Much thanks for your detter April23. I'd try to answer the many points it sovers.

- (1) Zebina's will -- have copied, very helpful, on children of Moses Jr. With its aid, plus other data in my files, I'll work up a revised sheet on those children and will send a copy to you. Z's will enclosed.
- (2) Your query abbout a genealogist to trace family of Almira Jane Seeley (Seelye) -- in New Milford or Fairfield, Conn. I suggest you first write to:

About a year ago, I found her most helpful on a problem I was tackling. Mention my name if you wish. To save time, I suggest the following procedure: (a) state your need fully, with names, places, dates: (b) enclose check for \$5 to cover initial search. (c) state how much more expense you authorize (the rate is \$5 an hour). This will avoid delay for sending you aform to fill out. . Also, you may add a request for a name of a genealogist familiar with the areas you specify, if the Society cannot help you. . . I'w sure Mrs Bishop was give you better advice than I could. And she might have your information right in her files, as New Milford and Fairfield are close to New Haven.

- (3) The data on Daniel David -- helpful. Thanks.
- (4) QUERY: On MAKE Zebina -- do you know his occupation? Similarly, can you give mm me occupations of others named on the fine batch of sheets for Walter Perrin Belknap's descendants? For present-day genealogy, this is essential, when available. So is place (or places) of residence,
- (5) Harriet, dau of Walter P. I'll be looking forward to your solution of this problem.
- (6) The tradition about Harriet Dustin and a Belknap girl being "captured" in 1679.

  New to me. If you have details, please tell me. . the Belknap girl could only have been a daughter of Samuel -- either Mary, b 1656 and 23 in 1679, if still living and if she was not the Sarah who married Nathaniel Singleterry; or Patience, b 1673 and only 6 in 1679. There were Dustins (Duston) in that area. Ibout 1775, I believe but cannot prove, a Duston at Salem NH, near Haverhill, married a grandaughter of Samuel. Haverhill was a frontier town in 1679. Trouble with Indians lasted till into the early 1700's. So the tale is likely.
- (7) The tradition about "coming over with the Conqueror." This is preserved in the article (written in the 19th century) in the British Dictionary of National Biograhy knownes the "DNR" on Sir Robert Bealknap. Basis was belief in the Roll of Battle Abbey, which purposed to name the knights who faught at Hastings in 1066. As late as 1911, this Roll was said to have been drafted right after the battle. 20th century research has proved that it was fabricated in the 14th century, from lists written in the 12th century and that there the known copies of it, with only one copy containing a Belknap and that in the 14th century (1301-1400), twhen the new-rich of that period were eager to claim Norman ancestry, the monks at Battle Abbey would, for a fee, erase a line on the roll and write in a new name and that

only a small handful of men named on the Roll have actually been proved to have been at Hastings --- and that no Belknap was among them, nor even in any of the more tolerant lists such as the one posted at the entrance to the abbey nowadays (which I saw when I visted the place about IO years ago). Conclusion: Sir Robert or maybe his son Sir Hamon, who was treasurer of Normandy under Henry V and brother-in-1: of the Treasurer of England, probably inspired a forgery to get an unwarranted claim supported. So, another pleasing myth gone aglimmering.

(6) Your story about HWB investing \$30,000 in an enterprise in Billings. Nothing on it in his own notes on his career, nor in his corresponding that I've read. Tell me more. . . And let me shock you a bit. In the 1920's he occasionally undertook genealogical research for pay. You'd nor guess his fee. It was, believe it, only 25¢ an hour. . . Soktell me all. . . With date, please. He might have inherited that money from his mother. He certainly never earned it.

Deer Mr Belnap:

It was kind of you to send me the file of Xerox copies. I have delayed replying in hope of finding time to check them theroughly against other records. But as it is apparent that I'm not going to have that much time available for a while, I'd better try to tell you what I have noted, thus far, in looking at these sheets. I'll try to be brief, without going into too much detail.

One fact lying behind what I'll be saying is that I have in my product personal the many thousands of pages of Belknap genealogy left in typescript and manuscript by Henry Wyckeff Belknap of Salem, including his correspondence on this subject.

It is plain that the data in the sheets you sent to me are based on his early records, not IME later than the date you mention -- 1910. The notes that he had developed by that time -- what I often call "early Henry Wyckeff" -- contained a great many errors and incorrect attributions of parentage. As time passed, between then and 1926, he corrected many of these early errors, making so many revisions that eventually he rewrete all his notes from beginning to end -- leaving a pretty clear record of early mistakes and subsequent corrections.

Howevers, he did not catch all of his errors. He was well aware of the fact that some identifications were still uncertain, when he ceased filling work on our family in 1926. So, in recent years, I have had the task of detecting mistakes that he did not correct -- some of them very sizable, involving the line of descent of scores of persons.

The sheets that you sent me contain both early errors that he later corrected and others that he left standing -- some of which I've been able to revise. Thus EXXI far, I have noted EMERGEMENT the following:

- (4) Your #5 -- children of Samuel Belkmap and Mary Newton. When he found fuller data on this family, Henry abandoned the possibility that INIE Jesse was a son of Samuel and Mary. In the light of my own researches, I agree with that decision. However, I should add that I have not yet been able to verify the date given for this Jesse's birth or the place where it is sometimes said to have occurred.
- (B) A number of the persons shown as EMILMENE descendants of this Jesse, on your sheets, were actually descendants of my own great great grandfather Jones Newton Belknapa, the eldest son of Samuel Belknap and Mary Newton. These include, as far as I've noted in my first examination of your sheets, the following: 116, 117, and 118 (which you have marked, correctly, "not in our line") and these later numbers 268 to 273, 373 to 382, 469 to 487, 490 and 491 and 126 "Elijah" (error for Elisha). I may have overlocked others.

(C) Your \$107, Elam. The Elam who lived and died at Wapping, Conn., has been identified conclusively as a grandson of Samuel Belknam's brother Job, whosewife was Phoebe Newton, through their san Ebenezer. So his descendants 241 to 246, and 385 their children, cannot have been descended from Jesse \$6.

Of course the person who probablt is best qualified to verify the accuracy of the other entries in your sheets is Della — who has, I think, a set of these sheets. So I'll send her a copy of this letter.

Again, my sincere thanks. I hope to find time, later on, to check these EXMANUAL sheets earefully and thoroughly, unless Della tells me I den't need to.

pages 706 & 707 I have enclosed a copy as we have added more to these sheets.

Then all the rest of the information in her book is new to me.

After some 30 yrs. of working on family history I have found it was to my advantage to make these family sheets out with any notes on the family. This I would do as soon as possible after obtaining the material. It sure has helped me to keep the families straight and to see the differences in names, dates and places. When I've found donflicting information I have recorded all of it. Then if I could not prove or disprove it, I just left it with notes to show the differences. There are some cases that will never be solved I'm sure. In some families the more information that was found the more confusing it became. Have found it hard at times to prove or to disprove some persons record. If this can't be done have quoted the sources and let it alone, lest I make a ligger mistake. In some cases we might have to wait until we are in heaven and can ask the people personaly to quote the facts. Any way it is all very interesting. I might not be much help to you, but I'll keep trying.

Glad you finally received Franklin Belknap's record. I think you will find his record to be very interesting when you read it. Most of it is personal letters. Most of it does agree with Henry W. Belknap's record, when they have covered the same families. Where the records do not match then more research is

needed. Who knows which one if correct.

Thanks for your letters and the information you have sent.

I don't seem to get one thing finished before some thing else starts. Just received your last letter with the information on the parents of Mary Wood & etc. Will answer this latter.

I mailed you dume 28, Monday, the Franklin Belknap's record that my father had. I was going to have a xerox copy made of my copy, but when I found my fathers copy I decided to mail it to you. My copy is typed better and have corrected some spelling. You can make the record out ok. This would also save you money to have it copied. I do not know it there was a cover to it. What is written on right left hand side of the pages means nothing. Some relative wrote that to match their copy. They wrote on every thing they touched. If this record of Franklins is of any value to you, you may keep it. The family of this Franklin Belknap is on page 267 in our book we loaned you. He was in Chicago, Ill. when my father met him and obtained this record. This record is a copy of his origanals. I do not know where the original records went. Franklin Belknap never married. If any part of it you can't read, refer the page to me and I will check with the copy I have. In this way maybe I could help. I did not have time to check every page with my copy.

The family of Levi Belknap, Franklin's Father, the marriages of the father and the son Levi are mixed up. Haven't had time to check into it. I'm hoping the records I am to receive in July from our New Eng. research will clear some of these questions.

While at the Salt Lake Gen. Library two weeks ago I came across a book (Know thy Self's by Leora Belknap. She lived in Claremont, N.H. latter to a nursing school in Boston, Where she is now I would not know. Glen Evans had this record. I see he has taken much information from this record, but failed to give the complete dates and names of towns, when he put it in his record. Leora Belknap gives both her mothers and fathers line of Genealogy. I had the Library copy only the Belknap lime for me. Didn't try to have the pages with pictures copyled as they would not take off very well. It cost me \$4.20 or 10¢ a page.

I'M adding the rest of the dates and etc to my family group sheets. If you like and if it would help I could make xerox copies for you. I could also make a copy of the book of Leora Belknaps or both. It would be 10¢ a page and postage. If I was able I

would love to do these things for you without charge.

Ism also enclosing a page of some things on the Oregon Belknaps I also copied at the Library. Didn't get too much because the Library closed for the day. I don't get to Salt Lake Library as much as I would like.

Here's a copy of it. As you will see, it was in the sizable file of persons whom HWB did not identify.

His information came from a "compiled genealogy" of the Pickering family, which makes it far from authoritative, for all such genealogies are suspect. As the old saying goes, "The difference between two compiled genealogies is that one is worse than the other." In attempting to produce one, I humbly bear in mind that one of the requirements for becoming a Certified Genealogist is proof that the applicant does not use material from compiled genealogies.

The information HWB set down gave details for one child of a Sarah Belknap and John Comerais - nothing more. About a year ago of perhaps two years, I found a record of the marriage in a list of marriages in the 2nd Baptist Church, Boston - and I entered this information on HWB's sheet.

The dates -- 1810 for marriage, 1813 for birth of a son -- make it just barely possible that this Sarah was daughter of Jereny. But, if so, she was 42 years old at marriage and 45 years old at birth of the son. Possible -- but unusual and unlikely.

Knowing Evans's habit of coupling names without proof, I see no reason for accepting his statement that Jeremy's Sarah married John Comerais. The parentage of this Sarah who did marry Comerais is still unknown, in my opinion.

All that is known about Jeremy's daughter Sarah is that she was unmarried at age 26, when Jeremy signed his will -- and that she was also an heir of her Aunt Abigail, Belknap, whose will I do not have, so I don't know its date or how Sarah was named in it.

There is one other Sarah whom Evans might have chosen, perhaps more plausibly, for she was only 30 years old in 1810 - but there's ne proof on that one, either.

Chances are, I think, that Evans happened to read that same Pickering genealogy -- and let guesswork do the rest for him.

I den't think this was one of the many cases in which he deliberately distorted facts.

He does not show this marriage in any of his material that I have, so I don't know what source he named — if any — in the copy you have. If you can tell me what that source was, I'll track it down — even though I know I may find, as in many other instances, that the source he names contains not one word supporting his statement.

I've gone over the sheets you sent with your letter of March 28 (which arrived yesterday) and am returning them with notations showing additional or differing data in HWB's records. I've not yet attempted to edit this portion of his work; so cannot insist that he is right on all points. But I'm sure you'll want to know what he recorded.

Where he had full dates, I've inserted them. In most instances his year dates were the same as yours. The differences in other details are:

- -- SIMEON -- not "Semion". (I have lots of other descendants of Simeon, not yet organized in final form.)
- -- Jessie (not Jesse) daughter of the second Augustus. You show husband as William Weiss. HWB shows him as John W Hutchinson. His information came from Jessie's brother Ralph Augustus. Possibly 2 marriages?
- -- Wife of the Charles who was son of Admiral Charles. You show Helen Rockwood. HWB says Gladys Goodrich, with full date and details. His source not named.
- -- Birthdate of Francis Wheelwright, son of Adm Charles. You show 1874 (from Evans?). HWB says 21 January 1873, one month before the marriage. Knowing the care he took on pre-marital births and pre-marital conception, I'm inclined to think that Evans got his date from someone who made the common effort to conceal pre-marital relations.

Numbers in parentheses, on your sheets, are HWB's file numbers -- not yet altered for my records.

