Two young women of Utah will be chosen to attend the "Girls' Nation" at Washington, D. C., on the campus of the American University August 9 to 14, with all expenses paid by the American Legion auxiliary. The selection will be made at the completion of the "Girls' State" registration for which started Sunday at one p. m. at the Utah State Agricultural college.

A class of 105 young women from all parts of the state registered.

They were chosen by the high school faculty for excellence in leadership, character, courage, honesty and scholarship.

The project is sponsored by 80 American Legion auxiliary units and other women's organizations, Business and Professional Women, and faculty members with Mrs. H. C. McShaw, chairman, and Mrs. Russell Rockwell, vice chairman, of the Ogden post.

During the week the young women will be taught the fundamentals of American government and will have training in the various offices of the municipality, county and state.

Gov. Herbert E. Maw, Grover Giles, state attorney general, Dr. Lowry Nelson, professor of sociology at the University of Minnesota, and T. Earl Hunsaker, state highway patrol and others will be guest speakers.

The purpose of "Girls' State" is to promote the love for God and country and to inculcate a sense of individual obligation to the community, state and nation.

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

at the Starlight Gardens on the roof of Hotel Utah, complimenting the affianced couple.

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
