The following resolutions were unanimously adopted:

Resolved, that we unqualifiedly commend and endorse the administration of President Harrison.

We congratulate the Republican party and the nation at large, on the passage and successful operation of the Republican tariff, known as the McKinley bill; and especially on that portion of it, known as the reciprocity clause, which has so largely increased the markets open to the manufacturers, farmers and producers of our country and has already turned the balance of trade so largely in our favor.

We commend the administration of the state department for its dignified, masterly and American treatment of the fishery question on the New England coast, upon the successful conclusion of the Samoan treaty, upon the successful and peaceful termination of the Chilean difficulty with the pen, without the aid of the sword; and upon its firm bearing on the Behring sea controversy with Great Britain.

We are heartily in favor of the free coinage of American silver.

We strenuously object to any tinkering with the tariff and recommend that no backward steps be taken. A proper protective tariff on wool and lead, and the encouragement of the manufacture of sugar are of vital importance to the best interests of the Territory, and that the course of our recent Democratic legislators in refusing to protect the beet sugar industry of Utah, merits and receives our hearty and unqualified condemnation.

Resolved, That in our opinion, no public man, who has been honored by the Republican party has a right to disobey its mandates, and refuse to become its standard bearer. It is admitted by all that our present secretary of state, James G. Blaine, is the strongest man who can be named by the national Republican convention at Minneapolis as its candidate for president of the United States.

Resolved, That our delegates to the Republican Territorial convention at Provo be instructed to use their influence to elect two delegates and two alternates to the National Republican convention, who will do all in their power to secure the nomination of James G. Blaine, and to use all efforts to induce his acceptance thereof.