The records left by Adm Charles are in NEHG Society library, 101 Newbury St. Boston. I inspected them and copied some portions. Was unable to get them lent to our local library or historical society. If you have better luck, through Salt Lake, please have copy made for me at my expense. They consistof (1) Ledger containing his findings on families he studied; (2) Ledger containing the original notes on which those findings were based, with sources shown in many instances; and (3) bundle of miscellaneous clippings, etc -- of little value, but worth more study than I gave to them.

For my files, I've m de copies of your letter and the accompanying sheets -- to use when I find time to work on the conflicts in data. Unless you beat me to it.

The information on Charles & Belknap line is as follows. according to Evans-

1. Samuel Belknap and Mary Dickinson

2. Semion Belknap b. 1726 and Elizabeth Porter

9-207 3. Moses #f. b. 7 Sept 1754 and Sara Kibbe

9 709-4. Moses Belknap Jr. b. 1780 and Margaret (Peggy) Richardson Lon 17 81)

9. 704 5. Augustus Belknap b. 1815 and Hannah C. Holden (instead of Clara Sanborn)

6. Charles E. Belknap b. 1846

In letters to my father from Charles he signs them as Charles E. Belknap. The records show his name as Charles Belknap.

The information on page 226 is according to Franklin Belkmap record of Chicago, Ill. Franklin Belknap rec. does contain many letters from Charles Belknap, but I have not located any letters on his own line.

H.W. B. record drops this family line with Samion b. 1726 who married

My father had borrowed adm Charles E. Belknap's records. Before he had time to have a copy typed off, Charles wanted the record back. Later Charles house was burned. They told my father the records burned also. I was surprised when Glen Evans quoted from those records.

Now the weather is better I hope to get to Salt Lake to do some checking. Do you have any idea what the name of the Genealogical Library would be in Boston. Glen Evans says that Charles Belknap rec. is in a Library there. If I could obtain the name of that Library, I would ask the Genealogical Society of Utah to borrow the record to obtain a copy. That is how we obtained the complete records of Glen Evans. He had them in the Lansing, Mich. Library. It seems the libraries borrow records where the individual can't. I can see where some individual might be responsible and the records could be lost.

I will try to answer your letters one at a time. Thanks for the time you take and the copies you send. Hope all is well with you and your family.

In exhuming my photostat of Warren's 1859 piece om The Belknap Family, I ran across a neglected photostat of pages in WHO WAS WHO in years ending about 1960. Here's what it said about the Charles Belknap who was son of Adm Charles B and Pannie Wijeelwright:

This confirms Evans on marriage to Helen Rockwood.

What about HWB record of marriage to Gladys Goodrich, as reported to you April 2? Note dates given for marriage:

HWB: marriage to Gladys Goodrich, 25 Oct 1909. -- Charles then 29 years old.

WWW: marriage to Helen Rockwood, 5 Oct 1918 -- " 38 " "

Looks like married twice. Detailed record on marriage In 1909, by HWB, must have come from Charles himself or from someone close to him. Most likely, I think, from Charles, with whom HWB had some correspondence that I read some years ago. At the time HWB got his information on Charles, Charles was a lieutenant in the Navy -- i. e., about 1914. Presumably still married to Gladys, as no mention of her death or divorce, up to that time.

Marriage to Helen Rockwood came about 4 years after HWB got his information.

Presumtion: Gladys dead or divorced by then.

No mention of Gladys in piece in WWW -- which contained information given, of course, by Charles himself. Was he suppressing the fact of a first marriage? Looks that way. No proof. No indication of where to search for proof, as neither Charles norHWB named any children. Might ask children of other children of the Admiral: Francis, or Robert -- if we know of them. Do you?

From my memory of character of this Charles, as shown in letters of his, I think him quite capable of this sort of suppression of facts.

Till further infor comes along, I'll handle by showing that HWB records fi marriage in 1909 and Charles shows marriage in 1918.

16 April 1974

Your letter April 11 requires a lengthy and detailed answer. So I'm returning it with markings in red, to aid you in following my replies to the many points you raised. Also, I'm returing the sheet for Jeremy Belknap & Ruth Eliot, similarly marked (A. etc) in circled black numbers.

Before I plunge into details, forgive me for making a basic distinction. Like you, I'm constantly troubled by conflicts in secondary sources, such as second-hand compilations, local histories, and the like. In such cases, I cannot accept any such alleged source, for it is not evidence. The only acceptable evidence is original documentation. So I try to keep digging till I find such real evidence. By and large, the conflicts trace back a usually — to uncritical echoing of erroneous statements in things like the published history of the Newburgh families, the local histories of Framingham, and so on and on. Plus, alas, the blunders and frauds perpetrated by such unscrupulous charlatans as Evans (believe, when I say "frauds" I can prove it).

The result of this insistence on valid evidence is that I do not pass anything along to you until I have what I believe to be orginal documentary confirmation. (I somehow doubt that Dr W Dean Belnap really understands the difficulty of this search for proven accuracy.)

(A) JEREMY'S NAME. To call him "Jeremiah" merely makes him pretty hard for a layman


Now, the replies to your questions:

to understand. Too bad, for he's the only Belknap who has been famous enough to appear in all American encyclopedias -- and always as Jeremy, never Jeremiah. The only name he ever used was Jeremy. For example, I have before me a copy of Vol. 1 of his American Biography -- and the title page reads "By Jeremy Belknap, D. D." just as all the title pages of his many other books do. (The "D. D." is essential in naming him. In his time, Doctors of Divinity were very rare, for most pastors in New England churches were merely "raised up" from their congregations. Jeremy a ways added the D.D. to his name; and so did everyone else in his time. 0 . . . On June 25, 1798, five days after his death, the newspaper Columbian Centinel (thus spelled) published a "Sketch of the Life and Character of the late Reverend Doctor Belknap," beginning with the words: "JEREMY BELKNAP, D.D., paster of the church in Federal-street. . . " . . . His will, a copy of which I'm enclosing, shows his signature as Jeremy. . . The many references to his books, in NEHG Register, always call him Jeremy. As far as I've ever found, the only time he was called "Jeremiah" im the Register was in warren's piece "The Belknap Family," Vol 13, p 18 -- in Warren's Management And Market Management Management And Market Management M listing of the children of Joseph Belknap and Sarah Byles. This piece by Warren was the first worthwhile bit of published Belknap genealogy and has often been copied slavishly. But it contains many errors and ommissions -- for example, three blunders in the listing of the children of Jeremiah Belknap and Sarah Fosdick and their marriages, one of them the ludicrous statement that daughter "Hannah" married "Mary Rand" -- her name was Anna and she married John Norton; it was herbrother Jeremiah who married Mary Rand. . . Warren had what we now term a "fixation" on the name Jeremiah, since he was trying to correct an earlier error on the parentage of the Jeremiah who married Sarah Fosdick. So maybe it was natural for him to KKKEEKXX "improve" a colloquial Jeremy to a formal Jeremiah (much like some of the "improvements" that Evans made in some of the documents he altered so sadly when he miscopied them). But we shouldn't follow Warren. . . Forgive all this detail, which is but a fraction of what I might say on this subject. I'm just trying to keep you from being laughed at by knowledgeable people if you publish a book calling the only famous Belknap "Jeremiah, when everyone knows he was Jeremy in all original documentation.

- (B) SARAH'S MARRIAGE: You say Evans shows m John Comerais. I recall that this Comerais appears somewhere in my files, in material not yet indexed -- so I don't know where to Yook for it at this moment; but I'm sure it's not with this Sarah. I've not been able to find a record of this Sarah's marriage. So, for now, am inclined to accept HWB's record that she never married. For one thing, she was still Sarah Belknap (i.e., unmarried) on Nov 19 1794 when her father signed his will (copy enclosed). As she was MMM 26 years old, then, she was well past normal marrying age for girls in that period in Boston. (As to Evans, he habitually matched marriages to anyone who had the same name -- see "C", below.)
- (C) RUTH PRESTON: The Joseph who married Ruth Preston was son of Samuel Belknap and Mary Newton -- brother of my gg grandfather Jonas. I've run into other cases in which Evans made simular mismatches, on sheer guesswork. MAYKEXIKIX I can't surmise how he got Stafford, Conn., as birthplace of Jeremy's son Joseph. Certainly the Joseph who married RuthPreston was not born there, nor anywhere else in Conn. See sheet
- for Samuel Belknap & Mary Newton, enclosed.

  (D) MARY ELIZABETH HODGES. I can see how Evans might have been misled into thinking that she was a first wife of Jeremy's son John. When I was anotating that sheet for you, I momentarily misread a confusing portion of old notes by HWB and started to make the same mistake then blotted it out when I read farther and saw the truth. Oliver Prescott, father of the Mary Prescott whom John married, had three wives:

  (1) Mary Elizabeth Hodges, (2) Ann Whiting, mother of the Mary whom John married, and
- (3) Elizabeth O., his widow and executor of his will. John's only wife was Mary Prescott.
- (E) CHARLES BELKNAP, admiral. I'm enclosing a separate note on his son Charles, to supplement material set to you before.
- (F) "BELNAP": Yes, there were many cases of this spelling in early New England; but I have not seen any use of this spelling by members of the family itself, in those years. This spelling, like "Bellnap", was often used by others -- lawyers, clerks, etc. -- who were setting down what they heard. I have not yet found any omission of the "k" by anyone who wrote his name himself, before your ancestor Jesse -- and his name was spelled with a "k" when he married at Reading, a few miles from my home. Whether he himself ever omitted the "k" -- or whether this was begun by his children or grandchildren, I do not know. (Incidentally, the spelling "Belnap" on a document sighed by marks is not evidence that the signer spelled his name that way -- it merely means that the lawyer or clerk did the spelling.) If you find any documentary instances differing from what I've found, please tell me about them.

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



At the moment, I see no immediate way of discovering the parentage of this Diantha Phoebe (whose middle name, however, suggests descent from family of the Asa Newton who married Tamar Vinton, as "Phoebe" was a name used in that family), However, there is a hypothetical line of thought that might be worth examination.

Like this: In 1818, pension application in NY State, by Jonas, says nothing of a wife. In 1820, in Kentucky, he names Tamar. So, a guess compounded by a guess: (1) that the marriage to Tamar occurred in Kentucky, between dates of those two applications; (2) that Asa had died quite recently, in Kentucky; (3) that Asa and Tamar Newton had been among those who "traded" Ontario County land for some of Gidenn Granger's land in Kentucky, about 1816 - and might be found in a more complete list of such people than the one I passed along to Gladys some months ago., Perhaps some helpful information might be found in one of the deeds involved in this "trade".

On guess (2), above, I'm influenced by the record of other instances in which a widower Belknap married very soon the widow of one of his cousins. In my branch of the family it would have been almost normal for such a marriage to occur, shortly after the death of the man's cousin. Claudia will recall two such instances in Oregon.

. . And the point is that, if this Asa Newton was the one we think he must have been, he was the son of a brother of Jonas's mother Mary Newton -- i.e., Jonas's cousin, which would go a long way to explain why Jonas, at about 60, married Tamar. It was just a natural thing to do, especially if Tamar had a child who needed a father in the nome. Such a marriage would occur, naturally, within a very short time after the death of Asa.

If I learn anything more, I'll keep you posted.

Me, I wish those genealogical forms had never been invented — for they lead too many people to be definite about things that are far from odertain, and they don't demand statement of sources on individual details.

I should hasten to tell you that a Belknap genealogy covering the early generations and some of the descendants of Jonas Newton Belknap (my g g grandfather) has recently been deposited in the LDS Genealogical Library, Salt Lake, by its author -- E. Clinton Belknap.

The pages on the early generations (Abraham to Jonas) cover ground that is already in your files. They are based partly on material that I supplied to Clinton as I did to you -- though. I'm sorry to say. \*\* he fell into the easy trap of using some sadly erroneous stuff that he got from Glen Evans about 20 years ago.

As Clinton is a great grandson of Jonas's son Elijah, his primary aim was to bring down to date a record of Elijah's descendants. He worked on this side of the task for more than twenty years — and did a fine job, as far as I can judge, for he didn't rely on hearsay but dug hard for verified records. So, when and if you ever want to add about 600 Belknaps to your files, you'll find them in this book — A Belknap Genealogy by E Clinton Belknap.

Here's a rough outline of what's in this book (after the first five generations):

Jonas Newton Belknap -- 10 pp
Elijah Belknap -- 8 pp
Jonas Jr -- 1 p
Elisha -- 21 pp
Jesse -- 18 pp
Susannah -- 2 pp -- wrong, I now believe.
Esther -- 1 p
Orin -- 7 pp
Elijah's descendants -- 180 pp.

