

# Two Experts to Participate In Cerebral Palsy Clinic

Two national authorities in the field of rehabilitation have accepted invitations to participate in the cerebral palsy clinic to be conducted at the University of Utah Aug. 6 to 24 under sponsorship of the Utah Society for the Physically Handicapped.

They are Dr. John J. Lee, dean of the graduate school at Wayne University, and consultant in special education to the National Society for Crippled Children and Adults, and Dr. Esther Snell, director of the cerebral palsy treatment center, Lubbock, Tex. Dr. Lee is past president of the National Rehabilitation Assn., and of the International Council for Exceptional Children. He is a member of the executive committee, Midwest Conference on Graduate Study and Research, and in the field of special education is considered one of the nation's leading authorities.

The Lubbock Clinic, of which Dr. Snell was one of the organizers, is providing for the treatment and training of more than 150 children. Before becoming associated with the clinic, Dr. Snell served as health counselor for the W. K. Kellogg Foundation from 1934 to 1937.

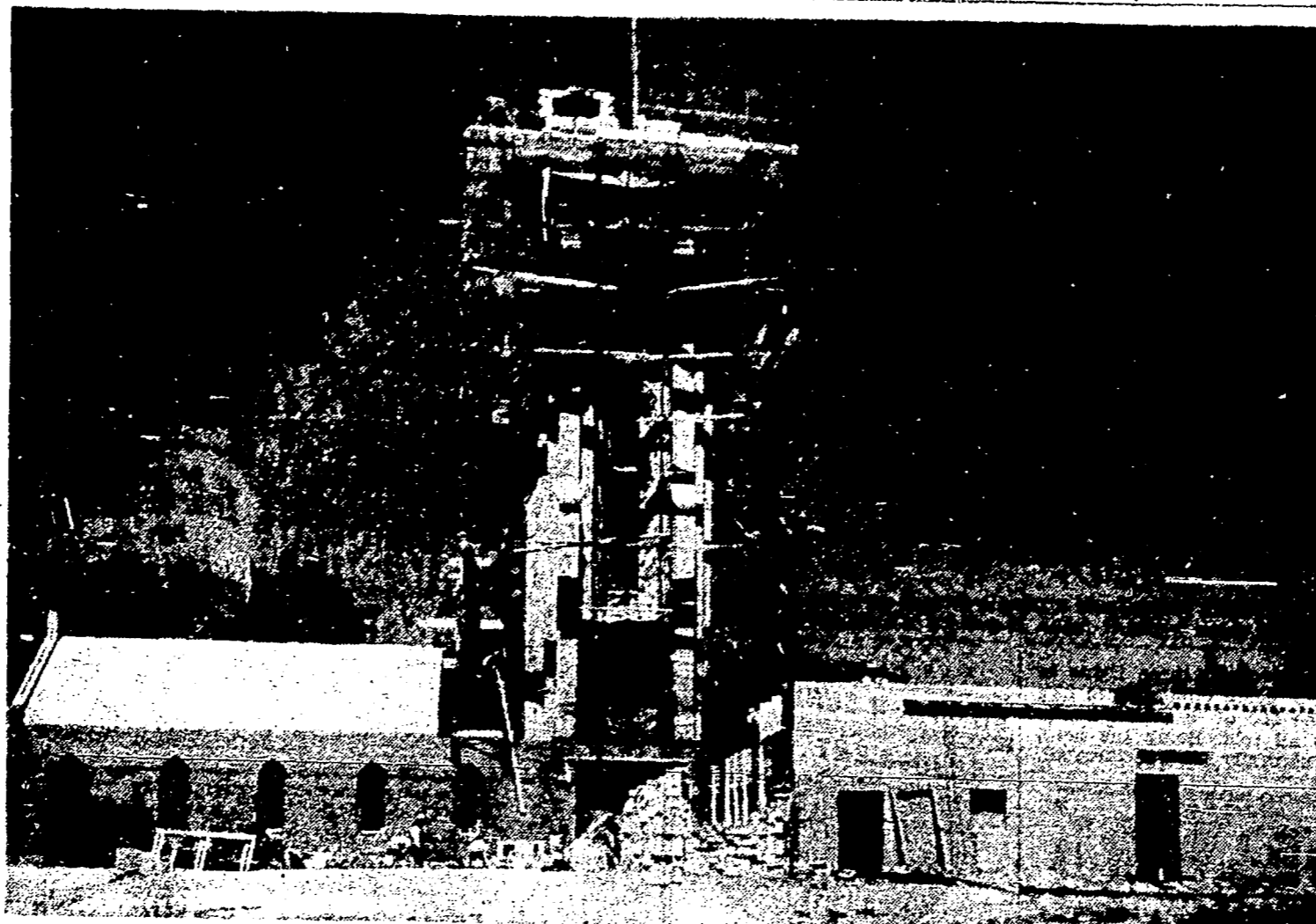
# Draper Prepares Tractor Rodeo

# Counsel for Convicts Protests 'Security Measures' in Court

A defense attorney for three Utah State prison inmates said Saturday the trio may not get a fair trial because they are forced to wear handcuffs, leg irons and chains in the court room.

He also contended too many prison officers and Salt Lake County sheriff deputies are being used to guard the defendants in court and said these factors—plus newspaper photographs of the men—may prevent their getting a fair trial.

Alwin Forrest Strauss, 23; Gerald Lee West, 18, and Wayne Johnson, 21, were arraigned Saturday before Judge Clarence E. Baker on a charge of attempt to escape from the Point of the Mountain prison.

Strauss also is charged with having threatened Guard Carlton W. Hobbler with a knife, forcing him to release Johnson

and West from the grade in the prison's segregation tier on June 19.

Gayle Hunt, who with Brent T. Lynch Jr. represents the convicts, asked the court that it order the handcuffs, leg irons and chains removed when the men are in court and that only the usual number of officers be allowed in the courtroom during subsequent appearances.

The court, while not ruling on the proposal, continued arraignment of the trio until next Saturday. Defense counsel indicated further motions will be offered at that time.

As on previous court appearances, Strauss and Johnson were cuffed together. A chain, fastened to each man's wide leather stomach belt, offered additional security.

West also was handcuffed throughout his stay in the courtroom.

# Lack of Bronze Holds Up Pioneer Trails Markers

As a result of a government freeze, lack of bronze temporarily is delaying the monument scheduled by the Utah Pioneer Trails and Landmarks Assn., according to John D. Giles, executive secretary of Harrisville, Weber County. Other markers in which the Pioneer Trails group is cooperating also are being delayed, Mr. Giles said.

Consideration is being given to a different type of marker, without the use of bronze, where such a marker would be feasible, Mr. Giles added.

Scheduled for possible erection this year were six markers: One near Huntington, Emery County, to mark the most northern point of the Old Spanish Trail; the site at approximately 65 S. Main of the first overland telegraph station in Salt Lake City, where the wires were joined in October, 1861; Travelers' Rest pony express station, about 6400 S. State; Echo pony express station at the junction of Echo and Weber Canyons; fork of the California Trail southwest of Cedar City, and a marker honoring Martin Henderson Harris, founder of Harrisville, Weber County.

Other markers in which the Pioneer Trails group is cooperating also are being delayed, Mr. Giles said.
