Will Be Honored

Honorary Law Degree
Awaits Prominent MD

Dr. George M. Fister, prominent Ogden physician and past president of the American Medical Association, will receive an honorary doctor of law degree at University of Utah commencement exercises Monday evening.

A native of Logan, Dr. Fister came to Ogden in 1928 to establish a practice as a urologist. In distinguishing himself in that field, Dr. Fister has written a number of papers that have received world-wide attention.

He played a leading role in organizing the Ogden Surgical Society and in developing its annual scientific meetings into one of the most prominent surgical events in the nation. He also is a past president of the medical association.

For several years he has been clinical lecturer in surgery at the University of Utah College of Medicine which he serves as regent.

Dr. Fister is a past president of both the Weber County Medical Association and the Utah Medical Association.

Storm Hits
North Utah;
Power Out

Lightning, Rain
Sweep Through
Scattered Area

A brief, but violent and spectacular lightning and thunderstorm swept through parts of northern Utah Saturday night about 7.

Power and telephone company officials reported lines damaged by trees and service out temporarily in widely scattered areas. No estimate of damage was available but it could run into thousands of dollars.

LIGHTNING STRIKES

Power was out for two hours in Roy, apparently the result of lightning striking a transformer, and a bolt struck the residence of Rev. Warren Meyers, 2066 W. 4750 S. Firemen said the lightning struck outside, traveled down an outlet causing a fire which scorched the walls. About \$50 damage was caused.

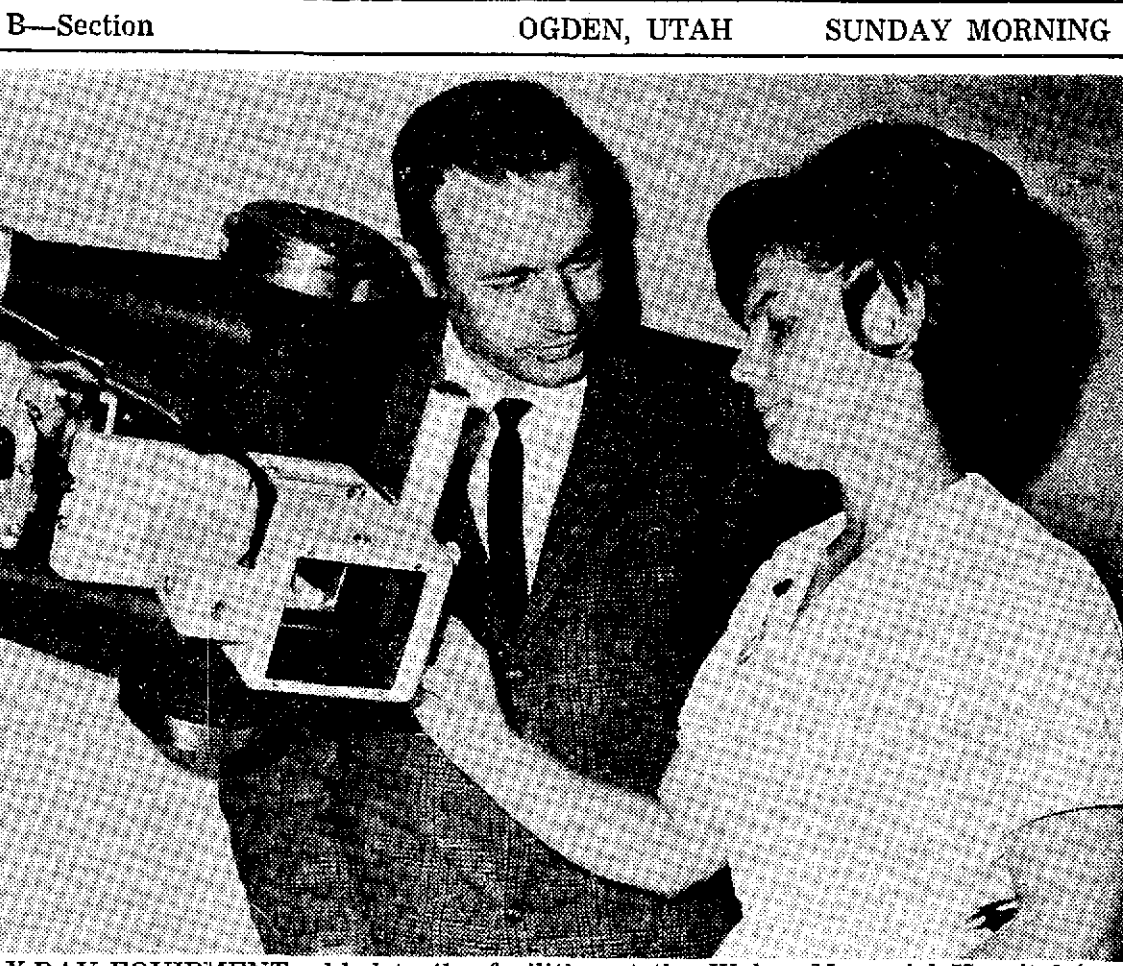
Another bolt of lightning struck near the Hot Springs station of the State Highway Patrol and darkened lights along US 89-91.

