagree with much that is currently in manuscript and in print.

Wish me well, on the plodding labor that I now must undertake. It won't be fun. The fun was in the solving of problems.

Yet I can be sure that there are still some puzzles that I haven't yet tackled, and that I'll stumble onto them in the coming twelve months.

I assume the pencilled note about Hannah's parentage was written by Mrs. Campbell, for it doesn't look like your handwriting. Perhaps you may wish to direct her attention to an old pussle for which I have found no solution: the identity of "Tamesin Turloar," Hannah's mother. (Note spelling as usually found: Tamesin, not Tameson.)

One preceding worker has suggested that "Turloar" may be an erratic misspelling my of "Thurlow."

"Tamesin" -- the only occurence of this first name I have found in early New Englandmay also be a more or less phonetic misspelling, no worse than many others in that
period. Consider this possibility:

"Thomas" was often spelled "Tammas" -- the "a" sounded "ah".

Possibly "Tamasin" was pronounced "Tahmahseen" and was a variant spelling of "Thomasina."

So -- could TIMISIN "Tamesin Turloar" mean "Thomasina Thurlow"?

I recently discovered a mistake I had made on my sheets for Abraham. Enclosed is a revised set -- with changes and additions marked red. Please destroy earlier version.

NOTE to you on second sheet means that the spelling without "k" in will of that Henry does not mean that he himself had adopted that spelling. It merely means that the person who wrote that will and set down the name to be signed by mark did not hear a "k" sound and so omitted that letter, as many others did from then on. In register entry for burial of his daughter Mary, three years before date of the will, his name was spelled with "k." So I question naming him "Belnap" on the evidence of the will alone. . . In early Massachusetts documents, there are many instances of omission of "k" when the name was written by persons not members of the family — but not in any actual signatures that I have yet seen. All New York documents naming your ancestor Jesse — as far as I have yet seen — use the "k" But I have not yet seen any examples of his own personal signature. Have you?

Page 1 of the records enclosed with Mr Field's latter 11 Nov 1971 to W D Belnap shows the following transcript from Essex Quarter Sessions Rolls:

Roll No. 247-16: Norrington 20 Oct 1624 at Laughton, stole 7 white ewes each worth 5s. of Abraham Belknappe. Pleads not guilty.

If "at Loughton" indicates where Abraham lived at that time, we then have something that may help to fill the gap between 1620 and 1627, in our knowledge of where he lived in England after his marriage.

I think it likely that "Loughton" is a variant spelling of Latton -- the name of the parish in which Abraham married Mary Stallion. My reasons:

- -- In the spelling of that time, "au" was a frequent variant of "a." For example, the name Frances was often spelled frances; as in the case of Abraham's sister.
- -- An "a" may easily have been miscopied as "o." The spelling originally may have been Laughton -- which would have been ponounced just like Latton -- i.e., "Lahton."
- -- Old maps of or near that period show only a Latton in Essex -- no Loughton nor any similar place name.
- -- All of the places where Abraham has previously been found are close together in a small area -- Sawbridgeworth, Netteswell, North Weald, Epping -- and Latton is in that area, only one mile from Netteswell.

I may be misinterpreting the significance of the words "at Loughton." Perhaps they do not indicate Abraham's location. But on the assumption that they do, I have summarized on the attached sheet what is now known — to myself — about the places where Abraham was in the years between his marriage and his emigration.

If I err in this matter, I'll be most grateful for comments and corrections.

And I think I should ask a question:

Have the parish records of Latton been searched, for the years between 1620 and 1627?

As I think you may not have seen the 1931 and 1950 material in The Register, perhaps I should explain its background.

In 1914, H W Belknap published in The Register, as you know, what he then knew about the English Ancestry of the American Belknaps. He had The Register print 100 additional copies for him, which found their way into various hands. One copy is in the Library of Congress (which unfortunately has no similar copy of what he published in 1931, for no separate reprints of it were run off).

Meanwhile Charles Bernau in England continued searching. As the result of his further work, H W Belknap published in The Register in 1931 a long article correcting what he had published in 1914 — pages 265-288, 1931 volume. It's a detailed record of a lawsuit and the genealogical conclusions drawn from that record. (I have a photostat copy of the whole article, but am sending you only the pages that summarize the conclusions.)

In 1950, fame years after HNB's death, his friend and fellow genealogist 6. Andrews Moriarty (whose skill is pretty well unchallengeable) reviewed all the focuments on which the 1931 conclusions were based and published in The Registerhiz his endorsement of those conclusions — and, in addition, his summery of the records of Abraham's children, which Bernau had found in England but which HWB had not published. So, finally, a true statement of the birth of Abraham's children became available, with exact dates and places.

In explaining my annotations on Hyrum Belknap's pedigree, I'll begin with the last entry on its page h, and work my way backward.

THE FIRST KNOWN BELTOFT in our line: The 1931 article (A) shows his first name to have been Richard and the first name of his wife to have been Christian — facts not known in 1914. The dates for his death and the probable date of his birth are deduced by HWB and by me, from the 1931 article and the documents on which it was based. There is no justification for saying "Belknap or Beltoft", for there is no recorded indication that he was ever known as Belknap.

Here, before going on, I must digress. HWB'S 191h piece has misled many people, including many genealogists. In it, he said that Bernau had found that the name of the Sawbridgeworth family "was sometimes Beltoft." Later, he wrote of "the use of alternate surnames," implying that the two names were used more or less simultaneously.

Both statements are contrary to the actual record. What really happened was something much more sudden and much more dramatic. Like this: Suddenly, on the death of their father (Bennet), an entire generation xxxxxx dropped Beltoft and adopted Belknap as their family name. Thereafter, there were only three isolated instances of the use of Beltoft — in entries on the records of the church at Sawbridgeworth in 1663 and in 1682.

LAURENCE BELTOFT — the 1931 article (A) shows that he was the father of the second Richard Beltoft. The "Henry" named as possibly this Richard's father, but with a question mark, in the 191h article, has not been identified — but presumably he was a cousin of Laurence (son of Edmund or of Thomas. There is no record indicating that he was ever known as a Belkmap.

THE SECOND RICHARD named as "Beltoft alias Belknap" in HWB's 1914 article, but not in the 1931 article. There is no record indicating that he was ever "alias Belknap" — even though his son Josias was using the name Belknappe at the time of this Richard's death. The name of his wife was given by HWB in 1914 as "Elizabeth." But in 1931 the editor of the Register challenged this on lack of authentication — and HWB replied that he had no proof but that "Mr. Bernau had believed that this was her name." So we have to insert a question mark after her name.

BENNET Rakka BELKNAP OR Beltoft — I have left this entry unchanged. But there are only three recorded instances when he was known as a Belknap. (1) When the will of his brother Josias forced him to identify himself as Benedict Belknappe in court, though he signed his own will as a Beltoft, many years later. (2) When his wife Grace Adam (not Adams) and his youngest son Josias swore in court that he was a Belknap, when proving his will. (3) When his wife and his children buried him as "Belknap."

ABRAHAM BELKMAP — I have added "or Beltoft," in line with the woring used in the pedigree. Abraham was christened Beltoft — must have married as Beltoft, for he buried his first two sobs as Beltoft, while living at Netteswell. He seems to have changed to "Belkmap" when he moved to North Weald (variously written thus and North Weld and Northweald Bassett in various documents and maps). And he signed a deposition as Belkmap in 19 1626. . . I think that the one precise way of naming Abraham and his brothers and his sister would be to say "Belkmap, formerly known as Beltoft."

(Some day, when I get around to it, I'll write much more fully about this sudden dramatic chage of family name -- and what led up to it -- and why it happened.)

Looking back at the last short paragraph on the preceding page, I see that I must promptly say that I dot, not intend to discourage you from continuing to search for a link between the Sawbridgeworth family and the de Bealknap family. There is no doubt in my mind that the Sawbridgeworth Beltofts knew and had known for years that their true and proper name was Belknap — and that in 1624 they simply resumed the name they knew was properly theirs. No other explanation seems to fit the recorded facts. . And I think I know how and where I'd start searching for the link, if I were sure of living enough longer.

SAMUEL BELKNAP (on p.ge 3 of pedigree) — data inserted come from the 1950 article by Moriarty (B). Whether we sould say North Weald or Northweald Basset, for his birthplace, is uncertain and probably doesn't matter — same place, however written.

EBENEZER BELKNAP -- my insertions come from HWB's final and well-documented record.

SAMUEL BELKNAP (on page 2) — Data inserted from HWB'S final record, thoroughly documented. Note that his wife was Mary Dickinson, Mary Wood was the maiden name of her mother. Note final paragraph on (C). HWB was uncertain about date birth as 1703 (?). Elsewhere in his records he surmised that it was more likely 1693 — which is supported as a probability by information recently sent to me by a distant relative in Massachusetts.

JESSE BELKNAP -- my insertions come from HWB's final record and from my own independent records.

At some points I have entered a query, "Source?" - meaning that I have no confirmation of the entries at those points. I hope you can tell me the sources.

Please feel entirely free to challenge any of my annotations that you disagree with.

I promised I'd send you the backward extension of the English ancestry. So here it is.

I have already given you the published sources of what I'm going to be saying -New England Historical and Genealogical Register, 191h, 1931, 1950. But what
I'll be saying is based on more than was published, for I havebeen fortunate enough
to be able to study the correspondence between H W Helknap and the EMILE English
record agent Charles Bernau, over period of many years in which they worked
together on the task of tracing the English ancestry of Abraham. So I know the
basis of what HWB wrote and published.

And so, before starting, I must make one point -- that HWB was not only a devotedly persistent perfectionist but also, very often, a rather stubborn man, clinging to a notion that he had adopted, even when me it no longer was justified.

Early on, he was impressed by a casual sentence in a letter from Bernau, to the effect that "the use of alterhate surnames was very rare in England (in the 15th century) though somewhat common in the Channel Isles." He quoted this sentence in what he published, as an indication that he believed that our village ancestors used both surnames — Beltoft and Belknap — alternatively and more or less at random. But examination of Bernau's letter shows that Bernau meant exactly the opposite — that he, himself, did not really believe that this was a case of alternate surnames. . Similarly, Bernau wrote that he had found a couple of instances in which the Lay Subsidy roals showed the same man as Beltoft one time and Belknap another time. HWB, in what he wrote, magnified this into a broad generalization covering three generations. When I study the actual evidence, I find that there were only two such instances, and both were an the generation that drepped Beltoft and adopted Belknap as its surname.

Partly this perpetuated error results from the fact that HWB got The Register to run eff, in booklet form, 100 copies of what he published in 1914. Most of these copies, matrix still in his hands, were destroyed when his home burned down in the Salem Fire in 1917. But he had a few of them in his office in Essex Institute, where he was curator. And he had placed a copy in the Library of Congress — another copy in the New York Public Library — another copy in the library of the New York Cenealogical Society — and so on. (And some few copies found their way into the hands of individuals; like Maynard, for example.) . . Unfortunately, he dad not do the same thing for what he published in 1931. So the only easily findable result of his work is that 1914 booklet — which is cited again and again.

What I have been trying to say, in this sort of preamble, is that there is no known justification for saying "alias Belknap" until those Beltofts actually changed from Beltoft to Belknap. I'll show you just when that change occurred. But I will not, at this time, attempt to deal with the reason for the change. That's a separate subject, involving statements of my personal interpretation of the long and detailed evidence in my hands (including much that has not been published). Itll write about that subject some other day. For the moment, I'll merely give you the facts - as shown in church registers, wills, lawsuits, and depositions in law suits, etca

The record that has been traced, up to now, begins with Abraham's great-greatgrandfather.

(1) RICHARD BELTOFT, Sawbridgeworth, Herts. A yeoman farmer with an above-average holding of land in fee simple (absolute ownership).. As the result of a lawsuit in the middle of the 15th century, this land passed out of the family. . This Richard's birth date is unknown, but it is known that he died in the first decade of the 15th But he probably was relative young when he died, as he century -- 1500 to 1510. left a family of young children. For this same reason it is assumed that his wife CHRISTIAN (surname unknown) was the mother of his children. The order of birth of his sons is apparent from what is known about his will. Nothing is known about the two daughters.

John, probably born not later than 1490 or 1493 (fall, in law law was always called Baltoft.)

The very lengthy records of the lawsuit resulting from his will always name him Beltoft - never anything else.

(2) LAURENCE, son of the first Richard - also never named as Belkmap. Lived at Sawbridgeworth. 2xebabky Date of birth unknown, Date of death, probably about 1525 as that is the year in which Laurence's older brother John tookLaurence's son Richard in his home, where he lived till he grew up . Wife's name undersown.

Children: order of birth unknown

RICHARD, born about 1520 Alice Another daughter, first name not known

3) RICHARD BELTOFT, son of Laurence - never on record as anything but Beltoft. Wife's name unknown, but HWB said Bernau "thought" it was "Elizabeth". No A landless farmer, on copyhold (that is, a tenant of the local "squire"). Lost both the land owned by the first Richard and also the house and small acreage bequeathed to him (through what we now call a "living trust") by his uncle John. Prosperous enough to be able to bequeath other

rather considerable possessions to his children.

Born about 1520. Lived Sawbridgeworth. First Buried at Sawbridgeworth 17 January 1588 First (by calendar then in use; 1589 by our present-day calendar).

Children: (Order of birth not certain, but sound reason for believing Bennet to be the eldest)

BENNET (date of birth not known, but probably Sawbridgeworth church register began)
Alice, baptized 15 Sept. 1561
Josias, baptized 6 Sept. 1562

Now I must summarize the unusual will of this Richard Beltoft, for it plays a small part in the later change of name to Belknap. . His wife being dead, this Richard's will left "the Best" of everythinghe owned to his younger son Josias. Then the executor and administrator were to dive the rest of Richard's possessions into two parts "as equal as possible" and let Josias take his choice with Bennet, the older son remains what Josias did not want .

(Sounds like this Richard didn't much like Bennet, dossn't it. Well, neither do I -- for reasons that I'll be explaining in a moment of

(4) BENNET (short for Benedict) HELTOFT. Always known as Beltoft except on two occasions, which IXEXXXXXXXXX I'll come to in a moment or so.

Born probably before 1558. Lived Sawbridgeworth. Buried 21 May 1624. Married Grace Adam, 25 May 1586. His will dated 11 April 1623.

Often referred to as "the church warden" - but was elected to this office for only one year - 1610. (Two churchwardens elected each year, for one-year term. Fact that in this small village he was thus choden only once may indicate he was not too popular.)

Inherited no land, xxBiaxisharito from his father. Did inherit land from his younger brother Josias. May have acquired some land by his own effort, but this is not known.

ABRAHAM, baptized "Beltoft", Nawbridgeworth, 10 March 1589/90.
Frances, baptized Beltoft 3 January 1590/1
John, baptized Beltoft 8 April 1593

What emerges from study of Bennet's will and his apparent relations with his wife and children is a picture of a petty tyrant. Of all his children, the only one that married before his death was Abraham, who left Sawbridgeworth and moved (first) to Netteswell, the other side of the River Stort. Frances did not marry till she was almost 35 years old, moon after her father's death. John must have been about 26 when he married. Daniel, about 38. Josias, when the same sees for marriage in such villages in those times.

