## CORRECTION OF SOME MISIDENTIFICATIONS MADE BY H W BELKNAP

ON: -- The Eli Belknap who married Clarissa (Cleracy) Lyman.

-- The Asa Belknap who married Abia Deverix

-- The John Belknap whose sons were Eli, Timothy, John, and Foris

The correction of these erroneous identifications is the result of years of research by John A Sherman, beginning about 1934, and by him and C Y Belknap cooperatively 1968 to 1972. The findings rest entirely on primary sources—wills, land deeds, court proceedings, and other original contemporary records.

These misidentifications are the most serious errors in H W Belknap's work, as they have led to the statement of incorrect lineage for scores of Belknaps.

The root of the errors was that HWB had no record of the second John Belknap in the list of three Johns descemded from Joseph Belknap and Prudence Morris:

-- John (Sr), son of Joseph and Prudence, born Woodstock, Conn., 21 Sept 1725.

-- John Jr, son of the above, born at Holland, Mass., 6 April 1748.

-- John (III), son of John Jr, born at Holland 12 April 1794.

Lacking a record of the second John (John Jr), HWB assumed that the John Belknap who was reported to have married a "Lovina" was John (Sr) and that she was that elder John's second wife. He therefore assigned to John (Sr) three sons — Eli, Timothy, and John (III) — who were actually sons of John Jr and Lavina Brock (widow of John Hinds), as proved by the will of Lavina's father David Brock of Woodstock, Conn. This Lavina was the so-called "Lovina" that HWB thought had been second wife of John (Sr). (HWB also misassigned another son of John Jr and Lavina Brock: Foris, whom HWB listed as son of Foris's uncle William and Anna Burke.)

In 1935; John Shemman directed HWB's attention to this error. HWB acknowledged the error but did not alter his records, as he had ceased active work on Belknap genealogy in 1926. (After 1926, he merely filed new data without entering them in his systematic records.) So those who have relied on his notes have perpetuated his errors.

By the end of 1913, HWB had found the record of the marriage of an Eli Belknap and Clarissa (Cleracy) Lyman at Peru, Mass. (called Partridgefield at the time of that marriage in 1800). He assumed — with no supporting evidence — that this Eli was the Eli in his records of the family at Holland, Mass., and entered this marriage on his card for that Eli (whom he showed as son of John Sr. incorrectly).

On 24 Feb 1914, the Boston Transcript carried an inquiry signed H.L.C. (H. L. Conlee of New York City) asking for the parentage and date of marriage of a John Belknap and a Lydia, and for the date of marriage of their son Eli to Clarissa Lyman.

On 15 March 1914, in the Transcript, HWB replied: "John born Sept 21 1725 married second(?) perhaps Lovina -- (the correspondent says Lydia), and had Eli by second wife, born Sept 15, 1780, married Cleracy Lyman. Eli was born at Wales, Mass. and married at Peru, Mass., being then of Stevens Town, Mass."

(NOTE: The name of the town was an error for Stephen Town, New York. There was no town of that or similar name in Massachusetts.)

On 16 March 1914, the Transcript carried a lengthy communication from Conlee, beginning: "John Belknap of Renssalaer County (New York) married Lydia. They had several children, one of whom was Eli." Then followed names of descendants of that Eli and Clarissa Lyman.

HWB ignored Conlee's repetition of "Lydia" and entered the children of that Eli and Clarissa (named by Conlee) as children of the Eli whom he believed to be the son of John Belknap (Sr) and a second wife named "Lovina" (but who was actually son of John Jr and Lavina Brock).

Conlee stuck with "Lydia." But in correspondence with him, HWB did not alter his insistence that "Lydia" was really "Lovina."

There was no evidence to support this insistence. But HWB clung to it.

He was completely in error. Years of research by John A Sherman and recent cooperative research by him and C Y Belknap have established the following unquestionable facts:

- -- Court records of the intestate settlement of the estate of John Belknap (Sr) of Holland, Mass. show that he married only once -- had a son named John (who is shown as John Jr in various records at Holland) -- and did not have sons named Eli. Timothy, and Foris.
- -- Other records make it plain that these sons and several daughters were children of John Jr and Lavina Brock.
- -- The Eli who married Clarissa Lyman could not possibly have been the Eli who was born at Wales, Mass. in 1780. Gensus records at Stephen Town NY show that Clarissa's husband Eli was born not later than 1774.
- -- That Eli (Clarissa's husband) moved from Oakham, Mass. about 1799 and in 1800 was settled at Stephen Town NY on land adjacent to the properties of his brother Asa and his father John.
- -- His father John was the oldest son of John Belknap and Ruth Farr of Westboro, Mass. He does not appear in Westboro VR, but HWB obtained acceptable evidence confirming his birth in 1740. He married Sarah Walker and lived in Oakham till 1799, then moved to Stephen Town NY with Sarah and their children.

