The vote was very much lighter than preceding years and in some districts only about 50 per cent of the registered vote was polled. One of the most remarkable features of the elecition was the overwhelming defeat of Jedediah Skeen and Charley Richards, the would-be dictators of the Democratic party in Weber county.