Some day, when I have time, I'll draft a set of notes on points where I differ with what Clinton has published -- mostly details of places and dates and other minor matters.

Forgive the delay in saying Thank You for the copy of Evans 1950 compilation. I'm most grateful -- especially when I think of the fact that you were so busy with your own book.

Thus far, lack of time has kept me from doing much with this set of Evans material, which contains much that isn't in my other sets of his work. About all I've been able to do is to glance through it, shuddering at the entries that are obviously incorrect -- and hoping you haven't copied them -- and hoping that a check mark against a section merely means you've read it.

But I can't resist the temptation to mention one entry which is an outstanding illustration of his habit of making guesswork identifications -- Eli Belknap m Clarissa Lyman, on his p 60. This one -- including his list of places of residence -- is a honey. What he did was to combine three unrelated Elis merely because they were named Eli == and he was wrong about all three of them. All that's right is that there was an Eli who married Clarrisa and lived in Nassau and Stephen Town (not "Stephenstown"). Everything else in that passage is wrong. He didn't evenhave a right list of their children.

But enough of that. I should tell you that John LaPiana is trying to find out whether Evans had any evidence for his identification of Pilgrim's father -- or was just making another guess. I can hope that he'll find real evidence -- but I doubt he'll succeed.

My main concern, right now, is my troubled uncertainty about what to do about questionable things in some pages of Clinton's book -- obviously echoes of errors made by Evans and Mrs Jane. I reproach myself for not having given Clinton all the information he needed. In my concentration on my own work, I just sent him whatever he asked for -- without taking time to consider what his full needs were. That is maybe my duty and my

I'm torn between fear of hurting Clinton by voicing disagreement with some of the things in his fine book -- indeed, I might even offend him by telling him of my differing views on details that have no bearing on his lineage or mine but might mislead people in other branches, such as decendants of some of Ebenezer's children.

But, knowing how readily people adopt whatever they find in print, I can't help thinking that perhaps I should draft a memo stating my points of difference and then send it to all libraries in which Clinton's book is deposited, in the hope that future searchers will read my memo as well as the book... In the back of my mind, always, is the harm done by Evans and by HWB's sharing of his faulty early notes.

Oh well, I shouldn't bother you with this sort of thing. But it helps to put it on paper.

Because you asked, I must tell you the results of recent work on this question. Here are my well-supported conclusions. Can take time to provide detailed evidence if you wish:

- -- Unquestionably, just one person, notine. Presumably widow Peet or widow Phinney. Evans certainly in error in saying Dorcas Peet was 2nd wife. Capt Johnhad only one wife.
- --- No sure evidence on whether maiden name was Peet or Phinney. But what I have seems to favor Peet as maiden name. I see no ready way of pursuing that question farther. In my records, I'll show her as probably born Peet, widow Phinney.

### NOT URGENT

A question for you when you have time:

-- What do you have (beyond the little in Evans) on John Belknap & Dorcas Phinney (and/or Dorcas Peet) and their descendants?

Nothing in the set of sheets you sent me years ago. But I seem to remember a query from you about Dorcas Peet. (Can't find that query in my files, today. Apparently misfiled.) So you may have something that I don't have.

As far as I know, the first and perhaps only naming of Dorcas Peet was in a DAR application in 1895 or 1896 -- in the years when the DAR accepted anything it received, without much evidence. I'm sending for a copy of that application.

I question Evans's statement that she was 2nd wife of that John. What I've assembled on his children shows plainly that the last-born children of whom I have a record were children of Dorcas Phinney.

\*\*\*\*\*\*

This query is prompted by recent aid to a Belknsp who was seeking to find proof that he ais descended of from John B and Dorcas Phinney. I found the proof.

Found this case leading me back into a problem I laid aide in 1971 — the parentage of the Thomas Belknap who married Naomi Dare (ancestor of Mrs Hamric, etc.) At that time I had convinced myself that the father of this Thomas, (b about 1755, probably) could not possibly the Thomas born 1729 as Evans said.

Now, re-studying my fat file on that case in the light of new information about:
John Belknap & Dorcas Phinney, I believe that the West Va Thomas was most probably
son of the John who was son of John B and Dorcas Phinney, b 25 January 1734. When and if
I get enough support for this guess, I'll set down the case for you.

Meanwhile, let me warn you, as I should, though doubtless you know it already, that what appears on this subject in Evans's Appendix is a confused mass of misinformation and mininterpretation. Poor Evans. He didn't know, for instance, that the Thomas, son of Thomas and Naomi Dare and b abt 1795, was the same man as the Thomas said to have been born 1779 and that the legend that he lived 104 years was just a myth — and Evans didn't know that "Emsey" Fisher was christemed Melviha ("Emsey" was a nickname based on her initial M) — and so on and on, including Evans's guess that the Thomas said to have been born 1779 was son of John 1734 (which was probably true of that Thomas's father, I believe.)... Am I confusing you by these comments?... Never mind. I"ll clear it all up, some day.

\*\*\*\*\*

Worthwhile, perhaps, to add that the difficulty in tracing children of John B and Dorcas Phinney seems to be the result of the fact this John went broke on continental money and his children and grandchildren scattered widely instead of remaining at or near Newburgh -- which perhaps explains why Ruttenber's sometimes-inaccurate record, written a hundred years later, does not include John and Dorcas.

Although I don't know whether or not it will be of interest to you, I think I should tell you about one outcome of my centinuing effort to expand my record of the family of Samuel Belknap and Mary Newton, at Belchertown, Mass. I'll summarize conclusions briefly. Later, when I rewrite my notes on that family, I'll give fuller detail.

\*\*\*\*\*\*\*

With the great help of a descendant of the Belchertown Kentfields, an answer to the old problem of Doelittle's #184 (Mary Belknap, widow Kentfield, joined church 1799, died 1781, aged 88) seems to have been found. This Mary, who seidentity has puzzled Belknap genealogists for more than a century, was grandmother of the Rufus Kentfield who married, 25 Nov 1773, the Mary Belknap who was eldest daughter of Samuel Belknap and Mary Newton. She was obviously the daughter (probably illegitimate) of either the first Joseph Belknap (son of Abraham) or one of his sons. Thomas or John. I am not yet ready to express any opinion as to which of these three was most probably her father. In any case, the marriage of Rufus and Mary, in 1773, is apparently the earliest instance of intermarriage of the two main branches of the family: a great grandaughter of Samuel marrying a great grandson (or possibly great great grandson) of Joseph.

Though additional supporting evidence may come to light later this year, I see no reason for doubting these conclusions. I wish I felt as certain about some of the other unproven matters in the record of this family, such as the identity of Pilgrim's father.

If anyome but you had wanted it, I'd have found some way of refusing to do it. But here's a batch of sheets listing errors that I have found in Clinton's book.

This is the first time I've really gone through the book in search of mistakes. Up to now, I've been merely noticing the points that happened to catch my attention. And of course I can't be sure I have caught every point that should be noted. If you find others, please let me know. Similarly, tell me if you differ with me on anything in those sheets.

I hope this listing of errors won't seem to obscure my admiration of Clinton's book. It's a fine book -- free from bias -- with no axe to grind -- and on the whole much more accurate than anything else that has been printed. For the most part, the errors that I've listed are minor details of no great significance. And some of them will be of no interest to you, as they won't affect your entries on your charts.

The one major error is on pages 139 and 140 -- the inclusion of a record for the Susannah Belknap who married David Chatfield. Originally, my comments on those two pages covered three or four sheets; but I finally boiled them down to a much shorter version, which you may find inadequate. I was reluctant to issue what I found I had to say about the puzzle of Clinton's antagonism to the evidence against identifying that Susannah as a daughter of Jonas Newton Belknap. If you want fuller proof, I'll send it to you. Even after thorough review of weeks of correspondence with Clinton on this subject, I still can't see any rational explanation of the mental attitude that led him to charge your sister Flora (or a Mrs Johnson) with having committed a forgery.

I suppose that maybe I should feel obligated to send a copy of those sheets to Clinton, but I don't want to bruise his sensitive skin -- and if he's not going to print a second edition when he won't have any need of them. I think I'll just defer this decision for a few weeks.

  - Should read Rowley, not Mansfield. Entry of date of marriage in manuscript Mansfield VR appears immediately above entry of barth of first child, indicating that it was written at the time of that birth 74 -- a common practice in early New England when children of newcomers were born.
  - 8th child, David -- date of death was "1760, in hospital at Montreal, after 74 capture of the city from the French."
  - This old error 9th child, Ruth -- there was no such daughter of this Samuel. was disproved years ago. The Ruth erroneously thought to be daughter of 74= Samuel was his grandaughter. Evans, from whom this entry was copied, merely repeated the questioned entry set down by those who first doubted it.

Here are two more points on corrections for Clinton's book:

page 68: Restere question-mark on shild Sarah, emitted in copying my manuscript.

page 77. child 8, Jenathan -- delete date and place of death. This came from erroneous record by HWB. Jehnathan lived in Oswege County, and probably died there, though I haven't yet found date of death. New Milford, in NE corner of Pa, was a virtually impossible place for him to go to in his old age, as you can see by looking at a map. Looks like one of HWB's blunders based on ignorance of geography -- finding a death of a Jenathan and jumping to comclusion as to which man of that name it was.

Samuel Belway + - 2-

Mother of Mary Newton -- should read "Mary Witt, possibly widow Gibbs." Children 1 and 2 - delete questionmarks. Child ? -- Stephen. "Mary" for name of wife was a guess by Evans, with no known substantiation, together with an unproved assumption that the Stephen in 1800 census Saratoga County NY was son of Samuel Belknap and Mary Newton. This problem, together with much fuller data on this family, will be covered in my next revision of my record of this family. Suggest you ignore this page 77, till you receive my revision.

- Last sentence of third paragraph. Before Somers separated from Enfield, the church in the Somers district was the only church in Enfield and so 78 children born snywhere in Enfield were baptized there. The statement that the parents had moved is incorrect.
- Next to last paragraph -- ". . . filed for a bounty coat . . . om that date." Incorrect. The date for the bounty coat, in Mass S and S, is not the date 78 of the application but the date when the order to issue the coat was approved. See next to last line in 2nd paragraph, page 79.
- lst paragraph: "Samuel received a land grant." Not true. bought his first land at Mansfield on a mortgage which he paid off two 75 years later. This misstatement came from Evans, who repeatedly said that members of this branch of the family "kept moving in search of free land." Actually, they always bought land when they moved, until finally those who reached Oregon in 1847 and 1848 found free land to settle on.
- He had been a weaver in his Third paragraph: "Samuel . . . a weaver." youth at Haverhill, but became a farmer in Connecticut. Like his forefathers, 75 he continued to call himself by his early trade long after he ha had beased working at it. The pattern followed by the first Samuel and the next four or five generations of his descendants was to begin as skilled craftsmen and
- follow a trade till they had accumulated enough money to buy land and become They were proud of their trades and -- in land deeds and other documents -- continued to identify themselves as joiners, turners, weavers, etc., long after they had become farmers. So this Samuel's 1739 deed, in which he called himself a weaver, does not indicate that he was still Working at this trade. He was then farming far too much land to have had time for doing anything else. The surmise that he was "raising sheep" is not supported by any known facts about the farming then done by settlers in that part of

- 8th child, Orin. (1) Should show also his second wife, Naomi Carpenter (widow 80 Lyman) on page 142.
- 5th paragraph, list of places: "Gobers Kiln" should be Cobleskill, N.Y., as noted in last paragraph on page 86, . . "Taking of Burgoyne (Battle of 81 Saratoga)" Delete Battle of Saratoga, inserted by Clinton. battle of Saratoga. The battle that caused Burgoyne's surrender at Saratoga Calley was Bemis Heights, listed correctly by Jonas. . "Battle of Newburgh" is error in copying. Jonas wrote "Newburn", presumably a misspelling of New There was no battle at Newburgh. Berne.

record in third paragraph from bottom page 101.

- Last paragraph -- second line -- delete "to have." This death was recorded, not merely "reported."
- 202 Eliza Carney, place of death -- should be "Lockport" not Lakeport. No such place as "Lakeport" in Niagara Coun ty.
- 103 First line, should show birthplace of Elisha Jr as Ontario County, NY.
- First line, birthplace of Eli should be Niagara County, not Niagara City.

  No such place as Niagara City. (Error probably results from Mrs Jane Belknap's use of "Cty" as abbreviation of "County.")
  - Birthplace of Maria Belknap should read "Niagara County," not Ontario County.

