PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear Family Members:

We are a great family and it has been a special honor to serve as your president.

Many of you know the Belnap Family Organization was invited to computerize their genealogy and several family members have been working to complete this project at the Institute of Family Research.

This project has delayed the publishing of the "CRIER", but I am excited about the potential of the computer to expedite family record keeping and genealogical research.

We appreciate the many family members who have assisted in this project and made it possible to complete it to this point. There is some information lacking on a few of Gilbert Belnap's descendants, but this can be added as the information becomes available and family members can contribute time and money to enter this information in the computer terminal. Hopefully the family will keep this project ongoing.

To give you an idea what this project means to each family member, let me illustrate with an example. If George Max (Ellis Belnap wanted to know his family genealogy information, by calling, writing or visiting the Institute of Family Research and asking a "Who Am I" representative to search for his ancestors and descendants, a printed pedigree chart would be provided. A list of names, birth dates of all of his children, grandchildren and greatgrandchildren would be printed in a minute or two for a fee. As new information is available, one can get it without several people duplicating the same work for individual Books of Remembrance. If our genealogical work is to move forward, I believe the computer will be used extensively to make it possible.

We are planning to have a copy of the complete project of computerized genealogy at the family reunion in August. If you find errors on your family group sheets on the computer print-out, these corrections or added information can be entered by contacting the "Who Am I" Library, 56 W. South Temple, Salt Lake City, Utah 84110, phone (801) 532-4000.

A very special thanks to everyone at the terminal for providing information and encouragement to family members to send in their information. The support has been great.

In this "CRIER" you will find four family group sheets that have the latest and most complete records we have. These sheets include Gilbert

Belnap and Adaline Knight, Gilbert Belnap and Henrietta McBride, Vinson Knight and Martha McBride and James McBride and Betsey Mead. These are provided for your use and to be submitted as part of your personal requirement as the family records due by July 1, 1981 to the Genealogical Department Ancestral File (July 7, 1979 Church News).

We are very much concerned as we come to the closing era of the Belnap Family Organization. If the family officially votes for the termination of this organization, then some of the families of Gilbert Belnap will not have any ancestral ties within their family.

It is our hope for the family representatives of the Gilbert Belnap Family to lead out to see that a new ancestral family organization be established making it possible for descendants of each of Gilbert Belnap's children to keep in touch. In some cases it may be advantageous to establish the new ancestral family organization two generations lower instead of one. Each family should carefully look at its situation and organ-

ize at the generation which best fits its family needs.

All of the family records which Della Belnap has will still be available to family members as need arises. Some of these records are being kept by Gordon and Joy Belnap and their sons, Steven and Brent. Steven and Brent have expressed an interest in continuing the service Della Belnap has graciously performed for the family for so many years. Please include \$1.00 or more to cover costs for duplication and mailing for family records.

If you need help, look to your previous copies of the Belnap Family "CRIER" for the names of the officers over the years, and I am sure any of them will be willing to help if their help is needed.

Due to rising costs in postage and printing, as well as insufficient interest, the Family Officers have decided to disband this phase of the Organization. Those who have been involved over the years with the composition and distribution of the CRIER wish to thank the many who have faithfully paid for, and contributed to, the development of it since its birth. The cover of this last edition is composed of all of the old covers of the CRIER since 1967.


Briefly, the first Family "CRIERS", or newletters, were one page in length, announcing reunions, recent organizational accomplishments and officer changes, as well as items for sale. Entered in the minutes of an officer's meeting held June 8, 1963, it states: "Gordon (Belnap, present editor of the CRIER) presented an outline of a form letter with the news and happenings of the Organization since the new officers were installed. Preparations were made for a copy of the letter to be mailed to everyone." CRIER Number 1 came out in June 1963, printed width-wise on Book of Remembrance size paper. The next 5 CRIERS appeared in the same format as the first. The first major change was CRIER Number 7, printed length-wise on both sides and sent out in December 1966. The CRIER as we know it today appeared in 1967, and has been printed continuously except for the year 1978. In 1977 almost 1,000 people received the CRIER. Over the years, the CRIER has brought family news, historical items. letters, stories, facts, pictures, announcements, and of course, genealogy to the many descendants of Gilbert Belnap in almost every state of the Union. Since its conception, it has been the main money maker of the Belnap Family Organization, making possible coordinated research in England and the funding of reunion notices, postage and printing costs for the succeeding CRIERS. Many times we have sent the CRIER to those to whom we know will not pay for its cost, but we have felt it to be important to every member of the Belnap Family.

