Loss Pegged at \$8,500 In Blaze at Roy Home

ROY—Two 6-year-old Roy boys miraculously escaped from a burning garage Monday afternoon after they dropped a burning match or a lighted firecracker onto a gasoline soaked rag.

The resulting fire in the garage and home of Eugene Sales, 2220 W. 4000 S., caused losses estimated at \$8,500, it was reported today by Roy Fire Chief Orlan Karras.

Members of the Roy Volunteer Fire Department fought the blaze for more than two hours.

Chief Karras said one of the Sales children and a neighbor boy were playing with matches and firecrackers and dropped either the burning match or lighted firecracker onto the rag.

Neighbors said that three minutes

after the youths ran from the garage it and the side of the connecting house were a mass of flames.

When firemen arrived, the flames were shooting 20 feet into the air, Chief Karras said. Just after firemen began playing water on the blaze the gas tanks of two cars in the garage exploded.

Mr. Sales told firemen he had just overhauled one of the vehicles and had been using the gas soaked rag. Stored nearby was a can of gasoline and several cans of paint which blew up shortly after the fire started.

Besides the two cars, over \$1,000 in mechanic tools was destroyed in the garage and extensive smoke and water damage resulted to the rest of the home.

The loss is only partially covered by insurance, Chief Karras said.

District Preparing For Water Election

Not only have costs on all items gone up since the Weber Basin project was started in 1952, but many additional acres of land have or will be brought under benefits of the system.

This was explained by E. J. Fjeldsted, manager of the Weber Basin Water Conservancy District, as his office continued with preparations for a special election at which voters will be asked to authorize an increase in the system costs of around \$24 million.

The election will be June 24 in Weber, Davis, Morgan and Summit counties. Qualified voters who paid a property tax in the district in the year preceding the election may vote on the issue.

"But water users will not pay higher unit costs or rates if the election is successful, because of the greater demand for water from industry, other commercial users, and the many additional customers to serve," he added.

Also, he said, many lands that were used for farming when the district was formed nine years ago now are used for residential and industrial purposes, with the result that more water is used under a higher schedule of fees.

Sewer Charges For Industry To Be Decided

A survey will be made soon by Central Weber Sewer District to determine an equitable procedure for charging industrial plants hooked into the system.

Trustees discussed necessity for conducting the survey during their meeting Monday night.

Under present procedure, industrial plants are charged on the basis of water consumption. But devices to accurately measure volume and concentration of disposals are needed to distribute the charges fairly, officials said.

Nearly 20 industrial plants were represented at a recent meeting where the proposed survey and its goals were discussed by Paul Bolton, Omaha, Neb., sewage plant engineer.

Attending were representatives of packing houses, railroads, poultry, livestock, dairy, and other firms, whose plants release large volumes into the sewage treatment plant in Slaterville.

Doreen B. Boyce, chairman of the trustees, said the matter would be discussed with Ogden City officials before further steps are taken to set up the measuring devices.

Workers Building Stage In Park for 'All Faces'

Construction of the three-tier natural stage for the July 21, 22 and 23 production of "All Faces West" at the Fourth Street Park is proceeding rapidly.

Bankers, accountants, an attorney and others in overalls have been welding shovels to get the earth and stone stages ready for the 11th annual production of the play.

The first tier will be about 90 feet long, some 17 feet deep; the second about 75 feet long, 12 feet deep and the third, and topmost, will be about 45 feet by 12 feet.

The stages will be about four feet above each other with the faces finished in natural stone, which some day will be covered with a native grass for strength and added color.

Present plans call for free parking areas to the east and west of the stage capable of holding 3,000 cars.

Viewers will be seated in chairs

on the green park area below and to the north of the stage. All action on stage will be to the south and above the audience so that all seats will afford a good view of the play.

Gordon Belnap, chairman of the pageant committee, said he wished the concept held by many people that All Faces West is a "piece of Mormon pageantry" would be dispelled.

He said to consider it more an American saga would be a better view. There is no doctrine of the church in the story, he said. He compared it to historical plays on the arrival of the Pilgrims to the American shore.

Mr. Belnap said the pageant of the Mormon pioneer's trek into Utah has had more than 100,000 paid admissions in its first decade. Present plans call for free seating in a covered pavilion to the east of the park for shut-ins.
