I'm most grateful for your memo en Chio census data. It solves one problem: whether or not Timothy Belknap had a wife named Candace, and when she was born. Age 51 in 1850 census confirms a previously questionable date in 1799 for her birth. . . but makes still harder the task of identifying the maternal parentage of Timothy's children, for whom I have what must be reliable birthdates from a family bible.

If born in 1799, Candace could not have been mother of children born 1809 & 1811. And could not have been Timothy's wife in 1820 and 1830, for censuses for those years show a wife such older than Candace could have been.

To make it still more complex, I'd found indications that timothy also had a wife Mary to was unknown to his descendants.

If I ever get the facts set up in sensible fashion, I may ask your judgment on possible interpretation.

Dear Mr Reed:

I'm most deeply grateful for all the effort you made to find an answer to my query about Timothy Belknap. I'm writing to Mrs Gentner, Cambria, as you suggest. And I note with pleasure your mention of Gladys Gray of Beneva. Her contact with your office was on my behalf. For morethan five years this rather extraordinary woman has tirelessly aided me in my work on preparing a Belknap genealogy. She is the best all-"round source of information about western New York, in the early 1800's, that I've ever found.

On the chance that you may some day find something that might help me. I think I should mention some ways in which my files differ from what was said in your letter -- so that you can correct any errors in them.

Census records: I attach copy of census data sent to me by an experienced searcher, who got the information from records (microfilmed, I believe) at the Mormon church genealogical library in Los Angeles. It shows Timothy at Cambria in 1820 and also in 1830. In each year, the detail on members of the household agrees with the known birthdates of his children.

Land deeds: The County Clerk's office gave you, apparently, the dates of recording, which are not always the same as the dates of transactions. From my copies of the deeds, I can give the record like this:

1822 - Timothy bought land from a syndicate, headed by the Willinks of Amsterdam, NY.

1825 -- He sold 40 acres of that land to Moses Beach.

1831 -- He sold the rest of it to his son Samuel F Belknap (and is not known to have owned any land in the next three years).

1835 - His son Samuel F and wife Mary, then living in Birmingham, Ohio, sold back that land to Timothy.

1835 -- Same day, Timothy sold the land to William Curtis.

Both of the 1835 deeds were dated 13 Oct 1835 and were recorded that same day. The first of the two was not from Timothy and wife Mary but to Timothy from Samuel and Samuel's wafe Mary. So it gives us no aid on name of Timothy's wife.

As no wife is named on the 1831 deed, it seems that his wife (presumably the female 26-45 in 1820 census and 40-50 in 1830 census) died between the date of census-taking in 1830 and lAug 1831 (the date of the 1831 deed).





Recently I received, from my most helpful correspondent, the record of land transactions in Cambria, Nigara Co. NY. 1825 and 1835, by a France Timothy Belknap and his son Samuel F Belknap. The initial "F" proved to stand for XEXEXEE "Forace," pne pf the many misspellings of Forris, Foris, Forest.

This led me to tackle the neglected task of dealing with the many questions raised in your One outcome is the attached sheet showing a proposed revision of Henry W Belknap's records - for your consideration. I shall do nothing more with it until I hear from you.

Meanwhile, in this memo, I'll try to indicate my conclusions and the reasons for them.

The tentative conclusions can be summarised briefly:

-- John III (brother of Forris) had two older brothers, Eli and Timothy.

-- His brother Ima Timothy was very probably the Timothy at Cambria 1825 and 1835. --- The Timothy shown in list of deeds, Oneida Co., was probably this same brother;

and the Eli in that list was probably the brother Eli.

-- The John who sold the lot at Lee, Oneida County, to Forris was probably the

- -- The John shown that in the Grantee list 1849, 1859, 1863; and in the Grantor list 1852, 1852, 1859, 1864, 1870; was probably John III -- and Sarah & in 1871 was probably his widow.
- -- The wife of brother Eli was named Lydia

Before talking about these findings (surmises?), I should dispose of the Johns in Henssalaer Co in early 1800's.

#### Renssalaer Co.

The persistent tradition connecting John II with Renssalaer County seems to have been a red herring. Certainly it led HWB into obvious errors.

There is plain evidence in HWB's records that the John Belknap at Stephen Town , Census 1800, was the one from BENETHEREXXEREXXEREXXED New Braintree, Mass., and that the Asa and Eli on adjoining EXHERE farms in that year were his sons. (HWB was misled into thinking that this Eli was the son Eli or John, 30.