    By 1820, her parents had moved to Niagara County.
  - 124 Place of death of Hannah Belknap should read "Coulee City," not Coules.
- 126 First name of Keturah Penton's mother was Magdalena (last letter not clearly typed on this page).
  - Child 6, Adeline -- name of husband was Robert Kyle. (Mistyping "Tra Anderson" was my error in 1971, which I corrected in 1972 when I noticed that I had shown same man as husband of both twins. Apparently I failed to send my revision to Clinton.)
    - 128 Child 9 -- Edward's place of death was Prineville, not "Prinerville."
    - Next to last line -- "Princeville" should be "Prineville."
  - The Susannb who married These two pages should not have been printed. David Chatfield was not Jonas's daughter. She may possibly have been 139 daughter of Jonas's brother Seth. . . . In 1973, I received a letter - & 140 written by your sister Flora in 1949, in which she copied from a letter by a Mrs L.N. Johnson (apparently a descendant of Jonas N Belknap, but not yet identified) a manuscript written in 1895 or earlier by a grandchild of Jonas N Belknap. The authenticity and accuracy of that manuscript were fully self-evident. It showed a list of Shildren for Jonas's daughter Susannah entirely different from the list of children of the Susannah who msrried David Chatfield. From the beginning, Clinton consistently refused to accept the authenticity of that manuscript. Dear Della: 4 Dec 1975

Your good letter of 1 Dec needs a prompt answer. So here goes.

- (1) I'm surprised that Mrs Féay was able to buy a copy of Clinton's book. He printed only 40 or 50 copies, placed many in libraries, gave away some, and had few left for possible sale. I've been hoping he will print a second edition to meet the demand for copies. . I'll deal, later in this memo, with the reason why that hope now seems sadly faint.
- (2) don't know anything about the "corrections by hand" that Mrs Feay says were made in the copy she got -- but I suspect that they were made by Clinton himself as result of my telling him about errors that I noted. They were mostly mere repetition of errors made by Evans, who did a job for Clinton many years ago. Example: Framingham inspead of Haverhill, as place of death of Ebenezer.
- (3) The errors I noted were almost wholly such minor matters as that one, in early generations before Jonas -- and a few in descendants of Jonas's son Elisha, as I've already told you. Nothing of vast importance.
- (5) Clinton did a fine jab on tracing descendants of Elijah Belknap and Catherine Garlinghouse. Years of travel and personal interviews, plus digging up documents, etc. I believe his work on this score can be accepted without question, for I know how he did it during the years we worked together.
- (6) I'll welcome a copy of Mrs Feay's line, when you find time to send it to me. Beyond what's in Clinton's book, about descendants of Esther Belknap and Gamaliel Garlinghouse, my files centain some unorganized material which I'll be glad to put together for her if she wishes and if I have anything that she doesn't have.

Now a couple of other points that I should mention.

(7) The reason why Clinton says he wen't print a second edition is, at heart, his anger over the way Dr Beinap used, without proper credit, the same material that Clinton received from me — and which Clinton printed with full acknowledgement of the fact that it came from me. Clinton's anger seems to be directed at both Dr Belnap and me — for printing and copyrighting material which Clinton had printed and issued about six months before Heritage with Honor was issued. Apparently he feels betrayed by me. And he says he fears a lawsuit if he now issues a second edition seemingly infringing the copyright on Heritage with Honor. It's no use my telling him that of course he'd win any such lawsuit, as he has full proof of prior use of what I wrote. Indeed, he'd be justified in bringing a countersuit against Dr Belknap, for damage done to Clinton by Dr Belnap's unmauthorized appropriation of what I prepared. And of course, future neaders of the two books, in such places as the Library of Congress, will doubtless conclude as Clinton does, that Dr Belhap engaged in flagrant piracy in using my work so as to make it seems to be his own. I have checked the marriage records for Southborough and westforough, Mass. I found; John Belimap md. Ruth Farr 10 June 1736.

Stephen Belknap md. Eunice Warren, 4 Mar 1780.

Lucy Belknap md. Benjamin Ball, 22 May 1777. No parents were given in the marriage record.

In the Glen Evans rec. I have, page 12. This family has only 3 children. Now I question my family sheet on Eli and Clarissa Lyman or Cleracy. My sheet shows the parmts of Eli and John Belknap and Lovinaj, and 12 children. This is according to H W B.

## REMAINING POINTS IN YOUR LETTER 25 Jan.

(1) Lucena -- thanks for catching the errormy stupid fingers made. They sometimes pay no attention to what my alleged brain is saying. Am returning the sheet.

- (2) Sheet showing Rinalde Webber's parentage. Yes, I had this information. Am returning the sheet with some added data -- including one more child.
- (3) Mrs Feay -- Considering the careful work shown on other sheets, I can't imagine how she got so mixed up on the top sheet showing her Belknap and Garlinghouse ancestry. If I weren't so busy, I'd write to her about it. But perhaps she has remedied the errors in this sheet already. Anyway, I hope it doesn't get into the records at Salt Lake -- for it certainly is confusing.
- (4) Foris Belknap Bibles -- Since I wrote to you on this subject, saying that I didn't agree with the Bible record you sent to me a year ago, I ran across a mention of it in a letter John Sherman wrote back in 1959 -- so sent it to him, asking his opinion of its validity. In replying, John has sent me Xerox copies of all pages of the Bible that Foris gave to his daughter Sarah -- Bible printed 1837, given in 1840, with inscription by Foris and birtdates filled out. Later entries, marriages and deaths, unquestionably written at various times in differing hands -- not written all at one time in one handwriting. This Bible, unquestionably, passes all tests for authenticity. Can send you the copies of photos of its pages if you wish -- but maybe you'll take my word for the fact that this Bible (on which Sherman relied in his piece about Foris) is the one to trust, rather than the dubious one you saw. . . Incidentally, Sherman explained how it happened that his Aunt Grace Sherman made that error on birthdate of Foris, writing 1782 instead of the 1788 shown in the Bible that Foris prepared. . . . In my judgment, the piece written by Sherman, about Foris, is absolutely correct -- except that I differ with him on his reluctance to abandon the family tradition that there was a brother named David -for whom no trace has ever been found in Helland and Wales VR or anywhere else.
- (5) Did I read the biographies in second half of Dr Belnap's book? Yes, many of them -- and thought them by far the best things in the book. Tipped my hat when I read yours.

You've been put to a lot of expense recently, on cepies of stuff for me. An enclosing a check for \$10, to cover it -- and other things I'm going to ask for in the next week or so, problems on which I need your help.



steadfastly refused to draw that conclusion -- preferring to regard the matter as a naive blunder by a non-professional writer. I'm withdrawing from any participation in this angry controversy, for I want no part of it. I didn't write to Mrs. Mansfield. She didn't answer the last time and besides i'm not sure she is living. I wrote to Hattie B. Weese's son in Moses Lake, Wash. He has Hattie's records. He hasn't done any more work on the records, and could not tell me where his mother obtained the inform mation. Only that she wrote to a lot of other people besides, Glen Evans. A lot of the relatives in W. Va. would not answer her letters. Mrs. Weese did not document her papters.

I also wrote to a family in W. Va. who wanted material from me, some time ago. They did seem interested in trying to find out where they s fit into the family. They didn't answer. Some people want information but

do not want to do any research them selves.

There is a conflict in Mrs. Mansfield and Mrs. Weese direct line. They both claim the same line. As I went over the papers they seemed to be too many Thomas Belknaps. They confused their line with some cousins.

Mrs. Mansfield and Mrs. Weese are descendents of Thomas Belknap and Polly Friend. While Mrs. Elizabeth Belknap Alberts of Tremonton, Utah, is a descendent of Thomas Belknap and (2) Emsey Fisher. She has been dead a long time. I never learned who her children were. Would take a bit to try to locate them mow.

The only thing now would be to go to Salt Land City and see if they have a copy of "D A R Leneage book" or do more research in W. Va. and try to go backwards on their line. Mrs. Hattie B. Weese does make a note "there were too mamy Thomas Belknaps. They were cousins and people tried

to put them in the same family.

As I have outlined the material I have, would be as follows: Not saying it is correct.

I warned you that as soon as I got through abswering your letter 25 Jan I would start bothering you with things on which I need your help. Here's the first one.

In Feb 75 you sent me a batch of sheets about the West Va Belknaps, including the two sheets that I'm enclosing.

SHEET A: The Thomas who m Naemi Dare. . . Can you think of any way to get actual evidence on the points that I have ringed in red? As far as I have been able to find out, the only source of the statement that he was born 1755, son of the Thomas who was son of Thomas and Sarah Wriggt, is an unsupported identification by Evans. . . All evidence I have found indicates that the Thomas b 1729 never married. so that any son would be a bastard, hence extremely difficult to find in any record now availale. The sources cited by Evans as shown at the bottom of the sheet, contain nothing supporting this identification. . . All that is of record on his origin is that he enlisted at Kingston, not far from Newburgh. I know of nothing to connect him with New Windsor -- and my files on him and his reputed descendants run to nearly 500 pages of inquiry and reply. . . . Note 2, at the bottom of the sheet, is new to me; and is not even remotely supported by anything in my files. . . The only thing that makes Evans's identification seem plausible is that I've found, recently, the record of a court case based on the fact that in 1784 this Thomas b 1729 admitted paternity of a bastard son by a woman whose initials were recorded as E H, nothing more. Maybe he had a habit of siring bastards. . . I've told you, I think, that his will named no children; he left everything to his brothers and sisters.

SHEET B: The Thomas who m Emsey Fisher. . . His descendants who say he was sen of Thomas and Naomi Dare give his birth date as 1795, but with no supporting evidence. I'd like to believe that Sheet B is correct in saying he was son of Capt John and Dorcas Peet -- and that therefore I can disregard the military record showing he was born in Virginia. But I need proof. On this Sheet B, one source cited is "DAR lineage book" which would mean his ancestry had been traced to either Capt John or to the Thomas who m Naomi Dare. Which was it? Can you get in touch with the person who prepared this sheet, and find out what is actually said in that lineage book? MANNAMMANN I thought I have copies of all DAR applications by descendants of Capt John -- but maybe there's one that they haven't sent to me.

. . On the other hand, I'm convinced that neither I nor anyone else has, yet, a complete list of Capt John's children, so it's easy for me to think that this Thomas who m Emsey Fisher might be a son of the Captain. I hope it can be proved; that would make my job a lot easier.

# NOTES ON NEW SHEET FOR ABRAHAM BELKNAP, received from Salt Lake 6/10/69

- (1) Hertfordshire not Hertsfordshire. (confused by abbreviation "Herts"?)
- (2) Date of christening for Abraham should be shown as 1589/90, not just Old Style 1589. (This omission also at upper right of sheet.)
- (3) List of sources should include NEHGR 1931 and also pages 316 &317 of NEHGR 1950, as the piece by G. Andrews

  (Andrews
- (4) Child 2 -- Abraham -- date of birth is not known. Moriarty gives it as "circa INIX 1622." All that is of record on him is that he was named in Bennet's will in 1623.
- (5) Child 3 David date of his birth or christening net known. Permissable to say "Probably 1623 or Isak 1624." Entry on his death should shew "Buried 2 March 1624/5."
- (6) Child 4 Samuel date given for his birth was date of christening and year should read 1627/8.
- (7) Child 7 "John or Jeremy" Very early writers stated a Jeremy. For many years all best genealogists have insisted that there was no Jeremy in this generation. Even Savage called him "the supposed Jeremy" and refused to accept him. Moriarty, in NEHGR 1950 (mentioned above) shows that John as John made a deposition on 27 March 1655. No record of any "Jeremy" in that generation has ever been found. Certainly it would seem that John was never "or Jeremy." Hack genealogies such as Connecticut Genealogy, which still lists a Jeremy, should be disregarded.
- (8) Child 8 Hannah date of birth should fellow Moriarty's wording: "About 1639/40."

  Name of Hannah's husband is usually given as "Christopher Osgood the 2nd" to
  avoid confusion with his father.
- (8) Child fx 4 Samiel article by Moriarty (most respected of all New England genealogists; see obit in recent issue of NEHCR) showed that the Samuel who was living in 1731 was notthis Samuel. Date of death of this Samuel is not known. Entry "after 31 Aug 1731" should be deleted.
- (9) QUERY: Should name of Abraham, at top of sheet, show MINNY MAXIMUM (Christened Beltoft")? Also, should that line also show "(Adopted name of Belknap at some time between 6 Dec 1620 and 2 March 1624/5, following precedent set by his uncle Josias")?
- (10) NOTE FOR FUTURE ACTION: Do not accept entries on name and parentage of A's wife till preof has been examined.

