History of the Fourth Primary Association.

The Primary Association of the Fourth Ward, of Ogden, Weber Stake of Zion, was organized Feb. 18, 1879, by Sister Eliza R. Snow, with Amelia M. Frodsham as president, Caroline Ballantyne and Lucinda Moffatt as counsellors; Martha Horspool secretary; Marian Freseder, assistant secretary; and Mariette Farley, treasurer. There were present on this occasion: President Jane S. Richards, and counsellors, Sarah Herrick and Harriet C. Brown; also counsellors Edwin Stratford and Winthrop Farley. The setting apart of these officers did not take place until the 4<sup>th</sup> day of May 1879, at the residence of Pres. Amelia M. Frodsham, she being too sick to attend meeting. May 20, 1879, the first quart

Aug. 27, 1879, Jane Feseder was  
appointed as treasurer, Marriette  
Farley having resigned.

ary conference was held in the Golden

Jan. 24, 1880, Amelia M. Frodsham  
died.

March 10, 1880, the Primary  
association reorganized, with the

following officers:— Martha Anderson  
Brown, pres.; Caroline Ballantyne  
and Harriet Nye, counsellors; Marian  
Treseder, secretary; Nellie Dana, assist-  
ant <sup>secretary</sup>, Jane E. Treseder, treasurer.

Dec. 16, 1882, Upion Richardson  
was appointed assistant secretary in  
the place of Annie Barlow who had  
previously taken the place of Nellie  
Dana.

Aug. 24, 1883, Marian Treseder resign-  
ed her position as secretary and Upion  
Richardson took her place.

Sept. 4, 1885, Martha Brown  
resigned her position as president  
and on the 25<sup>th</sup> of Sept. of the same  
year a reorganization was effected  
with Caroline Ballantyne, president.  
Harriet Nye, and Annie Ballan-  
tyme, counsellors; and on Oct. 16,

1885, Rachel Burton was chosen as secretary.

Nov. 6, 1886, Rachel Burton resigned and Clara Chambers was chosen as secretary and Minnie Watson as her assistant.

In June, 1887, the ward was divided, and in August of the same year the association of the Fourth Ward was organized with Sariah Blair, president; Phoebe Carr and Alice Mau, counselors; Mary Horn, secretary; and Etta Clark assistant.

From March, 1889, to April, 1890, no meetings were held as President Blair had resigned.

April 18<sup>th</sup> 1890, the Primary assoc. was reorganized with Maggie C. Chambers pres. Lillian M.

Stratford, and Edith Goodale coun-  
selors; Susie Beercraft, secretary  
Jane Horspool assistant sec; and  
Josephine Chambers, treasurer.

Dec. 9, 1892, Margaret Bluff  
Hobson, was chosen as second coun;  
Edith Goodale having resigned.

On account of pressing duties  
in other directions Pres. Maggie  
Chambers and coun. Lillian  
Stratford resigned their positions,  
and on April 24, 1896, Sisters  
Josephine R. West, and Rose Can-  
field together with Bishop <sup>Edwin</sup> Strat-  
ford and coun. <sup>Henry W.</sup> Quilliam and  
<sup>Henry</sup> Belcap met with the assoc. and  
appointed the following officers:-  
President - Elizabeth Barrows.  
First Coun. - Maggie C. Hobson.  
Second " - Francis C. Quilliam.

Secretary - Iusie Beecraft.  
Assistant - Nellie Beecraft.  
Treasurer - Grace Jackson.

Since that time no changes

Our enrollment on Dec. 31, 1899 was 149 members with an average of 61. Our financial condition is good & \$20 was donated to the Tabernacle Fair last year. This shows that the children are willing and able to do their part in any undertaking. <sup>But</sup> Owing to lack of room the Primary Assoc. have not been

able to form into classes and do the work assigned to them by the general board.
