'19-Year-Old' Really 15, Referred to Youth Court

A youth captured after a 20-mile bullet-punctuated chase was turned over to juvenile authorities late Saturday when police learned he was only 15 instead of 19.

Dennis Robert Baker, the son of Mrs. Evan LeRoy Jones, 5632 S. 2200 W., Roy, was taken into justice court in Riverdale on several charges Saturday afternoon.

Riverdale police chief Wesley Woolsey said it was then discovered that the suspect was only 15. He had an allegedly false driver's license giving his age as 19.

He faced charges in Riverdale for alleged reckless driving and attempting to elude an officer. Ogden police intend to charge him with alleged automobile theft. The car which he drove into a ditch on the South Weber road at the

end of the chase had been stolen earlier Saturday night at the White City Bowling Center, Chief Woolsey said.

OTHER CHARGES

The Riverdale chief said Roy also intend to file charges against the youth for alleged automobile theft. He reportedly had taken another car earlier in the evening at a bowling alley in Roy, had run out of gas on the South Weber road and had ditched it, then hitchhiked back to Ogden.

Also the Utah Highway Patrol plans to charge the youth for alleged reckless driving.

When he crashed into the ditch in South Weber he received a broken left arm. He was taken to the Dee Hospital by Chief Woolsey.

AGE REVEALED

After treatment he was released to the Riverdale chief for arraignment before Alexander Carlson, justice of the peace in Riverdale. At the time of arraignment it was learned he is only 15.

Ogden officers intended of questioning the youth Saturday and then place him in juvenile detention.

Young Baker was sent to the Utah Industrial School in May of 1960 after he had been charged with several car thefts and burglaries, according to Supt. Claude Pratt of the institution.

He was paroled from the school Aug. 19.

Idaho Hunter Hospitalized For Frostbite

A Montpelier, Idaho hunter was reported in fair condition in Dee Hospital Saturday night after spending 15 hours in below freezing weather on an isolated road.

Lawrence Larsen, 45, was reported resting comfortably. He suffered exposure and frostbitten feet.

Mr. Larsen was found Friday sitting in an upright position beside the road 22 miles from Montpelier. He was unable to move his legs.

He apparently had been hunting when his car stalled late Thursday. He climbed back to the road and apparently fell asleep.

Mr. Larsen was found Friday morning by Ross Clark of Montpelier who was checking property in the area.

Firemen said the apartment is occupied by Paul Malan. The place was filled with smoke for a time. Total damage was slight.

Utah Pianist to Play In Wednesday Concert

Piano virtuoso Reid Nibley and the Utah Symphony Orchestra under the baton of Maurice Abravanel will team up Wednesday night to offer Ogden music lovers the third symphony concert of the 1962-63 season.

The concert, under the auspices of the Ogden Symphony Guild, will begin at 8:30 p. m. in the auditorium at Ogden High School.

The box office will open at 7 the evening of the concert. Single admissions are \$2, \$2.50 and \$3.50 with students admitted for half price. Some season tickets are still available on a prorated basis.

Mr. Nibley returns to the Ogden concert stage by popular demand after just completing a tour of California, Arizona, Washington and Utah with Tossy Spivakovsky.

The artist is a native of Santa Monica, Calif., but has adopted Utah as his home.

He began studying for his career at the age of 8 and four years later made his debut with the Glendale Symphony Orchestra. At 17, he was featured piano soloist with the Los Angeles Philharmonic Orchestra.

After continuing his studies in the east, he was featured in New York City in a Town Hall recital in 1947. His career then took him on extensive tours through the United States, Canada and Europe.

For 10 years Mr. Nibley was official pianist for the Utah Symphony during which time he appeared as soloist over 30 times, playing some 23 concerts.

Wednesday's program will include the works of American contemporary composer Goldmark. With the keyboard touch of Mr. Nibley and the baton artistry of maestro Maurice Abravanel, the Utah Symphony Orchestra will open the program with Goldmark's colorful "Rustic Wedding Symphony."

Ogden Police to Host Seminar On Burglary for Area Officers

Law enforcement officers from throughout Weber County are scheduled to meet in Ogden Tuesday for a seminar on burglary investigation.

The daylong seminar is being conducted by the Ogden Police Department training branch in the Ogden City-Weber County Health Center.

Sessions are scheduled to begin at 8 a. m. and run through 4:30 p. m.

Detective Lt. LeRoy Jacobsen said the seminar is part of the police department's regular training program.

Discussions will cover the col-

lection and preparation of evidence and its presentation in court.

Speakers will be graduates of the FBI Academy; representatives of the county and district attorney's office and a city judge.

The session will get under way at 8 a. m. with a discussion of the preliminary investigation of a burglary by a uniformed officer.

The instructor will be Captain Dewey J. Fillis of the Salt Lake City Police Department.

Lt. LeGrand J. Baker of the Provo Department will discuss the investigation of burglaries by detectives and case preparation for court.

The afternoon session will begin with a discussion of the collection, identification and preservation of physical evidence by Lt. Clarence Evans of the Salt Lake County Sheriff's identification bureau.

Court procedures will be discussed by Max Lamph, attorney, and City Judge Charles Sneddon.

Mr. Lamph will outline what is expected of a police officer at arraignments and preliminary hearings. Mr. Newey will discuss the same subjects in relation to a trial in district court.

Judge Sneddon will discuss the dress, action and conduct of a police officer in court.

Center Will Show Public Its Program

No special observance of National Alcoholism Information Week is planned for Ogden but the public is invited to attend a meeting at the Alcoholic Rehabilitation Center at 529 25th.

Albert Hogan, director of the center, said Saturday the meeting will be held Monday at 8 p. m.

"We will welcome visitors to see our facilities and learn about our program of rehabilitation for alcoholics," Mr. Hogan said.

Current figures show that Utah has 13,800 alcoholics of whom 2,800 are women.

The average age at which individuals seek or are sent for treatment of alcoholism in Utah is 35 as compared to the national average of 45 years.

It has been estimated that alcoholism costs Utahans an estimated \$7 million annually in industrial and professional losses, lost wages, accidents, welfare, hospital and custodial services.

The average annual consumption of alcoholic beverages in Utah is 15.28 gallons while the national average is 25.17 gallons.

Utah's 2 New Congressmen Given HAFB Tour, Briefing

Utah's two congressmen-elect said Saturday the expansion of the Hill Air Force Base space-age role will be one of their primary concerns in Congress.

Republicans Laurence J. Burton of Ogden and Sherman P. Lloyd of Salt Lake City said they were "highly impressed" by a tour of the base and a briefing of its missions.

Mr. Burton will represent Utah's First District and Mr. Lloyd the Second District in the 89th Congress. Their visit to the huge air base was part of a program to familiarize themselves more thoroughly with activities in the state that will be involved in legislative matters scheduled to come before the new Congress.

Both congressmen will be concerned with Hill AFB because of its impact on the state's economy as its largest single employer. The base is situated in both districts and its 14,000 employees live in both districts.

The two congressmen-elect said

they were impressed by the "high level of proficiency with which the employees are accomplishing their mission."

Maj. Gen. Don Coupland and his staff briefed the two on missions, resources and future plans.