I hope you'll be able to get for me that record on Falls and Smith as Belknap, August 1806 - as mentioned in your page 3, especially in the Belknap was John. Any thing on a John Belknap in NY in that year is of great interest to me

SARA WRIGHT -- I have dome no research on her, as the record put together by H W Belknap about 1914 and by Commander Charles Belknap in the 1890's is sufficient for my needs -- and may be enough for yours. Here are the known facts, from original records:

Daughter of Joseph Wright of Woburn and one of his earlier wives, Elizabeth Bateman. (He had "several wives" according to record of intestate settlement of his estate). Born 7 Mayt1696, Weburn. Married (1) presumably at Woburn, Dr Isaac Hill, who was born 1684 and died 9 Jan 1723 ac 39 at Pomfret, Conn. Married (2) Thomas Belknap, 14 Dec 1727, at Weburn. Date, of death not known. All of her children by Thomas Belknap were born at Weburn, before Thomas moved to Newburgh NY in 1754.

One erratic compiler, Glenn Evans, says Thomas moved from Woburn to Pomfret, Conn., in 1739. This is an error, based on misinterpretation of the fact that Thomas was appointed administrator of Dr Hill's intestate estate in that year, in Windham Co., Conn. The record of the settlement identifies him as "Thomas Belknap of Woburn." In that settlement, 16 years after the death of Dr Hills, 1/3 of the estate — total value £53-2-6 — went to Sarah, the widow. The other 2/3 went to Isaac Hill, son of Dr Hill. The abstract of the record does not indicate whether this son was Sarah's son or the son of an earlier wife of the doctor.

Presumably, Sarah's story goes something like this. In or about 1720, when 24 years old or thereabouts, she married Dr Hill who was 12 years older, and moved to Pomfret with him. When he died in 1723, she returned to her family home in Weburn and married Thomas Belknap in 1727, when both she add Thomas were 31 years old. . . From the fact that the only known mention of the son Isaac Hill was in the settle ment in 1739, it seems likely that he was issue of an earlier marriage by the doctor.

Robable reason for delay till 1739: Maiting for own Isaac to come of age.

If he become 21 in 1738 or 1739, he was Bom 1717 or 1708—i.e., Enforce Sonah m. Dr. Hill, unless she m. him in 1716 or 1717 when 20 or 21 yrs old. ...; Still no proof on son's nother.

Dear Della:

Thanks for your fine letter of 7/28. It's very helpful. I hope you kept a carbon copy of it, for I'm gping to try to answer some questions you MEXMEN raised.

- (1) GLEN EVANS -- Yes, I know he added a Roger to list of abraham's children. His work was very sloppy, sometimes almost fraudulent. I have learned to trust nothing he wrote, till I have found real proof elsewhere.
- (2) The SARAH who married Nathaniel Singleterry. Though formal proof is lacking, she was unquestionably a daughter of Abraham's son Samuel. I have date of her marriage and names of the Singleterry children, if you want EXEMN them.
- (3) Birthdate of HAMNAH, daughter of Abraham. I'd distrust the information sent to you by Mrs. Daly. Even if date of birth appears in Vital Records of Lynn, it would be of questionable accuracy. For a long time, the so-called Vital Records in Massachusets were not entered annuallym, but were written up at intervals of some years, on basis of memory and hearsay— so are not trusted by experts in New England genealogy— with possible exception of those edited and published by N E Genealogical Historical Society... Best confirmation of probable date of Hannah's birth is that in 1671 she add her husband signed a deposition which gave her age as "about 30" and his age as "about 27." He is known to have been borns 6 Dec 1613, which agrees well with "about 27" in deposition. For Hannah, "about 30" in 1671 would plant her birth as about 1611 of possibly 1610. So reasonbly in accord with Moriarty's "about 1639/40."

  (4) The entry "Belkmap otherwise Beltoft" on Bennet's dil was made about 1913, on
  initiative of Charles Bernau, HWB's record agent in England as explained in HWB'S
  phasekex piece in the 1914 REGISTER.

One reason why the information you sent about Abraham's marriage is so welcome is that I'm in process of trying to write an analysis and interpretation of the evidence bearing on when and how and why the Beltofts of Sawbridgeworth changed their family name to Beltoft. The when and how are matters of record — but the more important question, I think is the "why." One point to be dealt with is the probable date at which Abraham made this change. So I needed to know whether I was right in believing that he married as Beltoft — which your record shows plainly (mention of him as Beltoft in will of his wife's father). When I get this thing written, I'll submit a draft of it to some experts, for their comments on the validity of my interpretation of the evidence.

- (5) ADDRESSES. I'm grateful for addresses of W Dean Belknap and Frank Smith. Will surely have occasion to write to them.
- (6) JIMMIE PARKER Hope he contacts me when he comes this way. I'm sure he could help me; perhaps I can help him. . . One thing I hope he digs up is further évidence of the parentage of your ancestor Jesse (the one who dropped the "k"). I've not been successful on this point.
- (7) MERRICK BELKMAP I had some correspondence with him a year ago. Sent him my record of his line of descent from Abraham. Do you want a copy of that record?

When I wrote to you a day or so ago, I was so intent on what I was saying about the reasons for not misusing the name Belknap for the early Beltofts at Sawbridgeworth that I omitted other points I had meant to cover.

- -- Reimbursement for your postage expense. I always insisten this, else I'd not feel free to make outrageous requests for bulky material. So, sheek enclosed. Please don't refuse to accept it.
- -- Zebina Belknap's will. Yes, please send me a copy if you can. Documentary material is precious. The will may solve some debatable points.
- -- Bissell Belknap. Yes, you did send me a sheet for him, in March.

My main reason for this present note, however, is that when a genealogist is lucky enough to encounter a careful and competent fellow worker who supplies real help, he naturally asks brashly for still more help.

So I'm enclosing two files that I hope you'll examine -- and improve.

I hope this material will be of interest to you. I'm also hoping that you can help make it more nearly correct. Plans

FS: It occurs to me that this might be a good time to try to answer a question that some people have asked: "If I don't call the early Beltofts Belknaps, how do I make the line of descent understandable to people who don't know the story?"

For someone like me, who is trying to combine genealogy and personal histories, there's no problem, for the change is aurname is an epsential part of the record. But for anyone who is concentrating wholly on genealogy -- as on record forms -it seems to me that the problem can and should be handled by inserting an explanation on or accompanying the sheet for Abraham's father Bennet, covering such points as these:

- -- All of Bennet's known aggestors at Sawbridgeworth used only the surname Heltoft.
- -- Bennet himself was paptized Beltoft, married as Beltoft, and signed his will as Beltoft.
- -- But once, in 1599/1600, 24 years before his death, he swore on oath in count that he was Benedict Belknappe, in order to inherit the property willed to him by his prospenous brother Josias, who called himself Josias Belknappe. This is why he is now Bennet Beltoft alias Belknap."

- -- Benut and his family continued to use the Beltoft surname until his death.
- -- But when he died, his wife and children buried him as Bannet Belknap -- and adopted the surname Helknap. None of them, and none of their descendants, ever used the name Beltoft again, after that burial.
- -- No proven explanation for this sudden and dramatic change has yet been found.
- -- Consequently, no proof has been found for any connection with the Belknap family founded in the 14th century by Sir Robert Belknap (Bealknap), Chief Justice of the Court of Common Pleasein the reigns of Edward III and Richard II. The proven male line in that family died out in 1421.

In a letter June 30 1971, you said something I should have answered then, but it escaped me till today.

"The family of Levi Belknap, Franklin's father, the marriages of the father and son Levi are mixed up. . . I'm hoping . . . our New England research will clear some of these questions."

For possible aid, I'm enclosing copies of HWB's final version of his record on these Levis. Same as yours, except for being a little more detailed and for giving family name of second Levi's first wife as Lamson, not Samson.

Is I compared them with yours, I underlined in red the differences I noted.

On the first Levi, you'll notice that HWB found two names for mother of Charlotte Boyden, and indicated no opinion on them.

On sheet for second Levi, he found VR not agreeing with information obtained before he consulted the VR -- notably a child Frank with same birthdate as that for child Ray. As he has detailed continuation for FRay, I think he felt the VR had the name wrong. In his records, when he shows a VR date beside a date obtained from other sources instead of crossing out the other date, he seems to have meant he didn't believe the VR. I've had the same problem.

Do you now have any changes I ought to make on these records?

The only statement I have found, on the parentage of Jesse Belnap of North East, came to me from Miss Della A. Belnap, secretary of the Belnap Family Organization, in Utah, which has many of his descendants in its membership. I enclose a copy of the sheet she sent to me. Perhaps you will wish to write to her, as she can give you the evidence behind this attribution of parentage. Her address is:

I am passing your letter and attached sheets along to her, after making a copy for my files.

as you and she will note, there are many differences in the two records; so I'll be much interested in the outsome of the comparison. For what it may be worth, I think it likely that each record has points at which it is better than the other one.

One problem on this Jesse Belnap is that of tracing his movement through New York State. I have sure locations at only three places: (1) Canojaharie in Montgomery Co. in 1790 Census; (2) Rome in Oneida Co. in 1800 Census; (3) Locke in southern Cayuga Co. after 1800 or a bit later. So I question some of the birthplaces shown in Della's sheet, which makes him do some backtracking that seems unlikely.

As to residence at Locke, in Cayaga Co., I enclose a record of land transactions that I received a short time ago. Item X is this Jesse. Item XI is doubtless his son David. (The Jesse Belknap shown in Rem XIII is another man, in a different branch of the family). The dates shown are the dates of recording, not the dates of the transactions -- which can be obtained only by examining the deeds.



1. THOMAS WOOD, SR., The first of the line, was born in England and called himself "UD years old" in 1675, (Essex Court Files 23127-9). It is probable he was such older than this. He was bur, sep 12. 1687 and in his will he wes listed "es of Rowley, (Mass.)"(Suffolk Probate 10:168). He was a brother of Obstian wood of Ipswich, Face. Josiah Wood of Charlestown, Mass,; Wlimbeth, wife of Solomon Phipps; and Ruth, wife of Phinesa Upham of Malden, Mass. Their parents may have been Edward and Ruth Wood of Charlestown, Mess. (Mousell)
He married ANN HUNT. She died Dec 29.1714. (She was either Ann Hunt or Ann Todd, She had sisters, Many Grant and Susan Todd.)

By Deed, he was conveyed four scres of land lying between the street (later Main St.) and Humphrey Bradstreet's Parm. (This is in great detail in original "Rases Deads, 2 Ipswich 134, 135, 66). He exchanged this land with John Pickard, Guardian of Nehemiah Jewett, for the former Jewett Manaion.

Wood was sooused before the Rowley Church, Aug 28, 1667 of haveing the deed of his land so made as to include about 60 rods of Meadew belonging to Nev. Samuel Phillips, minister of Rowley, and of pulling down the fence, thereby wronging Mr. Phillips. The matter was rettled by Mr. Phillips having his meadow restored and Bro. Wood confirming his sin. (Church Rec.)

In the Diary of Hon. Samuel Sewell (Vol 1, pg 10) is the following: "1675 July 31, at midnight, Thomas Wood, Corpenter, of Sewley, had his house and goods burnt, and Voe Malum, a daughter about 10 years of age who directed her brother so that he got out, was harself consumed to ashes."

