I have just received from a reliable source a transcript of a D.A.R. record of marriages in Allen County, Ohio. It shows, among others, the marriage of Rachel Belknap and James M. Starr18 Oct 1838 -- the marriage being performed by James' father, John W Starr. As you do not show the date of this marriage on your sheet for John W Starr, I'm enclosing a copy of a tentative revision of my sheet for Jonas Belknap (jr), on which kachel is #iv.

"Tentative" because there is an apparent conflict between what is said in your record and what is said in mine.

My information about Rachel came in 1968 from Mrs Bertha Hansen, who diedea few years later. I had high respect for the care she took in verifying the accuracy of her statements.

She had no record of Rachel's marriage to James Starr. Her records began with the marriage of Rachel (her grandmother) to Austin Howard in Iowa (presumably Van Muren County, I think). Think). The gave in detail the records of the children of Rachel and Austin Howard, beginning with the first child, Homer, born in August 1847 -- from which I judge that this marriage occurred about 1845 or 1846.

She also gave, in detail, the story of how Rachel and Austin Howard went west from Iowa in 1849, traveling with Rachel's parents, Jonas and Polly Belknap, but separating from them, at the point, which the turn off to California left the Applegate Road.

Rachel and Austin went from there to California, while Jonas and Polly went to Benton County.

The conflict in our records comes in the last column of your sheet for John W Starr, where you have that James Starr "left wife and stepson in California. Started for Texas."

As you will see, I'm assuming that James Starr was Rachel's first husband and that he was out of the picture, by death maybe, by 1845 or 1846. record, showing Min marrying Rachel when she was only 16, your "stepson" looks and so does "California"!

I'll be grateful for your comments, for you know much more about the Starrs than I do.

What an exciting red letter day this has been for me. Todays mail had a six page letter from Kay Barrett about the Belknaps begining with Richard Beltoft. I understand it is from you that she had received this information. Your patience perseverance in this task is unbelievable.

I also am a Belknap decendant through the Jonas and Mary Ann (Garlinghouse) Belknap line. I understand you decend through their brother and sister, Jesse and Jane.

While reading an Oregon biography book I came across Rachel Garlinghouse whose husband was Abiathan Newton. Rachel "was born in the east, 1806". Abiathan Newton and their son Norris P. Newton were witnesses for Jonas Belknap and Orin Belknap's Donation Land Claims.

Also found a William Garlinghouse born in Ohio and crossed the plains to Oregon in 1862, settling in Benton county. He married Mrs. Mary Ann Coyle.

Have you ever searched the Garlinghouse line? I would be most interested in any information you may have on this name.

Dear Cousin:

I'm always delighted to meet another great-great-grandchild of Jonas Newton Belknap, the father of my great grandfather Jesse and your Jonas. Another reason for being glad to have your letter is that it prompted me to look at my file of correspondence with Kay Barrett, only to be dismayed by the fact that her last letter to me, long ago, had never been answered. I must write to her at once and bring her up to date on new information discovered in the past year, including the discovery of the name of Abraham's wife.

Yes. I can tell you something about the Carlinghouses. But, first, I must ask you to tell me the full details of your descent from Jenas and Mary Ann (Polly) - just as fully as you can, on dates of birth, marriage, death, places of residence, etc. I'll be grateful for your aid on the genealogy I'm working on. And I'll be especially happy if you can give me the dates of Mary Ann Carlinghouse's birth and death, and the date of death of her husband Jonas.

How for the Carlinghouses. I'll try to be brief.

James and John Carlinghouse and their nephew Benjamin served in the New Jersey treeps in the Revolutionary war. By 1790, James was in Luserne County, Pa., with his wife Eleanor Hunt and the first few of their children. In ARAMANIAMANIAMANIAM XXX MARKX 1796 James and John settled in the area just south of HAMANANIAMANIAMANIAM XXX Honeoye Lake (pronounced honey-by) in Ontario County, N. Y. This county, then, was the whole western half of N Y state. The Garlinghouses, there, were near neighbors of Jonas Newton Belknap and the children in these families grow up together -- and some married each other. Alian Three one of Jonas Newton Belknap married three daughters of James Carlinghouse Billiam Catherine; Jonas and Mary Ann; Jesse and Jane. And Jonas Newton Belknap the Eather married James G's som Camaliel. Please note that the later of these Carlingouse children was James -- not Elijah as claimed by some people in our branch of the Lamity Actually, there was no Elijah Carlinghouse.

