

# CITY SCHOOL LIMITS FIXED

### Boundaries for All Districts Set By Superintendent

School boundaries for the 1923-24 term in the city schools as designated in the superintendent's office were announced today. They provide as nearly as possible for the most convenient accommodations for all school pupils, said Supt. W. Karl Hopkins.

Transfers made last year need not be renewed this year. New transfers must be made through the superintendent's office.

All sophomore pupils who are to attend Senior high school will register at 9 o'clock Wednesday morning. Senior students at the same school will register at 1 o'clock Wednesday, September 5.

All Junior high school pupils, including the Tenth grade pupils of the Central Junior district, will register Friday morning, September 7 at 9 o'clock in their respective buildings.

The elementary school pupils including the 7A pupils at Madison, Grant and Lorin Farr will register Monday, September 10, in their respective buildings.

**SCHOOL BOUNDARIES.**  
The school boundaries follow:  
Senior High: City limits with the exception of Tenth grade pupils, who attended Central Junior last year.

The North Junior High will receive pupils first grade to 8B inclusive. All Junior high pupils in the north of Ogden river will attend this school.

The Central Junior High will receive the 7B pupils who attended Lorin Farr last year. Also all other pupils who attended Central during the school year.

District boundary lines include city limits on the east and west, Ogden river on the north, Twenty-sixth street on the south.

Lewis Junior boundaries will be city limits on the east and west, Twenty-sixth street on the north, Thirtieth street on the south.

**ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS.**  
The elementary school boundaries will be as follows:  
Five Points district will include all territory north of Seventh street with the city limits on the east, south and west.

Mound Fort district will include all territory south of Seventh street and north of Ogden river, except Seventeenth street between Quincy and Washington avenue, which will be the southern boundary lines of these five blocks.

The city limits will be the boundary lines on the east and west.

Lorin Farr district will be bounded on the north by Ogden river, on the east by the city limits, on the south by Twenty-sixth street down to Van Buren.

Beginning at the intersection of Van Buren and Twenty-sixth the western boundary will be as follows: Twenty-sixth to Twenty-fifth along Van Buren, thence west to Jackson along Twenty-fifth, thence north to Twenty-fourth along Jackson, thence west along Twenty-fourth to Quincy, thence north along Quincy avenue from Twenty-fourth street to Ogden river.

Quincy district will be bounded on the north by Twenty-sixth street, beginning at the intersection of Twenty-sixth and Quincy, on the east by the city limits, on the south by Patterson avenue, on the west from Patterson avenue along Madison to Twenty-seventh street, thence east along Twenty-seventh to Quincy, thence north along Quincy to the intersection of Twenty-sixth and Quincy avenue.

Washington district will be bounded on the north by Thirtieth street from Grant avenue to Madison, thence south one-half block along Madison to Patterson avenue, thence east along Patterson avenue to city limits.

The eastern boundary will be city limits, the southern boundary will be city limits. The western boundary will be Lincoln avenue from the city limits to Thirty-second street, thence east one block from Lincoln to Grant, thence north along Grant to intersection of Thirtieth street and Grant avenue.

Pingree district will be bounded on the north by Twenty-seventh street to the intersection of Twenty-seventh and Grant avenue, the eastern boundary will be from the intersection of Twenty-seventh and

Grant along Grant avenue to Thirty-second street, thence west one block along Thirty-second street to Lincoln avenue, thence south to city limits. The southern boundary will be city limits. The western boundary the Weber river.

**OTHER DISTRICTS.**  
Lewis district will be as follows: Beginning at the intersection of Grant and Twenty-sixth street east along Twenty-sixth street to Adams avenue, thence south one block to Twenty-seventh street, thence east one block to Jefferson avenue, thence south one block along Jefferson avenue to Twenty-eighth street, thence east one block along Twenty-eighth street to Madison avenue, thence south along Madison avenue two blocks to Thirtieth street, thence west along Thirtieth street from Madison to Lincoln, thence north along Lincoln to Grant, thence north along Grant to intersection of Thirtieth street and Grant avenue.

Grant district will be bounded on the north by Ogden river, on the west by Weber river, on the east, from the river bridge along both sides of Washington avenue to Twenty-sixth street, thence west one block to Adams avenue, thence north one block to Twenty-sixth street, thence north along Washington avenue, thence north along Washington avenue to Twenty-second street, the place of beginning.

West Ogden district will include territory west of the Weber river within the city limits.

## M'DONALD TO HAVE HEARING

### Deputy Sheriff Says Evidence Piling Up In Sheep Theft Cases

George McDonald, a butcher of Huntsville, charged with the theft of 12 head of sheep from George N. and Ludvic Isard, appeared in city court this morning and his preliminary hearing was set for Wednesday, September 12. The theft was alleged to have occurred in August. McDonald asked for a preliminary hearing. His bail was set at \$1000.

Evidence continues to pile up against McDonald and against accomplices of his, according to Deputy Sheriff O. H. Mohlman who has returned to Ogden from Huntsville where he has been investigating the case.

According to Mrs. Ludovic Isard when the sheep were sent to the range above Shungual flats there were at least 4500 sheep in the bunch and at the same count made recently there were about 500 sheep missing.

Mrs. Isard denied emphatically, said Deputy Sheriff Mohlman, that she had ever told any person that they could take any of the sheep.

She said that the very time the sheep were being stolen she had employed J. C. Ellis, a cousin of her husband, at a memorial hospital for some time past suffering with blood poisoning, to search that section of the country for any stray sheep.

According to Mrs. Isard, she had three days in that section and it was his report to her that aroused her suspicions about the sheep being stolen.

Deputy Sheriff Mohlman said that he expects to get our complaints in the near future for others besides McDonald who are alleged to be implicated in the stealing of the sheep.

The theft of the sheep has created considerable talk in Huntsville and Eden.
