

They are about three hundred miles from Santa Fe - for some time they were in the pass of the mountain; But the severity of the weather renders impossible for them to winter there.

They also were within three days march of a Spanish Fort of eight thousand strong - the name of it I have forgotten - however spies were sent out and reported favourable; And the city was taken without the sound of a gun - by a band of Indians in the morning.

The remainder of the company are at Fort San Felipe sick.

The last news report seven deaths. They ^{were} conducted from fort Leavenworth to San Felipe on a forced march under command of one Smith who seemed to delight in human misery. The particulars of which would be impossible for me to write - But suffice it to say that the severity of the march was the cause of several deaths - men have written back to the camp that they have paid fifty cents for one drink of water and that to fill the pockets of Smith by taking the advantage of their necessities while crossing the Colorado River. coffee Butter and sugar bear the sum one dollar per pound and other articles in proportion.

The capture and deliverance of Brothers Woolsey and Gilfillan is worthy of note - They were taken captives by the Pawnee Indians and condemned to death - in token of all things being in readiness corn was sprinkled between their feet when the chief or prophet as they called him came on the spot and commanded the savages to stay his cruel hand - no doubt to the astonishment of all - And said that the Great Spirit had revealed to him that those two were good men and they must not hurt them - And accordingly unbound from the tree and cond-