The John at Nassau , Census 1810, was/surely the one from New Braintree. Mortxlikelyx with a second and younger wife. The was, likely, the John who married Lucy Pack of I also pearby Sandlake. - No

None of the other John Belkmaps in this county, Census 1810 or 1820, could have been John II, if the ages shown are even approximately correct.

HWB thought the John who married Lucy Peck was John I, as he did not know of John II. And it's possible that this John could have been John II. but the Ex New Braintree John seems much more likely, I think.

#### The Two Older Brothers

I have no priginal-source evidence that John III had two older brothers. Eli and Timothy. But there seem to be a number of reasons for regarding this as probable. For example:

\*Morris Belknap, copying, \*\*Harrage at Holland, Mass., noted that JOHN, son of John II, was mixture shown either as "3rd son" or as "John 3rd." He thought the notation meant 3rd son, and left empty lines for two unknown older sons.

- \* The correspondent who named Eli and Timothy to HWB and gave birth dates for IMMI said they were born at Wales -- which would explain why not MAGMENT IMMENTAL in Holland records. This correspondent, a Mrs Patrick.

  seems to have been reliable on many MAGMENT points on other entries, though she had no record of John II and thought Eli and Timothy were sons of John I. (She did not know of the other children: John II, Levine, Caphira, Forris.)
- \* The birth dates Mrs Patrick gave for Eli and Timothy are plausible dates for children born before John III -- if John II married Lavina Brock not later than 1779.
- \* At A Timothy with the same birthdate shown by MEXELECTIVE Mrs Pontick was reported independently by another correspondent, with notations indicating probable relationship to the Woodstock family and to Forris.
- \* An Eli and a fm Timothy appear in land transactions in Oneida Go. in same period as Forris and A a John who seems likely to be John II. I say "John II" because the lot in Lee was bought from John Worden in 1803, when John III would have been only 19.

\*In, deed showing names of Eli and Timothy issurmer Eli is named first — as if the elder.

(That deed, recorded 1843, might indicate that John II had died before the date of the transaction — which is not known yet.)

These bits of possible supporting data leave us the task of finding the V R for Wales, which I have not been able to do, thus far. So, now, a note on something you doubtless know.

### South Brinfield, Wales, Holland

Part of our problem comes from confusion of Wales of and Holland and lack of record for Wales V R. BERKI But the notes taken long ago by Morris Belknap show plainly that some of the Brimfield family lived first at Wales, later at Holland. The published Brimfield VR does not identify, alwys, entries from South Brimfield. In those times, South Brimfield had 3 "parishes": South Parish (no other name); West Parish (Wales); and East Parish (Holland). Morris did not find VR for Wales. Neither can I, thus far. I hope you can. They might, I think, show marriage date for John II and Lavina Brock and birth dates for Eli and Timothy.

## The Timothy at Cambria

HWB thought the Cambria Timothy was INE the Brimfield family (though wrongly thought he was son of John I, as HWB did not know of existence of John II -- but the birthdates certainly should have warned him that he was looking mx at the familiar problem of "a missing generation".

Reasons influencing HWB: The correspondent supply data on the Cambria Timothy

indicated he was from "the Woodstock family" -- and the only Belknap family at Woodstock, Conn. was that of Joseph and Prudence Morris, who moved to the Brimfield. South Brimfield area about 1742. . . This correspondent also gave the same birthdate for Timothy that Mrs Patrick had shown, as noted above. . . He also said that this Timothy "had a cousin named Forest," as explanation of middle name of Timothy's son Samuel FAXXEX Forace. An apparent or possible confusion between brother and cousin? By that time, HWB had a record on Forris, but mistakenly as son of William, Brother of John I; so "cousin" would look OK to HWB.

The specifit dates shown for the Cambria Timothy, as supplied to HWB, were:

His birth: 29 July 1783

Birth of his son Minard Samuel Forace, at Smithfield, Madison Co., NY, 1809.

Birth of his son Edward H., Madison County, 1811.

To which I now add:

1825 -- bought land in Cambria, Niagara Co. NY 1831 --- Sold same piece to his son Samuel F. 1835 -- Purchased same piece from son Samuel F.

John II, John III, Eli, Timothy, in Oneida County

Identification of the FERRITE Timothy as the Oneids Co. Timothy might be made by examining the deeds in which this name appears. Dates shown in the lists you sent to me are dates of recording -- not dates of transactions -- apparently dates of last known recording, not earliest.

