\$279,000 Blind School Building Dedicated During Ogden Ceremony

A former teacher of the blind said Friday night that handicapped people succeed not in spite of their handicap but because of their ability. "That is why we should stress the strengths and abilities of handicapped people, not their differences," said Mrs. Vera Gee, chairman of the Governor's advisory Council to the Schools for the Deaf and Blind. Mrs. Gee was one of the speakers at ceremonies dedicating the new classroom building at the School for the Blind as a monument to community willingness to help the handicapped. The \$279,000 building has four large and six medium sized classrooms, a braille library, music room, two offices, home economics room, general arts and crafts area and a drafting room. Also speaking at the ceremony were Supt. Robert W. Tegeder and Dr. Marion G. Merkley, Utah superintendent of public instruction. Dr. Merkley delivered the principal address for Gov. George D. Clyde who was unable to attend because of illness. Dr. Merkley said the greatest miracle of this age is the ability of man to assemble the resources of the earth for his benefit. He urged all people to "rub the magic lamp" by which training is made available to handicapped people so they can lead useful lives. The history of the School for the Blind and special education programs in the state was traced by Elwood Pace, state director of special education. Supt. Tegeder said the new building gives the blind students a facility separate from the deaf which Mrs. Gee said "will mean a great deal to them." Mrs. Gee said there is "greater differences between blind and deaf students than there is between blind and normal students."

S. L. Pauses To Observe Veteran Day

Organizations participating in the program included the United Veterans Council which comprises the United Spanish War Veterans, the Veterans of Foreign Wars, the Disabled American Veterans, the American Legion and the Canadian Legion.

Various high school bands and color guards from various ROTC units also took part. On Sunday morning, memorial services are planned in Memory Grove park in Salt Lake City. Mrs. Morton B. Tice, national president of the Ladies Auxiliary of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, will speak.

The seventh annual concert of the 23rd Army Band of the Utah National Guard will be held Monday night at Highland High School. Maj. Gen. Maxwell E. Rich, Utah adjutant general, will deliver a short address.