For more than a third of a century, these families were just about inseparable: in Ontario County from 1796 to MINNELLIARS about 1816; in Hart and Hardin Counties, Ky, in the 1820's; in Licking County, Chio, in the 1830's -- up to the time when Elijah Belknap, Jesse Belknap, and Jonas Belknap degan to move on West, first to SW Iows and then to Benton County, Oregon. Gamaliel Belknap, husband of Esther Belknap (Jesse's sister) stayed in Licking County; he bought, Jesse's land when Jesse decided to move on.

Rachel Hewton, whom you ask about, was another Carlinghouse girl, sister of Jane. Gatherine and Mary Ann. I'm uncertain of the correct spelling of her bushand's the name, for as copied in various places it is Abiatha, Abiather, Abiathar, Abiathans but he was from Contario County, too INMEXICHME (lots of Newtons in that county in early 19th century; some related to Belkmaps INTERNATIONAL through marriages). Until I see his signature, I shan't guess how to spell his name.

I den't knew the identity of the William Garlinghouse who you say settled in Benton Co. in 1862. But if he was born in Ohio he was certainly a member of the same family. I may be able to trace him, if it's important to you. My guess: maybe a sen of James Garlinghouse, I seem to have a faint recollection of having seen, somewhere, some time, the name of his wife: Mary Ann Coyle.

John Carlinghouse and Benjamin Carlinghouse did not move west from Unterio County. The area where they and their descendants lived is still known as "the Carlinghouse Area" in the vicinity of Maples, N. Y.

The quarter-century in which Jonas Newton Belknap and his family lived in Ontario County (near Honcoye, Canandaigua, Phelps) was a great formative period in the history of our branch of the family. If you are interested, I can suggest an amazingly detailed little book that we found in 1969: Early History of the Town of Springwater, by Orsan Walbridge. A year of so ago, believe it or not, a little bookshop in a town of 300 inhabitants had a facsimile of this book reprinted — and it's a mine of information about Belknaps and Carlinghouses and Cilberts, and what it was like to settle in heavily forested land and clear it tree by tree — written by a man who was a boy in those early years. You can order it from Schnucker's Book Store, Springwater, N. Y. 14560 — price \$4 plus 25¢ postage. It solved many pussles for those of us who were trying to reconstruct the life of Jonas Newton Belknap and his wife Bether Perker.

Mrs. Starr is one of the oldest natives of the Monroe vicinity. Her memory is somewhat weak in the matter of dates, but picture of early times is convincing. She said:

"My parents came to Benton County from Illinois in 1849. My father, William Coyle, was born in Kentucky. My mother was Mary Ann Jones. They came by ox team and were eight months on the way. There was lots of cholera and many deaths. The Indians harrassed the train and tried to run off the stock, and one or two men were killed by the Indians.

"My parents settled first near Portland. Then they took a donation land claim on Long Tom Creek just to the northeast of Monroe in 1852. There I was born that same year in a log cabin with a dirt floor. There was no saw mill near Monroe then, and all nails and hardware had to be bought in Oregon City. I had no brothers or sisters and had to play with the Indian children. There were many Indians about here then, and the children were much more agreeable playmates than the white children I know. They were well behaved and obedient. When there was any sound of quarreling or of loud talking a mother would call from the door of a wigwam, and one word was enough to put an end to the disturbance. I learned to speak the Chinook jargon which the Indians used quicker and better than English.

