REUBEN McBRIDE'S JOURNAL

(Note: The wording, spelling, and capitalization of the original manuscript are preserved here. But since there was no punctuation to indicate thought or sentence units, periods and commas have been added.)

Page 1st

On the 16th of June, 1833, I was Baptised into this Church in the town of Villenovia, Chautauque County, New York. In the Spring of March 4th, 1834, Joseph Smith and Parley P. Pratt Came to my House and held a meeting in that neighbourhood. at the close of the meeting Joseph Called for volenteers to go up to Redeem Zion. I volunteered to go. we were to meet in Kirtland I think the 22 of April. My Brother in law Vinson Knight took me in his bugy to Kirtland. we arived their before the time appointed. the day befor we Started Joseph Called us togeather and Spoke for a Short time and weware all Sealed up to Eternal life by Joseph and He Said they Should come forth in the day of the Lord Jesus. if they comited Sins they would be delivered

2nd

over to the bufeting of Saten for the destruction of the flesh but they Should come forth in the day of the Lord Jesus. on the 5th of May we left Kirtland and the 6th we arived at New Portage where we ware organised into Companys. we ware called uppon to consecrate all the money we had. I done so. Frederick G. Williams was treasurer. here we ware Joined by Some who went on berore us to New Portage. As we traviled along we ware not to molest anny thing in the Street, not so much as a Dog, nor to say any thing where we ware going or what our business was or the names of those who ware in the camp, and frequently before Starting in the morning we would all join and Sing

Hark listen to the trumpiters they Sound for volenteers on Zions bright and flowry mount behold their Officers.

their garments wite, their armors bright with courage bold they Stand inlisting Soldiers for their king to march to Zions land.

3rd

It Sets my hart all in a flame A Soldier for to be I will enlist, gird on my arms and fight for liberty.

we want no cowards in our band who will their Coulours fly, we call for valient harted men who are not afraid to Die.

May the 17. Crossed the Ohio line into Indiana. travilled 40 miles this day.

18 Sunday. had Meeting.

19. Passed through Vandolia.

21. forded White River.

At the State Line of Illinois, 25.

26 Monday. at night ware thretened by enemyes. Joseph Said he knew the angels of God ware with us for He had seen them Monday.

Grossed Kaskaskia River.

May 31, one mile from Jacksonvill. held meeting. a good manny out from town, a large meeting.

June 2. Crossed the Illinois River. Camped on the Bank of River. tuesday 3. Visited the Mounds. a skeleton was dug up. Joseph Said his name was Zelph, a great warrior under the Prophet Omandagus. an arrow was found in his Ribs, which he said he

4th

Suposed ocaisoned his death. he was killed in battle. Said he was a man of God, and the curse was taken off, or in part. He was a white Lamanite, was known from the Atlantic to the Rocky Mountains. June the 4. came to the Missipi River. ware 2 days in Crossing, being vary high, one mile wide.

On the 7th, arived at Salt River. Staid their 12 days to recrute and reorganise. Some came from Michigan and Joined the company here, a branch of the Church here.

5th

they Organized. Lyman Wight was Chosen General. I was one of the Rifle Company. Thomas Colburn was our Captin. here we ware drilled. on the 18th, Passed through Richmond Ray County. We now numbered, I think, 205. After we all got togeather we ware again Sealed up unto Eternal life, the Same as in Kirtland.

on the 19 June, Camped on arise of ground near fishing River. as Soon as we camped they put out a gard. Some of the mob came, about 4 or 5, and told us to get out of the Road and Swore we would Catch hell before morning. Soon there came up a Thunder Storm. the wind blew. it took 3 or 4 to hold the tent down, and the Rain Came down in torents. Bro. Amasa Lyman and me laid down in the tent. the watter was half way up our Sides. the Thunder Cracked first on one side and then on the other. it was, terible in the extrem. I saw no hale where I ware, but in the morning

6th

20 June as we travelen on a Short distance, the ground was covered with lims the hail had cut off the trees, some as big as your finger. they Said there ware hailstones as big as a tumbler. travilled five miles. Camped.