We know that in 1803 the lot in Lee was bought from Jotham Worden by a John Belknap who in 1811 sold it to Forris (who in 1816 sold it to Silas Pratt). As said earlier, I think this must have been John II, because John III only 19 years old in 1803. And from these deeds we know that Forris was in Ohio in 1811 (you may know the filate when he was taken to # Ohio?).

We do not yet know where the Cambria Timothy was before 1809 (when he was in nearby Madison County). The deeds bearing his \*\*management\*\* name may show where he was on the dates of the transactions (not the recordings) and may identify him as the Timothy who is linked to Eli in the lists of deeds.

So, till we see copies of all the NAME Oneida County deeds for Eli, Timothy, and John (plainly 2 different Johns, I think), I can only say that the tentative findings that I summarized in the beginning of this memo look like hunches that are worth following. If these hunches turn out to be right, they'll answer almost all the questions that have troubled you.

Consequently, I'll be eager to know if you think it worth while to test the hunches by getting copies of those deeds.

\*\*\*

Meanwhile, of course, I'm troubled by the apparent lack of confirmation in the census records for Oneida and Madison Counties. But I'm putting this point aside, for the moment.

Now, finally, two Thinks that I hope you can do for me:

(1) Can you give me any information about the parentage of the John Belknap from New Braintree? I have a good deal about his descendants, but nothing on him beyond his marriages.

I am going to copy from a "Centennial Biographical History of the City of Columbus and Franklin County, Ohio," published in 1901, in Chicago, by the Lewis Publishing Co. For some time, this was the only "background" of the Belknaps, that I could refer to.

Page 689: CHRISTOPHER SHOEMAKER

Christopher Shoemaker, deceased, was for many years a prominent business man of Clinton township, and one of its most highly respected and influential citizens. A native of Ohio, he was born in St. Albans township, Licking county, July 30, 1820, and was a don of Christopher and Barbara (Keller) Shoemaker, the former of French, the latter of German descent. The family came from Pennsylvania to Ohio at a very early day and were among the first to make a settlement in Licking county. The father, who was one of the heroes of the Revolutionary war, and a millwright by trade, spent

his last days in Franklin county.

The early life of our subject was spent under the parental roof and he received a common school education. On the 7th of April, 1844, he was married in Licking county, to Miss Sarah Belknap, who was born in Washington county, this state, April 13, 1825, a daughter of Forace and Sallie (Bateman) Belknap, the former a native of Connecticut, the latter of Chenango county, New York, both being the youngest child of their respective families. On the maternal side she is related to Lewis Cass and General Buell. Her Grandfather Bateman was a college-bred man, and a descendant of a Mayflower family. Mrs. Shoemaker now has in her possession a sugar bowl which was brought to this country on that famous ship by her ancestors and which is still in a fair state of preservation. Her paternal grandfather, David Belknap, was also a well-educated man, and served in the Revolutionary war under Paul Jones. On first coming to this state the Belknap family settled in Marietta, but later removed to Licking county, where they were numbered among the pioneers. Forace Belknap was an expert woodsman, swift of foot and a great hunter. He traded largely with the Indians, and was very popular with them. He died on a farm in Licking county at an advanced age.

To Mr. and Mrs. Shoemaker were born eleven children, six sons and five

daughters, etc.

As to the above: We know that Foris' father was John Belknap, who probably did serve in the Revolution; but there is no evidence that he served under John Paul Jones. Sarah (Bateman) Belknap's mother was a 1st cousin to General Joseph Buell; but I have been unable to prove relationship to Lewis Cass. William Bateman, is referred to as "an Irishman," in a history of Chenango County, New York, so this would puncture the myth that he was a descendant of a Mayflower family.

In a notebook, my Grandfather Sherman, wrote that Foris Belknap had brothers, David, Eli, and Timothy. He gave no source for this statement, and I rather discounted it, after making a search. Now, I feel that there

was truth in this statement.

If Foris had a brother, David, he, no doubt, was named for David

Brock, his mother's father.

Since running the 1800 census, for Hampshire Co., Mass., I have been puzzled as to who the following-listed person might be: Page 1106 - Holland. Loviah Hind - males: (None). Females: 1 over 45. On page 1104 - Holland, is listed William Belknap - males: 1 under 10; 1, 16-26; 2 over 45. Females: 1, 26-45; 1 over 45. This would be a brother of John, Sr. "Loviah Hind," is so close to being Levina Hinds, that I wonder if there is something here?

