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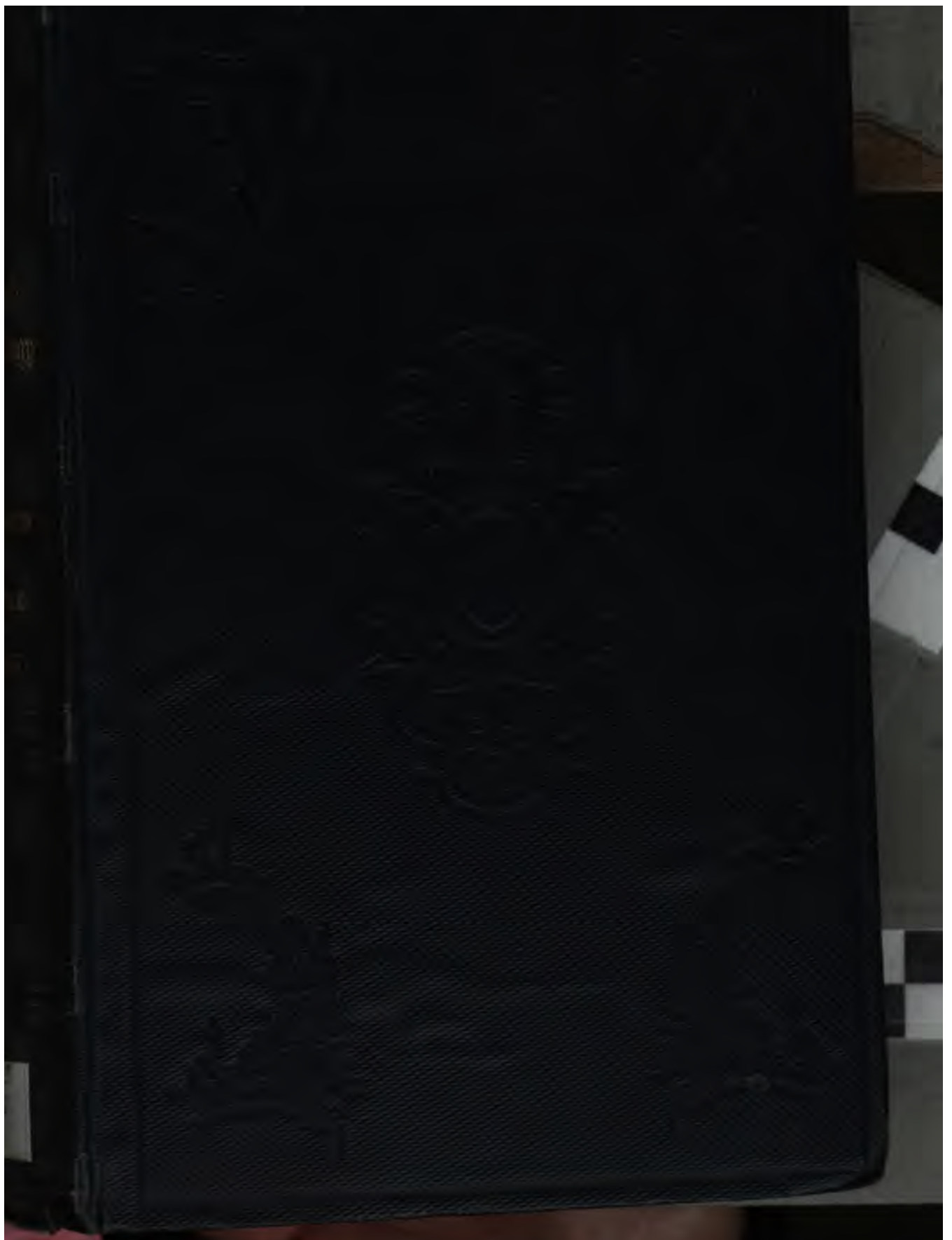

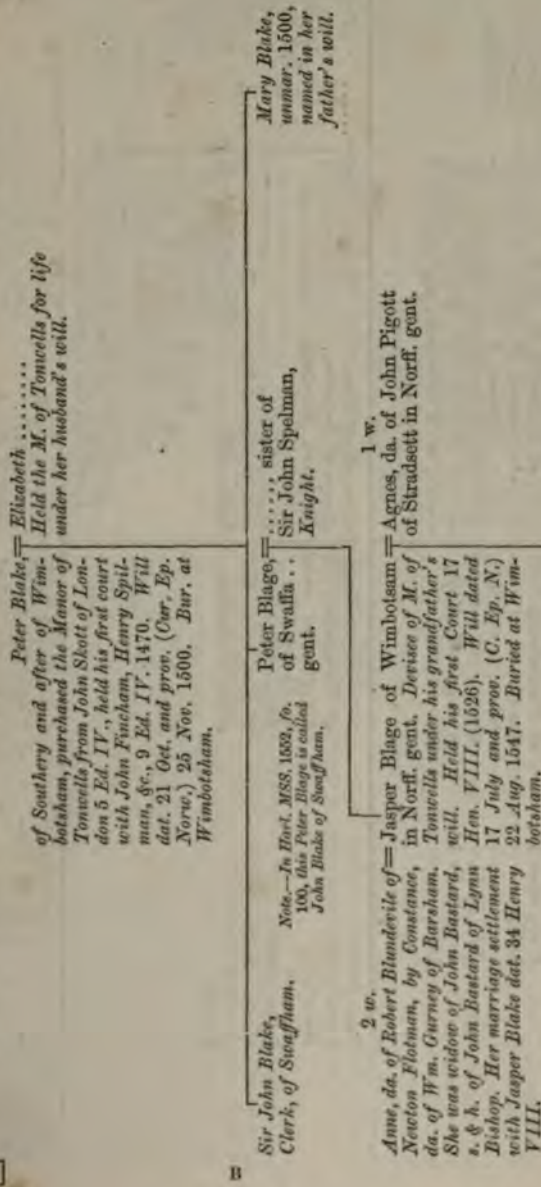

21 October, 1590, 16 Hen. VII. Peter Blake of Wymbotsham, Gent. To be buried in the church of our Lady at Wymbotsham;—to the altar of the church of St. Mary &c. &c. ;—to Elizabeth my wife my manor of Tonwell for life, she keeping sole and unmarried, she to have the rule and keeping of Jasper Blake for her life at her cost and charge, and after her decease I will the said manor to my son Sir John Blake for term of his life, he having the rule and governance of the said Jasper at his cost and charge, and after the decease of the said Sir John Blake then the said manor to remain to my neveu Thomas Blake for the term of his life, he having the rule and governance of the said Jasper at his cost and charge, and if it happen the said Elizabeth, John, and Thomas to decease, or the said Jasper be of the age of 22 years, then I will the said Jasper be at the rule and governance of William Skypwith, Squyer. At 22 said Jasper to have and enjoy the said manor to him and to his heirs male;—to said son Sir John Blake a messuage in Sothery, and to him my grey ambuling horse;—to Mary my daughter £40 to her marriage;—to my nece Elizabeth Blake. Executors, Elizabeth my wife, Sir John Blake my son, Thomas Blake, Squyer, and Wm. Skipwith, Squyer. Proved (Cur. Ep. Norw.) by John Blake, cap., executor, power reserved to the other executors, 25 Nov. 1590.

17 July, 1547. Jasper Blake, Gentryman, of the parish of Wymbotsham. To be buried in the church of our blessed Lady in Wymbotsham, under the stone of Nicholas Conwallis, next unto the sepulchre of my wyff. To Alye Byke my dowier at 21, twenty marks;—to Harry Blake my some £16;—to my son Thomas Blake ten marks at 20;—to Anne my wife;—to my daughter Ele Blake, 20 ewes and 20 lambs;—to my son Peter Blake my manor called Tonwell at Wymbotsham, Stow, and Downham, to him and the heirs male of his body lawfully begotten;—remainder to Harry Blake in like manner;—remainder to my son Thomas in like manner;—remainder to my son John, the said Thomas and John then under 16;—to my dawter Ele Blake;—provided always, that if in case my wyff do refuse such legacies and bequests, the which is aforesaid mentioned, that then I will she shall have all such legacies

and bequests as was given to her by the last will and testament of her husband John Bactard bearing date 1530. Executors, my son Peter Blake and Richard Bactcroft, Gent., Osbert Moundeford, Esq., supervisor. Proved (Cur. Ep. Norw.) 22 August, 1547.

16 October, 1570. Peter Blake of Wymbotsham, Gent. To my three sons, John, Thomas, and Francis, when 21;—to Beatrice Blake my wife;—to Christopher Bactcroft my brother-in-law;—to Jasper Blake my son and his heirs male my Manor of Tonwell; remainder to my son John, and remainder in like manner to Thomas and Francis;—to my cousin Alexander Greenall, Executors, my wife Beatrice and Thomas Bactcroft, Gent., brother-in-law, Francis Gaudy, Esq., supervisor. Proved (Archd. Norw.) 7 Dec. 1570, by the said Beatrice, the said Alexander Greenall procurator, &c.

5 October, 1645, 21 Car. I. Millicent Blake of Spottle, single woman. To my father Jasper Blake, Gent., an annuity for life;—to John Sherwood my sister Bridget Sherwood's son;—to William Fowle my sister Betterys Spottle's son;—to Wm. Mayes and Samuel Mayes, my brother-in-law John Mayes' sons (the said John Sherwood and Wm. Fowle were under 21). Executor, John Mayes the brother-in-law, Henry Vincent of Fincham, yeoman, supervisor. Executors, Robert Blake of Hemlyncston, Thomas Browne of Wodenorton. *Proved* (*Cur. Ep. Nor.*) 23 March, 1468.

18 November, 1505. Thomas Blake of Swaffham Market, Esq. To be buried in the church of Swaffham before the chantry altar;—26s. 8d. to be taken yearly of the issues and profits of my Manor of Holm Hale to the augmentation of the chantry of mine uncle Symond Blake to pray for my soule, and for my father Edmund Blake and Elizabeth his wife, and for the soules of Jane and Elizabeth my wiffe;—Elizabeth my wife to have 2000 sheep, i.e., xv hundred ewes and 5 hundred wethers, and the pasturage of them in Swaffham and Sporle, and all my plate and Jewells except the things that shall be rehersed herein;—to Ralph Blake before named [*it does not appear that he was named before*] all my lands and tenements in Swaffham, Sporle, and Cotys, after the decease of me and my foresaid wife Elizabeth, to him and to his heirs male for ever, and they to ber the name of Blake as it is before rehersed [*not so before rehersed*], and if the said Raffe die without issue male, then all those lands and tenements to him before named to remain to the heirs male of John Brampton, and they to bere the name of Blake, and if they die s.p.m. then the said lands, &c., to be sold by my executors, by the advice of my wife, Master Roger Townsend, and Wm. Beyr, under the pain of forfeiture of this my grant, &c.;—to my sister Jane Brampton 5 mares of money;—to her son Thomas 5 mares;—to my sister Margaret £5 in money;—to her daughter Elizabeth £5, and to her daur. Margaret £5, and if one decease, to remain to the other living at the time of her marriage, and if both decease to remain to my wife and to Raffe Blake;—to the said Margaret Daniell my sister the

foregift of vijli. after my decease;—to Henry Daniell xx mares;—my place in Walsoken to be sold by mine executors and the money thereof to be reserved to bring as mykill lands in this country to the use of my wife during her life, and the reversion to Raffe Blake aforesaid;—to Margaret Bokking of Langham and the reversion to Raffe Blake aforesaid, the wife of Roger Townshend;—and to 5 mares;—to Mistress Townshend, the wife of Roger Townshend;—and to churches of Holm Hale, N. Pickenham, Saham, Ashill, Sporle, Howton, S. Pickenham, and Bichauwell, each to have vijs. viijd.;—to Thomas Blake 6s. 8d.;—to Sir John Blake 5 mares. *Proved* (*P. C. C.*) 22 Dec. 1506.

23 *Hes.* 7. Thomas Blake, Esq., died seized of a messuage and 37 acres of land. Joan Braampton, widow, and Margaret Danyel, widow, are his coheirs and admitted.—*Stowham C. R.*

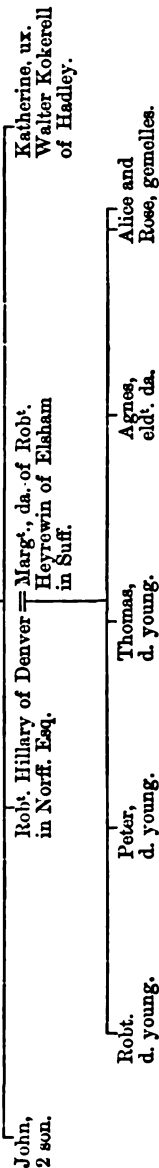
In 1475 Robert Southwell enfeoffed Symond Blake in the Manor of Aspals, Swadham. This Symond Blake, by will dated 10 Dec. 1487, settles the Manor of Aspals and White Sondes on feoffees, to provide an honest and secular chaplain to pray for his soul and the souls of his wife Joan and his parents Thomas Blake, Esq., and Elizabeth his wife, and 40*l.* per annum for the obit of Edmund Blake late of Hale. Sir Roger Townshend, Knight, and the Lady Ann Wyngfield supervisors of his will.—*Bl. N.* vol. vi.

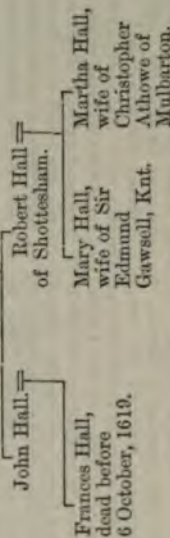
At a court held for the Manor of Mendham, Kingshall, Suffolk, on 6th October, 1619, it was presented that Robert Gawsell, Gent., son of Sir Edward Gawsell, Knt., and Mary his wife, who was eldest daughter of Robert Halle, Gent., the uncle of Frances Hall, deceased, daughter and heir of John Halle, Gent., and Christopher Athowe, who married Martha, sister of said Mary Gawsell, held free lands in Shottesham late of said John Halle, who held them of that manor by knight service, and that said Robert Gawsell was eight years old and in ward of the king.

At the same court Christopher Athowe, Gent., and Martha his wife, one of the cousins and coheirs of Frances Hall (viz., one of the daughters and coheirs of Robert Hall, Gent., brother of John Hall, Gent., father of said Frances) surrendered one moiety of copyhold property in Mendham, part of same estate on sale; the other moiety could not be conveyed, being in Robert Gawsell the minor.

In 1622, Gregory Gauscell of Watlington, Gent., was admitted to the other moiety as guardian of Robert Gawsell the minor, who was said to be of the age of fourteen years* on the 4th April in that year (1622).

The inferences to be drawn from this inquisition are as follows:—

1. Margaret, the wife of Thomas Lumnor of Manington, was in some way connected with John Heydon, Esq., [Query, of Baconsthorpe? See *Paston Letters*] who settled upon Thomas and Margaret and their heirs male the Sherington estate.
2. That Margaret survived her first husband, Thomas Lumnor, and subsequently married (2) Thomas Briggge or Briggs, and (3) Edmund Paston, Esq.
3. That by the first husband she had a son and heir, Thomas Lumnor, who married about the 9th Feb., 16 Henry VII. [1502], when the estate was once more settled upon him and his heirs male, and died 20th September, 17 Henry VIII.
4. That he left behind him a son and heir, Thomas Lumnor (the subject of this inquisition), who died 4th December, 33 Henry VIII., leaving behind him a son and heir, William Lumnor, aged eleven years.

LOMNER PEDIGREE.—CORRECTION.

Since the previous pages have been printed, I have discovered an error in the descent of the Lumners of Mannington, which I am able to correct by the Records of the Court of Chancery in the S. P. O., as well as by other information recently obtained.—A. J.

In January, 1597, "JANE LOMNER, late wife of EDMUND LOMNER, late of Mannington in the co. of Norff. Esq. deceased . . ., in his life time lawfully seized in his demesne as of the manor of Mannington in the co. of Norff. . .," presents a petition to Sir Thos. Egerton, Lord Keeper, setting forth that her late husband EDMUND LUMNER had sold the manor of Mannington . . . to one JOHN POTTS, for the sum of three thousand pounds, at three several payments; the first payment to be made immediately after the death of MRS. DODGE, wife of JOHN DODGE, *mother of the said EDMUND LOMNER*; that she, the petitioner, was married to the said Edmund Lomner; that she had been "*very well descended*," and had also "*received a good portion in marriage*;" that in selling the manor no provision had been made for her, though her husband had intended to provide £100 a year for her out of the said manor in lieu of jointure, but that "POTTS did so cunningly contrive the said conveyance" that no such annuity was assured to her the petitioner, nor any provision was made for her out of the purchase-money ". . . if the said MRS. DODGE should fortune to survive" her husband EDMUND LOMNER, "*as in truth she doth.*"

By the answer to this petition it appears that—

- (1) EDMUND LOMNER had died before Michaelmas, 1588.
- (2) At the time of his death he was greatly in debt, and forced to sell his estate.
- (3) He had no *brother* or *son* "able to undertake the purchase."
- (4) He had first offered the refusal of the manor to PETER HOUGHTON, Gent., who had married one of the daughters of MRS. DODGE, wife of JOHN DODGE, Esq., *since deceased, and sister* of the said ED. LOMNER.
- (5) That HOUGHTON had declined the offer.
- (6) That upon HOUGHTON's refusal, ED. LOMNER had offered the estate to defendant JOHN POTTS, who had married another sister of ED. LOMNER's.

(7) That since the death of said EDMUND LOMNER, "one ROBERT LOMNER, Gent.," had pretended to be entitled to the immediate remainder of the manor after the death of MRS. DODGE.

(8) That the said ROBERT LOMNER had lately married a daughter of one WILLIAM FRANKLIN, who, according to the allegation of defendant POTTS, was conspiring with the said ROBERT LOMNER to defraud said defendant of his rights in the manor, and that the cause was still pending in the Star Chamber touching the title set up by ROBERT LOMNER.

About a year after the filing of this petition MRS. CATHARINE DODGE died, and her nuncupative will was proved at Norwich by ANNE Lady Heydon, wife of Sir Christopher Heydon, on the 2nd Dec. 1598 (Cur. Ep. Adams, fo. 51). This will sets forth that the deceased CATHARINE DODGE of Mannington, co. Norff., widow, had frequently declared "that none of her children, but only her daughter the Lady ANNE HEYDON, wife of Sir CHRISTOPHER HEYDON, Knight, should have any pennyworth of her goods, but only her said daughter."

From these evidences the Pedigree at p. 35 may be corrected with certainty, and some additions made to it.

(1) It is certain that the EDW. LOMNER set down in the *Visitation* as son and heir of WILLIAM LOMNER of Sharrington ought to be described as EDWARD (or EDMUND) LOMNER, son and heir of Edward Lumner of Mannington.

(2) It is probable *and almost certain* that this EDWARD or EDMUND LUMNER's brother WILLIAM died unmarried, or at any rate *s. p.*, before September, 1588.

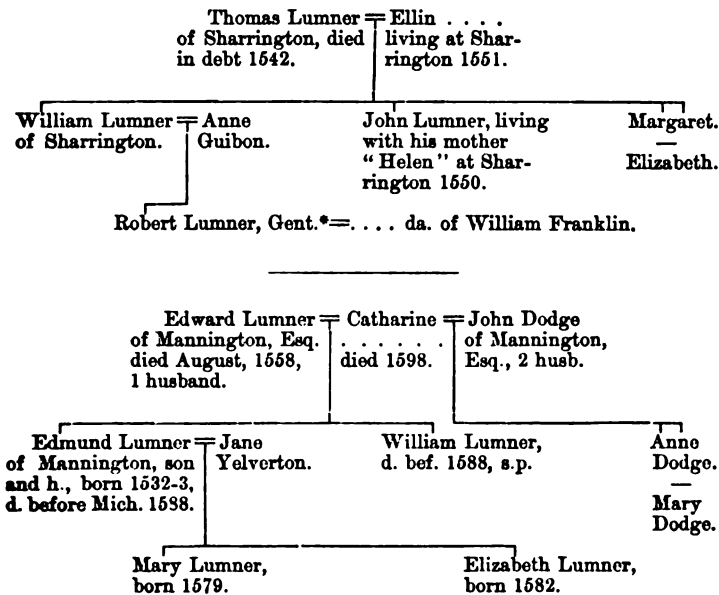
(3) It is probable that WILLIAM LOMNER of Sharrington had a son ROBERT by his wife Anne Guibon, who is the ROBERT LOMNER mentioned in the Chancery Proceedings.

(4) And it is probable that the confusion in Blomefield, vol. vi. p. 464, may be explained by allowing that CATHARINE, widow of EDWARD LOMNER who died in August, 1558, had by JOHN DODGE, Esq., a daughter ANNE, who married (1) JOHN POTTS and (2) Sir CHRISTOPHER HEYDON; and another daughter MARY, who married (1) Peter Houghton, and (2) Sir Thomas Vavasour.

