

FOUL PLAY FEARED AS MAN MISSING ON CORINNE HUNT

A Weber County man who went to Corinne at noon Sunday to hunt pheasants was missing today, and the Box Elder County sheriff said he was investigating the possibility of foul play.

The missing man is Elbert J. Stephenson, 56, of 1879 N. 2300 W., in Farr West. His disappearance was reported by a son, Bud Stephenson of 2606 Fillmore.

The younger Stephenson notified authorities after he saw what he believed to be his father's car, a pink and gray 1957 model.

The son said he came across the car near Nye's Corner about 11:30 p.m. Monday. There were four occupants inside, he said, but when he pulled next to it, the driver sped away.

Box Elder Sheriff Warren W. Hyde said this morning a search would begin after the son comes to his office about noon today.

Bonding Firm to Handle Well Drilling at Terrace

WASHINGTON TERRACE — A bonding company has agreed to assume responsibility for the unfinished contract to drill a culinary water well at Washington Terrace, Mayor Stanley Poulsen said today.

Drilling of the well by the Technical Services, Inc., Provo, was halted by the firm several weeks ago because of trouble with rock strata found in the shaft.

The Terrace contract with the Provo firm was for \$31,000. The Terrace City Council had paid \$7,650 on the contract, but refused

to remit additional claims until the trouble was straightened out, the mayor said.

The Council was authorized by its bonding company to employ another well drilling outfit, the J. S. Lee and Co., to determine what steps are necessary to complete the well, Mayor Poulsen said.

AWAITS INFORMATION

The council is now awaiting that information from the Lee officials. The company sent a crew to the site last week.

"The council has declared the contract with Technical Services, Inc., to be in default, and as a result, the city is being sued for \$29,000 by Technical Services," Mayor Poulsen said.

"The council feels everything will be straightened out in favor of the city, and that the well project will be finished without costing the city more than the \$31,000 specified in the original contract."

Officer Fired From Force

An Ogden officer, who was booked Friday for alleged assault on a 13-year-old girl, was dismissed from the police force Monday night.

Police Chief Golden Jensen ordered the dismissal of Officer Benjamin Rendon, 22, 216 N. Eccles. He had been in uniform about a year.

Chief Jensen said the investigation of the case is still going on by members of the detective division. Statements and evidence will be turned over to the Weber County attorney "today or Wednesday," the chief said.

City Manager Edward L. Carlsen said today Officer Rendon has five days in which to file a written appeal from the chief's order. Such an appeal must be directed to the city manager.

Mr. Belnap also disclosed that final auditing of receipts for this year showed a \$4,333 profit, the best on record for the 11-year-old show.

A total balance in the bank of \$8,301 is, according to Mr. Belnap, a composite of this year's profits, surplus from 1960, and trust funds.

Net worth of "All Faces" was estimated at \$16,870. According to the financial summary this breaks down to the cash funds on deposit, equipment, costumes, scenery and other assorted stage gear.

Ticket sales this year accounted for \$17,103 of a total income of \$20,074. The dollar sum represents 11,802 paid admissions.

City, Schools Cooperate To Help Palsy Children

Cerebral palsy is a parent's sorrow and a community's responsibility.

Ogden is the Utah community that has done the most to meet this problem, and much of the credit is due the Ogden Area Cerebral Palsy Association.

Even more important is the program conducted at Gramercy Elementary School where approximately 30 educable children afflicted with cerebral palsy and related diseases attend classes.

The program is conducted jointly by the city schools and the association with the city providing two teachers, a speech therapist and all school supplies. The association supplies a matron, an assistant teacher, two bus drivers and special services and equipment.

2 BUSES MAINTAINED

Two buses are maintained by the Utah Society for Crippled Children and the aid provided by social club donations has been invaluable. The state provides a physical therapist once a week.

Until 12 years ago, children with cerebral palsy were generally left helpless. Parents formerly kept them home and usually provided for their every need, even to feeding and dressing them.

Now many of the 30 students at Gramercy will fit into the regular school system after maybe two or three years. For less educable children, the association provides transportation to the Weber County Children's Care and Training Center. This day care center for retarded children has about 99 cerebral palsy victims currently enrolled.

VA to Close Local Office On Dec. 29

Ogden's Veterans Administration office will go out of business Dec. 29, after more than 16 years of operations, the Veterans Administration in Salt Lake City said today.

It will be one of 161 one-man operations across the country closing on that date. This will leave 33 of an original 1,049 like offices still in service from post-World War II days. A gradual reduction in the original number brought the total to 196 such offices until the order received by the VA Regional Office in Salt Lake City, on Monday.

Plans are for a part-time operation in Ogden, a VA aide in Salt Lake City said this morning. This will be set up some time after the closing date of the present operation here.

The aide said his office received a letter from Philip Brownstein, chief benefits clerk, in Washington, D.C., notifying them of the closing. A copy of the letter was also mailed to Sen. Wallace F. This brought a reduction in the number of applicants and the number of offices needed, the letter said.
