

Last December, George May kindly sent me a copy of his letter to you, dated Dec. 10.

If you have learned anything about the parentage of Diantha Phoebe Newton, I'll be most grateful if you'll aid me by telling me what you have found — or even what efforts have not yielded results, for this sort of negative information may be helpful.

Though I agree completely with the views expressed by George May, I'm still without proof that the Diantha named in 1820 by my great great grandfather was not his child. For several reasons, the Diantha Phoebe that you have found sounds likely to be the same girl.

Dear Mr Washburns

You ask for data on the Diantha, called "daughter Diantha, age 9" in a deposition made by Jonas Belknap on December 12, 1820. You state that you are seeking data on Diantha Phoebe Newton, born October 4, 1813 "somewhere in New York State"; died September 11, 1900, Plymouth County, Iowa; married February 13, 1834, at an unknown place, Alba Jeffers, born April 30, 1811, "no record of location"; died August 28, 1884, Akron, Iowa. You state further that the Jeffers' "lived in Beloit (Wisconsin) at least 12 years as their son Benjamin Alba Jeffers was born there November 10, 1846".

I cannot give you anything which would show that this Diantha Phoebe Newton was indeed the same Diantha referred to in Jonas Belknap's deposition. The fact that you have a firm date of birth of October 4, 1813 for Diantha Phoebe would seem to stretch the possibility of her having been a daughter of Asa Newton and his wife Tamar (Vinton) Newton. As Tamar was born July 30, 1766, she would have been 47 years of age at Diantha Phoebe's birth - if she were her mother. It is not impossible for a woman of age 47 to have a child but is not usual.

Have you written The Division of Records and Statistics, State Dept of Health, De Noines, Iowa 50319? For a fee they will send you copies of death certificates, and if they exist for Alba & Diantha, should give the names of their parents, as well as possibly more precise data on the places of their births. Also the Clerk of the District Court, Le Mars, Plymouth County, Iowa 51031 has many records such as birth, death and probate records from 1880 and on. He may have something of interest to you about these people.

The Asa Newton who married Tamar Vinton is not in any Newton Genealogy that I have seen. However I believe (no proof) he was the one who was a son of Oliver and Rebecca Newton of Belchertown, Massachusetts. This Oliver is shown in the book "Descendants of Richard Newton of Sudbury and Marlborough - 1638", by M Ermine Newton Leonard. There is also a Vinton Genealogy which gives the ancestry of Tamar Vinton. Should you find that these Diantha's are the same persons, and should you not have access to these books; I would be glad to look up this information for you. Couldn't do it till next year, however.

I am sending a copy of this letter to Mr Carroll York Belknap, 25 Club Road, Riverside, Connecticut 06878. Mr Belknap is a descendant of Jonas N. Belhap and perhaps could offer you further information on the Diantha referred to in 1820 by Jonas N. B.

I think that we may have found Diantha. Facts thus far reported, but not yet completely verified.

DIANTHA PHOEBE NEWTON: Born Oct 4 (or 6) 1813, "somewhere in New York State," died Sept 11 1900 (or Sept 13), in Plymouth County. Iowa; married Feb 13 1834, at an unknown place, Alba Jeffers, born April 30 1811, place not known, died Aug 28 1884 at Akron, Plymouth County, Iowa; had lived some years in Beloit, Wisc., where a son Benjamin Alba Jeffers was born. Death certificate for Diantha does not name her parents, as parentage on such certificates in Iowa was not required before July 1904.

As I think it likely that these statements will be fully verified, I'm passing them along to you without delay. One point, however, may be subject to doubt: the birth date shown for her is computed from her alleged age at death: "86 yrs, ll mos, 7 days." If correct, this would make her aged 7 in 1820 -- not 9, as stated by Jonas in his pension application in 1820. I do not regard this as conclusive, for I have found many errors in such statements of age on gravestones and in vital records.

At the moment, I see no immediate way of discovering the parentage of this Diantha Phoebe (whose middle name, however, suggests descent from family of the Asa Newton who married Tamar Vinton, as "Phoebe" was a name used in that family). However, there is a hypothetical line of thought that might be worth examination.

Like this: In 1818, pension application in NY State, by Jonas, says nothing of a wife. In 1820, in Kentucky, he names Tamar. So, a guess compounded by a guess:
(1) that the marriage to Tamar occurred in Kentucky, between dates of those two applications; (2) that Asa had died quite recently, in Kentucky; (3) that Asa and Tamar Newton had been among those who "traded" Ontario County land for some of Gidenn Granger's land in Kentucky, about 1816 -- and might be found in a more complete list of such people than the one I passed along to Gladys some months ago., Perhaps some helpful information might be found in one of the deeds involved in this "trade".

On guess (2), above, I'm influenced by the record of other instances in which a widower Belknap married very soon the widow of one of his cousins. In my branch of the family it would have been almost normal for such a marriage to occur, shortly after the death of the man's cousin. Claudia will recall two such instances in Oregon.

. . And the point is that, if this Asa Newton was the one we think he must have been, he was the son of a brother of Jonas's mother Mary Newton -- i.e., Jomas's cousin, which would go a long way to explain why Jonas, at about 60, married Tamar. It was just a natural thing to do, especially if Tamar had a child who needed a father in the home. Such a marriage would occur, naturally, within a very short time after the death of Asa.

If I learn anything more, I'll keep you posted.