21. Ware met by Colonel Scance and others. held a meeting. Joseph Spoke at lengh. they ware very much affected and some Shed tears. Col. Scance Said if that was their Sentiments he could allmost lay down his life for them.

fishing River had rose so high the mob could not Cross to get to us. it was said it rose 22 feet. Joseph and others went to the River in the morning. I did not go.

At Rush Creek, 23. this night the Cholera broke out and some fell while standing on gard. 24. many were taken. 9 at one time lay round on the flour togeather. at a time thirteen or fourteen Died, a very distressing time, indeed.

Next day went to Lyman Wights and camped.

While on fishing River, Joseph recvd a Revelation that the Strength of the Lords House had not listened to the call, but it was necessary to bring us this far for a trial of our faith, and our offering was excepted, as was Abrihams. you can read the Revelation. here at Lyman Wights, we were disbanded and I Recvd an honorable discharge under the Signature of General Lyman Wight,

7th

and was at liberty to return to my native Land. Some who had not families were Counciled to Stay. While here a brother by the name of Marshel Hubbard sent for me to come and se him. he had the cholera. I started and went a mile or so in Company with Bro. Wm. Carpenter. we came to a small creek where it formed a little Island. there they said lay Bro. Alford Fisk who had just Died with the Cholera. The Cholera struck us all of a Suden. it was all we could do to get bake to camp to Bro. Wights. he and Lyman E. Johnson went out into the hasel brush, laid hands on me, and it all passed off while their hands ware on my head. we then went and seen bro. Hubbard. he got well. We formed a company and in a few days Started for home. ther ware Thirteen in the Company, Bro. brigham Young Captin, Joseph Young Cook. There was only one wagon in the Com. it was very bad crossing the Praries in the hot Siason in August on account of the prairie flies. We tried traveling nights and laying by day times. but we soon had to give that up. before we Started back we Received back of what we had put into the company \$1 5 cts. I put in between \$30 and \$40 dollars. I felt like as Bro. Joseph Young Expressed himself at one time, said he felt to say

like Stephen of old, Lord Jesus receive my Spirit.

(Note: There were no further entries in the Journal for twenty-four years. The Mormons were driven from their homes in New York, Ohio, and Illinois. The Prophet Joseph Smith and many of his followers lost their lives, and Brigham Young led the Saints to the unsettled lands of the far West. Reuben McBride remained with the Church throughout, accepting the decisions of the leaders, and sharing in the hardships. He brought his wife and children to Utah, and established his home in Fillmore in 1850. In 1857, he was called on a mission to England, and left with the first company of handcart missionaries for the East. Again he kept a detailed journal, and recorded events of his journey and mission. Parts of his Journal are given in the following pages.)

Feel very well will get on Shore in about 2 hours Waiting for the tide to run in so as to get over the Bar Got on Shore at 2 P.M. After being toed up the River Mercy by a Steam tug br Ray met us out in the River I met Bro Ray on the Wharf wating for us to Land had a good Shake of hands And I bid adieu to the old

Dredd Nought for time and all eternity, went with Br Ray to the office after going through the Custom house Slept with Br Ray 2 nights found no letters from home was Disapointed

Note: The next forty-three pages of the Journal -- omitted here -- provide a detailed account of the first five months of Reuben McBride's mission in England, from August 4, 1857, to December 29, 1857. Then the entries end abruptly, apparently in an unfinished sentence.

The last part of the Journal, consisting of genealogical records and personal notes, begins just as abruptly, apparently part way through a list of relatives. All this suggests that some pages have been lost.

Genealogical Notes

The following records are given as they appear in Reuben McBride's Journal, though the abrupt beginning suggests that one or more pages are missing. These notes were obviously added long after Reuben's return from England.

