Counseling and Testing Can Decide Your Future

Your case is typical. Most college students do not know what they want to be. Even many of those who say they have definitely decided about the future may revise their ideas several times before their college training is over.

Job experiences usually are so limited and job opportunities are so numerous a person simply can-not know, in most cases, in what direction he will eventually go.

Here are some things a student should do if he is not sure: 1.-Think positively. Know that a decision will be made although it may be delayed a little while.

2.-Take an interest inventory test from his school counselor or college testing bureau. Have a trained counselor interpret it. 3.-Take a reading test and an

or its equivalent. Have these interpreted by a trained person. 4.—Talk with some of his teachers and counselors, as well as his parents, about the overall problem and about some developing fields or areas, as well as about ones' own

qualities and talents.

5.—If, after discussing with his counselor his potential for success in college, the student enrolls in college and takes the basic first two years of broad, general education, he may be able to choose from many different courses in filling these groups in four broad subject matter fields.

The four big groups include: humanities, life science, physical sci-

ence and social science.

The student could then talk with each of his college instructors about possibilities of job areas in relation to his own interests and qualifications. He will gradually develop some definite interests without losing any time.

6.-Talk with successful people about the professions or vocations they represent. List several questions. Then ask these of qualified

7.—Have confidence in oneself and in this great nation. Seldom, if ever, in the history of the world, have there been as many opportunities

Here are some things a student should not do if he is unsure of what he wants to be:

GROW BY MISTAKE

1.-He should not be so afraid of making a mistake that his ability to think or act is impaired. No one can be definitely sure all of the time. People grow by deciding and by making mistakes.


2.-He should not be negative or pessimistic because he is unsure. Negative thinking might lead to dis-

3.-He should not follow his father's vocation or that of any other relative or friend just because that is the only one he knows, without considerable investigating. However, many fathers have developed excellent opportunities for their sons and daughters. These opportunities should not be ignored.

Maturity and time in this decision are needed. (Incidentally, college helps one in the military also, by offering the first two basic years of broad, general education.)