Again, we offer our thanks for your support. The publication of the CRIER hasn't been easy. We hope it has met with your approval; a Family paper to be proud of, with the highest quality we can provide. We feel it has kept the Family together for over the past 15

years. As the Family has grown and scattered, its interests have changed. The Church has recently placed emphasis on immediate-family level organizations. We feel it is now the time for members of this noble Family to step back and examine where we should direct our efforts. Through the CRIER we have been able to give you the latest and most up-to-date historical and genealogical information for a nominal cost. Serious talk has been given concerning the disbanding of this ancestral organization, while others feel just as strongly for its continuance. Unfortunately, attendance at reunions and pleas for Family articles goes unheeded, indicating a large lack of interest.

We feel there is much to be gained by continuing the traditions set forth by the early officers of the Family. Perhaps it is time to become acquainted with our many relatives. It seems to be such a waste of money and years of effort by those who have become involved. The time is not far off when such strong family ties that have kept this great, large Family together will be needed again to lift our spirits and buoy our souls in the calamitous events to come.

FAMILY RESPONSIBILITY

FOUR BASIC RESPONSIBILITIES

Members of the Church should understand that they have four basic responsibilities in the area of priesthood genealogy and temple work, and should be emphasized during 1979-1980. These responsibilities are:

- 1. To check for accuracy all information on the four-generation program.
- 2. To compile a meaningful book of remembrance.
- 3. To establish family organizations.
- 4. To complete temple ordinances for the family.

ACCURACY IN THE FOUR-GENERATION PROGRAM

This year accuracy is to be emphasized in the four-generation program. Members should understand that these records will be used in the future as part of the Church-wide effort to compile and perfect all the generations of Adam. Therefore, information on these records must now be checked and rechecked to ensure accuracy.

Every name, date and place on these records should be properly documented. Evidence should be compiled from any and all sources. Accurate records will help us fulfill the injunction found in the Doctrine and Covenants 128:24.

Because of the vast amount of work involved in documenting all four generation information, it will be necessary for families to organize themselves to accomplish the task. Through cooperative family effort work can be divided.

First Assignment:

Church members are to cooperate with other family members in compiling an accurate set of family group record forms for four generations of ancestry. When these records are sent to the Church, only one copy for each ancestral family should be sent. These accurate records will then become the basis for a computer program that will begin to show a lineage-linked picture of ourselves and our ancestors.

Second Assignment:

Since Adam, records have been kept of testimonies, experiences, ordinances, histories and genealogies connected with the family. Such Family Books of Remembrance may be kept in a manner and format decided upon by the family, but they should contain copies of family genealogies, pedigree charts, and personal histories with an emphasis on spirituality.

Third Assignment:

Church members are encouraged to organize for genealogy at three levels:

- 1. Immediate families (with family home evening as its basis).
- 2. Grandparent families (the father and mother, their children whether married or single).
- 3. Ancestral families (descendants of deceased direct ancestor). Strong families are basic in building the Kingdom of God. Grandparent family organizations can coordinate genealogical research to combine family resources in an orderly effort.

Fourth Assignment:

All families should prepare themselves to receive temple ordinances. Eternal blessings for the family can be obtained only in the temples of the Lord. This work applies as much to living family members as it does to the deceased and should begin with the individual himself. Complete temple ordinances for all members of the family on your four generations (as much as possible).

RESEARCH UPDATE

As of August 7, 1978, the research in the counties of Essex and Hertford- The Belnap Family is indebted to the members of the Family who faithshire, England were completed by Brother Frank Smith.

The birth place of the earliest proven ancestor was at Sawbridgeworth, England. The marriage of Abraham and Mary Belknap, who came to America, was found at Latton, Essex, England. Thus, we were allowed to search all parishes within a 10-mile radius of these two towns. This included many parishes. A few would not permit anyone to look at their records.