Page 2 - Carroll York Belknap - February 19. 1971

Yesterday, I had a chance to see a micro-film of Madison County, New York Deed Index - Grantees. I did not have time to go through it, page by page, for Grantors. However, in Volume 1 - 1806-1853, on page 161, I found this:

1812. Mar. 26

Belknap, Timothy from Major Willcox & wife. Book F, pg. 321. 1812, Mar. 26

Belknap, Timothy from Samuel Morris & wife. Book F, pg. 323.

This might help you further, in placing Timothy Belknap. The Madison County, New York Courthouse, is at Wampsville, N. Y. I also checked the Madison County, N. Y. Will Index, 1806-1830, and found no Belknaps.

I ran through the Vermont Vital records, but found nothing promising. Many Belknaps, but none relating to our search.

I want to take a little more time with your format. I doubt there will be anything that I can add.

Dear Ms. Belknap,

Your letter concerning the wife of one TIMOTHY BELKNAP has been received at this office and you indeed do have a problem. As you are no doubt aware, Census Schedules prior to 1850 listed only heads of families.

We checked outthe various census listings for the county and although we found a Timothy Belknap listed for Town of Cambria in 1820, he does not show up again in 1830 although we know he was here as we found records of land transactions later than that.

We then checked the Miscellaneous Records in the Clerk's Office in hopes we could locate his wife's name. Nothing. A check of the wills reveals that the earliest date for a Belknap will was 1876.

The 1030 Census of Town of Niagara listed an ELISHA BEINAP, no doubt a phonetic spelling. No Timothy in any town.

Just on the chance that your information was in error we checked out land transactions in the Clerk's Office and learned that On March 9, 1821 Timothy sold 17 acres to one M. Beach. Again on Aug.31,1831 he sold 55 Acres(see below) to one Samuel F.Belknap(Liber 2-166 and 6-45).

On Feb.19 1825 Timothy prechased for the sum of \$306.67, 55 acres of land from the Holland Land Co.(Liber 1-678). This was same land sold to Samuel in 1831.

Again on Oct. 13, 1835 (Liber 13-341) Timothy and Wife Mary purchased 40 Acres of land from one Samuel Belknap. This last transaction is the only one in which a name of a wife is recorded.

Vital statistics for the State of New York prior to 1881 are just about non existant unless you can locate old church records. In an effort to build up a file we are going over old newspapers, tomb stones, letters, diaries and etc. Although we have several thousand notations filed so far, we have been unable to locate the one you are seeking. We suggest that you write us again in about a year in hopes that some kind person will walk in with a listing from a tomb stone. However, stones that old in this climate are just about impossible to read and even if one for Timothy's wife did exist with the proper data, we doubt if any one would be able to read it.

In the mean time we suggest that you write to Mrs. Vernette Genter, 4280 Church Rd., Lockport, NY in hopes that we has acquired some church records of that period. She is the Town Historian for Cambria

Also we suggest that you contact Mrs.Gladys E.Gray, 156 Cherry St., Geneva, NY 14456. We had extensive correspondence with her some years ago concerning the Belknap family in Niagara County and she just might have turned up the data you want.

May I ask if you can suggest a way to solve a problem in the period 1808-1820?

The problem is to find the correct name of the wife of Timothy Belknap who came to Smithfield in late 1807 or early 1808 and lived there till 1817.

Unfortunately, the grantor deed he signed when he sold his land before leaving Madisch County was never recorded -- so that means of learning his wife's first name does not exist.

Old records based on information obtained from descendants in 1912 show her name variously: Annis -- Candis -- Candace. Nothing is known of her maiden surname.

It seems likely that his marriage occurred in Smithfield in 1808.

May I ask if you can suggest a possible way to solve a problem in the period 1820-1840?

The problem is to find the correct name of the wife of Timothy Belknap, who came to Cambria about 1817 and lived there till 1835, after which time he moved to Ohio.

Old records based in information supplied by some of his descendants in 1912, show her first name variously? Annis -- Candis -- Candace. No indication of her surname has been found.

Grantor deeds signed by Timothy in 1825 and later years, do not name a wife. So presumably she died before 1825 -- after 1823 birth of her last known child, Almon Belknap.

Almon Belkmap and two other sons --- Edward -- are known to have stayed in Hiagara County. Descendants of Edward were living in Lockport as late as 1912.

If you can suggest a way for me to continue searching for her name, I'll be most grateful.