Lastly, in the Deposition Book for the years 1550-1551 in Episcopal Registry at Norwich there is further evidence, of a painful character, of the blight that seems to have fallen upon this family. EDMUND LUMNER of Mannington, Esq., "ætat 57 et amplius," gives evidence concerning ELEANOR LUMNER, mother of MARGARET LUMNER and of

JOHN LUMNER, who are described as living at Sharrington. He says that "the father of the said MARGARET died a poor man . . . and that his goods were not able to pay his debts." Further, it appears by the evidence given that this MARGARET LUMNER had a child by one NICHOLAS PAINTER, who afterwards deserted her, and married MARY DOCKING at the church of the Hospital of St. Giles in Norwich.

By the help of this additional evidence, the Pedigree of the Lumners of Sharrington and of Mannington, as given by the *Visitation* and other authorities at page 35, may be corrected, and will therefore stand as follows:—

The same Thomas Hobart. [Chanc. Inq. 12 Elizabeth, No. 62.] Co. Norfolk. Inquisition at Swaffham 22 Sept., 11 Elizabeth (1569). Miles Hobart, Esq., father of Thos. Hobart, now deceased, was seized in fee of the manors of Cattes and Emplies, &c., and by charter, dated 10 June, 33 Hen. VIII., gave by the name of all those messuages, lands, and tenements, of the said Miles in Panxforth and Hemblington, co. Norfolk,† which were of James Hobart, Knt. (father of Miles), to feoffees to hold to the use of Etheldreda, late wife of the said Thomas, son and heir apparent of said Miles for her life, and after her death to the use of said Thos. Hobart and his issue male; remainder further as by the said charter appears. Said Thomas also seized of the manors of Wotton, &c., in fee tail, &c. Said Thomas died at Little Plumstede 2 April, 2 Eliz. (1560); and Miles Hobart is son and next heir male of the body of the said Thomas, begotten on the body of the said Etheldreda; and he was aged on 6 May last (1569) twenty years. Etheldreda, late wife of Thomas, is yet living; and she has taken the issues and profits of the said manors and other the premises from the day of Thos. Hobart's death up to the date of this Inquisition.

A.D. 1579. Owen † Hubberte, Gentleman. [Chanc. Inq., 21 Elizabeth, p. 2, No. 44.]

Co. Norfolk. Inquisition at Hingham, co. Norfolk, 24 April, 21 Eliz. (1579), after the death of Owen † Hubbere, Gentleman. The said Owen Hubberte was seized in fee of the manor of Estehall in Depham (formerly of Edmund de Baconthorpe and afterwards of John Crosse, junior), and land, meadow, &c., in Depham and Hackford, &c.; and died sole seized thereof. (Other manors.) Said Owen Hubbert died at the city of Norwich, 20 November, in

Inquisition taken 17 Jan., Ao. 32 Eliz., post mortem Milonis Hobarto de Plumstead, found to be seized of (inter alia) lands in Wrotham, &c., in fee tail, viz., to the heirs of his body by Eliz. his wife of the gift of Will. Ben'baeset and Etheldred his wife, mother of said Miles. Ob. at Oxford 17 July last. Thomas Hobarte, son and heir of the bodies of said Miles and Elizabeth, aged nine years twelve months twenty days.—Esc. 32 Eliz., fo. 115.

A.D. 1598. Inquisition taken 15 Dec., Ao. 41 Eliz., post mort. Johis Hobarte, Arm. Found that said John being seized of manor of Thweit, late of Miles Hobart, Esq., his father deceased, by indenture dated 1 Jan., Ao. 32 Eliz., made between him the said John and Henry Hobart, Esq., in consideration of love, &c., towards Thomas, William, and John, his sons, and Mary, Helen, and Anne, his daughters, and his love for Anne his wife, made feoffment and declared uses for the benefit of himself for life, with remainder to Thos. Hobarte, Gent., eldest son and heir apparent, in tail male, with remainder to William and John, second and third sons, successively in tail male, with remainder to the daughters. As to the manor of Erpingham, the uses were, after death of said John, to William his second son in fee. By his will, dated 7 March, Ao. 39 Eliz., at Thweit, he gave to his son William lands in Metton, &c. Settled lands, in Burgate, &c., Suffolk, after decease of himself and wife, on son John in tail, with remainder to William, &c. Anne his wife died lately at Thwayt leaving him surviving. John ob. 8 Aug. last. Thomas, son and heir, ob. vit. patris, set. 40.—Esc. 41 Eliz. p. 1, No. 22.

A.D. 1602. Edward Huberd, Esq. [Chanc. Inq., 44 Eliz., p. 1, fo. 150.] Co. Essex. Inq. at Great Dunmow, 31 August, 44 Eliz. (1602). Edward Huberd, Esq., was long before his death seized in fee of the manors of Stansted, otherwise Stansted Mountfichett, Burnells and Benifield Bury, with appurtenances in co. Essex. Indenture between the Right Honourable John Fortescue, Under Treasurer of the Exchequer, and one of the Queen's Privy Council, Thomas Fortescue, brother of John, and Francis Fortescue,

son and heir apparent of John, of the one part, and said Edward Huberd and Francis Huberd, son and heir apparent of said Edward, of the other part, relating to marriage to be had between Edward Huberd and Eleanor * Pigott, widow, one of the daughters of the said John Fortescue, and for jointure of Eleanor, agreeing to levy a fine to the use of said Edward and Eleanor for their lives, and then to their issue male; in default, to use of said Edward Huberd, his heirs and assigns for ever. Said Edward, 24 Feb. then + next following, took to wife the said Eleanor at the city of London. Fine levied on Morrow of Pasch. B. V. M. 34 Eliz. (3 Feb. 1591-2.) Edward Huberd made his will (here quoted) in which he mentions his youngest son Richard Huberd, and sons John Huberd and Francis Huberd, also speaks of "my brother John Wilsha." Son Frances to be sole executor. Edward Huberd died 18 April last (1592) without issue by Elyanor, † and Francis Huberd is his son and heir, aged thirty, &c.

A.D. 1607. Nicholas Hobart, Gentleman. [Court of Wards, Inq. p. m., bundle 2, No. 199.]

Co. Suffolk. Inquisition taken at Woodbridge, co. Suffolk, 5 August, 5 James (1607.) Nicholas Hobart was, in his lifetime and at the time of his death, seized in fee of and in a messuage or tenement called Raven's Hall, and 100 acres of land, meadow, pasture, and wood, to the same appertaining or therewith occupied, with the appurtenances in Lillesey and Seamer, formerly in farm of one Thomas Coleman; and one tenement and 8 acres of land and pasture in Lillesey and Seamer aforesaid, parcel of lands and tenements formerly of John Cail, now in the occupations of Thomas Aggas and Elizabeth Hobarte, widow, or of their assigns (and other messuages and lands in said county.) And so being seized thereof, Nicholas Hobart died 15 February last (1606-7); and William Hobart, Gentleman, is his son and heir, aged thirty years. Said tenement, called Raven's Hall, and 100 acres therewith occupied, are hold of the King as of the dissolved monastery of Bury St. Edmund's in free socage by fealty and rent of 15 pence per annum; and they are worth per annum (clear) 100 shillings, &c.

A.D. 1611. James Hobarte, Esq. [Chanc. Inq., 9 Jac. I.]
Inquisition taken at Thetford, co. Norfolk, 30 Oct., 9 Jac. I., post mortem Jacobii Hobarte, Armiger. Said James Hobarte was seized of and in the manor of Holte, Holte Holes, and Holte Market, co. Norfolk, and divers lands and tenements in Holte, Lecherlogset, and Hunworth, and in the manor of Cley cum Menchyn, Cley next the Sea, Sutterly als. Blakeney, and Wiveton. By his will, dated 15 Aug. 1611, he bequeathed aforesaid manors and lands unto Mary his wife for ten years after his decease, to educate his two daughters, Catherine and Elizabeth, and desires his eldest son James, when of full age, shall grant unto his son Edward Hobarte an annuity of £40, or pay him in lieu thereof the full sum of £800. The said James Hobarte died at Norwich 11 Sept. last before the taking of this Inquisition, and James Hobarte his son was then of the age of seventeen years three months and three days.

A.D. 1613. William Hobart of Metton. [Chanc. Inq., 10 Jac. I.]
Inquisition taken at the Castle of Norwich 22 Jan., 10 Jac. I., after the death of William Hobarte, late of Metton, co. Norfolk, Gent. It was found that he died 5 Nov. then last past, seized of the Manor of Erpingham and lands in Felbrigge and Metton, and by a deed dated 6 January, 41 Eliz., he had enfeoffed Emanuel Callard, Gent., and Margaret his wife of certain lands to the use of himself and Catherine his wife and his heirs; and by his will, dated 25 Oct. last past, he gave to Katherine his beloved wife his dwelling-house in Metton for life, and appoints her sole executrix, and to have the wardship and marriage of his son and of his daughters, and it was further found that Henry Hobart was his son and next heir, and of the age of two years and eleven months at the death of said father.

A.D. 1616. James Hobart, Esquire. [Chanc. Inq. p. m., 14 James I., p. 3, No. 106.]

Co. Norfolk. Inquisition taken at Watton, co. Norfolk, 26 March, 14 Jas. I. (1616) after the death of James Hobart. Long before his death he was seized of the manors of Hales Hall, &c. co. Norfolk, and a fine was levied in Hilary Term on the Morrow of the Purif. B. V. M., 5 James I. (3 Feb., 1607-8) between Richard Brownlowe, Esq., and Thomas Waller, Esq., plaintiffs, and Henry Hobart, Knt., then the King's Attorney General, John

Hobart, Knt., the said James Hobart and Frances his wife, and Michael Hare, Nicholas Tymperley, Anthony Hobart and Anne his wife, John Coyell, Edward Hobart, Gent., and Robert Hobart, Gent., deforciant of manors aforesaid. By virtue whereof the said Richard Brownlowe and Thomas Waller were seized in fee, and a common recovery was thereof had to the use of the said James for term of his life, with remainder to said Anthony Hobart, for life, and after his decease to the use of the first son of Anthony and his issue male; in default, to second, third, and other sons successively of the said Anthony and their issue male; in default, remainder of all (except the manor of Catfields) to John Hobart, second son of Henry Hobart, deceased, son of James Hobart, for life, and after his decease to the use of the first and other sons successively of the said John Hobart and the heirs male of every such son; in default, and after his decease to first, second, and other sons successively of the said Henry, the son and heirs male of every such son; in default, in writ named, and heirs male of the body of the said James Hobart the son; in default, remainder to the said Edward Hobart, third son of the said James Hobart, in writ and issue male; in default, remainder to the said John Hobart, Knt. and heirs male of his body; in default, to the said Robert, fifth son of James Hobart, in writ and heirs male of his body; in default, remainder to the right heirs of the said Anthony. As to Catfields, for default of heirs male of the body of the said Anthony, to the use of the said John Hobart, Knt., his heirs and assigns, for ever; as by the said fine and recovery, and certain indentures tripartite* 5 James. [Other fines referred to—names mentioned which are difficult to read. As well as I can make out, Frances died and James survived. He seems to have died 6 Feb., 13 Jas. (1615-16.) Anthony Hobart is cousin and heir of the said James Hobart in writ, viz., son and heir of the said Henry Hobart, deceased, son of James Hobart in writ mentioned, aged thirty (the word looks like "triginta") it seems.]

A.D. 1623. Henry Hobarte, Gent. [Chanc. Inq., 21 Jac. I.]

Inquisition taken at the Castle of Norwich, 17 April, 21 James I., after the death of Henry Hobarte, Gent. It was found that William Hobart, Gent., father of said Henry, having been seized of the manor of Erpingham, and the

advowson of the rectory of that church, had by deed dated 6 Jan., 41 Eliz. enfranchised Emanuel Callard, Gent., and Margerie his wife, to the use of himself and Catherine his wife; that he made his will 25 Oct., 10 Jas. I., and died seized of the premises 5 Nov. 10 Jas. I., the said Henry his son, then being two years and eleven months; and it was further found that the said Henry died a ward of the king 24 Dec. last before this Inquisition, and that Anne and Frances Hobart were his sisters and next heirs, and that Anne was of the age of fourteen years and two months, and Frances was aged eleven years one month and seventeen days.

A.D. 1624. Thomas Hobart. [Chanc. Inq., 1 Charles I., p. 1, No. 63.]
Co. Norfolk. Inquisition taken at Norwich Castle, 7 September, 22 Jas. (1624.)

Thomas Hobart, late of Little Plumstead, co. Norfolk, was seized in fee of the manor of Skeytton Hall in Tybdenham, co. Norfolk, &c. Fine levied in Octave of St. Michael, 13 Jas. (6 October, 1615) before Henry Hobart and others, Justices, &c., between John Smyth, Esq., and Henry Spendlove, Gentleman, plaintiffs, and the said Thomas Hobart and Wilughby (*Wilughbyam*), then his wife, deforciant, of the manor aforesaid. To the use of the said Thomas and said Wilughby for her jointure and the heirs of the said Thomas for ever. [Other lands.] Thomas Hobart died 31 May, 21 James (1623) at Little Plumstead aforesaid, and Wilughby survived him and is yet living at Little Plumstead. Miles Hobart, Esq., is son and next heir of the said Thomas, and at the time of his father's death he was aged twenty-one years and five weeks and more; and he has had and received the issues of the residue (his mother having those assigned to her for her jointure) of the manors and premises aforesaid from the time of his father's death up to now, &c.

A.D. 1627. Sir Henry Hobart, Knight and Bart. [Chanc. Inq. p. m., 3 Charles I., p. 2, No. 108.]

Co. Norfolk. Inquisition taken at Ailisham, co. Norfolk, 22 September, 3 Chas. (1627), after the death of Henry Hobart, Knt. and Bart., late Chief Justice of Common Pleas. The said Henry Hobart, long before his death, was seized in his demesne as of freehold for life,—remainder to Dorothy his

wife, then to the right heirs of the said Henry,—in the manor of West Somerton, co. Norfolk, and rectory of West Somerton, with tithes and advowsons of the vicarage, by purchase of Christopher Heydon, Esq., and his wife, by indenture dated 24 February, 83 Edw. (1500-1.) [Several other manors.] Fine levied in Octave of Purif. B. V. M., 19 James (Feb., 1621-2), between John, Earl of Bridgewater, plaintiff, and the said Henry Hobart and Dorothy his wife, John Hobart, son and heir of said Henry Hobart, John Good, Richard Glover, and John Plumstead, defendants; which fine was levied to the use limited in a certain indenture dated 20 January, 19 James (1621-2), as to some manors, to the use of the said Henry Hobart and his heirs, until a marriage between said John Hobart and Lady Frances Egerton, daughter of the said Earl of Bridgewater, should be solemnized; and after to the use of the said Henry Hobart for the lives of the said Henry and John, and after the decease of such one of them as should first chance to die, to the use of the said Lady Frances; and after her decease to the use of which of the two, the said Henry and John, should be living, for life; and after his decease, as to the manors of West Somerton, &c., to the use of the said John Hobart and heirs male of his body lawfully begotten; for default, to the use of Miles Hobart, second son of said Henry, and heirs male of his body, with such remainders and such estate to Nathaniel, James, Robert, Edward, now deceased, and Henry Hobart, sons of the said Henry (in Commission named) successively; and for default, to the use of the heirs male of the body of the said Henry (in Commission named); and for default, to the use of the right heirs of the said Robert Hobart, Edward Hobart, and Henry Hobart the son for ever. And as to the manor of Langley, &c., to the use of the first-born son of the said John Hobart and heirs male of his body, with such remainders and such estate to second, third, fourth, fifth, sixth, seventh, and every other son of the said John Hobart successively and in order, one after the other; and for default, to the use of such woman as at the time of the death of the said John Hobart shall be his wife and shall have issue or issues in her womb of the body of the said John Hobart begotten, until such issue or issues shall be born and such woman shall die. And if such after-born issue be a son or sons, then to the use of the heirs male of the body of the said John Hobart issuing; and for default of such issue or woman, and after other determination of the estates aforesaid, then remainder to the said Miles,

Nathaniel, James, Thomas, Robert, Edward, and Henry, sons of the said Henry in Commission named, their sons and wives successively and respectively, in manner as before to the sons of John Hobart and their wives; after, to the issue male of the said Henry in Commission; and for default, to the right heirs of Robert Hobart, Edward Hobart, and Henry Hobart the son, for ever. And as to other lands, &c., to the use—after the decease of the said Henry, if Dorothy, daughter of the said John Hobart by Lady Philippa, late his wife and daughter of Robert then Earl of Leicester, survive—of Thomas Hobart, Knt., and others, on trust to secure the payment of £2,000 to Dorothy, daughter of John Hobart, when she should complete her age of seventeen years, or within six months after, and after the payment of the said sum to Dorothy, or after her death before such age, for the sole advantage of said John Hobart for term of his life; and after, to the use of the wife and daughters of John Hobart and heirs male of their bodies, and afterwards to Miles, Nathaniel, James, Thomas Hobart, Robert Hobart, Edward and Henry the son, and the wives and daughters of every one of them, and the heirs male of the body of the same sons, and heirs male of the body of the said Henry Hobart in Commission, and the right heirs of the said Robert Hobart, Edward Hobart, and Henry Hobart the son, in manner as before respectively mentioned and limited as to the manor of Langley, as by the said indenture (shewn to the jurors) doth appear. Afterwards, in the lifetime of the said Henry Hobart, the said John Hobart took to wife the said Lady Frances; and the said Dorothy is yet living and aged seven years. [A mass of particulars passed over.]

A fine levied in Trinity Term, 18 Jas. (3 July, 1620) to the use of Henry Hobart (in Commission) for life; after to the use of the said John Hobart and heirs male of the body of the said Lady Philippa then his wife (which said Lady Philippa died without male issue begotten on her by John Hobart); and for default, to the right heirs of the said Henry Hobart, as by the chirograph and an indenture dated 1 May, 18 Jas. (1620) doth appear.

A fine levied in Easter Term, 21 James (1623) as to the manor of Intwood, &c., to the use of the said Henry Hobart and his heirs until a marriage between the said Miles Hobart and Lady Frances Bedingfield should be solemnized; then to the use of the said Henry for life, after his decease to the use of Dorothy his wife in the name of part of her jointure; after, to the

use of said Miles for life, then to firstborn son of Miles and heirs male of the body of such first son, with remainder to second, third, fourth, fifth, sixth, seventh, and other sons of Miles, with further remainders to Nathaniel and James Hobart, &c. Afterwards, and before the death of the said Henry Hobart, the said Miles took to wife the said Frances Bedingsfield.

Henry Hobart, for the natural love which he bore towards his son Nathaniel, by indenture dated 1 April, 21 Jas. (1623) and duly enrolled in the Court of Common Pleas, agreed that he (Henry) and his heirs should be seized of the manor of Bloxham, co. Lincoln, &c., to the use of him (Henry) for life, and after to the use of his other sons, Thomas and Robert. (Other indentures to the use of his other sons, Thomas and Robert.) Mention of "Edward Hobart of Langley, Esq.," who deceased before the said Henry Hobart and before 22 June, 1 Charles (1625), the date of an indenture (also enrolled) by which Edward son of Henry was seized in fee-tail of the manor of Beeston alias Beeston Leames and sundry lands. Another indenture enrolled and dated 29 June, 1 Chas. (1625) for Henry the son, &c. The said Henry Hobart died 28 Dec., 1 Charles (1625) at Blickling; and John Hobart, Knt. and Bart., is his son and heir, and at the time of his father's death he was aged thirty years. Lady Frances, wife of John Hobart, son and next heir of Sr Henrie Hobarte, Kt. & Baronett, deceased, &c.—Book 65, fo. 22 b.

A.D. 1632. John Hobart, Esq. [Chanc. Inq. p. m., 9 Charles I., p. 1, No. 73.]

Co. Norfolk. Inquisition taken at Harleston, 8 October, 8 Chas. (1632.) John Hobart, Esq., long before his death was seized in fee of a capital messuage called Sendalls in Sall in co. Norfolk, with land, meadow, and pasture in Sall, Beppham, and Cardeston, with the same messuage used and

occupied, amounting to 107 acres, and other lands. One Thomas, Lord Knyvett, Baron of Eskricke, and Lady Elizabeth his wife, were seized in fee of the manor of Haves alias Haves Wood and Moorehall, &c., in co. Norfolk, and for a sum of £2000 paid sold the same 23 Nov., 9 James I. (1611) to the said John Hobart and John Hobart his son and their heirs for ever, as by the fine appears. John Hobart was also seized in fee of a messuage called Brushes, situate in Burgate, co. Suffolk, and land in Burgate, &c. So seized thereof, the said John Hobart, by good and sufficient conveyances in law, conveyed all and singular the aforesaid to his son John and Dorothy his (son) wife, and the heirs of their bodies. Afterwards, 18 September, 6 Chas. (1630) the said John Hobart made his testament and last will in writing, and devised land to one Miles Hobart his son for life, with remainder to first, second, &c., to tenth son and sons of the said Miles and their issue male; in default, to daughters of Miles and their issue. As to Sendalls, that Dorothy, then his wife, should have the use and occupation of the same for life; and after her decease, to his son John and his heirs for ever. Afterwards, viz., 14 October, 6 Chas. (1630) the said John Hobart died. John Hobart, son and heir, was at the time of his father's death aged twenty-nine years. Dorothy, wife of the said John deceased, the father, and Dorothy, wife of John Hobart the son, are yet living, &c.

