

names and those of their families, with the secretary of the province, (an Englishman) after which they are allowed to consider themselves as under the full protection of the Spanish government, with the privilege of having such disputes as may arise between subjects purely British, decided by arbitrators to be chosen from among themselves. Provision is also made for the security of the people generally considered as objects of contempt and detestation, viz. all such as have been disturbers of the public tranquility, and those accused of capital offences, are permitted to retire to such place of security as they may think proper to choose.

CHARLESTOWN, (S. Carolina)
July 29.

Saturday evening a most dreadful whirlwind happened at Santee, which did considerable damage to Mr. Peter Porcher's plantation, by carrying away all his buildings, &c. Happily no lives were lost.

PHILADELPHIA, August 18.

Wednesday last the General Assembly passed an act for enlisting 250 men for twelve months. This corps is the quota of this state of 700 men which Congress have judged necessary to be raised, to take possession of the frontier posts, and guard the public magazines.

Colonel Harnar who carried to Europe the ratification of the definitive treaty of peace, and returned in company with the Marquis de la Fayette, is appointed, by Council to the command of said troops.

Captain Douglas, of Col. Proctor's late regiment, is to take the command of the artillery, which is to accompany the detachment of Col Harnar.

NEW-HAVEN, August 25.

Tuesday the 17th instant, in the afternoon, there was the most violent tornado or hurricane, ever known in the memory of the oldest person living in this part of the country. By the best account we have been able to procure, it began at a place called Shipague-Neck, between New-Milford and Woodbury; its course was nearly from N. W. to S. E. and the greatest violence of the wind a bout 50 rods wide; in the parish of South-Briton, in Woodbury, ten dwelling-houses, five barns, two grist-mills, and a saw mill, were wholly destroyed or greatly damaged! The house of the Rev. Jehu Minor, was entirely demolished, and he buried in the ruins, from which he was taken out so much wounded that his life was in great danger. The planks of a new bridge, firmly spiked down, were torn off, and carried a considerable distance. A number of orchards entirely destroyed, and the largest trees in the forest levelled with the ground. In short, nothing withstood its fury, and destruction marked its whole progress. It was attended with the most tremendous thunder; The lightning struck in many places, and five stacks of hay in Southbury were set on fire & consumed.

HARTFORD, August 31.

Tuesday the 10th inst. a barn in Sandisfield, belonging to Mr. Caleb Bush, was struck with lightning and burnt down, containing about 20 tons of hay, and 150

shocks of grain; together with a small store at one end of it, containing sundry articles of husbandry, and other valuable effects.

SPRINGFIELD, August 31.

Extracts from the Journals Congress, June 3.

RESOLVED, That the district of territory lying on the west side of Connecticut river, called Vermont, within the limits & boundaries described in the act of Congress of the 20th of August, 1781, and the people inhabiting the same, be, and they are hereby recognized and declared to be a free, sovereign and independent state, by the name of the state of Vermont. That the said state of Vermont, being within the limits of the United States, shall be considered as a part of the confederacy, on the same principles as the new states, who shall have established permanent governments agreeable the act of Congress of the 23d day of April last, until it shall accede to the articles of confederation, and be admitted into the federal union of these states.

Resolved, That congress adhere to the guarantee to the states of New-Hampshire & New-York, agreeable to the resolutions of the 7th and 20th of August, 1781; and if it shall appear on running the line between New-York and Vermont, that the latter hath made any encroachments on the territory of the former, the same shall be immediately removed. Your committee further report, with respect to the matters alleged by the delegates of New-York concerning the sufferings of individuals by banishment and confiscation of property, and the disorders and violence that have happened in consequence of the opposite and interfering jurisdictions exercised by the state of New-York and the government of Vermont, over the same persons within the said district. That the several letters and papers from the governor of New-York and the people of Vermont, relative to those matters, have been heretofore committed, and no report hath been made thereon; your committee are therefore of opinion, that if Congress shall judge it expedient to take any further order respecting those matters, it will be proper again to commit those papers.

N. B. The above Resolve has not yet been acted upon
