Correct Adhesion With Operation?

 Dear Dr. Molner: I had a bladder operation five years ago. Recently I have had sharp pain and soreness in the vagina and the doctor said it is adhesion — that nothing can be done but surgery. He did not advise that, however. He said to take pain pills and hope it will go away, but they don't help. What is your opinion?—A. W.

In the healing process after an operation, some of the tissues may attach themselves a little differently — the surfaces adhere, and grow together. There may have been some sagging, or you may have taken on weight, or some other change may have occurred after five years by putting strain on these adhesions and causing the pain. It is true, as your doctor said, that surgery is the only way to correct these adhesions — it sometimes has to be done following an operation. Whether to have this subsequent surgery depends on a number of things: Your age, your general physical condition, the amount of discomfort, the question of whether the adhesions are in a location to do any real harm, or are merely causing discomfort. I cannot say whether the pain will disappear. Your doctor is in a better position to speculate on that. Some further stretching of the tissues may, in time,

Fruits Add Zing to Cool Drink

 Here's a combination of tropical fruits, served in tall glasses, for the autumn porch or patio party. It's equally delicious on a fire escape if that's the coolest spot available.

The second recipe, Cranberry Pineapple Zing, has a Cape Cod as well as a tropical ingredient.

PINEAPPLE SAMOAN NOG
 1 (8½-oz.) can crushed pineapple
 2 small bananas
 ½ teaspoon salt
 1 (1-pt., 2-oz.) can pineapple juice

Start with chilled ingredients. Turn undrained crushed pineapple, peeled bananas, salt and half of pineapple juice into electric blender.

Whirl at high speed until blended. Add remaining pineapple juice and whirl a second longer. Pour into serving glasses. Makes 5 or 6 servings.

CRANBERRY PINEAPPLE ZING
 1 qt. cranberry juice cocktail
 1 can (12-oz.) unsweetened pineapple juice
 Sugar to taste
 Four 2 cups of cranberry juice into ice cube tray. Freeze until solid. Combine remaining cranberry juice and pineapple juice. Sweeten to taste with sugar.

Place cranberry juice ice cubes in glasses and fill with cranberry-pineapple juice mixture. Garnish with mint sprigs. Makes 4 to 6 servings.

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JACOBY ON BRIDGE

Careful Trump Handling Pays

 Declarer at a suit contract wants to draw trumps in order to keep his opponents from ruffing some of his side suit winners and the general rule is to pull trumps as soon as you can afford to do so.

You can't afford to pull trumps when you need dummy's trumps to ruff some of your side suit losers.

Occasionally you may need them to keep your opponents from forcing you to use up one of your own trumps.

SIMPLE WAY
 There is a simple way for South to play his four spade contract. He can ruff the second heart and go right after the trump suit.

If trumps break 3-3 he will concede a trick to the ace of clubs and make five odd. Trumps break 3-3 sometimes but a 4-2 break is more likely.

They break 4-2 this time and the simple play is not going to work.

South will run out of trumps before he gets time to set up a club trick and will lose his contract.

He will be able to blame the loss on that unfortunate trump division but the real reason will be poor trump management.

South must not go after

 trumps until he has knocked out the ace of clubs or at least played clubs once.

It is all right for him to ruff the second heart. Then he must lead a club. If East ducks, South abandons the suit and runs out his contract with spades and diamonds. If East takes his ace of clubs and leads a third heart South must discard so as to retain four trumps. Then if East leads still another heart South will be able to ruff in dummy.

This play gives up the chance to make an overtrick but who cares about overtricks when the contract is in danger!

SALT LAKE CITY — Mr. and Mrs. Arias G. Belnap of Salt Lake City, formerly of Ogden, will be honored Saturday at a reception on the occasion of their 50th wedding anniversary.

The event will be hosted by the couple's sons and daughters, and they request that gifts be omitted.

The couple was married in September, 1916 in the Salt Lake LDS Temple. During World War I, they lived in San Francisco, Calif., where Mr. Belnap was employed at the Naval Training Center.

They returned to Ogden, and were engaged in the retail lumber business, until it was destroyed by fire.

COUNTY TREASURE
 Elected to the position of Weber County treasurer, Mr. Belnap served in that capacity until his appointment by Governor W. W. Clyde as a member of the State Tax Commission in April 1957. He retired in April, 1965. He was listed in Marquis' "Who's Who of the West."

He served as vice president and president of the Utah State Association of County Officials and was legislative committee chairman for 10 years thereafter. He was the first county official to receive the Mark Tulle Award for outstanding service.

Was chairman of the committee that prepared the State Public Employees Retirement Act of 1961.

ACTIVE IN CHURCH
 Active in the LDS Church, Mr. Belnap served a Southern States Mission, served as bishop of the Twentieth LDS Ward for 17 years, and in the Ogden Stake presidency for 14 years.

Mr. Belnap was born in Hooper Sept. 6, 1893, a son of Hyrum and Anna Bluth Belnap.

Mrs. Belnap, a daughter of the late Judson Nathan J. and Emma Oakason Harris, was born March 20, 1894 in Ann Arbor, Mich.

Active in the LDS Church, she has served as secretary in the Ward Primary, Sunday