A.D. 1633. Sir Miles Hobart, Knt. [Ex. 9 Chas. p. 1, No. 30.]

Co. Bucks. Inquisition taken 17 Sept., 9 Chas., after the death of Sir Miles Hobart, Knight, who was found seized of the manor of Harleford in Great Marlow, and by deed dated Oct., 5 Chas., he granted an annuity to Anthony Watson, clerk, and Elizabeth his wife of £11 for their lives. Sir Miles died at Harleford, 20 June, 8 Chas., and John Rous, clerk, son and heir of Anthony Rous, clerk, deceased, son and heir of Alice, wife of John Rous, and one of the daughters of William Hobard of Southwold, father of William Hobard of Norwich, father of Miles Hobard, citizen and clothworker of London, father of said Sir Miles Hobart, Knt., was at his death one of his coheirs, and was of the age of forty years. Wm. Hobard of Southwold by Margaret his wife had issue, besides Wm. Hobard of Norwich and said Alice, a daughter Dorothy, who was wife of Wm. Holbourne, and no other issue, and said Wm. and Dorothy had issue Wm. Holbourne their eldest son, who was heir

of said Dorothy, and he had issue by Ann his wife an only daughter Margaret, now wife of Oliver Ridge, and no other issue. At the Admiralty Sessions, 34 Eliz., said Wm. Holbourne the son was convicted and attainted of divers practices, robberies, and felonies, and on 19 Oct. in that year died without issue, except said Margaret Ridge, who was the other coheir of said Sir Miles Hobart, viz. daughter and heir of Wm. Holbourne, son and heir of Dorothy, wife of Wm. Holbourne, and the other daughter of Wm. Hobart of Southwold, &c., and was aged forty, but by reason of said conviction, &c., one moiety escheated to the Crown.

A.D. 1640. Miles Hobart, Esquire.* [Chanc. Inq. p. m., 16 Chas. I., p. 3, No. 136.]

Co. Norfolk. Inquisition taken at Thetford, co. Norfolk, 24 March, 15 Chas. (1639-40.) Long before the death of the said Miles Hobart, in the writ named, Henry Hobart, Knt. and Bart., Chief Justice of Common Pleas, and late father of the said Miles was seised in fee of the manor of Intwood, &c. Fine levied in Easter Term, 21 Jas. (1623) (here referred to) in contemplation of marriage between Miles Hobart and Frances, Lady Beddingfeld, and in- denture tripartite dated 3 April, 21 Jas. (1623.) The marriage was held and solemnized. Afterwards the said Henry Hobart died in the lifetime of Miles, and Dorothy, widow of Henry, survived and is yet living. Frances, Lady Beddingfeld, died in the lifetime of Miles, and they had issue between them a firstborn son, John Hobart, and two daughters, Dorothy and Alice.

Indenture tripartite dated 2 July, 8 Chas. (1632) and made between the said Miles of the first part, John Hobart, Knt. and Bart., and William Pruton, Esq., of the second part, and Elizabeth Hobart, second wife and now widow of Miles, of the third part, by the name of Elizabeth Moundeford, one of the daughters of Edmund Moundeford, Knt., deceased, of the third part, in consideration of marriage between the said Miles and Elizabeth, and for jointure of the said Elizabeth (quoted, in English, to the following effect.) It is agreed that if Miles Hobart die without issue male begotten of the body of the said Elizabeth, and have issue but one daughter living at the time of his death, then his heirs, executors, &c., shall pay to the said daughter £1000

at her age of twenty-one years, or at her marriage (which of them shall first happen) or at any other time. And if Miles shall die without issue male or female, and Elizabeth be "unseint" with a daughter by the said Miles at the time of his death, his heirs, executors, &c., shall pay to such afterborn daughter £1000 at her age of twenty-one, or marriage, or at any other time. Miles Hobart died 6 December last (1639), and John, his son and heir, the first-begotten son on the body of the said Frances his wife, deceased on 9 March last (1639-40), was aged twelve years. The said Elizabeth, late wife, is yet living. The said Miles and Elizabeth had issue, Miles, first-begotten son of the body of Elizabeth, and two daughters, Elizabeth and Abigail, who are all living. The said Elizabeth at the time of the death of Miles was pregnant. Dame Dorothy Hobart is yet living, &c.

In the east window of Loddon church was the representation of Sir James Hobart and his lady, with the family arms on his surcoat, and the following inscription beneath:—

"Orate pro aia Jaci Hobat, militi et attorney dñi regis, qui hanc ecclesiam a primis fundamentis condidit in tribus annis cum suis propriis bonis, anno regis Henrici septimi undecimo."

A passport granted to Sir John Hobart by the Parliament for a journey into Norfolk:—"Whereas Sir John Hobart of Bickling, Knight and Baronet, one of the Deputy-Lieutenants appointed by the House of Commons, is known to be a man well affected to his Majesty and to the Parliament, and is now travelling into Norfolk, with five cases of pistols, three carbines, and two little short pieces of brass; these are to require all Sheriffs, Mayors, and constables, and other his Majesty's subjects and officers whatsoever, to permit and suffer him to pass quietly and freely with the arms above mentioned, without any lett or molestation."—*R. H. Mason's History of Norfolk*, part ii. p. 287.

In the court-roll of the manor of Hendon, co. Middlesex, it is stated that Samuel Turner, Esq., was lord, and Edward Hobart, Esq., steward of the manor, 1686.

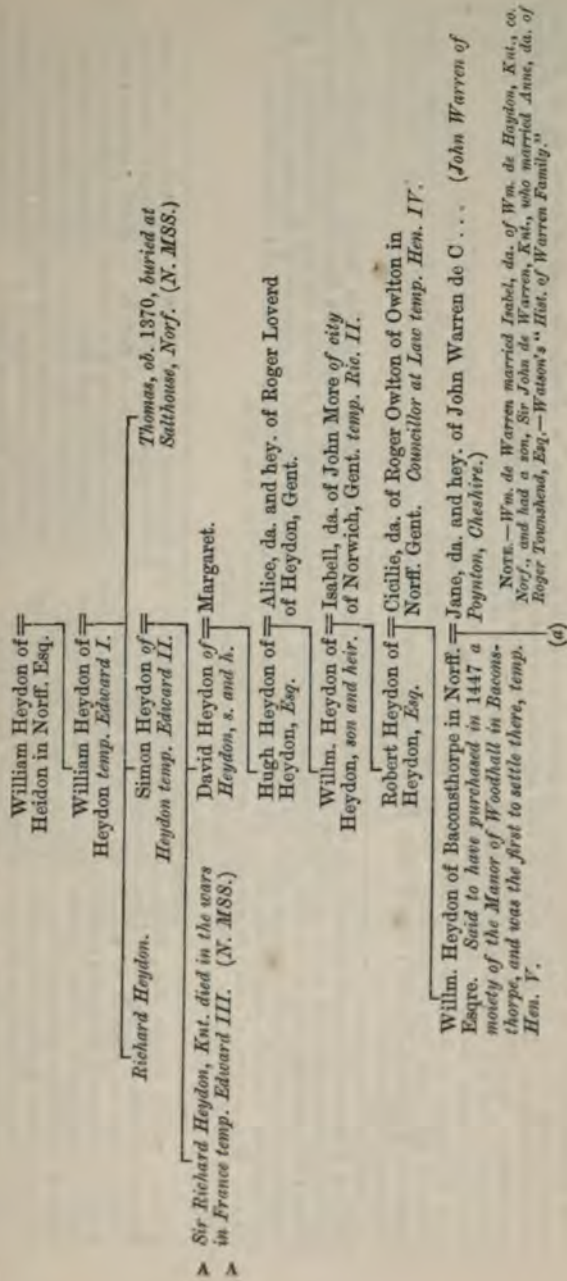

THE GROVE, WATFORD.

This domain was the ancient seat of the family of Heydon, of whom John Heydon died possessed of it on the 1st of March, 1408, leaving William his son and heir. William Heydon (son of William) succeeded, and by inquisition taken at Hatfield 21 July, anno 38 Henry VIII. after the death of the said William (the son) it was found that he made his will on the 8th of May, anno 37 Henry VIII., and afterwards died seised of this Manor of Grove in Watford, held of the King as of his Manor of Cashiobury, by fealty, suit of court, and an annual rent of 37*s.* and 2*d.*; and that Henry Heydon was the eldest son and heir of the said William (the son), and then of the age of 38 years.

The successor of Henry Heydon, Esq., was Francis Heydon, Esq., his son and heir, Sheriff of Hertfordshire anno 25 Elizabeth.

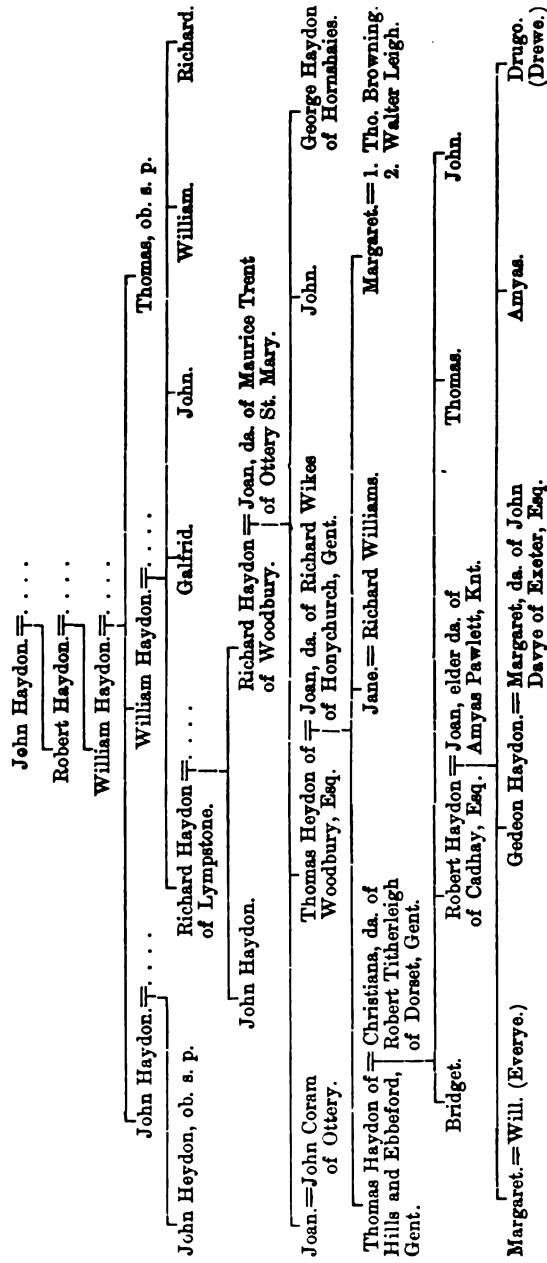

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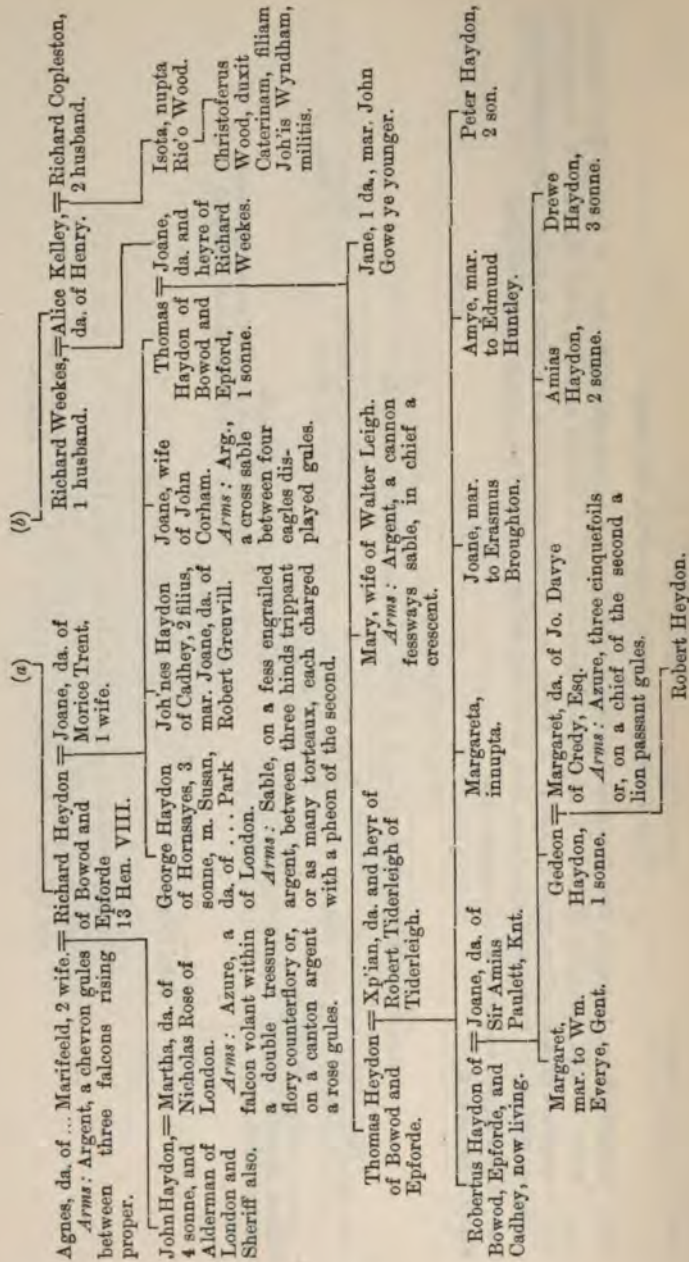

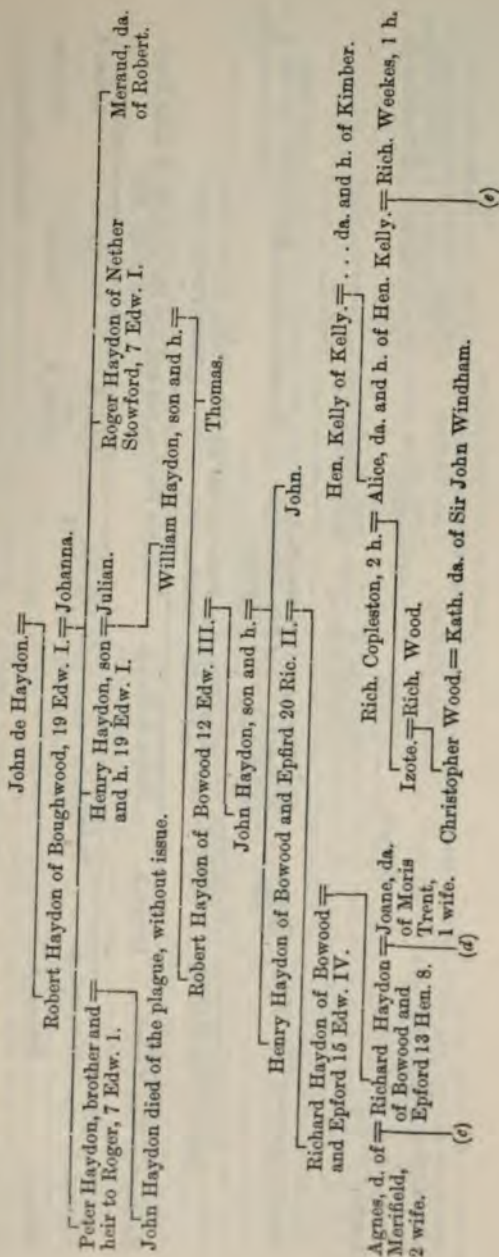

As Sir William was going to land with the soldiers, the enemies' approach was so furious that they were enforced by violence to retire into ye water, where he lost his life.

There died at ye same tyme with him, Mr. Johnson the enginer and one ensigne Greene, petardier.

Sir Wm. Heydon was buried at St. a flete in St. Martin's island, in ye best manner my Lord Gen'll could devise, being carried to church by ye young Lord Fielding and Colonel Gray, now Mr of the Ordnance, with many other Knts. of the best degree. My Lord Gen'll and Monse de Subize went to Church with him.

There were left many other Knts. and gentlemen which I have not time to relate.

Of French Barons there were alaine thirty-two who charged us most furiously, but few of them returned againe.

The number of horse that was slain was 112. Of their floote there was alaine a greate number web I am uncertaine of. Our English horse were not landed.

We are now marched cleane through the Island of St. Martin's and have driven them to their last retriete: they are in the forte of St. Martin web wee have now laid seige unto.

The Gen'll hath got the universall love of the Armie.

From St. Martin's Island, in fraunce, the 18 of July, 1627.

[Endorsement.] This copie was taken oute of a letter sent by Sr Wm. Heydon's man to one of ye clarkes of ye ordinaunce in England, for Sr Wm. was Lewtente of ye Ordinaunce here and a greate freinde of our Sr John Ashfeilde.—*Buxton MSS., Shadwell*.

"Among the Parkhurst correspondence at Cambridge, Es. II. 34, there are a great many letters in a cause which came before his Lordship as Bishop of Norwich, and which he appears to me to have done his best to adjudicate upon unfairly. Thomas de Grey, a boy of seven at his father's death, son of Thomas de Grey of Merton, by Anne, dau. of Henry Everard of Linstead, co. Suffolk, was heir to the Merton estate, by the death of his father in 1562. The lad became the ward of his father's second wife Temperance, dau. of Sir Wymonde Carew of Anthony, co. Cornwall, who married secondly Sir Christopher Heydon of Baconsthorpe. He was very delicate, and fearing he might slip through their hands, the Heydons married him when he was ten years old or thereabouts to Elizabeth Heydon, who, I presume, was a daughter of Sir Christopher by a former marriage. The lady was, I think, sixteen. The child died at Baconsthorpe (where he was married) in 1566, and the young widow was subsequently married to Nicholas Myrne, 'Esq.', evidently a great favourite of the Bishop's, who thereupon sued for the widow's dower. Robert de Grey resisted the demand, pleading the nullity of the marriage. The bishop wrote discreditable letters to his chancellor and others on the subject, they for the most part giving it as their opinion that the marriage

was null and that Myrme had not a leg to stand on. Nicholas Myrme, Esq., was of Little Walsingham, who belonged to a malignant family who christened their sons Nicholas again and again with no other object than to puzzle genealogists. He was quite a young man in 1571, and was mixing with the first people in the county at that time."—A. J.

Sir John Heydon and Sir Christopher Heydon were brothers. Sir Xpber. was one of the justices appointed to try the rebels. His commission dated 2 May, 1 Queen Mary, 1554.

Sir John Heydon and Sir Robert Mansfield quarrelled in the year 1600.

Notes.—W. E. G. L. B.

Sir John and Sir Christopher Heydon were both seized by Richard Jenkinson, Esq., High Sheriff of Norfolk, with their houses, goods, and chattels, for being in open rebellion against Queen Elizabeth A.D. 1600, as assistants to the Earl of Essex. Sir Xpber. lived at Mannington and had a mansion-house at Baconsthorpe. The Lady Heydon, the younger, of Mannington, then great with child and in great distress. Their offence committed 8 Feb., 1600.—*La New's MS.*

An oblong painting, on panel, of an Italian chateau with figures in the foreground, is now (1884) in the possession of Colonel Bulwer of Heydon Hall, and said to have come from Saxlingham Hall, one of the seats of the Heydon family.

The will of Thomas Darcy, dated Oct. 27th, 1557, to some extent clears up the difficulty about the asserted marriage of Robert Bedingsfield with Elizabeth, dau. of Sir John Heydon, referred to in the note, vol. 1, page 163, *Visitation of Norfolk*. Elizabeth Darcy, dau. of Sir John Heydon, proved her husband's will and died about a year after his death, apparently leaving no will. But Robert Bedingsfield, as supervisor of Thomas Darcy's will, proved it again, 1558.

The Sir Robert Mansfield who fought the duel with Sir John Heydon, 1600, was probably the same Sir Robert who married Anne, widow of Sir Francis Windham, Knt., one of the Justices of the Common Pleas, and daughter of Sir Nicholas Bacon of Bedgrave, Lord Keeper, by Jane, daughter of Wm. Farnley of London.

In the Lashington Room at the Canterbury Museum is a case containing the left hand of Sir John Heydon, Knt., and with it the MS. describing the remarkable duel which took place between him and Sir Robert Mansfield near Norwich, in the year 1600. The following account of this duel is taken from the description given in the catalogue of the museum at Canterbury, which was prepared by John Bress, Esq., F.S.A., 1875.

*DUEL BETWEEN SIR JOHN HEYDON AND SIR ROBERT MANSFIELD,
JANUARY, 1600.**

The severed hand of Sir John Heydon is exhibited in the Museum at Canterbury, and its history is somewhat curious. It is accompanied by a manuscript account of a duel which took place near Norwich, in January, 1600. The manuscript is thus headed:—"The hand of Sir John Heydon, Knight, who in the year 1600 fought a duel with Sir Robert Mansfield, Knight, near Norwich city, with Sir John dyed of ye wounds he recd in the said duel, (as I'm infor'd). I had this hand from Mrs. Lomax,† whose mother was nearly related to the Heydons."

