DR. RULON R. GARFIELD To Speak Here

Region HEW Director To Speak Here Friday

Dr. Rulon R. Garfield, former Ogden educator and now regional director of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, will speak at a banquet in the Chuck-A-Rama, 3225 Washington, Friday at 7:30 p.m.

The event is being sponsored by the Ogden Area Community Action Committee to honor James A. Felsted, director of the agency for five years until he resigned in September to enter private business.

Reservations for the dinner may be made prior to noon Friday by telephoning 399-9281. Tickets for the meal are \$2.75 each.

Dr. Garfield, a native of Harrisville, was director of educational services for Ogden City School District prior to accepting appointment as deputy director of HEW's Region 8 office in Denver, Colo., a year ago.

He was named director last month. As an Ogden educator, he also

served as a consultant to school groups in Western states. In 1969, he was appointed to the Utah Senate by Gov. Calvin L. Rampton.

HEW administers programs in education, social rehabilitation research, and social services, health and mental health services, civil rights, model cities and intergovernmental and community affairs.

In 1966-67, he served as a special staff assistant to then-president Richard M. Nixon.

Mr. Felsted was named assistant director of Community Action in 1965 and promoted a year later to executive director. His successor is H.C. Massey who is in charge of arrangements for the Friday banquet.

'Civic Club Movement Not Lead, Says Former Lion Club Official

A past-international director of Lions clubs predicts the future of Lionism is greater than ever and declares the civic club movement is not dead but will grow with universal commitment.

James A. Lundberg of Provo, who served in high offices of Lions International, spoke at the club's 50th anniversary dinner in the Weber State College Student Union.

Some 250 persons attended, including officers of Ogden Rotary and Exchange clubs, County Commissioner William S. Moyes, Dist. Gov. Gordell B. Brown of Farmington, Lions and their wives from other clubs. Ogden Lions president D. Frank Wight presided.

A highlight was the presentation to Trace A. Turner his 40-year membership certificate, marking his continuous service with Ogden Lions.

A PRELUDE

Film strips, arranged by Gordon L. Belnap, served as a prelude to the banquet, showing civic and humanitarian projects carried out by Ogden Lions since the club's founding.

Lions have focused attention on the visually handicapped, maintaining annual projects to

assist the blind and sponsoring White Cane Day. Mr. Lundberg recognized the universality of Lions and the international organization's contributions to mankind through the promotion of peace and understanding among all peoples.

NEW VISTAS

Lions clubs in other countries have opened new vistas, giving hope to people and demonstrating Lionism as a fine tool for humanitarianism, Mr. Lundberg said.

Although membership has declined 10 to 15 per cent over the past 15 years, Lions continue to commit themselves, whether it be in world affairs, national problems, community needs or to the welfare of their neighbors he added.

Mankind is about the same all over, Mr. Lundberg said.

SAME OBJECTIVE

"People may be of different skin, different religions but nearly all have the same objective: to raise a family and be patriotic," the speaker said.

Needed is improved communication among people. Lions who function fulfill this need, Mr. Lundberg added.

Dist. Gov. Brown noted there are 4,000 Lions in Utah. Worldwide there are 950,000 members in 26,000 clubs in 146 countries.

He cited Ogden Lions Club for its 50 years of leadership, saying its accomplishments are recognized both at the state and international levels.

Roy Gives Okay To Zone Change

ROY—A proposal to rezone a half-acre of land located at 1900 West and 4700 South met with the unanimous approval of the City Council.

Be Certain Car Ready For Holiday, Chief Asks

There is a lot more to planning a Thanksgiving trip than just loading a car and starting out, according to Ogden police chief LeRoy A. Jacobsen.

According to the chief and the International Association of Chiefs of Police, it's equally important that both driver and car are ready for the road.

"You can get yourself ready," Chief Jacobsen said, "By getting plenty of rest the night before and by planning a sensible schedule to avoid peak traffic periods.

"As for your vehicle, have a competent mechanic check out every item of safety equipment—brakes, lights, tires, defroster, windshield wipers and washer," he added.

Another good tip offered by the chief is to keep an eye on the weather. Winter storms often hit this time of year. A driver should be prepared to delay his trip if severe weather is predicted.

Chief Jacobsen also emphasized the following:

"Even though our department will be out in full force to help in emergencies, make sure your car's trunk contains a shovel, sand or rock salt, reinforced tire chains, booster cables, tow chains and flares or other emergency lighting equipment.

"After all," the chief concluded, "these are just good, common sense precautions—whether for a holiday or just a normal weekday."