Guernsey 6716 North Keota Street Chicago, Illinois Dear Mrs. Card and Mr. Guernsey: Some time ago, Mr. Guernsey loaned me his copy of "The Garnsey-Auernsey Genealogy" by reason of the fact that on page 362, it records that Elizabeth Garnsey, 1785-1843, daughter of Philo, married a David Belknap, no other date being given for him. I happen to have some information about David and Elizabeth from two different sources which might be of interest to you. One source is some research with respect to Jesse Belknap, 1760-1854 (the father of David). which was compiled by Henry Wyckoff Belknap, a professional genealogical researcher, with the Ethnica Institute at Salem, Massachusetts. After my father's death, we found a copy of a manuscript he had prepared in my father's papers, which identifies David's wife as Betsey, with the same dates of birth and death as in your genealogy and which gives December 3, 1800, which was when Betsey was 15-1/2 years old, as the date of marriage. That manuscript also shows that between 1802 and 1832, Betsey became the mother of 14 children, the dates of birth and death being given for a great many of them. My other source is research conducted by Rush Maxwell Blodget, 1881-1913, of Los Angeles, California, who was a great-grandson of Philo Gurnsy Belnap, 1805-1842, Philo being the third child and first son of David and Betsey. Philo was a river rafter, and one of Rush Maxwell Blodget's sons gave me, so that I might give it in turn to Nuel, III, now ten years old, a bistory of the United States printed in 1828 on the fly-leaf of which Philo Gurnsy had written his name; in addition, he gave me the original of a letter written by Philo back to his wife, Elizabeth (Mead) Belnap, just a few months before Philo died from illness contracted while running a raft of lumber down the Ohio. Inasmuch as Mr. Gurnsy lives next door to the Gohdy's and Joan (Gohdy) Belnap is the mother of Nuel, III, I think I am entitled to

I should say to Mr. Guernsey that I am really still doing some reading in the Garnsey-Guernsey genealogy, particularly with reference to those included therein who lived in the 1600's and 1700's. It is a tremendous work, and you both are to be highly complimented. I shall see to it that Mr. Guernsey's copy is returned to him this Fall. I would like to inquire the source from which you obtained the name of David Belknap as the husband of Elizabeth Garnsey and whether that source showed any further information about David. Attached sheet, which you sent recently: (1) Search of early Feet of Fine should look for Beltoft, not Belknap. Object is to determine when the first Beltoft appeared at Sawbridgeworth. If the Beltofts at Sawbridgeworth were descendants (probably illegitimate) of the Judge, they would appear at Sawbridgeworth sometime in first half of 15th Century (1400-1450), I think. If they appeared much before then, any relationship to the Judge would be very doubtful. . . Third paragraph your memo Feb 21 indicates no Beltoft there in 1377, when the Judge was only about 30 to 35 yrs old.

- (2) Can you give me the parentage of Thomas? Not named in any documents in my files.
- (3) Which Joan is meant? The daughter of the Judge or the granddaughter who was lady in waiting to Katherine, wife of Henry V (and White parentage is unknown, as far as I have yet found)?

There are many spellings of the Belknap name. When I speak of Belknaps I don't have time to write all the spellings checked. Cur researcher searches under all the spellings. If he sends us any information the names are spelt just as they are found. He is now going through the "Feet of Fines" to 1460. The object always has been to try and determine where the Belknap's went and if they when to Sawbridgeworth, Herts, Eng.

If we cann not connect our line to the Sir Robert Bealknap or Belknap, they should do more research to try and find where we came from. It's difficult to do research in England if you are connected with the "royality". So we are limited there if we cannot prove we are related. If we could check into that family more

I think we could find our family line.

Those in charge of the research here believe it is better to trace the family line back. Some times when that can't be done it is better to get the earliest name and work down the line.

I will write Frank Smith of the Salt Lake Gen. Soc. and see if he has done or could get some one at that Library to check the Early English records. I do know there is very little information on Herts. Some districts will let the Genealogical copy more than others. The Library use to have public researchers. Now they say they need them for the Library. However there are private researchers but do not know them by name. Think I could find out.

Dr. W. Dean Belnap will be home from London about July. He said he has gathered much information on the Belknaps, didn't have time to do much with it now as his job takes too much of his time. He will go over it when he gets home. Do hope he

Dear Nuel:

My great thanks for the Sawbridgeworth history, which arrived most unexpectedly yesterday. I've been digging into it with high interest. Perhaps you'll be interested in some hasty comments based on my long immersement in the published records of our Sawbridgeworth ancestors.

The booklet contains names long familiar to me -- families connected in one way or another with the prolonged lawsuits by which the chief Beltoft properties passed out of the family, in the middle 1500's. To speak of them, I should urge you to read H W Belknap's long report in NEHG Register, low, just as carefully as you seem to have read his 1914 piece.

When the first Richard Beltoft died (1501 to 1510) he left to his son John Beltoft a property called Nidelles (Nydellys) containing 30 acres. The size of this property was most unusual for a mere farmer at that time -- so large that it could hardly have been acquired in one generation unless "outside money" had been provided by someone who financed a purchase from a lord of a manor -- most likely a Leventhorpe So it has interested me to find the locations of the Chauncy's or a Chauncy. and Leventhorpe's -- at Mathams and Shingle Hall for the Chauncy's -- at Pishiobury In the long records of the lawsuit over Nidelles, these for the Leventhorpe's. names appear: Robert Chauncy, Henry Chauncy, Thomas Leventhorpe (Lentroope), and Edward Leventhorppe. What the records of the lawsuit indicate plainly is that John Beltoft was on good personal terms with both the Chauncy's and the Leventhorpe's of And I think it's a good guess that Nidelles may have been his day (circa 1540). located somewhere near both Shingle Hall and Pishiobury -- maybe midway between those two manors.

Now comes the entirely hypothetical "if." If there is any blood relationship between these Beltofts and the old Belknap family founded by Sir Robert de Bealknap, it is likely that the first mancknown as a Beltoft (an easy alias for Belknap) appeared in Sawbridgeworth not later than 1425 and possibly a year or so before 1400 in which case the John Leventhorpe whose brass decorates the front cover of the booklet was the person from whom Nidelles or the beginning of Nidelles was purchased.

I have thought for a long time that the feet of fines, around 1400 to 1425, should be searched in hope of finding a record indicating when Richard Beltoft's forebear using that name arrived in Sawbridgeworth.

At any rate, I've thought it worth while to tell you why I find the booklet fascinating.

Dear Mr Belnap:

It was kind of you to send me the map of Sawbridgeworth and your meme and the note from Della. I'm deeply grateful, as I hope you knew I'd be.

I can't let you send this to me at your own expense. Please tell me the cost of the map so that I can reimburse you. There's a good reason for this stipulation. the scores and scores of Belknaps who are helping me in my work, there are at least several who would eagerly ask for one, if you'll give me permission to tell them about it. But of course I couldn't do it unless they paid the cost.

In reading Della's memo, I see she has a lot that's wrong about me. I suppose I'd better try to straighten it out for your information. First of all, though I can readily omit the k in Belknap, I'm a bit pedantic about the fact that there are two 11's in Carroll, lest I be called Miss Belknap as I am much too often. And, for the record, I'm a great great grandson of Jonas Newton Belknap, whose uncle Jesse -- Della says -- was the father of your ancestor Jesse. . . I don't live near Hartford, but in one of the separately-named sections of Greenwich, 25 miles from New York, where I had my office for many years. . . . But Della, bless her, is right about the fact I hope to put it all into a book, a genealogy of something like 4500 Belknaps and Belnaps.

She's also right about the English line of descent of Abraham. I think you must have drawn your information from what Henry Wyckoff Belknap published in the New England Historic Geneslogical Register in 1914. In 1931 he published a long piece in the Register, based on newly obtained information -- revising the line of descent; supplying the given name (Richard) of the first Beltoft, and the name of his wife (Christian -----); showing that the next in line was Laurance, not Henry (who was probably a brother of the first Hichard); deleting the erroneous "alias Belknap" for the second Richard; but failing to delete, as he should have, the name "Elizabeth" as the supposed wife of this second Richard.

The facts of record are that deletion of "alias Belknap" because it has misled many people. The facts of record are that none of the earlier Beltofts at Sawbridgeworth ever west "also known" as Belknap -- not the first Ricard, or the Henry, or that Richard's brother John; nor Laurence, nor the second Richard. In all the known records, including the voluminous court proceedings in a number of suits, they were always called Beltoft. The first to call himself "Belknappe" was Josias, who forced his brother to say -- once -- that his name was "Belknappe." After Bennet's death, all Bennet's children chaged to Belknap and never again used Beltoft.

So, for Bennet's children, including our Abraham, I think that the wording "alias Beltoft" is inacarate and misleading, for they weren't known by both names, once the change of name had been made. I'm using the term "ex-Beltoft" instead -following the practice used when a ship's name is changed and its old name becomes To my mind, this ismuch more accurate. merely a matter of past history.

Dear Sylvia:

Your letter June ! raises a number of questions that I should try to answer. I'll try to be mercifully brief.

- (1) Marriage of Elizabeth Belkmap and William Ferrers (not "Ferreis). Yes, this Elizabeth was daughter of Sir Hamon Belkmap and did marry Lord Ferrers -- the 5th Lord Ferrers of Chartley, not the 6th, according to the present editor of Debrett's Peerage, with whom I've had some correspondence. I don't knowwhat is meant by "ca 1400" in the passage you copied. Sir Hamon was born 1890 and died 1429. Presumably this Elizabeth was born about 1410 to 1415; but I have no dates for her?. She and this Lord Ferrers were ancestors of Robert Devereaux, Earl of Essex -- favorite ME of Queen Elizabeth.
- (2) Your comment about "Beltoft" deserves an answer, for there has been much confusion on this point by people who have seen only part of the record -- and some of this confusion has led to fantastic INEXELLEMENTALE inventions which almost amount to forgery. So here goes:
- (A) In the Middle Ages, beginning immediately after the Norman Conquest, there was a Beltoft or de Beltoft family in Lincolnshire. The last males of this name died in the middle of the 14th century. No connection linking this family to the Belknap name or to the re-emergence of the Beltoft in the 16th century has been found.
- (B) The first known Belknap family appeared in the 14th century. Rebert Bealknap or de Bealknap (as the name was then spelled -- and probably was pronounced something like "Bayl - ka - nomp" or "Bayl-ka-noppeh" as there was sometimes a final "e) was 1335 probably born about 1366/as he was a page at court along with Chaucer. His father is assumed to have been a lawyer of that name, who was practicing in London in 1345. Robert became a judge, then Chief Justice of the MANNIXETY Court of Common Pleas -- was knighted in 1305 to the date seemsethy -- was unjustly condemned to death by Parliament and banished to Ireland when the Queen (Good Queen Anne) and the bishops interceded on his behal. When Henry IV & usurped the crown, Robert was recalled from banishment and his wast landed properties (some 15 or 16 manors) were restored to him -- but later were reconfiscated and were not finally restored all 1425, when title was given to his grandson Hamon. By that time, the gamily of the Judge was back in favor under Henry V. Hamon was knighted and made Treasurer of Normandy and married a sister of Ralph Beteler, Lord Suddley, Treasurer of England -- and a Joan de Bealknap, pessibly his Sister, was lady in waiting to Queen Katherine. family remained in favor through the reign of Henry VIII -- when the last male in it The girls of this family, immensely rich, married well. Among their descendants were not only the Earl of Essex but also Mady Jame Grey , and Elizabeth's great prime minister the Earl of Salisbury, and Sir Brancis Bacon -- and the executors of the will of Henry VIII. And the present Queen and her mother and her children.
  - But point to bear in mind that the last male of the Judge's family died in 1521.

- -- Corrington (vi) -- probably also bern in Van Buren Co, Iowa. Birthplace shown as "Saunders Co, Nebraska," is impossible -- and came from an unverified sheet from the Salt Lake Archives.
- -- Birthplace of the last three children was not Lane Co., but Belknap Settlement (Alpine) This is certain. in Benten Co., Oregon.

Will write again when I have fuller data on birthplaces of the first six children.

For your information, I should tell you about a book that you may encounter; author is Edna A Mintenye: They Laughed. Too; published by The Naylor Company, San Antonic, Texas. It is mainly the story of the founding and history of Belkmap Settlement in Oregon, by Jesse and Jane and their children in 1847 and 1848. A good book in its

capture of the flavor of the people and their times. But I should warn you that it's a perfect example of the unrelibility of local histories, on genealogy. It's full of alleged genealogical data, gathered by hearsay, and almost all of it incorrect. One of my heavy tasks, in recent weeks, has been to try to straighten out a lot of people who have relied on it for genealogy. . . Me, I learned long age to regard with acute distrust any genealogical data said to come from a local history — only very rarely does it turn out to be correct.

Wish so much of my time didn't have to be devoted to tracing and correcting errors. I've got AI to where I trust nothing till I have seen valid evidence supporting it. So I semetimes -- alas -- irritate people like Dick Taylor by refusing to send them information until I have good reason to believe it's substantially correct.

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In connection with the sheet enclosed, I should mention that Lorenze Gilbert was known as Lorenze in NY but generally as Dow in Oregen. Much of what has been put on paper about my people in early days in Oregen has been a bit confusing to those who don't know the full names and nicknames. Example: a gal mans christened "Elizabeth Ann" will appear in some records as Elizabeth, in others as Ann — and Lewis Franklin Belknap shows up variously, as "Lewis" or "Franklin" or "Frank," depending on who is writing about him. Lets of cases like this, in my tribe.

Thanks for letter Feb 21 and enclosures. In this present mailing, I'm enclosing separate menos for various unrelated subjects, for your convenience.

HUNT genealogy -- Will pass the sheets along to the person who needs them.