Abraham, who had married and moved away, was belowed not in Bennet's favor. Berlong and detailed will virtually disinherited his eldest son, Abraham, and left all main property to go to his youngest son, for the death of Bennet's wife Grac whom he directed, in his will "to keep the house and buildings in good condition and not to strip or waste the wood" (my wording, in present—day English.CYB) Ab was cut off with a bequest of 20 shillings — but was to inherit the land and builf his young brother Josias died without "heirs of his body" — an unlikely cont which did not occur.

Now is time to explain the change of name from Beltoft to Belknap. I'll state the facts, without exploring motives at this time.

This part of the story begins with Bennet's brother Josias — Abraham's uncle.
All that we know of him comes from the short and sweet and tender will that he obviously wrote or dictated as he lay near death. It contains none of the usual legal wording of wills drawn up by lawyers at that time. And he himself signed it. (Now of his generation or before could sign their names.)

From the will of Josias we know that he had married a Brown, who was dead. And the he loved her brothers and was grateful to the servant of one of them. And that though he owned "landes" (which he did not describe) he apprently did not live in a home of his own, as all his possesions aside from money were stored with a brothe in-law and with Bennet. And that he willed to Bennet "my landes and everything he I received from my father" — far together with some money and forgiveness of the money debt owed to him by Bennet, including unpaid rent on the "landes." And that by some unknown means he had built up what was a remarkable estate for a 38 year old villager who had begun with no real inheritance — including money owed him in Ireland and in Southwark on the south bank of the Thames. I can estimate his estate at probably about ... 150 points — a huge sum for those days, for a young villager. (Shakespeare, after a much longer business life of great prosperity, accumulated only about three times that much wealth — in the same period in which Josias lived.)

And we know from his will that Josias was away from home when this will was drawn - probably at Southwark, where he appears to have been buried. Entry in church register in Southwark, in the year when Shakespeare's Globe Theatre was built, "Josi Belknappe, An atranger and no parish foner."

And we know from his will that he called himself "Belknappe" and that he forced his brather Bennet to go into court and swear that he was Behedict Belknappe, as named in the will of Josias. Max

Josias was buried h February 1599/1600. Within two days, Bennet hastened to court to probate the will, as "Benedict Belknappe", on oath in court.

That is the only time that Bennet is known to have mainbooks called himself a Belknap.

Twenty-three years later, when he signed his will, he made his mark as Bennet Beltoft.

But in 1624, when Bennet died, his two chief legatees - his wife Grace and his youngest son Josias probated his will by swearing under oath in court

that though his will was signed (by mark) Beltoft, his name was Belknap.

From that day on, it was Belknap. A few short months after Gennet died, his daughter Frances married as a Belknap. From their brothers, when they married, married as Belknaps and christened their children Belknap — and were buried as Belknaps when them they died. And Bennet's wife Grace was buried as a Belknap.

There were only two reversions to Beltoft, in records after the doubt of Bennet. Twice, many years later, some clark or pastor or church warden not come Beltoft in the church register when someone who had been christened Belknap was buried. That's all.

But one of Bennet's sons had led the way, before Bennet died.

Abraham, from whom we are descended, married about four or five years before his father died and must have used Beltoft at that tame, for his first son, dying in infancy in 1620, was recorded as a Beltoft in the church register at Netteswell. But when Abraham moved a bit farther south in county Essex, to EX North Weald — a village near Epping — the church register of the baptisms of his children shows that he had begun naming himself "Belimap" in or before 1622 — two or perhaps that he had begun naming himself "Belimap" in or before 1622 — two or perhaps there years before his father Bennet died. For none of Bennet's other children had his courage to call themselves Belkmaps while their father lived. (The North Weald church register speaks it "Beltrap" — but that was a common misspelling of Belkmap in days when some one wrote down what he thought he heard said by an illiterate man — and from other evidence the identification of Abraham at North Weald, and as Abraham Belkmap properly spelled, is unmistakable.)

DEAR DELLA:

Forgive me. You're the last person whom I could neglect. But since the death of my wife's mother in July I've had no time for genealogy. And we've been away lately. Found your letter of Sept 25 when I returned today. It reminded me that I hadn't yet answered your July letter. I apologize.

Thanks for data on John and Joan, children of Sir Robert. . . Perhaps I can now add a little to the information sent by John Matthews. John's son WYKKET was not named "Harmon" as in quotation from Hasted's Kent (an unreliable source on many points.) His name was, in English "Hamon," in French "Hamond", in Latin "Hamo." He was treasurer of Normany, under Henry V. His wife's brother, Ralph Boteler (as then spelled, later generations "Butler") was Lord YMMATHY Sudeley, Treasurer of England under Henry V. . . . John's sister Joan Belknap married (1) Sir Ralph Stonor and (2) Edmund Hampden. . Most of above information frm P. W. Montague-Smith, editor of Debrett's Peerage, and a descendant of Joan Belknap and Edmund Hampden. Rest from various old documents in British Museum. . . . I am nearing the point at which I'll set down on paper a statement of the circumstantial evidence that tends to link the Sawbridgeworth family to the family of the Judge — wholly circumstantial, but nevertheless worth stating.

Your latter Sept 25: I'm interested, deeply, in your current research in England. Wish you'd tell me in detail what was found. Even negative results — "no record found" — can be very important to me, on certain points. . . Are you sure you are right in calling Bennet's wife Grace Adams? It's Adam in everthing I have seen of original douments — no "s." Months ago I made some notes on this, for you, from records sent by Edward Bernau to HWB. Here the are:

"In or before 1543, John Beltoft (son of the first Richard Beltoft CYB) gave his father's will to Dennis Adam and William Garland, who took it with them."

"4 April 1544 John made a new settlement appointing trustees, in presence of Denys Adam (and others, CYB)"

Always III Adam, no "s", in all such records of that family -- as far as I have seen.

I haven't yet gone to England. But I'll be in London on Oct 20 and 21 (on way to Greece for a month or more). I don't have anyone to suggest, for work in England.

Will be glad to see Mr Parker if he comes this way before Oct 19 or after Dec 1.

As to the old Mary Wood-Mary Dickinson, argument, I enclose a summary of the legal evidence assembled by HWB and Commander Charles Belknap — I wrote it in May, condensing legal verbiage into everyday English as best I could. (I have found the Commander's detailed records and expect to get them lent to me when I return from Greece. His work was beautiful scholarship.)

I did hear from Mrs. Milton R Belknap, Des Moines. Her difficulties stemmed from AXAAX a falsified entry in an old family Bible. My cousin Clinton Belknap (lincoln Nebraska) went to Des Moines and examined that Bible and established the correct date of the second marriage of Elisha Belknap, brother of my great grandfather Jesse. So now Mrs. Belknap's grandaughter Carol Anne is successfully applying for DAR membership. Elisha's father, my great great grandfather Jonas Newton Belknap, fought on Bunker Hill

when he was 16 and remained in the Army till June 1783.

Forgive me for not having time, right now, to fill in the pedigree sheets you sent to me. As a temporary substitute, I enclose a copy of pedigree sent to Dick Taylor for his use, some months ago. It begins with imam Jonas Newton Belknap, son of Samuel Belknap and Mary Newton — whem you have in your records. That Samuel, as you know, was the son of Samuel Belknap and Mary Dickinson (not, please, Mary "Mood"). So my great great grandfather Jonas Newton B. seems to be very closely related to your ancester Jesse Bellmap — some of whose descendants in Michigan spell it with the "K" as no doubt you know.

DATE OF DEATH OF ABRAHAM'S SON SAMUEL

Today I noted that on your latest sheet for Abraham (with memo dated May 1972) you retained for this Samuel the date you once said came only from Evans: 1676. My first instinct was to make a correction to "after Oct 1696" in accord with a memo to you some time ago. But something inspired me to take another look Result: I've come out with a humbling lesson in the folly of trusting even the greatest known authority.

The authority whom I trusted was O Andrews Moriarty -- the top man in New England genealogy during this century. In the Register, 1950, he gave his blessing to hwB's work on our anglish ancestry, out added:

"Mr Belknap states that Samuel, son of Aoraham. .. was living in 1731. This in an error, for the Samuel living in 1731 was evidently Samuel's son Samuel."

Accepting Moriarty's judgment, I abandoned HwB's "living in 1731" -- and eventually wrote you a note indicating that I was sure that Samuel signed a deed in Oct 1696 and might have signed one in Nov of that year but that the second deed might have been signed by his son Samuel, in which case the Samuel who acknowledged thexamentx Mov deed in 1731 would have been the son.

Now, reviewing all the evidence, including something I had not known but till lately and also something I hadn't noted. I've concluded that I was just as wrong as Moriarty was, and that HWB must have been right and our first Samuel must actually have lived till he was 104.

To make a record for my files, Its going to give the full evidence for this reversal of mine. Here goes.

- (1) Something I had not known till a little while ago: Samuel's son Samuel was settled in southern New Jersey by 1790, and apparently stayed there. couldn't have had anything to do with that deed of Nov 1696 and its acknowledgment in 1731. (I may have mentioned him to you, before, but I don't think so.)
- (2) Something I had not noted till now: When THEXXENTER Semuel's son Abrahm soldsome of the land given to him by MANNAI the Nov 1696 deed, the deed he signed on 17 June 1720 described the land like this -- " . . . 1 of the 100 acres which was laid out in to Bartholomew Heath's third division & by him conveyd to Mr. Thomas Brackett. . . & from him to my Hond father & from him to me" Underlining mine. proved that the Samuel who signed the deed dated 21 Nov 1696 was the Samuel who waspon of Abraham.
- (3) Now for the 1731 date: It had to be the same Samuel ... What seems to have happened is that at some time after Abrahm of Reading and Framinham sold that kand Haverhill land (rather half of it) a subsequent purchaser must have demanded verification of Abraham's title to it -- as no acknowledgement had been added in 1696. So, in 1731 -- as often happened in those days and in the next century -- a belated acknowledgment was attached, and signed by a Samuel who could only have been

the "Hond father" who deeded the land to his son in 1696.

So back into my records will go the date of death set down by HWB -- "after 1731" -- or more precisely. "after 31 Aug 1731." the day on which he signed that acknowledgement at Concord.

(From the fact that his daughter Patience, who never married, witnessed the acknowledgment in 1731, we can guess that she was living with her aged father and taking care of him -- but that's not evidence.)

And I'll never again trust an authority, no matter how great he is.

Other points on your #608:

- Moses and Obadiah were sons of Ebenezer, not sons of Samuel.
- -- The son Samuel, born 1662, did not marry Elizabeth Jones. As I think I've told you before (if my memory is correct) the Samuel who married Elizabeth Jones was son of Joseph, born 1684, as proved by entry of his death in his wife's Bible. So your #609 is also incorrect.

- (3) List of sources should include NEHOR 1931 and also pages 316 &317 of NEHOR 1950, as the piece by G. Antrova Moriarty on those pages is the source of the worrect list (Andrews)
- (4) Child 2 -- Abraham -- date of birth is not known. Moriarty gives it as "circa 1922 1622." All that is of record on him is that he was named in Bennet's will in 1623.
- (5) Child 3 David date of his birth or christening not known. Permissable to say "Probably 1623 or Issk 1624." Entry on his death should show "Buried 2 March 1624/5."
- (6) Child h Samuel d_a te given for his birth was date of christening and year should read 1627/8.
- (7) Child 7 "John or Jeremy" Very early writers stated a Jeremy. For many years all best genealogists have insisted that there was no Jeremy in this generation. Even Savage called him "the supposed Jeremy" and refused to accept him. Moriarty, in NEHGR 1950 (mentioned above) shows that John as John made a deposition on 27 March 1655. No record of any "Jeremy" in that generation has ever been found. Certainly it would seem that John was never "or Jeremy." Hack genealogies such as Connecticut Genealogy, which still lists a Jeremy, should be disregarded.
- (8) Child 8 Hannah date of birth should follow Moriarty's wording: "About 1639/40." Name of Hannah's husband is usually given as "Christopher Osgood the 2nd" to avoid confusion with his father.
- (8) Child ix 4 Samhel article by Moriarty (most respected of all New England genealogists; see obit in recent issue of NEHGR) showed that the Samuel who was living in 1731 was notthis Samuel. Date of death of this Samuel is not known. Entry "after 31 Aug 1731" should be deleted.
- (9) QUERY: Should name of Abraham, at top of shaet, show MIENTHEMEXENTERIZE
 "(Christened Beltoft")? Also, should that line also show "(Adopted name of Belknap
 at some time between 6 Dec 1620 and 2 March 1624/5, following precedent set by
 his uncle Josias")?
- (10) NOTE FOR FUTURE ACTION: Do not accept entries on name and parentage of A's wife till proof has been examined.

To keep you informed - here are copies of two letters to another very helpful cousin.

They may contain some bits of information that may interest you.

3/11/68

Today I'm going to try to answer the questions you asked on the sheet showing your own direct Belkmap lineage. Most of the can be answered briefly. But one of them is going to let you in for an ungodly long effort to tell you what I know and don't know about Jesse's father — Jonne Nowton Belkmap. I'll ask, in advance, for your forgiveness of its wordiness.

I'm attaching your sheet, with red ink notations. (I've made a copy for my file, so that you can write me about any point that you have reason to question.) The paragraph designations below — A, B, C, etc. — are shown in red ink on your sheet. (Red check-marks on your sheet indicate that my records agree with yours. I'll be talking mainly about points of disagreement, and uncertainties.)

- (A) It looks as if someone has misled you on dates Old Style and New Style. Up to 1752 the English calendar counted March 25 as the beginning of the new year. So dates from Jan 1 to March 2h, before 1752, are shown both ways, as 1889/90 for the birth of Abraham. But dates from March 25 to Dec 31 are the same year in both Old Style and New Style. That's why I've crossed out the second year dates for Hannah Ayer. Death
- (B) Birth date for Mary Dickinson is uncertain. I think 1703 the more likely year, and so did HWB in his later years. At present, I'm arguing with the Salt Lake people about this and other similar points. They place too much faith in the early "Vital Records" in Massachusetts which were notoriously erratic up to almost 1750 and cannot be trusted except when confirmed by other evidence. Often they differ by a year from more reliable records, such as church registers. Sixth date of her husband samuel is now known to have been before 6 Dec 1757. (HWB showed it as about 1757 in his early correspondence; found out better, years later.) Exact date not known, yet.
- (C) Name of church is "St. Mary the Great." I have a photo of it and a detailed description dated about 1870. As I've already told you, Bennet was churchwarden only one year. Local pronunciation of Sawbridgeworth in his time was sometimes "Sapsearth" and sometimes "Sabbisford" Name of townwas very ancient Old English out of Angle Saxon, meaning "Sebrig's enclosure" at an early time when almost no English land was "enclosed" by hedge or fence. Variation "ford" came later, from the ford teress the River Stort.
- D) Abraham and Mary had not lived in Sawbridgeworth since at least 1622 long before oming to America. Their known residences in England were Netteswell (Netswell) and orth Weald (Northweld; North Weald Basset) in Essex. They apparently signed up at opping, with the Massachusetts Bay Company as ammigrants for America. (Banks) oppographical Dictionary, published in the 1930's I forget exact date.) (HWB was sponsible for saying again and again that they came from Sawbridgeworth and did not she was not a Sawbridgeworth girl. Where she was born or lived before marriage a not yet been discovered.)
- (E) Ebenezer and Hannah had 12 children, mx as you say but one daughter died at 17. The other 11 were long-lived.
- Please give me the source of the middle name you show for Mary Gibbs. I have no ord of it. . . This Samuel did fight on Bunker Hill. I have his complete

military pay and enlistment record. He did not die on Bunker Hill as the old legend says — nor the next day as HWB sometimes wrote. His death occurred late in 1775, some time in late October or November or December — exact date not on record — merely "reported deceased" after last dated entry in Demember, which may well have been made after his death as it was an authorization for issue of "bounty coat or equivalent" which could have been taken as authorization of a money payment to his heirs. More about him later, when I talk about his son Jonas Newton Belknap.

