Grand Slam Bids Depend on Hand

When you bid a grand slam and go down one trick you have thrown away your below the line score, your small slam bonus and the value of a game. In addition, you have probably disrupted your partnership and possibly gotten into a losing argument.

Therefore, the first rule in grand slam bidding is: "Don't bid a grand slam unless you are sure of wrapping it up!"

The easiest grand slam to bid is the one where you can count 37 or more high card points. You may not make it but you will find that the odds are really with you.

North has 22 points opposite South's opening no-trump. He knows South has at least 15 so North should waste no time or energy in forcing bids. He just bids the grand slam and relaxes.