Mr. A. M. Colliard was the first English researcher who laid the foundation work. He died suddenly of cancer. For a period of time nothing was done in England.

The Family then contacted Brother Jimmie Parker. He checked and double checked the early direct Belknap line in the United States. This proved to be beneficial. With a few corrections, the direct line is as correct as possible. All ordinance work is done.

May 1966 Frank Smith, the director of the English Research for the Genealogy Society of Salt Lake, started directing the work in England. This was expensive but a very successful adventure for the Family. Because of his knowledge of the Old English language and their customs, he was able to confirm and correct the direct line in England. Also he found three grandmothers' lines we did not have.

36 parishes were searched in Hertfordshire; 28 parishes in Essex; 3 parishes in Berkeshire and 2 in Middlesex. A total of 69 parishes were visited and their records checked. Also checked were the records in the Genealogical Library in Salt Lake City, Utah,


Briefly, the following has been accomplished: 384 families were baptized, endowed and sealed; 1,594 couples were sealed to each other; 3,238 individuals were baptized, endowed and sealed to their parents; Total individuals affected 6,426, plus the 384 families. The number of individuals in the families were not counted. Up to 1971 the Society accepted the work as families only. Thereafter the names were accepted as individuals.

fully donated the money to do this work. No one person could have accomplished that much in this period of time.

In a letter dated April 2, 1980 to Gordon L. Belnap from Flora B. Dotson, she mentions the extensive research she has done on the Mead line of the Family. This letter is quoted here explaining her research. Along with this letter is included the family group sheet on James McBride and Betsy Mead with all the sources of research listed on the reverse side.

"For some time I have been engaged in an extensive research project on the Mead Family, which is the line through which both of Gilbert Belnap's wives descend. I have collected documents to prove the information I have, and have written an analysis, which I hope to put in the Genealogical Library in Salt Lake, of Gideon Mead and Martha Fisk, Isaac and Deborah Mead, Nehemiah Mead and Sarah Newcomb families, and hope to be able to finish an analysis of the rest of the Mead families on our pedigree.

I have extended the line of Sarah Newcomb, great grandmother of Henrietta McBride Belnap, whose mother has been shown on Belnap Family Pedigree Charts as Sarah Smith of Kinner. I have proof it was Smith, daughter of John Smith and Elizabeth Kennard (also spelled Kennard and Kinnerd) and carried down through the Mead and Newcomb families as a

given name of Kinner.

Elizabeth's parents were John Kenard (so spelled on the temple record) and Rebecca Spencer. She was a sister to Sarah Spencer who married Stephen Backus (Belnap Chart #16) who was one of the ancestors of Adaline Knight Belnap. They were daughters of Gerard Spencer and Hannah Hills, for whom there is an Archive Record in the Genealogical Department, and the Spencer family is traced back into England. I have not proved this line. There is an error on the Gerard Spencer Archive Record showing John Tanner as Rebecca's first husband, but I have a document which proves he was her second husband and she was married first to John Kenard.

I have three generations back into England on the Walter Butler

line--father of Esther Butler who married Jonathan Mead.

The three last children on the Archive Record of John Mead and Ruth Hardy, parents of Jonathan Mead who married Esther Butler, do not belong there. The settlement of John Mead's estate and the will of his father, John Mead who married Hannah Potter, giving land to his grandson John, provided he pay to his brothers Jonathan and Nathan and his sister Elizabeth money to compensate, proves that John Mead and Ruth Hardy had only four children. You will notice on the Archive Record that the dates of birth of two of the children shown are later than the death date of the father. Further transactions of John and Nathan Mead in Greenwich,

Connecticut and Nathan Smith, and association of Nathan Smith with the Meads in Nine Partners, Dutchess County, New York indicate that Nathan Smith may have been the husband of Elizabeth. Ruth Hardy married (2) Joseph Finch, Sr.

I have just learned of a new book published last year that may give further information on the Meads who came from Greenwich, Conn-

ecticut to Nine Partners, Dutchess County, N.V.