The manuscript we should judge was not contemporaneous, nor nearly so, with the event it describes, but rather appears to be in the orthography and writing of the commencement of the 18th century, although it may be earlier. The following "N.B." gives its own date:—"The document, together with the hand of Sir John Heydon, were given to me by Charles Viscount Maynard. A.D. 1822.—DANIEL JARVIS."

Mr. Jarvis was a doctor of medicine, resident at Margate, who presented the hand and the accompanying MS. to the Museum at Canterbury, probably at the time of the date of the indentment, or soon afterwards. The Mrs. Lomax alluded to as above, was a direct lineal descendant of Mirabel, the daughter of Sir John Heydon.

The relic we have alluded to is the left hand, carefully dried. It has been severed from the wrist about an inch below the little finger—transversely

† The late Lord Strafford had a MS. volume in his possession which, alluding to the severed hand of Sir John Heydon, stated it was formerly in the possession of Thomas Martin of Pegrave, the author of the *History of Bedford*. cutting the wrist bones, which have fallen out of the socket. Sir John, in spite of the aversment of the MS., did not die of this wound, but survived it some years, to be known hereafter as "Heydon with one hand."

We have no account of the cause of this duel, although the MS. minutely describes the affair itself, and certain proceedings which were attendant upon it. The mutilated hand, which is the left, looks as if injured by a sabre blow. This we know could not have been the case, as the combatants fought with their rapiers. More probably it was amputated by a surgeon. The excision is through the metacarpus of the little finger, down through the trapezoid and trapezium bones of the wrist below the third finger.

The duel was fought near Norwich. The combatants rode some little way towards the scene of action, accompanied by two friends, but they quickly parted company from their seconds, if such they might be called, and rode off. Sir John Heydon in advance, he being constrained to do so by Sir Robert Mansfield, who suspected or insinuated a suspicion of treachery from the very beginning. And here it is proper to remark, that the MS. account of this duel is entirely an *ex parte* statement of the latter knight. At length, upon a hill between two highways, they dismounted and fought. There appear to have been no witnesses present, although certain evidence of two labouring men is subjoined, which confirms parts only of the strange incidents connected with this duel.

To return, however, to Sir John Heydon and Sir Robert Mansfield. The only description of the duel which we have is from the MS. in the Canterbury Museum, placed alongside of the amputated hand.

Report of Sir Robert Mansfield.

"Sir Edwyn Ryche carried me without Bar Street Gate; my dere nephew Knyvett brought Sir John Heydon thither, wherupon we rid away towards Mr. Doyley's, and in a close upon this syde the waker, I entreated Sir Edward Ryche to go to my nephew Knyvett to the end we might be dismissed; wherupon we parted, and they both lighted and searched us, and measured our rapiers, and found Sir John Heydon's longer than myn, by a full ynche; then I desired Sir Edwyn Ryche to see if his rapier would fytt the other, and it would, but he would not let me have it. Then I saide I would fyght with my owne; my nephew Knyvett refused it absolutelie; and thereupon, after

many persuasions that I would suffer Sir John's rapier to go back to be shortened, I absolutelie refused, and swore that they both should not kepe me from ending the difference at that tyme with my owne sword; wherupon we mounted on horseback, and I led the wale, for so Sir John would have it. By and by, my nephew Knyvett called and tould me we were to ryde to Ruckewards, as I understood it, but being ignorant of the wale I was to be directed by Sir John Heydon, who led me another wale, and refused to fyght in a narrow place that we did ryde through, which had a depe dyke on the one syde and ploughed lands on the other syde. And then he made me take a wale to the topp of a hill between two great high wales, where he would have nedes me leight, for he would ryde no further, although he sawe companye ryding on both syds. When I sawe no remedie, I fitted myself thereunto, and cam up to him, and in the verie first thrust he hurte me in the breste, which I followed and hurte him in twoe places, whereof one was in the thigh, wherupon he turned his back towards me, and following of him he stumbled, and after I did judge he would falle I strooke him a blowe on the face, wherewith he fell upon his hands and knees, and he cryed, 'That I would not kyll him baselie on the grounde, for he would make me any satisfaction I would demand,' which I confesse held me from doinge him any further hurte untill he did rise; and when he was upp, without speaking any worde he ran me into the brest againe, and my thruste myst him, as I thought, by his coming home to me. Then we fell to stabbes with our daggers, and at his goinge out I strooke him upon the head with my sword, and another blowe at his face, which made him loose his dagger, which instantlie he recovered; afterwards I charged to halfe sword, and then he cryed to me to hould my hands, for he would make me any satisfaction; wherewith I stopped back, and suddentlie, before there passed any wordes, he thrust and hit withall, came to stabbes with his dagger, and hurte me in the right arm two stabbes, wherupon I never left him, untill he cryed the third tyme to hould my hand, saing againe he would make me any satisfaction, wherunto I answered, I would never trust a trecherous villaine the third tyme, unless he would laie downe his rapier and dagger, which att the first in valiant termes he denied, untill he sawe me presse him so hotlie, he said 'if I would not kyll him he would laie down his rapier and dagger, and make me whatever satisfaction I would,' which I promised by oathe to performe, though he in

Nottingham, relative to the duel, and the depositions of the two husbandmen, who were examined in the matter. Another letter is from Sir Basingbourne Gaudy to the Lord Chief Justice Popham, and the reply of the Lord Chief Justice.

Rumours of foul play, reflecting strongly on Sir Robert Mansfield, had become prevalent, and hence the comments and inquiries. Sir John Heydon, though grievously wounded, survived the encounter. He was alive in 1614, and bore the sobriquet of "Heydon with one hand," for in that year, at the marriage of Jane Drummond, one of the Maids of Honour to the Queen of James I., he appears to have had a quarrel with the Earl of Essex, which was to be decided "presently," but whilst Heydon went to fetch his sword, Essex was restrained by the Archbishop of Canterbury. The Queen, affronted at this unseemly "brabble" at her feast, and the fault being laid upon Heydon, he was temporarily confined in the Fleet Prison. The occasion, as the narrative relates, was "dismal to him and his family," for a Decree in Chancery was issued that day that the Sheriff and Justices of Norfolk should raise the county, and thrust his father out of all the possessions which he held.

The above documents are imperfect in some degree. The letters to the Lord Thomas Howard and to the Earl of Nottingham are unsigned, and no allusion is made in the other portion of the MS. to the death of Sir John Heydon. The affair of the duel is strange enough, when we consider the circumstances attending it, and even in those days, when every gentleman wore his rapier by his side, and personal encounters were of common occurrence, it awakened inquiry and comment. Sir Robert Mansfield appears to have set out with his opponent, prepared for every contingency;—he had his articles as he called them, carefully placed within his vest, in a most business-like manner, as if certain of the issue of the combat; he carried his pen and his inkhorn, like a scrivener of the day; his sword, indeed, was an inch shorter than his opponent's, but his attendant knight, if not his second, refused to accommodate him, according to his account, with the temporary loan of his own sword, that he might fight on even terms. In his account, he insinuates suspicion against his opponent from the very beginning, although we are unable to conclude how Sir John Heydon's refusal to fight "in a narrow place," or his ultimate determination to bring the affair to an issue "on the top of a hill between two great high wales," could be more prejudicial to one

the interim thrust his rapier in the ground to breake it, but perceiving it would not breake, he laid his rapier and dagger crosse wales close by his fete, and stepped back as I willed him. Then I tooke upp his rapier and dagger, and carried them to the place where I left my pures and tabernes, and drewe out my articles from my breste, where I carried them, and brought them with ink and pen to him to signe, who seeing me come towards him, fell downe, and told me I had killed him, and he was not able to wryte. Then I did present to kill him, which I would have done if he had not signed the articles, and thereupon he sett his hand, and told me he could wryte no better, and so I putt upp the articles in my pocket, and at his request I cast my cloak upon him, and going towards my horse, with his rapier and dagger I espied twoe men coming verie nere, and it made me call them for wytnesse, and then I asked Sir John whether he had signed this paper, which I drewe forth out of my pocket, who would make me no other answer but that he hoped there was nothing but the articles, and willed me to remember he hadd not then redd them. Then, finding myself very ill, and hadd no use att all of my ryght arme, verie little of the other, and one of my wounds to retell, I tooke both rapier and dagger, and left my ruffe, my spurres, and the scabbard of my dagger, behind me; and being mounted, I caused one of the poore men to cast Sir John's cloak about me, and so I cam galloping to my house, where I found Sir John Townsend, with many other gentlemen of worth, who can wytnesse of the unbuttoning and unripping of my doublett, and stripping of myself to be laide in bedd, in what manner and case I leave to their reports, and myself to justifie the truthe thereof, further, then by reputation or discretion, I shall be tyed within the eares of the least sence be contraried (*sic*) nor with any hostile by Sir John Heydon himself, unto whome I gave his life twice at that tyme—once, to my own endangering of my life by suffering hym to rise, and the second tyme, when he yielding me his rapier and dagger, whereof the world may be satisfied by my carrying it awale, and keeping it. In testimonie hereof I sett my hand.

The MS., besides the above document, contains the letters of Sir Basingbourne Gaudy and Mr. Hungate, to Lord Thomas Howard and the Earl of

party than to another. Sir Robert Mansfield, according to the deposition of one of the husbandmen, Thomas Yarham, exclaimed, "Old father, search me," and unlatched his doublet, but Sir Robert had nothing on his breast but the doublet, his waistcoat, and a shirt. The said husbandman did not see Sir Robert Mansfield put any pen into Sir John Heydon's hand, but he saw a very short pen lie on the ground hard by. The other husbandman, Henry Hardy of Norwich, confirms this account. He saw Sir Robert Mansfield going towards Sir John Heydon, "with a written paper in his hand without either pen or ink," and he heard Sir John reply, when requested to set his hand to the same, "that he could not, nor would not," and that Sir Robert Mansfield made no answer. Also that Sir Robert Mansfield, in spite of his saying "he was very ill, had no use at all of his right arm, and very little of the other," as per statement, "mounted his horse, with all the weapons he carried out of the field, without any help." Sir Robert having taken Sir John's cloak, left him his own; no attempt, however, seems to have been made by any of the parties present to staunch the blood from Sir John Heydon's wounds, or otherwise assist him. He was lifted up into a cart, and carried home some half-an-hour after Sir Robert Mansfield had quitted the field.

The letters of Sir Basingbourne Gaudy and Mr Hungeate relate chiefly to the facts that no force or practise was used to draw the husbandmen to Sir Robert Mansfield's house, and that their "speeches" were set down by a public notary; and that they all "decry or disclaim to be instruments of any such base practises as he and we are most unjustly charged withall, who would more willingly quench the fire already kindled, than be procurers of any further mischiefs."

The Lord Chief Justice's letter is written in a mild and conciliatory spirit, although he could not refrain from rebuking "such reports as had grown from Sir Robert Mansfield, as in terming Sir Christopher Heydon and his brother 'base knaves,' with many unbecoming terms to be given by one gentleman to another."

Nothing further appears to have arisen out of this affair, and Sir Robert Mansfield, or Mansel, seems in the reign of King James to have risen in favour with the Administration, and to have held the important office of Treasurer to the Navy.

We may note a curious expression in Sir Robert Mansfield's narrative. He

speaks of finding "one of his wounds to rattell." We can guess the meaning, but have been unable to find in any dictionary any appropriate signification beyond the meaning "to make a noise"—i.e., "to be troublesome."

In the fight Sir John Heydon appears at one time to have attacked his opponent with his sword in one hand and his dagger in the other, Sir Robert refusing to trust him unless "he laid down his rapier and dagger."

NOTE.—Another account of this mysterious duel is given in the *Gentleman's Magazine* for May, 1833, page 481; and an extended memoir of Sir Robert Mansfield is to be found in Massell's *History of the Family of Mansell*.—London, 1850. Sir Robert Mansel was the third son of Sir Edward Mansel, Knt., by his wife Lady Jane Somerset, daughter of Henry, Earl of Worcester. Sir Robert was knighted by the Earl of Essex, 1596, at the capture of Cadix, was afterwards made Vice-Admiral of the Fleet by King James I., continued in that post by Charles I., and lived to a great age.

"Sir John Heydon, Knt., married . . . 4th daughter of Sir Gilbert Gerrard, Bart., by Mary, sixth dau. of Sir Francis Barrington, Knt. and Bart."—Livescombe's *Hist. of Bucks.*

In the *Supplement to the Record of the House of Gournay* there appear several letters from the Heydons and others addressed to Sir Basingbourne Gaudy, Knt., of West Harling, during the period he was three times Sheriff of Norfolk, viz., 1578, 1583, 1602. Among these letters are the following:—

Sir. I am sorry my unhappie estate giveth me occasion to becume a suiter unto you in a matter of this natur, but I have no other way to prevent executions that are now lybly to cum out against Mr. Thetford as my suerty, but by your frendly forbearing to execute the same till the next terme, not doubtinge in ye meane tyme but to satisfie ye parties them selves. If I could have could land I wold not have suffred matters to growe to this extremitye, and before the tyme predexed I assure you upon my honest faythe to provide sum way for their contentment, and in the meane tyme I will not desire your under sherifes losse, but will most thankfully consider him for his fee, which, though it will be a charge, yet by this favor I shall prevent much infamie, greife, and other inconveniences yt will happen if my suerties shold be molested and empesched by my debt. I most earnestly pray you yt you will instantly give your ordre by letter or otherwise to your onder sheriffe for ye satisfayinge of this my request, giving him contentment to ye uttermost of his due, whereby as I shall acknowledge my self infinitely pleased so I pray you persuade yourself, you shall ever fynd me accordingly redy to deserve your

kindness as this present. So, commending me hartely to your self, with my services to my Lady, in hast I rest

Sr. With remembrance of my dewtie, this be to ascertayne you that after your coming from Norwich yestdaye the chalenge between Sr. Robert Mansfild and Sr. John Heydon took effecte. The first payd for it but bled onely, but Sr. John Heydon before this is thought to be deade. This nuse we had from one that cam from Norw. yestdaye, whose upon the waye mette wth. passengers that cam to the ende of the fraye, and reporteth thus. They went about twelve of the clocke from Norwch. to fight about half a myle distant from Herford without frende of eyther syde. In the fight passengers cam bye and before their neere approach they did see Sr. John Heydon falle; he is hurte in many places, but the deadly wounde is by a thruste in at his throte and out at the toppe of his heade. Sr. Robert went to Norwich with the armes of the other who laye upon the grownde till the foresaid passengers cam to him, but could neyther stande nor speake, and they conveyed him to a house next to the place, but further he reporte not. Thus much I thought to certifie you, yf it be newe it shall be welcome, yf not I desyre you to continue good construction of mee. I am and will be redye to doe any s^rvice for the discharge of my dewtie, or that might contente your worship.

The marriage of Thomas de Grey with Elizabeth Heydon, mentioned by Dr. Jessopp at page 212 in the contribution from the Parkhurst Correspondence at Cambridge, is explained in the following pedigree of "the Drury family," which shows that Thomas de Grey was married, not to Elizabeth Heydon, but to Elizabeth, daughter of Robert and Audrey Drury, and niece of Anne, the first wife of Sir Christopher Heydon of Baconthorpe. She afterwards married Nicholas Myrme of Walsingham. Little or nothing is known of this Nicholas Myrme, beyond that in the *Visitation of the County of*

Somerset, 1623, he is said to have been the son of Robert Myrme by a daughter of Lord Rich, and the extract from the Parish Register of Rushford, given at page 203, in all probability refers to him. The Myrme Pedigree at present is a "tangled skein." The similarity of Christian names and the absence of all descriptive distinctions have puzzled many genealogists. Dr. Jessopp calls them on this account "a malignant family," and that able historian and genealogist, the late Mr. G. A. Cartwright, F.S.A., in his *History of the Hundred of Llandudoch*, confesses his inability to draw out a connected pedigree of this family in spite of the numerous quotations from wills and parish registers given in his work.—W. E. G. L. B.

Blomefield says "There are several stones more of this family with their inscriptions rent off, and on some their arms remain, as on the stone of John Dynne, who was buried about 1471."

King Henry VIII., by a patent dated 17 July, 10 Henry VIII., granted the wardship of Robert, son and heir of Henry Dyne, and his marriage to Sir John Heydon, Knt.

24 Hen. VIII. Sir Henry Fernor was High Sheriff of Norf., and made his will 8 April in that year, by which he settled an annuity of 40 marks on Dame Winifred h. w., and her lodging in the east end of his house, during widowhood, with £20 toward hangeage the same; a bason and ewer of silver, a nest of gilt goblets, a dozen silver spoons, 2 goblets, 2 salts, with meat and drink for herself, two maids, and a man, at charge of his son William. His first wife was Margaret, relict of John Wode, Esq., by whom he had two sons and two daughters. Lady Winifrede remarried, 26 Hen. VIII., Sir John Tendal of Hockwold, Norf.

Sir John Tyndall of Hockwold, who was made a knight of the Bath 31 May, 1533, was the only son of Sir Wm. Tyndall of Hockwold, K.B., who died 22 Feb., 1405-6, by his wife Mary, da. of Osbert Mondelford of Hockwold, Esq. King Henry VIII., by a patent dated 17 July, 10 Henry VIII., granted the wardship of Robert, son and heir of Henry Dymne, and his marriage to Sir John Heydon, Knt.

24 Hen. VIII. Sir Henry Fernor was High Sheriff of Norfolk, and made his will 8 April in that year, by which he settled an annuity of 40 marks on Dame Winfred h. w., and her lodging in the east end of his house, during widowhood, with £20 toward bawginge the same; a basen and ewer of silver, a nest of gilt goblets, a dozen silver spoons, 2 goblets, 2 salts, with meat and drink for herself, two maids, and a man, at charge of his son William. His first wife was Margaret, relict of John Wode, Esq., by whom he had two sons and two daughters. Lady Winfredre remarried, 26 Hen. VIII., Sir John Tyndall of Hockwold, Norfolk.

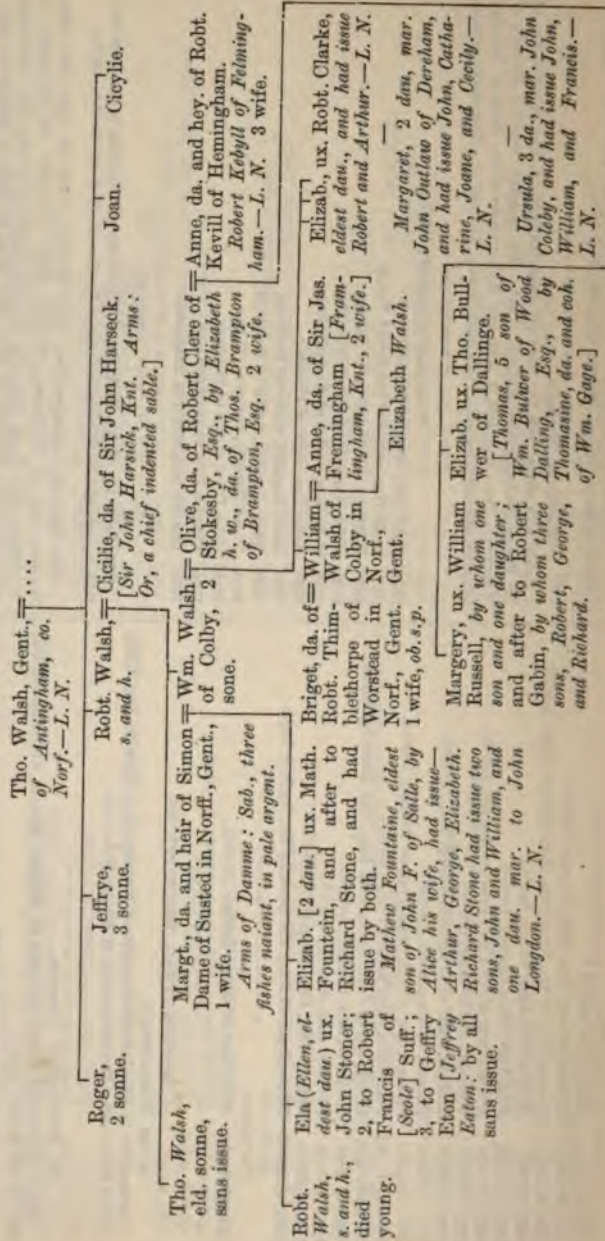

"I am apt to conclude these two descents of Nicholas, William, and Robert in the pedigree are all fictitious, as I find none of their names mentioned, or their matches, in any record that I have yet seen; but to confirm what I have here observed, it appears from a fine, 30th Edward III. (1365), that John de Westlers and Burga his wife conveyed three messuages and lands in Rollesby to William Clere and Dionycia his wife."

