## ROY LIONS CLUB DONATES FURNISHINGS TO COMPLEX

ROY—Furnishings valued at more than \$1,000 have been donated to the Roy Recreation Complex by the Roy Lions Club.

Primarily for the lobby of the complex, the furnishings include durable lounging chairs, pictures, a planter, a table-and-chairs combination and two large paintings purchased from local artists.

The furnishings were paid for by the proceeds from the annual sale of the club's Roy City Directory, an annual community service and fund-raising project.

A plaque commemorating the donation was also provided and will hang in the complex library.

The donation is the most recent in a series of contributions from Roy civic organizations that enhance the recreational facility by providing needed facilities, equipment and furnishings.

## City Against Bill on Massage Parlor Operators

The City Council has made it clear it doesn't endorse a bill before the Utah Legislature that an Ogden physician therapist claims would permit a massage parlor operator to practice medicine.

Councilmen unanimously approved a motion by Councilman John B. Arrington that a letter be written to Weber County legislators "spelling out clearly that we don't endorse" the bill introduced by Rep. C. DeMont Judd Jr.

However, the council said it would endorse legislation providing statewide controls for massage parlors and masseurs.

Councilmen took the action after Ogdenite Don Krambule, a director of the American Physical Therapy Association, said the bill is the third attempt in three years by masseurs to "get state legislation that would permit them to practice medicine."

Mr. Krambule said the proposed legislation would permit masseurs to do such things as give instruction on diets, exercises and perform colonic irrigation.

"They seek to get licensed by the state," he said, "which would indicate the state gives credence to what they're doing."

He said the masseurs have organized into a group they call the American Massage and Physical Therapy Association "and call themselves doctors."

Mr. Krambule said his association has been accused by the masseurs of "trying to prevent competition."

**NOT TRUE**

"This isn't true," he said, pointing out that he and other members of his profession "can only see patients referred to us by a medical doctor."

However, he said, adoption of the bill before the Legislature would permit masseurs to "take some one off the street, diagnose his problem and treat it."

"Their education or training doesn't qualify them to do that," Mr. Krambule asserted.

He said all the initial sponsors of the bill have withdrawn except for Rep. Judd.

Mr. Krambule also said the masseurs' association is distributing literature to the

legislators stating the bill has been endorsed by the Ogden City Council.

**STRESSED ACTION**

Councilmen stressed that the action referred to was, in the words of Mayor A. Stephen Dirks, an endorsement of statewide controls of massage parlors.

Mayor Dirks asked what amendments would be necessary to the bill to make it acceptable to the physical therapists.

"Take out all references to anything except massage," he replied.

Councilman Arrington offered a motion to "write a letter to the author clearly pointing out we don't endorse the bill but are merely calling for statewide controls for massage parlors and masseurs."

Mr. Krambule suggested the letter be given wider di-

tribution among the legislators "because Rep. Judd has said he's going to ride this bill through come hell or high water."

The council then instructed the letter be sent to "all senators and representatives in this area."

## Future of U.S. Funds For Impacted School Districts in Question

The Ogden School Board has heard a report that future income from Public Law 874 can be expected to decline and voted against applying for a small grant to be used in educating Indian students in the district.

Byron Moore, administrative assistant to the superintendent, told the board that a meeting he recently attended in New Orleans of school administrators concerned about the future of the so-called "impacted area" funds under PL 874 saw the outlook as principally gloomy.

Amounts available this year will depend on interpretations of

legislation Congress approved last year.

In general, percentages appear to be declining and more districts qualifying for the available funds under the newly revised law.

Dr. Gerald H. Raat, superintendent, said the Ogden district last year received approximately \$625,000 under the impacted area law, which supplies funds to school districts training sons and daughters of federal employees.

The money replaces taxes which the districts would ordinarily receive from private employees.

The amount Ogden district receives is not a large part of the total budget, but is enough to be the "frosting on the cake" which makes possible such things as the media centers in elementary schools which have been outstandingly successful.

Dr. Raat said.

The board agreed with district administrators that a possible grant of \$3,381 available through the federal department of Housing and Urban Development should not be applied for.

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## Cities Get Reduced Costs in Sales Of Gravel, Salvage at Incinerator

Revenues from the sale of gravel, firewood, salvage, and other materials from the Weber County Incinerator and landfill are deposited in the sanitation fund, and returned to the cities in the form of reduced costs.

The revenues are subtracted from expenses of the facilities before the county bills the cities for operational costs, according to Deputy Auditor Lloyd Barney.

The question of what happens to the revenues came up at a meeting of the County Solid Waste Board, chaired by Dennis Chugg, a councilman from Roy.

Chairman Chugg had questioned who should receive the revenue—the county that manages the facility and holds the title to the land, or the cities that paid \$115,528 for the property.

who represents the Ogden City Council on the board.

Mr. DeBoer said expenses are "based on income," and opined that revenues should go back into the incinerator-landfill operation.

"I think you're selling a false philosophy if you think there's going to be income out of this facility, ever. It may reduce your costs but you're not going to get a check out of it," he added, "unless we go into a wholesale gravel operation."

Mr. DeBoer said that was his understanding.

Sanitation Director John Barker said he could check with Auditor Dee Wilcox, but added he feels sure the money is funneled back into the operations fund.

Chairman Chugg said he wasn't aware that the revenues were being plowed back into the operation and felt that the cities that are paying the bills should receive the revenues.

## Grant Asked For Van In Police Work

A \$6,777 requisition to purchase a station wagon to haul collections of physical evidence on crimes for analysis has been endorsed by the regional Law Enforcement Planning Council.

Sheriff Ed Ryan seeks a federal grant from omnibus crime funds for the purchase of the vehicle and needed accessories.

An old van used in the past by sheriff's deputies has been junked. Due to the volume of criminal cases requiring physical evidence collection and processing by the sheriff's office a new vehicle is needed, the sheriff explained.

The sheriff's work in analysis of evidence encompasses crimes not only in unincorporated areas but in cities or towns upon request, as well, explained Donald O. Cavalli Jr., council director.

Pleasant View Mayor and Police Chief Richard G. Diamond, member of the council, said he had complaints from some small town police departments over the lack of cooperation in criminal investigations upon the part of the sheriff's department.

But Council Chairman A. O. "Pete" Archuleta, Clearfield Police chief, said the county can't process all crime scenes for all cities because of lack of manpower.

However, he agreed with council member Kenneth L. Dallinga that the sheriff's grant application should be endorsed if with the provision that all cities be assisted as much as possible upon their request to the county.

## 62 STUDENTS

The district now has 62 Indian students in its schools, with about one third of that number under the LDS Church placement program.

The required committee of Indian parents would be difficult to form and operate, and administrative time required to apply for the small grant would amount to nearly as much as the money received, Dr. Raat told the board.

He said also he was not sure it would enhance the quality of education for the Indian students, who are scattered through most of the schools in the district and are on many grade levels.

## COUNTY OKAYS TAX REQUEST

County Commission approved today a request by Treasurer Kenneth Dallinga to cancel taxes, penalty and interest of \$531 on property owned by the Salvation Army.

Commissioners also agreed to cancel property taxes for 1974, amounting to \$434, on land bought last year by Weber State College, near the campus on Harrison.

The Salvation Army facilities are situated at 2633 Grant but the exact location of the WSC land wasn't given.