(0) You ask about "Eather Lincoln" or "Eather Parker." Instead of merely answering that it was Eather Parker, I'm going to do much more. I'm going to try — for the first time-to tell what I now believe I know of the full story of Jonas Newton Belknap — my great-great-grandfather. It's only lately that I've brought together enough real facts to put me in position to tell his story, without making some bad guesses as I've sometimes done in the past. As you and I seem to be the only persons who have made definite effort to learn about him, I think you'll not mind my being EX long-winded — for you, like me, are interested in our people, not merely genealogy.

First, I must clear the way by saying that HWB, to whom all Belknaps owe so much, made a sad mess of setting down a record of this Jonas. Eventually his file contained two conflicting cards for Jonas — and both of them were full of errors, even to confusing the military record of Jonas with that of a much earlier Belknap who fought in a different var. And from time to time, in order to get help from living Belknaps, HWB wrote letters offering information that was based on his early research and would be found arroneous in later years. So he muddled the stream — and I keep trying to clear it up.

n 1913, for instance, he wrote a letter to Clark containing at least six misstatements. no of them was this: "Jesse was the son of Jonas N. and a Lincoln." He might better ave written that the wife of Jonas N. was "said to be a Lincoln," for he had no real vidence — nothing but something said by someone who merely repeated a bit of hearsay. y 1920, when HWB wrote to my father, a Belknap relative—by—marriage in Connecticut had hown them the valid record of marriage to Esther Parker — but today, 55 years after. WB wrote that letter to Clark, that Lincoln ghost still keeps on haunting us. One thing 'm going to try to do is to offer a surmise about that ghost — but that will come late a the story.

- Fore leges and pages (H) I doubt that dane's par father was Elijah Carlinghouse. of copies of original records (sales of land, wills, gravestones, etc) sent to me by my greatest kulphanxxxx helper, Gladys Gray, a member of the staff of a church in Canandaigua, N. Y., make it seem much more likely that her father was either James Garlinhouse, in Lucerne County, Pa. in 1790 (a year or so before Jane was born) or Benjamin Garlinghouse, born 1761, died 1850, age 89, whose wife was Marcia (last name unknown) died 18 Nov 1845, kanam aged 77, hence born 1768. Please tell mo the source of your entry of Elijah as her father. . . The Belknaps and the Carlinghouses were closely associated in the years from 1800 to 1820, in Ontario County, N. Y., Two of Jesse's brothers also married Garlinghouse girls. near Canandaigua Lake. His brother Jonas (son of Jonas Newton Belkmap) married Mary Garlinghouse -- who is said to have gone to Oregon with Jesse's family and to have died at Monroe, Oregon, in 1867. And Jesse's older brother Elijah married "Catherine" Garlinghouse according to HWB - but present-day descendants of this marriage call her "Christian" or The three girls are believed to be sisters. HWB finally, after doubting "Christine." that Elijah Garlinghouse was their father, came to believe that they were the probably daughters of James and Eleanor Garlinghouse. . . I think this parentage is attitix still open to study; so I'll welcome any aid you can give me. What's your source? . . The Ontariog County records make it certain that the Garlinghouses came from New Jersey (via N. E. Pennsylvania). You ask if they were "Dutch". I doubt it, for all the given names in this numerous family were English - wostly Biblical - with not one instance of a Dutch or German name -- though I too was told, when a children that they were of German or Dutch ancestry.
- (I) You ask about last names of wives Abraham's wife, Mary, has been said by an extremely unreliable correspondent to have been "Mary Webster." This correspondent, Walter Kerr Belknap of Chester, Conn. is dead. His widow tells me that all his genealogical papers were sent to one of his cousins, whose name I have just learned. Itll write to that cousin in a day or soy to see what I can learn about about the source from which he got "Webster", for he named no source when he supplied that name to Charlene Belkmap Taylor and her husband Dick -- who prepared that "family tree" Of course he may have discovered something that no one else has ever been able to find, the record of Abraham's marriage - but I'd think that in this case he would certainly have been eager and prompt to publish his discovery in some historical or genealogical journal, and I've not found any record of such publication. Judging by the visible inaccuracy of what he wrote to the Taylors, I have little faith in what he wrote about Mary's name. But I'll hope to find haxwaaxaightexx Our cousins in Utah real evidence that he was right. . Grace Adam, Bennet's wife. may have discovered her parentage. I haven't had time, yet, to study what they have dug up. . . Sarah Jones (wife of our first Samuel) was daughter of Robert and Elizabeth Jones of Hingham, Mass., according to HWB and other records. I am not sure of the date of her birth, nor the place (and one wonders how Samuel at Salem met a girl from the distant (for those times) south shore of Massachusetts Bay). . . . Hannah Ayer (wife of Ebenezer) was daughter of Nathaniel Ayer and Tamesin Turloar (which may be a misspelt version of "Thurlow.") Place of her birth uncertain, as yet. Her sister Elizabeth married Ebenezer's brother Abraham. . . Mary Dickinson, wife of our 2nd Samuel, was daughter of James Dickinson and his wife Mary Wood, Rowley, Mass. Note spelling - Dickinson, not Dickenson. After marriage to Samuel, she and Samuel and her brother James Dickinson the 2nd and his wife moved to north central Connecticut where they had adjoining farms and big families. . . The name of Richard Beltoft's wife: I've already written to you that her name is not really known and that there is no proof that her first hame was Elizabeth, though HWB said (in a letter to the editor of The Register) that "Mr. Bernau tho ught she was the Elizabeth who died in 1589." The editor did not agree and neither do I.



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When I began writing this letter, I planned to end with an effort to tell the full story of what I know (now) about my great-great-grandfather Jonas Newton Belkmap — for I have finally accumulated enough factual data to enable me to see that in everything that has been said or written about him by myself and other people there have been a lot of errors. I have often reproached HWB for his mistakes; but on the story of Jonas I've been just as guilty, and I want to remedy my past reliance on legend and gossip and hearsay. However, when I came to start writibg the true factual story I found that it was demanding more time than I can spare at this moment. So it will have to be set aside for a while. I'll send it to you when I complete it.

Another thing I intend to write an soon as I can find time for it is the true story of Abraham — why he was landless, though an eldest son who should have inherited land — why he came to Massachusetts — and so on. The bare facts are all on record, but their meaning has never been put down on paper. I need to tell that story to every living Belknap whom I can reach, for all of us need to know it.



Your letter of March 3 with its helpful enclosures arrived today. It embarasses me, for I'm the one who should be saying thank-you. I've done little to help you, by comparison with all that you have done for me.

I'm going to try to reply at once, for fear of letting myself get sidetracked by other things.

- (1) Thanks for sheets showing entries in Lattob church register. Am returing them, after running off copies for my files.
- (2) And thanks for having Mr Smith review my queries about "Loughton." I'll modify my record of Abraham to show him farming at Latton. Incidentally, my apologies for having sent you a poor carbon copy of my memo, instead of the original. Careless handling in putting things together for mailing. Sorry.
- (3) The handling of Beltoft and Belknap in our English records: I'll draft a statement of my notions, for your consideration, and will mail it soon.
- (4) Chart in QUEEN magazine. Will have a copy made for you.
- (5) New material on Seymour Belknap=Lydia Campbell. Agrees with my files except on some dates -- minor differences, not important. . On the chance that you may possibly have some use for it, I'm enclosing a copy of three sheets on which three present-day descendants of that line sketched their paternal and maternal lineage (with some obvious errors and shortages). Forget who sent it to me, long ago. Sent a copy of it to another descendant, a couple of years ago.
- (6) My new sheets on Joseph Belknap=Prudence Morris and their descendants. Will ship to you as soon as some remaining details have been entered. I should assure you that you won't be able to confirm them by anything you find in records previously published the point being that all preceding versions have been sadly in expor, as result of one of the classic errors in genealogy, "the missing generation."
- (7) Pooling of information. Yes, gladly. But don't know just how to go about it right now. Trouble is that I've been primarily interested in two main lines of research: (A) correcting old errors by HWB and others, by digging for priginal documents not previously taken into account, and (B) extending my basic master file by collecting new material, on **EXPLIMITENT** Belknaps not previously included by HWB and others. . . The result of this two-sided concentration of effort is that I have neglected the drudgery of entering new and revised data in my master file. So there are many hundreds of names in raw material not yet transfered to my master file in organized form. . What I must do, of course, is to stop searching for more and more Belknaps and put what I've got into systematic form and then re-number all entries and index them so that what I have can properly be coordinated with the records you have built up. How I hate this drudgery! But I'll have to submit to it. And it will take a lot of time.

Dear Carroll;

Thanks for the information you have sent. I appreciate what you do. Sure have

not done much for you, but will try to do what I can.

One can check and double check and still make mistakes. That is in the typing. Have had a lady helping to do the double checking, but one of us sliped up.

Maybe you have already noticed on the family group sheets I sent on Benet and Grace Beltoft, that the death date is 22 29 Oct 1630. The marriage date was typed in the death date place. Also on the same page the "e" was left out of Edward Doucet. On one of the sheets where Laurence is given as the father, it is spelled wrong. I hope that is all the typing errors made. On these same sheets I have put the last name in parenthesis the the surname that was not found in the parish records, but where entered by others in the Salt Lake Gen. Library. Also to identify, our line.

I have found no explaination as to why the name was some times Beltoft or Belknap, Belknap, Belknap, other than the fact the people could not write and who ever wrote the names wrote them as they thought in it sounded. There are other

spellings, but Beltoft has not be explained to my satifaction.

I know in the N E H G R of Jan 1914 page 83,84 The Will of Bennet Beltoft, father of Abraham Belknap it says "In the Commissary Court of London for Essex and Herts, and was entered in the Probate Act Book for 1623-1626 under the name BELKNAP, while it appeared in the Calander of Wills under the name BELTOFT, which is the form used in the Will & ets".

Also my father was in England in 1913. He did much research, also had others do research for him. He said there was no way to tell when the Alias Belknap or alias Beltoft had started. He also talked about a Belknap who had adopted a Beltoft. My father isn't here to ask about these details now, nor did he write it down. Not until I can find something more diffinate, have not mentioned this. We will record the name as found in the records as it is found. Also the name Belknap in parenthesis will be used to identify the line for the rest of the family. This is what we have decided to do until a better or more satisfactory explaination a can be found.

We are looking in the Beltoft family's origin. Nothing much is found on this name either. It has been called to our attention by our researchers Beltoft a hamlet in the "Isle of Axholme" in north-west Lincolnshire, in the parish Belton. The report says "It was inhabited by a family taking its name from the hamlet which was translated into Latin as "de Belto Toft". In 1394/5 they found a family of Thomas de Beltoft. They also had a Coat of Arms. This you already know, I'm sure.

Mr. Frank Smith has sent another mand to help in Essex. There already is one in Essex and one in Herts. Mr. Fields, who worked for Dr. Dean Belnap, is going to Middlesex and Linclonshire. Whatever they learn, if it is more than what you sent

you will receive a copy of.

You will notice an "X" by the name that is the direct line on the sheets I sent to you. The direct line as Mr. Smith has helped us with is; Bennet & Grace (Adam) Reltoft or Relknap; His father is Richard Beltoft and Elizabeth; His father is Laurence Beltoft and his father is Richard and Christian. Don't know who Henry

Reltoft Bur 5 July 1561, is.

Will have to apologize on the Will of Henry. Had the wrong Henry in Mind. Was thinking of the Henry Beltknap bur 13 Apr 1686. When I read his Will made 10 Apr 1686, he only mentions his wife Mary; Children, Elizabeth, James and Daniel and a son-in-law Edward Dowsett. Usually this would indicate all the living members of his family at that date, the rest would be dead. However I don't know the death dates of these children Samuel, Benett, Abraham and Sarah. The child Mary was bur 13 mug 170h. She would be living at the time of the Will. Also this Henry could have had a Bro-in-law Edward Dowsett as his let wife was Elizabeth Dowsett. I don't show or know who his Children married, but they could have married into the Doswett family. After looking at these facts I couldn't be sure the Death Dates in Waltham Abbey are children of Henry who married Mary Pery. Hope to find some other evidence to identify them.

Guess I had better do my own typing and check all family group sheets a little better. In checking kurk Henry Beltknap and Mary Pery 's sheet I see on one sheet the Bur date is typed in the death date. He was Bur 13 Apr 1686, not a death date. I hope There are no more typing errors.

I'm returnign your letter on Abraham Belknap. The comments in green are by Mr. Frank Smith. I'm also sending you a copy of the material found in Latton, Essex, Eng, You can see there were Belknaps there, but evidently had come from some place else as there where no birth or christening dates. Have not learned the relationship of these other Belknaps.

You will notice under the marriages a Daniel Beltnap and BarbaraGulliford. This I believe to be the son of Benet Beltoft and Grace Adam, who married Barberie.

Up to this time we have had nothing on Sir Robert having had a wife Amy. Only wife mentined as Sibbella or Sybill Dorset or Juliana Darset. Which some think is the same person.

Still have not had time to go over the material as I should by that Dr. Belmap obtained. Still trying to get through the material Jimmie Parker sent in. It is

too confusing to try too many lines as once.

No we do not have the chart published in Queen Magazine in 1951 showing the line of descent of the Queen of England and that of Shakespear. Have heard about it. Would appreciate having a copy. However I would make want to pay for the copy to be made. Let me know the cost and I will sent it to you.

If you have differences in some families, we would like to know it. The it would give us a chance to double check our resources. The family of Joseph Belknap and Prudence Morris is in my book on page 487. Most of the information is by H. W. B. Some by Glen Evans and now some by Jiumie Parker. Some of the information is conflicting. When you show information that is conflicting, could you give us the source for your information. We could check it out that in the Salt Lake Gen. Libr.

