

Ski School's 2nd Session Gets Under Way Saturday

The January session of the Ogden Standard-Examiner-Snow Basin-City Recreation Department Ski School will begin Saturday with a full complement of enthusiastic students.

Certified ski instructors will instruct the boys and girls on the gentle slopes of Snow Basin. Instruction periods will last one and a half hours each Saturday morning with practice time following each lesson.

Something Missing

Heard Still Seeking First Major Golf Title

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — In three of Jerry Heard's six seasons on the PGA circuit, the solidly built Californian has pocketed more than \$100,000. Just 27, he already has career earnings of \$538,445. In 1974, he had his best year ever, winning \$145,788. The Visalia, Calif., pro scored his fourth career tour victory, taking the Florida Citrus Open in March; finished second three times and was third twice. But something is missing and Heard knows precisely what. "It's just a matter of winning a major tournament and then backing it up with some wins," he said. "I'd like to win that

major tournament this year. I've come close several times but it just wasn't to be. Of the four major titles, the U.S. Open and the Masters appeal to me most." The 1975 tour kicks off with the \$150,000 Phoenix Open Thursday and Heard wants to get out of the starting gate quickly. "It's important to get off to a good start," he stressed. "It really gives you a big mental lift." "I know a lot of people think pro golfers have a glamorous existence and lead an easy life but that's a falsehood. Our whole life is a gamble. We have

no guarantees at all. I can't think of any occupation that is as insecure as ours. "Baseball players, basketball players, football players—they all have contracts. We don't have any. We have to earn everything we get. That puts a lot of pressure on you." One of the most popular players on the pro circuit, Heard entered 27 tournaments in 1974. He earned an average of \$4,537 at each event and had a scoring average of 71.25. He admitted he had superstar aspirations. "That's nothing to be ashamed about," said Heard,

who is represented by Ed Barner and Uni-Managers International of Los Angeles. "I'd like to be as good as I could possibly be. You should want to improve at your profession. I want to become better and better. Why not shoot for the top?" The Visalia native began playing golf when he was 11 and a year later met Johnny Miller, who is two days older. Heard and Miller are close friends today. Miller, of course, was the sensation of the '74 tour, winning eight tournaments and a record \$833,021.

Two Knicks Named To NBA Team

NEW YORK (UPI) — The New York Knicks backcourt tandem of Walt Frazier and Earl Monroe were named Saturday as the only teammates on either starting five in fan balloting for the National Basketball Association's 25th annual East-West All-Star game at Phoenix, Ariz., Jan. 14.

Frazier drew 91,621 votes and Monroe collected 52,637 in the first national voting by the paying public for NBA All-Stars. Previously, the starting teams were picked by sports writers and broadcasters. Bob McAdoo of the Buffalo Braves was the people's choice as 98,225 votes were filed for the high-scoring center.

EAST TEAM
Rounding out the starting East team were forwards John Havlicek of the Boston Celtics, with 87,715 votes, and Elvin Hayes of the Washington Bullets, 52,444.

Center Kareem Abdul-Jabbar of the Milwaukee Bucks was the most popular among Western voting fans with a 77,832 total. At the forwards were Rick Barry of the Golden State Warriors, 60,847, and Spencer Haywood of the Seattle SuperSonics, 50,302.

Picked as starting guards for the West were Gail Goodrich of the Los Angeles Lakers, 58,986, and Nate Archibald of the Kansas City-Omaha Kings, 46,724.

President Ford Picked For Top NCAA Award

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Ford, a former Michigan football captain, was selected by the National Collegiate Athletic Association Friday to receive its highest award for his contributions both during college and after.

Ford will receive the NCAA's Theodore Roosevelt award at a luncheon Tuesday as a highlight of the association's 69th annual convention.

He was cited as one "for whom competitive athletics in college and attention to physical well-being thereafter have been important factors in a distinguished career of national significance and achievement." He is the second president to receive the award. Former West Point player Dwight D. Eisenhower was the first "Teddy" winner in 1967.

The three-day NCAA convention opens Monday with the American Football Coaches Association convening at the same time in a separate Washington hotel and with both groups deeply concerned with the economic squeeze that is afflicting campus athletic programs.

Dr. Alan Chapman of Rice, outgoing NCAA president, described the economic situation as "the overriding concern of everybody attending these conventions."

MAJOR ISSUE
NCAA secretary-treasurer Richard P. Koenig of Valparaiso told newsmen that the recession and inflation squeeze is "the major issue" facing the delegates.

The NCAA's 18-member Executive Council confers during the weekend in advance of the convention on major issues which include the prospect of federal control legislation over amateur athletics and probably tougher policing of recruiting practices on the campuses.

A major topic of discussion among the delegates is anticipated government regulations expected from the White House later this month involving equal treatment of women in college sports. The delegates also will be asked to vote on a tightening of NCAA recruiting rules. One would prevent a college having contact with a prospective high school athlete until he completes his junior year. Other proposed restrictions would ban arrangements for summer jobs before an athlete enrolls in the college.