"My first school was at a log schoolhouse in Monroe about where the grade school now stands. We had only about three months school each summer at first. There was so much high water and mud in the winter that children could not get to school. The teachers were paid \$30.00 a month and "boarded 'round". Among my teachers I remember Emily Humphrey and A. R. Butolph. We were taught

roading, writing, arithmetic, spelling, and geography. Discipline was severe; some of the teachers used to give awful whippings. There was one girl who was very unruly and was semetimes whipped.

"In 1869, when I was sixteen, I got married and my schooling stopped.

My husband was Leander Starr whose father brought him to Benton County in 1846.

His father, Samuel Starr, was the first sheriff of Benton County. We lived on a farm just north of Menroe. Our children were Ida (Mrs. Larkin), Ivan, and Bert.

Then my husband died and I have been alone for a good many years. I learned to be busy as a girl. There was so much that had to be done then and no amusements to waste our time. We worked all day and at night we knitted or sewed. Fewadays young folks have too much time for amusement. They think they have a right to do as they please and so many of them go bad.

. . . . .

"The Monroe cemetery, which is about a half-mile north of town was given by Roland and Elizabeth Hinton in 1852. The first burials were made about the same time, but not all the graves were marked. The Hintons were buried there and many others of the old-time families. . . The first storekeeper I remember in Monroe was Mr. Barnard; the first doctor was Doctor McAfee. . . The first Sunday school was organized by an Episcopal clergyman named Joe McCormick. He was Irish and was called "Holy Joe".

"I never heard of the place called Jenneyopolis. Bill Gird had a stage station on the Torritorial Road about twelve miles south of Corvallis. Here he sold whiskey to all who had the price and drank a lot himself.

. . . . .

"Starrs Point postoffice was about a mile north and back on the hill.

Then it was moved down to the road to the place now owned by a dairy company, where
the old stage station is. Later it was moved down here by the mill and after a
time the name was changed to Monroe."

Long ago you asked about William Garlinghouse, born in Chio, settled in Benton County, Oregon, 1862, married Mrs Mary Ann Coyle. . . . I told you that he was most probably a descendant of James Garlinghouse, the father of Mary Ann who married your Jonas. And I said I had a faint memory of having seen the name of Mary Ann Coyle in my files. Today Ifound her, while rummaging through old papers for something else that I did not find.

Results may interest you -- for in a roundabout way you are related to these people.

Mary Ann Coyle, nee Jones, came to Benton County with her parents in 1849, from Illinois. Married III William Coyle, born in Ky.

Their daughter, Malinda Frances Coyle ("Fanny") married Leander Starr -- som of Samuel F Starr and Talitha Cumi Belknap, who was daughter of Jesse Belknap (brother of Jonas) and Jane Garlinghouse (sister of your Mary Ann).

### SOURCE OF THE NAME OF TALITHA CUMI BELKNAP

The name of this daughter of Jesse Belknap and Jane Garlinghouse comes from the Bible -- in the story of the daughter of the ruler of the synagogue. of whom Jesus said "She is not dead, but sleepeth."

King James Version: Mark 6:41

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#### CLAUDIA:

The reason why I asked if your father knew anything about Jesse's service in the War of 1812 was that I hoped he might be able to throw some light on what I was trying to figure out -- why Jesse became a deserter. This fact in the N Y militia records that I had obtained was to my mind just out of character.

Shortly after I wrote to you, my great helper in western NY -- Gladys Grey --happened to find in an old chest at her local historic society a document that helps to tell what actually happened; a muster roll of the militia company that Jesse was in. Sheer coincidence. Gladys didn't know I was working on that problem. She just keeps an eye out for the name Belknap.

The clues in that muster roll, at once, led me to dig for still further information at Albany and in Washington. So now I can tell the whole story. And I think I should make it a matter of record somewhere outside of my own files -- for some other industrious searcher may some day stumble on the fact of desertion, but without learning what led up to it. So I'm making you my repository. Nothing confidential about it. Feel free to tell others if you wish. There's nothing actually disgraceful about it, to my mind -- and I'm a one-time infantry captain, back in WW I, and might be expected to be intolerant about desertion.

So here's the story, as I now know it.