The following facts have also been established:

- -- In 1803, while the Eli who married Clarissa Lyman was living at Stephen Town in Renssalaer County, John Belknap Jr of Holland, Mass. was in Oneida County NY with his sons Eli, Timothy, and John (III). His youngest son, Foris, had gone to Ohio with a young couple from Lanesborough, Joseph and Anna (Sherman) Devereaux -- probably not long after the death of his mother Lavina Brock, which occurred at some time before 25 Nov 1795 (the date of her father's will, indicating that she was dead by that date).
- -- In 1803, John Jr bought land at Lee, in the Town of Western, Oneida County NY. Three years later, his sons Eli and Timothy jointly bought land adjacent to the land that John Jr had bought in 1803. In 1808, Timothy who had moved to Smithfield in Madison County NY sold his half of that jointly owned land to Eli.
- to French Creek, Chatauqua County NY.

  Niagara County 1820.

- During the entire period in which the Eli who married Clarissa Lyman was at Stephen Town in Renssalaer County, the Eli who was born at Wales, Mass. in 1780 was in different counties of New York.

In the process of correcting those misidentifications, a correction for a related error by HWB has been found:

- when HWB found the record of marriage of an Asa Belknap to Abia Devetix (of "Stephenton, Mass." according to his notes) he entered this marriage on his page for the Asa who was son of Daniel Belknap of Dummerston, Vermont. But Abia Deverix was of Stephen Town, NY (there was no such town as "Stephenton, Mass.") and the Asa who married her was the brother of the Eli who married Clarissa Lyman and lived on the farm adjoining that Eli's at Stephen Town. (No record beyond birthdate has yet been found for the Asa born at Dummerston.)
- -- In this instance, HWB indicated by "(?)" on his notes that he was merely guessing in his identification of the Asa who married Abia Deverix. But many people have omitted that (?) when copying his notes.

In the Census records for Stephen Town, NY, there seems to be a probable explanation of the "Lydia" named by Conlee as wife of the John Belknap whose son married Clarissa Lyman.

-- That John Belknap, of Oakham, Mass., married Sarah Walker at Brookfield, Mass. 15 Feb 1769. She was presumably with him when he moved to Stephen Town, being the female Over 45 shown in the 1800 Census of his household. In the 1810 Census, the oldest female in this household was shown as aged only 26-45. As there was no daughter of that age, this was probably the Lydia named by Conlee -- second wife of John, and not mother of Eli as Conlee believed. On this assumption, Sarah had died between 1800 and 1810, and the marriage to Lydia had taken place during that same period. The 1810 census indicates that this second wife was probably a widow with one small child.

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I'm now approaching the end of the road you put me on, back in 1968 -- five years ago. It has led me to revamping the lineage of scores and scores of Belknaps.

Today. I paused in the task of rewriting the notes on the key people involved in this wide change -- in order to draft a memo explaining why the changes are needed, by explaining how the errors happened to be made.

The aim of the memo is to convince some people -- most notably at Salt Lake -- that they should alter their erroneous records in accord with detailed sheets that I'll be able to send to them.

Before I mail this memo to them. I should of course submit it to you. Everything in it stems from work done by you. All the evidence was located by you. Your persistence was what kept me going. All I've contributed is a point of view in analyzing and interpreting the evidence.

In this memo, I've tried to include only points on which I believe you and I are in agreement. Those on which we may still differ will appear in the sheets on certain individuals.

Please read the memo with a critical eye and tell me what changes you think I should make in it.

HENO to George May

Long ago, you kindly sent me copies of some notes from the Boston Transcript.

Two or three of these notes bore directly on a major problem -- the reassignment of the lineage of scores and scores of Belknaps.

Since early 1968, I'd been working with John Sherman of Hollywood on an effort to correct seme serious misidentifications made by H W Belknap of Salem -- whose files have been the foundation of my work on a Belknap genealegy.