The Salt Lake Gen. Ribrary have just moved into a beautiful new building. The first 3 floors of a 28 story building. Hesides the Library Volts airs in a granit wall of a canyon just outside of Salt Lake City. The volts are really somthing to see. All of the genealogy has been duplicated on film and are stored in these wolts for protection. It would be nice for you to have a vacation and come out to see it, and some of your relatives too. Dr. W. Dean Relnap is now again on one of the committees of that Library. Maybe I should say the Salt Lake Genealogical Society. He doesn't have anything to do with running the Library. He has his own medical Clinis in Rountiful, its 8 miles north of Salt Lake City.

At the Pelnap Family meeting held Feb 28, it was proposed to the family to continue the research of the Belknap family in U.S. and Canada. Is is so expensive to get a good researcher. They are so few most of them have more than they can handle. It was proposed to use student researchers under the direction of a teacher or Jimmie Parker. At the Brigham Young University at Provo, Utah, about 35 miles south of Salt Lake City, they teach Genealogical and research courses. The University has a student body over 20,000. Dr. Belnap was going to check into this further.

Dr. Belnap also thought it would help if all Belknap's who are interested, could join together and help each other with the information they already had. Then in return they would receive a copy of the material we found. It would all be documented. You already have a copy of Hyrum Belnap's research. A kink copy of Glam Evans work. And I'm sure more of H.W.B. work than what has been published. What do you think of the idea.

It is Dr. Belmap's desire to put out a book or books on all material found and stories of any of the people we can find. He goal as four years. I told him you had the same idea of writing a book or do something along that line. We do not want to interfer with any of your plans. You could do as you wished, but we could

possibly help you with some information.

Almost forgot, I'm enclosing more information on one of Seymour Belknap and Lydia Campbell's children. page 277. Received it from Mrs. Betty Joe Barnson Abraham. Her father married Aileen Belknap as a 2nd wife. I obtained part of this from Glen Evans record. She has verified the information he had and has added what Aileen Belknap had. Hope you can understand this letter and the typing. Have had so many interruptions. Thanks again for all that you have done for me.

Thanks for all the information you have sent. Much of the

material was new to me.

All the Parishes we have asked to be checked, were searched from 1800 to the earlist records they could find. I assume the same was done in the Latton, Essex area. To make sure I have sent a letter to Frank Smith to find out. The first part of our research I was only informed if some thing was found. Now I receive the complete reports from all the parishes as they are searched. We are still going through all the parishes, with in a 25 mi. radius of Latton and Sawbridgeworth. Some of the parishes they will not let any one look at the registers. We are also looking for the names of Adam and Stallion. Have found nothing more on the Stallion name. But Adam or Adams and its various spellings are every where. However nothing more has been found on our direct line.

I'm sending the names of the other parishes you have mentioned to Frank Smith for him to have checked. Will let you know what he says

I had the Will of Abraham Belnap of Waltham Abbey, Essex. That parish did have records 1563 to 1800. Only Bellnapp found were burial dates.

1725 Mar 14 Bennet Bellnapp

1728 Apr 24 Abraham Bellmapp Jr

1733 Dec 5 Abraham Bellnapp

The Abrahm Bellnapp's Will dated 6 Apr 1728 leaves a question in my mind. Big Was it Abraham Jr that died in 1728 who made the will, or did the son in the will die in 1728 and the father die in 1733. Who was Bennet Belinapp? He is not mentioned in the Will.

It also looks like this family came from some place else, as no

births, baptisms or marriages were found.

I'm sending you, on family group sheets, all the information I have on the direct line from Benet Beltoft, back to Richard Beltoft and Christian. This included any information on their children. I know this is some different than H W B. record as we have learned that our direct line came thru a tamenen Lawrence rather than the We have Henry's will & etc. but do not know where he belongs in the family. Your letter Feb 13 and the sheets for Sawbridgeworth family came yesterday. My thanks, of course.

The Bennet and Abraham at Waltham Abbey must be -- I think you'll agree -- the sons of Henry Belknap and Mary Pery, b 2 Feb 1674/5 and 24 January 1679/80.

I'm a little puzzled by your comments about Henry Beltoft, in next to last main paragraph of your letter. In NEHG Register 1931, H W Belknap showed that he could not have been son of the first Richard Belknap nor father of the second Richard. Purpose of HWB's 1931 piece was to show that Richard's father was Laurance, not Henry as he had mistakenly said in 1914. . . You say you have this Henry's will (he died 1561). I'd like to see it, if possible.

As to Laurence: Original record of his name appears only on p 276 of the 1931 piece in the Register. There spelled, twice, "laurence" with a small "1" but that doesn't matter. I know of no instance in which his name was spelled with a "w" -- Lawrence.

I'm trying to muster enough brashness to write to you about your use of Belknap on the sheets -- "or Belknap" -- "alias Belknap." I fear you and I are far apart on this subject. But I can't help wishing you wouldn't publish the sheets as now worded, in the next Crier. There has been far too much widespread confusion in the past, over Beltoft and Belknap. I in 1914 HWB made use of "alias Belknap" on names where it was not justified -- was reproved for this -- and dropped it in the 1931 article.

Your letter, Jan 23. . . . I, too, "am always behind in letter writing." So, this time, I'm pushing everything else aside in order todeal with your letter and the batch of material from England. If I don't do it at once, I never will.

There's much for me to cover -- many points -- so for your convenience I'll be covering them in separate memos, one for each main topic.

In this present note I'll tackle only general points that don't need extended treatment or documentary evidence.

- (1) Money for this sort of copying. Glsd to provide it. Please just tell me when you can use it.
- (2) You're right about my being familiar with much of the English stuff you sent. But you were right to send it, for there are some important things in it that are new to me. I hope you'll find some or at least a few bits of new informationin the stuff I'll be sending to you as fast as I get it put together. . . . And I hope the many erratic variations in some of Mr Field's collections don't mislead you. Secondary sources such as local histories and pseudo genealogies compiled long years afterward are pf course pretty unreliable -- with lots of mere hearsay in place of real evidence. Even the Dictionary of National Biography is full of errors resulting from undue reliance on secondary sources. . . The confusion over Haman and his children is typical. I have never found any proof that he had a son named John, nor one named James. . . And the naming of a "Radulphi Belknap," in one document, is surely nothing but a blunder resulting from confusing tham and his brother-in-law Radulphi Boteler (Ralph Butler), Lord Suddeley.
- (3) I think I should warn you against accepting too readily what appears in the records of Visitations of Heralds -- established by Henry VIII to verify pedigrees of those who claimed the right to coats of arms -- attempting to trace back for many generations, often with nothing but hearsay and little or no real evidence. The records of Visitations are helpful in suggesting lines of research -- but often that's all they are good for. In the records Mr Field reported, you'll see plain examples of errors.
- (4) New England research: I'm eager to see what Mr Parker has dug up -- in hope thatit will contain answers to some of my unsolved puzzles. I should be able to understand his notes, for I've done a lot of work with New England Vital Records -- sometimes unhappily. Those dated before about 1750 are very unreliable, as they weren't always entered currently. Often, years would elapse until someone tried to bring the record up to date with aid of memory and gossip. . . Even those that have been edited and reissued by NEHGS still contain provable errors. . . Is it needless for me to warn you that the statement of a birth in those VR's does not necessarily mean it occurred in that town, unless the record definitely says so?

Thanks for address of Dr W Dean Belnap. Wish you give him mine, so he'll feel free to ask for anything I may have.

(5) Evans: Yes, I too sometimes find him right. That's what is damnable about him. If he were always wrong, I could ignore him. But because he is sometimes right I have wasted endless hours proving him wrong.

Letter from A H Field to W D Belnap, 20 Oct 1971

Transcripts from documents in archives of Dean and Chapter of Rochester.

In all the cited documents from 2 Dec 1365 to 28 June 1367, the wife of Robert is named as AMY. Documents later than that omit mention of any wife, although the most important one, the gift of land to the Prior of Rochester, 1 March 1375/6, concerns land to which the title had belonged to Robert & Amy.

I take this to mean that from 2 Dec 1365 (when he was probably about 30 years old)

RMN to 28 June 1367 (last date on which Amy is named) Robert had a wife named Amy,
who died before 9 Nov 1369.

All documents that I have seen, naming Robert's children, name Juliana Darset as their mother.

Indeed, this is the first time that I've encountered AMY... . who can be assumed to have died childless?

I am tempted to write about this Amy to Patrick Montague-Smith, editor of Debrett's, who has kindly helped me on some problems about Sir Robert's family. But before I trouble him again, I should ask you if you people have any further information about this AMY.

This seems to indicated that the DNB should have given 1375 as the date when Robert was knighted. Do yku people have anything further on this?

Perhaps, at the risk of merely saying what you already know, I should make some other comments about that article in DNB, as it is attached to the same file from Mr Field.

(1) The first sentence says: he "was doubtless descended from the Belknape found in the Battle Abbey list of the nobles who followed the Conqueror into England."

This article in DNB obviously was writen long ago, before modern scholarship exposed the falsity of the old myths about the Battle Abbey Roll. I believed it before I began digging into this subject. . As late as 1911, an encyclopedia published in England said that the Battle Abbey Roll was a document signed by the nobles who fought at Hastings, after that battle; but the fact is that the abbey at Battle was not founded till many years after the battle of Hastings, and that the so-called Battle Abbey Roll was not an original document of 1066 but a mere compilation made in the 14th century (the century in which Sir Robert) lived) from documents dating from the 12th century (i.e., 100 years after the battle of Hastings). Thus it has no standing as a reliable source.

Henry Wyckoff Belknap, who dug deeply into this subject in the 1920's, wrote

to one of his correspondents: "There are three known copies of this Roll. The name of a Belknap appears on one pf them, not on the other two. I cannot sayseither that he existed or that he did not exist. But it has been well established that the monks at the abbey at Battle in the 14th and 15th KANINGEN centuries would, for a fee, erase a name on that roll and insert another name at a time when everyone of prominence wanted to claim descent from a man who 'came over with the Conqueror."

To this I can add that the printed roll now at the entry to Battle Abbey (which I saw there) does not contain a Belknap; and that all recent books dealing with the question of "who came with the Conqueror" are also without a Belknap in their findings.

So I have abandoned my old time notion that the first Belknap came with William the Conqueror and that therefore the name might be of Norman origin — although I knew that only about a third of William's army at Hastings in 1066 was Norman, and the rest were French and Flemish, plus eager adventurers from all over western Europe, even as far as Sicily.

(2) The DNB, as of course you know, errs by implying that Sir Hamon was Robert's son — a common error also appearing in some of the documents reported by Mr Field. (Sir Howard was Robert's great grandson; not great grandson.)

The revised sheets showing recent changes have arrived. I'm most grateful, for I'm sure that they will help me straighten out some old errors -- especially in records left by H W Belknap, who went wrong very often.

However, one of these revised sheets (#407, Joseph Belknap and Prudence Morris) raises a question that I think I should ask:

When my records differ sharply from yours, do you want me to bother you about it?

In this case, five years of work have led to a result that is different from your #407 (and all other published records of that family) in a number of details.

HWB went sadly astray on that family — and admitted this in writing in 1935 — but did not attempt to change his record, as he had stopped work on Belknap genealogy in 1926. So I've had the long hard task of doing what he didn't do.

My outcome, I'm sure, is as correct as is now likely -- though some birthdates still have to be stated as "about."

THE LINCOLNSHIRE BELTOFTS

Letter by Albert H Field, 15 Jan 1971

Red Book of the Exchequer -- Vol 2 -- p 737 -- (Lists of knights)

Essexa. Hertfordsira. Temp. Hen. III. (1216-72 CYB) Rogerus (et Henricus) de Beltoft, duas partes.

This is interesting, as the first reference to members of this family south of Lincolnshire, in my experience.

This knightly family appears once in Domesday Book, shortly after the Norman Conquest, listed as holding "one carucate" of land. Name given without the "de" -- as I remember it. In later records the "de" often appears, but not always. Im Latin: "de Bello Tofto."

E C Bernau, HW Belknap's English record searcher, came to the conclusion that the last males of this family died before 1395 -- the year in which the last knownfemale members of the family, Katherine de Beltoft wife of Robert de Sheffield, was party to a lawsuit in Lincolnshire. (See attached sheet "A")

The pedigree given in "A" can be extended a bit farther back by the record of a suit by Henry de Beltoft against Robert de Beltoft. (See attached sheet "B")

The Rogerus and Henricus found by Mr Field are of or about the same period as the Henry and Roger named on Sheet B -- and may well be the same men. If so, note that their lawsuit concerned land in Lincolnshire.

Bernau and HWB made many efforts to link the Sawbridgeworth Beltofts to the Lincolnshire family, but found no connection.

However, various books on heraldry credit the Lincolnshire family with having (at differing dates) at least two different coats of arms, and much more in one book. So perhaps Bernau didn't trace all branches of that family.

AN UNIDENTIFIED BELTOFT

In 1917 Mr Bernau reported the existence of another Beltoft family that lived in the same period as the first known Beltofts at Sawbridgeworth:

Roger Beltoft (No "de". CYB) and Anne his wife. Residence Hallisworth. Wills at Ipswich, 154-1538. His will in fol. 238; hers in fol. 222.

I do not find "Hallisworth" on my maps of England. But they show a "Halesworth" a bit north of Ipswich, in Suffolk. Would sound the same; might be the same. This Suffolk family was not more than 55 or 60 miles from Sawbridgeworth. Were they related? HWBelknap's files contained no further information.

To her nearest relatives her natural charriulness (sic) and easy mind, her great fidelity and tender affection endeared her. She was an affectionate parent, and a discreet instructor to young and tender minds. Her conversation gave a sweetness to the pleasures of life. Strictly honest and sincere, she was courteous and civil to all, and took pleasure in serving every one to the best of her ability." (Gentleman's Magazine, 1791, p.876.)

CORRECTION

A few dats ago I sent you a memo about the Lincolnshire DE BELTOFTs.

Searching for other things, today, I ran across my original note on the entry in Domesday Book -- copied from HWB's files long ago. I hadn't looked at it in years, and my memory of it betrayed me.

As you will see on the enclosed copy, the entry did not refer to a family named Beltoft. It merely named a <u>place</u> where some sokemen and borders lived.

Presumably, the family that later took the name of that place (de Beltoft; "of Beltoft") did not exist at the time of Domesday Book, a few years after the Conquest. It does not — also — appear in any recognized list of those who "came with the Conqueror" in 1066, as far as I've fpund. It must have arisen and been knighted at some later time.

I also enclose a brief bit of partial pedigræe for that family -- also found in HWB's papers.

The place named Beltoft does not appear in my present-day maps, but I think it was probably near Belton, about 10 or 15 miles east of Doncaster.

THE NAMES OF OUR ENGLISH ANCESTORS

Before stating my views on the principles we should follow in naming our English ancestors, it may be well for me to summarize as best I can what reason there may be for thinking that I have any qualifications for expressing these opinions. In essence, what qualifies me is the simple fact that I am the only living person who has been in position to study in detail not only what Henry Wyckoff Belknap published in NEHG Register in 1914 and 1931 but also the original documents and correspondence on which his articles in the Registerwere based. The only other person who ever had access to this material, as far as I know, was G. Andrews Moriarty; and there were considerable portions of it which he obviously did not examine. (Through the courtesy of Essex Institute, I have copied all of it.)