I doubt that Michael Mead who married Freelove Barker, shown on the Belnap Pedigree Chart as great grandparents of Henrietta McBride Belnap, was the son of Enos Mead and Meleason or Millicent. Mrs. Eva Mead Firestone of Upton, Wyoming, who published a book called Mead Clark Genealogy, gave me her papers in 1975. Mr. Paul W. Prindle. Fellow of the American Society of Genealogists, sent me a photo copy of the Nehemiah Mead Bible. He has done extensive research on the Meads, especially the early ones who lived in Greenwich and published a book in the Genealogical Library called The Ancestry of Elizabeth Barrett Gillespie (his wife). Both of these people did considerable research on Michael, Enos Mead's son, and their conclusion was that his wife was Martha Potter (called Patty, a nickname for Martha) and that he was a Revolutionary War Soldier who moved to Ohio and died there. My thinking is that perhaps Michael Mead who married Freelove Barker was the son of Enos Mead's brother Michael. I have a photo copy of the will of Nehemiah Mead Sr. who was the twin brother of Enos, who died in Dutchess County. This will witnessed by Samuel Barker Sr., Samuel Barker Jr., and Freelove Barker. Relationships on Temple Records show that Isaac Mead had a sister Freelove who was sealed to James McBride. Henrietta's father. Isaac also had a daughter Freelove, for whom I have a marriage record, stating Isaac and Deborah were her parents. I also have a handwritten copy of the Isaac Mead Family Bible received from Lawrence N. Mead of Milwaukee, Wis. Further research will need to be done on the Michael Mead and Barker families."



INCIDENT MY FATHER, HYRUM BELNAP, TOLD ME OCTOBER 1931

When the Pioneers first came to Utah an Endowment House was erected. There were so many that wanted their endowments that they couldn't be taken care of. The Church then said that no one should come to this House until an invitation was sent to them. Invitations were sent to the older ones first.

Grandfather had been sealed to his first wife, Adaline Knight, in Nauvoo by Brigham Young and they had received their endowments in the Nauvoo Temple. When he married Henrietta McBride, they were married in Salt Lake City and sealed by Brigham Young. She hadn't received her endowments because it wasn't her turn to get them.

When Grandfather, Gilbert Belnap, and his wives went to get their second ancintings, he was told that the children born before Henrietta received her endowments would have to be sealed to them. Grandfather didn't think it necessary because he had had his endowments and was sealed to Henrietta before they were born. He would not have the work done.

Ten years before Grandfather died, Aunt Henrietta asked Hyrum to see his father about having her first three children sealed to them, as she thought he had more influence with his father than anyone else. Grandfather refused.

Hyrum went to see his father during his last illness and talked to him about his records. He did not succeed in convincing him. Finally he went home. While he was unhitching his horse, his father sent for him to come back.

Grandfather was in the front room with the head of the bed facing the kitchen door. Uncle Frank was sitting by the bed and Grandmother, Adaline, was in the kitchen. Hyrum came in the back door and when he entered the front room, his father sat up and reached over the foot of the bed and grasped Hyrum by the hand and said, "Hyrum, I will hold you back no longer. Take my records and do the work."

Hyrum got out some of the records and went over them with his father. His father died soon after.

Uncle Frank and Uncle Will refused to go to the temple to be sealed even when their mother, Henrietta, pleaded. Henrietta died seven months later in 1899. Uncle Frank said his father knew best. It was about twenty years later before Uncle Frank and Uncle Will were persuaded to be sealed to their parents.

My father, Hyrum, went to Salt Lake City for conference. He separated from the crowd and went to a part of the temple grounds where he could be alone. He was feeling badly because many years had elapsed and some of the children were not sealed and that he couldn't get other members of the family to help in doing the work for their dead.

While standing there meditating, someone slapped him on the back and said, "What is the matter, Uncle Hyrum?" Father turned and saw it was Henry, who then resided at Alamo, Idaho, the son of William Belnap.

Father told Henry why he was feeling so blue. Also that Uncle Oliver was not well and he had come from St. George and was in Salt Lake City and wanted the sealing to his father done, but Uncle Frank and Uncle Will would not listen to their pleadings.

Henry told him to get his recommend and he would get his father and Uncle Frank. He drove to Hooper that day and brought Uncle Frank and his father, William, back with him and the three, Oliver, William and Frank, were sealed to their parents.