We have finally arrived at solutions of the varied problems. And in the enclosed memo I have tried to explain (mainly for the benefit of people at Salt Lake) how and why HWB made the errors that so many people have perpetuated.

Perhaps it may interest you.

NOTE 3: Daughter of William & Elizabeth McNall of Union, Conn. "McNeill," in some later records, is incorrect.

NOTE 4: Identification of Jonathan as son of John and Prudence was made by Lovering.

He joined church at Holland in 1781, baptized there 1782. Wife's name unknown.

NOTE 5: Holland and Wales, Mass., were parishes of what was then Brimfield.

Early records (VR etc) of Holland, Wales and Brimfield are poor and often confused. Present edition of Brimfield VR does not indicate these places clearly or consistently.

NOTE 6: An Asa Belknap was a private on muster roll of Capt Davis' Company, Holland, 1756. No other mention of him in records Holland, Wales, Brimfield. No other Holland Belknap was in that Company. About 1890, William Burke Belknap of Louisville wrote that "there is reason to believe" Asa was son of Joseph and Prudence; but did not state the reason. No other identification has been found -- hence omitted from list of children above.

NOTE 7: Approximate birthdates for Sybil, Mary, Daniel & Jonathan are possible dates conforming to known sequence of birth, with regard to time of appearance on other records, such as: military service, petition signings, tax lists, lists of property owners, etc.

NOTE 1: 13 Feb 1812 is date of intestate probate of his estate.

NOTE 2: Town copy of Brimfield VR shows her last name as Ball. Another copy shows it as W--- with notation "torn." At a time when this second copy may have been in better condition, William Belknap of Louisville thought it might have read "Wallis." What seems most likely is that she was a widow Ball whose maiden name began with W, or vice versa. No confirming record has been found.

NOTE 3: This list of children differs from all other lists now current, which contain names of some of the children of John's son, John Jr. It derives directly from the list of John's children named as his heirs in the record of the administration of his intestate estate.

NOTE 4: Much of the widespread confusion about John's children, in past and present lists, has been a mistaken belief that the John Belknap recorded as marrying a "Lovina" was a this John, But this John married only once. The "Lovina" who was erroneously assumed to be his second wife was Lavina Brock, daughter of David Brock, and widow Hinds, who married John Jr. The result of this assumption was a typical instance of a "lost generation."

NOTE 5: Brimfield VR shows marriage to Sherman as "Eunice Lumbard," her name as widow. List of John's children in administration of his estate shows Eunice Belkmap as wife of Jeremish Sherman who was the administrator appointed by the court.

NOTE 6: Some present-day compilations show this Joseph as marrying Esther Snow, daughter of Jabez Snow and Keziah Newton. Esther's husband was the Joseph who was son of John Belknap and Buth Farr of Westboro, Mass. No record beyond date of

NOTE 7: Some present-day compilations contain two errors about Abigail. (1) Showing name of her husband as "James" instead of James. He was member of the large James family at Brimfield. (2) Showing Abigail as marrying, second, Daniel Thompson. She married only once and her husband William James was buried beside her. This error has been the result of an incorrect entry in Brimfield VR: entry of an undated marriage, in a church record only, of "Abigail Belknap and Daniel Thompson" which is plainly an erroneous entry of the marriage of Daniel Thompson and Abigail's aunt Hannah, daughter of Joseph Belknap and Prudence Morris,

NOTE 2: Probable date of death is inferred from land deeds in Oneida County, NY, which contain some curious and unusual features. . . On 3 August 1803, John Jr (father of Eli, Timothy, John and Foris) bought land at Lee in Town of Western from Jotham Worden. Contrary to normal usage at that time, the seller did not make formal acknowledgement of the act when signing the deed. Three years later, 15 October 1806, Jotham Worden and wife Fanny appeared before a judge and signed the customary acknowledgement of their action. This was not done to facilitate a sale of the property; it was not sold till 1811. The question of why the acknowledgement was made in 1806 seems to require consideration. Some light may come from something that had happened just two days earlier. On 13 October 1806, Eli and Timothy had bought 24 acres adjoining the land that had been bought by their father in 1803 -their first land purchase. An obvious implication is that Eli and Timothy had come into money and that there was a change in the ownership of the land their father had bought in 1803 -- making a confirmation of his purchase essential. It seems likely that the father (John Jr) had died. . . This inference is strengthened MUNICIPAL BY the fact that at about that known but not the date, except as not later than 1810. . . Further support comes from