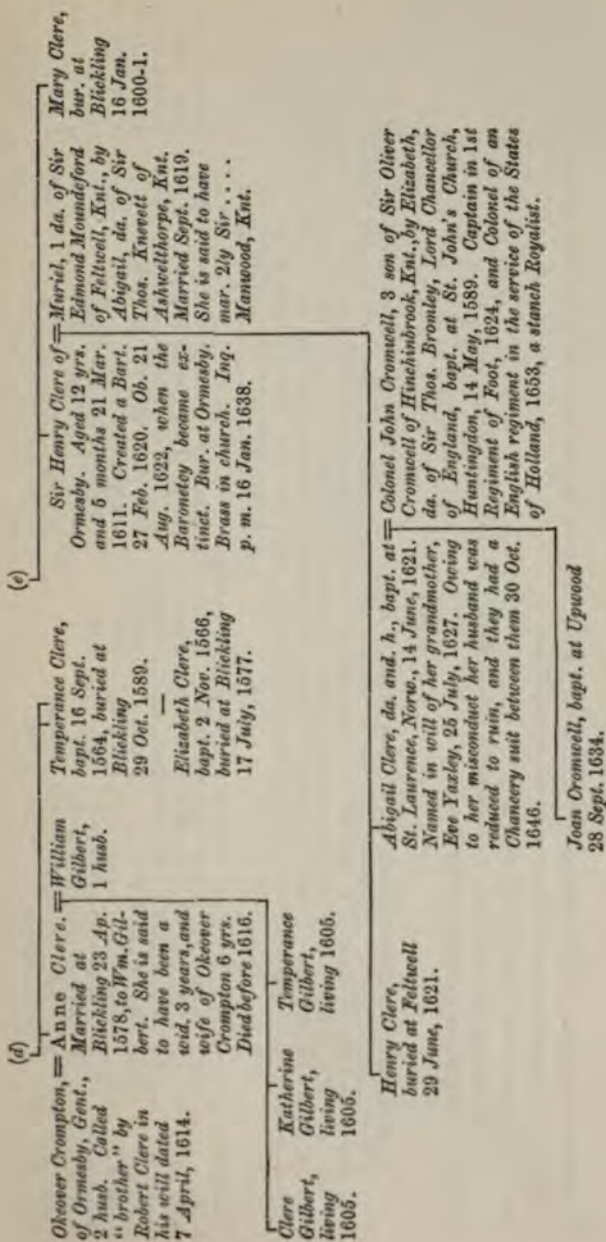

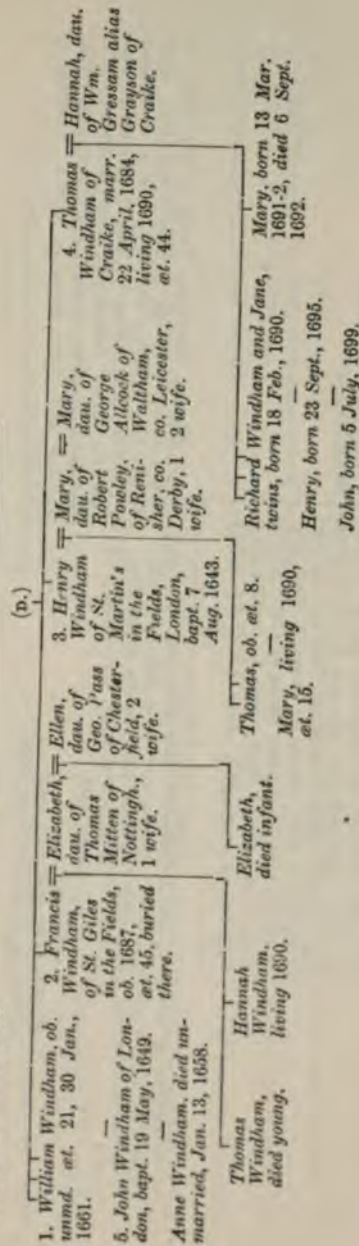
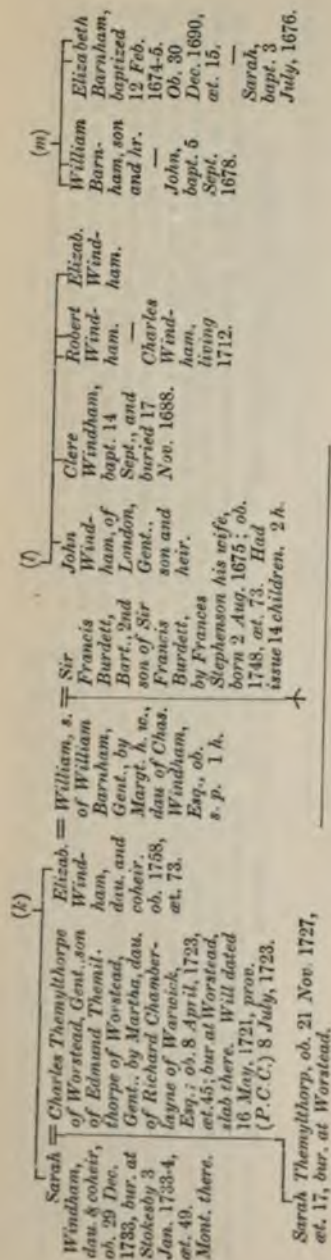

THE CLERE FAMILY OF IRELAND.

The first person of the name of Clere on record in the Office Books is the Very Rev. David Clere, appointed Dean of Waterford by Patent dated 9 August, 1570. He was an M.A., and as this date was before the foundation of Trinity College, Dublin, he must have been a graduate of Oxford or Cambridge, where his matriculation would show his parentage. His will, dated 31 Jan., 1601, was proved in the Prerogative Court of Ireland, 26 March following. He mentions his sons, Walter Clere, Luke Clere of Kilkenny, Nicholas Clere of Kilkenny, and two daughters, Margaret and Jane; also a brother Thomas Clere, who had two sons, James Clere, who was living at Ferns, co. Wexford, 1630; Robert Clere; and a daughter, Alison.

Sir Thomas Masterson, governor and grantee of Ferns Castle, temp. Queen Elizabeth, married Katherine, daughter of — Clero of Kilkenny, she died 30 Jan'y., 1596, and was buried at Kilkenny. Her death is recorded in the *Familiar Enriches*, vol. i., p. 19, where the arms recorded as hers are the same as those of Clero of Ormesby, Bart., viz., Argent, on a fesse azure three eagles displayed or. *Signed*, J. Bernard Burke, Ulster.

The above has been very kindly contributed by Sir J. Bernard Burke, who states in his *Extinct Baronetcies* that the Irish branch terminated in an heiress — Mary Clero, only daughter of John Clero, Esq., of Kilbury, who married 28 June, 1754, Sir Wm. A.D. 1455. Edmund Clerc, Esq., was made Bailiff, Feodary, and Gaolkeeper for the Duchy of Lancaster in Thetford.

A.D. 1537. The King leased the site of the Monastery of the Benedictine or Black Nuns of St. George in Thetford to Richard Fulmerston of Ipswich, Gent. (who was afterwards knighted), for 21 years, and he had an absolute grant of it in 1540, with other lands, and left it to his daughter Frances, who married Sir Edward Clerc of Blekinge, Knt., and at his death it descended to Sir Edward Clerc, his eldest son and heir, who was knighted at Norwich by Queen Elizabeth, Aug. 23, 1578, when she went her progress into those parts, and who was next year Sheriff of Norfolk, and afterwards a great traveller, and made a Knight of the French Order of St. Michael, but affecting much grandeur, he by degrees consumed his inheritance, and sold Blekinge to Sir Henry Hobart, Lord Chief Justice, and mortgaged the monastery to Mr. Godsalve of Bokenham Ferry, Norfolk.

In 1546 Cromwell's Manor, Wymondham, was sold to John Flowerdew of Wymondham, Esq., who settled it on Edward Flowerdew, who sold it in 1564 to Edward Clerc of Blekinge, Esq., and in 1636, Elizabeth Clerc, widow, was lady here. From this family it passed with Blekinge to the Hobarts.

In 1561 Wymondham Abbey Manor was granted by Queen Elizabeth to Walter Haddon, and in 1574 it belonged to Sir Henry Cobham, Knt., and

Anne his wife, late wife of Walter Haddon, Master of the Requests, who sold it that year to Edward Fiowerdew, Sergeant-at-Law, and since 1557 it came to the Cleres.

III., 1343, also 1346, 1347, 1351, and 1356. In 1390 he was guardian of the Temporalities of the See of Norwich during Bishop Percy's absence beyond sea.

Sir John Clere, Knt., who married Anne Tirrell, was Treasurer of the King's Armory in France, 1549, and was employed 1556 to hire ships for the King's service against Scotland; in 1557 was made Vice-Admiral and sent with a fleet to alarm the coasts of Scotland. On landing on Kirkway, one of the Orkney Islands, the Scots fell on them, killed and drowned 80 of his men, besides himself, who was drowned there 21 August, 1557.

Philip Paston, son of Sir John Paston, Knt., and Margery his wife, dau. of Sir Thos. Brews of Stinton Hall in Salle, married Anne, dau. and heir of Robert Griggs of Sparham, relict of John Blakeney, Esq. And a dau. Elizabeth, married to Wm. Clere, eldest son of Sir Robert Clere, with a portion of 400 marks.

Sir Edward Clere and Frances his wife sold St. Bennet's Manor, Winterton, to Sir Thomas Woodhouse.

July 14 (1489), 4 Hen. VII. The King sent his writ to the Escheator of Norfolk to deliver the Manor of Billings in Runham to the next heir of Edmund Clere, then 6 years old, to be kept for him till he was of age.

Sir Robert Clere, knighted 1494; Sheriff of Norfolk 1501; attended King Henry VIII. at the famous interview between him and the French King, 1526.

Sir John Clere, son and heir of Sir Robert, by his second wife, Alice Boleyn, was Treasurer of the King's army in France, 1549. And in 1557, being Vice-Admiral, and landing on one of the Orkney islands, called Kirkway, was there killed Aug. 21.

BILLS AND ANSWERS TEMP. JAC. I.

C 10. *Cleere v. Hobart*. Plaintiff was Dame Meryell Cleere, late wife of Sir Henry Cleere, Bart. Mention is made of Sir Edward, father of Sir Henry; also Dame Abigail Mountford, mother of Dame Meryell. Dispute over the settlements. [Lengthy proceedings.]

C 76. *Cleere v. Shiererd*. Plaintiff was Dame Elizth., widow of Sir Francis Cleere. Relates to lands in Cotton, Suffolk.

C 87. *Cleere v. Ognell*. Plaintiff was Dame Meryell Cleere, late wife of Sir Henry Cleere, late of Bokenham, Bart. Sir Edward Cleere, her husband's father. Dame Abigail Mountford, mother of plaintiff. Said Meryell and Sir Henry were married in September, 17 James I. Sir Henry died and left issue Abigail Cleere, a daughter of tender years. Bokenham was incumbered by Sir Edward and Sir Henry. The Cleeres seem to have been in financial difficulties. Ognell was a mercer in Cheapside, London, who had supplied goods and had extended the manor of Bokenham Ferry to satisfy his claim.

C 111. *Cleere v. Smyth, Kat.* Plaintiff swore John Cleere of Ratoliff, Midx., mariner, and Frances his wife, the administratrix of Robert Cleere, late of Stepney, mariner, deceased. John Cleere was a natural brother of Robert Cleere. Robert was of the ship "Trade Increase," and in the East Indies 15 March, 1612. Served three years. Claim for wages due.

C 26. *Cleere, Kat., v. Lambert*. 4 Nov. 1616. Sir Edw. Cleere of Thetford, Kat., plaintiff. Alleges that ten years ago Anne Crompton, the natural sister of the plaintiff and wife of William Gilbert, deceased, received by delivery of Sir Edw. Cleere, Kat., plaintiff's father, divers goods in trust for plaintiff; the said Anne lately suddenly died. That Okseover Crompton, her last husband, and Richard Lambert, "being lewd persons," seek to obtain the said goods. That they broke open the lodgings of Mr. Thos. Curson, Gent., of Norwich, where the goods were stored. The answer, with demurrer of Lambert, is a denial of most of the allegations. He says that he bought the goods from

Crompton in discharge of a claim of £5; that when he attempted to take possession Cleere assaulted, "took him by the hair of the head, and spat in his face," &c.; that Mrs. Crompton was a widow three years and wife of Crompton six years. Demurs on the ground of time elapsed, Sir Edward having been dead fourteen years.

C 223. *Cleere v. Kipping*. 7 Nov. 1622. Dame Elizth. Cleere, widow, late wife of Sir Francis Cleere, Kat., plaintiff. Alleges that Sir Edward Cleere, Kat., the father, was seized of the Rectory of Fretthorpe and conveyed it to said Elizth. on her marriage with Sir Francis, and she has since been in possession. Sir Francis died about twelve years ago. William Kippinge, the defendant, detains title deeds. Defendants answer, that the reversion of the rectory, since the death of Sir Francis, was sold by Sir Edward Cleere, the eldest brother and heir of Sir Francis Cleere, to Sir Tho. Berney, Kat., deceased.

C 223. *Cleere v. Colfer*. Nov. 1622. Dame Meryell Cleere, late wife of Sir Henry Cleere of Bokenham Ferry, Bart., plaintiff. Alleges that before marriage she had lands in Suffolk worth 100 marks per annum; that Sir Henry settled on her £400 per annum after his death; her title is now called in question, but she cannot prove it, as the deeds are in the hands of John Copher and Elizabeth his wife, of Norwich, who had two trunks full of deeds of the late Sir Henry, as the latter told her. Defendants answer. Alleges an indebtedness of £50 for board, &c., of Sir Henry, Dame Elizabeth, and their family, besides a winding sheet for Sir Henry, which was sent for by plaintiff, or the old Lady Cleere, mother of Sir Henry. Elizabeth Colfer also alleges that the plaintiff suddenly departed from her house in the absence of the other defendant and of Sir Henry; says that plaintiff left the room locked up and took the key with her; that she, Dame Meryell, has often been since to fetch things away; that the goods in the rooms have been extended by the sheriffs of Norwich, at the suit of Thomas Holl, Esq. Defendants do not know what things there are in the rooms.

BILLS AND ANSWERS, TEMP. CAR. I.

Ce 85, No. 42. [1627.] *Cleere v. Smythys*. The plaintiff was John Cleere of Colchester, and the proceedings relate to the "White Hart" in that town.

Ce 93, No. 69. [1626.] *Clerc v. Coke*. Plaintiff was Dame Elizabeth Clerc, widow of Sir Francis Clerc, Knt. Relates to Thorington, which Sir Francis had by grant from his father, Sir Edward Clerc, Knt. Mention made of Sir Edward Clerc, elder brother of Sir Francis, and his dealings with the manor. Sir Francis fell very sick of a burning fever and died thereof. He conveyed Wenhaston to John Wroth, Esq., plaintiff's uncle, and to John Byng, Esq., whom he intended to be Henry Byng, Esq., now Sergeant-at-Law. [Lengthy proceedings arising out of Lady Clerc's jointure.]

Ce 94, No. 13. [1636.] *Clerc v. Weaver*. Plaintiff was Sir Edward Clerc, Knt., who alleged that Weaver was entrusted with a trunk to take from Norwich to London. That it contained clothes, papers, and other valuables, worth £100, and that it was broken into and the contents removed. Weaver's answer alleges that he did take the trunk to London, but that Sir Edward owed him a considerable sum, that in consequence he, Weaver, being a freeman of London, attached the trunk for the debt according to custom; the trunk was kept intact for twelve months to give Sir Edward an opportunity of redeeming it, at the expiration it was opened, and contained goods worth only £2. 10s. Gives a list. This was about two years ago.

Ce 97, No. 20. *Clerc v. Clerc*, Knt. Answer, dated 1638, of Sir Edward Cleare, Knight, "to the frivolous and impertinent bill of complaint of Dame Meriel Cleare, widow." Alleges that the bill was issued at the instigation of Dame Abigail Mountford; seeks to deprive defendant of the advantage which he should have by the marriage of his son the said Sir Henry Clerc. "And this defendant doth say that by the practices and indirect means of the said Abigail and others of . . . consort, the said Sir Henry, this defts. son, did marry and take to wife the said complainant, for that he, said Sir Henry, might have had marriages of greater and better preferment and advancement both for his and this defendant's good than she was."

Ce 98, No. 29. *Clerc v. Clerc*, Knt. Answer, dated 1638, of Sir Edward Clerc, Knt., to the bill of complaint of Dame Elizabeth Clerc. [No information of interest.]

Ce 106, No. 12. *Clerc v. Elliott*. Bill dated 1649. Plaintiff was John Cleer of Sepulchre's parish, London, cooper. [Relates to a trade dispute.]

Ce 108, No. 42. *Clerc v. Jenkinson*, Knt. Bill dated 2 Nov. 1628. Plaintiff was Mary Clerc, widow and executrix of Heigham Clerc, late of . . . Norfolk, Gent. Plaintiff was daughter of Richard Jenkinson, late of Tunstall, Norfolk, Esq., who was twice High Sheriff of Norfolk. Plaintiff had a liberal portion of £700 or £800. She married Heigham Clerc, who disposed of part of said portion to pay his debts and part to provide their maintenance. That before plaintiff's friends would consent to the marriage, articles were drawn up about 18 Oct. 1624, and made between Charles Clerc of Stokesby, Esq., and Edward Clerc of Filby, Gent., brothers of the said Heigham, of the one part, and Sir Thos. Jenkinson of Tunstall, Knt., eldest brother of the plaintiff, as her trustee, of the other part. In consideration of the marriage and the portion the Clercs settle an annuity of £60 upon Mary (Clerc) Jenkinson, issuing out of their lands for sixty years, if Elizabeth, wife of said Charles Clerc, should so long live. That said Charles and Edward now seek wrongfully to detain the said articles. That Heigham Clerc had lands in . . . which he had from his grandmother, and worth £1500. That he was persuaded by Thomas Clerc of Stokesby, Esq., and Ann his wife, deceased, parents of the said Charles, Edward, and Heigham, to sell the same for the purpose of paying some of the debts of the said Thomas, and thus to save the latter's lands. That the said Thomas became bound in the penal sum of £1200 to secure eighty acres of freehold land to said Heigham. That said Heigham entrusted this bond to Mr. Thomas Wyndham, who married Mrs. Susan Clerc, sister of the said Heigham, and who then resided with Thomas Clerc the father. That the said Thomas and Edward, having no children of their own, intimated to Heigham that he would probably at their decease have the whole or greater part of their lands, and therefore he did not press for a settlement of the eighty acres. Said Heigham fell sick in February, 1627, and died thereof, having made his last will and devised to plaintiff all his lands and the benefit of the said bond. Plaintiff proved the will. That Thomas Clerc, Esq., dec., brother of the said Heigham, devised to him £100, appointing as his executor said Thos. Wyndham; that he left estate of great value, far exceeding the debts and legacies. That the said Heigham gave a receipt for the said £100 to his brother Charles in trust. He refuses to pay the £100 as well as the annuity due under the marriage articles.

Answer of Sir Thos. Jenkinson, Knt., who is friendly to plaintiff.

Answer of Thos. Wyndham, Esq. Says he lived in the house of Thos. Cleere when Ann, the latter's wife, fell sick and died. That he gave back the bond to the said Heigham Cleere himself. That he paid the £100 to Charles Cleere at the request of Heigham. That he is not in collusion with the Cleeres.

Answer of Charles Cleere, Esq., and Edward Cleere, Gent. They say that plaintiff's marriage portion was £600. That £100 was paid, but the residue was and is unpaid. The marriage took place about four years ago. That Heigham had no lands from his grandmother, but a sum of £390 came from her which was invested in land at Trigby in names of Edward and Heigham. That they, the defendants, Charles and Edward, being s. p., intended to leave their lands to Heigham. That he died s. p. in June last. That the annuity has not been paid since, and that they leave the said plaintiff to take her remedy at the common law. That the said Heigham did not spend any part of the plaintiff's marriage portion, part of which is still owing. [Long proceedings.]

Co 114, No. 82. *Cleere, Lady, v. Stone*. Bill dated 23 Jan. 1629. Plaintiff was Dame Elizabeth Cleere, widow, late wife of Sir Francis Cleere, Knt., deceased. Alleges that Robert Christopher, late of London, Gent., was in . . . seized of a great messuage now in the tenure of said Elizabeth Cleere, in Coleman Street, London, adjoining on the north the "Bell," and on the south a messuage in the tenure of Wm. Danyell, Sergeant-at-Law, now Sir Wm. D., Justice of the Common Pleas, and went on the High Street there. Said messuage was bought by Thomas Wrothe, Esq., plaintiff's father, who by will 14 August, 1610, devised it to said Sir Francis and Elizabeth his wife. [The dispute relates to ancient lights: some interesting particulars of rooms in the house are given.]

Co 116, No. 85. [Date 1635.] *Cleere v. Parkinson*. Plaintiff, Mary Cleere of Colchester, Essex, widow. That her late husband, Benjamin Cleere, was a merchant and roartner, and had dealings with Thomas Parkinson, a linen draper. That about three years ago the said Benjamin Cleere, being in parts beyond the seas at Virginia, there died intestate, leaving six small children unprovided for. She has taken out administration. Asks for an account against Parkinson. He replies with a denial of liability.