A necessary beginning point, now, is the personal history of the genealogical work done by Henry Wyckoff Belknap, to whom all Belknaps must be forever indebted. He had no formal training as a genealogist, but made himself one by long years of trial and error. Before taking a minor position at Essex Institute in Salem, he had been a clerk in Tiffany's in New York and then a partner in a small firm of interior decorators. Eventually, he reluctantly accepted the position of Curator of Essex Institute, meanwhile having begun to work on Belknap genealogy and on the genealogy of some of his other lines of descent -- which led in time to occasional work as a genealogist for a retainer fee of 25ϕ an hour.

In his early work, there were naturally many errors. As time passed, he kept correcting past mistakes and revising his records, till in the 1920's he completely rewrote all his records of Belknaps in America and destroyed the old ones. But by that time he had generously shared his records with anyone who sought information, with the result that much of his faulty early findings got into wide circulation and is still being quoted today.

In a way, his first publication of his findings on our English ancestry, in 1914, was an illustration of his relative inexperience at that point in his career. For instance, he used the term "alias" -- sometimes -- when it was not justified by the actual record: as when he named the father of Bennet Beltoft as "Richard Beltoft, alias Belknap" (Register, 1914, p. 103), a mistake for which he was reproved by professional genealogists, so that he carefully avoided it in his later article in the Register in 1931.

Unfortunately, many people have not noted his omission of that "alias" in 1931. (Partly, this has been because of widespread reliance on the reprint of his 1914 article in the Library of Congress. No similar reprint of the 1931 article was issued.) The result has been an oft-repeated use of "Richard Beltoft, alias Belknap" and even "Richard Belknap" in naming Bennet's father.

Another outcome of relative inexperience, in 1914, was lack of complete exactitude in quoting from correspondence. Two instances of this weakness have led to

much misinterpretation of the facts shown in what he published.

The first of these two instances is on the first page of his 1914 article (Register, 1914, p. 83), when he wrote: "Mr. Bernau began his search with the Lay Subsidy Rolls . . . and there discovered that the name of the Sawbridgeworth branch of the Belknap family was sometimes Beltoft or Beltofte." (Underlining mine.)

The facts shown in the correspondence and documents from Bernau were quite different. He reported finding one record of a tax payment by Bennet Beltoft and one record of a tax payment by Daniel Bellnapp of Netteswell, whom he identified correctly as son of Bennet. That was all. There was no justification for the generalization *** "sometimes." The truth was simply that one record was before Bennet's children dropped Beltoft and adopted Belknap, while the other record, years later, was after the change in name had occurred.

That word "sometimes", in what H. W. Belknap loosely wrote in 1914, has done great harm by leading many people to believe that the Sawbridgeworth family used the two names concurrently over a long period -- resulting in a frequent assumption that this presumed concurrent usage extended back through Bennet's ancestors all the way to the first known Richard Beltoft.

The foregoing comments do not imply that H. W. Belknap deliberately falsified a record. He was incapable of doing anything of that sort. He merely fell into the common beginner's error of writing not the exact facts but his interpretation of them -- without making it plain that what he said was an interpretation.

The same kind of inexact wording also occurred in a footnote that has misled many people. On page 84, 1914 Register, he wrote in a footnote: "Alternate surnames are said to have been somewhat uncommon in England, although much used in the Channel Islands." The underlining is mine, to draw attention to the difference from the wording of the original he was citing: a passage in a letter from Bernau, his English record agent. Bernau, expressing disagreement with H. W. Belknap on this point, had written:

"The use of two surnames is very rare in England, but common in the Channel Islands."

Again, it seems, he set down his own interpretation without checking the wording of his source.

This footnote, too, has caused confusion -- by fostering the notion that "alternate surnames" were used generally by the Sawbridgeworth family.

also
This misapprehension was fostered in some of his letters to Belknap correspondents.
In letters before 1920, such sentences as this appear: "They sometimes called themselves Belknap and sometimes Beltoft." From 1920 on, he stopped saying this.

My reason for the foregoing introduction is that the present need, in anything we issue or publish, is to do what we can to end the long-standing misconception

about the use of the two surnames.

Of course anyone who studies the whole record carefully, as I have done over a period of some years, will almost certainly come to the conclusion that what happened when the change in name occurred was that an entire family group, under the influence of a vigorous religious revival, decided to resume the family name that it believed was its

The change was not gradual. It did not extend over a slow succession of years. It happened suddenly and dramatically -- the moment that Bennet died.

Up to that moment there had been, it seems to me, a conflict between two brothers: on the one hand, the gentle and loving and successful Josias, who on his deathbed forced Bennet to admit being a Belknap; on the other hand, the stubborn and unsuccessful Bennet, deeply in debt, clinging to the Beltoft name, admitting to Belknap only in order to obtain an inheritance that would help him meet his financial needs, then returning to Beltoft in signing his will, refusing till his death to use Belknap more than just that once.

But on his death, his wife and his children buried him as a Belknap -- and from that day forward not one of them ever again used Beltoft in any recorded way.

As I see it, the history of the Sawbridgeworth family divides into four distinct periods:

THE BELTOFT-ONLY PERIOD: Richard, Laurence, Richard -- all these, like John, are never anything but Beltoft, in the records. We have no right to call them anything but just plain Beltoft, no matter what we think.

THE TRANSITION PERIOD: Josias, baptized Beltoft but changing to Belknappe some sizable time before his death, else his will would have been meaningless to his legatees; and Bennet, who once and once only used Belknap when forced to do so. We can justifiably call him "Bennet Beltoft alias Belknap." But for Josias, it seems to me, the best wording is "Josias Belknap, (baptized Beltoft)", because he obviously used Belknap for an extended period, and was known as Belknap, not Beltoft.

THE GENERATION OF CHANGE: Bennet's children, all of whom changed to Belknap when Bennet died. For them, in my judgment, the best wording is "Belknap (baptized Beltoft)."

THE BELKNAP-ONLY PERIOD: All children and descendants of Bennet's children.

If we do not make this sharp distinction, we lose the impact of what the change in name meant. It was, it seems to me, an emotional event of dramatic significance in the family at the time of Bennet's death.

When we blur the lines of the story, as H. W. Belknap did -- and lead people to think that the two names were used more or less interchangeably -- we sacrifice the heart of our story. . . and we encourage well-meaning people to invent the sort of imaginative nonsense about Beltoft-Belknap with which I've been bombarded ever since I began work on Belknap genealogy.

According to Banks" Topographical Dictionary" our Abraham came from Roping -- which I take to mean that, probably, Roping William was where he was recruited by the Massachusetts Bey Company, which was EntireFry spending huge HANNAXIA sums to collect people for its colony. But aside from the entry by Banks. I have found thus far nothing else that places him in Epping. a bit south of North Weald. What is the source of this new birthdate for possibly a chald of Abraham and Mary?
- (2) Merrick Belknap: You said you can't majoh what Merrick says with the records put together by HWB. . . I've thought, for years, that what you have of HWB's work must be what he had in 1918 and 1919 (which seem to be the time when he and your father were in contact). IIII I so (as I tried to warn you back in 1967) be wary of errors. Between 1920 and 1927, HWB rewrote all his cards, incorporating new information and correcting old errors. His final cards, of which I have copies, seem to differ very often with the HWB records that you cite. From his final records, the line for Merrick Belknap is as follows:

The only new information I have received from Hallie Belknap Weese's family is on Thomas Belknap b. 1779-d. 1883 who ad 1st Hary Friend and 2nd Emsey Fisher. They said this Thomas Belknap was born in Little Britian, N. Y. Lived in Hampshire Co, Randolph Co. (no state is mentioned) then to Braxton Co. W.Va.

His wife Mary Friend was born in Elk River. Wo state is given. I do not find Elk River in W.Y. or the Virginias, but it could be a very small place that is not

listed.

By his 2nd wife Emsey Fisher he had a daughter ElizaBelknap who married Simon T. Albert. They gave us the wrong birth date the first time. The correct birth date is 4 Jan 1851 and not 1849. I believe Glen Evans received most of his information on these families from

I noticed on the pedigree chart made by Michard B. Taylor of Las Vegas, New. There is a Ex. Wiltx a David S. Belkmap-- 98 Rivergate Dr. --Wilton, Conn. Do

you know him, if so does he have any Belknap records.

Some time ago you asked "what is the attitude of L. D. S. on illegitimate descent." I'm not sure what you want to know. If is is on genealogy that you want the information, The genealogy is kept like any one elses. All facts are recorded that are known. The child may not know who the parents are and may have trouble tracing their parents. But the child would know who his descendance are and records his or her family like any one else. If you are asking from a religious stand point, the church does approve of the actions of the parents. The children was are not held responsible for the parents actions. The children or their descendance, if they are good people, are treated like any other good child. There is such a thing as true repentance by their parents and fergiveness by God is possible. If the repentant parents sin no more we should forgive them the same as God. Hope that answers your question. If not you had better explain just what you mean.

Now some questions on your direct line. On page 411 in our record of Samuel Eelknap & Mary Newton (I know this family in our book is not complete) Glen Evans shows Mary Newton's mother to be Mary Wett or Witt or Gills. What is the correct Name?

On Jonas Newton Belknap's family sheet child #8 is Orin md 1st Anna Draper and 2nd Naomi Carpenter. Do you mean that Carpenter is her maiden name and that she is the widow of Mr. Lyman?

Cn Jesse Belknap & Jane Garlinghouse family sheet, child #6. Is the name Car or Corrington. In Franklin Belknap's record it is spelt Carrington. Do you have a copy of Franklin Belknap's Record? Without looking it up, Franklin is a cousin to Henry Wyckoff Belknap. He lived in Chicago, Ill. The record contains his letters to relatives & their answers. It is 158 typed pages. I do not know where the original is or another copy. My father had the original from Franklin some years ago and returned it to him. Franklin is dead now and I do not know much about his family. Don't think there is more genealogy in the record than what is in our record. However there are stories and personal information. I think my nephew could have it zeroxed at the place where he works of 5¢ a sheet. It would cost me 10¢ a sheet. Either way it would be a good copy! Thought I would let you know there was a Franklin Belknap record.

Do you have a copy of the direct line of Atty. Nucl D. Belnap of Chicago, Ill/? He is about 80 yrs old. He has been working up to this last year. Now his health is not too good. If you don't I could help you with that line.

Hope you are well and that you are progressing with your record.

Dear Caroll:

Its about time I answered your letters. Will try to get this finished today. I have been trying to get some information on the W. Va. Belknaps from the people of that branch who live out this way. As yet I have not received answers from some of my letters. Will send what I have.

First, I'm sorry they have your name spelt incorrectly on the last mailing list. It is spelt correctly in our card file. So have called attention

to the person who makes out our mailing lists.

Since the I BM machines came into existence all the employees were listed by their initials. As a result I get most of my mail as Mr. D. A. Belnap. The first time I took my pay check to the bank they told me I also had to sign my husbands pay check. So I know how it goes. Hope we don't make the same mistake again.

I do not know if you have heard from Mrs. Velma H. Manafield. I'm enclosing the Pedigree Chart she gave me. Also the material she placed with the Utah

Gen. Soc. that I could find.

Also the family sheet of Mrs. Hallie May Belknap Weese. Her son, Aaron, furnished the details that Glen Evans didn't. There are still some dates I hope to obtain on that family from the other children of Hallie May. Her son M. Harry Weese in Kennewick, Wash. has his mothers records. As yet he has not answered my letter. Don't know if this information will help or make for more questions.

I'm still waiting for are W.S. Researcher to send in his information. He asked for ? months to have it typed up. I hope that will be soon. He has many families from the New England States. I'm sure he could help clear up some question, If I could get him to send it in. The last meeting we had

with him was Nov 30. He was told to do this.

If you had worked out the line of Clarence E. Belknap of Chio, do you have the complete family of Joseph Belknap b. 1792 in Vt. and Abigail House. That is our connecting link. We found in the census there were 12 children. We have information on only 7 of therm. He didn't seem to have very much on that family nor do I.

I keep getting letters from a Mr. Corwin of New Orleans. There family have married into the Belknap family twice. The Saxoney Belknap I and trace but the Olive Belknap they can't give any more information on her. I don't

seem to find an Olive that would fit there line.

I now have a request from Shara Belknap Curry of Charleston, W.Va. I hope

she might have some information. Maybe you already know her.

I have read the compilation of the Media Research Bureau on the Belknap Family. Also found some thing that were not quite correct. Most of your comments are the same as mine, however some I may question. I have learned not to be too emphatic on some joints as I find out later I could be wrong. If I understand correctly you have based you opinion on Henry W. Belknap and Bernau, which are very good, but not all inclusive. I believe the research done for my father is worth some thing also. He gound many of the same information that H. W. B. found. This helped to verify his research. Then he also found some things H. W. B. didn't. Thought I had sent you copies of the differences. I have read the statement that Sir Edward Belknap died without issue. I also have proof he had a daughter. Knowing the conditions that some time exist in all countries, it would not surprise me that there were other children they did not admit having. It is more likely that a child or children had their name changed to Beltoft to cover up their past history of a nobility family.

It is queer to me the Belknap line seems to end with Sir Edward Belknap/Adm and Beltoft starts with Richard. They are both in the same period of time. Too many questions, for example. Why did Bennet prove his name was Belknap to obtain his share of the estate, and etc.

To bad there is a postal strike in England. Just before the strike Dr. W. Dean Belmap of London sent me a letter dated Jan 18,1971. He has had his own genealogist in England double checking parish Reg. and the Civic Archives in Essex and Hartfordshire. He says what we have found so far on our Belkmap and various spellings, to be correct. To quote him; "Also I have determined the orgin of the Belkmap name and the family baronages and estates in Orpington, Kent. This is within a 20 mile radius of the wherebouts of our ancesters between the 15th and 17th century. So undoubledly they are of a relationship. I will submit these to the family organization when all of that work is completed in the next few weeks."

Will contact Dr. Belnap as soon as the strike is over. Hope is is not long as it also effects the work that Frank Smith is doing for us in England. When such information is received you will get a copy.

The English Gen. say there are other various spellings of our name than the ones most commonly used, such as; Beltrapp, Beltropt, Beldam, Belcham, and

Burnapp. This Genealogy seems to be a never ending game.

I know when the "K" was taken out of Belknap. It was taken out by my 3 g grant father Jesse. He took it out to distinguish him from his half brother. Most of his descendents have left the name as he did, althou some who live in the east have put the "K" back in the name as not to be different. It matters not to me, it's still the same family. However I'm glad that most of the relatives in U.S. and Canada use just the two spellings of the name. Then it is not too hard to find them. My fathers cousin John Thomas Belnap just dropped the Belnap and goes by Thomas. Haven't had time to check to see what has happened to that family.