ROBERT JONES -- sheets most welcome, as they enable me to correct an error on death of mother of Sarah. Date commonly given (25 Sept 1712) appears to be date for second wife. QUERY: Are you sure of spełling of last name of first wife -- "Soane" ? I haven't encountered that name anywhere, before now. Coulde it have been "Sloane" ?

My two big problems on Samuel son of Abraham:

- (1) Place of birth of his first children, before he moved to Salem? Where did he live immediately after marriage? At Easthampton, Long Island, NY?
- (2) Identity of the daughter Sarah who married Nathaniel Singleterry (Haverhill VR)? Unquestionably Samuel's daughter but have found no record of her birth. Was she the daughter commonly shown as Mary (second daughter of that name) for whom I find no record of marriage or death?

Can you help on these questions?

Aside from these problems on that Samuel, I now have the early generations in my line (and yours) in reasonably good shape -- good enough to publish. Presently I"ll start writing an account of my branch of the family, for my children and grandchildren.

It's always good to hear from you. And there's much to answer in your letter May 17. So here goes.

JEREMY -- the Rev Jeremy Belknap, D.D. (always with the "DD" to distinguish him from most other ministers, who were just "raised up" by their congregations) was a fascinating character -- and a fine historian, whose books are still worth reading -- and the only Ameriban Belknap to be famous enough to be in all the encyclopedias.

MRS MANSFIELD -- I heard from her and from her names of Mrs Hamric, but neither of them has answered my later letters asking for evidence of birth and parentage of the Thomas Belknap who fought in Rev War. My next step, when I find time, will be to try to find a living member of the Newburgh family of Belknap's who can help with the problem of who was the father of that Thomas? -- and was he a legitimate sen, or illegitimate? All I know, thus far, is that the father they name was never married. And I can't find any other Newburgh Belknap who could have been his father.

...Meanwhile, thanks for sending me additional information on this W Va family. I have a full file on it. When and if I get the central puzzle solved, I"ll put the whole record together and send a copy to you. . . Haven't really tried to track this down -- but it looks like one of those instances in which one record shows a widow by her was she widow of a Gibbs or a Witt? I don't yet know.

WIFE OF ORIN Belknap, sen of Jenas Newton Belknap -- serry my wording isn't clear. She was widow of a Lyman; maiden name Carpenter.

JESSE & JANE, Child 6 -- my grandfather, Cerrington Gavett Belknap. Both of his given names have often been misspelled. Corrington -- with an 0 -- was name also given to some children of his aunts and uncles. I've found other similar errors in work by Franklin Belknap, as copied by others. . Do I understand you to say that you have a set of his 158 page record and can mm have a kerox copy made for me? If so, I'll be delighted to pay the cost -- or perhaps it would be easier for you just to lend it to me for the one day needed for making a copy here in my study.

HWB NOTES seem best place for me to start. . . Names of children he shows born at Williamstewn seem to come from that town's VR, and are probably OK. I think — and so are dates including ones shown only as year-date, But note he shows two sets of dates for John Q A — the ones on same line as "williamstown" being inserted later, with ?? Upper date for barth, 31 Oct 15, almost agrees with date shown by C E Belknap sheet, 31 Oct 1836, but differs 5 yrs from date shown in the local history, 31 Oct 1831. CEB is only source I have for date of birth of EXMX George Washington.

Third page of HWB notes suggests three other HII children from gravestones (probably at Williamstowh?). As local history says Joseph and Abigail had 14 children, it is likely that HWB's suggestion is correct. Working out their birth years from ages at death, I get:

P. Mary -- b 1816 -- looks OK, 1 yr after marriage, 2 yrs before Jeseph b 1818. Lucy -- before 25 Nov. 1825 as in 12th year at death. Conflicts with 1825 1825 for Zelah (should be spelled Zela, as abbreviation for Barzeta, this tened name of Abigail's brother for whom this child was named). This conflict may mean 1835 is wrong guess for Zelah, derived from age 41 shown on death -- unless Zelah born in early January 1825, but could be shown as aged 41 if born in late 1824, which is more likely.

Oliver -- I have nothing beyond what HWB shows, "living in Providence 1841 to ISEE 1866."
The "1841" implies born not later that 1820 or a year or so earlied, which places him between FIXENEXIES (a) P. Mary and Joseph, or (b) Joseph and Zelah. Good guess is: "ca. 1820."

Hubbard -- I have no information.

HWB left continuations for names with \* -- but I haven't yet checked quy of them against other sources.

SUGGESTION: Check Barre VR for dates on P. Mary, Oliver, Zela(h), Joseph-Check Berlin VR for dates on George, Hubbard, Clarissa. (I doubt CEB birthplace for George -- Williamstown)

Fillis Clayton Belknap, the enterprising and successful editor of the Bellows Falls Times, was born in the town of Berlin, Fermont, April 7, 1866.

Joseph Belknap, grandfather of Fillis C. Belknap, was a prominent resident of Berlin, Vermont, where for a number of years he was engaged in the occupation of farming. He married Hiss Abiyail House, nieve of Captain Tarael House, one of the wealthy land owners of the town of Berlin and who erected the first brick residence there, which structure is still standing (1903). Hr. & Mrs. Joseph Belknap became the parents of 14 children. Hr. Belknap died July 25, 1840, his wife, March 5, 1860. Their remains are interred in the old East Street burying grounds.

John Quincy Adams Belknap, father of Willis C. Belknap was born in Williamstown, Orange County, Vermont, Oct. 31, 1831.

He acquired his education in the village school and subsequently was engaged in cultivation of the soil. He was one of the representative men of the town and took an active part in all matters that pertained to its welfare and advancement. He was a faithful and sealous member of the Methodist Episcopal Church of Berlin. He married Miss Susan A Richardson, daughter of Lysander Richardson, and two sons and three daughters were born to them: Willis Clayton Belknap; Della May, wife of F. H. Nichols, a prosperous farmer of Barre, Vermont; Ida N., wife of Jason E. Martin, a successful farmer of Williamstown, Yt. and they have two children, Gladys and Marian; Charles B. Belknap a farmer of Berlin, Vt. and Bessie M.; wife of Dean K. Lillie, a stone-cutter of Montpelier, Yt.

Ur. John Q. A. Belknap died Oct. 5, 1897 at the age of 63 and his wife passed away July 17, 1883 at the age of 48 years.

Mr. Belknap is one of the board of directors of the Bellows Falls Trust Co.

On April 6, 1898, Hr. Bellmap was united in marriage to Miss Lette May Carpenter, Daughter of Ward B. Carpenter, of Bellows Falls, Vermont. Two children have been born to them: Paul Carpenter Belknap, born Feb. 8, 1899, and Caroline May Belknap born April 7, 1902.

# Comments on "THE NAME AND FAMILY OF BELKNAP OR BELMAP" Compiled by redia Research Bureau

Like all other commercial attempts at pseudo-genealogy, this widely circulated compilation is based on uncritical acceptance of whatever its author happened to find in print. So it is a mixture of truth, error, and fantasy -- with both major and minor inaccuracies, most of which are dealt with in the following comments. The numbering of the comments corresponds to numbers in the margins of the attached copy of the compilation. Philology

- (1) This attempt to explain the "meaning" of the family name is a characteristic example of the guesswork darkwark prevalent in America from Noah Webster on through the rest of the 19th century. Its source was a piece by Codman in New England Historical and Jenealogical Register, 1895 -- about the last time that the Register published this sort of nonsense, about derivation of surnames.
- (2) This second sample of imaginative derivation is still more ridiculous, but unfortunately is often repeated by those who accept such guesswork unsupported by evidence. The many offner guesses are equally without authority.

- (5) The accepted spelling of name of Juliana's father is Darset. "Dorset" was an early error.
- (6) Hamon was Robert's grandson, not his son. This has been a common error, till corrected by the present editor of Debrett's in 1952. The known children of Sir Robert were John, father of Sir Hamon, and Joan -- widow of Sir Ralph Stonor and then wife of Bumund Hampden, by whom she was ancestress of William Shakespeare (through the Arden connection in Warwickshire).
- (?) Sir Edward, brother of Anne, Elizabethm Margaret, and other sisters, died without heirs leaving no "son Edward who resided in warwickshire." He was the male of the family founded by Sir Robert. With his death in 1521 the name Belknap vanished from England until it was revived in 1599/1600 by the Josias Beltoft who charged his name to Belknap.
- (8) The "Robertus or kobert Bealknap of 1369" was precisely -- not"probably" -- the Sir Robert named above. On this point, the compiler was merely careless or inexcusably ignorant. . . The Joan Bealknap who was maid of honor to the Queen of Henry V was plainly of the same generation as Sir Hamon, but it is not known that she was his sister; might have been daughter of an unknown brother of Sir Hamon. . Philip Belknap, mayor of Canterbury, was an uncle of THE DIME Sir Edward (#7, above). . . Symon Belknap is known from old records but his parentage has not been found.
- (9) "According to historians" is pure fiction. The only source for the facts about the English ancestors of the American Belknaps was Henry Wyckoffg Belknap.

derived from the residence of its first bearers at a place of that name in England and to have been taken from the words beal, meaning "a passage between hills", and knap, meaning "a low hill or knoll". It is also possible that the first part of the name was derived from the French belle, meaning "beautiful", but the former theory is the more probable. The name is found in ancient English and early American records in the variant spellings of Bealknap, Bealeknappe, Bealenap, Bealeknappe, Belknappe, Bealenap, Bealenap, Bealenap, of which the form last mentioned is that most generally in use in America today, although the form immediately preceding it also is still occasionally to be found.

Families of this name were resident at early dates in the English Counties of Kent, Warwick, Hartford, Sussex, and London, and were, for the most part, of the landed gentry and nobility of Great Britain.

One of the earliest known lines of the family in England was that of Sir Robert Belkmap of County Kent, before the year 1377, who was attainted about eleven years later and benished to Ireland, By his wife, Juliana, daughter of John Dorset or Darset,

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he had at least one son, named Hamon Belknap, to whom the lands in England were restored. This last mentioned Sir Hamon Belknap was the father by his wife, Joan, daughter of Thomas Boteler, of three sons, John, William, and Hamry, each of whom inherited in turn the lands in County Kent, but the first two died without issue. Henry Belknap, the youngest of the three brothers, made his home in County Sussex and was the father there by his wife, Margaret, daughter of Richard Knowls or Knolles, of five daughters, Ann, Elizabeth, Mary, Griselda, and Alice, and of one son, Sir Edward, who was the father by his wife, Alice (surname unknown) of at least one son, also named Edward, who resided in Warwickshire.

Other early records of the family in England mention Robertus or Robert Bealknap of 1359, who was possibly the same as the abovementioned Sir Robert Belknap; Johane or Joan Bealknap, who was maid of honor to the Queen in 1422; Philip Belknap, Mayor of Canterbury, who died in 1457; and Symon Belknap of Kent and Essex Counties about the same time.

According to historians, the American Belkmap or Belmap family traces its descent from one Beltoft, sliss Belkmap (Christian name unknown), who was the father, in Hertfordshire in the latter fifteenth or early sixteenth century, of three cons, John, Edmond, and Henry.

Of these, Henry had issue by his wife, Elizabeth, of Richard and Alice, of whom the first had issue by his wife, Lizabeth, of Bennet or Bennett, Alice, and Josias. Of those, Bennet or Bennett was warried

in 1586 to Grace Adam or Adams and had issue by her of Abraham,
Frances, John, Daniel and Josias, of whom the first emigrated to
America probably about 1635 (or certainly before 1637) and became
the ancestor of most, and probably all, of the families of the name

in America.

The immigrant Abraham Selkmap or Belmap settled first at Lynn, Mass., and removed soon afterward to Saless, in the same colony. By his wife, Mary, whom he married in England about 1620, he left at least five children, Abraham, Samuel, Joseph, John or Jeremy, and Hannah. No record of the descendants of Jeremy has been found.

Abraham, probably the eldest son of the immigrant Abraham, came with his parents to America. It has been related that he took the oath of allegiance at Haverhill in 1677, but very little class is known of him although he may have been the nucestor of one Abraham Belknap who died at Johnston, R.I., in 1820 at the age of ninety-two years.

Samuel, son of the immigrant Abraham, came over with his parents and was married before 1653 to Sarah, danahter of Robert Jones of Hingham, Mass. He made his home first at Salem and later at Haverhill and may also have owned land at Hasthampton, L.I. The children of Samuel by his wife, Sarah, were Mary (died in infancy), another Mary, Abraham, Samuel, Joseph, Patience, and probably Ebenezer.