Co 120, No. 27. [April 1630.] *Cleere v. Cleere*. Plaintiffs, Charles Cleere of Stokeby, Esq., and Edward Cleere of Filby, Gent. Recites treaty of marriage between Heigham Cleere, brother and heir apparent of the said plaintiffs, and Mary Jenkinson, sister and heir of Thomas Jenkinson, Knt. That they expected that she should have £700 for her marriage portion, and in consideration thereof the said Charles Cleere granted an annual rent-charge to Mary Jenkinson of £60 out of his manors and lands, and also settled the said manors and lands on said Heigham in tail male. That the marriage took place, and they lived together four years. No part of the £700 was paid. Heigham Cleere died about two years ago. The said Mary Cleere was his executrix. Disagreements arose between her and the plaintiffs which at last were settled by the mediation of friends. It was arranged that Mary should have the said annuity for life, and £280 within six months of the death of the said Charles Cleere. For security Mary was to bring an action for debt against the said Charles Cleere in the Common Pleas, that judgment should be signed, but that no execution should issue, but that a bond of defeasance should be entered into. Complains that Mary now declines to sign the bond, and threatens to issue execution.

Co 121, No. 42. *Cleere v. Fiske*. Replication of Dame Elizabeth Cleere and John Wroth to the answer of Henry Fiske.

Co 122, No. 105. *Cleere v. Fiske*. Bill dated 19 Nov. 1622. Plaintiff, Dame Elizabeth Cleere, late wife of Sir Francis Cleere, Knight, and John Wroth of North Fawerton, Somerset, Esq. Say that they are seized of the manor of Thorington Hall, and also of Wangford Fennes. [Relates to disputes with Fiske, who was a copyhold tenant.]

Co 124, No. 70. *Cleere v. G . . .* Replication of John Cleere, Gent., to the answer of Edmund G . . . [Dispute relates to money only.]

Co 125, No. 128. *Cleere v. Grosvenor*. Bill, 13 April, 1627. Plaintiff, William Cleere of Wapping, Middlesex, clothier, against John Grosvenor. Trade dispute about the sale of some wool: plaintiff Cleere was thrown into prison for three months for debt.

Cc 127, No. 110. *Cleere v. Earl of Lincoln*. Replication of Dame Elizabeth Cleere to the answer of the Earl of *Huntingdon*. Relates to lands in Punting, Milthorpe, and Adaby. Mention made of Sir Francis and Sir Edward Cleere. [Long replication, but no pedigree information of value.]

Cc 114, No. 52. *Cleere v. Stone*. Plaintiff was Dame Elizabeth Cleere, late wife of Sir Francis Cleere, Knt. Bill dated 23 Jan. 1629. Answer of Andrew Stone. [Dispute over rights of light in Coleman Street, London.]

Cc 116, No. 19. *Cleere v. Girling*. Replication only extant (no date) by Dame Elizabeth Cleere to the answer of John Girlinge. Wm. Girlinge, dec., the defendant's father, was bailiff to Sir Francis Cleere, and this was a claim in respect of £700 alleged to have been received by Wm. Girlinge, and which plaintiff alleged had come into the hands of John Girlinge.

Cc 117, No. 20. *Cleere v. Ognell*. Replication only extant (no date) of Dame Lady (sic) Meriel Cleere to the answer of George Ognell. Says that she can prove that Bockenham Ferry was bona fide settled on her for a jointure by Sir Edward Cleere, Knt., in Nov. 17 James, in consideration of £3000 her portion. That she can prove that the bond for £200 entered into by the said Sir Edward Cleere was long since satisfied, for that Sir Edward was taken in execution thereon, and informed the then Lord Chancellor of the defendant's dishonest and unconscionable dealings. The matter was heard by the Master of the Rolls, who discharged Sir Edward out of prison, and did much blame and rebuke the defendant, and that if he heard any more of such his bad dealings he would inflict some punishment upon him. That the manor of Bockenham Ferry was assured to the said Sir Henry Cleere before the hearing of the said Cooke in court.

Cc 2. Replication of Dame Elizabeth Cleere, widow, to the answers of John Blomfield. [No information given and no other document accompanies this.]

Cc 15. *Cleere v. Denny*. 3 Nov. 1631. Plaintiff, Dame Elizabeth Cleere, widow, late wife of Sir Francis Cleere. She has been seized of the manor of Cotton Hemphalls, co. Suffolk. Relates to a right of way claimed by her. The answer of Denny alleges that late Sir Francis conveyed the fee simple of said manor to Mr. Binge, Sergeant-at-Law.

Cc 33. *Cleere v. Hall*. 1626. Plaintiff, Dame Meriel Cleere, late wife of Sir Henry Cleere, Knt. and Bart., dec. Alleges that Sir Edward Cleere, late of Ormsby, about six years ago, in consideration of marriage between plaintiff and Sir Henry Cleere, conveyed property to trustees, John Athowe and Anthony Hobart, to hold in trust for Sir Henry for life in tail; remainder to the right heirs of Sir Edward. Dame Meriel to have an annuity of £400. Sir Henry mortgaged the premises to Thos. Holl for £1000. Sir Henry died about five years ago. Sir Henry left chattels worth at least £300. Plaintiff was then young, and unacquainted with business. Thos. Holl offered to assist her. Advised her to take out letters of administration, Sir Henry having died intestate. A Mr. Kent was brought to make an inventory of the furniture, &c. Plaintiff wished to leave Bockenham Ferry to Sir Edward and to rely on her annuity, but was dissuaded from this by Holl. Chattels were valued at £185, being worth more. Holl then put in claim for £125, and took possession of the goods; he also took £48 of rent. Plaintiff, unwilling to have her house quite unfurnished, took goods of Holl to value of £113, and she and her mother, Lady Abigail Mountford, became bound therefore with three other bonds of £120 to secure principal and interest at 10 per cent. He also set on foot an old judgment, and has entered Bockenham Ferry. Holl has security to the value of £4000 to secure £1000. Holl's answer is a very long one, but throws no light on the pedigree. Mention is made of Colfer. [See former suit, *Cleere v. Colfer*.]

Cc 34. Bill of Revivor of Dame Elizabeth Cleere, widow, late wife of Sir Francis Cleere, Knt. dec. 11 Feb. 1640. Alleges that in March, 1630, she exhibited a bill which alleged that Sir Francis Cleere was seized of the manor of Cotton Hemphell, Suffolk, and by indenture, Oct. 5, Jas. I., leased same to Zebediah Shelverd of Cotton. Sir Francis died about fourteen years since. Zebediah assigned his interest to his sons Richard and John, and they to John Blomfield, who refused to pay rent of £6. 13s. 4d. He has the deeds. The answer refers to the bill exhibited against John Blomfield, father of John the defendant, in 1629. Zebediah Shelverd alias Whittinge. The son is described as R. Shelverd alias Shelford.

Cc 42. 6 Nov. 1624. This is the answer of Richard Shelverd, the defendant,

to the bill of Dame Elizth. Clere, widow. Refers to his former full answer. Mentions a ground called the Twenty Acres, in the possession of Sir Francis, late of Dame Elizabeth.

Co $\frac{11}{12}$. *Clere v. Freeman*. 12 Feb. 1643. Bill of Dame Elizth Clere, widow, late wife of Sir Francis Clere, Knt., deceased. Relates to lands in Mendlesham, Suffolk, of which Dame Elizabeth was the mortgagee.

Co $\frac{11}{12}$. *Cole, Knt., v. Clere, Lady*. Plaintiff, Dame Elizth. Clere, widow, late wife of Sir Francis Clere. Relates to Wenhamston and Thorington. Mentions Sir Edw. Clere and his sons Sir Edw. and Sir Francis Clere. Former bills and proceedings set out in detail. At this time Sir Edw. Clere, the son, was in the Fleet prison for contempt of court. Mention of the death of Sir Francis, who was suddenly taken sick in London.

[N.B.—These proceedings are extremely lengthy, one answer alone occupying two large skins.]

Co $\frac{11}{12}$. *Clere v. Blomefield*. 23 Jan. 1629. Plaintiff, Dame Elizabeth Clere, widow of Sir Francis Clere. Relates to Cotton Hemphall, and the lease to Shelverd. John Blomefield was the defendant.

Co $\frac{11}{12}$. *Clere, Lady, v. Lincoln, Earl*. Plaintiff, Dame Elizabeth Clere, late wife of Sir Francis. Mentions lands in Foynton, Mithorp, and Asleby. Disputes arising out of the settlement made by Sir Edw. Clere, the father, on his sons, Sir Edw. and Sir Francis.

Pedigree by Sandford (*Nor. Arch.* iv. 41), and by Blomfield (vol. vi. p. 487), that she was married to Philip Paston, son of Sir John Paston, Knt. Mr. Chas. Norton Elvin coinciding with this view, has been kind enough to describe these quarterings correctly:

BILLS AND ANSWERS TEMP. JAC. I.

C 17. *Cleere v. Robert*. Plaintiff was Dame Meryell Cleere, late wife of Sir Henry Cleere, Bart. Mention is made of Sir Edward, father of Sir Henry; also Dame Abigail Mountford, mother of Dame Meryell. Dispute over the settlements. [Lengthy proceedings.]

C 18. *Cleere v. Shalwerd*. Plaintiff was Dame Elizabeth, widow of Sir Francis Cleere. Relates to lands in Cotton, Suffolk.

C 19. *Cleere v. Ognell*. Plaintiff was Dame Meryell Cleere, late wife of Sir Henry Cleere, late of Bokenham, Bart. Sir Edward Cleere, her husband's father. Dame Abigail Mountford, mother of plaintiff. Said Meryell and Sir Henry were married in September, 17 James I. Sir Henry died and left issue Abigail Cleere, a daughter of tender years. Bokenham was incumbered by Sir Edward and Sir Henry. The Cleeres seem to have been in financial difficulties. Ognell was a mercer in Cheap-side, London, who had supplied goods and had extended the manor of Bokenham Ferry to satisfy his claim.

C 20. *Cleere v. Suggh, Knt.* Plaintiff swore John Cleere of Ratoliff, Midx., mariner, and Frances his wife, the administratrix of Robert Cleere, late of Stepney, mariner, deceased. John Cleere was a natural brother of Robert Cleere. Robert was of the ship "Trade Increase," and in the East Indies 13 March, 1612. Served three years. Claim for wages due.

C 21. *Cleere, Knt., v. Lambert*. 4 Nov. 1616. Sir Edward Cleere of Thetford, Knt., plaintiff. Alleges that ten years ago Anne Crompton, the natural sister of the plaintiff and wife of William Gilbert, deceased, received by delivery of Sir Edward Cleere, Knt., plaintiff's father, divers goods in trust for plaintiff; the said Anne lately suddenly died. That Okeover Crompton, her last husband, and Richard Lambert, "being lewd persons," seek to obtain the said goods. That they broke open the lodgings of Mr. Thos. Cursoun, Gent. of Norwich, where the goods were stored. The answer, with denurrer of Lambert, is a denial of most of the allegations. He says that he bought the goods from

Crompton in discharge of a claim of £5; that when he attempted to take possession Cleere assaulted, "took him by the hair of the head, and put in his face," &c.; that Mrs. Crompton was a widow three years and wife of Crompton six years. Demurs on the ground of time elapsed, Sir Edward having been dead fourteen years.

C 22. *Cleere v. Kipping*. 7 Nov. 1622. Dame Elizabeth Cleere, widow, late wife of Sir Francis Cleere, Knt., plaintiff. Alleges that Sir Edward Cleere, Knt., the father, was seized of the Rectory of Fretthorpe and conveyed it to said Elizabeth on her marriage with Sir Francis, and she has since been in possession. Sir Francis died about twelve years ago. William Kippinge, the defendant, claims title deeds. Defendants answer, that the reversion of the rectory, since the death of Sir Francis, was sold by Sir Edward Cleere, the eldest brother and heir of Sir Francis Cleere, to Sir Tho. Berney, Knt., deceased.

C 23. *Cleere v. Colfer*. Nov. 1622. Dame Meryell Cleere, late wife of Sir Henry Cleere of Bokenham Ferry, Bart., plaintiff. Alleges that before marriage she had lands in Suffolk worth 100 marks per annum; that Sir Henry settled on her £400 per annum after his death; her title is now called in question, but she cannot prove it, as the deeds are in the hands of John Copler and Elizabeth his wife, of Norwich, who had two trunks full of deeds of the late Sir Henry, as the latter told her. Defendants answer. Alleges an indebtedness of £50 for board, &c., of Sir Henry, Dame Elizabeth, and their family, besides a winding sheet for Sir Henry, which was sent for by plaintiff, or the old Lady Cleere, mother of Sir Henry. Elizabeth Colfer also alleges that the plaintiff suddenly departed from her house in the absence of the other defendant and of Sir Henry; says that plaintiff left the room locked up and took the key with her; that she, Dame Meryell, has often been since to fetch things away; that the goods in the rooms have been extended by the sheriffs of Norwich, at the suit of Thomas Holl, Esq. Defendants do not know what things there are in the rooms.

BILLS AND ANSWERS, TEMP. CAR. I.

Ce 85, No. 42. [1627.] *Cleere v. Sandys*. The plaintiff was John Cleere of Colchester, and the proceedings relate to the "White Hart" in that town.

Cc 93, No. 60. [1636.] *Clerc v. Cole.* Plaintiff was Dame Elizabeth Clerc, widow of Sir Francis Clerc, Knt. Relates to Thorington, which Sir Francis had by grant from his father, Sir Edward Clerc, Knt. Mention made of Sir Edward Clerc, elder brother of Sir Francis, and his dealings with the manor. Sir Francis fell very sick of a burning fever and died thereof. He conveyed Wenaston to John Wroth, Esq., plaintiff's uncle, and to John Byng, Esq., whom he intended to be Henry Byng, Esq., now Sergeant-at-Law. [Lengthy proceedings arising out of Lady Clerc's jointure.]

Cc 94, No. 13. [1636.] *Clerc v. Weaver.* Plaintiff was Sir Edward Clerc, Knt., who alleged that Weaver was entrusted with a trunk to take from Norwich to London. That it contained clothes, papers, and other valuables, worth £100, and that it was broken into and the contents removed. Weaver's answer alleges that he did take the trunk to London, but that Sir Edward owed him a considerable sum, that in consequence he, Weaver, being a freeman of London, attached the trunk for the debt according to custom; the trunk was kept intact for twelve months to give Sir Edward an opportunity of redeeming it, at the expiration it was opened, and contained goods worth only £2. 10s. Gives a list. This was about two years ago.

Cc 97, No. 20. *Clerc v. Clerc, Knt.* Answer, dated 1636, of Sir Edward Cleare, Knight, "to the frivolous and impertinent bill of complaint of Dame Meriel Cleare, widow." Alleges that the bill was issued at the instigation of Dame Abigail Mountford; seeks to deprive defendant of the advantage which he should have by the marriage of his son the said Sir Henry Clerc. "And this defendant doth say that by the practises and indirect means of the said Abigail and others of consort, the said Sir Henry, this defts. son, did marry and take to wife the said complainant, for that he, said Sir Henry, might have had marriages of greater and better preferment and advancement both for his and this defendant's good than she was."

Cc 98, No. 29. *Clerc v. Clerc, Knt.* Answer, dated 1636, of Sir Edward Clerc, Knt., to the bill of complaint of Dame Elizabeth Clerc. [No information of interest.]

Cc 106, No. 12. *Clerc v. Elliott.* Bill dated 1640. Plaintiff was John Cleer of Sepulchre's parish, London, cooper. [Relates to a trade dispute.]

Cc 108, No. 42. *Clerc v. Jenkinson, Knt.* Bill dated 2 Nov. 1625. Plaintiff was Mary Clerc, widow and executrix of Heigham Clerc, late of . . . Norfolk, Gent. Plaintiff was daughter of Richard Jenkinson, late of Tunstall, Norfolk, who was twice High Sheriff of Norfolk. Plaintiff had a liberal portion of £700 or £800. She married Heigham Clerc, who disposed of part of said portion to pay his debts and part to provide their maintenance. That before plaintiff's friends would consent to the marriage, articles were drawn up about 18 Oct. 1624, and made between Charles Clerc of Stokesby, Esq., and Edward Clerc of Filby, Gent., brothers of the said Heigham, of the one part, and Sir Thos. Jenkinson of Tunstall, Knt., eldest brother of the plaintiff, as her trustee, of the other part. In consideration of the marriage and the portion the Clercs settle an annuity of £60 upon Mary (Clerc) Jenkinson, issuing out of their lands for sixty years, if Elizabeth, wife of said Charles Clerc, should so long live. That said Charles and Edward now seek wrongfully to detain the said articles. That Heigham Clerc had lands in . . . which he had from his grandmother, and worth £1600. That he was persuaded by Thomas Clerc of Stokesby, Esq., and Ann his wife, deceased, parents of the said Charles, Edward, and Heigham, to sell the same for the purpose of paying some of the debts of the said Thomas, and thus to save the latter's lands. That the said Thomas became bound in the penal sum of £1200 to secure eighty acres of freehold land to said Heigham. That said Heigham entrusted this bond to Mr. Thomas Wyndham, who married Mrs. Suzan Clerc, sister of the said Heigham, and who then resided with Thomas Clerc the father. That the said Thomas and Edward, having no children of their own, intimated to Heigham that he would probably at their decease have the whole or greater part of their lands, and therefore he did not press for a settlement of the eighty acres. Said Heigham fell sick in February, 1627, and died thereof, having made his last will and devised to plaintiff all his lands and the benefit of the said bond. Plaintiff proved the will. That Thomas Clerc, Esq., dec., brother of the said Heigham, devised to him £100, appointing as his executor said Thos. Wyndham; that he left estate of great value, far exceeding the debts and legacies. That the said Heigham gave a receipt for the said £100 to his brother Charles in trust. He refuses to pay the £100 as well as the annuity due under the marriage articles.

Answer of Sir Thos. Jenkinson, Knt., who is friendly to plaintiff.

Answer of Thos. Wyndham, Esq. Says he lived in the house of Thos. Cleere when Ann, the latter's wife, fell sick and died. That he gave back the bond to the said Heigham Cleere himself. That he paid the £100 to Charles Cleere at the request of Heigham. That he is not in collusion with the Cleeres.

Answer of Charles Cleere, Esq., and Edward Cleere, Gent. They say that plaintiff's marriage portion was £800. That £100 was paid, but the residue was and is unpaid. The marriage took place about four years ago. That Heigham had no lands from his grandmother, but a sum of £300 came from her which was invested in land at Trilby in names of Edward and Heigham. That they, the defendants, Charles and Edward, being s. p., intended to leave their lands to Heigham. That he died s. p. in June last. That the annuity has not been paid since, and that they leave the said plaintiff to take her remedy at the common law. That the said Heigham did not spend any part of the plaintiff's marriage portion, part of which is still owing. [Long proceedings.]

Co 114, No. 82. *Cleere, Lady, v. Stone*. Bill dated 23 Jan. 1622. Plaintiff was Dame Elizabeth Cleere, widow, late wife of Sir Francis Cleere, Knt., deceased. Alleges that Robert Christopher, late of London, Gent., was in . . . seized of a great messuage now in the tenure of said Elizabeth Cleere, in Coleman Street, London, adjoining on the north the "Bell," and on the south a messuage in the tenure of Wm. Donyell, Sergeant-at-Law, now Sir Wm. D., Justice of the Common Pleas, and west on the High Street there. Said messuage was bought by Thomas Wrothe, Esq., plaintiff's father, who by will 14 August, 1610, devised it to said Sir Francis and Elizabeth his wife. [The dispute relates to ancient lights: some interesting particulars of rooms in the house are given.]

Co 116, No. 55. [Date 1626.] *Cleere v. Parkinson*. Plaintiff, Mary Cleere of Colchester, Essex, widow. That her late husband, Benjamin Cleere, was a merchant and mariner, and had dealings with Thomas Parkinson, a linen draper. That about three years ago the said Benjamin Cleere, being in parts beyond the seas at Virginia, there died intestate, leaving six small children unprovided for. She has taken out administration. Asks for an account against Parkinson. He replies with a denial of liability.

Co 120, No. 27. [April 1630.] *Cleere v. Cleere*. Plaintiffs, Charles Cleere of Stokesby, Esq., and Edward Cleere of Filby, Gent. Recites treaty of marriage between Heigham Cleere, brother and heir apparent of the said plaintiffs, and Mary Jenkinson, sister and heir of Thomas Jenkinson, Knt. That they expected that she should have £700 for her marriage portion, and in consideration thereof the said Charles Cleere granted an annual rent-charge to Mary Jenkinson of £60 out of his manors and lands, and also settled the said manors and lands on said Heigham in tail male. That the marriage took place, and they lived together four years. No part of the £700 was paid. Heigham Cleere died about two years ago. The said Mary Cleere was his executrix. Disagreements arose between her and the plaintiffs which at last were settled by the mediation of friends. It was arranged that Mary should have the said annuity for life, and £250 within six months of the death of the said Charles Cleere. For security Mary was to bring an action for debt against the said Charles Cleere in the Common Pleas, that judgment should be signed, but that no execution should issue, but that a bond of defeasance should be entered into. Complains that Mary now declines to sign the bond, and threatens to issue execution.

