Local Crisis Center To Hold Open House

Volunteer workers are putting the finishing touches on a Crisis Assistance Center at 2504 Adams that will provide a unique day and residential service for retarded persons of all ages.

The public will be invited to tour the facility during an open house Feb. 10 at 10 a.m.

A formal opening will follow sometime in March but interested citizens are invited to visit the center and become acquainted with the services that will be offered.

LIMITED CARE

Operated by the Weber County Association for Retarded Citizens (WCARC), the center will provide limited residential programs for the retarded.

Clients will be allowed to stay a maximum of 90 days but cannot stay less than three days.

During that time, they will defray the cost of the service, work with staff trained in special skills required for working with various handicaps.

Both ambulatory and non-ambulatory handicapped people will be accepted at the Crisis Assistance Center, including those people currently on medications.

NOT REQUIRED

Clients will not be required to board at the center but that service will also be available. Assistance monies are avail-