We would like to add your line to our files. You seem to have collected quite a lot. We would pay for a copy of your family record. Some times it is easier to do it as you find it and not wait until you think it might be finished. I don't think we will ever finish the record. But must get on

file what we have found so it will not be lost.

Thanks for all the material you have sent. Haven't gowe through it all nor all

of the other material sent in. But I'm still working on it.

Have been waiting to obtain more information on the W. Va. Belknap families. The two Weese brothers have sent copies of letters and notes, some from Glen Evans. They are very dim and will not copy off. Have gone through them and have come up with the right answer, I hope, on the Thomas Belknap question. There is quiet a lot of material to be put into families. As I go thru these notes will copy more information for you.

You may have heard from Mrs. Velma Mansfield's niece by now, if so you may have the Thomes Belknap's straighten out. If not I'm enclosing the pedigree as it appears in the material from Hary Weese. He received this from his mother Hallie May Belknap Weese. This looks more logical to me. It shows that Capt John Belknap b. 1734 and Thomas Belknap b. 1729 to be brothers. Then Thomas Belknap b. 1755 and Thomas Belknap b. 1779 were cousins. Both of them being in Virginia could have caused this confusion.

These families are not complete, but I hope this is a correct start. Let me know if you find this to be correct or find more information. Also sending a

corrected sheet on Mrs. Hallie May (Belkmap) Weese's family.

Harry M. Weese said, they use to have the picture of Thomas Belknap in his officers uniform. Thats the Thomas who md Mary Polly Friend and Emsey Fisher. The picture was sent to John Relknap of Cantor or Akron, Chio. The thought his son C. Oscar Belknap was still living at Chapel, W. Va.

You mention the spelling of Dickinson being spelt wrong in our record. This was corrected after you borrowed our copy. We have had no chance to change the

copy you have. We have fixed our original record.

This Keturah Belknap who went to Ore. Information from her journal is in the Salt Lake City Gen. Library. I read it many years ago. It didn't help then because she called people by their 1st name and didn't give any relationship. She was more interested in writing about the visiting ministers.

Have received a request from a Mrs. Edwin Starr Belknap of Milwaukee, Ore. Don't think she belongs to the Ore. branch of the family. She married Edwin Starr Belknap b. 1895 in Newburgh, N.Y. He was the son of a Edwin Starr Belknap. Thats all she has on the Belknaps. On page 948a there is an Edwin Starr Belknap b. 1859 in S. F. but was back in Newburgh, N.Y. in 1889. I almost believe this could be the father of Edwin Starr Belknap b. 1895. All Mrs. Belknap can tell is that Edwin Starr is a family name. She has a picture of his mother and sistery, but no names.

If you have done any work in N.Y. Have you come across this family on page 9482 I have written and asked her to write for his birth certificate and war record to see if his parents names would be on those records. If she will do this we could then add some to that family line. She obtained some information from a Burton H. Belknap, Clipp Rd., Voorheesville, Delmar, N.Y. about 1964. He also sent some information on your Jonas and Esther Parker line. He may be living. He is in Glen Evans Record page 222. They still haven't found the copy of Glen Evan's rec. I gave to the family. I use mine all the time, so do not want to sent it. I'm hoping the other copy will turn up one of these days.

Also enclosing a copy of a pedigree of Mr. Corwin of New Orleans. I could find the Edmund Sanxay Belknap on page 833 in our record. Did not find the Olive Belknap b. Oct 1797. If you should have the Olive Belknap's family would like a

copy. Also could send the information on to Mr. Corwin.

Hope I have been of some help. Thanks again for all you have sent.

Your fine letter March 24. Thanks. Many subjects. Hope I can cover them before I submerge myself in income tax work.

THOMAS, said to be born 1755 at New Windsor NY. I fear he's still a big question.

All Idve got, so far, is claims without supporting evidence. No proof from vital records obtainable, as town clerk says no records that early. All I can say with assurance is that the Thomas who served as a private in Rev War and married Naomi Dare was certainly father of the Thomas born maybe 1779 who served as a private in War of 1812 (for just a few days) and married Mary Friend and Emesey Fisher — but that 1779 is more likely about 1791 or 1795, I think. No proven connection between the Rev War Thomas and any member of the Newburgh and New Windsor families — nothing but the fact that he enlisted at Kingston NY, not far away — which proves nothing. My repeated requests for evidence have brought no reply from Mrs Mansfield's niece.

I have a photo of the War of 1012 Thomas in his private's uniform. If Harry Weese wants it, I'll see if I can get permission to give it to him.

OLIVE BELKNAP who married Mathew Howell Corwin — said to be born Oct 1797, died 11 Oct 1839, Goshen N Y. Looks like a member of the Newburgh tribe—but I can find no trace of her in my files — not evem a hint as to who she might possibly be. Olive a frequent name in that tribe — but not with those dates. . . . Could she have been a widow Belknap, mainden name not known? Maybe; but I can't find a possible Belknap husband for her. . . Close relationships of Corwins and Belknaps around Newburgh are known (example: Edmund Sanxay Belknap marrying a Corwin whose mother was a Belknap, so his wife was his cousin, though not first cousin). But I can't solve this Olive with anything I've got. Sorry. Do you want these Corwin sheets returned?

EDWIN STARR BELKNAP — Here I can help you, I think. You are right in believing this one to be of the Newburgh family. The Edwin Starr B born 2 March 1895 was sen of Edwin Starr B (born 18 Aug 1863, Newburgh NY; lived Terringthn & Bridgeport Conn and Albany NY) and Julia Wright. . . who, in turn was son of Moses Cook Belknap and his second wife Marietta McCamly. You have this Moses Cook B in your records. If you need any further information from me, just ask for it. If you get any information from this Mrs Belknap, please send me a copy — for I have nothing on her husband but the date of his birth.

I do hope that duplicate set of Glen Evans turns up. It might help give clues on some of my many unsolved problems. I'd need it just one day — to make copies and put it back in the mail.

THE WEST VIRGINIA BELKNAP FAMILY

I'm most grateful for all the material you sent on this family -- sheets for Velma Mansfield and Eliza Belknap Albert -- and especially the copy of latter from Veterans Administration, 1933.

This letter may provide a clue to the problem that thus far has evaded me: the parentage of the Thomas who served in the Revolutionary war and married Naomi Dare.

Both Mrs Mansfield and some other descendants say that this Thomas was son of Thomas born Woburn Mass 1729 -- and give birth date as 1755, New Windsor, N Y.

All other records that I have seen say that Thomas 1729 never married, and lived alone at New Windsor. His will (I have copy) bequeaths all property to his brothers and sisters -- and mentions no children.

The letter from Vet Admin says the Thomas who served in Rev War enlisted at Kingston -- which is not far from Newburgh and New Windsor. But this is, so far, the only reason I have found for thinking him to come from the Newburgh Family, to which Thomas 1729 belonged. (I haven't found any Belknaps living at Kingston. Have you?)

Mrs Mansfield and others give no evidence supporting the parentage they show -- nor any evidence for date and place of birth they show -- and they do not give name of a wife of Thomas 1729. So their claim looks suspicious, on the face of it.

Was this attribution of parentage just one of the many erratic guesses that Evans made? The records put together by Mrs Mansfield and Hallie Belknap Weese seem to have been based in part on work by Evans -- which of course makes them questionable.

So I have to keep searching. Next step, when I can find time, is to locate a Newburgh Belknap who has records of that family — beyond what has been published in the past. Meanwhile, I'll keep asking Mrs Mansfield, etc., for the missing evidence; but I doubt this will do much good. So far, they just don't answer this question of mine. If I ever get this one questionable point settled, we'll have scores of names to add to our records. For the present, I cannot accept the MMAX parentage MAXXX shown by Mrs Mansfield, etc.

QUERY: What XX is the attitude of LDS on illegitimate descent?

To aid you in filing, I'm trying to send you separate memos on subjects you mentioned. Sent one yesterday. And am enclosing another. Will send you a third one, on my own line of descent from Samuel Belknap and Mary Newton, just as soon as I can put it together -- which requires inserting question marks and notes on points not yet verified as fully as they ought to be.

Meanwhile, my comments on other points in your letter:

CORWIN. New Orleans. There's nothing on Corwins in my organized files, but I have a faint memory of seeing the name somewhere, so it may be in the huge unorganized mass of data of "unidentified" people. But maybe I'm just remembering the Corwins in the set of shbets you sent me.

SAXONEY BELKNAP -- Who he? Why don't you send me a copy of what you have on him (and Corwin) and let me dig for what I may have? Glad to help, if I can.

SHARA BELKNAP CURRY, Charleston W Va. I have nothing. If you can give me names of any of her ancestors, such as grandfather, I may be able to help you.

SIR EDMARD BELKNAP -- I have quite a lot on him, including information furnished by pastor of church in a Warwickire town that Sir E once owned. Without taking time to look it up, I think I recall that he had a daughter, as you say -- but she died before he did, and all his property went to his sisters, Anne, Margaret, etc.

QUESTION ABOUT BENNET, at top of p 2 of your letter. Probable reason why Bennet hastened to probate Josias' will 2 days after Josias died, and swore on oath that he was Benedict Belknappe, is indicated in the will of Josias -- which shows Bennet far in arrears on tent payments for land rented from Josias. So Bennet was probably in poor shape financially, and needed to inherit. (If you think this comment implies that Bennet is not one of my favorite people, you're right.)

Presently, I'll be sending you a fully verified revision of your sheet #489 -- John Belknap and Elizabeth ----. Your sheet shows children of two generations: those of that John and some of the children of his son John born 1748. Work on this revision is almost complete -- pending agreement on probable date of death of the son John, whom we have traced into Oneida County NY in first 1800's. John Sherman and I have been working on this matter for a long time.

You must have been put to expense on making copies for me. So I enclose a small check. Please never hestitate to tell me about expenses I should repay.

RECOMMENDATION: Get the Belnap Family Organization to buy you a copying machine. Once you have one, you'll wonder how you ever lived without it. Good used machines can be bought for as little as \$200 -- sometimes even less.

Della:

Sorry to hear of the illness of your sister. Glad that she is better, now.

Thanks for the clipping about Hallie Weese. I had her marriage -- but not the names of her children. So it will add to the record of that Virginia family -which I'll send to you when (and if) I determine the parentage of the THAXXX Thomas who married Naomi Dare.

From Nat Archives, I have received proof of his service in Rev War, xhat and copies of papers which indicate that he must have been the father of the Thomas (in Virginia) who served in War of 1812.

But I have not yet found any proof of the following points in Mrs Mansfield's lineage sheets:

- -- That the Thomas who served in War of 1812 was born 1795 and was son of Naomi Dare. (Other descendants say he was born 1779, THEY This ten years before Naomi's A marriage, in which case Naomi presumably was his father's second wife.)
 - -- That the Rev War Thomas was born 1755 (which would make him 34 at marriage to Naomi in 1789, so an earlier marriage might be likely).
 - -- That this Rev War Thomas was son of the Thomas born 1729, son of Thomas Belknap and Sarah Wright. (Ihave the will of this New Windsor Thomas. It names only his brothers and their children, and his sister Sarah -- no wife or children of his own are mentioned. So maybe he never married, which is the old tradition.)

So you see I have problems, before I can send you the record of the family from which Hallie Weese and Velma Mansfield come. Lots of names in it, for the second Thomas had 22 children by his two wives.

Had a nice letter from Mrs Mansfield, giving me the name and address of a niece who, she says, has all her records. I've written to the niece. No reply yet.

You mention a son of Mrs Weese who is not listed in the obituary: "the oldest one, who was killed in an auto accident." Can you give me his name?

Dear Della:

Here's a check I meant to send long ago, to cover your expense in getting copies made for me. I hope it's adequate. If not, please say so.

Forgive the delay. I've been swamped with work, hurrying to try to get information from people before it's too late -- and always thinking of the number of my most helpful correspondents who have died since I get started on this job of compiling a Belknap genealogy.

My gratitude for your aid is endless.

And now I have another suggestion to make. I hope you'll agree.

It concerns the records assembled by Glenn Evans. I have several sets of them, including a copy I made of the set he deposited in the Grand Rapids Library which lent it to me for copying. No two of the various sets and individual shhets accumulated from various sources seem to agree with each other. contradict each other.

Of course he was credulous and inaccurate. Most of the time I devote to trying to verify something on which he differs with other searchers usually proves only that he was dead wrong -- as in his giving our original Abraham a son named Roger, on the basis of something written by a nice lady in Illinois years ago. But once in a while I find that he is right; so I have to keep following his lead no matter how much I distrust him.

What is most obvious to me, and has been for some time, is that you must have a more complete and much later version of his records than I have. So I need to see that version -- rather, I need a copy of it, for present and future use.

I can't ask you to make a copy for me. But, as you know, I have complete copying equipment here in my study. So . . . would you be willing to lend me your set of Evans records for the day or so that it would take me to run off a copy of them? would you be willing to ship them to me by first class mail, registered for protection, abd let me copy them and ship them right back to you? I'll pay all expense, of course.


This is a lot to ask. But other people and some institutions have done it. So maybe you will.

Now to your letter to Mrs. Mansfield. I hope she has answered you. I have hound that she is still living and was here last month. I was surprised that Mrs Hallie Belknap Weese was alive until Oct 14,1970. She is a relative of Mrs. Velma Mansfield. I have talked to Mrs Weese's son Carl who lives in Ogden. He said her mother had many records and papers. He didn't know much about them but his brother Harry was the one that was interested in genealogy had and understood it. Received your letter of Dec. 31. Have had the flu and have been off work

for five weeks. o haven't gotten the letters out like I should.

This English researcher is slow and they don't send me all the material until it is finished and they can write there conclusions of the material found. When I get something definate, will forward it to you. I have just sent Mr. Frank Smith our English research some more money and a copy of your last letter. He hasn't had time to answer it as yet. I did suggest to him the he would be in a better position to write what was found in his research in England than any one else. It all takes time and he does this work for us out side of his regular work.

To answer an earlier question. Not sure if Grace Adams, is Adams, adam or Adams. Mr. Smith is finding it spelt more than one way. He is still doing research in "Wills" on this line and on the "Stallion" line. Mr. Smith won't make a conclusion until they have tried to find all that can be found.

I'm enclosing the material that Mr. Smith sent in a while back. Some of the information we had and some we didn't. This is a copy so you can keep it.

I have also sent to James Parker, our research in U.S. a d Canada, the information on the Mary Wood and Mary Dickinson. It looks more reasonable the way you have it. But would like to be able to prove it, as it is our direct line. Thanks for your help on this.

Mr. Parker informs me he has: covered the New England States and has picked up new information on families we have and some 160 families we do not have. That it would be July before he would send in his findings of that part of the country. I was going to his place to check this over, but won't be able to until I feel better.

Will let you know when I hear anything more. Thanks again for your help.

Dear Mr. Belknap;

It has been some time since I have heard from you. I hope all is well with you. I thought you might have gone to England and that my last letter came after you had

left. If you have been to England, I hope you had a good trip.