Co 121, No. 42. *Cleere v. Fiske*. Replication of Dame Elizabeth Cleere and John Wroth to the answer of Henry Fiske.

Co 122, No. 105. *Cleere v. Fiske*. Bill dated 19 Nov. 1622. Plaintiff, Dame Elizabeth Cleere, late wife of Sir Francis Cleere, Knight, and John Wroth of North Pewerton, Somerset, Esq. Say that they are seized of the manor of Thorington Hall, and also of Wangford Fennes. [Relates to disputes with Fiske, who was a copyhold tenant.]

Co 124, No. 70. *Cleere v. G* . . . Replication of John Cleere, Gent., to the answer of Edmund G . . . [Dispute relates to money only.]

Co 125, No. 128. *Cleere v. Gravenor*. Bill, 13 April, 1627. Plaintiff, William Cleere of Wapping, Middlesex, clothier, against John Gravenor. Trade dispute about the sale of some wool: plaintiff Cleere was thrown into prison for three months for debt.

Ce 127, No. 110. *Cleere v. Earl of Lincoln*. Replication of Dame Elizabeth Cleere to the answer of the Earl of *Huntingdon*. Relates to lands in *Pointing*, *Milthorpe*, and *Ashby*. Mention made of Sir Francis and Sir Edward Cleere. [Long replication, but no pedigree information of value.]

Ce 114, No. 52. *Cleere v. Stone*. Plaintiff was Dame *Elizth. Cleere*, late wife of Sir Francis Cleere, Knt. Bill dated 29 Jan. 1629. Answer of Andrew Stone. [Dispute over rights of light in *Coleman Street*, London.]

Ce 116, No. 19. *Cleere v. Girlinge*. Replication only extant (no date) by Dame *Elizth. Cleere* to the answer of John *Girlinge*. Wm. *Girlinge*, dec., the defendant's father, was bailiff to Sir Francis Cleere, and this was a claim in respect of £700 alleged to have been received by Wm. *Girlinge*, and which plaintiff alleged had come into the hands of John *Girlinge*.

Ce 117, No. 20. *Cleere v. Ognell*. Replication only extant (no date) of Dame *Elizth. Cleere* to the answer of George *Ognell*. Says that she can prove that *Buckenham Ferry* was bona fide settled on her for a jointure by Sir *Edw. Cleere*, Knt., in Nov., 17 James, in consideration of £3000 her portion. That she can prove that the bond for £200 entered into by the said Sir *Edw. Cleere* was long since satisfied, for that Sir *Edw.* was taken in execution thereon, and informed the then Lord Chancellor of the defendant's dishonest and unconscionable dealings. The matter was heard by the Master of the Rolls, who discharged Sir *Edw.* out of prison, and did much blame and rebuke the defendant, and that if he heard any more of such his bad dealings he would inflict some punishment upon him. That the manor of *Buckenham Ferry* was assured to the said Sir *Henry Cleere* before the hearing of the said *Cocke* in court.

Ce 2. Replication of Dame *Elizabeth Cleere*, widow, to the answers of John *Blomfield*. [No information given and no other document accompanies this.]

Ce 115. *Cleere v. Denny*. 3 Nov. 1631. Plaintiff, Dame *Elizth. Cleere*, widow, late wife of Sir Francis Cleere. She has been seized of the manor of *Cotton Hempnalls*, co. *Suffolk*. Relates to a right of way claimed by her. The answer of *Denny* alleges that late Sir Francis conveyed the fee simple of said manor to Mr. *Bingo*, Sergeant-at-Law.

Ce 119. *Cleere v. Holl*. 1626. Plaintiff, Dame *Meriel Cleere*, late wife of Sir *Henry Cleere*, Knt. and *Bart.*, dec. Alleges that Sir *Edw. Cleere*, late of *Ormesby*, about six years ago, in consideration of marriage between plaintiff and Sir *Henry Cleere*, conveyed property to trustees, John *Athowe* and Anthony *Hobart*, to hold in trust for Sir *Henry* for life in tail; remainder to the right heirs of Sir *Edw.* Dame *Meriel* to have an annuity of £400. Sir *Henry* mortgaged the premises to Thos. *Holl* for £1000. Sir *Henry* died about five years ago. Sir *Henry* left chattels worth at least £300. Plaintiff was then young, and unacquainted with business. Thos. *Holl* offered to assist her. Advised her to take out letters of administration, Sir *Henry* having died intestate. A Mr. *Kent* was brought to make an inventory of the furniture, &c. Plaintiff wished to leave *Buckenham Ferry* to Sir *Edw.* and to rely on her annuity, but was dissuaded from this by *Holl*. Chattels were valued at £185, being worth more. *Holl* then put in claim for £125, and took possession of the goods; he also took £48 of rent. Plaintiff, unwilling to have her house quite unfurnished, took goods of *Holl* to value of £113, and she and her mother, Lady *Abigail Mountford*, became bound therefore with three other bonds of £120 to secure principal and interest at 10 per cent. He also set on foot an old judgment, and has entered *Buckenham Ferry*. *Holl* has security to the value of £4000 to secure £1000. *Holl's* answer is a very long one, but throws no light on the pedigree. Mention is made of *Colfer*. [See former suit, *Cleere v. Colfer*.]

Ce 113. Bill of Revivor of Dame *Elizth. Cleere*, widow, late wife of Sir Francis Cleere, Knt., dec. 11 Feb. 1640. Alleges that in March, 1630, she exhibited a bill which alleged that Sir *Fras. Cleere* was seized of the manor of *Cotton Hempnall*, *Suffolk*, and by indenture, Oct. 5, Jas. I., leased same to *Zebediah Sholverd* of *Cotton*. Sir Francis died about fourteen years since. *Zebediah* assigned his interest to his sons *Richard* and *John*, and they to John *Blomfield*, who refused to pay rent of £6. 13s. 4d. He has the deeds. The answer refers to the bill exhibited against John *Blomfield*, father of John the defendant, in 1629. *Zebediah Sholverd* alias *Whittinge*. The son is described as R. *Sholverd* alias *Shelford*.

Ce 49. 6 Nov. 1624. This is the answer of *Richard Shelford*, the defendant,

to the bill of Dame Elizabeth. Clare, widow. Refers to his former full answer. Mentions a ground called the Twenty Acres, in the possession of Sir Francis, late of Dame Elizabeth.

Co 87. *Clare v. Freeman*. 12 Feb. 1643. Bill of Dame Elizabeth Clare, widow, late wife of Sir Francis Clare, Knt., deceased. Relates to lands in Mendlesham, Suffolk, of which Dame Elizabeth was the mortgagee.

Co 88. *Cole, Knt., v. Clare, Lady*. Plaintiff, Dame Elizabeth. Clare, widow, late wife of Sir Francis Clare. Relates to Wenhamston and Thorington. Mentions Sir Edward Clare and his sons Sir Edward and Sir Francis Clare. Former bills and proceedings set out in detail. At this time Sir Edward Clare, the son, was in the Fleet prison for contempt of court. Mention of the death of Sir Francis, who was suddenly taken sick in London.

[N.B.—These proceedings are extremely lengthy, one answer alone occupying two large skins.]

Co 89. *Clare v. Blomefield*. 23 Jan. 1639. Plaintiff, Dame Elizabeth Clare, widow of Sir Francis Clare. Relates to Cotton Hempnall, and the lease to Shelverd. John Blomefield was the defendant.

Co 90. *Clare, Lady, v. Lincoln, Earl*. Plaintiff, Dame Elizabeth Clare, late wife of Sir Francis. Mentions lands in Foynton, Miththorp, and Asleby. Disputes arising out of the settlement made by Sir Edward Clare, the father, on his sons, Sir Edw. and Sir Francis.

Answers of the defendants, the Earl of Lincoln and John Obrey or Obery. [N.B.—These are also lengthy proceedings.]

7 Jac. I., part 12. Richard French of Bromham, Wilts, yeoman, of the one part, and Henry Cleere, citizen and dyer of London, of the other part. Deed of conveyance dated 20 July, 1609, of certain premises in St. Giles' parish, Reading.

7 July, 5 Jac. I. Indenture between John Evelyn of Godstone, Surrey, Esq., of the one part, and Humfry Clare, citizen and draper of London, of the other part. Evelyn, in consideration of £380, grants to Clare three closes of arable land in Norbyton, Surrey, on the south part of London Lane, containing 38a., late in tenure of William Bennet. Excepting 1½a. in the lower close next Martyn Lane, whereof Richard Tyffyn and John Gypin are seized jure uxoris. Usual covenants for title against himself, his wife, and brother. 5 Jac. I., part 3.

20 July, 1609. Indenture between Richard Teauche of Bromham, Wilts, yeoman, and Henry Cleere, citizen and dyer of London. Relates to the purchase of premises in St. Giles, Reading, for the sum of £50. 7 Jac. I., part 12.

31 Dec. 1621. To all, &c. Okcover Crompton of Ormesby, Norfolk, Gent. Reciting that Sir Edw. Clare by writing dated 9 Sept., 13 Jac. I., granted to Okcover Crompton and Anne his late wife, now deceased, an annuity of £30 issuing out of lands called [Scamleys?] in Tyney, Norfolk, for the lives of said Okcover and Anne, and the longer liver. And also an annuity of £10 for the like period after the death of Dame Agnes Clare, widow, late wife of Sir Edward Clare, deceased. That he is now seized of the said annuities, and in consideration of £125 releases them to Sir Henry Clare of Buckenham, Bart. Dated last day of Dec. 1621. 19 Jac. I., part 6, No. 41.

INQUISITIONS POST MORTEM.

CHANCERY, 23 EDWARD III., PART I, No. 96.

A.D. 1349. Writ directed to (Wm. T.) de Middleton, escheator. Recites that John, son and heir of Edmund de Clerc, holds of the king in chief, and that he says that he is of full age and seeks livery of his lands now in the custody of John de Brocas. That the said John was born at [Stinston!] and bapt. at the church of Walton. Tested at Woodstock, 13 May, 23 Edward III. (1349.) Proof of age appended. Held at Stanford, Norfolk, and taken before Walter de Myddelton, escheator of Norfolk and Suffolk, 18 Aug., 2 Edward III. John Danowes? of Woburn? aged fifty-three, says that said John is son and heir of Edmund de Clerc, and attained twenty-one on eighth day after the Feast of St. [Luke?] last. That he was born at Telford [Thetford?] and was baptized at Church of Saint Peter in that town.

That John Langetot died on the day aforesaid.

Roger, so . . . de Holdwelle, aged forty-five, says

Andrew de

William de aged fifty-two.

[Several witnesses were called in proof of age, and deposed to facts which led them to fix the date, but the document is too faded and stained to be readily deciphered.]

COURT OF WARDS AND LIVELIES, Vol. vi. p. 129.

A.D. 1553. Inquisition taken at Norwich in le Sherehous, 12 January, 3 Edward VI. (1553), before John Spencer, Esq., escheator, on the death of Thomas Clerc, Knight. The jurors say that Henry VIII., by letters patent dated 25 June, 28 Hen. VIII., granted to said Tho. Clerc, "domus Heryngby," co. Norf., commonly called Heryngby College, lately dissolved, a marsh called Chylder Marsh, Tunstall, Norf., also Fermes, Spencels alias Spencers, Cattes, Snetches in Heryngby.

Also—That he was seized of the manor of Filby with appurtes, &c., in Filby, Mawdby, Caster, Ormesby, Thykby, Borowghe St. Marye, Borowghe St. Margaret, Rollesby, Stokesby, Heryngby, and Rougham, in Norfolk, aforesaid, and being so seized by writing dated 20 Nov., — Edward VI., granted to George Funsteyn out of the manor of Filby for life.

Also—That said Thomas and Anne his wife were seized in right of Anne for her life in the manor of Barkyns alias Gyges and the appurtes, in Filby, Mawdby, Thykby, Ormesby, and Runham, which with the reversion were lately belonging to John Blakeney, Gent., of which a fine was levied 5 Edward VI., between Thomas Cleare, Knt., querant, and John Blakeney, Gent., deforcant, of the said manor of Barkyns alias Gyges, and the other premises in Filby, &c., acknowledged to be the right of the said Thomas by gift of said John, warranted against John and his heirs.

Also—That John Brumpton, Robert Holdiche, Esqs., Nicholas Hare, Knt., and Edward Jerny, Gent., were seized of the manor of Runham, with the appurtes, in Runham, Thykby, Mauntby, and Rakethe, with view of frankpledge in Rakethe, and by their charter, dated 8 Jan., 28 Henry VIII., enfeoffed Roger Townesend, Knt., Thomas Clerc, Knt., Edmund Wyndham, Tho. Tyndall, Henry Hubbard, and Tho. Godsalve, Esqs., and George Turnour, to hold to the use of the said Thomas Clerc and Anne his wife, and the heirs of Thos., and were so seized till 4 Feb., 27 Henry VIII., in which year, by virtue of the statute then passed, [i.e., Statute of Uses, 27 Hen. VIII. cap. 10] said Thomas and Anne became seized in demesne as of fee, and being so seized said Thomas died, and said Anne, by reason of which Anne was seized thereof at time of this inquisition.

Also—That said Thomas Clerc so seized on the 22 Nov. 1542, at Stokesby, made his will and (*inter alia*) willed that said Anne Clerc, then his wife, should have the college of Heryngby and the manors of Fennes, Spencers, Snetches, and Cattes in Heryngby, and the manor of Runham and Filby for life. Remainder to Charles Clerc his son in tail. Remainder to right heirs of Thomas. That Anne is now so seized, with remainder to Charles, and in default of issue of Charles to the right heirs of Charles.

Also—That said Thos. was seized of the manor of Gunnors, (1) Norf., being in Crom', Felbrigge, and Runtun, which lately belonged to Richard Bylke, Clerk. That the said premises descend to said Charles as son and heir of Thomas.

Also—That said Thomas was seized of the manor of Cowpers and Millers and the appurtes, in Baldswell, Spearham, Foxley, Lyng, Belought, and Byllingforth next Baldswell, Norfolk. Also manor of Marthams in Stokesby and other neighbouring towns, which lately belonged to Gregory Calse,

merchant. That the said premises descend to said Charles as son and heir of Thomas.

Also—That said Thomas was seized of the manor of Stokesby, &c., in Stokesby, Runham, Heryngby, Filby, Mawteby, Ryppes, Caster, Rollesby, Billobye, Owlby, and Winton, which belonged to John Barnes, Esq. That the said premises descend to Charles as son and heir of Thomas.

Also—That he was seized of Upton, Byllys, and Allettes, lying in Stokesby, Heryngby, Runham, and Thyrkby, which lately belonged to Edmund Clear, Esq., together with a certain swan mark called Upton's swanne marke, with all swans and cygnets marked therewith, with the appurtes, of Runham, Heryngby, Thyrkby, and Mawteby, or elsewhere in the Hundred of Westeslegge, lately belonging to Wm. 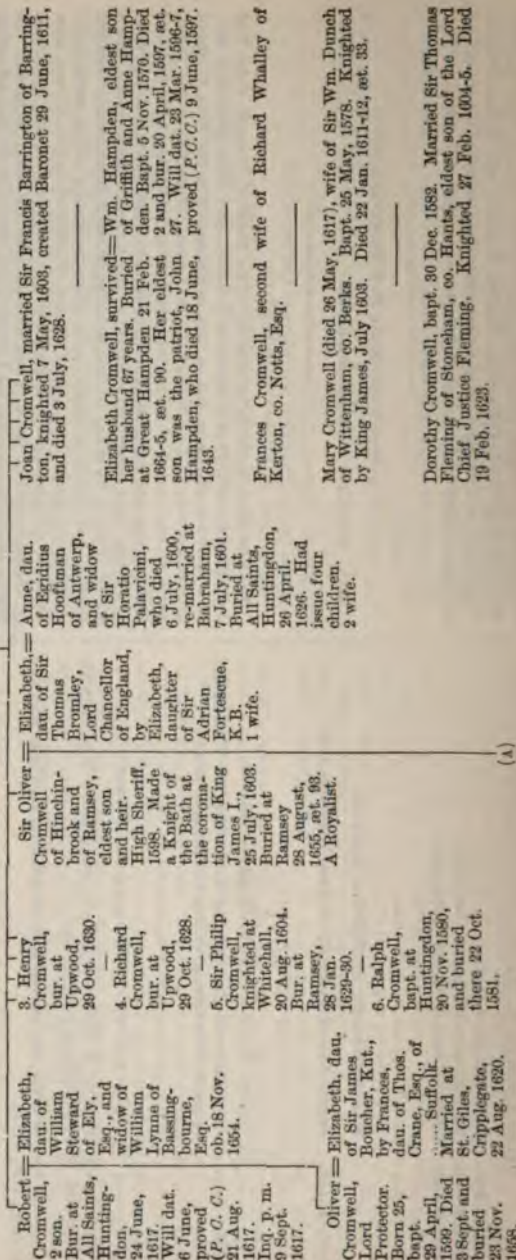
NOTE.

The Rev. Mark Noble, in his *Memoirs of the House of Cromwell*, states that John Cromwell, third son of Sir Oliver Cromwell, Knt. (Clerc pedigree, p. 269), went early into the army, and in 1624 was a captain in the First Regiment of Foot sent over by King James I. for the recovery of the Palatinate. Afterwards he was colonel of an English regiment in the service of the States of Holland, and was commissioned by Charles, Prince of Wales, and the Prince of Orange, with letters credential from the States to interview his cousin Oliver Cromwell on behalf of that unhappy monarch King Charles the First when he had been condemned to die. The particulars of this unsuccessful interview are narrated by Noble (vol. i. p. 31), who adds, that Colonel John Cromwell returned again to Holland, where he was commanding a regiment in 1653, and where he probably resided during the remainder of his life. In 1659 he applied to his cousin the Lord Protector to expedite the long depending cause between himself and "Abigail, his abandoned wife, through whose misconduct he was reduced to the brink of ruin." The House of Commons ordered this cause to be deferred to the hearing and determination of the Court of Chancery, but no further information can be discovered in the Chancery reports from 1662 to 1690, and it is probable, therefore, that this suit bringing discredit on the name of Cromwell, it was thought advisable to destroy all reports of these proceedings. The following portion of the "Cromwell Pedigree" will show the relationship of Colonel John Cromwell, who married Abigail Clerc, to "The Lord Protector."—W. E. G. L. B.

COPY OF A LETTER FROM COLONEL JOHN CROMWELL TO THE
LORD GENERAL CROMWELL.

My Lord,

Since my arrivall in these parts, I have bin with the lords commissioners of the chancery, to whom I have freed myselfe of those aspersions which were falselie cast upon me, and they well satisfied in all things that they could expect; my humble suite is now, that your lordship would be pleased to put them in minde to give a quick despatch to this my tedious suite in law, which unlesse you are pleased to forward their delay with three or four lines directed to them, and inclosed to me to deliver to them, I maie be scene to starve in expectation; for since the decree passed in court, whereby that cleeres that the estate of right belongs to me, yet possession was, nor is, not to be given untill the accounts are made upp, which as divers believe maie be verie tedious, they havinge procured another commission to examine new witnesses, though notwithstandinge the decree past, and with all my wife's grante favours from your familie, makes her give onte strange languages, that she hopes to have the disposall of the estate at hir owne pleasure; but I hope of better favours and justice, havinge spent a verie competent estate, and employed your lordship's affections in the recoverie of an estate so infinitelie desparate. I shall not trouble you with any complaints of a vicious wife, but in short let you know, I am most unhapie if ever she or hir sordid council prevails, whereby (if not timelie prevented)

they maye cause both our ruines by studdieing to set dishonourable things for me, and improvident for hir; I shall arme myselfe with patience, cravinge your favourable assistances in theis my troubles, hopinge you will not suffer me to goe unworthilie or stained to my grave, and gull'd by a woman. I am tincorous I have intrenched on your patience, wherefore I shall desire to take leave for the present, not forgettinge my prayers for your health and happines, soe long as I am able to subscribe myselfe,

In 1579 Sir Ralf Shelton, Knt., owned it, and in 1581 Anne Shelton, widow. In 1589 Charles Cornwallis, Esq., and Anne Shelton his wife.—Vol. iv. p. 529.

In 1499 Lady Margaret, late wife of Sir Ralph Shelton, Knt., sent by Master Simon Dryver a gold chain of 25 ss., weighing nearly 8 ounces, to be put about the image of the Holy Trinity, in the chapel of St. Mary of Pity.

1484. Cicely, widow of Thomas Shelton, Gent., of Norwich, was buried by the tomb of her late husband, in the Gray Friars' Church.

The advowson of St. Catherine in Newgate, Norwich, passed with Carrow Abbey, by grant of Henry VIII. to Sir John Shelton, Knt.; but in 1561 a great contention arose between Ralph Shelton of Shelton, Esq., and John Bonde of Carrow, who had purchased it of Wodehouse, and obtained a lease of it in 1543 from Anne Shelton, widow of Sir John Shelton, and John her son and heir.

