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Mrs. Earl Belnap Is Honored By BPW

Sparks Business and Professional Women's Club announced recently that they have selected Emma Lou Belnap as the Golden Rule Mother for the year of 1948.

Mrs. Belnap is well known here and over the state of Nevada for her many church and community activities.

During the first world war she served as a Red Cross nurse overseas in the general base hospital in France and also served in the states before going over seas.

Upon her return to the United States she met her husband, Dr. Earl Belnap and they were married the day he finished his internship at the Grant hospital in Chicago.

Mrs. Belnap has not only had time for the usual home duties but has given her time to her husband in his practice, assisting him in the office and as his nurse. Besides these duties she has given generously of her time to the welfare of children at Montello, where they made their home for some time. In the absence of the state nurse, who visits these towns and could make it but once a year, Mrs. Belnap assisted in checking the children in the interest of their health and safety during the years of 1939 to 1936.

Often through their first years of married life and the first years of the doctor's practice, she assisted him in the deliveries of new babies, in places where they had nothing but lamp light to work by.

From 1932 to 1934 she worked on the Democratic state central committee, traveling over the entire state of Nevada.

She was also instrumental in organizing Troop No. 12 of the Boy Scout Mother's Club in 1938, and is still active in this group. She has just recently served as chairman of the Boy Scout fund drive for 1948.

She has always been active in church affairs, having taught the primary classes in the LDS Church both in Sparks and in Montello. Mrs. Belnap was president of the LDS relief society for six years.

She has been quite active in the interests of the American Legion Auxiliary, Dubv Reid Unit No. 30, having served as president of this organization.

During World War II she took a very active part in the American Red Cross, serving on the Nurses' aid committee, home nursing committee, and was production chairman for several years just before Pearl Harbor.

Her son Bruce Belnap, who is 22 years old, served in the United States navy intelligence department, and is now attending the University of Nevada, majoring in electrical engineering. He is just an Eagle Scout, having just recently received his ten-year badge in scouting.

Mrs. Belnap has also been very active in P-TA work, having been president for one year in the junior high P-TA.

With all of these things, she also finds time to open the doors of her home to the young people at least once or twice a month where they gather for an evening of fun. In this way she keeps them interested in civic and church work, building for a cleaner and better generation of young citizens who will be the men and women of tomorrow.

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