On Sept 28, 1812. Jesse enlisted in a new militia company (infantry) that was being formed by Capt Elizur Hills, along with other men from the area of Bristol, west of Canandaigua. Bristol, you'll remember, was where Jonas and his family lived at that time.

It was a small company: one captain, one ensign, four sergeants, one corporal, a drummer and two fifers, and 19 privates. Jesse was the corporal -- an unusual appointment for an inexperienced boy of 20. Jane's cousin Ben Garlinghouse was one of the privates

The company, untrained, was marched to the town then called Manchester (now Niagara) on the Niagara River north of Buffalo. There it remained through October, without seeing action.

On October 13, the American regulars captured Queenston: Heights, across the river in Canada, and the British commanding general in Canada died in that battle. The course of the war in Canada could have changed if the success had been followed up. But the N Y militia commanding general, Van Rennsalaer, failed to send his troops in as reinforcements -- and we lost Queenston: Heights -- which ended our chance of success in Canada. It also ended General Van Rennsalaer. He was forced to resign his command.

In the ranks of the militia, the immediate response was a wave of desertion. Many hundreds of men just went home. In the troops in and around Manchester, there were 446 such desertions. Among them was Jesse.

On October 21 -- eight days after Queenston: Heights -- Jesse and EMMEMBEREMENT three of the four sergeants (including the First Sergeant) and five privates went home -- and were listed as deserters. The Ensign, David Doolittle, was sent with one private in pursuit of them. He did not get them, though he was still absent from the company when a special muster was held on Nov. 2 -- for the purpose of finding out just how bad things were in the militia forces. As I said, they were very bad. So a reorganization and consolidation was ordered and put into operation by Now 10.

When I got this far, in putting the record together. I wrote to Gladys: "If anything even faintly like this had happened in the company I commanded long ago and far away, I'd have ceased being a company commander right then. The Army judges that any officer who has this sort of thing happen is unfit to command. Men -- and most especially non-coms -- don't walk out unless they have good reason to be thoroughly disgusted with their officers."

[en masse like that]

With that notion in my mind, I dug for information about that captain and his ensign. What happened to them was precisely what should have happened. On Nov 10 both of them were given their discharges and an allowance for travel expense to their homes.

So ends the story. None of the many "deserters" was brought to trial. And I doubt that any of them felt any guilt.

Certainly Jesse never made any effort to conceal the fact that he had been in the service in that war. It was known to at least some of his grandchildren, who mentioned it when supplying genealogical information back in the early 1900's.

Technically, of course, there's no excuse for desertion. But in this case it's pretty obvious that the guilty man was Captain Elizur Hills -- and probably General Van Rennsalaer, too.

I should tell you what I'm trying to do about one point, for you may be able to help or to suggest things I should do.

For a time, I've been trying to get proof that Jonas's daughter Cynthia married Isaac Newton. As you know, I have accepted Evans' statement on this -- partly because it seems to be based on documentary evidence but also because there is circumstantial evidence supporting it. (E.g.: (1) 1820 census figures, Hart Co., KY, subgest Isaac and Cynthia living with Jonas; (2) Isaac was consulpf land in Licking County, Thio, in partnership with Cynthia's brother Orin; (3) Orin named one of his sons Isaac Newton Belkmap; (4) another son of Orin gave this same name to one of his sons. All very suggestibe -- but not real proof.)

To date, my effort to find proof has not been successful. All I have learned is that when Isaac sold land in Licking County in 1837 and 1838, his wife's name was Rebecca -- which suggests that Cynthia died before 1837. (From Waije -- Walbridge 56)-we know that she died "in Ohio.")

I'm now trying to get from Ohio Board of Health a record of Cynthia's death -which may show her as Cynthia Newton. But I haven't too much hope on this, as
I've been told that Ohio Vital Statistics don't go back that far. If this effort
fails, I'll need to try something else.

Any suggestions?