what next happened to the land that had been bought in 1803. On 27 August 1811, this 30-acre property was sold to Foris (who was in Ohio and had been for some years) by a John Belknap who seems sure to have Foris's brother John, not his father John. At the time when the deed was signed, a major change was made in its wording. Originally, the deed had read that the land was the property that had been sold by Jotham Worden in 1803 to "the said John Belknap" -- i. e. the John Belknap now selling it. But before signing, the words "the said John Belknap" were erased and merely "John Belknap" was substituted -- an apparent indication that the John Belknap now selling the land was not the John Belknap who had bought it in 1803. It seems reasonable to conclude that the father had died between 3 August 1803 and 13 October 1806, and probably not long before that 1806 date. . . However, there is one bit of contrary evidence. When Foris came from Ohio to sell that land in 1816, the original wording "the said John Belknap" was not altered in the deed he signed. As this could be mertely an oversight by a very young man, in a hurry to sell the land and return to Ohio, its significance should not be overweighted. . . The net conclusion seems to be that on the death of John Jr his estate was shared by the sons who were in Oneida County, with the youngest of them taking the land and the older two taking the money -- and it is possible that the son John was merely taking the land in trust for his still younger brother Foris, at a time when Foris was still a minor (18 years old), and transfered The Torrest Than Foris had come of age. Foris separated from his family while young, probably not long after the death of his mother in or about 1795. # CORRECTION OB SOME MISIDENTIFICATIONS MADE BY H W BELKNAP

ON: -- The Eli Belknap who married Clarissa (Cleracy) Lyman.

-- The Asa Belkmap who married Abia Deverix

-- The John Belknap whose sons were Eli, Timothy, John, and Foris

The correction of these erroneous identifications is the result of years of research by John A Shermand beginning about 1934, and by him and C Y Belknap cooperatively 1968 to 1972? The findings rest entirely on primary sources—wills, land deeds, court proceedings, and other original contemporary records.

These misidentifications are the most serious errors in H W Belknap's work, as they have led to the statement of incorrect lineage for some scores of Belknaps.

The root of the errors was that KWB had no record of the second John Belknap in the list of three Johns descended from Joseph Belknap and Prudence Morris:

-- John (Sr), son of Joseph and Prudence, born Woodstock, Conn., 21 Sept 1725.

-- John Jr, son of the above, born at Holland, Mass., 6 April 1748.

-- John (III), son of John Jr. born at Holland 12 April 1784.

Lacking a record of the second John (John Jr), HWB assumed that the John Belknap who was reported to have married a "Loving" was John (Sr) and that she was that elder John's second wife. He therefore assigned to John (Sr) three sons — Eli. Timothy, and John (III) — who were actually sons of John Jr and Lavina Brock (widow of John Hinds), as proved by the will of Lavina's father David Brock of Boodstock. Conn. This maying was the so-called "Loving" that HWB thought had been second wife of John (Sr). (HWB also massigned another son of John Jr and Lavina Brock: Foris, whom HWB listed as son of Foris's uncle William and Anna Burke.)

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By the end of 1913, HWB had found the record of the marriage of an Eli Belknap and Clarissa (Cleracy) Lyman at Peru, Mass. (called Partiiggefield at the time of that marriage in 1800). He assumed — with no supporting evidence — that this Eli was the Eli in his records of the family at Holland, Mass., and entered this marriage on his card for that Eli (whom he showed as son of John Sr, incorrectly).

On 24 Feb 1914, the Boston Transcript carried an inquiry signed H.L.C. (H. L. Conlee of New York City) asking for the parentage and date of marriage of a John Belkmap and a Lydia, and for the date of marriage of their son Eli to Clarissa Lyman.

On 15 March 1914, in the Transcript, HWB replied: "John born Sept 21 1725 married second(?) perhaps Lovina -- (the correspondent says Lydia), and had Eli by second wife, born Sept 15, 1780, married Cleracy Lyman. Eli was born at Wales, Mass. and married at Peru, Mass., being then of Stevens Town, Mass."

(NOTE: The name of the town was an error for Stephen Town, New York. There was no town of that or similar name in Massachusetts.)