I have had another report on the work done in England by our researcher. They have been at the British Museum and the Public record office in London. They have also been through Subsidy Rolls (taxes) of 1345 to 1547. They also checked for the Adams family besides the Belknap of Beltoft. I mentioned before we have found Grace Adams father, Jerome Adams. He is mentioned in the Subsidy Roll of 1562/3 but nothing more. They also went through many wills of Adams, but nothing more was found as this time.

The Poll tax of Sawbridgworth collected in 1377 does not mention Belknap or Beltoft. It suggests that the Belknaps came from some place before that time.

If you went to England. Were you able to obtain any more information.

A detailed report of the English work is being sent to me, but have not received it yet.

A Mr. James Parker of the Genealogical Society of Whah is making a trip to the New England States for that Society. While there he is also going to try to check more on this Samuel Belknap and Mary Wood and her husbands. He has a copy of the information on the Dickensons you sent. There are too many questions and we are not sure of the answers. We may or may not be able to saswer our questions, but we will try.

I forgot to ask Mr. Parker if he was going to Conn. Also how long he would be there. If he was going any place near Greenwich, I would ask if he could call on you. Maybe I could find out from his wife. I tried to call her. There telephone did not answer.

You may have heard from a Mrs. Delknap of Des Moines, Ia. She wrote me to find more information on Jonas Newton Belknap and Esther Parker. I couldn't help her and asked her to write to you.

My family keep asking what relation you are to us. I tell them you are a cousin but unable to tell which one, 3md, 4th and etc. Will you fill out the enclosed pedigree chart, which wouldn't take much time, so this will give us an idea of the

relationship.

We had a very nice family reunion. 280 people attended. In the morning we had a work shop. We had charts and pictures showing where reseach work had and is being done. Any one could take time to copy what they wanked. Also had some interesting articles on display of the older members of the family that had passed on. At noon we had lunch and birthday cakes. As it was 100 years since our grandparents went to the little town of Hooper, Utah to homestead. Hooper is 10 miles south west of Ogden. In the afternoon we had a program. I saw more 1st cousens than I have seen for some time. Most of them are older than I am and don't get around to much. I know my 2nd sousins better. I did enyoy it. It was a lot of work. I had my turn at being responsible for the reunion now next time it will be some one else. However I am still in charge of the research work being done here for our branch of the family. It isinteresting work, but it is work. We are trying to keep our branch of the family up to date so the next generation will not have such a hard time.

Wishing you success in your work. Have been greatful all you have done.

Here are copies of some papers which you may wish to give to Mr. Frank Smith at the Genealogical Society in Salt Lake.

They are facsimiles of MSS sent to H W Belknap about 50 years ago by Charles Bernau, the English record agent who dug up the Sawbridgeworth record. By the time HWB received them, he had lost interest in the old family of Sir Robert Bealknap — so, as far as I can judge, nothing further was done with these papers.

The "I" in the notes on some of the papers is Mr. Bernau.

The rarid of these papers to Mr. Smith is something I can't judge. But here they are.

- (A) The inclusion of Henry Finch at the end of this item dates the original as possibly circa 1500. His will was probated in 1493.
- (B) This one, also not earlier than about 1500, seems muddled but may be useful on names of children.
- (C)Chiefly of interest, maybo, because of the hint in Mr. Bernau's suggestion that there might be more that is worth copying. (This has the look of an extract from a Visitation of Heralds, which would date it as not earlier than the reign of Henry VIII.)
- (NOTE: In all of the foregoing documents, the Sir Edward is the "Sir Edward" named in the letter I received from the oditor of Debrett's Peerage.)
- (1504-1515)
 (D) I am interested in this one because it is the only old document (in my files) that associates a Belkmap of that time the Chertin with except county Essex, and I strongly suspect that the Sawbridgeworth family had an Essex origin. It certainly had continuous and close contacts in nearby Essex, across the River Stort. I do not know who this Edward Belkmappe was; but it seems possible that he was not the Sir Edward who was the great-grandson of Sir Robert, and onded his carger as custodian of Warwick Castle, according to one historian. So he interests me.

I think I should send you a copy of a letter from England, just received -- though it may be old stuff to both of you.

I was led to write to Debrett's because I had two unsolved puzzles:

- An apparent "missing generation" in the published record of Sir Robert Bealknap's descendants.
- My inability to find the John and Joan who were tho link between the present Queon and Shakespoare.

Being unable to solve either of these puzzles from the records available to mo, I was at a dead end until it dawned on me, one day, that these two puzzles might be one and the same.

And so it proved,

The next obvious step is to see if Sir Robert, or John, or Hamon had any brothers. None are shown in any of the British Museum documents of which I have copies. But those documents were written at least 100 years after the death of Sir Robert, and can't be trusted on anything but the years between 1400 or 7450 and 1500.

And I find it difficult to believe that in three successive generations there was only one son.

Vave started this letter several times. I need a secretary to keep up this writing of letters. Thanke for sending the material. I was very happy to learn about it. You should have received your material and some other sheets I sent to you by now.

If you will read my last letter you will see that the record I sent is a copy, whe original is on better raper and has a nice cover. Also we don't loan the criginal. I know you have picked on a big job. I have been at it in my spare time for years. A great deal of the record is my fathers research. We spent hundreds of dollars and lots of time personally traveling to all the town and court houses and even to uncland. A lot of the material he found was the same as W. W. D. He also paid researchers in uncland and in new England. He could fine more on the welknap's before 1500 because of their royal line. I also think W.W. D. did have this too. If not I have some material on that line. Fust received your letter this after noon from Mr. Smith in uncland. I was going to tell you shout him, we had not written to him and I was thrilled to think you had and that he did answer you.

Too had my father isn't here. We could tell vou more than I can. We did visit Jondon and visited the Sommerset Mouse. I understood from what he found, and M.W.R. also found that Dennet Delknaps s will was listed under the name of Dennet Deltoft. Dear Mr. Montague-Smith:

I thank you most deeply for your great courtesy and kindness in answering so fully my query about John Belknap and his sister Joan. I am writing to The Queen Magazine, as you suggested.

Perhaps I should explain the reason for my interest. In the course of trying to prepare a record of the Belknap name in England and America, I had come to believe that the sketch of the life of Sir Robert Bealknap in the Dictionary of National Biography must be wrong in saying that Sir Edward ("Sir Edmund" in your letter) was the great-grandsonof Sir Robert. I felt sure there was a missing generation — most likely between Sir Robert and Sir Hamon. But I could find no support for my belief, in copies of old documents in the British Museum; and so I had come to a dead end until I surmised that the John and Joan mentioned in your 1952 edition might represent that missing generation.

I should add that there is no known connection between the American and Canadian Belknaps and the family of the Judge.

Till I /// studied the article in the magazine, I shall not trouble you with questions that it may answer.

There is, however, one question that you may be able to answer easily, from your memory of your research. Was this Joan Belknap, daughter of Sir Robert, the "Johane Bealknap" listed as main of honor to Katherine, wife of Henry V, in 1422? (The reference in my files is Rymer's Foedera, vol. x, p. 204, "Demoiselles de nostre Treschere Compaigne".) This Johane (Joan, Joanna) is said to have perm been Sir Robert's daughter, but the date and the word "Demoiselles" have made me think it more likely that she was a grand-daughter—if the Dictionary of National Biography is correct in saying that Sir Robert returned from exile in 1397 and if I am right in believing that he was about 60 years of age at that time (on the basis of the statement that he was a page at Court along with Chaucer, in Fuller's Worthles of England).

COUSIN DELLA:

What you have told me about Mr. Frank Smith, at the Salt Lake Genealogical Society, heartens me greatly. I have been hesitating to write my full interpretation of the evidence on the change of family name from Beltoft to Belkmap in 1630, for I have not known where to turn for a competent professional evaluation of my conclusions. Perhaps, some day, Mr. Smith might be so kind as to examine what I make write on that subject.

There is, however, one bit of evidence that I still lack — the exact date of the first imposition of "lay subsidies" in England. I haven't been able to find it in any books accessible to me, thus far. Perhaps Mr. Smith knows this date.

And here are a couple of other questions that you might wish to pass along to him. I have not yet tried to find the answers.

- (1) Who and when was the John Belknap said to have been mentioned in a description of an inscription on a window in the church in Marsham, Norfolk? (In Blomefield's Norfolk county history) Norfolk is far afield from the homes of any other Belknaps I have found. The wording of the inscription: "Pray for the soul of John Belknap, Gen."
- (2) Who and when was the Symon Belknap who is said to have been mentioned in a Visitation of Essex (which presumably would not be earlier than the reign of Henry VIII)? I have not yet found any other trace of him.

Dear Della:

What a fine friend you are. I'm most grateful for all the timey and effort you put into helping trace the possible parentage of the father of the INDEXENTARY Thomas Belknap who was born in Frederick Co, Va. in 1779. . . As you noted, the material data you sent me is full of problems and contradictions; but I think it may lead to a solution. Here's a brief summary of my present thinking about it.

(1) Evans' confusion about John and Thomas as father of John Thomas van be dismissed as just one of his many blunders. The record of John b. 1734 is known and well sustantiated. He could not have been the father of a John Thomas born 1755. XXX If any of the Newburgh-Kingston Belknaps was this father, it would have to be Thomas b/ 1729, who did have a son named Thomas, born 1755.

(2) It is true that a Thomas Belknap married Naomi MATE Dare in Philadelphia, Pa., but the date was Oct 17 1789 -- not 1791. There is, as yet, no proof of his

parentage. No evidence on this, in material you found.

(Hampshire Co and Braxton Co, Va)

- (3) Places of residence named by Evans, for Naomi and her husband, make it seem probable that her husband ax was the "John Thomas" we are looking for. But Naomi could not have been mother of the Thomas born 1779. Might have been stepmother (2nd wife of the Thomas whom she married in 1789).
- (4) The key question seems to be: Did the TMM Thomas (John Thomas?) who married Naomi Dare come originally from the Newburgh-New Windsor-Kingston area? If he did, then he would just about have to be the Thomas born 1755, son of Thomas born 1729.

It may be that the military and pension records in Nat. Archives will supply the answer. So I'm sending for them.

I'll keep you informed. May be able to give you a lot of new names in several generations, to add to your records -- if Nat Archives supply the missing link...

Sorry to take so long to answer your letter. It seems like there is always a problem in every line you check. There is one in this line and I thought maybe I could get some correct information before I answered. I'll send what I have and maybe you can find more information on this line.

I'm enclosing a pedigree chart. Most of which was given me by Mrs. Velma H. Mansfield of Sacramento, Calif. And a little information I had. We thought it was fairly correct. After reading Glen Adams' record it's the same line only there seem to be a mix up in two Thomas'.

Mrs. Alberts of Tremonton, Utah use to come visit with my father. They tried to connect per family to our line, but they didn't find the connecting link. She was a relative of Mrs Hallie Belnap Weese of Ogden. A Mr Bailey Belknap of Virginia lived near me. He was from Virginia and was a cousin of Mrs Mansfield. He was not interested in family history and would give us nothing. He died just a few months ago. Mrs. Hallie Belknap Weese is also dead. She has children here some where, but have been out of contact with them. I have written many times to Mrs. Mansfield for mobe information on her family. She never did answer. She was very friendly while here and glad to obtain the information I had. Her letters are never returned, so I do think she is still align.

Bo you have a copy of Glen Evans record of Landsing, Minh. If so you will find that he agrees with this pedigree until we reach Thomas Belknap who married Mary Friend. He has ? different Thomas that marry Mary or Mary Polly Friend and E. Fisher. One of the Thomas's father is Thomas and the other Thomas's father is John. Both Thomas and John are the sons of Thomas Belknap B. 1698 and Sarah Wright. She was the widow of Isaac Hill. You will find what I have on this line in the books of Family Group Sheets I loaned you. I have marked in red the pages on the pedigree chart.

The connecting link according to Mrs. Mansfield was John Thomas Belnap and Naomi Dare. I have not done any research on this branch line as yet. I was in hopes four U. S. researcher would help us out. He has been so busy with his job and traveling that he hasn't done much.

Also enclosing what has been filed at the Salt Lake Gen. Library since 1941. If filed before that date it was an individual cards and not as a family. I spent yesterday at the Salt Lake Library. Didn't have time to do more than check the family sheets. To check by the individual name. A card has to be made for each name and it is mailed to you later. This take a lot of time. Also I didn't have time to check out records on Virginia. One day does not give time to do much when there is so much material to go thru.

Hope this helps some or at least it will give you an idea as to where this line fits in. I sincerely hope our books have helped you some.

Have received from Atty Nuel Belnap of Chicago, Ill. a map of the town of Sawbridgeworth, Herts, Eng. His son had some made for him wile he was in England. I haven't had time to study it thousandly. If you would like one I think I could get one sent to you. He said he had some extra ones. I have also received copies of the original Wills of 3 Belnaps from Dr. W. Dean Belnap of London. A short verson of these wills are in the New Eng Hist & Gen Reg. But I see in Henry Belnap's will in the New Eng. Rep. left out one child. I also was interested that the original Will of Henry, the name is spelt BEINAP. I'll send you a copy of these also if you would like to have them.

Dear Della:

Can I induce you to help link up a Belknap family that has not previously been known? It's worth dping, for it's the only Belknap family ever located in West Virginia, as far as I know.

The problem is to determine the immediate ancestry of Thomas Belknap, born 1778 (or 1789) in Frederick County, Virginia -- died 30 Nov 1883, Braxton County, West Virginia. (He may have been the son of another Thomas, born circa 1750, perhaps, but this is uncertain.) No known link to other Belknaps.

The only hope I can see, toward solving the puzzle, is that one of his daughters — Eliza Ann, who married Simon T EXEMPTIMIZED Albert — became a Mormon and lived and died in Garland, Utah. The grave of her husband, bearing his name and hers, was reported examined at Garland Cometery in 1967. (He died 1932.)

I have what is obviously a set of fragmentary notes based on her Church genealogical records. These notes do not indicate whether or not she submitted any record farther back than her father. I'm hoping that she did. Can you find out for me?

This THEME Thomas (1778) seems to have been quite a character. Had 12 children by his first wife, Mary Friend. When she died in 1850, he promptly married again: Emesy Fisher, aged 26 -- he was then 71. Had 8 more children by his second wife. Died at age 104.

The Alberts, at Garland, seem to have had at least three sons -- names not known to me.

Aside from the somewhat garbled data sent in by a descendant of Thomas (police chief in a small town in Fennsylvania), I have no other record of thes West Va family.

I'll be grateful for your help -- I hope.

Dear Miss Belnap (or should I say "Cousin Della?):

As I believe Dick Taylor has told you, I'm now immersed in the preliminary editing of the many thousands of pages of family records left by Henry Wyckoff Belknap, one-time curator of Essex Institute. My eventual aim is to expand the records beyond the tenth generation, which was as far as he got. This means that I must shamelessly ask for aid, wherever I think I may be able to get it. So I have two questions that I hope you can and will take the trouble to answer.