P S -- I think the marriage of Cynthia and Isaac probably occurred in Kentucky, probably in 1820. Reasonsk (1) Have found no Isaac Newton among the many Newtons in OntarionCounty NY, though the search has been pietty thorough; (2) In affidavit in 1831, supporting pension claim by Stiles Parker, Isaac said he had known Stiles for "ten years" -- implying had not known him in Ontario Co. -- bo think Isaac did not come from Ontario Co.

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#### EXPLANATION OF ORDER FOR PHOTOCOPIES

Use this form to order photocopies of records of veterans who served in the United States or Confederate armed forces. These records include:

Pension application files based on United States (not State) service before World War I.

Bounty-land warrant application files based on United States (not State) service before 1856.

Pension or bounty-land warrant application files usually include an official statement of the veteran's military or naval service, as well as information of a personal or genealogical nature. If we find such a file, we send copies of the documents we think will be most useful to you.

Military service records based on service in the United States Army (officers who served before June 30, 1917, enlisted men before October 31, 1912), Navy (officers and enlisted men who served before 1886), Marine Corps (officers and enlisted men who served before 1896), and Confederate armed forces (1861-65).

Military service records rarely contain family information. The record of a man's service in any one organization is entirely separate from the record of his service in any other organization. We are ordinarily unable to accurately establish the identity of men of the same name who served in different organizations. If you know that a man served in more than one organization and you desire copies of his military service record, submit a separate form for the service record in each organization.

More information about these records may be found in our free Genealogical Information Kit.

Send the completed form to the address on the front of the form. When you send more than one form at a time, each order will be handled separately; you may not receive all your replies at the same time.

When we find numerous files for the veteran, we suggest that you visit the National Archives and examine the various files, or hire a professional researcher to examine the files for you. So you've encountered Aunt Kit. I'll eagerly accept your offer to send me a copy of what you've found -- provided you'll let me pay the cost of having the copy made -- as I always do, in order to feel free to beg for anything I want. I need to compare the version you have found with other versions, to see if it contains anything different -- as it well may.


Aunt Kit (Kitturah, Returah, Ketturah, Kiturah, according to who wrote the name) is our one eye-witness to the early days in Ohio, Iowa, Oregon. What we call "Aunt Kit's Diary" is a collection built from letters she wrote (mostly to two names) in her later years -- with her diary open to her eyes. Various people assembled such collections -- often similar, sometimes differing in detail. Of her actual diary, only a very few minor passages have survived as far as I can find.

As to relationship -- I'm a grandson of Corrington Belknap, a much younger MANNAIX brother of Kit's husband George.

Too bad Mrs Mintonye didn't have Aunt Kit's reminiscences. They would have kept her from making some of the errors in They Laughed. Too.

Went to California in 1849, they did nt fail to find gold. "They did well; so we lived well after they got back." said Aunt Kit.

What I most need to find is the missing part of her reminiscences - from Fort Hall to the Willamette Valley. The summaries of it, written by other people from their memory of what Kit wrote, aren't too good.



Dear Mr. Belknap, Thank you so much for your letter of Dec. 2. I had a Zerox copy made and forwarded to Mrs. Keeney. Quite possibly she has written to you by this time.

Mr. Belknap, which of Jesse and Jane's children de you decend frem? The reason I ask is a genealogical friend remembered I have a Belknap surname and had a copy of a diary written by Kitturah Penton Belknap wife of George made for me. I picked it up at her home this evening and it is truly one of the most delightful diaries I have read.

The first sentence: "George Belknap and Kitturah Penten were married Oct 3, 1839 both of Allen county, Ohio."

Next paragraph: "On October 17th we gathered our earthly possessions and put them in a 2 horse wagon and started to find us a home in the far west."

One pape 10: Tuesday April 10, 1848 they leave Iowa for Oregon. Page 14 is the last page and they are approaching Fort Hall.

Kitturah is such a courageous and sensitive person her diary is an insperation for anyone to read.

I was told that the Belknap lady that ewns the original copy loaned it to someone once with the solemn promise that she would not copy it or loan it to anyone. Just how my friends friend was able to get a copy to copy I don't know. Then again maybe that is something someone just dreamed up to add interest. It does not need anyone's help to make it interesting however.