On 16 March 1914, the Transcript carried a lengthy communication from Conlee, beginning: "John Belknap of Renssalaer County (New York) married Lydia. They had several children, one of whom was Eli." Then followed names of descendants of that Eli and Clarissa Lymah.

HWB ignored Conlee's repetition of "Lydia" and entered the children of that Eli and Clarissa (named by Conlee) as children of the Eli whom he believed to be the son of John Belknap (Sr) and a second wife named "Lovina" (but who was actually son of John Jr and Lavina Brock).

Conlee stuck with "Lydia." But in correspondence with him, HWB did not alter his insistence that "Lydia" was really "Lovina."

There was no evidence to support this insistence. But HWB clung to it.

He was completely in error. Years of research by John A Sherman and recent cooperative research by him and C Y Belknap have established the following unquestionable facts:

- -- Court records of the intestate settlement of the estate of John Belknap (Sr) of Holland. Mass. show that he married only once -- had a son named John (who is shown as John Jr in various records at Holland) -- and did not have sons named Eli. Timothy.
- -- Other records make it plain that these sons and several daughters were children of John Jr and Lavina Brook.
- -- The Eli who married Clarissa Lyman could not possibly have been the Eli who was born at Wales, Mass. in 1780. Census records at Stephem Town NY show that Clarissa's husband Eli was born not later than 1774.
- -- That Eli (Clarissa's husband) moved from Oakham, Mass. about 1799 and in 1800 was settled at Stephen Town NY on land adjacent to the properties of his brother Asa and his father John.
- Westboro, Mass. He does not appear in Westboro VR, but HWB obtained acceptable evidence confirming his birth in 1740. He married Sarah Walker and lived in Oakham till 1799, then moved to Stephen Town NY with Sarah and their children.

# The following facts have also been established:

- -- In 1803, while the Eli who married Clarissa Lyman was living at Stephen Town in Renssalaer County, John Belknap Jr of Holland, Mass. was in Oneida County NY with his sons Eli. Timothy, and John (III). His youngest son, Foris, had gone to Ohio with a young couple from Lanesborough, Joseph and Anna (Sherman) Devereaux -- probably not long after the death of his mother Lavina Brock, which occurred at some time before 25 Nov 1795 (the date of her father's will, indicating that she was dead by that date).
- -- In 1803, John Jr bought land at Lee, in the Town of Western, Oneida County NY. Three years later, his sons Eli and Timothy jointly bought land adjscent to the land that John Jr had bought in 1803. In 1808, Timothy who had moved to Smithfield in Madison County NY sold his half of that jointly owned land to Eli.
- -- Eli bought more land at Lee and remained there till 1817, when he moved to French Creek, Chatauqua County NY. Timothy moved to Cambria in Niagara County about 1822.

-- During the entire period in which the Eli who married Clarissa Lyman was at Stephen Town in Henssalaer County, the Eli who was born at Wales, Mass. in 1780 was in different counties of New York.

In the process of correcting those misidentifications, a correction for a related error by HWB has been found:

- -- When HMB found the record of marriage of an Asa Belknap to Abia Devetiz (of "Stephenton, Mass." according to his notes) he entered this marriage on his page for the Asa who was son of Daniel Belknap of Dummerston Vermont. But Abia Deverix was of Stephen Town, NY (there was no such town as "Stephenton, Mass.") and the Asa who married her was the brother of the Eli who married Clarissa Lyman and lived on the farm adjoining that Eli's at Stephen Town. (No record beyond birthdate has yet been found for the Asa born at Dummerston.)
- -- In this instance, HWB indicated by "(7)" on his notes that he was merely guessing in his identification of the Asa who married Abia Deverix. But many people have omatted that (1) when copying his notes.

In the Census records for Stephen Town, NY, there seems to be a probable explanation of the "Lydia" named by Conlee as wife of the John Belkmap whose son married Clarissa Lyman.

That John Belknap, of Oakham, Mass., married Sarah Walker at Brookfield, Mass. 15 Feb 1769. She was presumably with him when he moved to Stephen Town, being tha female Over 45 shown in the 1820 Census of his household. In the 1810 Census, of the oldest female in this household was shown as aged only 26-45. As there was no daughter of that age, this was probably the Lydia named by Conlee -- second wife of John, and not mother of Eli as Conlee believed. On this assumption, Sarah had died between 1800 and 1810, and the marriage to Lydia had taken place during that same period. The 1810 census indicates that this second wife was probably a widow with one small child.

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