- (1) I'm assuming that the Mormon Church genealogical records must contain much more Belma-Belknap data than Dick Taylor's chart shows. Can you tell me anything about this or about the records on file at the Salt Lake Genealogical Society and what I might possibly do to get access to them, or copies of them and whom to write to? . . What I must IN do is to try to assemble all known collections of such records and correlate and combine them, for Henry Wyckoff Belknap left many questions unanswered which was why he never published the book he intended to write.
- (2) One of these unanswered questions, I hope, you can answer easily from your own records the evidence of the parentage of Jesse Belknap, number 36 on Dick's chart. As Jesse Belknap (Dick's No. 35) was an uncle of my great-great grandfather Jonas Newton Belknap, Isve assumed that Jesse No. 36 was a first cousin of Jonas. But I have no proof of this. All that I actually know about Jesse No. 36 is that he married Eunice Hall on 28 April 1779 at Redding Church in Connecticut a 30 minute drive from my home and that a Michigan Belnap, some years ago, supplied a list of this Jesse's children with dates of birth. . I enclose copies of Henry Wyckoff Belkmap's record of Jesse Belknap No. 35, showing that he failed to establish the linkage to Jesse No. 36, though the letters he wrote show that he tried hard to do this. (I should add that the Michigan list of children shows Elam, born 1791, instead of Clem as shown on Dick's chart.) . . . Can you help me on this point?

Dear Mr. Belknap;

It has been very interesting to correspond all these years with other relatives. The bad part of it is that some are so far away I have only a writing aquaintace with them. Also I'm not too good in explaining in writing. But I will try. It was very nice of you to write.

Have enjoyed Dick and Charlene Taylors letters very much. I have talked to Dick by telephone and discussed which way would be best for us to help all those who are

interested in Belknap or Telnap research.

You have taken on a big job. I've spent some 20 years putting my fathers research in order. Of course could do it only in my spare time. Working and keeping a house takes a lot of ones time. Since my fathers death I have added to the record. Yet there is still many undinished families and lots of questions.

My father was Hyrum Belnap. He and Henry Wyckoff Belknap knew each other and had planned to print what they could find. My father made trips to Conn. N.H., Mass. Canada, England and etc. Visited with every relative he could find. He did pick up a lot of first hand information. He checked wourt houses, Wash. D.C., and army records and etc. Also paid researchers in New England States and in England. I believe he and

Henry W. Belknap both covered mush of the same territory.

Cn most of the information they both came up with the same answers with the exception of our line, that is when it came to the Jesse Belknap and Jesse Belnap. My father also met and obtained the record compiled by a Franklin Belknap of Chicago. He was a cousin of Henry W. Belknap, but I could not find his family. My father would have known. Its too bad we wait so long to get interested. Could have had lots of first hand information. He also had Admiral Charles Belknap Record. He didn't get it copied before Charles wanted it back. Charless house burned later and we understood his records were lost. A Few years ago I came in contact with Glen Evan whoes G. Mother was a Belknap. He worked at the Lansing State Library in Lansing, Mich. He has compiled quite a lot of material and but it into a book form. After he died I obtained a copy of his work through the Salt Lake Genealogical Society. Glen Evan said he found Admiral Charles Belknap record. I furnished him with the records I had from Faznklin Belknap, Henry W. Felknap and my direct line. There is a lot of new material in this record which I haven't had time to check out. They are mostly in Mich. and Virginia.

This last year I have added Atty. Nuel D. Felnap's record. He lives in Chicago.

He (New this Clen Evans. Nuel D. Belnap is a descendant of Jesse and Eunice (Hall) Belnap.

When I was young a Leverett Belknap from Hartford, Conn. came and stayed with us.

He sent his family line after he went home. I have his letters. He would be dead now I'm sure. But he did have two sons living at that time in Hartford. They could still be there. If you should find him or know of him I would like to know when he

The Genealogical Library at Salt Lake is a very large library. I'm sure it contains much more data them we have. But one would have to dig it out. There are not many printer books on the Belknaps. There is Henry Wyckoff Belknap and several small books of three or Bour families or a paper sent in on one family. The record we had made up to 1956 has been put on a film and is now there for public use.

There are hundreds of books and films of Vital records from most every state. and forign countries. We have debated as a family organization to hire a genealogist to do research. I have a lot of Belknap families I don't know where they belong. As the information comes in, sometimes I can fit these families in the right place. It would be wonderful to have a more complete record printed of the Belknap and Belnaps. There quite a family.

There was a book "The Belknap Family of Newburgh, N.Y." printed. my father had one Thats the only book of its kind I know of, not unless the State Library at Albany, N.Y. has one. Albany, N.Y. has a large Gen. Library there. I have a nephew who lives about twenty miles from there. I was back there in 1962. It has a lot of information but had time to spend only one day there. Our family Organization printed a small

Redding, Conn. to find who Eunice Hall's parents were. Glen Evans of Lansing, Michagave us the parents names. They are not correct. We have traced that Hall line and it is the wrong one. I can find the record of Eunice Hall and Jesse in the Congregational church, marriage date and the pastor who married them, but no birth date for Eunice. I was going to write to the county seat of Fairfield County, Conn. Do you know what town that would be?

We do not have much on a Jonas N. Belknap. We do show there is a Jonas Belknap as a nephew to Jesse Belknap who married Eunice and Deborah. We do not have any more information on him or his family. But I do believe we are 4th or 5th cousins. I have a nephew Eruce E. Belnap who works for G.E. in Schenectary, N.Y. I was back there. It's getting late. I see I'm starting to repeat myself. I know M.W.B. and my father didn't agree on the Jesse line. In M. W. B. record the differences start with Samuel Belknap b. about 1707 who married Elizabeth Jones. Then he says this same Samuel married 2nd Mary Wood, wife of James Dickson or Dickenson, also the wife of Daniel Pearson. Eelieve these families were mixed to. That they were two Samuels. At least the information my father found seemed to be more logical.

The 2nd son Jesse b. 21 May 1782 by his wife Deborah. Now Jesse born in 1760 married Eunice Hall. We can find both of these Jesse's war records. The are no parents names on the war or pension records. This would have given the proof that was needed. Father trace the Jesse b. 1739 to Castleton, Vt. where he was town clerk. He saw in Jesse's own hand writing in the town records of his childrens and wifes deaths in 1777. Also the birth of his children by Deborah Hathway. He wrote the birth of my 2nd son Jesse 21 May 1784. The record shows all of his children as girls before this date. So there must have been a son Jesse by his wife Eunice.

I have the record sent in by Dr. Parnard Relknap of Wyoming, N.Y. he was a descendent of Augustus or Augustine Belknap, the next child Jesse and Deborah had. He also

could not give any more information.

We have a Family organization here who is trying to get all information we can to put in our files and to put in the Genealogicl Library. So we or any one else may use it. Checking Dick Taylors pedigree chart we have the bulk of that material already. However on some lines he has two more gereations down. We agree on all branches of the family except one. We hadn't planned on printing this large of a record. Would help any one who wanted to do so.

We have had a researcher in England for the last four years trying to find more information and to carry on where my father and H.W. B. left off. we have not found any thing back Burther than 1500. There is 6 generation of Belknaps back of that date but we are unable as yet to find where we fid into that line. We are sure we came from that line some place. At present our Gen. is reading the old Manor Court Rolls, It is allow work, its written in old Latin. So if you could come up with any place in England to look we could have our research do it. Then furnish you with a copy. It would not make since for us both to pay for research in the same field.

To out a record together is a lot of work. We are most willing to help you and to trade what we have for what help you can give us. I had suggested to Dick Taylor, that we had a work copy of our record all set up in families about 1000 families. We could send you this copy. This copy might help you, in as much as the families are put together. In going through H.W. F. record or papers you could double check for corrections or more information. Any thing else we find we would be glad to send.

I owe it to you to tell you where my work now stands and what I plan to be doing in the coming months, for them'll be a question about the possible extent of your participation.

Last night I returned from Salem with some 75 pounds of the Belkmap family papers left by Henry Wyckoff Belkmap — how many thousands of pages and sheets and documents and clippings I cannot even guess. Thought Through the great courtesy of Essex Institute, the owner, these papers have been lent to the Greenwich Historical Society so that I may have access to them them. (Once the Institute people decided that I was fit to be trusted, the rest of the negotiation was me relatively easy.) I feel that you should know me the present location of this great body of material.

The papers divide into three main classifications:

- l. Five binders of Data Sheets, one or two (sometimes more) for each individual person. The American binders begin with Abraham, numbered with and end with \$1713 for Prescilla Alden Belkmap, Henry Wyckoff's niece who was a direct descendent of John and Priscilla Alden. They contain , also, hundreds of names to which he did not assign a number though I think he should have done so. These Data Sheets show dates of birth, marriage and death name and parentage of with spouse, names and dates of children residence addresses and what is known about the person's career. (Not all sheets, of course, contain complete entries)
- 2. \$2 or more manila folders containing the source material on which the Data Sheets are based.

 containing
- 3. A numbers of folders manufacture copies of some thirty years of correspondence. Many hundreds many thousands of sheets. Totally unorganized, yet.

There is reason to think that I'll have to go back to Salem some time later, to spend days searching the files of his work on other families, b see what Bellmap data they may contain — for he worked simultaneously on a museur of families, some of which he sometimes thought were variants of Belkmap. But this will come later.

Meanwhile, as I now see it, my work will go through such phases as the following:

PHASE 1: Making electrostatic copies of HWB's Data Sheets, for my own use, so that I can correct his errors (when possible) without defacing his records. Also, making facsimile copies of letters, clippings, etc., where I find this to be necessary.

PHASE 2: On my facsimile copies, making corrections of known errors — by comparison with my records and yours, and by detecting his mere clerical errors (as when he listed me as the son of my grandfather, although he knew better). I have much that he did not have.

PHASE 3: Adding Data Sheets for persons not included in his material — mostly members of generations later than the 10th Generation on America, for he died in 1966.

PHASE 4: (Or maybe before Phase 3) Making an alphabetical index of all names in Data Sheets, in order to find and trace omissions that need to be remedied. prepared an index of this kind, but it was destroyed in what is locally called "The Great Salem Fire," before his death.

PHASE 5: Putting tegether a chronological catalog, properly indexed, of all known Belkmaps past and present — as far as I then know about them — with the records of their lives where anything is known.

How far I go beyond that, I cannot say at present — except that of course I'll write a narrative summary centering mainly on my own branch of the family, for the information of my children and grandchildren.

What I've called "a chronological catalog" will not be campin — nor can I dare hope that it will be entirely accurate. But I can hope that it will show clearly what is reliably known to date — and what is doubtful or subject to question and in need of further steady — thus leaving for you and others in future days are accurate of a clear trail, frankfrom free from at least one of the many errors that have erept into print in the past three centuries. Asving the same opinion that I do, about the probable accuracy and completeness of this frankfrom catalog, the people at Essex Institute (one of the two or three chief centers of genealogical research in this country) have suggested that the Institute may wish to consider publishing it — but this is merely a possibility, for future thought.

along with the work I have antition so optimistically, above, I'll have a lot of other things to do — correspondence with other members of the family who can provide additional data, correspondence with spurces in England about matters that Henry Wokoff Bellmap did not investigate, study of the microfilms of the early U S Census the up to 1840 (thus far I have studied only the first one, for 1790) — and so on and on.

So, as you can see, I have sentenced myself to hard labor for many months to come. Fortunately, I have both the interest and the time. So wish me luck. And don't expect much from me while I'm still immersed immersed in detail.

Now, my question about the degree and extent of your possible participation in what I plan to do. But let me say, swiftly, that I'm not thinking of asking you to devote any time to the job. What I'm thinking about is something very different. I one to you the stimulus that has led me this far and I owe it to you to offer you the opportunity to aid — if a surmise of mine is even participation.

My surmise is that you probably have, in your files, a lof of notes and names of Belknaps that you have not yet found occasion to insert in your charts — just as HWB's records contain hundreds and hundreds of names that do not yet appear in your charts — and so do mine.

So, when I arrive at what I'Ve termed my "PHASE 3" — adding more Data Sheets — you may possibly decide to do what I'd do if I were you. That is, ship to me at my expense everything that you have in your files but have not yet entered in your charts — so that I can make electrostatic copies of all of its and them ship your material back to you, promptly. From my copies of your material, I could then determine what I do not yet have from HWB's records, my records, and your charts — and add Data Shhets for such persons to the set of shhets that I'll be building up.

That last paragraph, now that I re-read it, seems rather clumsily worded. But maybe it's semi-intelligible.

If you decide to do what I've suggested, the material would have to be properly protected in transit. It would have to be shipped as First Class Mail, Registered. This would be a bit expensive, perhaps, but I'll gladly assume the cost — both ways.

This isness semething that has to be decided at once. I wouldn't be able to teach your thus-far-unused material till at least a month or so from now. If the idea appeals to you, I can tell you when I'm ready — guaranteeing to ship your material back to you within a week after it reaches me, for it won't take me long to run off facsimile copies of it here in my study.

Se please think about my suggestion, at your leisure, and let me know what you think of it, when you get around to it.

To me, it seems only common sense to try to combine all three sets of data — Henry Wyckeff's, mine, and yours (beyond what you have thus far entered in your charts). I hope you'll feel the same way about it.

Dear Cousin Carroll:

I was going to answer your letter before. But its such a busy season. At work it's been hectis. Then I would get the flue and be off work two weeks. On my way to work I'm mailing the record I spoke to you about. As I said, its a it is a work record. If we do research work its added to this record and later typed and recorded him the record we keep for our Family files. This record covers the period of 1550 years A.D. down to my grant father Gilbert Belnap. It is filed according to our direct line. I have mailed a pedigree chart and a Index to this record. Also there are dividers in the record according to our pedigree line. Between the dividers all the information on the decsendents of that family. The exception is Gilbert Belnap. We have this much on Gilbert Belnap descendents alone. Gilbert Belnap record is more complete, however we do not have a work copy of it.

I thought this record might help as it is already on family sheets. I can and should

have sent you extra work sheets.

We are interested in obtaining corrected information or more information. You can use this record the best way it may be of help to youl You can write differences of dates or more information on the sheets. Then when you return our record, we can bring our records up to date. Or we can wait until your record is completed and we can obtain it. Which ever way you think is best. We have a researched in Salt Lake City who is trying to help us with guestions

on families we can't seem to straighten out.

I also have some family sheets that I con't know where they belong. Also we keep getting individuals who send in their sheets to see if we can tell them how they belong. These sheets I didn't have time to copy. Some I don't believe would be in H. W. B. record as they are to late or after the date of his work.

I have gone throught Glen Evans record, infact I copied if from a film to but into book form to be easied to use. I'm very sorry he didn't understand compiling a record better. He has done such a great amount of work. He has made it confusing to a person not knowing the families, to read. For example; a man marries more than once. He puts the wives to gether then all the children together. In many instances you can't tell which child belongs to which wife. Then he seemed only interested in recording the year a person was born or died. He didn't record the day or the month or the place. He did this even with the records I loaned him. These I know which is correct, but it leaves much research to do over in some of the families, to obtain the complete dates and places and etc.

Hope this will be of some help. Let me know if you receive our record.