- 9. Mabel Whelpley (Reuben McBride visited her in Plainsville, Ohio, in 1857, calling her Aunt Mabel Whelpley.

Also, Abigail McBride was baptized on July 21, 1844, in Nauvoo, for her Grandmother, Abigail Fisk, and for her Grandfather Fisk, though his given name was not recorded.

I RELATIVES OF REUBEN MCBRIDE

Great-Grandparents (Maternal) Enos Mead Paternal grandparents of Abigail Mead McBride, for whom she was baptized on July 28, 1844, Milla Mead in the Nauvoo Temple. The maiden name of Milla Mead has not been found. Maternal grandparents of Abigail Mead McBride, Fisk for whom she was baptized on July 21, 1844, Abigail Fisk in the Nauvoo Temple. Although the given name of her grandfather is omitted, the record proves that Martha, the wife of Gideon Mead, was a Fisk. Actually, her parents were Jonathan and Abigail (Mead) Fisk, of Greenwich, Connecticut. Grandparents Samuel McBride) Reuben notes that his grandparents came from Ireland, and were in Stillwater, N. Y., in

Samuel McBride) Reuben notes that his grandparents came from Margaret McBride) Ireland, and were in Stillwater, N. Y., in 1766. It seems likely that this is the Sam McBride of the Albany County Militia, who was issued ammunition July 26, 1781. (National Archive Record.) In 1790, Margaret McBride, widow, was listed in the Stillwater census.

Gideon Mead) Parents of Abigail Mead McBride, for whom she Martha Mead) was baptized on July 28, 1844, in Nauvoo.

Great-Uncles and Great-Aunts
brothers and sisters of the four grandparents listed above, or
brothers- and sisters-in-law of these four grandparents.

John McBride) A brother and sister-in-law of Samuel McBride.

Susannah McBride) Their marriage is recorded in the Schaghticoke Dutch Reformed Church, five miles from Stillwater, as follows: "13 April 1775, John McBride and Susanna Sempson." Two births are also recorded as follows: "Edward, son of John McBride and Sarah Simson, Aug. 9, 1780"; and "John, son of John McBride and Susanna Simson, April 19, 1782." He was probably the John McBride enrolled in the Albany Militia during the Revolutionary War.

Margaret McBride, whose maiden name may have been Brown. The First Presbyterian Church, N. Y., records the birth of: "James, son of William Cooper and Sarah Brown, his wife, 29 Feb. 1768." And the Schaghticoke Dutch Reformed Church records another birth: Elizabeth Cooper, daughter of William and Sarah (Brown) Cooper, 29 June 1780." William Cooper and his wife were admitted to membership in the newly-organized Presbyterian church in Stillwater in 1793; and five months later, Mrs. McBride, widow, was admitted. William and Sarah Cooper are buried in the Yellow-Meeting-House Cemetery in Stillwater. He died in 1812, and she in 1813.

Michael Mead Enos Mead Mathew Mead Michael Mead was a brother of Gideon Mead.

There is no evidence, except this journal, that
Gideon Mead had brothers Enos and Mathew, though

he did have brothers Levi and William, not mentioned in the journal. Levi had sons Enos and Mathew, who were cousins of Abigail Mead McBride. Either John McBride listed the wrong relationship for these men, or the Mead genealogy is incomplete.

Israel Thompson Milla Thompson Sister and brother-in-law of Gideon Mead. Milla (Millicent) outlived her husband and left a will naming her brothers Gideon, Levi, and William, and some of Levi's children.

Lockwood Smith

Brother-in-law of Gideon Mead, and the husband of Gideon's sister, Nancy Mead.

Jonathan Fisk
David Fisk
Faith Fisk

Jonathan and David were brothers of Martha Fisk
 Mead, and sons of Jonathan and Abigail (Mead)
 Fisk. Faith has not been identified, though she may have been the wife of David Fisk.

Reuben McBride gives birth and death records of his parents, but little else concerning them. Some of their movements may be traced through the

records of their children.