1473. Wm. Shelton of Norwich. Sir John Shelton, Knt., fitted up the parlour and hall of Carrow Abbey, at his coming to dwell there not long after the Dissolution.

Sir Anthony Hevingham, a Knt. Banneret, married first Katherine, dau. and heir of Sir Philip Calthorpe, by Anne, dau. of Eden of Suffolk. In 1546 he settled by fine on himself and Mary his then wife, dau. of Sir John Shelton the elder of Shelton, Knt., the manors of Hevingham, Ubbeston, Cookeley, Walpole, and Sibeton in Suffolk; and in 1557 he held the manor of Westbarrow Hall of the honour of Balogh in Essex, and died the following year, and was buried according to his will by his last wife. She re-married to Philip Appleyard, Esq.,

In 1345 Sir Ralph Shelton was lord of Shelton manor; and in 1346 King Edward III. granted him letters patent, signifying that he was in the King's own company in the battle of Cressy, and there received the order of knighthood, the King pardoning him the contempt and penalty incurred for not taking that order upon him before, when His Majesty issued his proclamation that all those who had forty pounds a year in land, should take that order upon them. And the same year, on his marriage with Joan, daughter of Sir John de Plais, of Weying, he settled this and Bedingham manors on himself, his wife, and their issue. In 1355, on going beyond the sea with King Edward III., he had his letters of protection, and being in the battle of Poitiers, he took John Rocourt prisoner, for whom he obtained a safe conduct in 1355.

There was a grand antique mansion or manor-house here, in Shelton, built by Sir Ralph Shelton, in a square form, with an outside wall imbeddled, and a turret at each corner. In the windows and ceilings were many coats of the matches of the Sheltons, but the whole is now ruined. The demesns and park were sold to Sir Robert Houghton, Knt., Serjeant-at-law, and one of the Justices of the King's Bench.

This same Sir Ralph Shelton (who married Margaret Clere) also built the church; his name is expressed often in the windows, viz., Raf with an esclop shel and a tun, which cannot fail of making Shelton.

1481. Master Archibald Davy, rector of Shelton, was licensed to solemnize matrimony between Sir Richard Fitz Lewis, Knt., and Elizabeth Shelton, and between John, son and heir of Thomas Havvingham, and Alice Shelton, in the Chapel of the Manor House of Sir Ralph Shelton, Knt., father of the said Elizabeth and Alice.

1508. Sir John Shelton, priest, presented to Shelton Rectory, whom I should have taken to be the Poet Laureat of that name, had it not been that this man died in 1523, and the Laureat lived to 1529.

1520. Richard Shelton, who died 1530, was elected Master of Ravensingham College, and held the manor of Peter's Hall in Bunwell.

Maurice Shelton of Brimingham, Suffolk, Esq., and now of Bury St. Edmund's, sold the manors of Overhall and Netherhall in Shelton, with the alternate right of presentation to the rectory, to John Howse of Norwich, Esq.

1538, 2 Nov. (30 Henry VIII.) King Henry the 8th, by letters patent, granted—on the dissolution of religious houses—to Sir John Shelton, Knt., of Shelton, the rectory and advowson of the vicarage of Stow Bardolph, and Sir John Shelton alienated it to John Hare of London, mercer, 26 Sept. 1547 (1 Edward VI.)

1235-6, 20 Hen. III. John Shelton held a quarter of a fee of the heirs of Narfold, in the manor of Mountjoy Priory, Haverland; and 10 Edward II. there was an agreement between John, son of Sir John Shelton, Knt., and Robert his son, on one part. Nicholas, son of the said Sir John, and Alice his wife; Richard de Ely and Catherine his wife; the said John and Robert granting their manor to Nicholas and Alice for their lives, on condition of repairing the old, and building a new house 80 feet long and 18 feet broad, and paying them £30 sterling for thirteen years. To this deed is affixed the seal of John de Shelton—a fess between three mullets, pierced, and his name round.

23 Edward III. On the death of Sir Hugh le Burgulion, Sir Ralph Shelton of Shelton was found to be his cousin and heir, and John, son and heir of Sir John Shelton, who died December 21, 31 Hen. VIII. (1539), had livery of Burgulione Manor in Kerdestone.

20 Hen. VIII. (1538). At the dissolution, King Henry VIII. granted the inappropriate Rectory of East Winch to Sir John Shelton.

1501, 15 Sept. (3 Eliz.) Lands called Walsingham, and other lands belonging to Langley Abbey in Rous Manor, Dunham Magna, were granted to Sir Edward Warner and Ralph Shelton.

Sir Ralph Shelton, Knt., who was killed at the Isle of Rhé in 1625, sold the lordship of Great Snoring, in 1611, to Thomas Richardson, Serjeant-at-law, afterwards Lord Chief Justice of the King's Bench.

The family of Shelton, lords of Shelton, Norfolk, were, soon after the Survey, enfeoffed of the lordship of Walsingham Priory manor in Bedingham, and held it under the Bigots, Earls of Norfolk. In 1235, Robert, son of Ralph de Shelton, was lord; and in 1270, Henry de Shelton, and Robert was his son, who had a grant of free warren in this town in 1286; he was a knight, and died 34 Edward I., leaving by Isabel, his wife, John, his son and heir. Sir Ralph Shelton settled it in 1346, on his marriage with Joan, daughter of Sir John de Flete. It continued in this family till Sir John Shelton, 36 Henry VIII., conveyed it, by fine, to Thomas Hanchet.—P. 103.

1503, July 21 (5 Elizabeth). Belhouse Manor, in North Tuddenham, was granted to Humphrey Shelton and Eds. Hunt.

Sir Ralph Shelton was lord and patron of Mundham, temp. Edward I., and John, his son and heir, presented to church of St. Peter's, in Mundham Magna.

Ralph Shelton of Brome, by deed dated August 18, 31st Elizabeth, settled this manor and advowson on himself for life, then to his three daughters and their heirs.

1556, Dec. (3 and 4 Philip and Mary). Rollesby Manor was granted to Ann Shelton for life, free from all rent, and the wood and underwood only excepted.

It is said that Anne, after this display of loyal feeling, sent an order to Lady Shelton directing that Mary should be beaten if she persisted in calling herself princess, and that if she would not dine at the Common table she was to have nothing to eat at all.* But Mary was not beaten, and the king was charged the extravagant sum of ten shillings a week for the breakfast and supper, which were supplied to her in her room."†

"The troubles of the Boleyns had been due, in a great measure, to the influence of the new favourite,‡ whose reign had now lasted nearly six months, for Henry rather a long time. It occurred to them that their prospects might be improved if the king were under the dominion of a more friendly beauty; and, in the hope that he might be fascinated, they brought to Court Anne's pretty cousin, Margaret Shelton, daughter of the governess of Mary. The scheme may not have been very dignified, but it was eminently successful. On the 25th of February, little more than three weeks after the ball at which Gontier had seen Anne in despair, Eustache Chapuis wrote:—'The lady who formerly enjoyed the favour of this king does so no longer; she has been succeeded in her office by a first cousin of the concubine, daughter of the new governess of the princess.' The defeat of the Imperialist favourite led to renewed agitation among the malcontents, for with the advent of Margaret Shelton disappeared the last hope that by means of female influence a reversal of policy might be obtained."

Catherine Shelton married Taylor, and was living 4 Jan., 1738-9; Beata Shelton was unmarried 23 Dec., 1740. Dame Frances Peyton died 1685; her will, dated 23 Dec., 1689, was proved (P. C. C.) 26 May, 1685 (62, Cann), by John Shelton, and in it she is described as "Dame Frances Peyton, now the wife of John Shelton, Esq., of St. Martin's in the Fields, Middlesex."—*Memoirs of the Chester Family*, by Mr. Chester Waters.

Vol. i. p. 267 (in chap. viii.) Dec., 1533. "At Hatfield, Mary was entrusted to the care of Lady Shelton, a sister of Anne's father. This lady, of course, did all she could to subvert what she considered the obstinacy of her ward, but she made no impression whatever; Mary held out."

Vol. i. pp. 271-2. Feby., 1534. "To the complaints of Anne, Henry replied that henceforward Mary should be more closely guarded; and we find that shortly afterwards the Duke of Norfolk and Lord Rochford upbraided Lady Shelton for her leniency and weakness, and ordered her to treat Mary more severely, as the bastard she was. Lady Shelton, who seems to have been a good woman, and to have pitied her unhappy ward, answered with much spirit that Mary was kind and gentle, and did not merit such harsh treatment. Anne was enraged at this insubordination of her aunt, and became even more indignant when she heard that some Essex peasants had assembled under

Vol. ii, pp. 141-2. "Henry had also begun to talk in a rather ominous way. Mary having fallen ill, he went to Greenwich, where she was then staying; and in the presence of all the servants he loudly ordered Lady Shelton to tell her ward that she was his worst enemy, and that on her account he was on bad terms with most of the princes of Christendom. Chapuis * interpreted this message as an encouragement to those who might feel inclined to poison the princess. During the latter half of 1533, and during the whole of 1534, Chapuis credited Anne and her friends with the most infamous designs. For the protection of Mary against certain dangers, at which he occasionally hinted in his letters to the Emperor and to Granville and his son, he could trust only to the virtue and firmness of Mary herself. But for her protection against attempts to poison her he took active measures. For some time he wished that she should reside with her mother, but this was refused, and in the end it seemed to him best that they should not live together; for if Mary stayed with her mother, her enemies might poison her without exciting suspicion, whereas if she was with Lady Shelton they could not harm her without immediately causing a popular outcry. Having arrived at this conviction, Chapuis tried to help the princess by influencing her guardian. He sent Lady Shelton little presents with complimentary messages, but at the same time gave her to understand that she, herself, would be in the greatest danger if the princess died while entrusted to her charge. In the spring of 1535, Dr. Willm. Butts, the royal physician, was ordered to attend the princess; and he assisted the ambassador by telling Lady Shelton that it was commonly reported in London that she had poisoned Mary. The poor lady was not a little frightened, and whenever Mary was ill cried bitterly and was in the utmost anxiety."

Vol. ii, p. 198. Jan., 1535. "Mary was told, through Lady Shelton, that if she would act as a dutiful daughter towards the king, Anne would be to her a second mother..... But Anne had misunderstood Mary's character

The truth was, that as soon as they had manifested an intention to go to Eltham, instructions had been sent to Lady Shelton to prevent Mary from seeing or conversing with any of them; and Lady Shelton had immediately told the princess that she would have to keep her room while the ambassadors were there."

Vol. ii, p. 198. Jan., 1535. "Instead of promises, threats were now tried. Anne wrote to Lady Shelton that she was not to take any further trouble with that obstinate and undutiful girl. All that Anne had hitherto done had been out of charity and pity, and she was indifferent whether Mary submitted or not. She merely wanted to save Mary before she, herself, should give birth to a son, as she shortly expected to do. For after the birth of a prince, she well knew the King would not hesitate to punish Mary, and no mercy would be shown to her. This letter Lady Shelton, as if by chance, dropped in Mary's oratory; and the princess, finding it there, read it and took a copy of it, which she sent to Chapuis."

"Anne was bitterly disappointed to find that the will which she had attempted to bend was as inflexible as her own Almost her only hope now lay in the pregnancy to which she had alluded in her letter to Lady Shelton."

Noreys, also a gentleman of the King's Chamber, and the Keeper of his Privy Purse. Noreys had been for many years a favourite attendant of Henry. He had at once sided with Anne when she had begun her struggle; and he had been among the foremost of those who had worked the ruin of Wolsey. Ever since the death of the Cardinal, he had belonged to the little group of personal adherents of the Boleyns. He had married a daughter of Lord Daures of the South; but having been for some time a widower, it had occurred to him that he would please both Henry and Anne if he took as his second wife pretty Margaret Shelton, who, although she had lost her hold on Henry's caprice, had remained at Court. So a marriage had been arranged between him and Mistress Margaret. But of late he had become somewhat cold, and Anne attributed his estrangement to jealousy, for she had observed that Sir Francis Weston had been paying rather marked attentions to her cousin. Accordingly, on the 23rd of April, she had some private talk with Sir Francis, and upbraided him for making love to Margaret and for not loving his wife. The young man, knowing how great was her appetite for flattery, answered that he loved some one in her house more than either his wife or Margaret Shelton. Anne eagerly asked who it was, and he replied, "it is yourself." She affected to be angry, and rebuked him for his boldness; but the reprimand cannot have been very terrible, for Weston continued his talk, and told her that Noreys also came to her chamber more for her sake than for that of Madge, as Margaret Shelton was called.*

Weston and Noreys were shortly after beheaded.

"Thomas Wodehouse, Esq., eldest son of Sir Roger, was never knighted. 1st Philip and Mary he was High Sheriff of Norfolk and Suffolk, which office he served again 5 Elizabeth. He was Burgess in Parliament for the Burgh of Yarmouth in Norfolk; was in favour with Henry VIII., whom he faithfully served to his death, afterwards being retained in the service of Edward VI. ;

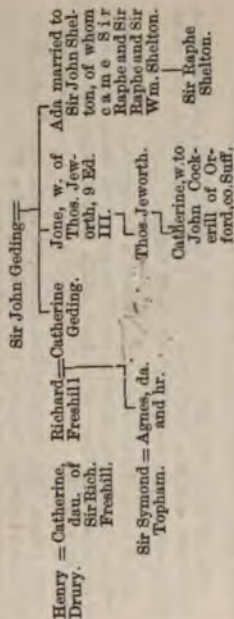

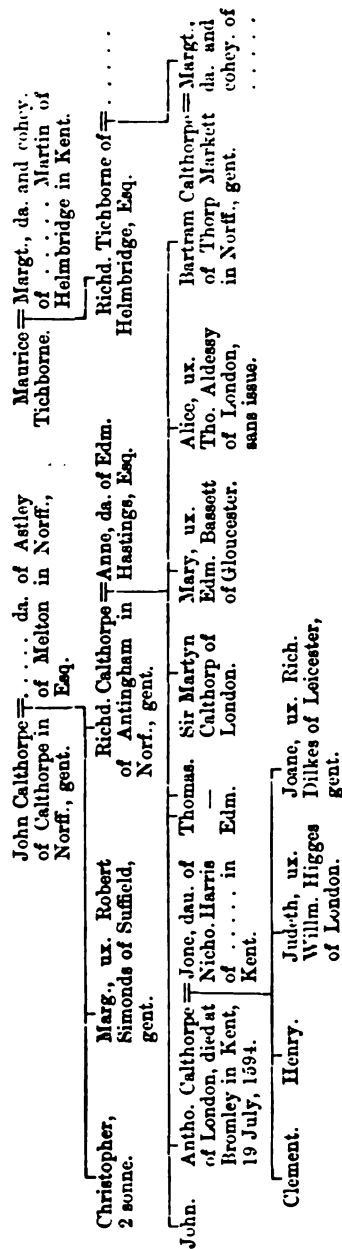

The early part of the Calthorpe Pedigree is involved in some confusion, which apparently has puzzled even such learned genealogists as Le Neve, Norris, and Blomefield; but the late Rev. James Lee Warner, in his interesting and valuable account of this family, published in Vol. IX. of *Norfolk Archaeology*, has cleared away many of these difficulties. The following descent of the Antingham branch is carried down to the present representative in the female line, "Thomas Calthorpe Blufeld, Esq.," to whom I am indebted for much information.

Bartram Calthorpe, gent., Wm. Broomwich, clerk, in trust for said Christopher and Joan his wife.

That Christopher Calthorpe (grandfather of Christopher) and Alienor his wife, were seized (*jure uxoris*) of Sterton, and premises there in Harleston, Fulham, Needham, and Redenhall, and settled same, by deed of 14 June, 20 Henry VIII., between Robert Garnels of Kinton, Suffolk; . . . Drury, Esq., Roger Woodhouse, Esq., Robert Holdich, Esq., Christopher Jenney, Esq., John Antoley, and John Garnels levied a fine of Sterton, etc. Christopher and Alienor (his grandparents) died, and James Calthorpe became seized thereof.

That Elizabeth, (wife of James Calthorpe) survived, and was seized of Sterton, with remainders over.

That Christopher Calthorpe made his will [here recited in English], dated 28 Sept., 1560, Jane his wife being with child.

That James Calthorpe was seized of Sutterley, etc., and by his deed of 5 June, 3 & 4 Ph. & M., granted the premises to William Fowle, Clerk, in trust for Christopher, son of James and Jane (wife of Christopher).

Messuages in Sutterley, also Blackney (Blackney), are held of Wm. Butts, Knt., as of the manor of Thorneage in soage; worth 20s.

Sterton, etc., is held of the Duke of Norfolk, as of the manor of Fornett, as a knight's fee, and is worth £20.

Premises in Sutterly, etc., are held of the Queen as of the possessions of the late Bishopric of Norwich: as a quarter knight's fee.

That Christopher Calthorpe died at Cockthorpe, 11 April, 1562. James Calthorpe is his son and heir, and was aged 5 years and more.

Jeremy Bowes and Joan his wife, late wife of Christopher Calthorpe, have occupied the premises (except Streston, etc.) from the death, and have taken the profits.

Elizabeth Calthorpe, now deceased, occupied the manor of Sterston; she died at Lynne day of

The jury say that Martin Calthorpe, late of London, Knt., deceased, was seized of the manors of Hickling Netherhall, Paulinge, Stalham Lynfordes and Weildes, in co. Norfolk; and of one capital messuage in Hickling, late parcel of Hickling Priory; of the rectory, vicarage, and tithes of Hickling, and divers lands, etc., in Hickling, Pawling, Waxtonnesam, Eccles, Brunsted, Stalham, Sutton, Catfield, Horsey, and Smallborough, in co. Norfolk, late parcel of the Priory of Hickling.

That the said Martin Calthorpe by deed of 2 May, 31 Eliz., made between him as Martin Calthorpe of London, Knt., (1), Thomas Aldersey of London, Esq., and Anthony Calthorp of London, citizen and mercer (2), in consideration of the marriage between him, the said Martin Calthorpe, and Dame Joan his wife, for her jointure and for his love to his sons, "amicabilibus et naturalibus," and for establishing the lands in the name and blood of the Calthorpes, assigned the premises to the said Aldersey and Calthorpe (as trustees) upon the following uses:—

Also reciting statute of uses and consequent seisin of Martin Calthorpe. Also his death, and that Dame Joan entered on the Manor of Hickling and manors, and she died seized thereof. Also entry of Martin Calthorpe, the son, and he being so seized with Martin Calthorpe, the grandson, by indenture of 14 January, 2 James, as Martin Calthorpe of London, Esq., and Martin Calthorpe, gent., his son and heir apparent (1), and Thomas Scambler of Brunsted (2), and by virtue of an act of first session of 1 James, being "an act for the jointure of Martin Calthorpe, gent.," conveyed to said T. household stuff, &c., and appoint him sole legatee and executor. Witnesses, Thomas Baleston, James Wharley, Richard Wharley.—*Proved* (P. C. C.) 22*nd* June, 1658, by Catherine Calthorpe, relict and administratrix of the goods of her husband John Calthorpe, who was named executor to his father Martyn Calthorpe, but who died before proving the above will. A memorial to be sett in the wall there, like that lately set up for my father and mother. It appears from the pleadings that in the will of Calthorpe there were two manors, called Kyballhall and Uppehall; and Kyballhall was called the manor of Calthorpe, and was held of the Honor of Gloucester, and had been held, from time out of memory, by the ancestors of William de Calthorpe. The manor of Uppehall was held of the Abbot of St. Benedict of Halm.

Mr. Frederic T. Colby of Hillsborough Terrace, Ilfracombe, has forwarded the following corrections to the "Colby Pedigree," which appeared in the first volume of the *Visitation of Norfolk*, and was compiled by the late Mr. G. A. Carthew, viz.:—

Arms: In the *Visitation* edited for the Harleian Society, the chevron is said to be "engrailed." This seems to be more correct, though, as regards actual practice, the chevron seems to have been borne "plain."

Crest: A broken sword. No mention is made of its being "enlined with blood," as it has usually been borne.

Page 97, l. 7. "Avelina." In the will of John Colby, his wife's name is "Elwyse." (?) a second wife.

„ 95, l. 10. The arms of "Jenkyn" are quartered with "Green" and "Hobart" on a cup which belonged to the late G. A. Carthew, Esq. (per bend sinister gules and azure, a lion rampant argent).

„ 95, l. 12. Faith, Agnes. In the *Harleian Visitation* these two ladies are put in the next generation, which is probably a mistake, as they are not mentioned in Edward Colby's will.

- Page 96, l. 3-5. "Buried at Cawston, 20 April." Rather "10 July, 1638."
On the 20 April, 1646, the burial of Anne, wife of Tho. Colby, is worded, so that Dr. Colby must have married twice.
"Dorothy mar. Bulwer." According to Davy, Dorothy mar. Michael Robinson of Norwich, in 1621.
- „ 96, l. 13. For "Archer" read "Arthur."
- „ 97, l. 4-5. "Rob. Southwell." According to the *Visitation of Suffolk*, 1561, ed. Metcalfe, p. 17, she mar. Rob. Nicholls of Brundish.