Abraham, eldest son of Samuel, of Salem and Haverhill, was married in 1691 to Elizabeth Ayer, by whom he had issue of Mary, Hanneh, Samuel (died young), Abraham, another Samuel, Elizabeth, Jeremiah, Nathaniel, Jedidiah, Thankful, and Experience, all but the first three of whom were born at Framingham, Mass., where this branch of the family settled and flourished.

Joseph, son of the immigrant Abraham, made his home at Boston, Mass., and was first married there about 1657 to Ruth, daughter of Nathamiel Williams. By this first marriage he left issue of Joseph, Mary, Nathamiel, and Elizabeth. Before 1668 he married, as his second wife, Lydia, daughter of Francis Ingalis, by whom he had only one child, a daughter who died young; and sometime before 1670 he took a third wife, Hannah, daughter of Thomas Maskine, and had further issue by her of Thomas, John, Hannah, Ruth, Abigail, and Abraham.

Joseph, eldest son of the first Joseph of Boston, was the father by his first wife, Deborah, daughter of Jeremiah Fitch, whom he married before 1684, of Mary (died young), Joseph, and Jeremy or Jeremiah. In 1690, he married again. His second wife was Abigail, daughter of Thomas Burtolph, by whom he had issue of Thomas, Abigail, Mary, Nicholas, Buttolph, Rathaniel, Ruth, Elizabeth, Lydia, and Ahraham.

Thomas, son of the first Joseph of Boston, was married about 1694 to Jane, (who was probably a daughter of Thomas Cheney of Roxbury and Cambridge, Hass.,) and, at Woburn, Mass., became the father of Thomas, Jane, Benjamin, Hannah, Samuel, Joseph, and at



least one other daughter who died young. Of these, the sens Thomas, Benjamin, Samuel, and Joseph settled at Newburgh, N.Y., in the first half of the eighteenth century and founded the New York line of the family.

The descendants of these and other branches of the family in America have removed to practically every part of the Union and have aided as much in the advancement of the nation as their ancestors did in its founding. On the whole, the record of the Balknaps and Belnaps in the United States is that of a courageous, strong-willed, pious, patriotic, and resourceful race. Representatives of the family have won distinction in the service of their country.

Among those of the name who fought in the War of the Revolution were Sergeant Joseph, of Massachusetts; Ensign William, of New York; Lieutenant Czakiel, of New Rampshire; Lieutenant Jacob, of Rhode Island, Captain John, of New York; Captain Ebenezer, of Massachusetts; Captain Sergual, of Massachusetts; and numerous others from the various New England States.

Robert, Thomas, John, Henry, Edward, Josias, Abraham, Samuel, Joseph, Nathaniel, Benjamin, Ebenezer and William are some of the Christian names favored by the family for its make progeny.

A few of the manners of the family who have distinguished themselves in America at various times are:

Jeremy Balkmap (1744-1798), of Massachusetts, Congregational clergyman.

William Worth Balknap (1829+1890), of New York and Washington, P.C., military officer and son of General W. G. Belknap.

George Eugeno Belknap (1832-1903) of New Hampshire, navel officer.

Reginald Rowan Belknap (b. 1871), of Massachusatts, naval officer.

William Burke Belknap (b. 1885), of Kentucky, member of the Kentucky House of Representatives and educator.

The coat of arms of the English family of Balknappe or Balknap is described in heraldic terms as follows (Burke, General Armory, 1884):

Arms. - 'Azure, three eagles in bend between two cottises argent."

W. Belknap gave the death of Josias Belknap of Sawbridgeworth, Herts., as occurring "betw. 28 Jan. 1599/1600 and 6 Feb. following" -- these being the date of his will and the date of probate. A note in Mr. Belknap's handwriting, in his papers, shows that in 1930 he received from his English record searcher, C. A. Bernau, a transcript of the record of the burial of Josias: "Register of St. Saviour's, Southwark. 4th February 1599/00 Josias Belknap, a man being a stranger and no parishioner." I enclose a facsimile of the page on which he made this pencilled entry. Although the writing is not reproduced clearly, it is readily intelligible to anyone familiar with his handwriting, as I am. Through the courtesy of Essex Institute I have been privileged to make copies of many hundreds of pages of noteland correspondence left by Mr. Belknap, one-time curator of the Institute. Although I have not found the letter from Bernau, containing this bit of information, I believe it proper to accept the authenticity mg of the pencilled entry. Both Bernau and H. W. Belknap were scrupulous technicians of complete integrity. A small point, as I said. But this Josias is of great interest to everyone who is interested in Belknap genealogy. Till now, all that has been known about him is the record of his baptism as a Beltoft and his will signed as a Belknap (Belknappe). As he was the key figure in the family's change of surname, every scrap of information about him is interesting -- for the several mysteries in his will have yet to be solved. In this case, the fact that he apparently died in Southwark will probably prove to be significant, for this has not been known as the explanation of his bequest of 20 shillings "to the Poore where I shalbe buried." (Register, 1914, p. 92) Containing As was his custom after he had ceased typing up his notes (from 1926 on) Mr. Belknap entered his pencilled note on a sheet sassass earlier information from the same source. ## SOME PEOPLE WHO ARE INTERESTED IN BELKNAF GENEALOGY

On this sheet, I'm about to do something without first asking permission. I hope none of those whom I name will object; perhaps may approve, and find it helpful in their own pursuit of information. But I should admit that my motives are selfash. I hope that those who receive this list will send me the names and addresses of others whom I've not yet met, for -- as you'll probably observe -- my list is overweighted by descendants of Abraham's older son Damuel, with too few descendants of the younger son Joseph. . . . Meanwhile, the list may help some of you get in touch with each other, beyond your present contacts. My own experience has been that priceless aid often comes from people who have run across data on other people's ancestors, in addition to their own.

I could make this list longer, but that's enough for the mement, for it illustrates one major weakness in my work -- my lack of enough good contact with eastern members of the family.

I hope you'll help by sending more names of people to whom I should write.

In pursuing the record of my gg father Jesse Belknap in War of 1812, I have come across evidence that may lead you to make some changes in your records for the Jesse Jr who was son of Jesse and Eunice Hall. I'm enclosing the papers on this subject and will comment on them. But first let me summarize the genealogical facts that they disclose. (Compare with your ## 58 and 99.)

- -- The maiden name of the wife of Jesse Jr was not Sarah Camp but Sarah De Camp.
- -- On 20 July 53 she gave her age as 64. So born presumably in 1789.

  But 27 May 1851 she gave her age as 66; which would make her born 1785.
- -- In 1851 she said she married Jesse Jr in Dec 1802.

  Dec

  But in 1853 she said the marriage was 1 (EXXIX1806, at Genoa, NY (near Locke)
- -- In 1851 she said Jesse Jr died 1 July 1849, at North East Pa. And a J. L. De Camp, probably her brother, gave that same date. In 1853, she and others gave this date again.
- -- There is nothing in the papers to help us choose between the varying figures for her age (and birth) -- and the varying dates for her marriage. -- as both sets of figures show her as marrying at sage 17. MANMANAMAN The apparent confirmation by two persons in 1853 can't be taken too literally, as they obviously just signed an affidavit prepared by some one else.

Before discussing the papers, maybe I should warn you not to take too seriously the fact that Jesse Jr was a deserter. The record of N Y militia in 1812 was a sad one, with men much dissatisfied with their officers. Many hundreds pf men, like Jesse Jr, just got fed up and went home -- so many that no effort to punish them was ever made.

Now, the papers. They divide into three groups.

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#### MILITARY RECORD

Red A and B -- copies from payroll, obtained from NYState offices, Albany -- showing Jesse Jr paid to Nov 28 1812 but having deserted before next pay day.

Red C from National Archives, card copied from muster roll -- showing him present on Dec 20. Red D, same source, copied from payroll Dec 20 showing him paid to Nov 28 (as in Red B).

SARAH'S 1851 APPLICATION for Bounty Land under act of Sept 28, 1850. THYKKHHAX
1-a: Application in long hand, prepared by Justice of the Peace, M. Norton,
& b: signed by mark by Sarah. Shows maiden name as De Camp. Sarah then living
in Harmony, Chatauqua Co., NY

2-a & b: Affidavit signed by J. L. De Camp (note large C in signature) and accompanying certification of Norton's office -- signed by a clerk named Green, but in Norton's handwriting in body of certification.

3-a & b: Affidavit by David Belnap (brother of Jesse Jr) -- in Norton's handwriting -- and certification of the signature of the JP. (Note: This signature by David is the only instance of spelling without k, in all these documents.)

4: Note dated March 4 1852, saying the name of Jesse Belknap "does not appear on the rolls of Captain Daughterty" -- indicating Sarah; s Mick application rejected. (Note by CYB: This probably means that the person the rolls must have looked at later ones, after Jesse had been dropped from the company's roll.) Notation shows that Norton, at Harmony, was notified accordingly.

So Sarah's claim was denied in 1852. But next year, 1853, a new application was prepared by the forms printed for that purpose. Sarah was now living in Tompkins County, south of Locke. SARAH'S APPLICATION in 1853:

5-a and b: Application signed by Sarah by mark -- and affidavit signed (by marks) by Susannah Ross and Juliana Carter, of Groton (near Locke). Both documents witnessed by therebeyeard a notary public, Welthy, who filled in the forms, and by a Aaron Murphey who was named as her "agent."

6-a and b: Note by auditor (same man who couldn't find Jesse Jr on rolls he had examined in 1851), saying Jesse Jr on rolls to Dec 31st 1812 and "rep Deserted". (Rep: abbreviation for "reported" CYB)... Notation on back (6-b)shows that a notification of rejection was sent on March 6 1854.

In these later documents, written by the short Sarah's mainten name is spelled Decamp. This spelling should be disregarded, as the controlling spelling is that in the signatures of J. L. De Camp, in 1851 (1-b and 2-a).

\*\*\*\*\*\*

I think you should have these documents. So here they are.

Looking back, now, at the whole record, I find myself disagreeing with something I said earlier. I now think I see a sound reason for accepting the age (hence birthdate) and date of marriage as shown in the 1851 papers: "aged 66" in 1851, hence born 1785 -- and married 1 Dec 1802. My reason is the affidavit by David Belnap (3-a), in which he said that "in the month of Dec 1802 he was present at her wedding" and also gave 1802, twice, as the year in which he began knowing Sarah.

So, in my records, I'm going to accept the age and date shown in the 1851 papers — unless you disagree. Is this OK with you?

Thanks for your latest letter and for all the letters you have sent. I'll try to write a little of a lime to try and catch up. By this time you probably found

We might never learn in our time when the name Belknap and its various spellings were used by all the people we believe to be in our direct line. We know the name has been around a long time. I have not read there was forged entries in the "Battle of Abbey Roll. I have checked back on this in the Library in Salt Lake as I have been checking in the English records on the Richmond family. There is much information on that family. Jane Richmond married Rosel Belnap. She would be my great grand mother. I am surprised how that family parallels the Belknap story. They fortunately can trace their line, from father to son, back to Roaldus Musard De Richmond who accompanied WM the Conquer to England. It may not mean anything, but it intrigues me to learn that this family also became Wobles, Knight & etc. The record does Mention the property they held, such as the Manor of Croft.

During the cicil wars one John Richmond killed his brother Henry by mistake. One brother was in the Kings army and the other brother in the opposing army. Their father, by De Richmond, sold his manors and property to save John's life. / This was during the 1600's. about 1635 John Richmond came to America. As far as I know the Michmond and Belknap families never met until the time of Rosel Belnap and Jame Richmond. Then I do not know if that was in New York or Canada. As both families were in the same place in New York and Canada. But the property of Croft in both families. I wondered if it could be the same property. We might find our family faster by tracing the omnership of the properties they

It isn't reasonable to me that a name, such as Belknap, could exist for years then becom extinct and then start up again. Because we haven't found the name doesn't always mean that the name is not there. It's most likely we don't know where to find it. Records could be lost, or they no longer were land holders. If they didn't own property in that day, no record was kept of them. We have been lucky that most of the early Belknaps were land owners.

I checked in the Salt Lake Gen. Library on the information you sent on the "Wood" and "Hunt" lines. I need to go back and check out the orginal source records. The sheet sent in by others agree with the Wood line, but not the Hunt line. They could have made the mistake or we may have. I'm enclosing the theets I found and hope to get back to Salt Lake to check further.

I haven't gone through all the material Mr. Parker sent when he quite his rch in the New Eng. States. Most of it is references and notes on many 3. Not too sure I can understand it all. It looks like one big headache. we found the parents and family of Sarah Jones, wife of Samuel Belknap. we from Eng. We asked our researcher to see if he could find any

find any thing farther back on that line. Don't know if I sent you this family any way I'll send it now.
