N B W Y O R K, March 20. By a letter from a gentleman in Gibraltar to his friend in Philadelphia, dated the 8th of December last, we learn that several Algerine Corsairs had sailed out of the Straights; from which great danger was to be apprehended of their boarding some of our trading ships at sea. The postscript, however, of the same letter, which is dated the 11th of the same month, says that the Commodore had sent out some frigates after them to prevent mischief.

" A PROCLAMATION.

By his Excellency ARTHUR ST. CLAIR, Governor and Commander in Chief of the territory of the United States northwest of the River Ohio, and Commissioner Plenipotentiary for removing all causes of controversy between the Indians in the Northern Department of the United States.

" To all Persons to whom these Presents shall come, Greeting:

" WHEREAS a treaty was concluded at Fort Harmar on the 9th day of February, in the present year, with the Six Nations, the Wyandot, Delaware, Chippewa, Ottawa, Peotowatamie, and Sacnations of Indians, and the United States, whereby peace and friendship have been renewed and confirmed between the United States and the before mentioned Indian nations: All the citizens and subjects of the United States are hereby requested to take notice of the same, and to abstain from any act of hostility, injury, or injustice to the said nations, and every individual of the said nations, as they shall answer the contrary at their peril.

The proprietor, Mr. JOHN RAYMOND, having at his sole expence erected machines for carding, spinning and twisting cotton, cleaning wool, &c. It is hoped that our farmers, who have wool to sell, will give our own manufacturers the preference, and not vend the same out of the State, to the great detriment of the poor people employed therein.

B O S T O N, March 23.

Orders have been issued by his Excellency our worthy Governor to Col. Tyler, commandant of the first troop of horse in Suffolk division, to hold his troop of horse in readiness, to escort his Excellency the Vice-President of the United States, when he shall out for the seat of federal government.

A vessel which arrived here Wednesday last, in—days from Lisbon, brings an account that his Britannic Majesty was alive on the 14th of January last, but his life was depaired of; and that the Prince of Wales was appointed sole Regent.

P R O V I D E N C E, March 28.

Capt. Stanton arrived at Stonington on Wednesday last from Cape-Francois. By him we learn, that Capt. Thomas Munro, in a Sloop belonging to this Port, arrived at the Cape on the 5th Inst. He was bound from Surinam for this Place, but had been beat off the Coast several Times during the Winter, and when he reached the Cape had been 99 Days at sea.

Wednesday last the Hon. GEORGE PARTRIDGE, Esq; one of the federal Representatives for the State of Massachusetts, arrived in Town, and Yesterday sailed for New-York on Board Capt. Allen's Packet, to take the Seat of Congress.