LOTS OF WATER

Gutters overflowed at numerous locations in Ogden, especially in the Five Points area.

A flash flood took out the front yard and retaining wall in Liberty and there were reports the Nordic Valley road was washed out.

Considerable damage also was reported in North Ogden and Pleasant View. A cloudburst struck the area about 8 p.m.

LANDSCAPING MOVES AHEAD

Municipal Park Play
Equipment Installed

Playground equipment in the west city park downtown has been installed in the first phase of an improvement program.

Commissioner Jen A. Patterson, in charge of parks for Weber County, said that the swings, slides and play bars are in the area from which the Air Force Minuteman missile was recently moved.

Future plans include a bandshell where concerts and talent shows may be held during the summer months.

The play equipment is available to children living in downtown areas who can not utilize other city or county parks because of distance.

Mr. Patterson said that permanent landscaping of the park areas has been under way more than a month under the direct supervision of Arvin Shreeve, county parks superintendent, and that a new night lighting program has been worked out to beautify floral and other displays.

Soon to be completed is an oriental section of the East Gardens with a 14-foot decorative Japanese bridge over an artificial pond.

Two other areas in this part of the gardens are set aside for permanent themes such as colonial and tropical. Mr. Shreeve said, resulting in economy and an increase in quality in the park operation.

Patterned flower beds and shrubs will decorate the colonial area, and a "bonsai" dwarf tree collection in the making for some 10 years will soon be in place.

The project is a joint Ogden City-Weber County operation with the expense shared equally to make the gardens attractive for citizens and tourists alike.

The official name of the municipal parks area is now the Ogden-Weber County Municipal Gardens and the area is divided into east and west gardens.

Roy Hospital
Adds X-Ray
To Services

ROY — X-ray services are now available for the public at the Weber Memorial Hospital, administrator Grant Horsley announced Saturday.

The new department will be under direction of Mrs. Verl Hansen, registered X-ray technician, with Dr. Warren B. West, radiologist, reading the negatives.

Services will be available for all general and radiographic type X-ray, except fluoroscopy and die examinations, the administrator said.

Patients must have referrals from their private physicians and hours will be by appointment operated on an out-patient clinic type basis, he said.

A technician will bon 24-hour call and appointments may be made by calling the hospital, 825-9731.

Mr. Horsley said this is another step in an expanding public service program at the hospital. This service should save much time and be of convenience to residents of Roy and North Davis County who in the past traveled to Ogden for such a service, he said.

City Ready to Open
Summer Recreation

Just about everything from baseball to band concerts is planned for the summer recreation program sponsored by Ogden City which begins officially Monday.

All but three playgrounds — Grandview, Lester and Liberty parks — will begin their activities Monday and continue until school opens in the fall.

Among the special events scheduled by the city recreation department, headed by Ernest Shreeve, will be Hobo Day, Junior Olympics, a queen contest and the Kiddies Parade in conjunction with Pioneer Days celebration.

The annual Lagoon trip is planned for June 26.

CITY DIAMONDS

Kids baseball will begin with regular league play Monday on city diamonds and the annual state all-star game will be the same day at Affleck Park. Proceeds will be used to improve facilities of the baseball program.

Tennis lessons will be given free at all city courts during the summer. Schedule will be announced at a later date.

The annual July 4 fireworks extravaganza, financed by the Retail Division of the Greater Ogden Chamber of Commerce, will light the skies around Affleck Park beginning at 9:30 p.m.

Sunday evening "Pop" concerts begin June 15. Appearing during the summer will be the Davis Honor Orchestra and the Weber High School Band. Concerts will be held in Municipal Park.

1,200 Sign
For Summer
Class Work

A near record enrollment in summer school classes was reported Saturday by the Ogden School District.

Already 1,200 have enrolled at the secondary school level, with the majority registered for music, typing, food preparation and sewing.

Enrollment in the elementary classes was 425 as of Saturday. Most of these children plan to study arts and crafts and reading.

Russell Carruth of the Ogden School District administrative staff said the schools are not restricted to Ogden City and residents outside the city can sign up for the classes at the same fee.

Most of the registration took place Thursday but Mr. Carruth said students can sign up the opening day of summer school Monday.

Secondary class registrations are being taken at Mount Ogden and Highland junior high schools. Elementary pupils can register at the Madison or Gramercy schools.

One of the interesting classes in the secondary division is field biology with a good deal of the time to be sent out of doors.
